#### HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 739**

Offered by Representative Halbrook:

WHEREAS, The oil and natural gas industry is a vital part of the United States' economy, and increasing domestic energy production and reducing dependence on foreign supplies are in the best interest of our nation's strategic and economic well-being; and

WHEREAS, High oil and gas prices, our growing reliance on imported oil, and price volatility clearly demonstrate the imperative to change course and expand domestic oil and gas production; and

WHEREAS, Expanding domestic production will reduce our dependence on foreign oil and natural gas and significantly reduce the billions of dollars we send abroad each year; and

WHEREAS, As our reliance on oil and natural gas will necessarily continue for the foreseeable future, we can no longer rule out the value of our own significant proven oil and gas reserves nor the value of a future significant discovery anywhere in or off the shores of the United States; taking advantage of our own resources will create new investment and new jobs here at home; and

WHEREAS, The Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) is an area of some 1.76 billion acres submerged off the United States' coasts that is controlled by the federal government; approximately 97% of the OCS is under federal moratoria preventing any exploration or production of oil and natural gas; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) estimates that the OCS contains 86 billion barrels of oil and 420 trillion cubic feet of natural gas; because exploration is prohibited on the vast majority of the OCS, these estimates are primarily based on survey projections and are likely quite conservative; additionally, approximately 83% of federal lands onshore, containing some 28 billion barrels of oil and 207 trillion cubic feet of natural gas, are under moratoria or severely restricted; and

WHEREAS, In the 26 years since the OCS moratoria were put into place, the technology utilized to extract oil and gas has evolved, significantly reducing the environmental impact of producing the resources; advanced multidimensional seismic imaging allows a much higher degree of accuracy in locating oil and gas deposits, which reduces the amount of drilling necessary while increasing the amount of resources recovered; pressure gauges and safety valves incorporated into offshore production facilities diminish the possibility of spills; these technologies have reduced the spillage rate to just 0.001%; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. has significant reserves of liquid fuels derived from coal, oil sands, and oil shale as well as expanded infrastructure to enable greater access to these resources located throughout North America; and

WHEREAS, According to the Department of Energy, the United States has recoverable reserves of coal equivalent in energy value to nearly six trillion barrels of oil, oil shale amounting to more than two trillion barrels of oil, and heavy oil and oil sands equal to another 154 billion barrels of oil, some portion of which can be converted to liquid fuels such as gasoline and diesel; and

WHEREAS, Unfortunately, much like the moratoria on energy development on the OCS, there is also a legal prohibition against the federal government leasing much of this land for exploration for oil shale;

keeping these lands off limits is stunting the investments necessary to improve the technology to extract these valuable resources in an environmentally responsible manner; and

WHEREAS, If the United States could embark on new domestic oil and gas exploration efforts and invest in building its domestic energy infrastructure, it would not only help with the energy transition here at home, it would also help keep costs down for American families, strengthen our economy, create jobs, and make American energy secure; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we strongly urge the President of the United States to develop and implement new sound domestic energy exploration and production policies to strengthen U.S. energy security and ensure that the United States can provide its people with stable, affordable, and reliable energy prices; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the U.S. to undertake a sustained and enduring federal research and development effort, in partnership with private industry, universities, and national laboratories to evaluate technologies and practices to minimize the impact of the development of these underutilized fuels on the land and water resources of the United States, while also evaluating technologies and practices to reduce the energy intensity and carbon footprint of these fuel sources; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President of the United States, the United States Secretary of the Interior, the United States Secretary of Transportation, the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 740**

Offered by Representative Halbrook:

WHEREAS, Transportation infrastructure is critical to the economy and future growth of Illinois; and WHEREAS, Disruptions to the distribution of goods have led to shortages and increased inflationary pressures; and

WHEREAS, The transportation equipment supply chain remains clogged following the stresses and production closures from the pandemic; notably, class 8 vehicle production has stalled in large part from the semiconductor chip shortage, which some sources estimate could end as early as this fall or as late as 2023; and

WHEREAS, Equipment producers are also facing delays and high prices for other source materials and components, such as rubber, steel, aluminum, tires, suspension parts, and wiring harnesses, which is keeping the cost of commercial trucks and trailers high; and

WHEREAS, The federal government should implement changes to eliminate restrictions that would impede the transport of goods; and

WHEREAS, There are literally hundreds of regulations that apply to carriers, and the federal body that oversees regulations is the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration, which is part of the U.S. Department of Transportation; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration to examine transportation restrictions in the United States to assist with eliminating supply chain shortages; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to President Joe Biden and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 741**

Offered by Representative Halbrook:

WHEREAS, The peaceful peoples of the world currently face a renewed energy crisis, marked by the feckless drift of key segments of global energy supply into totalitarian hands; and

WHEREAS, Much of the oil, gas, and other energy that currently flows, or until recently has flowed, into the stream of operating consumption of the world's peaceful peoples comes from non-allies of the United States; and

WHEREAS, One of these non-allies is the Russian Federation; it is the largest geographic nation on earth, with the largest area of land mass and the largest access to geological resources that include oil and gas; and

WHEREAS, The peaceful peoples of the world, especially the United States, ought not to buy oil and gas from non-allies; instead, we should redouble our efforts to gain true energy independence; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the United States should not buy oil or gas from non-allies of our country, and we urge exerting diplomatic efforts to discourage other peaceful peoples of the world from doing so; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend the sacrifices being made by ordinary Americans who are currently being forced to pay record prices for motor fuel as a result of the current international situation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to President Joe Biden, U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken, U.S. Secretary of Energy Jennifer Granholm, and all members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 742**

Offered by Representative Sosnowski:

WHEREAS, Professional sports franchises often relocate to address seating capacity limits, restructure debt, modernize the stadium experience, or to gain full authority over a new stadium; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Bears professional football team has expressed a willingness to consider property in the Village of Arlington Heights; and

WHEREAS, Chicago Bears fans have also expressed an openness towards the team moving, with a recent informal survey of 6,000 people by Patch.com indicating that over 70 percent of correspondents said they would like to see the team move; and

WHEREAS, The former Arlington Park presents itself as a fresh development opportunity for the Village of Arlington Heights and the Chicago Bears team; it is conveniently situated off a major highway, just a 20-minute drive from O'Hare International Airport, and, crucially, it has its own dedicated stop on the Metra commuter rail line; and

WHEREAS, The economics of major professional sport leagues have been changing dramatically in recent years; from television and streaming rights to team-sanctioned legalized sports betting, worldwide merchandising deals, and massive media empires, teams have become huge corporate conglomerates with wide-ranging interests far beyond the stadium; and

WHEREAS, The location of the Chicago Bears team matters much less than their name, which implies that the team is one with Chicago so long as the team keeps its namesake; and

WHEREAS, Moving to a stadium in Arlington Heights presents an economic opportunity for a top-of-the-line stadium featuring a higher capacity and burgeoning entertainment, restaurant, and retail industry; the Arlington Heights location also provides easier access via the State's roadways and Metra commuter rail lines; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the owners of the Chicago Bears to move the team to Arlington Park; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Chicago Bears organization should move to the Arlington Heights location without requesting incentives from local or state government that would go toward stadium construction; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Chicago Bears organization, Chicago Mayor Lori Lightfoot, and Arlington Heights Mayor Tom Hayes.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 743**

Offered by Representative Kifowit:

WHEREAS, The Vietnam War was fought in Vietnam from 1961 to 1975 and involved North Vietnam and the Viet Cong in conflict with the United States Armed Forces and South Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, The United States became involved by serving in an advisory role to the South Vietnamese in 1961; and

WHEREAS, In 1965, United States Armed Forces ground combat units arrived in Vietnam, and by the end of that year, there were 80,000 United States troops in Vietnam with a peak of approximately 500,000 troops in 1969; and

WHEREAS, On January 27, 1973, the Treaty of Paris was signed, which required the release of all United States prisoners-of-war held in North Vietnam and the withdrawal of all United States Armed Forces from South Vietnam; by March 30, 1973, the United States Armed Forces completed the withdrawal of combat troops from Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, More than 58,000 members of the United States Armed Forces lost their lives in Vietnam, and more than 300,000 members of the Armed Forces were wounded; and

WHEREAS, In 1982, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial was dedicated in Washington, D.C. to commemorate those members of the United States Armed Forces who died or were declared missing-in-action in Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, Members of the United States Armed Forces who served bravely and faithfully for the United States during the Vietnam War were caught upon their return home in the crossfire of public debate about the involvement of the United States in the Vietnam War; and

WHEREAS, March 30th marks the anniversary of the day that combat and combat support units withdrew completely from South Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, On March 7, 2011, the 112th U.S. Congress agreed to Senate Resolution 55, honoring veterans who served in Vietnam by designating March 30th as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day"; and

WHEREAS, The establishment of a "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day" is an appropriate way to honor those members of the United States Armed Forces who served in Vietnam during the Vietnam War; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 30, 2022 as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all citizens of the State of Illinois are encouraged to honor our Vietnam veterans.

#### **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 81**

Offered by Representative Harper:

WHEREAS, Heirs' property is defined by the United States Department of Agriculture as land that has been passed down informally from generation to generation without clear title or documented legal ownership; every heir has rights to the property, but the lack of a clear title creates confusion regarding taxes, the use of the land, and the ability to sell the land; and

WHEREAS, Without much trust in the legal system, many of the African American farmers who purchased or were deeded land after the Civil War died without a will, and the property was passed down informally; each successive generation of heirs further divided the title to the property and complicated the heirs' ability to determine the legal owners of the property; and

WHEREAS, Some of the consequences that the heirs' property owners face are disagreements over which heirs have the right to occupy the land and how the land may be used, difficulty selling the property due to a lack of a clear title, the exclusion from some governmental support programs, including disaster relief funds, the inability to claim the land as an asset to obtain a mortgage or other loan, and the loss of land due to disagreements over responsibility for the payment of taxes; and

WHEREAS, Heirs' property is the leading cause of involuntary land loss among African Americans, and the United States Department of Agriculture reported the loss of 80 percent of the land owned by African American farm owners since 1910; the rate of African American land loss has been far greater than for other racial and ethnic groups in the same time period; it remains a continuing and systemic problem, as it is a significant factor in the wealth gap between white and African American populations, with African Americans having ten percent of the wealth of white Americans; and

WHEREAS, There is no national data regarding the amount of land held as heirs' property; some organizations have attempted to develop models to estimate the information; it is challenging to obtain specific data because every state and each county within each state compiles real estate ownership data differently; and

WHEREAS, Owning land is significant, especially for African Americans; it allows for increased personal and economic freedom; many Americans, including African Americans, believed that real economic and political independence could only be achieved by owning land; landowners provide economic stability within their communities through payment of property taxes and support for local business; in addition, they are more likely to be civically engaged, having greater political influence; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Heirs' Property Study Task Force to examine current and prospective methods to address heirs' property issues in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall:

- (1) determine the amount of land in Illinois that is subject to the heirs' property system;
- (2) study the impacts of federal and State legislation on the partition of the land subject to heirs' property;
- (3) analyze approaches and methods undertaken by other states to address heirs' property and study if those methods could be applied to Illinois; and
- (4) determine the costs heirs' property presents to the economic well-being of Illinois and estimate the benefits of proactive measures taken to address heirs' property; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Task Force shall be comprised of the following members, who shall serve without compensation:

- (1) 3 members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House, one who shall serve as co-chair;
  - (2) 3 members of the House of Representatives appointed by the House Minority Leader;
  - (3) 3 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate President, one who shall serve as co-chair;
  - (4) 3 members of the Senate appointed by the Senate Minority Leader;
  - (5) The Director of the Department of Agriculture or his or her designee;
  - (6) The Director of the Housing Development Authority or his or her designee;
  - (7) The Director of the Department of Natural Resources or his or her designee; and
- (8) The Director of the Illinois Municipal League or his or her designee appointed by the Governor; and be it further

RESOLVED, The Department of Agriculture shall provide administrative support for the Task Force; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Task Force shall submit its final report to the General Assembly no later than December 31, 2022, and upon the filing of its final report, is dissolved.

#### **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 82**

Offered by Representative Harper:

WHEREAS, The last four decades have represented a period of significant demographic change in the United States; now more than ever, Black immigrants compose a significant percentage of both the immigrant and Black populations in the U.S. overall; and

WHEREAS, Black immigrants face disproportionate interactions with the criminal justice system and encounter more discrimination based on their race as well as immigrant status; just as African Americans suffer disproportionately high arrest, prosecution, and incarceration rates, so too are Black immigrants, despite no evidence that they engage in more criminalized activities in comparison to any other racial group; Black immigrants are also disproportionately impacted by the compounding impact of the immigration enforcement system, where numerous federal agencies and programs work in conjunction with local law enforcement to criminalize, detain, and deport immigrants; these disparities in policy and law concerning Black immigrants are rooted in racism and unjustly target Black immigrants at all stages of the process; and

WHEREAS, The Biden Administration has pledged to develop a pathway to lawful permanent status for undocumented immigrants, but advocates are asking how President Biden will address the overall plight of Black immigrants; and

WHEREAS, As the number of Black immigrants living in the United States continues to rise, debates around immigration must acknowledge and rectify the injustice inherent in the system; and

WHEREAS, There is much work to be done to address the struggles of Black immigrants, who have been left out of policy decisions for too long; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois is committed to protecting Black immigrants; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Task Force on Black Immigrants is created and charged with the task of studying the state of Black immigrants in Illinois and providing recommendations on how to assist them; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall consist of the following 16 members, who shall serve without compensation:

- (1) One member appointed by the Speaker of the House, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (2) One member appointed by the Senate President, who shall serve as co-chair;
- (3) One member appointed by the House Minority Leader;
- (4) One member appointed by the Senate Minority Leader;
- (5) One member appointed by the Chair of the House Black Caucus;
- (6) One member appointed by the Chair of the Senate Black Caucus;
- (7) One member appointed by Governor;
- (8) One member appointed by the Lt. Governor;
- (9) The Director of the Department of Human Rights or his or her designee;
- (10) The Director of the Department of Human Services or his or her designee;
- (11) 3 members representing diplomatic missions and trade organizations that serve Black immigrants appointed by the Governor;
- (12) 2 members from an organization dedicated to defending the rights and improving the quality of life for immigrants appointed by the Speaker of the House; and
- (13) 1 member from a organization dedicated to improving the quality of life for African Americans in the State of Illinois appointed by the Senate President; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Department of Human Rights shall provide administrative support for the Task Force; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall meet at the call of the co-chairs; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall submit its final report to the General Assembly no later than December 31, 2022, and upon the filing of the report, is dissolved.
