HOUSE RESOLUTION 759

Offered by Representative Lilly:

WHEREAS, International Women's Day commemorates the global, centuries-long struggle of women to participate fully and equitably in society; and

WHEREAS, Women's Day first emerged as the result of various labor and suffrage movements in North America and Europe in the early 20th century; and

WHEREAS, The United Nations celebrated its first official International Women's Day on March 8, 1975 during International Women's Year; and

WHEREAS, Gender equality is a fundamental human right, and women's full empowerment and participation is integral to solving society's most threatening social, economic, and political problems; and

WHEREAS, International Women's Day is intended to focus the global community's attention on accelerating gender parity; and

WHEREAS, The theme of this year's International Women's Day, Break the Bias, calls on all of us to challenge inequality and to take meaningful action towards a more equitable and inclusive world; and

WHEREAS, The health disparities that women face have been exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, Healthy women are the backbone of a thriving, stable, and resilient society; and

WHEREAS, International Women's Day is an opportune time to raise awareness of the inequity in women's health and begin efforts to improve such inequities while encouraging all women to prioritize their health; and

WHEREAS, March 8th of each year is recognized as International Women's Day by countries around the world to celebrate the past, present, and future achievements of women as well as the obstacles that women continue to face in their struggle for equal rights and gender equality; and

WHEREAS, International Women's Day is a time to reflect on the progress we have made in the economic, social, and political achievements of women and to reaffirm our commitment to pursue strategies that guarantee the basic human rights of women and girls both statewide and globally, to promote meaningful and significant participation of women in all facets of our society, to encourage equitable access

to and healthcare for all women and girls, and to support policy initiatives that seek to achieve gender parity and empower all women; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare March 8, 2022 as "International Women's Day" in the State of Illinois in order to reflect on the progress made thus far in women's rights; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we reaffirm the State's commitment to pursue strategies that guarantee the basic human rights of women and girls, to promote meaningful and significant participation of women in all aspects of our society, to encourage equitable access to and healthcare for all women and girls, and to support policy initiatives that seek to achieve gender parity and empower all women.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 760

Offered by Representative Kifowit:

WHEREAS, All citizens possess the basic human right to the preservation of personal dignity; and

WHEREAS, All citizens deserve the investment of every possible resource to ensure their lasting physical, mental, and emotional well-being; and

WHEREAS, Post-traumatic stress can result from any number of stressors, including combat, interpersonal violence, severe impact collisions, natural disaster, and exposure to the suffering of others; and

WHEREAS, The diagnosis known as Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) was initially formulated in 1980 by the American Psychiatric Association to commonly describe and categorize the psychological aftermath of severe traumatic distress; and

WHEREAS, Post-traumatic distress has historically been unjustly portrayed as a mental illness caused by a preexisting flaw of character or ability, and association with the word "disorder" generates a stigma that perpetuates this misconception; and

WHEREAS, It has been shown through electro-magnetic imaging that severe post-traumatic stress causes physical changes within the brain that are more accurately described as an injury rather than a disorder; and

WHEREAS, Referring to post-traumatic stress as a disorder can disparage the injured and discourage them from seeking timely care for their behavioral health needs; and

WHEREAS, Post-traumatic stress injury exhibiting compliance with criteria B through H of §309.81 in the Diagnostic Statistical Manual deserves equal compensation strictly matching that presently allowed under the law for post-traumatic stress disorder; and

WHEREAS, All citizens suffering from post-traumatic stress injury deserve our compassion and consideration; the brave men and women who received these wounds while risking their lives to protect our freedom, health, and welfare deserve special recognition for their gallantry, commitment, devotion, and sacrifice; and

WHEREAS, Timely access to appropriate treatment of post-traumatic stress injury can diminish complications and prevent suicide; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare June 27, 2022 as Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we declare June 2022 as Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Month; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Departments of Public Health, Military Affairs, and Veterans Affairs to continue working to educate victims of interpersonal violence, combat, life-threatening accidents, or natural disasters and their families, as well as the general public, about the causes, symptoms, and treatment of post-traumatic stress injury, and we encourage all citizens and residents to join in this worthy observance; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Governor.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 762

Offered by Representative Moeller:

WHEREAS, The members of the House of Representatives wish to congratulate Terry Cosgrove on his retirement from serving as the president and CEO of Personal PAC; and

WHEREAS, In addition to his Personal PAC responsibilities, Terry Cosgrove has also lent assistance to NARAL Pro-Choice America, Planned Parenthood affiliates across the country, the National Organization for Women (NOW), the National Pro-Choice Resource Center, Voters for Choice, the Women's Campaign Fund, Emily's List, and the Emergency Abortion Loan Fund over the past 31 years; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove worked as a tenant counselor in central Illinois for several years beginning in 1977, where he helped low-income women who were being evicted from their apartments for non-payment of rent and unable to pay their gas and electric bills; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove served as the volunteer record keeper for the Emergency Abortion Loan Fund that raised and lent money to low-income women who wanted to obtain a legal abortion; through this work, he became a pro-choice advocate 40 years ago; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove played a pivotal role in the restoration of abortion services for low-income women at John H. Stroger Jr. Hospital of Cook County in 1992; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove was instrumental in the passing of House Bill 40 in 2017, the passing of the Reproductive Health Act in 2019, and the repeal of the dangerous Parental Notice of Abortion law in 2021; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove was appointed to the Illinois Human Rights Commission by Governor Pat Quinn, with confirmation by the Illinois Senate, in 2011; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove was honored with the Freedom of Choice award by the Chicago Abortion Fund and the Ally Award by the Lake County Democratic Women; he was inducted into the Chicago LGBTQ Hall of Fame in 2014 for his role in filing the first successful national lawsuit challenging discrimination based on sexual orientation in public accommodations in 1980; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove has an academic background in the area of economic justice and equity as it pertains to gender discrimination and the treatment of women as second class citizens; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove earned his Master of Social Work from the Jane Addams School of Social Work with a focus on public policy and its impact on reproductive rights; he earned his second master's degree in Labor & Industrial Relations; and

WHEREAS, Terry Cosgrove has committed his life to making sure laws that terrorize low-income and young women are repealed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we congratulate Terry Cosgrove on his retirement from serving as the president and CEO of Personal PAC and commend him for his years of dedicated service; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Terry Cosgrove as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 86

Offered by Representative Windhorst:

WHEREAS, It is important and appropriate to honor and remember the men and women of the Illinois State Police Trooper Patrol for their contributions to improving public safety; and

WHEREAS, Trooper James Grady Sutton and Chief Daniel Law of the Harrisburg Police Department were shot and killed during an arrest; and

WHEREAS, As Trooper Sutton and Chief Law were escorting three suspects in a stolen car to jail, the violators drew weapons and opened fire on the officers; and

WHEREAS, The officers stopped the vehicle at Poplar and Vine Streets, directing the driver to City Hall for further questioning; Trooper Sutton stood on the left running board and Chief Law on the right running board of the vehicle; as the vehicle approached City Hall, the driver accelerated, and the men in the car drew weapons, killing both officers; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Sutton was struck in the chest and fell to the street near City Hall; before being shot in the head and body, Chief Law was able to cling to the vehicle for four blocks, exchanging gunfire with the suspects and killing one of them until he finally dropped from the vehicle; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Sutton died from his wounds following emergency surgery shortly after midnight; the suspect killed by Chief Law was found in the abandoned vehicle ten miles north of Harrisburg; the other two fugitives were later captured in the state of Virginia and returned to Illinois for trial, where they both received life sentences; and

WHEREAS, Trooper Sutton and Chief Law were buried in adjoining plots in Sunset Lawn Cemetery in Harrisburg; Trooper Sutton was a three-year veteran of the Illinois State Police and was survived by his wife; and

WHEREAS, The service and sacrifice of Trooper Sutton and Chief Law to the people of Illinois should never be forgotten; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate Illinois Route 34 within the city limits of Harrisburg as the "Trooper Sutton and Chief Law Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations, consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name of "Trooper Sutton and Chief Law Memorial Highway"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the surviving members of the families of Trooper Sutton and Chief Law, the Illinois State Police, the Harrisburg Police Department, and the Secretary of the Department of Transportation.
