MESSAGES FROM THE SENATE

A message from the Senate by

Ms. Shipley, Secretary:

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9

WHEREAS, Illinois now holds the distinction of being first in the nation in the number of people exonerated by DNA evidence in non-capital cases; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has made great strides in identifying and attempting to address the causes of wrongful convictions in capital cases, but has not extended systemic reforms to non-capital cases; and

WHEREAS, The incarceration of an innocent person not only works an injustice against that individual, but also harms society in that the real perpetrator of a crime remains free and able to commit additional criminal acts; and

WHEREAS, Wrongful convictions result in an erosion of public confidence in the judicial system; and WHEREAS, The Appellate Courts review cases only for procedural error and do not provide a forum for presenting claims of actual innocence; and

WHEREAS, Defendants in non-capital cases do not have the right to counsel on post-conviction, that stage of proceedings in which new evidence supporting a claim of actual innocence can be presented, and therefore are unable to effectively present such a claim; and

WHEREAS, Defendants against whom the death penalty is not pursued, or for whom the death penalty has been taken off the table, do not have the resources available to adequately defend themselves; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Illinois Justice Study Committee, hereinafter referred to as the Committee, consisting of 17 members, and appointed as follows:

- (1) Three members appointed by the Governor;
- (2) Three members appointed by the President of the Senate;
- (3) Two members appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate;
- (4) Three members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (5) Two members appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives;
- (6) One member appointed by the Cook County State's Attorney;
- (7) One member appointed by the Office of the Cook County Public Defender;
- (8) One member appointed by the Office of the State Appellate Defender; and
- (9) One member appointed by the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the appointed members shall be from diverse backgrounds so as to reflect the diverse citizenry of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall review all non-capital wrongful conviction cases that have been resolved as of the effective date of this resolution and which resulted from DNA testing; a pardon granted on the basis of actual innocence; and dismissal of charges or acquittals upon a retrial based on relief granted by either the Illinois Appellate or Supreme Courts, or the federal District, Court of Appeals, or United States Supreme Court; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall review any other relevant material, identify the most common causes of wrongful convictions in non-capital cases, identify current laws, rules and procedures implicated in each type of causation, and identify solutions through research, experts, public hearing, and any other source the Committee deems appropriate; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall consider rules, procedures, educational, and legislative reforms that can aid in eliminating future wrongful convictions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall consider whether the State of Illinois should put into place a procedure for addressing claims of factual innocence prior to appellate review of a conviction; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall do a cost analysis of wrongful convictions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall elicit voluntary assistance from educational, legal, civic, and professional organizations and institutions as well as notable individuals; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall submit its final report to the Governor and the General Assembly on or before December 31, 2008.

Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14

WHEREAS, There has been, and continues to be, a significant expansion in the volume of personal property sold through pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, and other resellers; and

WHEREAS, There has been, and continues to be, a similar increase in the volume of stolen personal property sold through pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, and other resellers; and

WHEREAS, Access by law enforcement to sales-related information generated by pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, and other resellers has always been an important tool in combating burglary, robbery, theft, and other crimes directed at personal property; and

WHEREAS, Recent advances in electronic data collection and compilation have greatly simplified both the reporting of sales-related information by pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, and other resellers; and

WHEREAS, These same advances have created opportunities for law enforcement to access sales-related information at increasingly shorter intervals after the date of sale; and

WHEREAS, Law enforcement agencies, pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, resellers, and information technology-related businesses in several states have created differing systems to provide law enforcement with timely access to sales-related information; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created the Re-Sellers' Electronic Reporting Task Force, consisting of 19 members appointed as follows:

- (1) four members of the General Assembly, one member appointed by the President of the Senate, one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate, one member appointed by the Speaker of the House, and one member appointed by the Minority Leader of the House; the members appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House shall serve as co-chairs of the Task Force;
 - (2) three members appointed by the Governor; and
- (3) twelve members who are not members of the General Assembly appointed by the co-chairs of the Task Force representing a range of interests, including: law enforcement, pawnbrokers, consignment sellers, auctioneers, insurance companies, and the general public; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all members shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for their reasonable and necessary expenses from funds appropriated for that purpose; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall study the various systems, technologies, and methods of operation for providing law enforcement with timely access to information relating to the sales of personal property by pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, and other resellers, and shall consult with such law enforcement agencies, pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, resellers, and other persons or entities as it may deem fit, including, but not limited to, providers of technology and services relating to the collection, compilation, storage, and access to such information; and be it further

RESOLVED, That on or before December 31, 2008, the Task Force shall report to the General Assembly concerning its recommendations regarding the systems and technologies, together with their usage and potential funding mechanisms and sources, to be implemented to create a state-wide system for the collection of nation-wide sales-related information by pawnbrokers, auction services, consignment sellers, and other resellers, and for the compilation, storage and timely access to such information by law enforcement and shall include proposed legislation to implement its recommendations, if needed; and be it further

RESOLVED, That upon issuing its report, the Task Force shall be dissolved.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 256

Offered by Representative Flider:

WHEREAS, There are thousands of public, academic, school, governmental, and specialized libraries in the United States and the State of Illinois that provide excellent and invaluable service to library users regardless of age, ethnicity, or socioeconomic background; and

WHEREAS, Libraries provide millions of people with the knowledge and information they need to live, learn, and work in the 21st Century; and

WHEREAS, Librarians and library support staff bring the nation a world of knowledge in person and online, as well as personal service and expert assistance in finding what is needed when it is needed; and

WHEREAS, It is important to recognize the unique contributions of all library workers and the value to individuals and society of those contributions; and

WHEREAS, A steady stream of recruits to library work is necessary to maintain the vitality of library services in today's information society; and

WHEREAS, Librarians and other library workers must be brought to the table at public policy

discussions on key issues, such as intellectual freedom, equity of access, and narrowing the digital divide; and

WHEREAS, The funding of libraries and salaries for library workers must be increased to attract more talented people to work in our nation's libraries and to ensure that these vital services are delivered each day; and

WHEREAS, Libraries, library workers, and library supporters across America are celebrating National Library Workers Day sponsored by the American Library Association-Allied Professional Association (ALA-APA); therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Illinois House of Representatives proclaims April 17, 2007, as Library Workers Day in the State of Illinois and encourages Illinoisans to take advantage of the variety of library resources available, and we thank library workers for their exceptional contributions to American life.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 41

Offered by Representative Froehlich:

WHEREAS, Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) are the leading cause of mental retardation in western civilization, including the United States, and are 100% preventable; and

WHEREAS, The term FASD includes a broader range of conditions and therefore has replaced the term fetal alcohol syndrome as the umbrella term describing the range of effects that can occur in an individual whose mother consumed alcohol during pregnancy; and

WHEREAS, FASD are a major cause of numerous social disorders, including learning disabilities, school failure, juvenile delinquency, homelessness, unemployment, mental illness, and crime; and

WHEREAS, The incidence rate of fetal alcohol syndrome is estimated at one out of 500 live births and the incidence rate of fetal alcohol spectrum disorders is estimated at one out of every 100 live births; in Illinois, it is estimated that there are potentially 9,000 children born with FASD each year; and

WHEREAS, It is estimated that FASD alone can cost between one and 5 million dollars per child, not inclusive of societal costs associated with lost productivity, incarceration, and quality of life; and

WHEREAS, Learning and life skills affected by prenatal alcohol exposure vary among persons, depending on amount, timing, and pattern of exposure and on each person's current and past environments; as a result, services for people with FASD vary according to the parts of the brain that have been affected, the person's age or level of maturation, the health or functioning of the person's family, and the person's overall living environment; given the range of need, services must be individualized; and

WHEREAS, Illinois does not currently have a statewide, coordinated response to FASD that includes data collection, educational services, and mental health services; and

WHEREAS, The estimated cost that each individual with fetal alcohol syndrome will cost taxpayers is significant; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the Department of Human Services, in collaboration with the Departments of Children and Family Services, Healthcare and Family Services, Corrections, Financial Institutions and Professional Regulation, the Illinois State Board of Education, and the Illinois Planning Council on Developmental Disabilities to complete an assessment of existing State and federal assistance programs that includes the following: conducting public hearings across the State to gather testimony from parents, educators, healthcare providers, clinicians, mental health providers, FASD service providers, and others regarding what services they feel need to be in place in this State to serve this unique population of children and adults; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Human Services shall issue a report highlighting the findings of this Resolution's requirements and recommendations for improving Illinois' services to children, adults, and their families affected by FASD to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than

January 2, 2008; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a copy of the report be sent to the Directors of the Departments of Children and Family Services, Healthcare and Family Services, Financial Institutions and Professional Regulation, and Corrections, the Superintendent of the Illinois State Board of Education, the Illinois Planning Council on Developmental Disabilities, the Illinois General Assembly, the Office of the Governor, and the Governor's Office of Management and Budget.

Sec. 5.675. The Secretary of State Driver's Certificate Fund.

Section 10. The Illinois Vehicle Code is amended by changing Sections 2-119, 6-106, 6-118, and 6-205 and by adding Section 6-107.5 as follows:

(625 ILCS 5/2-119) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 2-119)

Sec. 2-119. Disposition of fees and taxes.

- (a) All moneys received from Salvage Certificates shall be deposited in the Common School Fund in the State Treasury.
- (b) Beginning January 1, 1990 and concluding December 31, 1994, of the money collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title and corrected certificate of title, \$0.50 shall be deposited into the Used Tire Management Fund. Beginning January 1, 1990 and concluding December 31, 1994, of the money collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title and corrected certificate of title, \$1.50 shall be deposited in the Park and Conservation Fund.

Beginning January 1, 1995, of the money collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title and corrected certificate of title, \$2 shall be deposited in the Park and Conservation Fund. The moneys

deposited in the Park and Conservation Fund pursuant to this Section shall be used for the acquisition and development of bike paths as provided for in Section 805-420 of the Department of Natural Resources (Conservation) Law (20 ILCS 805/805-420).

Beginning January 1, 2000, of the moneys collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title, and corrected certificate of title, \$48 shall be deposited into the Road Fund and \$4 shall be deposited into the Motor Vehicle License Plate Fund, except that if the balance in the Motor Vehicle License Plate Fund exceeds \$40,000,000 on the last day of a calendar month, then during the next calendar month the \$4 shall instead be deposited into the Road Fund.

Beginning January 1, 2005, of the moneys collected for each delinquent vehicle registration renewal fee, \$20 shall be deposited into the General Revenue Fund.

Except as otherwise provided in this Code, all remaining moneys collected for certificates of title, and all moneys collected for filing of security interests, shall be placed in the General Revenue Fund in the State Treasury.

- (c) All moneys collected for that portion of a driver's license fee designated for driver education under Section 6-118 shall be placed in the Driver Education Fund in the State Treasury.
- (d) Beginning January 1, 1999, of the monies collected as a registration fee for each motorcycle, motor driven cycle and motorized pedalcycle, 27% of each annual registration fee for such vehicle and 27% of each semiannual registration fee for such vehicle is deposited in the Cycle Rider Safety Training Fund.
- (e) Of the monies received by the Secretary of State as registration fees or taxes or as payment of any other fee, as provided in this Act, except fees received by the Secretary under paragraph (7) of subsection (b) of Section 5-101 and Section 5-109 of this Code, 37% shall be deposited into the State Construction Fund.
- (f) Of the total money collected for a CDL instruction permit or original or renewal issuance of a commercial driver's license (CDL) pursuant to the Uniform Commercial Driver's License Act (UCDLA): (i) \$6 of the total fee for an original or renewal CDL, and \$6 of the total CDL instruction permit fee when such permit is issued to any person holding a valid Illinois driver's license, shall be paid into the CDLIS/AAMVAnet Trust Fund (Commercial Driver's License Information System/American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators network Trust Fund) and shall be used for the purposes provided in Section 6z-23 of the State Finance Act and (ii) \$20 of the total fee for an original or renewal CDL or commercial driver instruction permit shall be paid into the Motor Carrier Safety Inspection Fund, which is hereby created as a special fund in the State Treasury, to be used by the Department of State Police, subject to appropriation, to hire additional officers to conduct motor carrier safety inspections pursuant to Chapter 18b of this Code.
- (g) All remaining moneys received by the Secretary of State as registration fees or taxes or as payment of any other fee, as provided in this Act, except fees received by the Secretary under paragraph (7)(A) of subsection (b) of Section 5-101 and Section 5-109 of this Code, shall be deposited in the Road Fund in the State Treasury. Moneys in the Road Fund shall be used for the purposes provided in Section 8.3 of the State Finance Act.
 - (h) (Blank).
 - (i) (Blank).
 - (i) (Blank).
- (k) There is created in the State Treasury a special fund to be known as the Secretary of State Special License Plate Fund. Money deposited into the Fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the Secretary of State (i) to help defray plate manufacturing and plate processing costs for the issuance and, when applicable, renewal of any new or existing registration plates authorized under this Code and (ii) for grants made by the Secretary of State to benefit Illinois Veterans Home libraries.

On or before October 1, 1995, the Secretary of State shall direct the State Comptroller and State Treasurer to transfer any unexpended balance in the Special Environmental License Plate Fund, the Special Korean War Veteran License Plate Fund, and the Retired Congressional License Plate Fund to the Secretary of State Special License Plate Fund.

- (1) The Motor Vehicle Review Board Fund is created as a special fund in the State Treasury. Moneys deposited into the Fund under paragraph (7) of subsection (b) of Section 5-101 and Section 5-109 shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the Secretary of State to administer the Motor Vehicle Review Board, including without limitation payment of compensation and all necessary expenses incurred in administering the Motor Vehicle Review Board under the Motor Vehicle Franchise Act.
- (m) Effective July 1, 1996, there is created in the State Treasury a special fund to be known as the Family Responsibility Fund. Moneys deposited into the Fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the

Office of the Secretary of State for the purpose of enforcing the Family Financial Responsibility Law.

- (n) The Illinois Fire Fighters' Memorial Fund is created as a special fund in the State Treasury. Moneys deposited into the Fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the State Fire Marshal for construction of the Illinois Fire Fighters' Memorial to be located at the State Capitol grounds in Springfield, Illinois. Upon the completion of the Memorial, moneys in the Fund shall be used in accordance with Section 3-634.
- (o) Of the money collected for each certificate of title for all-terrain vehicles and off-highway motorcycles, \$17 shall be deposited into the Off-Highway Vehicle Trails Fund.
- (p) For audits conducted on or after July 1, 2003 pursuant to Section 2-124(d) of this Code, 50% of the money collected as audit fees shall be deposited into the General Revenue Fund.
- (q) The Secretary of State Driver's Certificate Fund is created as a special fund in the State treasury. Moneys deposited into the fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Secretary of State to pay for the increase in the costs associated with additional applicants for driver's certificates issued under subsection (b-2) of Section 6-106 and costs associated with specialized verification procedures regarding those applicants.

Sec. 6-106. Application for license or instruction permit.

- (a) Every application for any permit or license authorized to be issued under this Act shall be made upon a form furnished by the Secretary of State. Every application shall be accompanied by the proper fee and payment of such fee shall entitle the applicant to not more than 3 attempts to pass the examination within a period of 1 year after the date of application.
- (b) Every application shall state the legal name, social security number, zip code, date of birth, sex, and residence address of the applicant; briefly describe the applicant; state whether the applicant has theretofore been licensed as a driver, and, if so, when and by what state or country, and whether any such license has ever been cancelled, suspended, revoked or refused, and, if so, the date and reason for such cancellation, suspension, revocation or refusal; shall include an affirmation by the applicant that all information set forth is true and correct; and shall bear the applicant's signature. The application form may also require the statement of such additional relevant information as the Secretary of State shall deem necessary to determine the applicant's competency and eligibility.
- (b-1) The Secretary of State may in his discretion substitute a federal tax number in lieu of a social security number, or he may instead assign an additional distinctive number in lieu thereof, where an applicant is prohibited by bona fide religious convictions from applying or is exempt from applying for a social security number. The Secretary of State shall, however, determine which religious orders or sects have such bona fide religious convictions.
- (b-2)(1) In compliance with the federal REAL ID Act, Division B of Public Law 109-13, the Secretary of State, on and after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly, shall issue to any Illinois resident who meets the requirements of this subsection (b-2) a driver's certificate that shall:
- (A) clearly state on its face that it may not be accepted by any federal agency for any federal identification or other official purpose ("official purpose" being defined under Section 201 of the federal REAL ID Act); and
- (B) use a unique design or color indicator that shall visually distinguish these certificates from driver's licenses and permits issued under the Illinois Vehicle Code so as to alert federal agency and other law enforcement personnel that these certificates may not be accepted for any federal identification or other official purpose.
- (2) Any applicant for a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) must be at least 18 years of age and must:
- (A) provide the Secretary with a valid individual tax identification number issued by the federal Internal Revenue Service or social security number issued by the federal Social Security Administration;
- (B) provide a valid passport and any additional documents, as the Secretary may set forth by administrative rule, such that the passport and additional documents in combination shall include the following:
- (i) a photo identity document, except that a non-photo identity document is acceptable if it includes both the person's full legal name and date of birth;
 - (ii) documentation showing the person's date of birth;
- (iii) documentation showing the person's name and address of principal residence; provided that the Secretary shall not accept any foreign document, other than a valid official passport, for purposes of this

subparagraph; and provided further that the Secretary shall verify, in a manner and form prescribed by the Secretary in administrative rule, the issuance, validity, and completeness of each document presented by the applicant, to satisfy the requirements of this subdivision (b-2)(2)(B); and provided further that the Secretary has the right to reject any document presented by the applicant that cannot be verified; and

- (C) file with the Secretary of State proof provided to the applicant by the Illinois State Police that a set of the applicant's fingerprints has been collected (costs associated with this fingerprinting shall be paid by the applicant at the time of collection); and
- (D) surrender all false driver's licenses or State identification cards in the applicant's possession. The Secretary shall handle the surrender of these documents at the Secretary's discretion, provided that no applicant shall be subject to civil or criminal prosecution for the acquisition, possession, use, or distribution of these documents, and provided further that the Secretary shall destroy any relinquished documents within 24 hours of receipt and shall not maintain any records of those documents, except that this requirement does not apply if the Secretary of State can identify a bona fide law enforcement purpose for retaining such documents.
- (3) The Secretary of State shall provide to the Illinois Department of Revenue all information, including the individual tax identification number, captured on the application. If the Illinois Department of Revenue determines that an individual to whom a driver's certificate was issued is not in compliance with any applicable tax laws administered by the Department of Revenue, the Department of Revenue shall request that the Secretary of State revoke the certificate.
- (4) Any applicant for or the bearer of a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) shall be subject to any and all provisions of this Code and any and all implementing regulations issued by the Secretary of State to the same extent as any driver issued a driver's license, including but not limited to the mandatory insurance requirements and penalties set forth in Chapter 7, Article VI of this Code, unless otherwise specified in this subsection (b-2). To the extent that any driver is required by law to have a valid Illinois driver's license in order to purchase insurance to comply with the mandatory insurance provisions of this Code, a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) shall satisfy that requirement. Within 30 days of receiving a certificate, the driver shall provide to the Secretary of State, in a manner and form prescribed by the Secretary, proof of liability insurance coverage for the driver and for any and all vehicles to which the driver has title of ownership; if the driver fails to provide that proof within 30 days, the Secretary is authorized to suspend the certificate until the driver provides that proof.
- (5) A person denied a driver's certificate under this subsection (b-2) may seek review under the Administrative Review Law. This amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly does not affect the issuance of any commercial driver's license or school bus driver's permit under the Illinois Vehicle Code or any State identification card under the Illinois Identification Card Act. A driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) may not be used to obtain a Firearm Owner's Identification Card and may not be used to obtain a driver's license in another state.
- (6) The Secretary of State may provide, in his or her discretion, by rule that an application for a driver's certificate under this subsection (b-2) may include a suitable photograph of the applicant in the form prescribed by the Secretary, and the Secretary of State shall further provide that each driver's certificate shall include a photograph of the driver. The Secretary of State shall utilize a photographic process or system most suitable to deter alteration or improper reproduction of a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) and to prevent substitution of another photo on the certificate.
- (b-3) Subsection (b-2) becomes inoperative 5 years after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly; however, any document issued under subsection (b-2) shall remain valid until the date set forth on the document by the Secretary of State.
- (b-4) The Secretary of State may, in his discretion, by rule or regulation, provide that an application for a drivers license or permit may include a suitable photograph of the applicant in the form prescribed by the Secretary, and he may further provide that each drivers license shall include a photograph of the driver. The Secretary of State may utilize a photograph process or system most suitable to deter alteration or improper reproduction of a drivers license and to prevent substitution of another photo thereon.
- (c) The application form shall include a notice to the applicant of the registration obligations of sex offenders under the Sex Offender Registration Act. The notice shall be provided in a form and manner prescribed by the Secretary of State. For purposes of this subsection (c), "sex offender" has the meaning ascribed to it in Section 2 of the Sex Offender Registration Act.
- (d) Any male United States citizen or immigrant who applies for any permit or license authorized to be issued under this Act or for a renewal of any permit or license, and who is at least 18 years of age but less than 26 years of age, must be registered in compliance with the requirements of the federal Military

Selective Service Act. The Secretary of State must forward in an electronic format the necessary personal information regarding the applicants identified in this subsection (d) to the Selective Service System. The applicant's signature on the application serves as an indication that the applicant either has already registered with the Selective Service System or that he is authorizing the Secretary to forward to the Selective Service System the necessary information for registration. The Secretary must notify the applicant at the time of application that his signature constitutes consent to registration with the Selective Service System, if he is not already registered.

If a person's license or permit has been revoked or suspended due to 2 or more convictions of violating Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense, arising out of separate occurrences, that person, if issued a restricted driving permit, may not operate a vehicle unless it has been equipped with an ignition interlock device as defined in Section 1-129.1.

If a person's license or permit has been revoked or suspended 2 or more times within a 10 year period due to a single conviction of violating Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense, and a statutory summary suspension under Section 11-501.1, or 2 or more statutory summary suspensions, or combination of 2 offenses, or of an offense and a statutory summary suspension, arising out of separate occurrences, that person, if issued a restricted driving permit, may not operate a vehicle unless it has been equipped with an ignition interlock device as defined in Section 1-129.1. The person must pay to the Secretary of State DUI Administration Fund an amount not to exceed \$20 per month. The Secretary shall establish by rule the amount and the procedures, terms, and conditions relating to these fees. If the restricted driving permit was issued for employment purposes, then this provision does not apply to the operation of an occupational vehicle owned or leased by that person's

employer. In each case the Secretary of State may issue a restricted driving permit for a period he deems appropriate, except that the permit shall expire within one year from the date of issuance. The Secretary may not, however, issue a restricted driving permit to any person whose current revocation is the result of a second or subsequent conviction for a violation of Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance relating to the offense of operating or being in physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, other drug or drugs, intoxicating compound or compounds, or any similar out-of-state offense, or any combination thereof, until the expiration of at least one year from the date of the revocation. A restricted driving permit issued under this Section shall be subject to cancellation, revocation, and suspension by the Secretary of State in like manner and for like cause as a driver's license issued under this Code may be cancelled, revoked, or suspended; except that a conviction upon one or more offenses against laws or ordinances regulating the movement of traffic shall be deemed sufficient cause for the revocation, suspension, or cancellation of a restricted driving permit. The Secretary of State may, as a condition to the issuance of a restricted driving permit, require the applicant to participate in a designated driver remedial or rehabilitative program. The Secretary of State is authorized to cancel a restricted driving permit if the permit holder does not successfully complete the program. However, if an individual's driving privileges have been revoked in accordance with paragraph 13 of subsection (a) of this Section, no restricted driving permit shall be issued until the individual has served 6 months of the revocation period.

(d) Whenever a person under the age of 21 is convicted under Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance, the Secretary of State shall revoke the driving privileges of that person. The person must pay to the Secretary of State DUI Administration Fund an amount not to exceed \$20 per month. The Secretary shall establish by rule the amount and the procedures, terms, and conditions relating to these fees. If the restricted driving permit was issued for employment purposes, then this provision does not apply to the operation of an occupational vehicle owned or leased by that person's employer. A restricted driving permit issued under this Section shall be subject to cancellation, revocation, and suspension by the Secretary of State in like manner and for like cause as a driver's license issued under this Code may be cancelled, revoked, or suspended; except that a conviction upon one or more offenses against laws or ordinances regulating the movement of traffic shall be deemed sufficient cause for the revocation, suspension, or cancellation of a restricted driving permit. - (f) Any revocation imposed upon any person under subsections 2 and 3 of paragraph (b) that is in effect on December 31, 1988 shall be converted to a suspension for a like period of time.
- (g) The Secretary of State shall not issue a restricted driving permit to a person under the age of 16 years whose driving privileges have been revoked under any provisions of this Code.
- (h) The Secretary of State shall require the use of ignition interlock devices on all vehicles owned by an individual who has been convicted of a second or subsequent offense under Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance. The Secretary shall establish by rule and regulation the procedures for certification and use of the interlock system.
 - (i) The Secretary of State may not issue a restricted driving permit for a period of one year after a second

or subsequent revocation of driving privileges under clause (a)(2) of this Section; however, one year after the date of a second or subsequent revocation of driving privileges under clause (a)(2) of this Section, the Secretary of State may, upon application, issue a restricted driving permit under the terms and conditions of subsection (c).

(j) In accordance with 49 C.F.R. 384, the Secretary of State may not issue a restricted driving permit for the operation of a commercial motor vehicle to a person holding a CDL whose driving privileges have been revoked under any provisions of this Code.

Section 95. No acceleration or delay. Where this Act makes changes in a statute that is represented in this Act by text that is not yet or no longer in effect (for example, a Section represented by multiple versions), the use of that text does not accelerate or delay the taking effect of (i) the changes made by this Act or (ii) provisions derived from any other Public Act.

Section 97. Severability. The provisions of this Act are severable under Section 1.31 of the Statute on Statutes.

Sec. 2-119. Disposition of fees and taxes.

- (a) All moneys received from Salvage Certificates shall be deposited in the Common School Fund in the State Treasury.
- (b) Beginning January 1, 1990 and concluding December 31, 1994, of the money collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title and corrected certificate of title, \$0.50 shall be deposited into the Used Tire Management Fund. Beginning January 1, 1990 and concluding December 31, 1994, of the money collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title and corrected certificate of title, \$1.50 shall be deposited in the Park and Conservation Fund.

Beginning January 1, 1995, of the money collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title and corrected certificate of title, \$2 shall be deposited in the Park and Conservation Fund. The moneys deposited in the Park and Conservation Fund pursuant to this Section shall be used for the acquisition and development of bike paths as provided for in Section 805-420 of the Department of Natural Resources (Conservation) Law (20 ILCS 805/805-420).

Beginning January 1, 2000, of the moneys collected for each certificate of title, duplicate certificate of title, and corrected certificate of title, \$48 shall be deposited into the Road Fund and \$4 shall be deposited into the Motor Vehicle License Plate Fund, except that if the balance in the Motor Vehicle License Plate Fund exceeds \$40,000,000 on the last day of a calendar month, then during the next calendar month the \$4 shall instead be deposited into the Road Fund.

Beginning January 1, 2005, of the moneys collected for each delinquent vehicle registration renewal fee, \$20 shall be deposited into the General Revenue Fund.

Except as otherwise provided in this Code, all remaining moneys collected for certificates of title, and all moneys collected for filing of security interests, shall be placed in the General Revenue Fund in the State Treasury.

- (c) All moneys collected for that portion of a driver's license fee designated for driver education under Section 6-118 shall be placed in the Driver Education Fund in the State Treasury.
- (d) Beginning January 1, 1999, of the monies collected as a registration fee for each motorcycle, motor driven cycle and motorized pedalcycle, 27% of each annual registration fee for such vehicle and 27% of each semiannual registration fee for such vehicle is deposited in the Cycle Rider Safety Training Fund.
 - (e) Of the monies received by the Secretary of State as registration fees or taxes or as payment of any

other fee, as provided in this Act, except fees received by the Secretary under paragraph (7) of subsection (b) of Section 5-101 and Section 5-109 of this Code, 37% shall be deposited into the State Construction Fund.

- (f) Of the total money collected for a CDL instruction permit or original or renewal issuance of a commercial driver's license (CDL) pursuant to the Uniform Commercial Driver's License Act (UCDLA): (i) \$6 of the total fee for an original or renewal CDL, and \$6 of the total CDL instruction permit fee when such permit is issued to any person holding a valid Illinois driver's license, shall be paid into the CDLIS/AAMVAnet Trust Fund (Commercial Driver's License Information System/American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators network Trust Fund) and shall be used for the purposes provided in Section 6z-23 of the State Finance Act and (ii) \$20 of the total fee for an original or renewal CDL or commercial driver instruction permit shall be paid into the Motor Carrier Safety Inspection Fund, which is hereby created as a special fund in the State Treasury, to be used by the Department of State Police, subject to appropriation, to hire additional officers to conduct motor carrier safety inspections pursuant to Chapter 18b of this Code.
- (g) All remaining moneys received by the Secretary of State as registration fees or taxes or as payment of any other fee, as provided in this Act, except fees received by the Secretary under paragraph (7)(A) of subsection (b) of Section 5-101 and Section 5-109 of this Code, shall be deposited in the Road Fund in the State Treasury. Moneys in the Road Fund shall be used for the purposes provided in Section 8.3 of the State Finance Act.
 - (h) (Blank).

 - (j) (Blank).
- (k) There is created in the State Treasury a special fund to be known as the Secretary of State Special License Plate Fund. Money deposited into the Fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the Secretary of State (i) to help defray plate manufacturing and plate processing costs for the issuance and, when applicable, renewal of any new or existing registration plates authorized under this Code and (ii) for grants made by the Secretary of State to benefit Illinois Veterans Home libraries.

On or before October 1, 1995, the Secretary of State shall direct the State Comptroller and State Treasurer to transfer any unexpended balance in the Special Environmental License Plate Fund, the Special Korean War Veteran License Plate Fund, and the Retired Congressional License Plate Fund to the Secretary of State Special License Plate Fund.

- (l) The Motor Vehicle Review Board Fund is created as a special fund in the State Treasury. Moneys deposited into the Fund under paragraph (7) of subsection (b) of Section 5-101 and Section 5-109 shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the Secretary of State to administer the Motor Vehicle Review Board, including without limitation payment of compensation and all necessary expenses incurred in administering the Motor Vehicle Review Board under the Motor Vehicle Franchise Act.
- (m) Effective July 1, 1996, there is created in the State Treasury a special fund to be known as the Family Responsibility Fund. Moneys deposited into the Fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the Secretary of State for the purpose of enforcing the Family Financial Responsibility Law.
- (n) The Illinois Fire Fighters' Memorial Fund is created as a special fund in the State Treasury. Moneys deposited into the Fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Office of the State Fire Marshal for construction of the Illinois Fire Fighters' Memorial to be located at the State Capitol grounds in Springfield, Illinois. Upon the completion of the Memorial, moneys in the Fund shall be used in accordance with Section 3-634.
- (o) Of the money collected for each certificate of title for all-terrain vehicles and off-highway motorcycles, \$17 shall be deposited into the Off-Highway Vehicle Trails Fund.
- (p) For audits conducted on or after July 1, 2003 pursuant to Section 2-124(d) of this Code, 50% of the money collected as audit fees shall be deposited into the General Revenue Fund.
- (q) The Secretary of State Driver's Certificate Fund is created as a special fund in the State treasury. Moneys deposited into the fund shall, subject to appropriation, be used by the Secretary of State to pay for the increase in the costs associated with additional applicants for driver's certificates issued under subsection (b-2) of Section 6-106 and costs associated with specialized verification procedures regarding those applicants.

Sec. 6-106. Application for license or instruction permit.

(a) Every application for any permit or license authorized to be issued under this Act shall be made upon

- a form furnished by the Secretary of State. Every application shall be accompanied by the proper fee and payment of such fee shall entitle the applicant to not more than 3 attempts to pass the examination within a period of 1 year after the date of application.
- (b) Every application shall state the legal name, social security number, zip code, date of birth, sex, and residence address of the applicant; briefly describe the applicant; state whether the applicant has theretofore been licensed as a driver, and, if so, when and by what state or country, and whether any such license has ever been cancelled, suspended, revoked or refused, and, if so, the date and reason for such cancellation, suspension, revocation or refusal; shall include an affirmation by the applicant that all information set forth is true and correct; and shall bear the applicant's signature. The application form may also require the statement of such additional relevant information as the Secretary of State shall deem necessary to determine the applicant's competency and eligibility.
- (b-1) The Secretary of State may in his discretion substitute a federal tax number in lieu of a social security number, or he may instead assign an additional distinctive number in lieu thereof, where an applicant is prohibited by bona fide religious convictions from applying or is exempt from applying for a social security number. The Secretary of State shall, however, determine which religious orders or sects have such bona fide religious convictions.
- (b-2)(1) In compliance with the federal REAL ID Act, Division B of Public Law 109-13, the Secretary of State, on and after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly, shall issue to any Illinois resident who meets the requirements of this subsection (b-2) a driver's certificate that shall:
- (A) clearly state on its face that it may not be accepted by any federal agency for any federal identification or other official purpose ("official purpose" being defined under Section 201 of the federal REAL ID Act); and
- (B) use a unique design or color indicator that shall visually distinguish these certificates from driver's licenses and permits issued under the Illinois Vehicle Code so as to alert federal agency and other law enforcement personnel that these certificates may not be accepted for any federal identification or other official purpose.
- (2) Any applicant for a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) must be at least 18 years of age and must:
- (A) provide the Secretary with a valid individual tax identification number issued by the federal Internal Revenue Service or social security number issued by the federal Social Security Administration;
- (B) provide a valid passport and any additional documents, as the Secretary may set forth by administrative rule, such that the passport and additional documents in combination shall include the following:
- (i) a photo identity document, except that a non-photo identity document is acceptable if it includes both the person's full legal name and date of birth;
 - (ii) documentation showing the person's date of birth;
- (iii) documentation showing the person's name and address of principal residence; provided that the Secretary shall not accept any foreign document, other than a valid official passport, for purposes of this subparagraph; and provided further that the Secretary shall verify, in a manner and form prescribed by the Secretary in administrative rule, the issuance, validity, and completeness of each document presented by the applicant, to satisfy the requirements of this subdivision (b-2)(2)(B); and provided further that the Secretary has the right to reject any document presented by the applicant that cannot be verified; and
- (C) file with the Secretary of State proof provided to the applicant by the Illinois State Police that a set of the applicant's fingerprints has been collected (costs associated with this fingerprinting shall be paid by the applicant at the time of collection); and
- (D) surrender all false driver's licenses or State identification cards in the applicant's possession. The Secretary shall handle the surrender of these documents at the Secretary's discretion, provided that no applicant shall be subject to civil or criminal prosecution for the acquisition, possession, use, or distribution of these documents, and provided further that the Secretary shall destroy any relinquished documents within 24 hours of receipt and shall not maintain any records of those documents, except that this requirement does not apply if the Secretary of State can identify a bona fide law enforcement purpose for retaining such documents.
- (3) The Secretary of State shall provide to the Illinois Department of Revenue all information, including the individual tax identification number, captured on the application. If the Illinois Department of Revenue determines that an individual to whom a driver's certificate was issued is not in compliance with any applicable tax laws administered by the Department of Revenue, the Department of Revenue shall request that the Secretary of State revoke the certificate.

- (4) Any applicant for or the bearer of a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) shall be subject to any and all provisions of this Code and any and all implementing regulations issued by the Secretary of State to the same extent as any driver issued a driver's license, including but not limited to the mandatory insurance requirements and penalties set forth in Chapter 7, Article VI of this Code, unless otherwise specified in this subsection (b-2). To the extent that any driver is required by law to have a valid Illinois driver's license in order to purchase insurance to comply with the mandatory insurance provisions of this Code, a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) shall satisfy that requirement. Within 30 days of receiving a certificate, the driver shall provide to the Secretary of State, in a manner and form prescribed by the Secretary, proof of liability insurance coverage for the driver and for any and all vehicles to which the driver has title of ownership; if the driver fails to provide that proof within 30 days, the Secretary is authorized to suspend the certificate until the driver provides that proof.
- (5) A person denied a driver's certificate under this subsection (b-2) may seek review under the Administrative Review Law. This amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly does not affect the issuance of any commercial driver's license or school bus driver's permit under the Illinois Vehicle Code or any State identification card under the Illinois Identification Card Act. A driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) may not be used to obtain a Firearm Owner's Identification Card and may not be used to obtain a driver's license in another state.
- (6) The Secretary of State may provide, in his or her discretion, by rule that an application for a driver's certificate under this subsection (b-2) may include a suitable photograph of the applicant in the form prescribed by the Secretary, and the Secretary of State shall further provide that each driver's certificate shall include a photograph of the driver. The Secretary of State shall utilize a photographic process or system most suitable to deter alteration or improper reproduction of a driver's certificate issued under this subsection (b-2) and to prevent substitution of another photo on the certificate.
- (b-3) Subsection (b-2) becomes inoperative 5 years after the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 95th General Assembly; however, any document issued under subsection (b-2) shall remain valid until the date set forth on the document by the Secretary of State.
- (b-4) The Secretary of State may, in his discretion, by rule or regulation, provide that an application for a drivers license or permit may include a suitable photograph of the applicant in the form prescribed by the Secretary, and he may further provide that each drivers license shall include a photograph of the driver. The Secretary of State may utilize a photograph process or system most suitable to deter alteration or improper reproduction of a drivers license and to prevent substitution of another photo thereon.
- (c) The application form shall include a notice to the applicant of the registration obligations of sex offenders under the Sex Offender Registration Act. The notice shall be provided in a form and manner prescribed by the Secretary of State. For purposes of this subsection (c), "sex offender" has the meaning ascribed to it in Section 2 of the Sex Offender Registration Act.
- (d) Any male United States citizen or immigrant who applies for any permit or license authorized to be issued under this Act or for a renewal of any permit or license, and who is at least 18 years of age but less than 26 years of age, must be registered in compliance with the requirements of the federal Military Selective Service Act. The Secretary of State must forward in an electronic format the necessary personal information regarding the applicants identified in this subsection (d) to the Selective Service System. The applicant's signature on the application serves as an indication that the applicant either has already registered with the Selective Service System or that he is authorizing the Secretary to forward to the Selective Service System the necessary information for registration. The Secretary must notify the applicant at the time of application that his signature constitutes consent to registration with the Selective Service System, if he is not already registered.

In order to ensure the proper implementation of the Uniform Commercial Driver License Act, Article V of this Chapter, the Secretary of State is empowered to pro-rate the \$24 fee for the commercial driver's license proportionate to the expiration date of the applicant's Illinois driver's license.

However, any person whose license or privilege to operate a motor vehicle in this State has been suspended or revoked for a second or subsequent time for a violation of Section 11-501 or 11-501.1 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense or Section 9-3 of the Criminal Code of 1961 and each suspension or revocation was for a violation of Section 11-501 or 11-501.1 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense or Section 9-3 of the Criminal Code of 1961 shall pay, in addition to any other fees required by this Code, a reinstatement fee as follows:

Revocation	\$500

- (c) All fees collected under the provisions of this Chapter 6 shall be paid into the Road Fund in the State Treasury except as follows:
 - 1. The following amounts shall be paid into the Driver Education Fund:
 - (A) \$16 of the \$20 fee for an original driver's instruction permit;
 - (B) \$5 of the \$10 fee for an original driver's license;
 - (C) \$5 of the \$10 fee for a 4 year renewal driver's license; and

- (D) \$4 of the \$8 fee for a restricted driving permit.
- 2. \$30 of the \$250 fee for reinstatement of a license summarily suspended under Section
- 11-501.1 shall be deposited into the Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Fund. However, for a person whose license or privilege to operate a motor vehicle in this State has been suspended or revoked for a second or subsequent time for a violation of Section 11-501 or 11-501.1 of this Code or Section 9-3 of the Criminal Code of 1961, \$190 of the \$500 fee for reinstatement of a license summarily suspended under Section 11-501.1, and \$190 of the \$500 fee for reinstatement of a revoked license shall be deposited into the Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Fund.
- 3. \$6 of such original or renewal fee for a commercial driver's license and \$6 of the commercial driver instruction permit fee when such permit is issued to any person holding a valid Illinois driver's license, shall be paid into the CDLIS/AAMVAnet Trust Fund.
- 4. \$30 of the \$70 fee for reinstatement of a license suspended under the Family Financial Responsibility Law shall be paid into the Family Responsibility Fund.
- 5. The \$5 fee for each original or renewal M or L endorsement shall be deposited into the Cycle Rider Safety Training Fund.
- 6. \$20 of any original or renewal fee for a commercial driver's license or commercial driver instruction permit shall be paid into the Motor Carrier Safety Inspection Fund.
 - 7. The following amounts shall be paid into the General Revenue Fund:
 - (A) \$190 of the \$250 reinstatement fee for a summary suspension under Section 11-501.1;
 - (B) \$40 of the \$70 reinstatement fee for any other suspension provided in subsection (b) of this Section; and
 - (C) \$440 of the \$500 reinstatement fee for a first offense revocation and \$310 of
 - the \$500 reinstatement fee for a second or subsequent revocation.

 8. The entire amount more than \$10 of any fee for a driver's certificate issued under subsection (b-2)
- of Section 6-106 shall be deposited into the Secretary of State Driver's Certificate Fund. The Secretary of State shall adopt rules setting the fee for issuing a driver's certificate, in light of the additional costs associated with issuing those driver's certificates.

Sec. 6-205. Mandatory revocation of license or permit; Hardship cases.

- (a) Except as provided in this Section, the Secretary of State shall immediately revoke the license, permit, or driving privileges of any driver upon receiving a report of the driver's conviction of any of the following offenses:
- (a-5) The Secretary of State shall immediately revoke the driver's certificate issued under subdivision (b-2(1) of Section 6-106 of this Code, upon notification from the Illinois Department of Revenue that the holder of the driver's certificate is not in compliance with any applicable tax laws administered by the Department of Revenue.
 - 1. Reckless homicide resulting from the operation of a motor vehicle:
 - 2. Violation of Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance relating to the offense of operating or being in physical control of a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, other drug or drugs, intoxicating compound or compounds, or any combination thereof;
 - 3. Any felony under the laws of any State or the federal government in the commission of which a motor vehicle was used;
 - 4. Violation of Section 11-401 of this Code relating to the offense of leaving the scene of a traffic accident involving death or personal injury;
 - 5. Perjury or the making of a false affidavit or statement under oath to the Secretary
 - of State under this Code or under any other law relating to the ownership or operation of motor vehicles;
 - 6. Conviction upon 3 charges of violation of Section 11-503 of this Code relating to the offense of reckless driving committed within a period of 12 months;
 - 7. Conviction of any offense defined in Section 4-102 of this Code;
 - 8. Violation of Section 11-504 of this Code relating to the offense of drag racing;
 - 9. Violation of Chapters 8 and 9 of this Code;
 - 10. Violation of Section 12-5 of the Criminal Code of 1961 arising from the use of a motor vehicle;
 - 11. Violation of Section 11-204.1 of this Code relating to aggravated fleeing or attempting to elude a peace officer;

- 12. Violation of paragraph (1) of subsection (b) of Section 6-507, or a similar law of any other state, relating to the unlawful operation of a commercial motor vehicle;
- 13. Violation of paragraph (a) of Section 11-502 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance if the driver has been previously convicted of a violation of that Section or a similar provision of a local ordinance and the driver was less than 21 years of age at the time of the offense.
- (b) The Secretary of State shall also immediately revoke the license or permit of any driver in the following situations:
 - 1. Of any minor upon receiving the notice provided for in Section 5-901 of the Juvenile Court Act of 1987 that the minor has been adjudicated under that Act as having committed an offense relating to motor vehicles prescribed in Section 4-103 of this Code;
 - 2. Of any person when any other law of this State requires either the revocation or suspension of a license or permit.
- (c) Whenever a person is convicted of any of the offenses enumerated in this Section, the court may recommend and the Secretary of State in his discretion, without regard to whether the recommendation is made by the court may, upon application, issue to the person a restricted driving permit granting the privilege of driving a motor vehicle between the petitioner's residence and petitioner's place of employment or within the scope of the petitioner's employment related duties, or to allow transportation for the petitioner or a household member of the petitioner's family for the receipt of necessary medical care or, if the professional evaluation indicates, provide transportation for the petitioner for alcohol remedial or rehabilitative activity, or for the petitioner to attend classes, as a student, in an accredited educational institution; if the petitioner is able to demonstrate that no alternative means of transportation is reasonably available and the petitioner will not endanger the public safety or welfare; provided that the Secretary's discretion shall be limited to cases where undue hardship would result from a failure to issue the restricted driving permit.

If a person's license or permit has been revoked or suspended due to 2 or more convictions of violating Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense, arising out of separate occurrences, that person, if issued a restricted driving permit, may not operate a vehicle unless it has been equipped with an ignition interlock device as defined in Section 1-129.1.

If a person's license or permit has been revoked or suspended 2 or more times within a 10 year period due to a single conviction of violating Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense, and a statutory summary suspension under Section 11-501.1, or 2 or more statutory summary suspensions, or combination of 2 offenses, or of an offense and a statutory summary suspension, arising out of separate occurrences, that person, if issued a restricted driving permit, may not operate a vehicle unless it has been equipped with an ignition interlock device as defined in Section 1-129.1. The person must pay to the Secretary of State DUI Administration Fund an amount not to exceed \$20 per month. The Secretary shall establish by rule the amount and the procedures, terms, and conditions relating to these fees. If the restricted driving permit was issued for employment purposes, then this provision does not apply to the operation of an occupational vehicle owned or leased by that person's employer. In each case the Secretary of State may issue a restricted driving permit for a period he deems appropriate, except that the permit shall expire within one year from the date of issuance. The Secretary may not, however, issue a restricted driving permit to any person whose current revocation is the result of a second or subsequent conviction for a violation of Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance relating to the offense of operating or being in physical control of a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, other drug or drugs, intoxicating compound or compounds, or any similar out-of-state offense, or any combination thereof, until the expiration of at least one year from the date of the revocation. A restricted driving permit issued under this Section shall be subject to cancellation, revocation, and suspension by the Secretary of State in like manner and for like cause as a driver's license issued under this Code may be cancelled, revoked, or suspended; except that a conviction upon one or more offenses against laws or ordinances regulating the movement of traffic shall be deemed sufficient cause for the revocation, suspension, or cancellation of a restricted driving permit. The Secretary of State may, as a condition to the issuance of a restricted driving permit, require the applicant to participate in a designated driver remedial or rehabilitative program. The Secretary of State is authorized to cancel a restricted driving permit if the permit holder does not successfully complete the program. However, if an individual's driving privileges have been revoked in accordance with paragraph 13 of subsection (a) of this Section, no restricted driving permit shall be issued until the individual has served 6 months of the revocation period.

(d) Whenever a person under the age of 21 is convicted under Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance, the Secretary of State shall revoke the driving privileges of that person. One

year after the date of revocation, and upon application, the Secretary of State may, if satisfied that the person applying will not endanger the public safety or welfare, issue a restricted driving permit granting the privilege of driving a motor vehicle only between the hours of 5 a.m. and 9 p.m. or as otherwise provided by this Section for a period of one year. After this one year period, and upon reapplication for a license as provided in Section 6-106, upon payment of the appropriate reinstatement fee provided under paragraph (b) of Section 6-118, the Secretary of State, in his discretion, may issue the applicant a license, or extend the restricted driving permit as many times as the Secretary of State deems appropriate, by additional periods of not more than 12 months each, until the applicant attains 21 years of age.

If a person's license or permit has been revoked or suspended due to 2 or more convictions of violating Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense, arising out of separate occurrences, that person, if issued a restricted driving permit, may not operate a vehicle unless it has been equipped with an ignition interlock device as defined in Section 1-129.1.

If a person's license or permit has been revoked or suspended 2 or more times within a 10 year period due to a single conviction of violating Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance or a similar out-of-state offense, and a statutory summary suspension under Section 11-501.1, or 2 or more statutory summary suspensions, or combination of 2 offenses, or of an offense and a statutory summary suspension, arising out of separate occurrences, that person, if issued a restricted driving permit, may not operate a vehicle unless it has been equipped with an ignition interlock device as defined in Section 1-129.1. The person must pay to the Secretary of State DUI Administration Fund an amount not to exceed \$20 per month. The Secretary shall establish by rule the amount and the procedures, terms, and conditions relating to these fees. If the restricted driving permit was issued for employment purposes, then this provision does not apply to the operation of an occupational vehicle owned or leased by that person's employer. A restricted driving permit issued under this Section shall be subject to cancellation, revocation, and suspension by the Secretary of State in like manner and for like cause as a driver's license issued under this Code may be cancelled, revoked, or suspended; except that a conviction upon one or more offenses against laws or ordinances regulating the movement of traffic shall be deemed sufficient cause for the revocation, suspension, or cancellation of a restricted driving permit. The revocation periods contained in this subparagraph shall apply to similar out-of-state convictions.

- (e) This Section is subject to the provisions of the Driver License Compact.
- (f) Any revocation imposed upon any person under subsections 2 and 3 of paragraph (b) that is in effect on December 31, 1988 shall be converted to a suspension for a like period of time.
- (g) The Secretary of State shall not issue a restricted driving permit to a person under the age of 16 years whose driving privileges have been revoked under any provisions of this Code.
- (h) The Secretary of State shall require the use of ignition interlock devices on all vehicles owned by an individual who has been convicted of a second or subsequent offense under Section 11-501 of this Code or a similar provision of a local ordinance. The Secretary shall establish by rule and regulation the procedures for certification and use of the interlock system.
- (i) The Secretary of State may not issue a restricted driving permit for a period of one year after a second or subsequent revocation of driving privileges under clause (a)(2) of this Section; however, one year after the date of a second or subsequent revocation of driving privileges under clause (a)(2) of this Section, the Secretary of State may, upon application, issue a restricted driving permit under the terms and conditions of subsection (c).
- (j) In accordance with 49 C.F.R. 384, the Secretary of State may not issue a restricted driving permit for the operation of a commercial motor vehicle to a person holding a CDL whose driving privileges have been revoked under any provisions of this Code.

"Section 5. The Illinois Pension Code is amended by changing Sections 15-113.6, 15-113.7, 15-141, 15-158.3, and 15-178 as follows:

(40 ILCS 5/15-113.6) (from Ch. 108 1/2, par. 15-113.6)

Sec. 15-113.6. Service for employment in public schools. "Service for employment in public schools": Includes those periods not exceeding the lesser of 10 years or 2/3 of the service granted under other Sections of this Article dealing with service credit, during which a person who entered the system after September 1, 1974 was employed full time by a public common school, public college and public university, or by an agency or instrumentality of any of the foregoing, of any state, territory, dependency or possession of the United States of America, including the Philippine Islands, or a school operated by or under the auspices of any agency or department of any other state, if the person (1) cannot qualify for a retirement pension or other benefit based upon employer contributions from another retirement system, exclusive of federal social security, based in whole or in part upon this employment, and (2) pays the lesser of (A) an amount equal to 8% of his or her annual basic compensation on the date of becoming a participating employee subsequent to this service multiplied by the number of years of such service, together with compound interest from the date participation begins to the date payment is received by the board at the rate of 6% per annum through August 31, 1982, and at the effective rates after that date, and (B) 50% of the actuarial value of the increase in the retirement annuity provided by this service, and (3) contributes for at least 5 years subsequent to this employment to one or more of the following systems: the State Universities Retirement System, the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois, and the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago.

The service granted under this Section shall not be considered in determining whether the person has the minimum of 8 years of service required to qualify for a retirement annuity at age 55 or the 5 years of service required to qualify for a retirement annuity at age 62, as provided in Section 15-135. The maximum allowable service of 10 years for this governmental employment shall be reduced by the service credit which is validated under paragraph (2) of subsection (b) (3) of Section 16-127 and paragraph 1 of Section 17-133.

Sec. 15-113.7. Service for other public employment. "Service for other public employment": Includes those periods not exceeding the lesser of 10 years or 2/3 of the service granted under other Sections of this Article dealing with service credit, during which a person was employed full time by the United States government, or by the government of a state, or by a political subdivision of a state, or by an agency or instrumentality of any of the foregoing, if the person (1) cannot qualify for a retirement pension or other benefit based upon employer contributions from another retirement system, exclusive of federal social security, based in whole or in part upon this employment, and (2) pays the lesser of (A) an amount equal to 8% of his or her annual basic compensation on the date of becoming a participating employee subsequent to this service multiplied by the number of years of such service, together with compound interest from the date participation begins to the date payment is received by the board at the rate of 6% per annum through August 31, 1982, and at the effective rates after that date, and (B) 50% of the actuarial value of the increase in the retirement annuity provided by this service, and (3) contributes for at least 5 years subsequent to this employment to one or more of the following systems: the State Universities Retirement System, the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois, and the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago. If a function of a governmental unit as defined by Section 20-107 is transferred by law, in whole or in part to an employer, and an employee transfers employment from this governmental unit to such employer within 6 months of the transfer of the function, the payment for service authorized under this Section shall not exceed the amount which would have been payable for this service to the retirement system covering the governmental unit from which the function was transferred.

The service granted under this Section shall not be considered in determining whether the person has the minimum of 8 years of service required to qualify for a retirement annuity at age 55 or the 5 years of service required to qualify for a retirement annuity at age 62, as provided in Section 15-135. The maximum allowable service of 10 years for this governmental employment shall be reduced by the service credit which is validated under paragraph (2) of subsection (b) (3) of Section 16-127 and paragraph one of Section 17-133.

Except as hereinafter provided, this Section shall not apply to persons who become participants in the

system after September 1, 1974. (Source: P.A. 90-65, eff. 7-7-97; 90-511, eff. 8-22-97.) (40 ILCS 5/15-141) (from Ch. 108 1/2, par. 15-141)

Sec. 15-141. Death benefits - Death of participant.

- (a) The beneficiary of a participant under the traditional benefit package is entitled to a death benefit equal to the sum of (1) the employee's accumulated normal and additional contributions on the date of death, (2) the employee's accumulated survivors insurance contributions on the date of death, if a survivors insurance benefit is not payable, (3) an amount equal to the employee's final rate of earnings, but not more than \$5,000, if (i) the beneficiary, under rules of the board, was dependent upon the participant, (ii) the participant was a participating employee immediately prior to his or her death, and (iii) a survivors insurance benefit is not payable, and (4) \$2,500 if (i) the beneficiary was not dependent upon the participant, (ii) the participant was a participating employee immediately prior to his or her death, and (iii) a survivors insurance benefit is not payable.
- (b) If the participant has elected to participate in the portable benefit package and has completed the one-year waiting period required under subsection (e) of Section 15-134.5, the death benefit shall be equal to the employee's accumulated normal and additional contributions on the date of death plus, if the employee died with 1.5 or more years of service for employment as defined in Section 15-113.1, employer contributions in an amount equal to the sum of the accumulated normal and additional contributions; except that if a pre-retirement survivor annuity is payable under Section 15-136.4, the death benefit payable under this paragraph shall be reduced, but to not less than zero, by the actuarial value of the benefit payable to the surviving spouse. If the recipient of a pre-retirement survivor annuity dies before an amount equal to all accumulated normal and additional contributions as of the date of death have been paid out, the remaining difference shall be paid to the member's beneficiary. The primary beneficiary of the participant must be his or her spouse unless the spouse has consented to the designation of another beneficiary in the manner described in subsection (d) of Section 15-136.4.
- (c) If payments are made under any State or federal workers' compensation or occupational diseases law because of the death of an employee, the portion of the death benefit payable from employer contributions shall be reduced by the total amount of the payments.

Sec. 15-158.3. Reports on cost reduction; effect on retirement at any age with 30 years of service.

(a) On or before November 15, 2001 and on or before November 15th of each year thereafter, the Board shall have the System's actuary prepare a report showing, on a fiscal year by fiscal year basis, the actual rate of participation in the self-managed plan authorized by Section 15-158.2, (i) by employees of the System's covered higher educational institutions who were hired on or after the implementation date of the self-managed plan and (ii) by other System participants.

The actuary's report must also quantify the extent to which employee optional retirement plan participation has reduced the State's required contributions to the System, expressed both in dollars and as a percentage of covered payroll, in relation to what the State's contributions to the System would have been (1) if the self managed plan had not been implemented, and (2) if 45% of employees of the System's covered higher educational institutions who were hired on or after the implementation date of the self managed plan had elected to participate in the self managed plan and 10% of other System participants had transferred to the self managed plan following its implementation.

- (b) On or before November 15th of 2001 and on or before November 15th of each year thereafter, the Illinois Board of Higher Education, in conjunction with the Bureau of the Budget (now Governor's Office of Management and Budget) shall prepare a report showing, on a fiscal year by fiscal year basis, the amount by which the costs associated with compensable sick leave have been reduced as a result of the termination of compensable sick leave accrual on and after January 1, 1998 by employees of higher education institutions who are participants in the System.
- (c) On or before November 15 of 2001 and on or before November 15th of each year thereafter, the Department of Central Management Services shall prepare a report showing, on a fiscal year by fiscal year basis, the amount by which the State's cost for health insurance coverage under the State Employees Group Insurance Act of 1971 for retirees of the State's universities and their survivors has declined as a result of requiring some of those retirees and survivors to contribute to the cost of their basic health insurance. These year-by-year reductions in cost must be quantified both in dollars and as a level percentage of payroll covered by the System.
 - (d) The reports required under subsections (a), (b), and (c) shall be disseminated to the Board, the

Pension Laws Commission (until it ceases to exist), the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability, the Illinois Board of Higher Education, and the Governor.

(e) The reports required under subsections (a), (b), and (c) shall be taken into account by the Pension Laws Commission (or its successor, the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability) in making any recommendation to extend by legislation beyond December 31, 2002 the provision that allows a System participant to retire at any age with 30 or more years of service as authorized in Section 15-135. If that provision is extended beyond December 31, 2002, and if the most recent report under subsection (a) indicates that actual State contributions to the System for the period during which the self managed plan has been in operation have exceeded the projected State contributions under the assumptions in clause (2) of subsection (a), then any extension of the provision beyond December 31, 2002 must require that the System's higher educational institutions and agencies cover any funding deficiency through an annual payment to the System out of appropriate resources of their own.

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Sec. 15-178. Duties of the State Comptroller and payroll officers. The State Comptroller and employer payroll officers, in drawing warrants and checks for items of salary on payroll vouchers certified by employers, shall draw such warrants and checks to participating employees for the amount of salary or wages specified for the period, and shall draw a warrant, or check, or electronic funds transfer to this system for the total of the contributions required under Section 15-157. All warrants and electronic funds transfers covering such contributions, and together with a deduction register pertaining to the payroll supplied by the employer, shall be transmitted immediately to the board.

The Comptroller shall draw warrants or prepare direct deposit transmittals upon the State Treasurer payable from funds appropriated for the purposes specified in this Article upon the presentation of vouchers approved by the board.
