#### HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 1069

Offered by Representative Mendoza:

WHEREAS, Countless families in the United States live with prostate cancer; and

WHEREAS, One out of six men in the United States live with prostate cancer; and

WHEREAS, Over the past decade, prostate cancer has been the most commonly diagnosed non-skin cancer and the second most common cause of cancer-related deaths among men in the United States; and

WHEREAS, In 2008, according to estimates from the American Cancer Society, 186,320 men in the United States will be diagnosed with prostate cancer and 28,660 men in the United States will die of prostate cancer; and

WHEREAS, African-American males suffer a prostate cancer incidence rate up to 60 percent higher than white males and more than double the mortality rate; and

WHEREAS, African-American men have the highest mortality rate of any ethnic and racial group in the United States, dying at a rate that is 140 percent higher than other ethnic and racial groups; and

WHEREAS, Obesity is a significant predictor of the severity of prostate cancer and the probability that the disease will lead to death; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the month of September 2008 as Prostate Cancer Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we declare that the Illinois government has a responsibility:

(a) to raise awareness about the importance of screening methods for, and treatment of, prostate cancer;

(b) to increase research funding that is commensurate with the burden of the disease so that the screening and treatment of prostate cancer may be improved, and so that the causes of, and a cure for, prostate cancer may be discovered; and

(c) to continue to consider ways for improving access to, and the quality of, health care services for detecting and treating prostate cancer; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we request the Governor to issue a proclamation calling on the people of the United States, interested groups, and affected persons:

(a) to promote awareness of prostate cancer;

(b) to take an active role in the fight to end the devastating effects of prostate cancer on individuals, their families, and the economy;

(c) to urge Congress to prohibit the application of LCA or similar policies for drugs and biologicals that unfairly target prostate cancer patients; and

(d) to observe National Prostate Cancer Awareness Month with appropriate ceremonies and activities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Governor and the members of

the Illinois congressional delegation.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 1070

Offered by Representative Berrios:

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we respectfully request that the Board of Higher Education conduct a study to look into how extra funding to State universities for study abroad programs might help students to be more ready for our global economy; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Board of Higher Education report its findings and recommendations concerning funding for study abroad programs to the General Assembly on or before September 1, 2008; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Board of Higher Education.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 1076

Offered by Representative Bill Mitchell:

WHEREAS, Coal gasification technologies are considered a cleaner method of producing energy by converting coal into a synthetic gas; the procedure also allows for larger use of Illinois coal, which many coal-fired power plants have stopped using due to its high sulfur content; and

WHEREAS, Last year, Secure Energy, Inc. purchased property for a coal gasification project to produce synthetic natural gas from Illinois coal; the \$250 million facility would generate approximately 40 permanent jobs and would use 600,000 tons of Illinois coal each year from the Viper Mine in Elkhart; and

WHEREAS, Secure Energy sought financial assistance from the State and has been waiting nearly a year for final approval for a \$14,100,000 coal development grant; and

WHEREAS, Illinois' Coal Development Fund was created to assist the development of coal and energy projects, especially projects that promote to use of Illinois coal; and

WHEREAS, In November of 2007, the Governor removed more than \$10,200,000 from the Coal Development Fund to provide temporary funding for the Regional Transportation Authority, and now there is not sufficient moneys in the Coal Development Fund to support Secure Energy's grant; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that, in accordance with Section 3-2 of the Illinois State Auditing Act, the Auditor General is directed to conduct a performance audit of the activities of the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity and other State agencies with respect to actions taken under the Illinois Coal and Energy Development Bond Act, particularly with respect to deposits into and transfers, appropriations, and other withdrawals from the Coal Development Fund; and be it further

RESOLVED, that in accordance with Section 3-4 of the Illinois State Auditing Act, the Auditor General is also directed to investigate the propriety of the method by which moneys were removed from the Coal Development Fund and given to the Regional Transportation Authority; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Auditor General commence this audit as soon as possible and report his findings and recommendations upon completion in accordance with the provisions of the Illinois State Auditing Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be delivered to the Auditor General.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 1077

Offered by Representative Bellock:

WHEREAS, Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) is a type of infection that is resistant to treatment with the usual antibiotics and is the most common pathogen that causes Healthcare-Associated Infections (HAIs) in the United States and around the world; and

WHEREAS, A study led by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that in 2005 more

than 94,000 invasive MRSA infections occurred in the United States and more than 18,500 of these infections resulted in death; and

WHEREAS, The percentage of MRSA infections in the United States that are antimicrobial-resistant has grown from 2 percent in 1974 to 63 percent in 2004; and

WHEREAS, The annual number of hospitalizations associated with MRSA infections more than doubled between 1999 and 2004, from 127,036 to 278,203; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 85 percent of all invasive MRSA infections were associated with healthcare; and

WHEREAS, Serious MRSA infections occur most frequently among individuals in hospitals and healthcare facilities, particularly the elderly, those undergoing dialysis, and those with surgical wounds; and

WHEREAS, Individuals infected with MRSA are most likely to have longer and more expensive hospital stays, with an average cost of \$35,000; and

WHEREAS, MRSA results in more than \$3,000,000,000 in annual Medicare charges alone, a major factor in the over \$5,000,000,000 annual price tag for treating healthcare associated infections in the United States; and

WHEREAS, There has been an increase in reported staph infection outbreaks, including antibiotic-resistant strains, in states such as Illinois, New York, Kentucky, Virginia, Maryland, Ohio, North Carolina, and Florida, and in the District of Columbia; and

WHEREAS, Clusters of MRSA have been reported since 2000 among competitive sports teams, where it is transmitted through personal contact, sharing towels or equipment, and sharing locker facilities; and

WHEREAS, Anyone, not just an infected patient, can be a vehicle for the transmission of MRSA through skin-to-skin contact; and

WHEREAS, MRSA is a preventable disease when appropriate hygienic practices, such as hand washing and appropriate first aid for open wounds and active skin infections, are followed; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FIFTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we:

(1) recognize the need to apply what is already known about reducing the transmission of

infections in hospitals and rationalizing antibiotic prescribing practices;

(2) recognize the need to pursue operational research to find the best ways of

preventing hospital- and community-acquired Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) and developing new antibiotics for improving care for MRSA patients;

(3) recognize the importance of raising awareness of MRSA and methods of preventing MRSA infections;

(4) support the work of advocates and organizations in educating, supporting, and

providing hope for individuals and their families affected by community and healthcare associated infections; and

(5) designate the month of March 2008 as "MRSA Awareness Month".
