HOUSE RESOLUTION 84

Offered by Representative Jehan Gordon:

WHEREAS, Parkinson's disease is a progressive neurological movement disorder of the central nervous system; the disease has a unique impact on each patient; and

WHEREAS, According to the Parkinson's Action Network, Parkinson's Disease Foundation, the National Parkinson Foundation, the American Parkinson Disease Association, and the National Institutes of Health, there are over one million Americans diagnosed with Parkinson's disease; and

WHEREAS, Symptoms of Parkinson's disease include slowness, tremor, difficulty with balance and speaking, rigidity, and cognitive and memory problems; and

WHEREAS, Although new medicines and therapies may enhance life for some time for people with Parkinson's disease, more work is needed for a cure; and

WHEREAS, Increased education and research are needed to find more effective treatments with fewer side effects and, ultimately, a cure for Parkinson's disease; and

WHEREAS, A multi-disciplinary approach to Parkinson's disease care includes local wellness, support, and caregiver groups; and

WHEREAS, The month of April has been proclaimed as World Wide Parkinson's Awareness Month in order to recognize the need for more research and help in dealing with the devastating effects of Parkinson's disease; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the month of April as Parkinson's Disease Awareness Month in the State of Illinois to aid in the fight against Parkinson's disease and its effects on the people of this State and the world at large.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 86

Offered by Representative Crespo:

WHEREAS, April 6, 2011, marks the 691st anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Arbroath in 1320, in which Scotland declared its independence from England; the Declaration of Arbroath is one of the precursors of the United States Declaration of Independence; and

WHEREAS, Almost half of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence and 9 of the Governors of the original 13 colonies were of Scottish descent; and

WHEREAS, More than 11 million Americans can trace their roots back to Scotland; and

WHEREAS, Illinois is home to various festivals and games featuring Scottish culture that are held annually across the State; and

WHEREAS, Established in 1845, the Illinois Saint Andrews Society is the oldest charitable organization in Illinois; their motto is: nourishing Scottish identity through service, fellowship, and the celebration of Scottish culture; their principal charity is the Scottish Home, a nursing home that the Society built in 1910 and has supported for 100 years; the Society also provides scholarships to bright, talented young students and hosts events to help families learn about Scottish culture, art, music, dance, and literature, including the Scottish Festival and Highland Games; and

WHEREAS, The Scottish cultural identity reflects individualism, a strong work ethic, family loyalty, patriotism, and faith in God; and

WHEREAS, Citizens of both the State of Illinois and Scotland are first in the defense of rights and freedom; and

WHEREAS, The Scottish people, with their self-reliance and unbending spirit, helped to shape the unmistakable character of their country and the State of Illinois; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we commend the more than 200 organizations throughout the United States that honor Scottish heritage, tradition, and culture, representing the hundreds of thousands of Americans of Scottish descent, residing in every state, who have already made the observance of National Tartan Day on April 6 a success; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we proclaim April as Scottish Heritage Month in the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 88

Offered by Representative Kay:

WHEREAS, Recent media reports indicate that a state workers' compensation arbitrator who was to decide whether former Illinois State Trooper Matt Mitchell should be compensated for his injuries took actions to keep an arbitration hearing secret; and

WHEREAS, It was only through diligent work by the press that led to the Freedom of Information Act requests inquiring about the change of hearing place that led to the general public's knowledge of this arbitration action; and

WHEREAS, The chief of staff for the Illinois Attorney General spoke out against apparent deceptive practices manifested by the Illinois Workers' Compensation Commission when it appears to have attempted to mislead and prevent the public to be informed of a public arbitration hearing; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Illinois Auditor General conduct an extraordinary compliance and programmatic audit of the Workers' Compensation Commission, with special, but not exclusive, attention, to the issue of possible collusion between the Commission and Illinois public safety officers, especially the case of former Trooper Matt Mitchell.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 89

Offered by Representative Morthland:

WHEREAS, The Department of State Police is charged with the responsibility for administering the Firearm Owners Identification Card Act (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, The purpose of the Act is to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public by providing a system of identifying persons who are not qualified to acquire or possess firearms, firearm ammunition, stun guns, and lasers; and

WHEREAS, Each applicant for a Firearm Owner's Identification Card ("Card") must complete an application and submit evidence that he or she meets specified criteria and is not prohibited by certain conditions from having a firearm; and

WHEREAS, Entering false information on an application is punishable as a Class 2 felony; and

WHEREAS, The Department of State Police must approve or deny all applications within 30 days after the date they are received; and

WHEREAS, The Department of State Police may revoke a previously issued Card if the person to whom the Card was issued is or was at the time of issuance ineligible for approval; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Auditor General is directed to conduct a management audit of the Department of State Police's administration of the Firearm Owners Identification Card Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the audit include, but need not be limited to, the following determinations:

(1) What steps the Department of State Police takes to determine whether an applicant is eligible or ineligible to receive a Card and whether those steps appear to be adequate;

(2) The total number of applicants during the past 3 years, the number of those applicants who were denied a Card, and the reasons for denial;

(3) Whether the Department of State Police is approving or denying all applications within 30 days after the date they are received;

(4) The total number of Cards that were revoked during the past 3 years and the reasons for revocation; and

(5) Whether, during the past 3 years, the Department of State Police has denied any applications for a Card because the applicant provided false information and, if so, whether the Department of State Police made any referrals for criminal prosecution of applicants providing false information on a Card application; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Department of State Police and any other State agency, entity, or person that may have information relevant to this audit cooperate fully and promptly with the Auditor General's Office in its

conduct; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Auditor General commence this audit as soon as possible and, upon completion, distribute a report in accordance with Section 3-14 of the Illinois State Auditing Act.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 90

Offered by Representative Reboletti:

WHEREAS, Recycling reduces the need for landfilling and incineration and prevents pollution caused by the manufacturing of products from virgin materials; and

WHEREAS, Recycling one ton of paper saves 17 mature trees, 7,000 gallons of water, 3 cubic yards of landfill space, 2 barrels of oil, and 4,1000 kilowatt-hours of electricity; and

WHEREAS, An aluminum can takes over 100 years to decompose, but a recycled can may be reused in 60 days; and

WHEREAS, A group of middle school students in Addison formed the Recycle Because You Care Team to research various approaches to encouraging their community to recycle; the experiment proved that recycling rates increased in households that were educated about recycling techniques; during the experiment, the number of recyclers increased by 86% in neighborhoods where the homeowners were informed about how to recycle and were given recycling bins; and

WHEREAS, Following the approval of a State grant, an Addison waste hauler provided more than 7,000 new recycling bins to their community; as a result, the recycling volume increased by 85 tons; and

WHEREAS, The impact of educational tools in Addison proves that recycling rates in the State can be increased by better informing citizens and businesses of recycling programs and possibilities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity shall develop a Workplace Recycling Toolkit containing downloadable information and resources for implementing or expanding business or institutional recycling programs; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Workplace Recycling Toolkit shall include information to show companies and institutions how to:

- (1) identify available recycling and waste reduction options;
- (2) identify and overcome barriers to implementing recycling programs and implementing suggested solutions;

- (4) identify additional available education and program resources; and
- (5) implement a comprehensive and effective waste reduction and recycling program; and

be it further

RESOLVED, That, once completed, there shall be a promotional campaign to make the public aware of the Toolkit and the useful information it contains; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity shall complete this task on or before March 1, 2012.

RESOLVED, That every individual with autism is a valued and important member of our society and should be acknowledged and recognized on this important day; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we recognize the parents and relatives of those individuals with autism for their sacrifice and dedication in providing for the needs of individuals with autism.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 94

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, Premature birth is a serious and growing problem that affects families from every walk of life and in every corner of the country; and

WHEREAS, 12.8%, or one of every eight, of all babies born in the United States are born prematurely; and

WHEREAS, Premature births have increased by 36% since the early 1980s; and

WHEREAS, In the United States, prematurity/low birthweight is the second leading cause of all infant deaths in the first year of life and the leading cause of infant death among black infants; and

WHEREAS, Premature babies who survive may suffer life-long consequences, including cerebral palsy, mental retardation, chronic lung disease, and vision and hearing loss; and

WHEREAS, Preterm birth and low birth weight are a significant financial burden in health care; and

WHEREAS, The medical, educational, and lost of productivity costs associated with preterm birth in the United States was at least \$26 billion in 2005; and

WHEREAS, Low birth weight, especially in conjunction with environmental stress, is associated with the development of diabetes and other chronic diseases later in life; and

WHEREAS, It is a fact that pre-term infants are more likely to have health problems that result in re-hospitalization; and

WHEREAS, The causes of premature births are not fully understood; and

WHEREAS, The cause of approximately half of all preterm births is completely unknown; and

WHEREAS, To reduce the rates of preterm labor and delivery, more research and funding is needed on the underlying causes of preterm delivery, the prevention of preterm birth so that babies are born full-term, and treatments improving outcomes for infants born prematurely; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize activities and programs that promote awareness of and solutions to the dangers of premature birth across the United States; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we designate the 16th of every month in 2011 as Premature Birth Prevention and Awareness Day in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we encourage Congress to reauthorize the PREEMIE Act, which is currently scheduled to expire at the end of fiscal year 2011, to continue and enhance federal support for research into the causes and prevention of premature birth and to reduce infant mortality caused by prematurity; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we dedicate this resolution to the memory of Leilani Marie Decker and her courageous struggle; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Governor, the Speaker and Minority Leader of the Illinois House of Representatives, the President and Minority Leader of the Illinois Senate, and the members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 12

Offered by Representative Reis:

BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we, the legislature of the State of Illinois, hereby make application to the Congress, under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution of the United States, for the calling of a convention for proposing amendments; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this application is for a convention limited to considering and proposing amendments on the following subjects:

(1) improving the fiscal management of the federal government by imposing requirements, with any stated exceptions, that federal expenditures during a fixed time period not exceed federal revenues or anticipated revenues during that time period; imposing prohibitions and/or limits on federal debt; and/or imposing limits on expenditures, revenue, and/or taxes;

(2) improving the legislative process by requiring that all bills, orders, votes, and resolutions introduced in and passed by Congress contain only a single subject and/or by providing a minimum time period before passage for bills, orders, votes, and resolutions to be reviewed by members of Congress and members of the general public;

(3) restraining the powers of the federal government by clarifying that the Constitution does not authorize Congress to employ its spending power to regulate activities otherwise outside its enumerated powers and/or prohibiting mandates or requirements on any state, subdivision of any state, or any official thereof, unless the federal government fully funds the cost of compliance; and

(4) empowering the legislatures of the several states, with stated exceptions, to repeal all or certain acts of Congress and/or administrative regulations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this application shall be deemed an application for a convention to address each and any of the subjects listed in this resolution; for purposes of determining whether two-thirds of the states have applied for a convention addressing any subject, this application is to be aggregated with the applications of any other state legislatures limited to one or more of the subjects listed in this resolution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this resolution constitutes a continuing application and remains in effect until rescission by any sitting session of the legislature of this State; this application does not constitute a recognition that any particular activity or activities currently undertaken by the federal government is or are authorized by the Constitution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the President and Secretary of the United States Senate, the Speaker and Clerk of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress, and the Archivist of the United States; to the members of the United States Senate and House of Representatives from this State; and to the presiding officers of each of the legislative chambers in the several States, requesting their cooperation.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 13

Offered by Representative Riley:

WHEREAS, Krabbe disease, also known as Globoid Cell Leukodystrophy, is an inherited neurodegenerative lysosomal enzyme disorder affecting the central and peripheral nervous systems caused by a defect in the GALC gene; persons with this gene defect do not make enough of an enzyme called galactosylceramidase; the body needs this enzyme to make myelin, the material that surrounds and protects nerve fibers; without the enzyme, myelin breaks down and as a result, brain cells die and nerves in the brain and other body areas cannot function properly; and

WHEREAS, The symptoms of the infantile form of Krabbe disease usually begin before the age of one year; initial signs and symptoms typically include irritability, muscle weakness, feeding difficulties,

episodes of fever without any sign of infection, stiff posture, and slowed mental and physical development; with disease progression, muscles continue to weaken, affecting the infant's ability to move, chew, swallow, and breathe; affected infants also experience vision loss and seizures; death usually occurs before the age of 2 years; and

WHEREAS, Though the condition is considered very rare (1 in 100,000 births in the United States) it is estimated that the carrier rate in the general population is estimated to be 1 in 125 births; the genesis for this resolution is the late Liam Hammonds who succumbed from Krabbe disease in 2001 before his first birthday; his parents, Scott and Terry established a memorial foundation in his behalf to educate the public about Krabbe disease and provide monetary and other support to affected families; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Department of Public Health shall study Krabbe disease and related leukodystrophies and report to the General Assembly by December 31, 2012 salient information, including, but not limited to, disease incidence in this State, available treatment options, State or federal research projects, available disease registries and biobanks, diagnostic tests and their usage, access and availability of drugs, economic impact of the disease on families, and any other relevant information that the General Assembly should consider in addressing the diseases; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Director of Public Health.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 18**

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to add Section 8.1 to Article IV of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE IV
THE LEGISLATURE

SECTION 8.1. PASSAGE OF BILLS WITH A FISCAL IMPACT.

A bill may become law only with the concurrence of three-fifths of the members elected to each house of the General Assembly if the bill directly: (i) requires the expenditure of any State funds, (ii) decreases the revenues of the State, (iii) requires that units of local government or school districts expend their own funds, (iv) decreases the revenues of units of local government or school districts, or (v) revises the distribution of State funds among units of local government or school districts. However, if the Governor vetoes a bill so passed by returning it with his or her objections to the house in which it originated, then that bill shall not become law unless, upon its return, it is passed by a record vote of three-fifths of the members elected to each house of the General Assembly. Likewise, if the Governor returns a bill so passed with specific recommendations for change to the house in which it originated, then those recommendations may be accepted only by a record vote of three-fifths of the members elected to each house of the General Assembly.

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.
