### **HOUSE RESOLUTIONS**

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 584**

Offered by Representative Yarbrough:

WHEREAS, Millions of Americans are struggling just to get by during these tough economic times, and the many who have been fortunate to avoid job loss and foreclosure are working to pay off and avoid accruing further consumer debt; and

WHEREAS, One of the most effective ways to avoid debt is for consumers to stop using credit cards, and the most convenient way to make purchases without using credit is to use a bank debit card; and

WHEREAS, Bank of America recently announced that it would soon begin charging customers \$5 per month to use their debit card, and other major banks have already followed suit; and

WHEREAS, During these trying times when individuals, as well as small and large businesses, are trying to change their financial behaviors to eliminate debt and emerge from this ongoing recession in a stronger position, charging fees for smart financial decisions will only penalize those behaviors and may cause vulnerable consumers to continue spending on credit; and

WHEREAS, Banks that received public financing and bailouts to remain solvent should lead the way to a new financial paradigm, one that encourages smart financial behaviors that could prevent future economic uncertainty; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we encourage Bank of America and other national banks that have, or are considering implementing a punitive fee for debit card usage, to reconsider that fee and instead try to build businesses that reward customers who make sound financial decisions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Bank of America Corporation.

#### **HOUSE RESOLUTION 586**

Offered by Representative Franks:

WHEREAS, Children who have had a loved one die, especially a close family member or friend, can carry that loss with them forever, causing confusion and fearfulness as they struggle to understand why their loved one was taken away; and

WHEREAS, Grieving children often struggle to get over the loss of a loved one, and, despite appearances, have intense inner turmoil which often goes unrecognized; and

WHEREAS, Counseling provided by hospices, churches, organizations, and grief counseling centers offers emotional support for children struggling with grief, allowing them to find guidance and understanding during an extremely difficult time; and

WHEREAS, On November 17, 2011, citizens and communities throughout Illinois are encouraged to wear blue in an effort to raise awareness and show their support for grieving children and the grief centers that seek to serve those young people confounded by the reality of death; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize November 17, 2011, as "Children's Grief

Awareness Day" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That all support agencies in the State of Illinois that provide grief counseling support services to children be recognized for their efforts to support children, teens, families, and communities in coping with grief and the death of a loved one.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 587

Offered by Representative Poe:

WHEREAS, Plans exist for the Department of Central Management Services (CMS) to consolidate the information technology (IT) staff of the Department of Corrections (IDOC); and

WHEREAS, Current IT personnel under the Department of Corrections are required to undergo background checks and drug screenings to help ensure against the possibility of drugs and weapons being brought to inmates; and

WHEREAS, All IDOC IT staff are required to go through IDOC's pre-service classes and annual training regarding prison security; and

WHEREAS, Concerns exist as to what effect this consolidation may have on IDOC security; and

WHEREAS, The proposed consolidation also raises questions as to what effect it would have on current IDOC personnel's pensions; and

WHEREAS, There have been multiple audit findings against CMS and various other State agencies for incomplete interagency agreements and inadequate billing documentation for CMS services; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Central Management Services should not attempt to shore up its budget by consolidating services of agencies and then overcharging the agencies for the service they provide; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we direct the Department of Central Management Services, in cooperation with the Department of Corrections, to conduct a study showing the potential cost or savings from the proposed consolidation; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the study shall also include any potential impact on Department of Corrections personnel; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this study must be completed by the Department of Central Management Services and filed with the Clerk of the House of Representatives before any consolidation is initiated; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the Director of Central Management Services and the Director of the Department of Corrections.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 589

Offered by Representative Moffitt:

WHEREAS, Amtrak Illinois service has been an excellent investment in mobility for Illinois' economy for more than 30 years; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has for decades been a partner of Amtrak, the National Railroad Passenger Corporation, in financing additional service in Illinois beyond the national network of long-distance passenger trains; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has enjoyed a bipartisan, statewide consensus on the value of passenger train service to link the State's universities, smaller communities, suburbs, and Chicago; and

WHEREAS, With ever-increasing traffic on the State's highways, especially in the Chicago area, investing in passenger rail to alleviate automobile traffic is a prudent use of taxpayer dollars; and

WHEREAS, A robust passenger train system is an essential component of national security in the event of a mass evacuation, as demonstrated by the aftermath of the September 11 attacks and the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois General Assembly in 2006 doubled its commitment to Amtrak Illinois service,

setting the nation on a path for growth in passenger rail, and has reaped doubled ridership on almost all routes in the State, sparking real estate development around train stations and frequently selling out trains; and

WHEREAS, An essential tool for rural economic development is passenger trains connecting small towns to the economic engines of large cities and universities; and

WHEREAS, The United States House of Representatives passed a budget bill that precludes the use of any federal dollars for State-supported Amtrak routes such as the Lincoln Service, the Illini, the Saluki, the Carl Sandburg, and the Hiawatha; and

WHEREAS, The provision in the House budget bill would essentially eliminate most Amtrak service in Illinois, stranding almost 2 million annual passengers; and

WHEREAS, The House budget bill woefully underfunds Amtrak and the high speed rail program; and

WHEREAS, In light of Illinois' continued robust capital and operating investment in Amtrak and high speed rail, it is particularly shortsighted for the federal government to eliminate or cut back its investment in passenger rail; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the United States Congress to fully fund Amtrak and the high speed rail program; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the United States Congress to eliminate any provision that would reduce the federal investment in State-supported Amtrak service, as this partnership is a model to be emulated, not discouraged; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be presented to Senators Dick Durbin, Mark Kirk and the entire congressional delegation of the State of Illinois.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 590

Offered by Representative Pihos:

WHEREAS, More than 35 million people are living with Alzheimer's and other dementia related diseases worldwide, with 5.4 million in the United States and 210,000 in the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Someone develops Alzheimer's disease every 69 seconds; it is now the sixth leading cause of death in the United States; and

WHEREAS, By 2050 16 million Americans will have Alzheimer's and someone will have developed the disease every 33 seconds, unless something is done to combat Alzheimer's; and

WHEREAS, Currently, 14.9 million family members and friends provide 17 billion hours of unpaid care to those with Alzheimer's and other dementia related illnesses, care that is valued at \$202.6 billion; and

WHEREAS, Costs to Medicaid are 9 times higher for a person with Alzheimer's than for a person without Alzheimer's in the same age group; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Alzheimer Legislators Alliance, a bipartisan alliance of State policy makers, is helping to make this devastating disease a top priority in daily policy making; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Alzheimer Legislators Alliance, working closely with the Alzheimer's Association and others, are raising awareness as to the impact Alzheimer's disease and related dementias have on Illinois individuals and families, communities, and the public health system; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the month of November as Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That citizens of the State of Illinois acknowledge the increased need for State involvement in raising awareness for Alzheimer's disease support, funding, and research as the disease impacts individuals and families across the State.

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 48

Offered by Representative Bradley:

WHEREAS, Energy affects all aspects of American life and is indispensable for the quality of life, economic growth, and the sustainability of modern society; and

WHEREAS, Access to energy and the supply of energy shall become more important in the future as energy demand continues to increase; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Energy Information Administration projects that overall energy consumption in the United States will grow by 14% between 2008 and 2035, electricity demand will increase by 30%, and demand for liquid transportation fuels such as gasoline and diesel will increase by nearly 14%; and

WHEREAS, According to the U.S. EPA, since 1980 domestic GDP has increased 124%, vehicle miles traveled have increased 103%, population has increased 36%, and energy consumption has increased 30%; and

WHEREAS, U.S. EPA reports that since 1980 aggregate emissions of air toxins have decreased 52%, ambient levels of carbon monoxide are down 77%, ozone is down 21%, lead is down 94%, and sulfur dioxide is down 68%; and

WHEREAS, EPA's recently issued the Cross-State Air Pollution Rule and other recent U.S. EPA proposals, including the Coal Combustion Residuals Rule and the Mercury and Air Toxics Standards Rule, could threaten the reliability and security of the nation's electric energy supply; and

WHEREAS, More than 28 Gigawatts of coal-fired electricity generating capacity had been publicly announced to be retired beginning in 2010, before the Cross-State Air Pollution Rule was finalized on July 6, 2011; and

WHEREAS, Additional retirements of electric generating capacity are being announced due to the emission reduction requirements of current and proposed U.S. EPA regulations, and, according to estimates by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission staff, could be as much as 81 Gigawatts, or one-fourth of the nation's fleet of coal-based generation capacity; and

WHEREAS, In 2009, 46% of electricity generated in Illinois was produced from coal-based units, including many units that may be retired in response to current and proposed U.S. EPA regulations; and

WHEREAS, The PJM Regional Transmission Organization has commented that U.S. EPA's regulatory analyses have not adequately taken into account local reliability impacts and have understated the level of expected generation retirements under the EPA's proposed Mercury and Air Toxics Standards Rule, while the Midwest ISO has expressed similar reliability risk concerns; and

WHEREAS, The Chair and members of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission have expressed concerns about the inadequacy of analyses of potential reliability impacts, with Commissioner Philip Moeller noting that "the timing of the EPA regulations does not conform to the relevant planning horizons in the electric sector of our economy, one of the most capital-intensive sectors of industry...the federal government needs to convene an open and transparent process to assess the reliability implications of the

EPA rules individually and in the aggregate"; and

WHEREAS, The premature closure of dozens of power plants in Illinois and surrounding Midwest states could imperil critical electrical transmission services, including voltage support, black start recovery, and reactive power, thereby further jeopardizing the dependability of the nation's energy supply; and

WHEREAS, Maintaining electrical grid reliability is particularly critical to the Chicago metropolitan area, due to its population density and vulnerability to extreme weather events; and

WHEREAS, Estimates by the United Mine Workers of America indicate that the retirement of existing generating capacity in the short 2-4 year timeframes called for by current and proposed U.S. EPA regulations for reducing SO<sub>2</sub>, NO<sub>x</sub>, and air toxics emissions may put at risk more than 250,000 jobs directly and indirectly related to coal mining, rail transportation, and power generation, including an estimated 28,000 jobs in Illinois, imposing economic hardship on workers and communities at a time of unacceptably high unemployment; and

WHEREAS, Energy efficiency is an important component of state and federal energy policies, but cannot be counted on to replace the output of the unprecedented numbers of power plant retirements anticipated under current and proposed U.S. EPA regulations; and

WHEREAS, The National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners has adopted resolutions calling on U.S. EPA to seek ways to minimize cost impacts to consumers and increases in residential, commercial, and industrial energy tariffs that will affect the competitiveness of businesses and the ability of customers in lower economic circumstances to be able to afford energy; and

WHEREAS, The National Conference of State Legislatures has strongly urged the Administration and Congress to take steps to protect the environment without the serious anticipated consequences to grid reliability, electricity price spikes, and job losses; and

WHEREAS, Alternatives that would achieve the same level of emissions reduction as those targeted in the various EPA proposals can be achieved at much less cost, disruption to local economies, and with less impact to utility customers; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the General Assembly of the State of Illinois urges Congress and the Administration to act without delay to establish a sound foundation for national energy policy given the important and integral role of energy in all facets of modern life; by providing the necessary and fundamental support for programs key to a secure and sustainable energy future, the nation will at the same time be ensuring the resilience of our domestic economy and the competitiveness of the United States in the global economy; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the reliability of the U.S. energy grid should never be put at risk from policies that could cause energy shortages or delivery failures; and be it further

RESOLVED, It is the policy of the State of Illinois, and should be the policy of the United States, to allow utilities to coordinate the closure and retrofitting of existing power generation stations in an orderly manner that will ensure the continued supply of electricity and that will allow power generators to upgrade their facilities in a manner that provides the least cost while attaining environmental compliance; and be it further

RESOLVED, The United States Congress, which represents the interests of the states individually and collectively, is the appropriate public body to determine national energy policy as it relates to reliability of supply, residential affordability, competitive impacts on American industry and workers, and the overall economic prosperity of the nation; and be it further

RESOLVED, The time available to deploy existing emissions control technology to comply with U.S. EPA regulations must reflect normal construction industry experience and practices that maximize order and efficiency to avoid wasteful financial expenditures and any risks to energy reliability; and be it further

RESOLVED, The General Assembly encourages and supports efforts to promote State and federal environmental and energy policies that will enhance the reliability of our State and nation's energy supply and minimize cost impacts by:

- (1) allowing electric generators to coordinate the closure or retrofitting of existing electric generating units in an orderly manner that will ensure the continued supply of electricity and that will allow power generators to upgrade their facilities in the most cost-effective manner;
- (2) allowing regulatory options for units that are necessary for grid reliability that commit to retire or repower and allowing phasing in of regulatory requirements; and
- (3) establishing interim progress standards that ensure generation units meet U.S. EPA regulations in an orderly, cost-effective manner; and be it further

RESOLVED, The General Assembly therefore urgently requests that the Congress, the President, and



the Administration take such actions as necessary and appropriate to ensure the continued supply of affordable and reliable electric energy, consistent with the maintenance of fuel diversity and grid reliability, while also ensuring continuing emission reduction progress for the protection of public health and welfare; and be it further

RESOLVED, This Joint Resolution is approved and copies of it are to be transmitted to the President of the United States, the Governor of Illinois, all Members of the Illinois Congressional Delegation, the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Energy, the Administrator of U.S. EPA, the Chair and Members of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, and all Members of the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners.
