Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Senate Joint Resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 54

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois General Assembly wish to honor the great work of the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. for his contributions for bringing justice and equality to millions of Americans; and

WHEREAS, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. deserves to be recognized more significantly for his work in urban America; and

WHEREAS, Many places in Illinois have street signs, public buildings, and statues that honor Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and his work; and

WHEREAS, A street in Chicago known as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive runs from 26th Street in the north to 115th Street in the south; and

WHEREAS, The Far Southside communities recognized as Rosemoor and Roseland Heights have, within its boundaries, the only public bridge along the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive corridor; and

WHEREAS, On August 27, 2011, the public and its elected officials assembled to recognize the importance of this day marking the anniversary of the March on Washington (1963) and the National Democratic Nomination of U.S. Senator Barack Obama for President of the United States (2008); and

WHEREAS, In 2011, the public raised a significant amount of money to build a statue of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in the Washington Mall; the public also held a historical event on October 16, 2011; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the bridge located at 99th and 100th Streets and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Drive in Rosemoor and Roseland Heights as the "Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Bridge"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Department of Transportation is requested to erect at suitable locations,

consistent with State and federal regulations, appropriate plaques or signs giving notice of the name of the "Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Bridge"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Secretary of the Illinois Department of Transportation and the Chicago City Council.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 821

Offered by Representative William Davis:

WHEREAS, The Republic of China (Taiwan) has achieved economic and social stability; in 2010, Taiwan was ranked as the United States' 9th-largest trading partner in the world; Taiwan is also the United States' 13th-largest export market and 9th largest source of imports, with U.S. exports to Taiwan in 2010 having increased by 43%; and

WHEREAS, In the last 2 decades, Taiwan has been praised as a beacon of democracy for Asia, having successfully completed its parliamentary elections and its 5th direct, popular presidential election on January 14, 2012; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan has taken great steps forward to enter the world arena as a trusted partner; for the last 3 years, Taiwan has participated as an observer in the World Health Assembly of the World Health Organization (WHO); in 2012, Taiwan will celebrate its 20th anniversary of participation in the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum, of which the United States is a longtime and respected member; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan has been added by the United States government as a candidate for the U.S. Visa Waiver Program, for which Taiwan is grateful to the United States, and, in particular, to the Illinois House of Representatives for its support in this regard; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has a strong economic and cultural relationship with Taiwan since establishing sister-state relations in 1992; in 2011, Illinois ranked 5th among U.S. states in the value of overall exports to Taiwan, which increased 47% last year and were worth almost \$1.2 billion; these figures rose from \$812 million in 2010, when Illinois exports to Taiwan ranked 6th among U.S. states; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan is the world's 6th-largest market for United States agricultural goods, with Taiwan having sent 26 procurement missions to the United States between 1978 and 2011; these missions have enhanced the mutually beneficial trade relations and permanent friendship between the 2 countries, while the Illinois economy has benefited from Taiwan's consistently large imports of Illinois agricultural products; in 2011, the State's agricultural exports to Taiwan, worth \$739.24 million, comprised almost 62% of Illinois' total exports to Taiwan and increased 82% from the State's 2010 agricultural exports to Taiwan (\$406.78 million); and

WHEREAS, Taiwan's continuing absence from international organizations dealing with climate change has impeded Taiwan's ability to respond to natural disasters, such as Typhoon Morakot in 2009, while the global initiative to combat climate change has been impaired by the lack of participation of Taiwan; similarly, Taiwan's absence from international organizations dealing with airline safety and security, major global concerns since 2001, has left a gap in the international aviation security system, as Taiwan is a key transport hub in the Asia-Pacific region; Taiwan has more than 1,000,000 flights passing through the Taipei Flight Information Region and one of the world's largest airports by cargo volume, Taoyuan International Airport; and

WHEREAS, The Taiwan government highly values its relations with the United States and continually seeks to demonstrate its willingness to contribute its resources and know-how to the international community, such as its swift delivery of humanitarian assistance to Haiti following the 2010 earthquake in that country; the aid was expedited by the United States, which generously aided Taiwan in rescue and recovery after Typhoon Morakot; Taiwan also seeks to contribute to peace, freedom, and security in the world as a responsible stakeholder and peaceable nation of 23 million citizens through the Republic of China's policies, such as "flexible diplomacy" in foreign affairs and its pragmatic approach to relations with the People's Republic of China, as demonstrated by the historic passage in 2010 and implementation in 2011 of the Economic Cooperation Framework Agreement between Taipei and Beijing; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we congratulate the Republic of China (Taiwan) on its successful presidential and parliamentary elections and on the re-election to a second term of President Ma Ying-jeou; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we further congratulate Taiwan on the 20th anniversary of its participation in the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) forum to increase Taiwan's international space and contribution to the global community; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we affirm our support for the meaningful participation of Taiwan in the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) with observer status; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to United States Secretary of State Hillary Rodham Clinton, UNFCCC Executive Secretary Christiana Figueres, ICAO Secretary General Raymond Benjamin, and the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in Chicago.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 824

Offered by Representative David Harris:

WHEREAS, The United States of America was attacked in a well-coordinated operation by a group of terrorists on September 11, 2001; and

WHEREAS, Almost 3,000 innocent men, women, and children were killed as a result of the airplanes that were hijacked by the terrorists and subsequently crashed into the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and an open field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, The terrorists were proven to be members of the terrorist organization known as al-Qaeda, which was lead by Osama bin Laden; and

WHEREAS, The al-Qaeda terrorist organization had operated for years from sanctuary locations based in Afghanistan; the group conducted numerous acts of terror over the years against U.S. targets both on the U.S. mainland and in other locations throughout the world, which had been planned in those sanctuary locations; and

WHEREAS, In order to disrupt and destroy the al-Qaeda terrorist organization and capture or eliminate its leaders, it was necessary to attack the organization's sanctuary bases; and

WHEREAS, In October of 2001, the United States military, acting under orders issued by Commanderin-Chief President George W. Bush, attacked al-Qaeda sanctuary bases in Afghanistan in conjunction with local Afghan forces opposed to the terrorist organization operating in their country; and

WHEREAS, The United States military, in the finest traditions of America's fighting forces, had great success in disrupting, dispersing, and destroying al-Qaeda operations and eliminating many of its senior leaders; and

WHEREAS, President Barack Obama, succeeding President Bush as Commander-in-Chief, did continue and strengthen the efforts to completely destroy al-Qaeda; such efforts resulted in the killing of Osama bin Laden, the leader of al-Qaeda, bringing the world's leading terrorist to justice for the many acts of murder which he and his organization carried out; and

WHEREAS, The United States, having joined forces with nations from around the world, led an effort to stabilize Afghanistan by supporting infrastructure projects beneficial to all Afghans and by helping the Afghans understand the positive benefits of equal rights for all, judicial due process, and the rule of law; and

WHEREAS, After more than a decade of extended military operations to enhance security and with contributions of hundreds of billions of dollars of nation-building resources having been put into the country to foster development, much progress has been made toward the goals of a free and secure society within Afghanistan; and

WHEREAS, While this progress has come at a high financial cost, it has also cost the lives of more than 1,500 brave Americans service members and dozens of fighting forces of other nations, all of whom made the ultimate sacrifice in service to their country; and

WHEREAS, Despite this progress, it appears from recent events involving all the International Security Assistance Forces (ISAF) that the presence of the United States military and that of other countries, as well as the civilian consultants that are working to help the Afghan people, has not been accepted by a broad spectrum of the Afghanistan population; and

WHEREAS, This lack of acceptance places all foreign military and civilian consultant personnel in grave danger, which results in an inability for those personnel to properly conduct the types of operations in which they are engaged; and

WHEREAS, There is already in place a plan to withdraw most forces from Afghanistan in the 2014 time frame; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the President and Congress to begin an expedited withdrawal of forces from Afghanistan, thus accelerating the current withdrawal plan set in place; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be sent to the President, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and the President pro tempore of the United States Senate.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 825

Offered by Representative Franks:

WHEREAS, On August 6, 2011, Richard Dent was inducted into the Professional Football Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, After playing for 4 years at Tennessee State University, Richard Dent was drafted by the Chicago Bears in 1983; and

WHEREAS, Richard Dent played every game during his rookie season with the Chicago Bears and started in 3 of those games; and

WHEREAS, In 1984, Richard Dent recorded a Bears team record of 17.5 sacks while being a starter in only the last 10 games of the season, which was also the most of any defender in the NFC; and

WHEREAS, During the historic 1985 Bears Super Bowl victory, Richard Dent recorded 3 tackles, 1.5 sacks, and 2 forced fumbles, ultimately earning him the Most Valuable Player honors; and

WHEREAS, Richard Dent was named first-or second-team All-Pro 4 times and All-NFC 5 times; he was also selected to play in 4 Pro Bowls (1985, 1986, 1991, and 1994); and

WHEREAS, Under Richard Dent's leadership, the Bears defense during the 1980s ranks as one of the best in the history of professional football; and

WHEREAS, Upon his retirement in 1997, Richard Dent had a career total of 137.5 sacks, 8 interceptions, and 13 recovered fumbles; and

WHEREAS, Richard Dent founded the Make a Dent Foundation over 15 years ago to improve the lives of children; the organization currently focuses on partnerships with higher education institutions, civic and community development, and leadership development; and

WHEREAS, The Make a Dent Foundation cultivates the advancement of inventive and effective ways of helping people help themselves and those around them lead productive and satisfying lives; and

WHEREAS, Richard Dent embodies the true nexus of on-field excellence, sportsmanship, and teamwork; and

WHEREAS, The members of this body, along with the citizens of the State of Illinois and the City of Chicago applaud Richard Dent for helping make history for Bears fans worldwide; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL

ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the date of August 6, 2012 as "Richard Dent Day" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Richard Dent as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 826

Offered by Representative Beiser:

WHEREAS, The wars in Iraq and Afghanistan began following the attacks on United States soil on September 11, 2001; and the members of the Illinois House of Representatives are proud to honor the men and women who serve, and have served, in our nations' armed forces; and

WHEREAS, The war on terror represents a global military, political, legal, and ideological struggle against organizations designated as terrorists or presented as posing a threat to the United States and its allies; and
