HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1040

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, Falun Gong, also known as Falun Dafa, is a discipline of personal beliefs that incorporates exercise, meditation, and principles based on truthfulness, compassion, and forbearance; its millions of practitioners work to attain inner peace, good health, and better skills to deal with stress and conflict in life; and

WHEREAS, Although rooted in ancient Chinese spiritual tradition, Falun Gong was first taught publicly in China by Mr. Li Hongzhi, the founder of the practice, in 1992; Falun Gong spread quickly through word-of-mouth, with tens of millions of Chinese citizens finding greater health and spiritual well-being through the practice; and

WHEREAS, Falun Gong actively works to bring about a peaceful resolution to the persecution of Falun Gong in China and improve the future of the world's most populous country; these actions have led to 4 Nobel Peace Prize nominations for its founder, Li Hongzhi; and

WHEREAS, Since 1992, over 100 million people of all ages and backgrounds in over 80 countries worldwide have become healthier, happier, and more altruistic through their practice of Falun Dafa; and

WHEREAS, Falun Dafa practitioners throughout the State of Illinois and the nation at large dedicate countless hours to their communities through free meditation lessons, Chinese cultural productions of music and dance, and participation in local events; and

WHEREAS, On May 13, 2012, thousands of people throughout the United States will celebrate World Falun Dafa Day and commemorate the 20th anniversary of the introduction of one of the world's most popular meditation and cultivation practices; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the week of May 13, 2012 as Falun Dafa Week in the State of Illinois in honor of Falun Gong and its work in bringing physical and spiritual well-being to the people of this State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Falun Gong as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1041

Offered by Representative Flowers:

WHEREAS, Mental illness is a critical underlying concept in various areas of our law affecting mitigation of criminal responsibility and fundamental rights to property, individual liberty, and personal privacy; and

WHEREAS, For at least 2 generations, mental illness has been presumed to be brain disease which is best confronted as a treatable medical problem; and

WHEREAS, Vast amounts of State resources and tax monies, not to mention the creative energies and work of our citizens and civil servants, are continuously expended in accordance with Illinois laws and regulations dependent upon derived psychiatric definitions, formulations, and diagnostic criteria for mental disorders, in particular upon those definitions, formulations, and criteria which are found in the American Psychiatric Association's nearly 20-year-old Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, Fourth Edition (DSM-IV); and

WHEREAS, Some experts in the field of mental health are currently in major and substantial disagreement about methods and standards of psychiatric diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, Despite explicit admonitions in DSM-IV against the use of psychiatric diagnosis for such legal purposes as establishing competence, criminal responsibility or disability, Illinois courts and agencies have nonetheless habitually relied upon the formulations and criteria in the DSM for the precise expertise which the text itself disclaims; and

WHEREAS, A new edition of the American Psychiatric Association's manual, DSM-5, is scheduled for publication in May of 2013, but proposed changes for this upcoming DSM are provoking intense criticism from a diverse range of mental health experts; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Task Force on Mental Health Diagnosis within Illinois Law be created to:

- (1) thoroughly survey the Illinois Compiled Statutes and Administrative Code to identify all instances where our laws and government functions depend upon purported understanding of mental illness or disorder, mental capacity, mental health, behavior or psychology, which may have been recently discredited or found to be incorrect or seriously called into question;
- (2) forward initial recommendations of urgent legislative actions which may be needed to avoid gross injustice or waste of public resources to the General Assembly as soon as possible; and
- (3) produce a final report summarizing the task force's findings and detailing recommended statutory or constitutional strategies to recognize best practices and highlight any areas of major disagreement within the profession; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the task force shall consist of the following members: 5 task force members appointed by the Speaker of the House, 2 of whom are State representatives (one who will serve as co-chairperson), and 3 of whom are professionals in the mental health field; 5 task force members appointed by the minority leader of the House, 2 of whom are State representatives (one who will serve as co-chairperson), and 3 of whom are professionals in the mental health field; one task force member appointed by the Governor under the Division of Mental Health under the Department of Human Services; and one task force member appointed by the Attorney General as a representative of her office and trained in a related field; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the task force be appointed and hold its first meeting by March 1, 2013; and be it further

RESOLVED, That in appointing members of the task force, the Speaker and minority leader shall consider that professional experience in diverse mental health-related fields may be a positive qualification; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the task force shall take voluntary assistance and testimony from individuals and professional organizations and institutions; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the members of the task force shall serve without compensation; and be it further RESOLVED, That the task force shall submit its final report to the General Assembly, the Governor, and the Attorney General no later than December 31, 2013.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1043

WHEREAS, Glenwood Academy was co-founded by Robert Todd Lincoln, son of President Abraham Lincoln, in 1887; the academy has earned a reputation of excellence for 125 years by changing the lives of over 18,000 children; and

WHEREAS, Glenwood Academy integrates a rigorous academic program with a nurturing boarding model that teaches social and leadership skills in a structured environment, including on-campus cottages that house students along with houseparents who provide the necessary discipline, support, and nurturing in a family-like community; and

WHEREAS, Glenwood Academy students are willing and able to learn, but are constrained by difficult socio-economic situations; and

WHEREAS, Over the course of its history, Glenwood Academy has responded to the pressing needs of children and society at large through its many name changes, including the Illinois Training School for Boys in 1887, the Glenwood Manual Training School in 1911, and the Glenwood School for Boys in 1948; and

WHEREAS, In 2002, the Trustees of Glenwood School for Boys expanded the mission of the school to serve both at-risk boys and girls, thereby becoming known as Glenwood School for Boys and Girls; and

WHEREAS, Glenwood Academy is the only boarding school of its kind that provides a safe and nurturing environment for at-risk children throughout the Chicagoland area by offering a holistic program for children to Live, Learn, and Succeed; and

WHEREAS, Children generally come to Glenwood Academy with academic achievement scores 2 years below grade level; with the support of teachers and staff, 85% of eighth grade students in the class of 2011 scored at or above the national average percentile in reading, math, and language; and

WHEREAS, 95% of all the students that graduate from Glenwood Academy's program go on to higher education, the military, or specialized training schools; and

WHEREAS, Glenwood Academy continues to be successful in raising the academic success of at-risk boys and girls from the Chicagoland area; and

WHEREAS, Glenwood Academy is currently celebrating its 125th anniversary; on May 19, 2012, the academy will celebrate its 116th Flag Day and Graduation ceremonies; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the date of May 19, 2012 as Glenwood Academy Day in the State of Illinois and urge the citizens of this State to celebrate Glenwood's success on behalf of at-risk children and their families, its distinguished alumni, and the students it will serve in the future; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Glenwood Academy as a symbol of our esteem and respect.
