Doorkeeper: "All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery.... All persons not entitled to the House floor, please retire to the gallery."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order. Members please be in their seats. We'll be led in prayer by the Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Reverend Krueger: "In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, Amen. O Lord, bless this House to Thy service this day. Amen. Hear the words of Solomon, found in the thirteenth verse of the twelfth chapter of Ecclesiastes: Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter. Fear God and keep His Commandments for this is the whole duty of man. Let us pray. O God, our heavenly Father, we are grateful for the direction Thou hast given in Holy Scripture. May we ever heed Thy wisdom in our deliberation in this House of Representatives so that we become not soft in the head by emotion and by the humanism that is surrounding our society. May we ever look to Thy words to lead us in the paths of truth, to enact Legislation that will bring forth the people guided by faith, a country inspired with hope and a humanity filled with charity. Hear our prayer, O Lord, as we pause in Thy Holy Name, Amen."

Speaker Redmond: "Roll Call for attendance. Representative Madigan. Representative Madigan..."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would the record show that Representative Mugalian is excused because of illness and Representatives Davis, Mann and Flinn will be excused for this entire week because of a meeting of the Advisory Committee on Public Aid."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections? Hearing none....Flinn.... The record will so show. Any excused absences on the Republican side? Let the record show that Representative



Ryan is closing fast. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. The reason I'm so late is my list is so long. Let the record show that Representative Davis, Representative Deavers, Representative Antonovych, Representative Peters, Representative Sevcik, Representative McAvoy.....are all absent because of illness. Representatives Catania, Campbell and Kempiners absent to take care of legislative business."

Speaker Redmond: "Any objections to having the records show the absences....excused absences? Hearing none, the record will so show. Introduction, First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 401, Flinn, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning termination of mineral interests, First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 402, Lucco, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code, First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 403, Stuffle, a Bill for an Act to amend the Downstate Firemen's Pension Fund Article, First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 404, Stuffle, a Bill for an Act to amend the Downstate Firemen's Pension Fund Article, First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bills, Second Reading. On House Bills, Second Reading appears House Bill 18. Representative Kelly? Out of the record. House Bills, Third Reading. House Bills, Third Reading, appears House Bill 4. Representative Kelly."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 4, a Bill for an Act to regulate the repair of Citizens' Band Radios, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 4 is the Citizens' Band Radio Bill, which in effect would require anyone that owns a citizen band radio and wishes to have that radio repaired by a repair shop would have to be a licensed operator. There have been numerous 'CB' radios that have been stolen over the last several years since the advancement of the 'CB'proposal.



Now this Bill would require that thethat a person would have to be licensed to have the radio repaired. It's my feeling and the feeling of many others that by making this a requirementthat you have to be a licensed operator or that you will have to at least have applied for your license from the Federal Communications Commission. You would, in effect, ...be placing a heavy burden upon those who are thieves and who have stolen 'CB' radios. Many times when a thief breaks into an automobile andand rips off the radio, they do actually break the radio and they have to bring them in to have them repaired. If an individual, that is getting it repaired and is a thief and has to identify themselves they would think twice before they would bring that radio in and I hope would think twice before they would steal the radio. So that was what my object in sponsoring this legislation... and I would ask for the approval of this Body."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He indicates he will."

Simms: "Representative Kelly, I'm in basic support of your legislation but in the case of a used car dealer that would have a car that would come in on trade, in some automobiles now are manufactured with the 'CB' radios already included in the automobile, or; in the case where a 'CB' may come in with a used car on a trade. Would that car dealer then be required to have a 'CB' radio to have a license to have it repaired?"

Kelly: "If it is a.....an individual....are you speaking of a car dealer or an individual that's getting a...."

Simms: "A car dealer....."

Kelly: "That purchases a 'CB'.....a car with a 'CB' radio in it?"

Simms: "Let's say, for example, there are 'CB' radios now that are in automobiles that are sold new."

Kelly: "Right."



Simms: "Or in the case of asomeone might trade a their car in on a new car and leave the 'CB' in. Would the car dealer, then, in order to have the radio checked or to be repaired, would he have to have a license?"

Kelly: "If, in fact, first of all you did mention about new automobile with a 'CB' radio in it, this Bill would not include a new...an automobile that has a 'CB' radio, as you can buy it as part of a package, it would not include that. What we would be talking about and your question is, an automobile that is a used automobile that has a 'CB' radio that's included...permanently fixed into the vehicle. Yes, anybody that would buy an automobile that has a 'CB' in it would have to either be a licensed operator or would have to apply for a license ...if in fact they want to get it repaired. I don't think that this is an undue burden on a dealership that is purchasing automobiles that have the 'CB's' implanted in them because I certainly feel that they're just as concerned as anyone else about these rip-offs of 'CB' radios. So I can't see where this would be a drawback"

Simms: "But they would be required to have a license in order to have it repaired, in order to turn-out the used car for resale. Am I correct then?"

Kelly: "Yes, in order to ...to purchase...if they buy the automobile they would have to be....but you say, 'if they sell the automobile'?"

Simms: "Now, the car comes in..."

Kelly: "Yeah."

Simms: "The car is reconditioned before...or allegedly it should be reconditioned before it's resold by the car dealer. The car dealer would then have to take the 'CB' or the radio to a dealer, he would then have to have a license himself?"

Kelly: "Yes....indeed. Right."

Simms: "Okay. That's what I want to know. Thank you."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sumner."

Sumner: "Mr. Speaker, if I were to take another member of my family's 'CB' in to be repaired, would it be necessary for me to have their license with me or would it even be allowed that I could do so?"

Kelly: "Yes. I'll answer that question. You would have to ... you would have to identify yourself. If you weren't a 'CB' operator you would have toat least make some identification about having it repaired. So you'd probably have to bring in your relative's license to.... prove youryou are a legitimate person that wants this item repaired. You could, in fact, ...just as long.. you either have to be licensed or you have to make some proof, as the Bill indicates, that you arehave applied for it. I would say that this would be profc. Most of the time you would be getting it repaired yourself, if you are a 'CB' operator, because you want to deal directly with whoever is fixing your radio. But I would say that in a caseof an exception where you may want to take one in for a family or a friend....I feel that this would cover that."

Sumner: "Will this exception be made so that it is understandable? So there is not a lot of hassle when you go in as far as a citizen is concerned?"

Kelly: "Well,...I don't visualize anyany handicap that thiswould make upon your ability to get your relation's or your friend's 'CB' radio repaired. You see....I'm not... the legislation is not directed against the individual citizen....it's directed against the great many of the 'CB' radio thefts.....thiefs that are trying to steal these radios and I don't want to make life any easier for them than what it is so there's no way that we can explicitly draw just so it takes care of everyone on an individual basis but I feel that right now the legislation willthis proposal will give you that ability to get your....your husband's or your friend's 'CB' radio



repaired. If you have their license and if you can identify yourself."

Sumner: "I do think that's a goodnew law but how do we enforce it then? What is your....how is it going to be enforced?"

Kelly: "Well, enforcing it is just like anything else, if we don't have the cooperation of the radio industry, the radio repair industry, it's like many other items in our State, you won't have thieves being brought to justice. But I am hoping and I expect that the radio repair industry will cooperate with the law enforcement officials and when they suspect that someone is, in fact, a thief, they will submit that information to the local law enforcement agency so that that person can be brought to justice. If not, the law specifically says that they are in violation and, therefore, would be subject to a fine and possible other infedations."

Sumner: "Thank you."

Kelly: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kent."

Kent: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Now, I have a new kind of 'CB' radio where it's in the radio. When I have that radio fixed and I don't mean the 'CB' I mean ...just the radio... am I going to have a 'CB' licensed guy to do it?"

Kelly: "Well, you say your 'CB' is part of the radio?"

Kent: "It sure is."

Kelly: "Okay. If it's part of a radio then it is, in fact, a 'CB' operation and you have to be a licensed operator to have thatparticular unit anyway. I would say 'yes', in fact, you would have to have a license or at least have applied for a license. So, it would make that requirement, Representative."

Kent: "Mr. Speaker, could I speak against the Bill, please?... I'll go ahead, since he is busy. I would think that this would really be a detriment to having things fixed suddenly because...sometimes they fix your radios in the



automobile dealership and so I would say that this could not be enforced. It would be sort of.....just something to have on the books and I would oppose it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Tipsword: "Representative Kelly, this may have been asked and I might have missed your answer to it. Under the present federal law, you can operate a 'CB' radio the minute you have applied for your license. Sometimes that application takes four or five or six weeks to come. What if you have to have your radio repaired in the meantime?"

Kelly: "Well, Representative, the legislation, as amended, does provide forwell, you either have to be a licensed operator or you will have to have applied for your license....for your FCC Class C license. So, it would protect you even if you didn't have your license in the meantime."

Tipsword: "What do you do then, keep a copy of your application to show to them, or...?"

Kelly: "You would have to bring along a copy of your application or possibly.....yeah.....a copy of the application or some other information which would indicate that you had, in fact,sent in for your FCC....regular license. Yes.."

Tipsword: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Boucek."

Boucek: "Mr. Speaker, will the Representative Kelly yield to a question?.....Representative Kelly....."

Speaker Redmond: "The new benedict has just arrived. He's a little bit late. Representative Skinner was married Saturday.....Representative Tipsword, do you want to sing 'Nearer My God to Thee' for his bride?....Proceed, Representative Boucek."

Boucek: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Representative Kelly, the FCC requires that you keep your license at your base

station. They do not give you a pocket identification card. Would you say that we should violate the rules of the FCC and take the license card from our base station to the repair shop?"

Kelly: "If you want to get your radio repaired and if that is, in fact, the communication system which you are using, it's not going to do you much good if it isn't working and I would think 'yes', you should take your license with you, to the repair shop along with the unit, yes."

Boucek: "I have three units, one base and two mobile and the FCC says you must keep that license in your base."

Kelly: "Okay, if you don't keep your license.....what you could do is take a picture of that license....in other words... the Bill says either bring a license or some other reasonable information and I would say a copy of that license would be reasonable...for the repair shop to make that repair. Yes, I do..."

Boucek: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, if he can hear me, will he yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Kosinski: "Richard, I'm a little unclear about this Amendment. Now, the original thrust of the Bill was consistent with my views in the matter, but the Digest indicates that this prohibits the sale or repair of citizens' band radio. Wasn't it emasculated by the Amendment?"

Kelly: "No, no....not really, Representative ..I originally intended that the requirement for a 'CB' radio license was would be with purchasing and also with repairing 'CB' radios. However, during the course of our deliberation, it came upon the matter of if someone wanted to purchase a 'CB' radio, let's say, as a Christmas present or as a birthday present, for their wife, husband or their friend, they couldn't do this without having a license and they



may not be a licensed operator. So, I think in the long run, it would be better not to make this requirement upon an individual because many people, now that it's becoming such a big fad, want to buy these for their friends or for their loved ones and that is the reason why I sponsored the Amendment which took that out. So it's strictly with just repaired 'CB' radios and I think that is where it belongs."

Kosinski: "So, presently a stolen 'CB' radio only comes to life when it's repaired. Is that correct?"

Kelly: "Yes, when a 'CB' radio is stolen and a thief walks into a repair shop, they are going to have to identify themselves and I think this will be a great step forward in reducing the great many stolen 'CB' radios that we have in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Polk...Representative Huskey."

Huskey: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to ask the Sponsor a question."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Huskey: "Representative Kelly, how is the State going to know who all these repair men are throughout the State, if this Bill passes, that they can send them the Rules and Regulations for this particular suggested law?"

Kelly: "Anyone that repairs citizens' band radios and that would be, for the most part, all of your various radio repair shops...throughout Illinois would have to be bound by this provision."

Huskey: "Yeah, but how is the State going to know who these individual repair shops are, they don't pay sales tax on repairs. How are they going to have any record of these repair men, who they are?"

Kelly: "Well, they would be required, as far as you know, traveling throughout the State of Illinois, to decide which each one of them are. I ...I'm not sure. I'd just say that it would require anyone that repairs radios



would have to be made aware of it. So, they would have to be"

Huskey: "Well, we are asking the repair men, really...in order, what we're really doing now, I might be a little confused, but aren't we asking the repair men, the radio or TV repair men to become policemen for the State of Illinois?"
At probably no pay or is there some compensation for them?"

Kelly: "Well, not directly, but indirectly we're asking for their cooperation. It'll be almost impossible to monitor each one of these ...repair shops and individual bases, but there will be many repair shops and hopefully most of the repair shops will cooperate with reporting these stolen 'CB' radios.....to the authorities. So we are asking them to cooperate and be good citizens. Yes."

Huskey: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly to close."

Kelly: "Well, I would just ask that the House accept this - legislation and vote for it. Certainly, the concern of most of the General Assembly Members is thatand it's acknowledged that there are ...stolen 'CB's' in great numbers in this day and age and with the increase in the number of these 'CB' radios I think it can do nothing more but increase the number of stolen radios. This legislation willwill remove this big factor in a thief's ability to steal 'CB' radios and I ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Kelly?"

Kelly: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This proposal, which I brought before the House of Representatives certainly is not going to stop the citizens' band radios....all of the citizens' band radios from being stolen. In no way is it going to continue to stop this promulgation upon the general public, however, it is a step in the right direction. I



think those of you who have CB radios and especially those of you who have spoken against this proposition a little earlier should even be able to realize more and more just how directly this would effect the thieves who are stealing citizens' band radios. I can't understand why ...why anyone that is interested in the number of stolen citizens' band radios, which is a very strong proposition in every district throughout the State of Illinois, would not take a strong interest in this particular proposal. I don't know how many of you have had an opportunity to talk to 'CB' radio operators or to those organizations in your district, but if you want to discontinue a great many stolen 'CB' radios then I ask for your support. It's not an answer, it's just a step in the right direction and I would ask for favorable support."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 65 'aye' and 59 'no'.....the Bill having receivedfailed to receive a constitutional majority is hereby declared lost. Two seven.....Representative Ebbesen on the floor? Representative Ebbesen?.....Take two seven out of the record. Five four....Representative Yourell. Out of the record. Seven six...Representative Deuster.. Representative Deuster....Out of the record. One two zero... Representative Griesheimer. Out of the record. From the Speaker's Table, House Resolution 21."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 21, Geo-Karis...."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. Are there any announcements? Any Committee Chairmen desire to make an announcement? Representative Hart...."

Hart: "The Committee on Financial Institutions will meet at 2 o'clock, in room D-1. We have four, I would like for all of the Members to be there. We'll have a meeting and get it over with very promptly....D-1."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "There'll be a meeting of the Judiciary II Committee in Room 114 at 2 o'clock today in addition to the scheduled matters that appear on the notice. The new Director of the Department of Correction will be appearing before the Judiciary II Committee and the Members are urged to be there promptly at 2 o'clock when the Director of the Department of Corrections will be talking."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Apparently the Clerk thought a lot more of the Bill than the Committee on Cities and Villages did but House Bill 208, which is listed on Second Reading, First Legislative Day, received no votes on attempt to pass it out. So it shouldn't be on there."

Speaker Redmond: "It didn't receive any votes?"

Totten: "No."

Speaker Redmond: "Who was the Sponsor?"

Totten: "Well,Yours truly....was the Sponsor and I'm happy to see the Clerk was so perceptive in getting it on the Calendar because I think the merits of it....if the House would like to leave it there we'll attempt to go tomorrow on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Taylor."

Totten: "He's the detective."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Taylor."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I thank Representative Totten for recognizing that area but we had also recognized it earlier and made certain that that Bill would not have been called. Thank you very much. The Committee on Cities and Villages will meet promptly at 2 o'clock in Room C-1, State Office Building."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce...Somebody bothering you, Mr. Pierce?"

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, the Revenue Committee will meet at 2 p.m., today, in our wonderful Room 118, from which I've



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been liberated ...from the broom closet, will be in Room 118 at 2 p.m., House Revenue Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kosinski."
Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, in conference with Chairman of Judiciary I, Bob Mann, I understand House Bill 166 was inadvertently assigned to that Committee and should have been assigned to Committee II. What is the procedure, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Committee on Assignment has to make the change and we will you call it toI'll call it to their....."

Kosinski: "Thank you, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any other announcements? Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Just to welcome back to our chambers our good friend Sparky Garmisa."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I move that we recess for 15 minutes."

Speaker Redmond: "Stand at ease for 15 minutes and then recess, is that correct?.....Representative Madigan, the Clerk advises me that what he would desire us to stay...in Perfunctory Session for about 15 minutes for the purpose of permitting Bills to be introduced, at the conclusion of that, then adjourn until noon tomorrow. Is that your motion?"

Madigan: "...So I move that we stand.....we recess to a Perfunctory in about 15 minutes and then adjourn until 12 o'clock tomorrow afternoon."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, before we do that....I introduced a Resolution last week, House Resolution #67 and the Committee Clerk from'Exec' forgot to post it. So, I wonder if I could have leave of the House to suspend the provisions of Rule 18 (b) I believe...."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker....Mr. Speaker..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan..."

The Gentleman's motion prevails. House Resolution 67 will be heard. Representative Madigan, are you seeking recognition?"

Madigan: "Do we wish to move for the adoption of the Adjournment"

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion. All those in favor say 'aye'...'aye', opposed 'no' and the 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and we now stand.....Perfunctory Session for about 15 minutes and at which time we will adjourn until tomorrow at 12 o'clock."
