

Doorkeeper: "All persons not entitled to the House floor please retire to the gallery. Attention all Members, the House will convene in five minutes. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Where are our guests in the gallery, where are they from? Where? Alton, Illinois? Madison County. They had a pretty good basketball team last year, didn't they? The House will come to order, Members please be in their seats. Be led in prayer this morning by Reverend Krueger, the House Chaplain."

Suggest that you look at the Third Reading Bills and see if any of your Bills that should not have been moved yesterday was inadvertently moved and call it to our attention, we'll bring it back. House will come to order, Members please be in their seats. Representative Lucco, you seek recognition?"

Lucco: "Yes, good morning, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,



on this real bright sunny day, I thought that all of you would like to take a look at this little palm tree that someday will grow up and be a very, very important part of this House. For those of you that don't know, today is our Chief Clerk, Jack O'Brien's birthday. And I'd like to present him with this little tree and the Speaker, of course, may want to make some comment about this."

Speaker Redmond: "I would like to have the Members take a look at the Calendar today and I would like to also have a...a comment and a word of gratitude and thanks not only to Jack but to the entire staff in the Clerk's Office. We moved about 525 Bills yesterday. I don't know how in the world they did the job that they did. And, Jack, because he is the Chief Clerk is just a symbol of a word of gratitude to clerks both in the well and upstairs."

Clerk O'Brien: "And I don't want the girls on the fourth floor to be forgotten, they were here at 1:30 this morning, too."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar, do you seek recognition?"

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I ask leave to move House Bill 1327 back to Second Reading for purpose of an Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? House Bill 1327 on Third Reading. Will you read the Bill, Mr. Clerk? 1327."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1327. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Municipal Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 clarifies some of the language that was asked for by the Municipal League and I ask for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to return this to the Order of Second Reading? Hearing no objection it will be returned to the Order of Second Reading. Mahar. I don't think so, what... what's the number? "

Mahar: "Mr. Speaker, did you adopt the Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "We have to wait till the Clerk gets the...."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Mahar. Amends House Bill 1327 on page 1, lines 25 and 26 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of the Amendment.

Those in favor signify by saying 'aye'; 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carries. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Anybody else have a Bill on Third they want to return to Second? Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to return House Bill 941 to Second Reading for purposes of an...it's Amendment 2, Jack."

Clerk O'Brien: "What...what Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "Who are you talking to, Geo?"

Geo-Karis: "Pardon?"

Speaker Redmond: "You talking...I don't care."

Geo-Karis: "Pardon?"

Speaker Redmond: "Never mind."

Geo-Karis: "They got it."

Speaker Redmond: "942 was it?"

Geo-Karis: "941."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bill 941."

Geo-Karis: "This. This Amendment will amend the Bill so that the state colleges will have the right of vote in the State Board of Higher Education, and simply.... And simply add one member from the non-public colleges on the board."

Speaker Redmond: "Does she have leave to return 941....we don't know what..... Does she have leave to return it to the Order of Second Reading? Returned to the Order of Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 941 on page 2 by deleting lines 5 through 8 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "I move the passage of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Lady has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to 941.

Those in favor...Representative, Representative Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Mr. Speaker and Members, would the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Geo-Karis: "Certainly."

Speaker Redmond: "She will."



Stuffle: "Could you explain the intent of this Amendment?"

Geo-Karis: "Yes. This Amendment will allow the state colleges to retain their vote on the Board of Higher Education and...which before the Bill did not. And all I'm doing is adding a non....a member of a... nonpublic colleges to be a member of the Board of Higher Education, that's all."

Stuffle: "Would the...."

Geo-Karis: "There is none now, you know."

Stuffle: "Right. Would the Amendment then give back the four public members a right to vote?"

Geo-Karis: "Yes."

Stuffle: "Does it also specify that the nonpublic member has to be a lay person, or is a nonpublic member still the president of the federation?"

Geo-Karis: "It's the...and it's not the president....yes, it's the president of the...it's the chairman, it's not the president of the federation."

Stuffle: "But is not a lay person?"

Geo-Karis: "It is a layperson, yeah."

Stuffle: "It is not a layperson in the sense that it is a person who is directly connected in administrative position with the Independent Federation?"

Geo-Karis: "No, that's right. It's not. It would be a president of one of the colleges. It's the chairman...it's not the...you know, it's not the president of the Independent Federation, it's the chairman of the.... It's good, honest, Larry."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's of...Lady's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Anyone else have a Bill on Third Reading that they want to return to the Order of Second for an Amendment? Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "2309, Mr. Speaker."



Speaker Redmond: "2309."

Clerk O'Brien: "2309 is on Second Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "It's on Second Reading, Representative."

Cunningham: "Well, then let's adopt the Amendment. It's a meaningless Amendment that's been suggested by counsel from the other side, my great friend Lee Schwartz. And all it does is delete the referenceIs this premature for me to suggest this?"

Speaker Redmond: "I think this is premature...."

Cunningham: "My apologies."

Speaker Redmond: "This is your second premature on this."

Cunningham: "...Again, your forgiveness."

Speaker Redmond: "Pretty soon you'll be full term."

Cunningham: "I repent."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyers, for what purpose do you arise?"

Meyer: "2175, Mr. Speaker, I'd like it brought back to Second Reading. for purposes of an...."

Speaker Redmond: "2175. Gentleman asks leave to return 2175 to the Order of Second Reading. Does he have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. 2175 returned to the Order of Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Meyer. Amends House Bill 2175 by deleting lines 8 through 22 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyers."

Meyer: "Mr. Chairman, I'd like to move to table Committee Amendment #1. May I have leave?"

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has moved to table Committee Amendment #1. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries. Amendment #1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Meyer: "Floor Amendment #2 is incorporates Committee Amendment #1 and makes one change in the Bill, changing the word 'owner' to 'resident'. I move adoption...."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it; the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 995. Representative Steczko."



Steczo: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to bring House Bill 995 back to the Order of Second Reading for the purposes of an Amendment.

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman requests leave to return 995 to the Order of Second Reading for purposes of an Amendment. Does he have leave? Hearing no objection leave is granted. House Bill 995 will be returned to the Order of Second Reading."

Steczo: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 answers the questions that were asked the other day with relation to service at....full and mini-service stations. Amendment #1 provides that only when a service station operator advertises mini-service then that service shall be offered during the time...period of time in which that reduced price is advertised. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 995. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Motion carries. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. House Bills Second Reading. We'll go in numerical order on these and give us some idea what our plans are. I think we did last night what we probably hoped we could do tomorrow morning, so we won't work tomorrow. However...however, we will work tonight as....my guess is eight or nine o'clock. I really don't know. But we'll go to Third Reading starting Monday of next week and we won't return back to the Order of Second Reading for all of next week. Our intention is to adjourn today; to return Monday at twelve o'clock. Twelve o'clock. I'm beginning to think that this load is pretty nearly unmanageable. I don't know just how we're going to make it because quite frankly although we had five hundred and fifty fewer Bills, the last time we had almost the same number that came out of Committee. Adjournment Resolution."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 34. Madigan. Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Eightieth General Assembly of the State of the Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the House of Representatives adjourns on Friday, May 6, 1977, it stands adjourned until Monday, May 9, 1977, at twelve o'clock noon. And



when the Senate adjourns on Friday, May 6, 1977, it stands adjourned until Tuesday, May 10, 1977, at three o'clock p.m."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. The Adjournment Resolution."

Madigan: "Move for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. The Resolution's adopted, pardon me. Messages from the Senate."

Clerk O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives, the Senate has concurred with the House in the passage of a Bill of the following title, to-wit: House Bill #51. Passed by the Senate, May 5, 1977. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Anderson."

Anderson: "Mr. Speaker, I notice that the Appropriations Committee, both I and II, are scheduled for noon Monday."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, I believe there is an announcement on the floor that postponed those hearings until one o'clock. So there was a change."

Anderson: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "House Bills Second Reading. House Bill #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill #2. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan. Out of the record. 19. Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, there were two Committee...."

Speaker Redmond: "The Clerk...the Clerk says there's nothing to do with this one."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendments 1 and 2 were adopted...."

Hanahan: "Right."

Clerk O'Brien: "In Committee."

Hanahan: "Right,...."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or floor Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 19."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 19. A Bill for an Act relating to the right of teachers and other educational workers to join unions. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal motion filed? Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Amendments from the floor."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note is filed, Third Reading. 34."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 34. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections ofthis Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendment #2 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions, no floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading 41."

Clerk O'Brien: "He wants this out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Who?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Cunningham."

Speaker Redmond: "Take that out of the record. 41."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 41. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendments #1, 2 and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. Amendment #4..."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "Younge. Amends House Bill 41 on page 6, line 24 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Younge."

Younge: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I move the adoption of the Amendment. It is not opposed by the Sponsor of the Bill, Mr. Caldwell."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Caldwell."

Caldwell: "That's correct, Mr...."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Lady's motion for the adoption of Amendment #4. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'.

The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 44."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 44."

Speaker Redmond: "The fiscal note been furnished on this?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The fiscal note is not filed. No fiscal note."

Speaker Redmond: "There's nothing filed? I'd like to call the attention of the Members that are sponsoring Bills that fiscal notes have been requested that I think maybe you ought to do something about that if you want to get these Bills moved along. 83."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 83. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendments #2 and 4 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any motions filed with respect to Amendment #2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #7. Conti. Amends House Bill 83 by striking everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I arise for two purposes this morning. First of all, I would like leave to table Amendment #7."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have leave? Hearing no objection, leave.... is that your table...your Amendment?"

Conti: "That's my Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment #7 is tabled."

Conti: "Secondly, I'd like the attention of the Members of the House, that I feel I've been here quite a long time and one thing I have never done is strike the enacting clause of any Member's Bill. I may have voted vehemently and decided to kill the Bill, but I've never moved to strike the enacting clause. Nor would I have ever had a Resolution drafted to recommit it to another Committee after it came out of Committee and got a full hearing in Committee. I don't know whether Mr. Marovitz or whether the IPAC or who was responsible, but on April 27th, the Chicago Sun-Times - I don't know where they got their information - came out with an editorial that debate is needed on the Bill and the how's and why's and the measure is controversial. It might penalize the Illinois industry, for example, but it would just make the rates fair. Fortunately, the withdrawal Tuesday of a motion by Representative Conti of Elmwood Park, will allow the full airing the measure



should have. Conti has moved to shunt the Bill yet to another Committee'. I have never prepared a...motion to recommit to another Committee. I don't know what they're talking about and I'm not going to ask for a retraction but it's another good example of editorializing the news instead of reporting it. And I wish they'd get their facts straight before they'd write any editorials."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Marovitz, for what purpose do you arise at 10:20?"

Marovitz: "On a point of personal privilege, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Was your name mentioned in debate?"

Marovitz: "Yes, it was."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Marovitz: "...Mr. Speaker. As my good friend from the other side of the aisle, Representative Conti, knows, although we disagree on this particular issue we've always dealt with each other in a fair manner like gentlemen. And I just want the Representative to know publicly, although I told him this privately, that as far as that particular editorial, I, myself had nothing to do with that editorial being in the newspaper. And I respect the Gentleman's word and I hope that we can continue to deal in the manner that we have dealt up 'til now for many years to come."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any further Amendments? Third Reading. 106."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 106."

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Clerk, are the Calendars reasonably accurate when it says a fiscal note is requested? If it's filed are they accurate on that?"

Clerk O'Brien: "They were as of yesterday..."

Speaker Redmond: "I think probably we should omit those where the fiscal note has been requested and assuming the Calendar is correct. Is that right?"

Clerk O'Brien: "You could ask, Chalky could look at the Bill in just a second and tell us if it's filed."

Speaker Redmond: "106, has the note been filed, Chalky?"



Clerk O'Brien: "No, the note is not filed."

Speaker Redmond: "132."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 132. This Bill's been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 186."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 186. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendments #1 and 2...Amendments 1, 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion's filed. Floor Amendment #3. Luft. Amends House Bill 186, as amended, by Amendment 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #3 to House Bill 186 is a technical Amendment. It corrects the errors that were made by the Reference Bureau in drafting Amendment #2. It is a simple, technical Amendment and I would move for its adoption at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4... Jack Davis."

Luft: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Has this Amendment been distributed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Has not. Who's the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Jack Davis and Ewing."

Speaker Redmond: "When was it filed? Representative Luft, what's your pleasure?"

Luft: "Well, Mr. Speaker, since you said you would not be going to Second Reading at all next week, I'd like to move this Bill, if you wish. I would appreciate it very much."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. It's been the ruling of the Chair that the Amendment is dilatory since it hasn't been filed in time to be printed and distributed. So, we'll move this to the Order of Third Reading. Now you talk to the Sponsor, Mr. Davis, and maybe you can work



something out on it. Third Reading. 238."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 238. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Robinson. Amends House Bill 238 on page 8 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robinson."

Robinson: "This...this Bill is a Bill that provides for direct election of the Commerce Commission. Amendment #1 clarifies the way in which the Members from Cook County will be elected."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald, you seeking recognition? Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1....Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'm going to have to oppose Amendment #1. It...I believe it's an unfair advantage. You're taking away something from the City of Chicago that we have presently and I'll have to oppose Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Robinson to close."

Robinson: "The Amendment doesn't materially affect the Bill except it is an Amendment that I did discuss with the Majority Leader before I put it in. I thought it was acceptable. It provides from Cook County...two Members from the City of Chicago, one from the suburbs. The Bill already provides one Member from each of the downstate judicial districts. I move adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor of the adoption indicate by voting 'aye', opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Conti."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker, this is a part of the action of the lifeline Bills and some common cause Bills that have been coming before the Public Utilities Committee. And this action and this Bill, I guess, was the birth of some of the Bills aimed at the utilities companies this year and the ICC that they weren't doing their job. When Dave Robinson came up to me and talked to me about maybe we ought to elect them instead of appoint them, they'd be a little more responsive to the people in common cause and the 'Ma-Hall' group and the IPAC.



And they...he suggested that they should be elected. I did not buy his Amendment when he said he was going to elect them from Circuit Court Judge Districts because, again, the City of Chicago, with their votes, would make orphans of the suburbanites just like we got the short end of the stick on the RTA. So I asked him if he would amend his Bill to make sure at least that the suburbanites and the downstaters would get their fair share of the candidates if the ICC members were to be elected. I'm not saying it's a good Bill but I'm saying at least it's a reapportionment. And if we are going to elect the Illinois Commerce Commission members then I think that the suburban, which has close to three million people now in the suburban area of Cook County, should have their fair share on that board just like the City of Chicago is going to get two with just a half a million people more. That's usually our fair share in the suburbs, half a million less people and we get a two-to-one ratio on anything that we divide."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 68 'aye', 24 'no'. The Gentleman's motion prevails and the Amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Macdonald. Amends House Bill 238 on page 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to table Amendment #2 because we more fully expanded the concept in number two in number four. So I'd like to table number two at this time."

Speaker Redmond: "Lady has moved to table Amendment #2. Does she have leave? Is this your Amendment, Representative Macdonald? Hearing no objections leave is granted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Robinson. Amends House Bill 238 on page 8, line 33 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robinson."

Robinson: "Mr. Speaker, in Committee when this was heard some Members of the utility industry suggested that if this Bill was to get out, that it would be better to have staggered terms so that if there were a burning issue one year all the Members of the Illinois Commerce Commission wouldn't be elected according to that one issue."



So this allows for staggered terms in the election to the Illinois Commerce Commission. I move adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #3. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4. Macdonald. Amends House Bill 238 on page 9 by inserting between lines 9 and 10 the following and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. If the General Assembly decides that they indeed do want to elect the Commerce Commission, I think that it is very important for us to prohibit contributions that may be a conflict. So Amendment #4 provides that no industry regulated by the Commission, no person who owns any interest in any industry regulated by the Commission or who is employed by any such industry or any labor or manager's organizations that represents employees of any such industry may contribute anything of value to any candidate for a member of the Commission. I move the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robinson."

Robinson: "Mr. Speaker, I agree with this Amendment. I think that one of the reasons we're moving for the direct election of the Illinois Commerce Commission is so that we can end some of the special interest influence on these decisions. They make billions and billions of dollars in decisions that affect the people of Illinois in a way more than any other office of state government perhaps except the Governor. I agree that those who are regulated should not be involved in contributing to the campaigns of those who run for this office. And so I concur in this Amendment that Representative Macdonald has proposed."

Speaker Bradley: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Mr. Speaker, thank you. I'd like to speak on a point of order as soon as you're done with this Bill. Okay?"

Speaker Bradley: "We'll...you'll be recognized, Sir. Mrs. Macdonald to close on the Amendment."



Macdonald: "I think we have....between Representative Robinson and I, think we have thoroughly explained the Amendment and in the interest of time I would just ask for the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #4 to House Bill 238. All in favor will signify by saying 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Further Amendments? The Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, the prior speaker on the podium had ruled an Amendment on 186 out of order because it was dilatory. Now, I...I'd just like to comment on that. The difficulty that we are having, as you are having, with the volume of Bills coming out, analyzing them and putting Amendments on makes it difficult to file Amendments that we may want to file on time. I thought the rules provided that any time a Member files an Amendment the Bill will stay on Second Reading, or unless we can get an agreement from the Sponsor to bring it back when that Amendment's been distributed, that the Bill should remain there. Now the Bill in question was House Bill 186 and Representative Davis and had filed an Amendment - and I believe it is Representative Luft's Bill - and I wonder if Representative Luft would agree to bring the Bill back to Second Reading when that Amendment is distributed otherwise I think the Bill should remain on Second Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, Mr. Luft was...not listening to your request at that but the Chair would like to comment. I don't think that the rules do provide that a Bill must stay on Second Reading....yeah, huh? Yeah,...the....there's no rule that provides it must stay on Second Reading waiting for an Amendment. It's a courtesy, really, and it should be worked out between the Gentleman or Lady who is offering the Amendment and the Chief Sponsor. And you and I know that generally they...they are courteous enough to bring the Bill back from Third to Second for an Amendment. And, Mr. Luft, Mr. Totten was requesting on some measure you have if you would be so kind as to bring back to Second a Bill you have. And we are not



tabling those Amendments, we're just trying to move things along and we're getting the Amendments printed as rapidly and getting them up here and then.... I have a Bill in the same situation myself and I'm waiting for the...it's on Third Reading, we're waiting for it to come up, we'll move it back to Second. Now that's different than somebody else offering to my Bill. I know that, I have control of it, but....there's no rule..."

Totten: "Yeah, Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Bradley: "There's no rule, as you...as you request, or suggest."

Totten: "But traditionally when an Amendment has been filed with the Clerk, we either have the Bill held on Second Reading or the Sponsor agrees to bring it back."

Speaker Bradley: "Right...."

Totten: "If the...if the Sponsor agrees to bring it back then we have... then there's no problem."

Speaker Bradley: "Let's take it as they come along, we'll ask the Sponsor at that time and we'll see what happens. Mr...Mr. Luft, do you know which Bill they're referring to?"

Luft: "They're referring to House Bill 186, Mr. Speaker, and at that time I asked if the Amendment had been distributed and they had not been. And if you'll recall, Speaker Redmond said that we will not be going to Second Readings at all next week, we'll be on Third Readings. And I wanted to move it to Third Reading at this time. If the Sponsors of that Amendment would like to speak to me concerning that Amendment and I feel that Amendment will not harm that Bill in any way, I'll be more than happy to pull it back off Third, but I want to make sure on this thing...if it does not harm the Bill in any way."

Speaker Bradley: "I think every Member has the, you know, the right to move that Bill to Third Reading. We all want to move them along and I think Mr. Luft.... Why don't you talk with Mr. Luft? Did you have an Amendment for his Bill?"

Totten: "No. It's not my Amendment. Representative Davis has filed the Amendment, it was filed yesterday with the Clerk's Office and of course it's not been printed."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, as...if...if we were to rule that right now on



that....if that Gentleman does not agree to bring the Bill back to Second Reading, there's no way in the world we're going to get it back to Second Reading unless....I don't know how we'd do it unless the Gentleman agrees to do it. So Mr. Davis had better get over and talk to Mr. Luft and try to work things out."

Totten: "But, Mr. Speaker, what....yeah, if he does not agree, and that Amendment has been filed finally with the Clerk, then that Bill should be held on Second Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Point of order, Mr. Speaker, we were here until about 1:15 in the morning, I'd like to move right along. I believe you're part....of a dialogue going on right now."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, I think....I think your point is well taken with the exception that I think we're in a position this is going to happen a few times during the day and we might as well clear up what the intent of the Chair is, and the ruling of the Chair has been that if the Amendment is not distributed the....the Sponsor of the legislation has every right to move that Bill to Third Reading. And that's the ruling that the Speaker, himself, made and I'm going to abide by that rule. There's no other way that you're....I'm not going to have myself put into a box in a difficult situation. He ruled that and that's the way the Chair is going to....go along with that ruling. The Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I spoke with the...the real Speaker yesterday about this situation of filing Amendments and I'm not sure that I understand what your definition of timely is. And certainly if it's our Amendment and you don't think it's timely then you're going to do what you want with it. And I think the smart thing for you to do at this time would be to take this Bill out of the record till we get this resolved."

Speaker Bradley: "The Bill we're talking about, Mr. Ryan, has already been moved to Third Reading, yesterday as I...."

Ryan: "No, that Bill was not moved yesterday."

Speaker Bradley: "It was moved this morning to Third Reading, Mr. Ryan, but we're not on that Bill. We're just discussing what happens if



an Amendment is filed on a piece of legislation and it has not been distributed. We're giving the Sponsor of the Bill the opportunity to move that Bill to Third Reading. And that was the ruling of the real Speaker."

Ryan: "When did he make that ruling?"

Speaker Bradley: "And we'll abide by that....Mr....the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "All right, Mr. Speaker, you and I just talked before you came to the podium and I...I had a brief....couple of words with Speaker Redmond. All....your rule....Mr. Speaker. What you are saying, then, if a Member on the other side of the aisle files an Amendment and wherever the Amendments are being printed, and all of us know at this time of the Session, they're inundated. They just can't get the work out. You're saying if the Amendment isn't printed and the Sponsor of the Bill doesn't want to hold it on Second, it goes to Third. Now what you're saying, Mr. Speaker, is that the Members of the House don't have a chance to participate in Second Readings simply because the printing process is overworked and overloaded. That's not fair to the Members. Second Reading is an amendment stage."

Speaker Bradley: "Well...."

Telcser: "If...if...if the Sponsor won't agree to...to take it back to Second, let's read it a second time and leave it on Second."

Speaker Bradley: "Mr. Telcser, let's do this. We're not at that point in time where that has happened where we can make a change anyway. This Bill has already been put on Third Reading. Let's move along and if we get to that point then we'll make a decision if it's going to be different. I doubt that it will. Maybe we can work it out where the...as the Speaker suggested, that the Sponsor of the Bill and the Member who is offering the Amendment, that it's not printed, get together and make an agreement between themselves that he will bring it back to Third."

Telcser: "No, but that's..."

Speaker Bradley: "That's where we are."

Telcser: "But that's not...that's not right, Mr. Speaker, because if the Sponsor doesn't want to then we're...the House is denied Second



Reading."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, let's wait till we get to that..."

Telcser: "You can read a Bill a second time and leave it on Second and you still save a Legislative Day."

Speaker Bradley: "Let's wait till we get to that point and the first time...."

Telcser: "Jack, you may want to have Amendments to our Bills. It works both ways."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan, on a point of order."

Hanahan: "Point of order, Mr. Speaker, this is dialogue after a ruling of the Chair. The Gentleman knows full well after having served as a Speaker of this House, that the only recourse he has, appeal the rulings of the Chair, not to hold dialogue...."

Speaker Bradley: "I think your...I think...point is well taken. The last comment of the Chair is, we're not ruling that that Amendment is out of order or anything else. We're going to wait until the time comes now and until we have that situation we'll address it at that time. House Bill 254."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 254. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Bluthardt, Collins. Amends House Bill 254 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bluthardt. Oh, all right, Mr. Collins is...handle that Amendment."

Collins: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Representative Bluthardt asked me to handle this Amendment for him. It is the same Amendment, as you will recall, that was adopted on Bradley Bill yesterday. The....it modifies the five-man board to the extent that the fifth member is the chairman of the board but he is a nonvoting member except in the event of a tie. If the four partisan members are unable to reach agreement then, and only then, does the fifth member have the...have a vote. The House accepted this unanimously yesterday and I would ask for the same consideration



on this Amendment to this Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "Any discussion? Hearing none the Gentleman moves that Amendment #1 to House Bill 254....all in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'no'. Opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the.... All in favor of the Gentleman's motion vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Michael, would you.... Zeke. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 62 'ayes', 72 'ayes', 63 'noes'. And the Gentleman's motion is adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. House Bill 268."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 268. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Just a minute, there is a Committee Amendment. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any motions relative to Amendments #1 and 2? The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Greishëimer."

Greisheimer: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, on this particular Bill, Amendments #1 and 2 are inconsistent on their face. Amendment #1 was evidently adopted by the Committee while I, as Sponsor, was not in the room. I talked to the Chairman of the Committee and he has advised me that he believes that it was adopted incorrectly. In light of the adoption by the Committee, the second Amendment.... I would move at this time to table Committee Amendment #1 and I believe the Committee Chairman will concur in that."

Speaker Bradley: "Gentleman moves to table Committee Amendment #1. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion to table say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Gentleman's motion is adopted and the Amendment is tabled. Is there a motion on 2? The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Greisheimer."

Greisheimer: "Mr...Mr. Speaker, on Amendment 2 what we have done is reduce the statute of limitation period on these two particular diseases. And this Amendment changes the period from twenty-five to twenty years asbestosis and from twenty-five to seven years on silicosis. I would



move the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, the Amendment was adopted in Committee. You don't have to move...."

Greisheimer: "Oh, all right."

Speaker Bradley: "Been adopted, so....there's motions relative... It's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Abramson. Amends House Bill 268 on line 1 by deleting Section 1 of...and so forth."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Abramson."

Abramson: "Amendment #3, Member.....amends the Bill. Requires that an injured employee who refuses service of an employer's physician. To select a physician from a panel of physicians maintained by the employer and approved by the Industrial Commission. Presently, an employee may refuse the employer's physician and choose any physician he desires. This promotes doctor shopping. An employee goes from one doctor to another until he finds the type of medical report that ...that he needs in order to get his claim approved. Second part of my Amendment is to the process for determining the degree of hearing loss in cases of partial hearing loss. The standards are based on a decibel system used in the State of Wisconsin. Provides for yearly exemptions based on aging. Bases the first twenty-five decibel of loss are not compensated. Permits deductions for pre-existing hearing loss. The problem with the statute as it now exists is it is vague, hard to determine a standard for computing hearing loss. The next part of the Amendment eliminates the compensation rates adjustment fund. Or secondary injury fund which pays the cost of living increases for long term benefit recipients. Employers are presently assessed one-half of one-percent of all workmen's compensation payments to maintain this fund. Last part of the Amendment reduces permanent partial benefits paid individuals who return to work but are partially handicapped. Reduces the present benefit which equal $66\frac{2}{3}$ of the difference between the... an employee's present earnings and those he would have earned if he were able to function at full capacity to 50% of that difference. I move the adoption of Amendment #3."



Speaker Bradley: "Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #3.

Discussion? The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, these are sweeping changes to the Workmen's Compensation Act and I might...I wonder if the Sponsor would answer a question as to whether this was embodied in the Bill? It has been heard by the Industry and Labor Committee?"

Abramson: "I didn't have any Workmen's Compensation Bills in Labor and Commerce Committee."

Giorgi: "So this is...this is a sweeping change. It hasn't gone through Committee, is that it? These Amendments...this Amendment makes some... creates standards for hearing and...it eliminates the opportunity for an injured employee to...to use his own doctor, his own specialist. Is that what you're saying?"

Abramson: "Pardon me?"

Giorgi: "This doesn't allow an injured employer...employee to use his own specialist, his own doctor that he might need."

Abramson: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Bradley: "Yes, Mr...."

Abramson: "Can we take these out of the record?"

Speaker Bradley: "Let's take this out of the record and we'll...are there further Amendments?"

Giorgi: "Yeah, there are...there are more Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "All right, we'll...the.... Mr. Greisheimer, we'll leave this on Second Reading. Lady from Lake, Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, I wanted to ask a question of the Sponsor."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, let's wait...we're not at that position now. We took it out of the record."

Geo-Karis: "All I wanted to know...all I wanted to know is when the Amendments were adopted, are they the same ones that are in the Digest book dated April 27?"

Speaker Bradley: "Well..."

Geo-Karis: "That's all I wanted to know."

Speaker Bradley: "He's not at his desk right now and you're asking him and I...let's take it out of the record and hold it. Well, we didn't do anything with 3, tabled 1 and adopted 2 and the Committee...all right, 268 is out of the record. 368. Mr. Greisheimer on 368."



Greisheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 368, the Amendment that has been placed on this Bill hopefully brings the Bill into compliance with the request of a number of the Members of the Executive Committee that heard this Bill. First of all the Amendment which completely takes the place of the original Bill tries to use permissive language with regard to the prosecution of these events as Representative Tipsword has suggested. I've reviewed this with Representative Tipsword. I believe we agree it improves it somewhat. The question isis what the permissive language is in the Bill per se. If Representative Tipsword has any comments on it he has been shown the Amendment. Also, it revises the various provisions of the Bill so it's in a better order. There were other suggestions made by the Committee at the time it was passed out to eliminate certain mandatory language in the Bill which I've similarly removed from the Bill in this comprehensive Amendment. I have tried to comply with all of the requests of the Committee at the time that I appeared before it. If anyone has any specific questions on this. I'll be glad to answer them."

Speaker Bradley: "...Any discussion? Hearing none, the Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 368. All in favor say 'aye', opposed....'ayes' have it. Favor of Mr. Daniels. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Bradley: "Third Reading. 375."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 375. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee. Floor..."

Speaker Bradley: "Any...any motions relative to...."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Floor Amendment #2. Stearney."

Speaker Bradley: "Is Mr. Stearney here? I don't think he's here, we'd better take that out of the record."



Speaker Bradley: "376."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 376. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there any motions relative to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Bradley: "Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Greiman, what purpose do you arise, Sir?"

Greiman: "Did...did the Clerk say there was no Amendments relative to 376?"

Speaker Bradley: "On three-what?"

Greiman: "376."

Speaker Bradley: "We're just getting to that point, Sir."

Greiman: "Oh, okay, because I have a floor Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "Further Amendments...."

Clerk O'Brien: "This is...I don't....I'm missing...we must have worked on this before....Committee Amendment 1 and then the next Amendment I have is 4."

Speaker Bradley: "Mrs. Pullen. Regarding 376, which is your Bill, was this Bill on Second Reading before, we....it seems as though we go from Amendment #1 to Amendment #4."

Pullen: "I've been wondering about that, Mr. Speaker, myself. This Bill has never been called on Second Reading other than to be read a second time this morning in a perfunctory manner."

Speaker Bradley: "Well, let's have Mr. Greiman, while we have Amendment #4 instead of 2 or 3."

Clerk O'Brien: "Evidently we misnumbered the Amendment. If you would ask for leave to change Amendment #4 to #2, on its face."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman asks leave to do that and hearing no objection it will be Amendment #2 and Mr. Greiman on the Amendment."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, perhaps the most sacred thing that we have is our right to vote. People in this country have given their lives and their energies and all that they have to insure the vote for other people in this



country. In 1976 in the Election some 5,000 Cook County voters did not have their votes counted. I suppose one could make political hay of that somehow or other but I'm not interested in the fault. I'm not interested in the reasons why they were not voted. I don't want to make a political thing out of this. I want to see that a sensible way is...is adopted by this Body to allow for efficient election machinery so that no one, no one who votes and particularly those people who have taken the trouble, they had absentee ballots, will be disenfranchised. Several Bills were put in, House Bill 376 came out of Election Committee by a close vote. That vote...Bill turns it, changes the whole system around. It gives to the township clerks the right to handle the whole absentee process so that, for example, in Cook County we would have thirty different arrangements because we have thirty different township clerks. Thirty different interpretations of how a federal election should be held. Accordingly, I have filed Amendment 2. Firstly Amendment #2 corrects something that is not addressed by the House Bill 376. There were many complaints that people who had made application early in October didn't get their ballots until the end of the month. My Amendment requires that the clerk within two working days gets those ballots out of the office to the people, to the voters, so that they can have proper time to vote and get their ballots back. That's a very critical part of Amendment 2. Amendment 2 further provides that we shall continue to deliver absentee ballots as we have in the past. And that those ballots that are not delivered, those ballots which are postmarked, for example, the day prior to the election but are not delivered, for any reason, will be counted by a separate precinct. That separate precinct will have all the safeguards against any election fraud. Candidates will have a right to...to have watchers. Parties will have a right to have watchers. Of course the judges will be picked in the same manner as they are now picked for other precincts. This Bill, essentially, leaves the good order of the election machinery as it is but insures that every single vote that is cast will be counted. The present Bill,



as it is written, makes no assurance of that. If the Township Clerk in one township doesn't deliver the Bill, they don't get counted, they just don't get counted. This Bill is a very important Bill not just to my district where twenty-two hundred people weren't allowed to vote, my Congressional District, that is, but to people all over the state who have taken their time to vote absentee. Taken the time to want their votes cast. I ask that you adopt Amendment #2."

Speaker Bradley: "Discussion? The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill....Gentleman....the Lady from Cook, Mrs. Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 376 is my Bill and I do not accept or particularly care for this Amendment to this Bill. In fact, I have not seen this Amendment until about fifteen minutes ago when I discovered Amendments #5 and 6 and sent a page to find out what Amendments 2, 3 and 4 were. We then found there were no 2 and 3. Suddenly this #4 becomes #2. But the Sponsor of this Amendment did not bring it to me or even mention that he was going to be introducing this Amendment. This Amendment entirely guts the Bill. It completely changes the purpose of this Bill. This Amendment allows for the counting of absentee ballots after 6 o'clock on election day in the office of the election authority. It is an important principle that all ballots should be counted by the Precinct Election Judges in charge of the precincts that the voter is casting his vote in. This Amendment would shift the counting to a special panel set up by the election authority, in this case the County Clerk. It completely destroys the intent of House Bill 376 which was voted out of the Elections Committee not by a very close vote but by a vote of 10 to 7. This is an important issue, particularly in Cook County. We are looking, in this Bill, to transfer the authority to a local place so that the ballots can be easily distributed to the polling places and that will insure that they are counted. The fact that now the County Clerk has to deliver them, sometimes as much as fifty miles from his office, makes it no surprise that it is impossible for him to deliver ballots in time to be counted. I have not sought



to make this a political Bill. I have not criticized the County Clerk. I am not taking this from him because he did a bad job. In fact, I said in Committee that it was not surprising that he could not get these ballots delivered. In moving the absentee ballot procedure to the Township Clerk we are hoping to put it in the hands of someone who will be within six miles of the polling place for purpose of delivering the ballots and someone who knows where the polling places are because it's in their own neighborhood. That is how these ballots will be counted, by the Precinct Election Judges. If House Bill 376 is left in the form in which I introduced it, these ballots will be counted. I ask you to defeat this Amendment. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I really, I really believe that this Amendment, although well-intentioned, does great harm to a very good Bill. This is a problem that we became more aware of in the last election than ever before but it's not a problem that has been newly come upon. The fact that certain peoples' absentee ballots do not get counted election after election is a fact. They are not delivered. They are lost. They are delivered to the wrong precinct. Now this Bill of Representative Pullen's will rectify this situation. It will make sure that these...these ballots are counted, are counted in various places closest to the home precinct of those voting absentee insuring that everybody's vote will be counted. It's high time that we put an end to the inefficiency and waste in this operation of...and conduct of our elections. The County Clerk has proven, especially in the County of Cook, that its office is not equipped to do the job. And whether these ballots are misdirected, lost or misdelivered by accident or for some other reason, we'll leave that to the voters to decide. The fact is that they are lost and they are not delivered and they are not counted. This is an excellent Bill that will insure everybody's vote, that it will be counted. The people in Cook County, especially, are sick and tired of some absentee ballots being counted and others not being counted.



Everybody's ballot should be counted. I think that everyone should get behind this very good Bill of Representative Pullen's and...and turn down, turn back this Amendment of Representative Greiman's, although well-intentioned I think does great damage and does gut a very good Bill."

Speaker Bradley: "The Chair would like to bring the attention of the Members that that TV light is on and we've had some requests for some pictures to be taken, when they're done we'll...We waited until we got to Mr. Leverenz. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leverenz, on the Amendment."

Leverenz: "Would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield?"

Greiman: "Yes."

Speaker Bradley: "He indicates that he will."

Leverenz: "Wouldn't this then make it much easier on the County Clerk to do the role that he's charged with?"

Greiman: "Well, I think it would but I think that more important than making it easier for the County Clerk it will insure that ballots will be counted. Under the Bill, the present Bill as it's written, nothing shows that ballots undelivered will be counted. So that if a Township Clerk doesn't deliver the ballots they're not going to be counted. So I...I think that...I think it does make it easier, Ted. But I'm not even....concerned with the ease of it. I'm concerned that everyone who casts a ballot, who has had it appropriately delivered to the clerk, is going to get his vote counted."

Leverenz: "I agree with you. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Mr. Greiman made the point that one of the real causes of the fiasco that occurred in Cook County in which upwards of five people in my district, people who had actually voted didn't have their ballots counted who had their votes in on time, was that the ballots were not sent out in time. That the problem was one that was created because people made application for their ballots early and no ballots were sent out. And he said that there was a deficiency in House Bill 376, that there was no mandate in that Bill that



required the local authorities to respond quickly when the application is made for the ballot. That you could avoid the whole problem by getting the ballots out early and having them returned early and then you don't have the problem of the eleventh hour trial...trying to deliver the ballots. Now I listened carefully to what the Chief Sponsor said. She did not respond to that question at all. I listened with interest to the comments of the distinguished Gentleman from Chicago and he did not touch that point at all. I think that the Amendment of the Gentleman from Skokie goes really to the heart of the problem. He is requiring that the public authority charged with this responsibility within two days of the time of the request for the ballot mail it out rather than accumulating the ballot, accumulating the applications, send them out at the eleventh hour and then getting us into the ridiculous situation where the ballots are arriving coincident with the date of the election. So I believe that the Amendment strikes at the very heart of the problem. That the weakness of the Bill is correctly pointed out by the Gentleman from Skokie, that the Sponsor of the Bill has not even talked to the deficiency in the Bill to which the Amendment is directed. And I would urge an 'aye' vote in favor of the Amendment."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman...the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Porter."

Porter: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it seems to me that the...on the merits, the Amendment ought to be defeated and that the Bill ought to be allowed to stand in its original form. There's been a lot of smoke thrown up here but it seems to me that I remember well when I first came down to the General Assembly a principle that we followed and followed very well was that a Sponsor ought to have the right to have their Bill in the form they wished it when it was introduced and heard by the Committee. Amendments were permissible to change certain small aspects of it. But to change a Bill entirely, change the entire principle of the Bill was considered pretty bad form. I think that Bill holds now. This idea is a change in public policy that has not had a public hearing. It's brought up and a lot of



smoke is being thrown up here but it's an entirely different change. It would make the Bill entirely different than when it was introduced. And it seems to me, aside from the merits, which are all with the Bill and all against the Amendment, that the Amendment ought to be defeated as a matter of policy."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank...thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise to support Amendment #2 to House Bill 376 because just recently it was pointed out by the Sponsor of the Bill that apparently the thirty Township Clerks can better handle the conduct of the election countywide than the County Clerk can. But just a month ago the Republican Party in my township filed a...a suit in the Circuit Court of Cook County challenging the Township Clerk because he didn't correctly distribute the absentee ballots. Now this is on a local level and not on a county or statewide level where the 102 County Clerks would be charged with the conduct of the election in all of its aspects. And we talk about public policy, that is, that is substantially changing that public policy and allowing 30 individuals in a township to handle absentee ballots rather than a central county station, such as the County Clerk's office. Now in response to one Gentleman's statement that a Sponsor is entitled to have his Bill in the...in the...in the position that he wants it as relative to its contents, if that be true then all of these Bills on Second Reading that have all of these tons of Amendments certainly are flying the face of that statement. I don't know of any Bill, really, that the Sponsor is entitled to. That Bill does not belong to its Sponsor, that Bill does not belong to an individual, that belongs to this House. That Bill belongs to this House and each 177 Members are a part of that Bill and have every right and every authority to change the contents of that Bill and have those changes voted on by Members of this House. So I support the Amendment. The system is working well. We do not want to delineate that system from one individual to have 30 individuals who are more or less sometimes...competent and less competent to handle election laws of this...of this



county and I move that we support this Amendment #2."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr...Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think that some of the proponents of this Amendment are overlooking the fact that Representative Bowman has Amendment #5 which much better addresses itself to the problem of counting ballots and I think that you ought to take a look at that, Representative Katz, before you support this Amendment. What Representative, and Representative Pullen, I believe, is willing to accept Amendment #5 on the Bill. Now, the problem of...of counting ballots is one that the present County Clerk says he could not do. And he was so quoted in an article in the Chicago Tribune because he did not have the manpower, although he had four people doing it there. This job rightfully belongs in the townships who are deputy clerks, by the County Clerk's own definition can better handle it, and that Amendment #5 gets at the problem of counting ballots. And that's the one that should be adopted and this one should be defeated."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Taylor."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman moves the previous question. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. 'Ayes' have it. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Greiman, to close."

Greiman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, because the world is the way it is, American servicemen are all over this world and every corner of this world. I wonder if a soldier from Glenview, a young eighteen year-old soldier from Glenview, and his age is immaterial, might know whether he should send it to the New Trier Township Clerk, the Northfield Township Clerk, the Niles Township Clerk or the Maine Township Clerk. And if he sends it to Glenview, the city of Glenview, falls within all four of those townships. Okay? And if he does...if he...if he...if the rules yields it and he sends it to New Trier, maybe his vote doesn't get counted. Maybe his application never gets there, 'cause he's someplace on a hill in Korea or on a ship or someplace else defending ourselves.



Believe me, we would effectively disenfranchise servicemen. ...This Bill, this Amendment deals only with the undelivered. The House Bill as it presently is written by Representative Pullen makes very substantial and sweeping changes in the procedure. This Bill keeps the proceed...my Amendment, I should say, keeps the procedure. basically, basically as it is, insuring the counting of ballots that are delivered later. It is a fair way. It is a good way. It keeps the scrutiny, the eye, on one man, on one office not on 30. I challenge all the...the good government associations to be able to keep an eye on 30 townships. I say they can't. But they can sure keep an eye on one. Let's therefore vote 'aye' on Amendment 2. Thank you."

Speaker Bradley: "The Amendment...Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 376. All those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. And the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mugalian, to explain his vote. And we have one minute to explain our votes and we're going to start abiding by that rule this morning."

Mugalian: "Thank you...thank you, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to talk about the merits of this Amendment as contrasted with the original Bill of the Sponsor. It has been admitted by everyone in this debate that the performance of the election authority in question has been abominable. That election authority did not deliver those ballots in the thousands. And what this Amendment would do would be add another important responsibility to that same election authority. If that's progress, I don't see it. The Sponsor of this Amendment, my dear friend, Representative Greiman, says that the guts of his Bill is that it now mandates the clerk, the election authority, to send out the ballots within two days. Now do we really have to tell the clerk that if...that if he stood on an application for three weeks, is it necessary to amend the statute to say you better get them out in two days? It's been shown that this system does not work. And I think the Sponsor of the Bill, the original Bill, has a viable alternative. If that doesn't work out, we can go back to another system. But to give the election authority that failed miserably in the last



election, the additional sensitive job of counting the ballots, I think that's a terrible mistake. I vote 'no'."

Speaker Bradley: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Conti, to explain his vote in one minute."

Conti: "Yes, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, let me also remind you that the job of administrating election of Cook County has gotten to be too great for one office. There are over 5,000 precincts in the County of Cook and my clerk has complained year after year that they request the absentee ballots and they never get 'em on time and the people....leaving either for vacation or out of town on business has to go all the way downtown into the City of Chicago to get their ballot. Then after we receive them and they go through the mail, I've got a document and affidavit of six people who requested a....Republican primary ballot, absentee ballot and when they were sitting in Florida, they got it four days before the election and when they got their ballots they were Democratic ballots. It was too late and they were disenfranchised to vote for that particular election. The other point is that they cut off the voting downtown the Saturday before the election but up in the suburbs they cut off the voting at least ~~ten days before the election.~~ And they cut 'em off. That's why we're asking you downstate people to help us understand our problems in Cook County. We have, you're talking about your veterans being disenfranchised, we have our businessmen and our business people who have to move out of town or got out of town on business, they're not able to vote on elections because they either have to travel eleven miles or thirteen miles to the City Hall downtown or when they do get their ballots they find that they didn't get the ballots that they requested. This will help the County Clerk. I'm not accusing the County Clerk of doing this intentionally. But take it from a victim who lost two elections by less than a hundred votes. Now if those people were not disenfranchised in their, fortunately or unfortunately, I might have been down here a little sooner. So when you lose two elections by less than a hundred votes and your absentee ballots are not



counted or your people are disenfranchised on voting....

President Carter is asking for instant legislation now. We can't even get a ballot ten days before an election in suburban Cook County. We can't even vote until we get our ballots back and then when we do get them they're not the kind of ballots we asked for."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Marion, Mr. Friedrich, to explain his vote in one minute."

Friedrich: "Mr...Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, the Sponsor of House Bill 376 has given a lot of time and thought to...to solving a problem. Obviously some of you out there, the Sponsor of this Amendment thinks he has a better solution. I think that the Sponsor of this Bill has the right to have it voted on because it's a new concept. And if the Sponsor of the Amendment wants a Bill voted on with his concept then he should put in a Bill to do that. But let Representative Pullen have a vote on her Bill the way it came out of Committee."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wish? The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I just ask you to please vote on my Bill on its merit. Don't adopt an Amendment that will change the entire Bill to a different Bill. Please vote 'no'."

Speaker Bradley: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz, to explain his vote."

Lechowicz: "At the appropriate time, Mr. Speaker, we'll have a verification."

Speaker Bradley: "You're entitled to that. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Getty, to explain his vote."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I was impressed by the two speakers just prior to Representative Lechowicz in their saying that they'd like to have their Bill in the form that they'd introduced so they could have an opportunity to have their Bill voted on the merit. Well, I...that convinced me, so I'm voting, I'm voting 'aye' on this Amendment because I recall both of them last night denied me that privilege."

Speaker Bradley: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?"



The Clerk will take the record. Gentleman from Cook,
Mr. Greiman."

Greiman: "Would you poll the absentees?"

Speaker Bradley: "We will poll the absentees. Okay now?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Bluthardt, Ralph Dunn, Hart, Kornowicz, Kurcharski,
Madison, Peggy Smith Martin, Sandquist, Schlickman. Representa-
tive Madigan in the Chair."

Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I request now for a verification.

Mr. Speaker, maybe to expedite the time of the House, could we have
a...oral verification?"

Speaker Madigan: "For the first time, Ladies and Gentlemen, under our
rules we will now proceed to a verified Oral Roll Call. Proceed,
Mr. Clerk. Every Member must be in his chair. All nonmembers
must leave the floor. Every Member must be in his chair. Mr.
Marovitz, would you sit in your chair? Mr. Beatty. Mr. Giglio.
All nonmembers please leave the floor. The gentleman talking
to Mr. Stanley please leave. Mr. Taylor, would you please be
in your chair? Mr. Taylor, would you please sit down? Proceed,
Mr. Clerk. Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, the rules call for this type of Roll Call to be
used prior to the use of the electronic voting system. I suggest
to you that the Speaker is not timely in requesting an oral
verification. That must be done in anticipation of a request
for a verification."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Hanahan. Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I believe the Gentleman is
in error. Rule 48-A specifically says 'any Member may demand a
verification of an electrical Roll Call vote except for a vote
which requires a specific number of affirmative votes and which
has not received the required votes. Whenever a verification
is properly demanded, the Speaker shall either order the veri-
fication under this rule of order or shall order a verified
Roll Call on the question'. I think it's timely and I believe
the Speaker is in order."



Speaker Madigan: "Your point is well taken, Mr. Hanahan. Mr. Clerk, proceed with the verified Roll Call."

Walsh: "Your ruling that my point is not well taken, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Madigan: "I'm ruling that Mr. Hanahan's point is well taken because he read from the rules on page 38. Proceed, Mr. Clerk. Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Do I understand we're going to have an oral...or if we're going to do it, you better wipe off that board."

Speaker Madigan: "That's what we planned to do, Mr. Matijevich. Clear the board. Ladies and Gentlemen, the procedure to be followed for this verified Oral Roll Call will be that when your name is called, you will stand at your desk, state your vote and at the same time switch the switch on your desk. Repeating. Repeating. Ladies and Gentlemen, when your name is called by the Clerk, you will stand at your desk, state your vote and at the same time switch the switch on your desk. All nonmembers please leave the chamber. All nonmembers please leave the chamber. Mr. Mudd."

Mudd: "Mr. Speaker, would you also give us the rule for changing votes on this particular Roll Call?"

Speaker Madigan: "That will occur at the end of the Roll Call, Mr. Mudd."

Mudd: "Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Dunn."

Dunn: "Mr. Speaker, having arisen, cast a vote, casting a vote when my name is called, does that constitute verification so that there may be no further challenge to the Member's vote?"

Speaker Madigan: "That is correct."

Dunn: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Madigan: "Further questions? Proceed, Mr. Clerk? Mr. Conti."

Conti: "Do I understand you to say, that when a man gets up and pushes his button, that he's verified and that he is allowed to roam through the hall again?"

Speaker Madigan: "No, we want everyone to stay...his chair."

Conti: "Now your Parliamentarian is shaking his head yes and you're saying no. Now which is it?"



Speaker Madigan; "Mr. Conti, we would like everyone to stay in their chair to facilitate this thing...."

Conti: "Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, because then we cannot see if they're all walking around the hall, we can't see them."

Speaker Madigan: "In addition, you stated that the individual would push his switch. We want the individual to also orally state his vote."

Conti: "Thank you. Thank you."

Cunningham: "Well, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, before we engage in any premature backpatting, I think it should be pointed out by the Speaker in the gallery that this ridiculous procedure is made possible because there are public servants who cannot trust each other to punch their own switches. This is a waste of time. The Speaker ought to appoint a Committee to see what used totalizer boards will sell for. And it should be pointed out in the interest of fairness that every time we have a verification it's the Minority Party that gains by it rather than the Majority Party. And there ought to be some...let...three or four of the Majority Party. I move that we sell the totalizer board



and just an adding machine and go back to the...to the ...prior years."

Speaker Madigan: "The Clerk informs me that the verified Roll Call indicates that there were 78 'ayes' and 84 'nays' and the Amendment #2 fails. And Mr. Collins. Mr. Collins."

Collins: "Mr. Speaker, having voted on the prevailing side, I move that the vote by which Amendment #2 to House Bill 376 was defeated be reconsidered."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "I move that that motion lie on the table."

Speaker Madigan: "All those in favor of Mr. Leinenweber's motion say 'aye'. All those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it."



Speaker Madigan: "And with leave of the House, the Chair would like to go to the Order of Senate Bills Third Reading for an emergency matter sponsored by Mr. Polk and that would be Senate Bill 485. The Chair recognizes Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman, I believe that there is an Amendment that is necessary, has just come over from the Senate, that the Chairman of the Appropriations II would like to offer and I would support."

Speaker Madigan: "Does the Gentleman have leave to move this Bill to the Order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment? Mr. Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, what happened to the last Bill that we were...."

Speaker Madigan: "We will return to that Bill immediately, Mr. Ryan."

Ryan: "Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "And this Bill is now on the Order of Second Reading. The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. E. M. Barnes. Amends Senate Bill 485 on page 2 by inserting between lines 16 and 17 the following, and so forth."

Barnes: "Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 485 is really a technical Amendment. This is language that was involved in the original OCE, it's an Agreed Amendment and it's language that is now being litigated in the courts. And I would move for the adoption of Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 485."

Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes Mr. Peters."

Peters: "Mr. Speaker, the Sponsor of the Amendment is exactly correct in what he states the Amendment to be and on our side we certainly support the Amendment. Encourage its passage."

Speaker Madigan: "The question is, shall Amendment #2 be adopted? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Madigan: "Third Reading. The Chair recognizes Mr. Polk to move to suspend the rules to allow for the immediate passage of



this Bill. Is there leave? Leave being granted, the Bill shall be read a third time."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 485. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Department of Labor. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Mr. Chairman, the Bill's been debated. It's noncontroversial supplemental...Department of Labor and I would move do pass."

Speaker Madigan: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 485 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', all those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question there are 136 'ayes', 4 'noes', 5 voting 'present'. And Senate Bill 485 having received a Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. We shall now return to the Order of House Bills Second Reading. House Bill 376. The Chair would like to announce that it is the intent of the Speaker to break for lunch at 12 noon and to return to the floor at 1 o'clock. House Bill 376. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5. Bowman. Amends House Bill 376 on page 14 and so forth."

Speaker Madigan: "Amendment #5, Mr. Bowman. Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Amendment is erroneously numbered. I ask leave of the House to amend it on its face so that it becomes Amendment #3."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman requests leave to amend the Amendment on its face so that it reads Amendment #3. Is there leave? Leave being granted, the Amendment shall now read #3. Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Mr. Speaker, thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Clerk, change the board."

Bowman: "Amendment #3. On Amendment #3 the Amendment addresses itself to the fundamental problem that occurred in Cook County in the last General Election. There were thousands of ballots, literally thousands of ballots that were delivered to the Clerk's Office before the polls closed and then were unable because of the press of time to be delivered to the polling place by 6 p.m. to enable the Judges



of Election to count them at the...at the polling location. And so they were...they were held in limbo and eventually destroyed, never having been counted. We now have a...we're now in the posture of considering Representative Pullen's Bill which shifts the responsibility for distribution of the ballots to the Township Clerks rather than the County Clerk. And even though the County Clerks are more closely related to the polling places, or closer to the polling places, and it should be easier to deliver late ballots to the polling places nonetheless there is the likelihood that some ballots will... will arrive in the hands of the Township Clerks too late to be delivered but really should be counted because they were in before the polls closed. So what my Amendment would do, would simply allow the Township Clerks to deliver any ballots that were received before 6 p.m. to the polling location. Now some of them would...would arrive at the polling locations after the polls were closed. But as you all well know it takes anywhere from an hour or more even with electronic voting to...to tally all the votes so it would be possible in almost every case to count the ballots that...that arrive within an hour after the polls close. It would...it would be possible in almost all cases to count them. Now, the Judges of Election under this Amendment would by majority vote, would decide whether they would...there was sufficient time to put them into the hopper and...and tally them. So the final decision is left with the majority of the Judges of Election at each polling place. I submit to you that this is certainly in the spirit of the Bill and...and certainly addresses itself to the fundamental problem that occurred in Cook County. And I ask Affirmative Roll Call."

Speaker Madigan: "Further discussion? Is there any further discussion?"

The Chair recognizes Mrs. Pullen."

Pullen: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have agreed to accept this Amendment and I'm in agreement with it. Thank you."

Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr.

D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D.L.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to the Amendment. I would call the attention



of the Membership to the provision in the Amendment which is to the effect that ballots received at a polling place by the Judges after the closing of the polls shall be counted only if so determined by a majority of the Judges of Election. Now the majority of the Judges of Election as far as political representation varies from precinct to precinct. I suggest that this is a totally arbitrary determination if it can be treated to as whether or not ballots in a particular polling place shall be counted. There are no standards for this. It's completely arbitrary. I'd ask for a...negative vote."

Speaker Madigan: "Further discussion? There being no further discussion, the question is, shall Amendment #3 be adopted? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, we should have a Roll Call. And all those in favor of the Amendment signify by voting 'aye', all those opposed by voting 'no'. The Chair recognizes Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in addressing myself to the negative remarks I'd simply like to suggest that the reason that I'm... put that provision in the Amendment is that it is possible that some of the ballots would arrive after the tally sheets have been filled out in which case, obviously, you know, if the ballots... tally sheets are sealed in their envelopes it can't...could not and should not be counted, so that I provided for that eventuality. And so I...I think the point, while an interesting one, is not very well taken."

Speaker Madigan: "Any further discussion? The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan, to explain his vote."

Houlihan, D.L.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in response to the prior speaker's comments, it, of course, is not what this Amendment provides. I would like to point the attention of the Membership to this, it's a zany ballot. It doesn't say all ballots. You could get a selective thing like this, 'we'll count this one, won't count that one, count this one, maybe we'll count the next two, we won't count the next three or four'. Now that's why this thing is very poorly drafted. You're leaving this into the total discretion of the majority of the Judges. There's no protection for the voter here at all."



Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Giorgi. You don't wish to speak, Mr. Giorgi? The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I couldn't agree with Representative Houlihan more. Unfortunately it does rotate by precinct as far as the Judges of...that are appointed by both the Chairman of the Democratic and Republican Parties in respect to variance. I believe that a person's ballot is something in between he and the officials that he expects them to be counted no matter what his ballot choice or candidate choice is. I don't believe that it should be left to the discretion of a majority of the Judges within a respective polling place to make that determination. A person casts his ballot in good faith and conscience and in turn the least we should do is assure them that that ballot will be counted and recorded. And I strongly recommend a 'no' vote."

Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the Lady from Champaign, Mrs. Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Judges of Election now have the discretion to accept or reject an absentee ballot. There is nothing in the Election Code that says an absentee ballot has to be counted. The Judges make that decision after the polls are closed and during the counting process. They can determine whether or not that ballot comes from a registered voter from that precinct. I think the discretion must remain in the hands of the Election Judges as it does now. It really does not change that process, it seems to me, and I support the Amendment."

Speaker Madigan: "The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Epton."

Epton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move the previous question."

Speaker Madigan: "The question is, shall the main question now be put? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed by saying 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it. Are we on explanation of votes? Mr. Epton, your motion is out of order. We're on explanation of votes. The Chair recognizes the Gentleman



from Cook, Mr. Ewell, to explain his vote."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have had the fortune, or good fortune, to be on a election recount. Now what I'm saying is, the fairness of this Amendment is questionable. When you recount an election you recount it by precincts. And if you're going to take it outside the precinct in order to get a determination it will be impossible to get an accurate recount. For the purposes of the sanctity of the ballot box you have to have all of this in the precinct and allow the determination by the Election Judges in the precinct. If they err, there are proper remedies. On a recount, if you believe it's bad, you have the ballots there, you can check the particular situation at the time and make the proper determination. I sat with our members on a recount when the Republicans were in the majority, I sat there when they told us that you couldn't count ballots that hadn't been initialed by the Judges in the City of Chicago. So we didn't count the ballots. But when we got to the suburban areas the write-in vote was about four times as heavy, basically Republican, and that, too, was not counted. That is fair. What's fair for one is fair for all. But what you're seeking now is injustice. And thank you, Ladies and Gentlemen."

Speaker Madigan: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk shall take the record. On this question there are 65 'ayes', 91 'noes' and Amendment #3 fails. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #6. Bowman. Amends House Bill 376 on page 11 and so forth."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Mr. Speaker, first.....just to clean up...."

Speaker Madigan: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madison, arise?"

Madison: "Mr. Speaker, what happened to Amendment #4?"

Bowman: "Oh, that...Mr. Speaker, I am addressing myself to that point."

Speaker Madigan: "Proceed, Mr...."

Bowman: "The Amendment was erroneously numbered and I'm going to ask leave of the House to move to amend it on its face so that it reads Amendment #4."



Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman requests leave to renumber this Amendment to Amendment #5. Is there leave?"

Bowman: "Four. Four."

Speaker Madigan: "Number four. Is there leave?"

Madison: "Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Madigan: "Mr. Madison."

Madison: "I have an Amendment in front of me that's already numbered Amendment #4."

Speaker Madigan: "And the Gentleman is requesting...."

Bowman: "But that was changed to 2. Four was changed to two, five was changed to three and I'm asking that six be changed to four."

Speaker Madigan: "I...I see. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Proceed, Mr. Bowman."

Bowman: "Mr. Speaker, I haven't been down here very long but I've been down here long enough to count and I move to table this Amendment. I ask leave of the House to table this Amendment."

Speaker Madigan: "The Gentleman asks leave to table this Amendment. Is there leave? Leave being granted the Amendment is tabled. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Madigan: "Third Reading. We will now stand in recess until 1 o'clock. Mr. Katz would like to announce a meeting of the Rules Committee immediately in the Speaker's Office."

RECESS

Doorkeeper Koehler: "Attention all Members in the House of Representatives, the House will reconvene in fifteen minutes. Thank you. Attention all Members of the House of Representatives, the House will reconvene in five minutes. Thank you. All members not entitled to the House floor please retire to the gallery."

Clerk O'Brien: "He did it again. He told the Members not entitled to the House...."

Speaker Redmond: "The House will come to order, Members please be in their seats. Representative Geo-Karis, you're wanted on the phone. House Bills Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "I've got a few additional Bills to read the titles of



I didn't read this morning and then hold them on Second.

House Bill 613. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the cost of living increase and the compensation of certain state employees. Second Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1118. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1119. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Department of Transportation. Second Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1418. A Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the State Comptroller. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Is that lady bothering you, Mr. Clerk? On your birthday? On House Bills Second Reading. 376, is that.... Did you move..... How about 391? 391."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 391. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act codifying the powers and duties of the Mental Health. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 399."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 399. A Bill for an Act in relation to auxiliary policemen."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill. 399."

Speaker Redmond: "Has a fiscal note been furnished on this one?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Second Reading of the Bill. The fiscal note has not been furnished."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 455."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 455. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 455 on page 6 by deleting lines 10 through 29."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan.Representative Houlihan. Madigan."



Madigan: "What order is the Bill on, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "We're on 455...."

Madigan: "We're on the Order of Second Readings?"

Speaker Redmond: "On the Order of Second Reading."

Madigan: "455?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yeah."

Madigan: "Is there an Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "They say it's a floor Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. D. L. Houlihan."

Speaker Redmond: "Who...who's the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Madigan: "Daniel Houlihan. The Sponsor of the Bill is James Houlihan."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 455 on page 6 by deleting lines 10 through 29."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D.L.: "Could you pass it for a moment? We can't find the file or the Amendment or Schwartz."

Speaker Redmond: "Elwood never got one misplaced. 465. Who's the... wait a minute. Out of the record on that one. 492."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 492. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendments #1, 2 and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. Floor Amendment #4."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft."

Clerk O'Brien: "Eugene Barnes. Amends House Bill 492 as amended and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Mr. Speaker, I discussed this Amendment with Representative Barnes. It has not been distributed. I've given him my word that if he and I come to a solution that this Amendment should be on the Bill, we'll pull it back from Third Reading. It is distributed? Well, anyway I still talked to him about that even if it is distributed. He and I have not discussed the Amendment and we'll bring it back from Third...."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 495. He will. Carpentersville. 495."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 495. This Bill has been read a second time



previously. Amendments #1 and 2 were tabled in Committee. And Amendment #3 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "495. Are there any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 513."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 513. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None. No motions."

Speaker Redmond: "No motions. Third Reading. 535. Think I'll come back at 11 o'clock tonight and let you people go home."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 535."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 607. 583, they tell us a fiscal note requested and has it been filed? 583."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 583. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Has a fiscal note been filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A fiscal note has been filed. Floor...floor Amendment #1. Catania. Amends House Bill 583 on page 14, line 19."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Amendment #1 simply makes the effective date July 1, 1979. I ask for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Lady's motion for the Representative D. L. Houlihan. Proceed."

Houlihan, D. L.: "I had a question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan, D.L.: "What's the reason for the Amendment, Representative Catania?"

Catania: "Well, Representative Houlihan, as we heard in Judiciary II there would be some difficulty in making this Bill take effect any sooner than that and therefore to give Judge Gulley reasonable time to prepare for the legislation to take effect, we are asking for an effective date of July 1, 1979."

Houlihan, D.L.: "Who suggested the date of July 1, 1979?"

Catania: "I did in Committee, as you may recall. I think you were there when we discussed it."



Houlihan, D.L.: "No, I was not, that's why I'm asking the question."

Catania: "Oh, I'm sorry. I thought you were."

Houlihan, D.L.: "What is the fiscal impact of the Bill as disclosed in the fiscal note?"

Catania: "There was no fiscal effect whatsoever in fiscal year 1978. In fiscal year 1979, Judge Gulley requests between two hundred thousand and three hundred thousand dollars for phase-in cost."

Houlihan, D.L.: "In speaking to the Amendment if I may, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Houlihan, D.L.: "I would rise to oppose the Amendment. The merit of the Bill is not two years away, it is immediate. This is a subject that has been discussed for many years about a revision of the probation system on a statewide basis. It is my impression that Judge Gulley's Office is totally familiar with all of the programs which have been advocated by this type of legislation which is basically a duplicate of what was considered in the 79th and in the 78th Session. I see no real reason as to why this should be deferred until July 1979. I think it should have a much earlier effective date and in consequence I would ask the Membership to defeat the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on.....Representative Catania to close."

Catania: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker, I wasn't expecting this to receive opposition. Do you want it out of the record or do you want us to go with it now?"

Speaker Redmond: "It's up to you. Out of the record might be a better idea."

Catania: "Yes, would you take it out of the record for now if you want to?"

Speaker Redmond, "607. Out of the record. 607."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 607. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or...."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Floor Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3. Schneider. Amends House Bill 607 on page 1, line 31 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Clerk O'Brien: "Twenty thousand ... twenty-five thousand."

Schneider: "What's the next one get?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment 4....."

Schneider: "We had some...thank you, Mr. Speaker, we had confusion. I think we...I'd like to move to table #3 first and proceed with Amendment #4."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman have leave to table Amendment #3?
Hearing no objection leave is granted, Amendment #3 is tabled."

Schneider: "All right, thank you....."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4. Schneider."

Schneider: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is the Amendment that allows that firemen, teachers, policemen and those boards making less than \$1,000 in remuneration to be...at a \$30,000 threshold before they file under the Ethics Act and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, I...I don't really oppose his theory but I oppose having this Amendment put on my Bill. Representative Schneider has another Bill that it is in, And actually his reasoning is, 'well, he'd like to have it on at least two Bills, so if one gets beat he'll have it on the other one'. Well, what he's doing really is, fouling up my Bill which was rather simple and I would appreciate if he'd keep his Amendment on his own Bill and let me work with mine. And so I think it's going to confuse the issue to...I think it could be the vehicle which would defeat my Bill which is clearcut. So I would like to urge you to vote 'no' on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, the...both Bills when they came out of the Executive Committee were identical and they were agreed to Bills by the Subcommittee and the full Committee. And it's true that I think both...both Bills will have the Amendment but it's also true that we never know which one will reach the Governor's desk. I think to have them in pretty close conformity is good policy on this issue. And I would ask, therefore, for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Would the...would the Gentleman yield to a question? Repr-



sentative Schneider. In Subcommittee didn't we recommend that each of the Bills, I think yours was 385? What was the number of your Bill? Whatever it was, and 607 received the same treatment and the Amendments #1 and 2 were put on in Committee and adopted by the full Executive Committee. Is that right?"

Schneider: "That's correct."

Yourell: "Well, what...what does your Amendment do that the other two did not do?"

Schneider: "This...expands the threshold or expands it from twenty to thirty thousand dollars. As you know, presently, twenty thousand dollars is the law. But the reason the Bill was initiated by me to begin with, and I'm sure with Representative Friedrich is, that we found that that threshold by now with the inflated dollars was no longer a viable figure for those people that are really not in conflict. So in order to avoid trying take the various individuals out of the Ethics Act it probably makes more sense to make keep them in the Act and raise...to thirty thousand dollars."

Yourell: "Well, perhaps Representative Friedrich can answer my question. Did we...did we change the twenty to thirty in the Subcommittee Reports ...that reported back to full Committee?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "At least that....it did not come out there with any Amendments, Representative Yourell. The Amendments were on there...the collective bargaining Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Byers."

Byers: "Thank you, Mr...thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd like to speak against this Amendment. I think that twenty thousand is a livable threshold. That's what it is for Legislators. I think this is a bad Amendment and besides it's a bad Bill. And I think we should vote 'no' on both of them."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? All voted who wish?"

Schneider: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."



Schneider: "In explaining my vote, Mr. Speaker, what we have found and what Mr. Byers obviously doesn't understand is that when you're dealing with conflict, you have to talk about people that are on the...in the position to be in conflict. Teachers and firemen and policemen are not in that kind of a position. I think it's silly to add to the clerk the responsibility, the filing of these kinds of forms, when all it does is amount to a set of paperwork. So it's silly to oppose it on the assumption that you're dealing with conflict it's more of a problem, for us as Legislators, because we are in a position to be in conflict and make those kinds of a decision."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 45 'aye', 63 'no' and the Gentleman's motion fails. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5. Schneider. Amends House Bill 607 on page 1, line 31 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "This Amendment reduces that threshold from twenty...rather increases it from twenty to twenty-five and for the same arguments, the bargain basement. Amendment...I would ask that we adopt the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, for the same reason I would ask you to oppose this. I'm not opposed to what Representative Schneider is trying to do. I do oppose having it on the same Bill because I think they're separate issues. I'd ask you to vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Byers."

Byers: "Et cetera, et cetera, et cetera."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan, you seeking recognition?"

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this Amendment which I understand would raise the ceiling from twenty thousand to twenty-five thousand for those required to file ethics statements under the Governmental Ethics Act. Mr. Speaker, I think that many of us have misunderstood the intent of the Amendment. Today, in the City of Chicago, a carpenter or a plumber employed for the City of Chicago is required to file an ethics statement. Therefore, any other trades -



person, or person performing menial labor earning twenty thousand dollars a year and it does happen quite frequently, is required to file these statements. Not only is that not the intent of the Act, I feel it places a very onerous burden upon people who are not in policymaking decisions. Not in a position to whip those governmental positions one way or another and that is the reason for my support for this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "I could not agree more with the Majority Leader. The only thing I'm trying to do is to keep from confusing the issues and if the Majority Leader will put in a Bill to do that I'll vote for it."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion, those in favor indicate by voting 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. The motion for the adoption of Amendment #5. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 63 'ayes', 56 'no'. The Gentleman's motion prevails and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. We skipped over 510 but I understand that the fiscal note has been filed on that, is that correct?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The fiscal note...it is filed? The fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "No motions? No Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 510. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 560."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 560. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion. Floor Amendment #2. C. M. Stiehl. Amends House Bill 560 as amended in Section 1.2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Amendment #1



simply places residency re... Amendment #2, excuse me, simply places residency requirements in order to vote on the corporation and for directors. It has been approved by the Sponsor and I would ask for an affirmative vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Lady's motion for the adoption of Amendment #2. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, what...what was the response on the fiscal note for this Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "I haven't got quite that far yet. What it...now moving to adopt Amendment #2. All in favor on that motion indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment's adopted. Now has the fiscal note been filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note is filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "It's been brought to my attention, and I...and I hate to mention it on this particular Bill, but some of the fiscal notes that have been filed are certainly not in the proper order nor have been submitted in the proper fashion. And I think you ought to look at them and I have one here on my desk on another Bill and I'd certainly like to see the one that's been filed on this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "613. Well,....you make that motion out there, I guess. 613."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 613. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment...Amendments #1, 2 and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. No floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 640."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 640. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Birchler. Amends House Bill 640 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Birchler."

Birchler: "Mr. Speaker, I...I present Amendment #1 in the absence of



Representative Dunn who was supposed to put this on but he's sick and not here on the House floor. What House Amendment #1 does, it refers to industrial production, location and assignment. The Department shall establish a cost to be established industrial production and its institutions and facilitate to secure the most practical and efficient use of labor. The office for the coordinating such industrial production shall be located in Springfield. I move for the adoption of Amendment 1."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question? What might this do...is it...to the total cost...House Bill 640?"

Birchler: "The purpose of the Amendment is to see that they do the work within the institutions, to give employment to the residents of the institutions and help keep them to be self-surviving within the institution itself."

Totten: "Does it limit the number of institutions or does it encompass all of those under the department?"

Birchler: "It's for the institutions...the whole penal institutions of the state."

Totten: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Brummet. Amends House Bill 640 on page 1 by deleting line 18 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummet."

Brummet: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment was requested by General Services just to comply with the law and I would move for the passage of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Will you explain it, Mr. Brummet?"

Brummet: "Yes, what it does, in other words, any department of state government has to have bids on what they're ordering and it has to come through General Service. And since the Corrections Department would be selling some of their foodstuff to the Department of Mental Health, it would be carried on through General Services so that they would



still be buying at the lowest bid. I move for the passage of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Representative Winchester."

Winchester: "Don, one question. Do you mean that General Services would be inviting bids from private food suppliers and the Department of Corrections and the lowest bid would get the contract to furnish food to the Department of Mental Health?"

Brummet: "That is correct but I...I'm satisfied that this could be worked out to where Corrections would always have the lowest bid."

Winchester: "I see. Okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion's adopted. Any further Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 700. Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 700."

Daniels: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would move to table Amendment #1 which is a Committee Amendment and pursuant to discussion, the Judiciary Committee, when this Bill came out of the Judiciary Committee 16 to nothing, I advised them that I wanted to look further at the Amendment to make sure that the provisions contained in Amendment #2 would be accurate to recite that violations of one of the subsections would be considered a second offense. And that's why I want to table Amendment #1 and accept Amendment #2 which is in line with the discussion had with the Judiciary Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave to have Amendment #1 tabled? Hearing no objection leave is granted. Amendment #1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Daniels. Amends House Bill 700 by deleting everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #2 is identical to Amendment #1 that came out of the Judiciary Com-



mittee by a vote of 16 to nothing with the exception that it makes it clear violations of one of the subsections would be a second offense in the event of a subsequent arrest or conviction and would be then concluded as a second offense under the statute. And it's a little clearer otherwise it's identical to the Bill. And I would move for the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Geo-Karis: "How does your second Amendment vary with the...I understand the first Amendment that you introduced was second hearing on the Bill, is the Bill. Is that right?"

Daniels: "The second Amendment would become the Bill if its adopted, that's correct."

Geo-Karis: "This one here? Didn't you...didn't you in the second hearing on the Bill before the Judiciary II Committee, I was there that day that's why I don't, put an Amendment on the Bill which changed the original Bill?"

Daniels: "Oh, yes."

Geo-Karis: "Was that the first Amendment?"

Daniels: "That was Amendment #1. Amendment #2 is identical to Amendment #1: with the exception of the language makes a little clearer that violations of that subsection, any one of the subsections, would be concluded as a second offense."

Geo-Karis: "I see. In other words, you're not reducing any of the penalties...."

Daniels: "No."

Geo-Karis: "That you had in Amendment #1."

Daniels: "No."

Geo-Karis: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Representative Davis."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker, point of inquiry. You seem to have passed House



Bill 681, was it moved to Third Reading at last night's Session?"

Speaker Redmond: "681?"

Davis: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "It's on Second Reading now. It was moved to....
Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Schisler."

Speaker Redmond: "681 was moved. Wasn't it? Yeah, Representative Davis
is asking a question about 681."

Davis: "Yes, my question is very simple. There is a second Amendment
floor Amendment to 681 to be offered and it was passed on the Calen-
dar and I wonder if it was indeed moved on Third last night. And if it
was, I would like to have it called back to Second for purposes of
offering floor Amendment 2...."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we'll reach that when we get to it. It's on
Second now?"

Davis: "It appears on the Order of...."

Speaker Redmond: "It's on the Calendar on Second Reading."

Davis: "Yes, indeed."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. 700. We'll, let's continue and finish with
700, Mr. Davis."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Schisler. Amends House Bill 700 on page
1 by deleting lines 6 and 7."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Amendment #3, the Sponsor of that
Amendment here? Representative Daniels."

Daniels: "Is...is the Amendment #3 in proper order, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "I don't know. Where's the Parliamentarian?"

Daniels: "I don't know but we can put out a shout for the Parliamentarian
wherever he may be to produce himself at the podium."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian. Would you want Mr. Collins to act
as a parliamentarian or... Even he isn't here."

Daniels: "Well, we...Representative Skinner might...."

Speaker Redmond: "What's your inquiry, Representative Daniels?"

Daniels: "Is Amendment #3 in proper order?"

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment #3 in proper order?"

Daniels: "The Parliamentarian....I'm assuming....I'm advised Amendment #2



has been adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "The Parliamentarian advises me that the Amendment's in order."

Daniels: "Does it refer to the Amendment, House Bill 700, as amended?"

Speaker Redmond: "He says it does."

Daniels: "It doesn't have to say that it refers to as amended? It just says amend House Bill 700."

Speaker Redmond: "Amends the lines that weren't changed, not amending lines that were amended. He advises me that it's in order. Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "I am sorry to ask again but...it's...as there was a confusion here, I...I couldn't get the gist of Amendment #3. Is that the Sponsor's Amendment? I can't...."

Speaker Redmond: "No, it is not."

Geo-Karis: "And what does Amendment #3 provide...."

Speaker Redmond: "Strikes the enacting clause."

Geo-Karis: "Is that what it does?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."

Geo-Karis: "Okay, thank you. Is the Sponsor of the Amendment on the floor? What is your pleasure, Representative Daniels?"

Daniels: "...Mr. Speaker, we know about the deadline we have and I...I would like to move the Bill, he has....also has a motion pending."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, if...can't hold the Bill here because the Sponsor isn't here. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Well, nobody presented it to you. Nobody moved to do anything with 3. 723. Third Reading. 723.

Oh, yeah, 681."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 681. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Is any motion filed with...."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Floor Amendment #2. Jack Davis. Amends House Bill 681 as amended on page 3 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Davis."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I realize that I'm diminutive in size



back here and I'm oftentimes not seen however, I thank you for recognizing me. I offer Floor Amendment #2 to House Bill 681 after conferring with your very able and capable Parliamentarian who not only helped me to draft the Amendment and clarify and tighten the language of the Bill of the Amendment itself, which in fact in substance, is practically the entire Bill. But we worked on an addition and I would like to speak only to the addition and not to the substance of the Amendment which is the Bill for all intent and purposes. The addition that the Amendment provides which was requested from the other side of the aisle that was indeed that the Amendment now requires that this Bill become a permissive or optional Bill at the County Clerk level or the proper election authority level that deals with the Bill. Armed with that information I would respectfully move for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 681."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any...any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. Pardon me, Representative Conti."

Conti: "I wonder if I could ask the Sponsor a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Conti: "I'm a little concerned about the last wording in that Bill where ~~it says that they must write in the precinct number. Now if the precinct~~ number is 67, there's about seven different ways you can write a six or seven. Would that constitute a marked ballot?"

Davis, J: "I'm not sure I understand your question, Representative Conti.

The answer should be 'no'. I...I think 67 can be clearly marked. If you're indicating a line through the 7 in the European fashion..."

Conti: "You...you'll have to excuse me for being suspicious, but on... on something like this but it can be that there are many ways to writing numbers down on a ballot and I didn't think that any Judge or anybody had a right to write anything on the ballot itself."

Davis, J: "Well, Representative Conti, if you'll look at the Amendment, and I really do not think we should be discussing the merits of the Bill which is in fact the Bill itself. However, the Bill addresses itself in that particular section only write-in ballots."

Conti: "All right."

Davis, J: "Mr. Speaker."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Davis, J: "Mr. Speaker."

Houlihan: "If I...if I may in reference to the question that was asked, the Amendment addresses itself only to the envelope not to the ballot itself."

Davis, J: "I beg your pardon, Dan, I didn't hear you."

Houlihan: "In answer to Representative Conti's question, the Amendment addresses only the ballot envelope and not the ballot itself according..."

Davis, J: "Yes, indeed, that is true. Now, Mr. Speaker, having had Amendment #2 adopted, I would move to table Amendment #1 that was adopted in Committee simply because Amendment #2 deals with..."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave?" Hearing no objection leave is granted and Amendment #3 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 723."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 723. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendments #1 and 2 were filed in...were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions filed with respect to the Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Catania. Amends House Bill 723 as amended in the first sentence and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is a technical Amendment requested by the Legislative Reference Bureau which changes the word 'of' to 'or'. And I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question's on the Lady's motion. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 725. Has a fiscal note been filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note is not filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 730."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 730."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce, they advise me that a fiscal



note has not been filed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Yes, Chalky says it has."

Speaker Redmond: "That puts me in a puzzlement. You got a copy?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Yes, the fiscal note is in the Bill. House Bill 730.

This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions filed or floor Amendments filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed. Floor Amendment #2. Ewing. Amends House Bill 730 on page 1, line 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Who was the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Ewing."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing. Representative Hudson, sit down."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, I have an Amendment, a very simple Amendment, that deletes 'mineral water' from the Bottle Bill. 98% of the mineral water sold in this state is sold in disposable containers such as milk is sold in. Only about two percent of it is sold in throw-away glass containers. I believe that this Bill should not have mineral water included in it. I think it's fair that we take it out or we should add milk to it. And I would ask for a favorable vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I have a question of the Sponsor of this Amendment if he'll yield to a question."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Mudd: "Bob, do you find that this is the only thing that you can find that's objectionable to this Bill as far as you're concerned?"

Ewing: "Representative Mudd, if that has any relationship to this Amendment, I'd answer it. When I vote on this Bill you'll be able to see how I feel about it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce....question."

Pierce: "I have no objection to the Amendment and why don't we just take a voice vote and adopt it? Let's debate the Bill on Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Ebbesen. Amends House Bill 730 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen. Ebbesen."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I want to make one point very clear with Amendment #3 to House Bill 730. I want to make it very clear that the...the thrust of the Amendment is not directed at the media who are editorializing in favor of House Bill 730. I think the objective that I have in presenting this Amendment is to point out to you, Mr. Speaker, and every Member of the House how they are discriminating against one particular industry. Amendment #3 to House Bill 730 says that every issue of a newspaper of general circulation sold or offered for sale in this state shall have a refund value of not less than three cents. To receive the three cent refund the consumer shall return the entire issue to the distributor as it was sold to the consumers. Now, the newspaper distribution center shall not refuse to accept from a customer, or consumer, any complete issue of a newspaper of general circulation which was distributed through that individual's center. Now I selected three cents to try to make my point, the impracticality of this. I'm a great believer, if we're going to clean up America, I kind of buy the idea of what the direction of House Bill 730 leads us to but it singles out one industry. And one industry only. And I cite the newspapers because that's something that's very difficult to dispose of and I don't think that they are recycled. They're not reused. And as far as I'm concerned I understand now that there is a proposal in this Session of the General Assembly that addresses itself to that. But if we're going to get into this area of cleaning up America I think that the Sponsor would be well-advised, in my opinion, to recommit this to an Interim Study Commission and let's hang... let's hang on everything as far as recycling that...in which we call debris throughout this country.- it's very costly I will admit.- and add all those items and include all those items in the legislation. And that's the thrust of this particular Amendment. I would encourage...encourage a 'yes' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."



Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill will be voted up or down on Third Reading on its merits. It was a...it was approved in Committee without this Amendment. This Amendment wasn't even offered in Committee. What this Amendment does is attempt to require every newspaper in this state to carry a deposit in the printing of the newspaper that it has a deposit. It's a way of controlling the press in telling them what they have to do with their newspaper. It's clearly unconstitutional. Now here's what it's aimed at. We have certain big businesses here that some of the Members represent. They're opposed to the Bill. And they're sore at some newspapers for editorializing in support of the Bill. So like...like big industries like Krupp in Germany and other big industries, they say, 'we don't like what the newspapers are saying, let's tell the newspapers what they should print and what they should have and what the newspapers should cost. Let's control that newspaper and then next time they'll think twice before they editorialize against our particular little industry'. These Amendments don't come out of nowhere. We have the biggest group, highest paid group of lobbyists in the history of this state paid to fight this Bill. Some of them want it on interim study because they want to keep working out there, afraid it may be killed on Third Reading. I noticed the Gentleman offered to put it on interim study, which is very nice of him, but the reason they want it in the study is because they want to keep on lobbying against it. Let's vote it up or down on Third Reading. Now we, we're not going to joke around here and try to control newspapers. Newspapers have never carried a deposit in any state. No one has ever thought they should in any state. We should separate newspapers. And there is legislation, I think maybe Representative Meyers or someone, has a Bill to separate out newspapers. And let's return them. They should be returned and recycled. As the Gentleman said, 'newspapers aren't recycled'. He doesn't know what he's talking about because newsprint is recycled. It's recycled regularly and made up into newsprint whenever they can use newsprint. The Amendment really isn't germane to the Bill, I don't believe, but at any rate let's defeat the Amendment and move the Bill to Third Reading and vote



it up or down. Taking a little shallow swipes at the press and at newspapers, you notice he doesn't have containers, cardboard containers here because that might affect some of the industries that are opposing the Bottle Bill but he does have newspapers not cardboard containers, not container corporations, not box companies, not Alton Paper Box, but newspapers. I'd be very suspicious when newspapers are picked up for special discriminatory legislation. We know what it is. No matter what it's called, it's a way of trying to control the press, telling them what they print. This Amendment tells the press what they gotta print in the newspapers. It tells them so many times a year you gotta print it in the newspaper...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen."

Pierce: "I oppose Amendment #2."

Ebbesen: "Mr. Speaker, I...I think my distinguished colleague didn't hear my opening remarks."

Speaker Redmond: "I think maybe we'll call on you to close. There's others seeking recognition. Representative Cunningham. Cunningham. He's the little short fellow over there."

Cunningham: "Takes one to know one, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I respectfully suggest that the distinguished Sponsor of the original Bill is irate about this Amendment for the wrong reason. I agree with him it's wrong but it's wrong for the reason it's inflationary. At the present time, and many of you may not know this, but the newspaper industry has carefully cultivated the market in old papers and you can sell them for forty dollars a ton. All you have to do is bundle them up in hundred pound units and take them to various distribution centers. That figures out at two cents a pound. So, on the Amendment you'll have to have the Sunday edition to make any money at all and usually, you'd break... you'd lose your shirt on it. If you reduce it down to a penny why it'd be all right. The reason I mentioned this to you, it represents a splendid opportunity to make money if you're a campaign committee. I'm going to send out my workers to gather old newspapers for that forty dollar salvage value. And I suggest that to you because the time's coming you have to face the voters again and we'll need some



money in the exchequer. But for the inflationary reasons cited I'll be voting 'no' on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ebbesen to close."

Ebbesen: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to cite one illustration here as it relates to the glass industry in the State of Illinois that employs really approximately well over twelve thousand people. And the can industry which employs almost...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce, for what purpose do you arise?"

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, he's debating the Bill itself on Third Reading and if I don't give him a chance he's going to..."

Speaker Redmond: "Confine your remarks to the Amendment."

Pierce: "...Third Reading...this is a crucial Amendment."

Ebbesen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I shall....I shall continue. I think that he was addressing himself to the Bill when he was chastising me earlier. And the cost of the jobs in the state...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, would you rule that he's supposed to speak on closing his Amendment which is...affects newspapers only, not supposed to talk about bottles...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce..."

Pierce: "He can do that on Third Reading and he can..."

Speaker Redmond: "Your point of order is well taken. Representative Ebbesen, confine your remarks to the Amendment."

Ebbesen: "I'd just like to make it very clear, Mr. Speaker, that the thrust of this Amendment is not directed at the newspapers who have been editorializing in favor of House Bill 730. The thrust of the legislation in this proposal is to point out to you that there should be about fifty more items and my thrust in this legislation is to encourage you to take this back and put it...put the legislation into interim study and look at it and include everything that creates litter all over this country. Let's clean up America that way, not with just one industry. I urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all



voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative Bowman."

Bowman: "Mr. Speaker, in explaining my 'no' vote on this. I was on the Committee that heard the testimony. And I heard people make suggestions to this effect, although no formal Amendments were offered, and it is pointed out that the real problem is not just litter but the danger that the particular kind of litter imposes. For example, bottles and cans jam farm equipment. They cut the tires of the farm implements. They are a danger hazard to farm animals. And I know in my own district, which is...which lies along the lake front and has many fine features, the litter poses a distinct hazard to the users of those beaches. The broken glass that lies under the sands, the pop top cans that people lie around pose distinct hazards. So it seems to me that this Bill really is...is well drafted and we needn't add superfluous...superfluous items to it. So I would urge a 'no' vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 66 'aye' and 62 'no' and the Gentleman's... Representative Meyers."

Meyer: "Point order...point of order, Mr. Speaker, have you ruled on the germaneness of this Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "Wasn't arise...didn't arise and we've already put the question. On this question there's 66 'aye' and 62 'no' and the Gentleman's motion prevails and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 748."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 748. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ryan."

Clerk O'Brien: "...Utilities."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I had some questions on that last Bill concerning the legality of the fiscal note that had been filed. Certainly is not in conformance as it should be."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, when you had voiced your concern about that, I asked the Parliamentarian to come up here and he asked me to ask you what rule you are citing in suggesting that the...."



Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, the rule is 32-A that says that a fiscal manner must be filed in accordance with the law, it's provided by the law. And the law states that the fiscal note shall be prepared by such board, commission, department, agency or other entity and furnished to the Sponsor of the Bill within five Calendar days thereafter. The fiscal note that's filed with the Clerk has not been prepared by the agency affected, or administering agency, and therefore is certainly not in conformance with the law."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Pierce."

Pierce: "Of course there's no enforcement in this Bill of that nature.

I want to say this. The fiscal note was filed and was not objected to until after the Bill was advanced to Third Reading and was filed after I checked with two agencies who said because the Bill is effective July 1, 1980, there's no fiscal affect for fiscal '78, fiscal '79 or fiscal '80. And for subsequent years of fiscal '80 they would be unable at this time to determine what impact, if any, it would have. However, if this objection stands, I want that to apply to every fiscal note filed today that wasn't by an agency that was signed by a Member, and the scores. And if that's what we want to do, let's do it. But I don't want the big lobbyists to pick on ~~this one and knock this one out just because it happens to affect~~ someone's particular interest. Let's be fair and challenge all of them. Actually, as the Gentleman knows, this has no fiscal impact in fiscal '78, fiscal '79 and fiscal '80 because it's not effective until July 1 of 1980 and can't affect state revenues in any case because the nickel deposit doesn't affect state revenue."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, that's...that's not my problem with the Bill and I certainly have no interest one way or the other in an attempt to pick on Mr. Pierce. I called this to your attention on some other Bills earlier and I feel, as Mr. Pierce does, if we're going to do this we're going to have to check them on each Bill. And I would certainly think that would be one of your obligations, Mr. Speaker, to make sure that the notes, or at least the Clerk, are filed in conformance with the law."

Speaker Redmond: "I don't see anything in the statute or in the rules

that gives me any jurisdiction at all to determine the sufficiency of a fiscal note. The statute requires that it be filed. If there's any question about the application of that statute, the decision has to be made by the Body and not by the Speaker. So, it's my opinion that I don't have any authority to decide whether the fiscal note is...is in compliance with the statute and therefore that's the way I rule. 748."

Clerk O'Brien: "This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Klosak, are you seeking recognition?"

Klosak: "Yes, Sir, I am, Mr. Speaker. I hereby move that this...this House of Representatives gives the Speaker the authority to rule on the sufficiency of each and every fiscal note hereafter filed. And I would like that motion to go to a vote."

Speaker Redmond: "You have to amend the rule and I believe you have to amend the statute. And I don't know whether the last day to file the Introduction of Bills has passed unless it's an appropriation measure. 748. Thank you for the confidence, Representative Klosak."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 748. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor or any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 758."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 758. House Bill 758. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed.Floor Amendment #2. Hanahan. Amends House Bill 758 on page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hart here? Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Representative Hart is excused of...illness in his family. But I have discussed with him Amendment #2 which does...does not affect his intent and changes the language in his intent of the...of the support of this Bill. I don't know what you want to do with it. You want to move the Bill?"

Speaker Redmond: "I'd rather hold it. We got...I thought I got burned on this in '75 and '76 in this subject matter so I would rather have the Sponsor of the Bill here so that..."



Hanahan: "Right."

Speaker Redmond: "So we'll take this one out of the record and we'll get back to it...."

Hanahan: "It's all right with me."

Speaker Redmond: "788."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 788..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McAuliffe, for what purpose do you arise?"

McAuliffe: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like unanimous consent of the House to have my vote changed on House Bill 575 on Amendment #2 from 'aye' to 'nay'. My switch was voted inadvertently."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. 788."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 788. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Floor Amendment #2. Johnson. Amends House Bill 788 on page 15 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Edgar."

Edgar: "Would you take this out of the record, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 810."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 810. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee. There's a motion filed to table Amendment #1 by John Dunn."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative John Dunn."

Dunn, John: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 adopted in Committee has some technical problems in the language of the Amendment referring to sections of the Bill. I have filed a motion to table and intend to present a corrective Amendment that has the same substance in it as Amendment #1. I would ask leave to ask that my motion be adopted to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 810."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carries."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. John Dunn. Amends House Bill 810 on page



1, lines 29 and 30 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."

Dunn, John: "Amendment #2 does the same thing that Amendment #1 tried to do. It converts this Bill which originally was filed for the purpose of authorizing self-service gas stations in Illinois. It deletes all the substance in the Bill with regard to what shall or shall not take place with regard to self-service gas stations. And leaves remaining in the Bill the fifty dollars permit fee called for in the original Bill. So all this Bill will do, if this Amendment is adopted, is permit the State Fire Marshal to charge a fifty dollar permit fee for those service stations that choose to adopt self-service in the State of Illinois."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion. All those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carries, the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Skinner. Amends House Bill 810 on page 4 by inserting between lines 27 and 28 the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner. Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the General Assembly, Amendment #3 requires that the price differential between self-service and full-service be at least ten percent. The motivation behind this Amendment is were...what the...were the headlines in yesterday's Chicago papers indicating that the Chicago City Council thought that was an appropriate price differential. And generally my theory has been what's good enough for Chicago ought to be good enough for the rest of the state. In fact, I think that's the only way the rest of the state can protect itself. And for that reason I offer this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. With regard to...to Amendment #3, I would just like to point out that self-service gas stations were originally prohibited by regulation of the State Fire Marshal. That regulation has now been rescinded and a new regulation has been promulgated authorizing self-service gas stations in the State of Illinois by regulation of the State Fire Marshal. We don't need legislation on this matter at this time. The State Fire Marshal can conduct hearings



if any changes need to be made in the regulations and to legislate a price differential between full-service and self-service islands is obviously contrary to everything, all the principles of free enterprise that we believe in and uphold in the State of Illinois. So I would certainly ask that this Amendment be defeated. This is not the way I want the Bill to go to Third Reading as Sponsor of this Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk. Will the Member sitting...standing up between Representative Tuerk and the Chair please be seated?"

107 votes. Barnes, will you please be seated? Representative Barnes. Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Tuerk: "I take it, by your Amendment to this Bill, that if gasoline sold for sixty cents a gallon, you're suggesting the price would drop ten percent, is that the way you have that drafted? Is that the understanding? In other words, sixty cents a gallon, you're suggesting six cents differential?"

Skinner: "Yes, that is correct."

Tuerk: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I arise in support of this Amendment. I join my colleague in bringing to the attention of the floor of the House one of the reasons why this Amendment is so necessary. That the...House Bill 810 is written, allows the Department of Law Enforcement the complete right to set and adopt rules and regulations. Well, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, one of the biggest problems we have as a Legislative Body is when we give up our right as a Legislature to some bureaucracy to adopt rules and regulations as they seem to think is set forth. And this is a big problem in today's society when the Legislature skips out from its responsibility and what type of rules and what kind of differential there should be in law concerning self-service stations. Now if the people of Illinois want self-service, we the Legislature, should adopt the necessary legislation to mandate a differential. This Amendment is a good Amendment. It sets in force at least some kind of rule making



procedure that this Body addresses itself to instead of allowing some nonelected person who has never stood the test of election to promulgate rules that in effect are law. I support this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman."

Hoffman, G: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it's absolutely ridiculous that we haven't had self-service gas stations in this state for the last ten or fifteen years like every other reasonable state in the union has had them. To get...to put our nose...for the Legislative Body to stick their nose in...in the free enterprise system and determine what percentage ought to be the difference between one kind of service and another shows you how far down the road towards a socialistic society we're going. Now you and I know why the last speaker takes the position that he takes and it's unrelated to the vast majority of the people of the State of Illinois. And for this reason as well as for reasons previously mentioned, I believe that with all due deference to the Sponsor, that this Amendment ought to be soundly defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there are some of us on the floor of this House that feel that self-service gasoline stations may in the end not be in the best interest of the consumers but may be in the best interests of the oil producers, the oil refiners, the major oil wholesalers. This Amendment is a protection to the consumers and I commend my Croatian countryman in Chicago, Bilandic, for offering this type of ordinance in the City of Chicago. This really will mean that we in the Legislature are going to make sure that if we are going to have self-service, it will be in the best interest to the consumers rather than the best interests of the major oil companies. And believe me, believe me when I say, that those who are the major oil companies, they know that this is in their best interests. I know because I have a Bill that will come before us later on in the afternoon that will prohibit the...the oil refiners and the oil producers from being in the retail gasoline service station business. And believe me, they're lobbying against that Bill. They don't want it because they know being in the retail business and being major oil companies that they have much to benefit. And who's going



to pay the cost? The consumers. So I say, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, if you are for self-service, then let's have it at the benefit of the consumers and let's make sure that they get that saving at the pump. And this Amendment guarantees it. And I ask the Members of the House to vote in favor of Amendment #3 to House Bill 810."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dunn to close."

Dunn, J: "Thank...thank you, Mr. Speaker, I would just like to point out that...."

Speaker Redmond: "Pardon me. Representative Skinner to close."

Skinner: "Thank you, Sir. I know that we have similar votes on many matters but you shouldn't confuse us. I would appeal to my colleagues with the idea that free enterprise and the oil industry are hardly compatible concepts. Using them in the same sentence means one does not understand what the oil industry is all about. I would suggest that if you trust big oil this Amendment definitely should be defeated. But if instead you can remember what happened to price of gasoline at the pump during the energy crisis when there was virtually no shortage of gasoline in the country whatsoever, you should support this Amendment. I would remind you that there was virtually no shortage and the price of gasoline virtually doubled. Now, two weeks ago President Carter made his energy statement which indicated that he was going to increase the taxes on gasoline. I don't know how many of you have noticed what's happened to the price of gasoline in the Chicago area since that announcement but it's gone up ten to fifteen cents in about a two week period and nothing has changed except the President has said that the price of gasoline might go up if Congress ever gets around to doing anything. Now anybody that suggests the oil..oil industry is a competitive industry haven't had any courses in micro-economics. This is an administered price industry. It is an oligarchy at best, at worst it's a monopoly and it certainly is not to be trusted. Now I know I'm getting through when lobbyists from various industries don't invite me to their receptions. And the big oil people had their reception just last week and I didn't get an invitation and neither did...neither did anybody else who said anything



hostile about the oil companies, I imagine. Well, I would suggest we have every reason to say hostile things about the oil companies. And if we...if they...if we...the only way that we can possibly make them live up to their promise that we'll get lowered prices for self-service gasoline is to follow Mayor Bilandic's excellent example and to vote for this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #3. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Leinenweber to explain his vote."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to explain my vote, why I'm going to vote against this Amendment. Representative Skinner pointed out that in the energy crisis the price of gas went up tremendously and he felt there wasn't any choice. Well, I'm inclined to agree there probably wasn't a shortage but I think it's very curious that the price went up at the same time the government clamped the lid on the price. The price went up to meet the lid. This is nothing but price fixing. Representative Skinner, the Sponsor of this Amendment has shown that he's not in favor of self-service gas stations. I don't know..when's the last time he's traveled outside the State of Illinois but you'll...if he has...you'll find out that he pays more for a gallon of gas in the State of Illinois because of the fact that he's entitled to have persons pump the gas and he can't pump it himself. You go to any other state in the union except for a very few others, you can pump your own gas and you can save five, six, seven cents a gallon, and a lot more, depending on it. So I would say that...that, sure you can pass this Amendment, you can...you can... you can fix prices but you're not going to affect anything. And you're wasting a lot of time with us and I urge its defeat."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 67 'ayes' and 35 'no' and the Gentleman's motion prevails and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 853."

Clerk O'Brien: "House...House Bill 853. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor? Representative Daniels, is there an Amendment on this that you know of?"

Daniels: "Yes, Amendment #1 which I'm sure Representative Hanahan wants to look at and study very carefully so I'd like to take this out of the record."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 868."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 868. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 868 on page 1 by deleting lines 28 and 31."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Take this out of the record, please, right at this moment. We'll come right back to it."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 876."

Clerk O'Brien: "House...."

Speaker Redmond: "Is that all right? Southwest side Croatians are having trouble there."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 876. A Bill for an Act to require access to certain information. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion. Floor Amendment #3. Dan Houlihan. Amends House Bill 876 on page 1 by deleting lines 32 and 33 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3 to House Bill 876 would exempt from applicability of the Act units of local government and restrict the applicability Act to state agencies. The reason for the Amendment is, that the provisions of this Bill are new. They are far reaching. I think it would be helpful to local units of government to let the state experiment first with the provisions of the Bill. If it works, well, we can subsequently expand its application to local units of government. Secondly, this will be duplicative of existing local Public Records Act which deal with local fiscal records and makes them open to the public. And thirdly, pursuant to House Resolution to House Cities and Villages



Committee a study and public notice requirement. I think we should delay a applicability of this Act to local units of government." And so our House Committee has acted. And I would request a favorable Roll Call on the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."

Catania: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, as the Sponsor of House Bill 876, I oppose this Amendment. What the Sponsor is attempting to do is to take out local government units. The Illinois Municipal League has very carefully studied this Bill and feels that it would in no way work any hardship whatsoever on local government units. And one of the problems right in Illinois is the uneven quality of provision of public records to the general public. Some local governments do an excellent job of providing these records. Others, our neighboring counties, simply don't really go to the trouble of providing records and in some cases it's simply because they don't understand how to go about it. So the public is denied access to public records. I'm afraid that the person Sponsoring this Amendment is trying to insure the City of Chicago will not have to provide public records which is unfortunate and I certainly hope that it's just not that kind of special interest which is moving him to offer this Amendment. I do ask for your opposition to the Amendment. It is the thrust of the Bill to require that government units, except the courts in Illinois, do provide public access to their records. And I would ask for a strong defeat of Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Levin."

Levin: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Levin: "Mr. Sponsor, if this Amendment is adopted, would you be able to support House Bill 1876...876?"

Houlihan, D: "Yes."

Levin: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would speak briefly in opposition to this Amendment. I am a Cosponsor of House



Bill 876 and the reason I am is because many residents out in Lake County have come to me and told me about the problems they have and it's mainly with local units of government, either the local park districts or the villages. And the common experience that the citizen who wants some information about government is, is really not with the state, it's normally with his local unit of government. And if there's anyplace that where we ought to insure that they have reasonable access to public documents and information about what their government is doing, it is on the local level. So I would encourage your 'no' vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan to close."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I think the issue as defined by the Amendment is clear. I think if you respect the integrity of local units of government that this is not an unreasonable Amendment to first let the proposal embodied in the Bill to see how it works as far as state agencies are concerned. We would have the capability subsequently to expand the applicability of the Bill to local units of government. I would ask for a favorable vote on the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'.

Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?-- Representative Catania."

Catania: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, to explain my 'no' vote I would like to point out that most local government bodies are now providing public records. It is the City of Chicago which unfortunately is trying to exempt itself from this Bill. The City of Chicago traditionally opens its records to the public only after extensive court action. In the City of Chicago, for instance, if you want to look at election records you are allowed to do so only for four hours a day, and those are not four consecutive hours. Everything is done to make it a hardship to examine records in the City of Chicago. And this is an attempt to just exempt the City of Chicago. The Illinois Municipal League has no problem with this Bill without this Amendment. They say that it will not work any hardship on local governments. And I would ask for a lot more red lights to defeat this very self-serving Amendment."



Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record.

On this question there's 79 'aye' and 56 'no'. The Gentleman's motion prevails and the Amendment's adopted. Anything further?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 901. Representative D. L. Houlihan.

D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D.L.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, at my request, on the previous Bill, previous to the one I just considered on 868, the Sponsor was courteous enough to take it out of the record for just a moment. I've shown him the Amendment. I believe it is an Agreed Amendment now. And if we could move to that now."

Speaker Redmond: "868."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 868. This Bill's been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment 1. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 868 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment to House Bill 868 removes ambiguous language. It is agreed to by the Sponsor. He may have a comment on it, Representative Terzich."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Well, two things. First, I move for adoption of the Amendment. #1. And number two, Representative Kornowicz had a get-well card passed around the House and it's lost. So anyone who's got the get-well card for Representative Kornowicz, I want it here immediately. Eddie wants that card."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the motion carries and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 901."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 901. This Bill's been read a second time



previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 901 on page 1, line 10 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you. House Amendment, excuse me. Amendment #1 to House Bill 901 is an agreed Amendment with the Sponsor and I think she wishes to address the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stiehl. Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I agree with this Amendment it improves the Bill and would ask for an affirmative vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on...motion for the adoption of

Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed, 'no'.

The 'ayes' have it. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 932."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 932. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note furnished on this?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No...no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note is filed. No floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 933."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 933. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. DiPrima. Amends House Bill 933 on page 1, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative DiPrima. DiPrima."

DiPrima: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd advise you to proceed over to your battle stations, get ready to vote on this beautiful Amendment. When I endorsed Bud Washburn for the job of Director of Veteran's Affairs, I knew what I was doing because this Amendment came to me from Bud Washburn and his aides, Administrative Assistant Walter Kesselman. Now, I introduced this Bill about eight



years ago when Ogilvie was Governor, and a good Governor, at the time...signed this Bill into law. And what it did, the government gave \$10,000, and the state \$5,000, a total of \$15,000 for the real estate tax exemption for the paralyzed veteran. Now, the kind old government, the Congress, has upgraded that from 10,000, an additional 15,000, and the 5,000 that the state gives, that makes a total of \$30,000 tax exemption the paraplegic will get on a special housing... specially constructed for paraplegic and paid for by the government for these paraplegic veterans who gave their...their...most of themselves for us. So now in the words of that illustrious Representative from Aurora, Fred Tuerk, it would be ludicrous for you not to vote for this Amendment. I would appreciate an affirmative vote. From Peoria."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative James Houlihan."

DiPrima: "Daniel Webster's..."

Houlihan, J: "Mr. Speaker...look, Representative DiPrima on your Bill that Amendment on line 7, it seems to indicate that the 30% reduction of the brownstones is not in the same fashion as the 15 reduction... 15% reduction of the 30,000 that you have from the \$5,000 on the federal thing on the bungalows. Could you explain why there is a difference the bungalow and the brownstone Amendments?"

DiPrima: "Jimmy, don't jump in the lake. And now my good colleague over there, Bud Skinner, he ought to quit floundering in the weeds with these fiscal notes. I don't know what he put a fiscal note on this for. I would appreciate an affirmative vote for the adoption..."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, I'm not quite sure what this Amendment does. Does it increase the exemption on property tax for housing from 15 to 30,000?"

DiPrima: "Yes, Sir."

Ewing: "When this Bill was introduced originally, if I remember right, you appeared in front of the Revenue Committee and you said this was to restore this exemption to one little old widow. Is that correct?"

DiPrima: "Oh, the Bill, yeah. The original Bill. But this is an Amendment that was given to me by Bud Washburn. Yeah."

Ewing: "Well, Bud Washburn..."



DiPrima: "Your former boss."

Ewing: "Yeah. He isn't my boss anymore. But now we're going to double that exemption for all veterans, right? That would mean..."

DiPrima: "No. No. No. No. No."

Ewing: "No, all disabled."

DiPrima: "Just the paraplegics. This is special housing that they get through the government."

Ewing: "Yes. Well, they would have to have a \$90,000 home now before they'd owe any taxes under your Amendment."

DiPrima: "Well, you gotta understand. In order to have adapted...specially adapted houses and they have to have ramps and what-have-you, you know, it's a costly home in the long run."

Ewing: "Well, what this..."

DiPrima: "It's the paraplegics, what are you arguing? Vote for the Bill."

Ewing: "I'm not...I'm just...just a little confused."

DiPrima: "You're standing on your feet, they sit in a wheelchair."

Ewing: "I...I could agree with you....this is...but I tell you when you come before a Committee with a Bill for one little old lady, let's...let's hear it correctly when we hear it."

DiPrima: "All right. Now this little old lady lives in my district.

She was married to a paraplegic. All right? Now. This fella died so she still maintains that 15,000 tax exemption while she's unmarried. When she remarries she loses that. Well, she married another veteran that wasn't a...a paraplegic so she lost that. So now this guy died. Now she's back a widow, you know, and this Bill reverts her back to the status which is probably the only one in the state. And then another thing, in order to satisfy Chapman, Dyer, Catania and Geo-Karis another word was changed that ought to make them happy, from 'widow' to 'spouse'."

Ewing: "Well, I think..."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further?"

Ewing: "Yes. I think..."

DiPrima: "Male or female?"

Ewing: "Representative DiPrima has covered all bases here but I...I'm



going to speak to the Amendment. I think that it's really a fraud on this House to have this kind of Amendment come in on a Bill that's put through to aid one little old lady and the costs here are going to be tremendous. I don't think that most paraplegics live in \$90,000 homes and I have...would have to oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Representative DiPrima."

DiPrima: "Yeah, Leverenz is telling me that she's moving into Ewing's district. All right, I'll appreciate an affirmative vote."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 76 'aye' and 20 'no' and the Gentleman's motion prevails and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 933 as amended on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D. L. Houlihan. D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in respect to Amendment #3 to House Bill 933, I've heeded the admonition of Representative DiPrima in manning the battle stations, feel that discretion is a better part of valor, would ask leave to withdraw Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman have leave to withdraw Amendment #3? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 949."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 949."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Clerk O'Brien: "This Bill has been read..."

Speaker Redmond: "You're not in your seat, according to Hanahan's rules, that's where you're supposed to be. Changing the rules."

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note has been filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note is on file, is that correct?"

Hanahan: "I thought the Gentleman just filed a little while ago. He came to me and said that the fiscal note was being filed. Some staff guy."



Speaker Redmond: "That was Bud Washburn."

Hanahan: "In fact he told me the amount of money was very....one hundred and forty-some thousand dollars or something and he had...he brought it here...."

Speaker Redmond: "Take this out of the record until we find the fiscal note. 951."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 951. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Tuerk. Amends House Bill 951 on page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker, I don't recall filing this Amendment. Perhaps... is this the Amendment that Representative Porter may have filed on this Bill? If you give me a moment, let me put my act together."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay, we'll take this one out of the record. How about 953?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 953. This Bill has been read a second time previously...."

Speaker Redmond: "We'll get back to you. 953, are there any Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 956."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 956. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Dan Houlihan. Amends...."

Speaker Redmond: "D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "On Amendment #1, Mr. Speaker, to House Bill 956, as the Sponsor of the Amendment, I ask leave to withdraw it please. Asking leave to withdraw Amendment #1 to...."



Speaker Redmond: "Does he have leave to withdraw Amendment #1?"

Hearing no objection leave is granted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Did we find the fiscal note on 949?"

You better get a copy of that Representative Hanahan. 957."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 957. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Dan Houlihan. Amends House Bill 957 on page 1, line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, as the Sponsor of Amendment #1 to House Bill 957, I ask leave to withdraw Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have leave? Hearing no objection leave is granted. Amendment #1 is withdrawn. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 958."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 958. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. D. L. Houlihan."

Speaker Redmond; "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "As Sponsor of Amendment #1 to House Bill 958, I now ask leave to withdraw Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objection leave is granted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 962."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 962. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 963."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 963. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 964."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 964. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. McClain. Amends House Bill 964 on page 1, line 6 by deleting 'road' and inserting in lieu thereof 'general revenue'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McClain. Is he on the floor? Representative Ryan, what's your pleasure?"

Ryan: "I didn't hear your question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Sponsor of the Amendment is not on the floor, what's your pleasure?"

Ryan: "Well, I would like to move the Bill, Mr. Speaker, if that's possible."

Speaker Redmond: "Well."

Ryan: "It...it...if it be...who's the Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Speaker Redmond: "McClain."

Ryan: "Well, I'll take it out of the record for Representative...."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, it's up to you."

Ryan: "No, I'd be glad to accommodate Representative McClain."

Speaker Redmond: "That'll cost him dearly. 972."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 972. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 989."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 989. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. Floor Amendment 2. D. L. Houlihan.

Amends House Bill 989 as amended on page 2 by deleting lines 4 through 6 and inserting in lieu thereof the following."

Speaker Redmond: "D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #2 deletes the Home Rule Amendment as applicable to this Bill. It's unnecessary in view of Representative Matijevich, his



Bill respecting Home Rule Amendment. I ask the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Tuerk. Will the Republican caucus please adjourn to the the Supreme Court Chambers? The Gentleman standing between the Chair and Representative Tuerk please sit down. Representative Ryan, Representative Waddell."

Tuerk: "Well, Mr. Speaker, is this a floor Amendment to this Bill, is that what we're on right now?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative D. L. Houlihan's Amendment."

Tuerk: "I'm sorry, I was studying this other Bill, I didn't hear it. I'm sorry, Representative Houlihan."

Speaker Redmond: "Will you explain it again, Representative Houlihan?"

Houlihan, D: "Thank you. House Bill 989 is, in its present form, referred to that the Act, or the Amendatory Act, does not apply to any county which is a home-rule unit either under the Amendatory Act of 1975 or the Amendatory Act of 1977. What the Amendment does is simply to delete this home rule provision and insert the language, 'the Amendatory Act of 1975 does not apply to any county which is a home rule unit'. The balance of the language is unnecessary in view of Representative Matijevich's Bill respecting Home Rule Amendments in the future. That's all it does. It's a technical Amendment."

Tuerk: "I have no objection."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman moves the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 992."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill...992. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stanley."

Clerk O'Brien: "House...just a moment, I've got the wrong Bill. 992.... 992. House Bill 992. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee. No motions filed. Floor Amendment #2. Stanley. Amends House Bill 992 on page 1, line 10 and so forth."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stanley."

Stanley: "Yeah. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I would like to table Amendment #2 and there's an additional Amendment, Amendment #3, which I'd like to move on to."

Speaker Redmond: "Does he have leave to table Amendment #2? Hearing no objections leave is granted. Amendment #2 is tabled."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Stanley. Amends House Bill 992 as amended on page 1, line 10 and so forth."

Stanley: "Thank...thank you very much. Amendment...Amendment #3 increases the Liquor Control Commission's appropriation by \$45,400. And let me explain the reasons for that and what I think is a very good justification. In 1971 in the Liquor Control Commission there were 28 special agents, investigators. Today in 1976 there is a total of 8 special agents...."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner, sit down, can't see Mr. Stanley."

Stanley: "There are a total today of 8 special agents in the Liquor Control Commission for the whole State of Illinois. And there are many instances in which all the agents can do is simply respond to requests from particular people or particular taverns or...or problems that they have in the...in the liquor industry throughout the state. This is totally inadequate to handle the whole State of Illinois. What my Amendment does is add \$40,000 personal services and the remainder for retirement and social security to place an additional four special agents on the appropriation. And I request a favorable...."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I stand in opposition to Amendment #3. When this Bill was heard in the Appropriations Committee the original request was for \$410,300. Upon the House Committee's action there was a net reduction with Amendments #1 and 2 which was adopted in Committee, the reduction of sixty-eight hundred. Now we have by the Sponsor of the Bill Amendment #3 restoring practically \$45,000 in the personal services line item. This Bill was heard in Committee. The testimony was heard. The analyses by both staffs were reviewed and in turn now they're saying that we need four additional liquor control agents. Well let me point out to this Membership that in fiscal '77, as far as personal services,



this agency had \$297,000 that was estimated expenditure. In their fiscal '78 request it went up to \$305,000. It was reviewed by the Committee and in turn there was no justification for any new people. They made a recommendation of a net reduction of \$6800 overall in the budget and now this Gentleman is trying to justify these additional positions. I will stand with the analysis that was worked on by both staffs and then in turn I would hope that the recommendation of the Appropriations Committee and its Membership would be sustained and this Amendment be defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative James Houlihan. They don't have adequate."

Houlihan, J: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Houlihan, J: "Representative Stanley, with the addition of these people, what would be the number of agents compared to some two or three years ago?"

Stanley: "What would be the num.... I'm sorry, Representative Houlihan, I didn't understand your question."

Houlihan, J: "With the increase of these necessary agents what would be the result, in terms of staff, compared to some two, maybe three years ago?"

Stanley: "Okay. I think....in 1973 there were 26 agents; 1974 there were 6 agents; 1975 there were 7 agents and in 1976, right now, there are 8 agents. So what we're adding is 4, a total of 12 special agents as compared to 1972 when it had more agents than any other time and that was a total of 30."

Houlihan, J: "In...in other words, it was up to a high of 30 and this would bring it about...somewhere in the vicinity of 12? Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, let me address myself to this Amendment. I...handled the appropriation for the Liquor Commission when they made the major reduction of Amendments, or of agents. And what the commissioners said at that time was that we should reduce the agents so that we could allow the Department of Revenue, which has agents doing the same function take over many of these functions to streamline and make more efficient the entire operation. At that time when they appeared before the Committee, they indicated if this was not going to work if there was going to be some slippage in



terms of their review of the liquor licensees in terms of complying with the law that they would come back to this General Assembly and ask for additional dollars. That is precisely what Representative Stanley has done. It is still a small number. It is a minor increase. And I think that there is a full justification to bring the Department into a position where it can be responsible for the laws that it must carry out and I would support Amendment #3."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner. You'd probably be...."

Skinner: "Fine. But this is...on the one hand I am astounded that someone who represented the Walker Administration so ably, while the Walker Administration was firing all the Liquor Control agents in the...in the Liquor Control Commission and putting them under the Revenue Department so that the guy that's now handling patronage for the Thompson Administration for my county would lose his job, would argue in favor of putting them back in. And on the other hand, I wonder whether they really need it because during the Walker Administration the primary accomplishment of the Liquor Control Commission investigators, at least in Elgin, was closing down the American Legion Home because the steward happened to buy a truckload of Coors beer that he put in his cooler a hundred feet away from the bar. And lo and behold these...these gentlemen didn't find him the day after he bought the Coors beer and shut him down. Now it seems to me that if the Liquor Control Commission is going to be so frivolous in its use of time and instead can't find some real violators of some real Liquor Control laws, that perhaps they don't need any more people. So I'm totally confused on how to vote on the Amendment. Maybe the Sponsor can give us some more guidance."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, I was wondering why we're dealing with Annual Appropriations Bills at a time when we've got the regular House Calendar to clean up and...Appropriations Bills be handled later."

Speaker Redmond: "It's a good question and we won't do it very much more. Representative Stanley."

Stanley: "Yes, thank you,....Speaker. I talked to Representative Ryan briefly and I think wisdom is going to prevail. And I think I'm going to ask that this Amendment be tabled."



Speaker Redmond: "This is your Amendment, Representative Stanley? This is your Amendment?"

Stanley: "Yes."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment #3: Does he have leave? Hearing no objection, leave is granted. The Amendment's tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1029. Has a fiscal note been furnished on that, Chalkie? You furnished that, Representative Houlihan? 1029, did you furnish the fiscal note? 1029 and 1030...."

Houlihan, D: "I was under the impression that they have been furnished."

Speaker Redmond: "They have?"

Houlihan, D: "I was wrong, Mr. Speaker, they have not been."

Speaker Redmond: "1078. David Epstein here? David Epstein here?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1078. This Bill has been read a second time previously...."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian around?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any motion with respect to Amendment #1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions on file."

Speaker Redmond: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2. Luft. Amends House Bill 1078 on page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Luft, 1078. Mulcahey."

Luft: "I'd like to withdraw that Amendment, please, Mr...."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman has asked leave to withdraw the Amendment.

Any objections? Hearing none, it's withdrawn. Any more Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3. Mulcahey. Amends House Bill 1078 as amended on page 1, line 10 by deleting 'certified'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Amendment #3 simply changes one word 'certified employees' to include 'all employees' And I move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Gene Hoffman, do you seek recognition?"

Hoffman, G: "Certified to 'all'?"



Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #3. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'.

The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1079. Fiscal note been furnished on that? Representative Jacobs, did you furnish the fiscal note on 1079? Just nod yes or no."

Jacobs: "No, really, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, with two Amendments there will not be any necessity of a fiscal note because it would not take effect until July 1st of 1978, number one. Number two, is that...."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's...who filed the request for a fiscal note?"

Jacobs: "I think Representative Conti."

Speaker Redmond: "Who?"

Jacobs: "Representative Conti, I think."

Speaker Redmond: "Conti. ...Your opinion is it still required, in light of the Amendment? You persist in the request for a fiscal note then? Gentleman has withdrawn his request for a fiscal note then."

Jacobs: "Thank you, Representative. There are two Amendments and Geo-Karis has one, I have one, which would change the effective date to July the 1st 1978. Representative Geo-Karis, if she's here, we could present her Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Call the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1079. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Geo-Karis: Amends House Bill 1079 on page 5, line 32, by deleting line 32 and inserting in lieu thereof 'authorized to issue statements of opinions or audits'."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Excuse me, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, my Amendment to House Bill 1079 amends it on page 5, line 32 and it provides that the independent accountants, in other words, the accountants who are not CPA's are not authorized to issue statements of opinions or audits. And I move the adoption of the Amendment. The way the Amendment reads it...the language is not in here but in



the Bill it strikes out line 32, as I said on page 5, and when line 32 is stricken on page 5, the sentence will read: 'However, licensed accountants shall not be authorized to issue statements of opinions or audits'. I move the passage for this Amendment... the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I approve of and ask for the adoption of Amendment #1. To House Bill 1079."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2. Jacobs. Amends House Bill 1079 on page 1, line 4 and so forth."

Jacobs: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #2..."

Speaker Redmond: "He's married, Geo."

Jacobs: "To House Bill 1079...actually what Amendment #2 does...there is on page 1, line 4 by inserting immediately after 'title of' the phrase 'and to repeal Section 31'. And on page 25 by inserting immediately after line 4, the following: 'Section 3. Section 31 of said Act is repealed.' And Section 4: 'This Amendatory Act takes effect July 1, 1978'. And I ask for the adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye'. Representative Tipword, pardon me."

Tipword: "I would just like to ask Representative Jacobs, if I might, what...what does this do now? I've been getting so many letters both ways from accountants and CPA's and I'd like to know where the heck we are."

Jacobs: "Well, really, Representative Tipword, Section 31 is what would preempt the home rule part. And I'm removing that where the home rule powers will exist."

Tipword: "This doesn't do anything then between CPA's and accountants, I mean, as far as..."

Jacobs: "The Bill itself just sets up a...where the public accountant, as we



know them today, no CPA's would still have the right to continue to do what they are doing today but not be classified as CPA's."

Tipsword: "Well, they will not be able to give audit opinions."

Jacobs: "They will not be able to give opinions or complete or do audits."

Tipsword: "Or do audits. They'll do accounting."

Jacobs: "Right."

Tipsword: "Thank you, Sir."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #2. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopt...I mean the Amendment's....Third Reading. 1140. I'm following Representative Friedrich's admonition on these next two. 1140. Representative Cunningham."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1140. It's been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "How about the fiscal note?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A fiscal note is not filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Fiscal note's on the way. The fiscal note is on the way."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, we'll have to take it out until you get it. 1178."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1178. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment...Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion or floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion. Floor Amendment #2. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 1178 on page 12 by deleting lines 13 through 17."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, as Sponsor of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1178, I ask leave at this time to withdraw the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Gentleman have leave to withdraw the Amendment? Hearing no objection leave is granted. There is no further floor Amendment or motion, is that correct? No floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."



Speaker Redmond: "... 1189. Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1189. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1191."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1191. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee. No..."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Schuneman. Amends House Bill 1191 as amended in the first sentence in Section 363 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Schuneman."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman on Amendment #2."

Schuneman: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #2 is a technical Amendment changing the wording having to do with the supplemental Medicare benefits which was suggested by the Department of Insurance. I don't think there's any objection to the Amendment. I move its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman. Gentleman has moved for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1205, we'll take that out of the record. 1212. Representative Von Boeckman, for what purpose do you arise?"

Von Boeckman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to have the privilege of introducing to you the fifth grade students of Ivy Hill School which is represented by Susan Melcher, Mrs. Carter, Mrs. Dwyer...Mr. Dwyer, Mrs. 'Hanigay' and Principal, Mr. Johns. They are Representative....from Arlington Heights and they are in the Third Legislative District which my daughter-in-law, Jill, teaches. And they are ably represented by Representatives Chapman, Macdonald and Totten. They are above me in the balcony."

Speaker Redmond: "Fiscal note hasn't been filed. We'll take that one out. 1222. Out of the record. 1223."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1223. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Floor Amendment #2. Catania. Amends House Bill 1223 on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, as I agreed to do in the Veterans' Affairs Committee where this Bill was approved, I would like to move to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Does she have leave? Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I am the Sponsor of Amendment 1 and this is the Amendment that was agreed by Representative Catania would be on the Bill if I voted...if I recall clearly, by voting to pass the Bill out of Committee, which I did. And I would like to offer and affirm my Amendment 1 to the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, the Lady has moved that Amendment #1 be tabled. Now will Representative Catania."

Catania: "Representative Geo-Karis, the problem with Amendment #1, as you may recall, was that it put one dental hygienist and two public members in place of two dentists. And what I have agreed to do in Committee was to put back the two dentists so that we keep the total of seven dentists on the Dental Examining Board. And what Amendment #2 does is to restore them, so we have 7 dentists and then we end up with 7 dentists and 2 dental hygienists with Amendment #2."

Geo-Karis: "Well, then, do I understand you correctly to say that your Amendment will restore...will have 7 dentists?"

Catania: "Amendment #2, which I will move to adopt after we table Amendment #1, will have 7 dentists which is the current number of dentists on the Dental Examining.... Yes."

Geo-Karis: "And how many more are you adding besides the 7 dentists on your Amendment?"

Catania: "We're...we're adding two dental hygienists."

Geo-Karis: "Yeah, but wasn't your understanding and mine that you would add one dental hygienist and...and that was what I did in this Amendment?"



Catania: "No, it was that we would keep the number of dentists."

Geo-Karis: "That's right and..."

Catania: "That are now on the Dental Examining Committee."

Geo-Karis: "And then one dental hygienist. That was my understanding."

Catania: "And that we would...and that we would work out with the Department the rest of the details. And the Department's position is that they want an odd number of people on the Committee which is why they have to add two to add up to 9."

Geo-Karis: "Well, under my Amendment, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, you would have six dentists, is that....and if I'm correct."

Catania: "There has to be seven."

Geo-Karis: "Well, all right. If we have seven dentists, under my Amendment then, and one dental hygienist, is that correct?"

Catania: "No, we have to have seven dentists in total."

Geo-Karis: "Well, doesn't my...my Amendment provide for seven dentists?"

Catania: "Not the one we adopted in Committee, no."

Geo-Karis: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, for the purpose of expediting the business of the House, I will accept the tabling of my Amendment but I'm not crazy about Amendment 2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Catania moves to table Amendment #1.

Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it.

Table...Amendment #1 is tabled. Amendment #2 is the...Representative Catania."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #2 would keep seven dentists, which is what we now have on the Dental Examining Committee, and it would add two dental hygienists which is the desire of the Department so that we maintain an odd number of members, a total of nine. And I will be happy to discuss it with Representative Geo-Karis so that she is happy with the Bill on Third Reading. But I would move for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1223."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor of the Amendment yield to a question?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes."



Friedrich: "It was my understanding in Committee that everyone had agreed on the one but I didn't know anyone had agreed on the two. And I'm talking about the department, the dentists, technicians and all. I'm going to have to oppose the Bill the way you're... the way you're doing it because I had agreed to go along with the one but not the two. And I think you're fouling up the Bill if that's what you're.... I can't vote for the Bill with your Amendment, that's what I'm saying. Everyone has agreed on one. I don't know anyone's agreed on two except...."

Catania: "Well, Representative Friedrich, what I said in Committee was, that we would restore seven dentists, which is what the dentists really questioned, and that we would work out the rest of it with the department. That was the problem in Committee, the department had not yet made it clear whether they wanted a dental assistant or a dental hygienist as the ninth member. But their position is that they want an odd number of members so that when there's a controversial decision there will be a five to four ratio."

Friedrich: "I don't believe the dentists will agree to this."

Speaker Redmond: "Where are we now, Mr. Clerk? Any further debate?"

Representative Catania to close."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I would ask for adoption of Amendment #2 with, as I said, the understanding that I would try to make it clear what the department's position is for the people who raised questions when we are on Third Reading."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Lady's motion for the adoption of the Amendment. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Those in favor vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'.

Representative Catania."

Catania: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, the problem with voting 'no' here is that what you're doing is putting one dental hygienist and one member of the general public on the board which everybody's opposed to. If you want to put a member of the general public on the board, it's fine with me, and we are all members of the general public and we all have teeth and that's what we're all about in a Dental Examining Committee. But I would have to tell you



that the dentists are opposed to that and the department is opposed to that but...but I'll accept the will of the General Assembly on it."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 37 'aye' and 75 'no' and the Lady's motion fails. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 1227."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1227. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1227 on page 1, line 16 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan. Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "House Bill 1227 exempts laborers from Metropolitan Sanitary District's Civil Service exam. Yesterday on House Bill 1227 we exempted several positions from MSD Civil Service. Those exemptions were based on the argument that they were policy-making, middle management decisions. Labor is...are not policy-making positions. Argument could be made that laborers...day laborers are hired on a day to day basis so they don't have to take an exam because they only work a few days. However, this Bill does not state it's for day laborers. These laborers will be appointed by the general superintendent. After a year if they are not discharged, be blanketed under civil service. The only reason for this type of Bill to be ...to give the general superintendent power to hire patronage workers. This is Bill is without reasonable justification. It is unnecessary encroachment on civil service. My Amendment allows the general superintendent to hire laborers for a period of sixty days or less and requires them to hire them on a contractual basis under competitive bidding. I move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1227."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to Amendment #1 to House Bill 1227. First of all, the Amendment goes much further than explained by the Sponsor of the Amendment. Presently exempt from the civil service provisions



are the positions of deputy chief engineer, assistant chief engineers, assistant attorneys, assistant director of research and development and the comptroller. However, this Amendment would make them exempt only if employed for a period of less than sixty days. The most serious problem, though, with the Amendment is what it contains in the provision which would delete this language in the Act. The present Bill proposes all labor shall be appointed by the general superintendent and shall be on probation for a period to be fixed by the rules not exceeding one year. What that...this Amendment would do, would be to delete that language in its entirety and insert this language, and I'm quoting from the Amendment. 'All labors performed by laborers employed for a period of less than sixty days shall be contracted on a basis of competitive bidding'. Now there's only one way, Ladies and Gentlemen, that you can read that kind of an Amendment and that's to say that the only ones that are going to work are as laborers, are those who are willing to work for the cheapest wage. This is an insult to the workingman. I ask for a negative vote on this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any additional discussion? Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "I concur with what Representative Houlihan has made in the observation of this Amendment. This is called union-busting in the worst sense of the word and this Amendment should be completely defeated."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Lechowicz in the Chair."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson to close."

Abramson: "My figures indicate that laborers working for the MSD are currently getting 18% over the private sector's wages. Hiring laborers on the basis of competitive bidding to give the public the best deal here. I urge adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor of the Amendment signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment's defeated. Roll Call is requested. All those in favor of Amendment #1, vote 'aye', all those against vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk take the record. On this question there are 32 'ayes', 86 'nays', 2 recorded 'present'. The Amendment is



defeated. Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Ewell. Amends House Bill 1227 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, this is an Agreed Amendment with the Sponsor. All it does is allow the Board of Commissions to appoint an equal opportunity officer who will develop an equal opportunity employment plan."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan, Dan."

Houlihan, D: "That is correct, Mr. Speaker, this is an Agreed Amendment and I would move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 1238, Representative Barnes. E. M. Barnes."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1238. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, take that out of the record. House Bill 1240, Representative Schneider. Yeah, but the Sponsor is not on the floor. House Bill 1240, Representative Schneider. ...He's not on the floor either, take it out of the record. House Bill 1249, Representative Kelly."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1249. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. D. L. Houlihan. Amends House Bill 1249 on page 1, line 13 by deleting 'a comma' and inserting in lieu thereof the following."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "This is an Agreed Amendment with the Sponsor. I'll defer to...to the Sponsor on the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this Amendment which Representative Houlihan Sponsored would place a section in here which



would actually tighten up the law and would pertain to only title insurance policies. And therefore it would.....it would limit it and I think meets with the approval of the Members of the House."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan moves the adoption of Amendment #1, all those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed. Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1213. Representative Houlihan, Dan. 1315."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1315."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker...."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 were adopted in Committee...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A motion to table Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 by Representative Chapman."

Houlihan, D: "If I may, before we recognize Representative Chapman, point out that Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 were Committee Amendments. There apparently was a technical error. I've discussed it with Representative Chapman. Amendment #5 is the technical Amendment which incorporates Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 and that's why she is moving at this time to table those and ask the adoption of Amendment #5."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "I move to table Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 to House Bill 1315."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Does the Lady have leave? Leave being granted Amendments 1, 2, 3 and 4 have been tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5. Chapman. Amends House Bill 1315 on page 1 by deleting lines 23 to 28 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker, I move to adopt Amendment #5 to House Bill 1315. This Amendment, as Representative Houlihan points out, includes all of the four Committee Amendments except that now we have removed the incompatibility and have corrected the drafting error."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Lady moves the adoption of Amendment #5. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #5 is adopted. Third Reading."



House Bill 1328. Representative Houlihan, Dan."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1328. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Tipsword. Amends House Bill 1328 on page 1, line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Tipsword. At the request of the Sponsor the Bill will be removed...take it out of the record. For what purpose does Mrs. Kent seek recognition?"

Kent: "I have filed a judicial note request and therefore this Bill will have to be held on Second Reading until I receive it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "According to the Calendar, ma'am, a fiscal note has not been requested. I don't know when you filed it. House Bill..."

Kent: "I said judicial note, not fiscal."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Oh, I'm sorry. I'm sorry. I misunderstood you."

Kent: "And they are on file there."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All right, thank you, ma'am. House Bill 1346, Representative Shumpert. Take it out of the record. 1347, also, out of the record? And 51, 53? House Bill 1354, Representative Doyle? Out of the record. No, I'm sorry. House Bill 1354, Representative Doyle."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1354. The fiscal note is not filed on this Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Take it out of the record. House Bill 1356, Representative Simms."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1356. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Sevcik, Simms. Amends House Bill 1356 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Simms."

Simms: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Amendment is offered by Representative Sevcik and myself which I have agreed to; which Representative Sevcik said that was requested by the Forest Preserve District in Chicago to allow the Zoological Society to maintain a security force within the confines of the zoo. And I move for its adoption."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Hearing no discussion, Representative Simms moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1384, Representative Chapman."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1384. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2. Chapman. Amends House Bill 1384 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Chapman on Amendment #2."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the effect of Amendment #2 is to restore the language that presently is in CDB Act here. No... proposing no change in Section 10.07. And I move for the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Chapman moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed 'nay'. Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Chapman. Amends House Bill 1384 on page 1, line 2 and line 7 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #3. Mrs. Chapman."

Chapman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I move to adopt Amendment #3 to House Bill 1384. It includes the Illinois Health Facilities Authority along with other authorities such as the Illinois Housing Development Authority, the Educational Facilities Authority and the St. Louis Metropolitan Area Airport Authority in the exemption from coming under the definition of state agency within the CDB Act. This authority, like the other authorities, does not spend any state money."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? All those in favor of Amendment #3 signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #3 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 13....I'm sorry, House Bill 1405. Representative Hanahan."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1405. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1406."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1406."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan."

Clerk O'Brien: "This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1407."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1407. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Deuster. Amends House Bill 1407 on page 1, line 14."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Deuster on Amendment #1. Not here. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He's not... Representative Deuster is not on the floor."

Clerk O'Brien: "Oh, wait, I've got Amendment #2 here."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All right, let's go back to Amendment #1. Representative Hanahan on Amendment #1. Amendment #1, Clerk. Thank you.

Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I move to adopt Amendment #1 to House Bill 1407 which deletes the word 'trade' in the context of trade unions... labor union.. We had agreed to this Amendment and I...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Hanahan moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All...all in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Amendment #2."



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Keats. Amends House Bill 1407 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Keats on Amendment #2. Representative Keats. 1407."

Keats: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I appreciate having this moment to speak. The Amendment I am offering to this Bill is a fairly minor, insignificant change. All it does is delete the Bill and change it around to say Section 1 would read: 'The School Code approved March 18, 1961, as amended, is repealed'. What we're talking about is a mandated program and I don't think we need to expand mandate. While I might agree with my dear friend, Representative Hanahan, that we should be teaching students as much as possible, I think that should be left to some local discretion. And I do not feel that we need to mandate still more programs. For that reason, I ask that this mandate be repealed which is what this Amendment does."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan on Amendment #2."

Hanahan: "Yes, first of all, is the Clerk...have Amendment #2 because I have two Amendments #1; one by Keats and one by Deuster; and I was wondering....the...the... The Amendment that was passed around here said Amendment #1."

Clerk O'Brien: "It appears this was misnumbered 1 because 2 is written over the 1 in our...in my copy."

Hanahan: "Oh, on your copy. In our copy it just says Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Keats asked that it be amended on its face. Leave being granted, Amendment #2 is amended on its face."

Hanahan: "All right. Well, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, we're trying to amend the School Code and the mandated program that... a concept that we, in the General Assembly, mandated that in the area of required topics on consumer education. That we're amending not only the provision that business and agriculture be a part of the required topics but the trade union, or the labor union...labor union contribution towards consumer education should be part of the program. Now, Representative Keats is using this Bill and this philosophy now to repeal the total section. I haven't heard the business community or from the farm bureau or from the trade union movement advocate any repeal of this Consumer Education Program."



In fact, if anything, I think we should encourage the program along and...and...to make sure that our youths understand what contributions have been made by business and by the agricultural interests and by the trade union movement. And to repeal this kind of mandated program that is now on the books, seems to me, a step backwards in an overall education that young people should achieve in...in school about consumer education. And I urge the defeat of Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, did...I was going to explain my vote, Mr. Speaker. Was he...was he...oh, he was not closing, was he?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, it's Representative...."

Walsh: "I beg your pardon and I will speak on the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The timer's on. Okay."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think this Amendment is well turned and I wouldn't think that Representative Hanahan would object to it since he is providing the vehicle for doing away with a mandate that requires all school districts by us to do something. We have heard time and time again from our school people that they don't need these mandates. They don't need to be mandated to teach driver education, for example, something that is not an education course. They don't need to be mandated to teach consumer education. They will teach consumer education if consumer education is advantageous without the need for us mandating it. If it is not, they don't have the money, then they won't do it. I would urge everyone to support Representative Keats in this Amendment and do away with this mandate."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "I move...move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor of moving the previous question signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... The previous question has been moved. Representative Keats to close."

Keats: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, what I would ask of you is to remember we are not simply repealing this specific topic, what we're repealing is the philosophy. We're saying...we are saying...in the last campaign many of us campaigned on the issue saying we wanted to do



away with some of these educational mandates. We, the Legislature, very few of us who are teachers-I am allegedly one, although I have days when I wonder-but there are very few of us in here who are teachers and I find it ridiculous that we should spend large amounts of our time mandating various programs in local schools. I feel we should end as many mandates as possible. Here is a chance to end a...end a mandate and make good on your promises to the folks back home. And your folks back home will appreciate your assistance in freeing...up...needed educational dollars for other areas. Thank you and I urge a 'yes' vote on my Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor of Amendment #2 will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'nay'. The Clerk will open the board. Representative Schneider to explain his vote. Timer's on."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, there was truly a lot of discussion in the Committee this year about mandated programs. Well, let me just suggest that you begin with this Section. You begin with a piecemeal look at the many programs that are mandated. The Governor's Commission, a Subcommittee and the House Education Committee, I think, are duly talented to begin to look at the far reaching implications of either accepting or rejecting mandated programs. If we begin with this kind of proposal..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Kindly bring your remarks to a close."

Schneider: "Which is better suited to a more thorough study, I think we make a mistake, so I would ask we oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All...Representative Brady." Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 53 'ayes', 78 'nays', none recorded as 'present'. The Amendment's defeated. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1408."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1408. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1411."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1411. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment...Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions? Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, we have a second Amendment that's been worked out by agreement with the railroad and the railroad unions. And I'd like to move to table Amendment #1 to be replaced with Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan moves to table Amendment #1. Is there leave? Leave is granted. Amendment #1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Hanahan. Amends House Bill 1411 by deleting everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #2 keeps the...the agreement with the railroads and the railroad unions intact and it allows the first Section of Amendment #1 to back into the Bill, and that was what the agreement was. We had gone further than intended on the original Amendment #1. And I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates that he'll yield."

Waddell: "Tom, what does this really do? The first Section says it deletes it. What does it really do?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, what it does is that in cases where the Illinois Commerce Commission finds the thing to be practical and necessary for safety of railroad employees, bridges and trestles over and upon which railroad trains are operated shall include as part a safe and suitable walkway and handrail on one side only of such bridge or trestle and such handrail shall be located at the outer edge of the walkway and shall provide a clearance of not less than eight feet, six inches from the center line of the nearest track measured at right angles'. And that's what we're putting into the law. We're taking out provisions that the railroads found objectionable. And that part is:



'Any person, farm or corporation doing business in the state shall keep and maintain those margins alongside their track where railroad employees are required to walk in the course of their duties reasonably free from debris and vegetation'. Even though I may believe in the concept, we had made an agreement that that part would not go into the Bill as proposed and the railroads and the railroad unions accept the first part."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any additional discussion? Representative Hanahan moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1412. Representative Hanahan, 1412."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I have Amendment #1 to 1412. This is EIA...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any floor Amendments? Any Amendments from the... Any Committee Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1412. This Bill has been read previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Hanahan. Amends House Bill 1412, page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, EIA is a new term that's used around here this Session more than ever before. We've heard of ERA and RTA, but this Session EIA became a very well-known symptomatic disease among the equine population of our state. This is a horse disease and years ago we had put into the Act a rule making provision for the Department of Agriculture to...enact rules and regulations that would control the disease. Since then, since the Bill was heard in Committee and during the hearings in Committee, many facts were brought out and brought to our attention of the Committee, and working together with some of the equine specialists of the state-and I could assure everyone in this General Assembly-and working with the Director of Agriculture, even just as late as an hour ago on this Bill, I'd like to amend...House Bill 1412 with Amendment #1 which defines syptomomatic reactors. Allows tatoofing



of the inner lip of a symptomatic reactor that shows positive on a...on the animal which sets up the provisions of a humane type of quarantine provision for a horse that does show a reaction to the 'Coggins' test. And allows the department to charge a dollar for the veterinarian who takes the test, the blood test. And one of the things that we learned in the Committee Hearings with the experts there, and everyone agrees to, is the fact that the disease is transmitted by transfer of blood. And one of the features that has, we feel, caused the transfer of the disease has been the usage of needles that are not properly sterilized..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Hanahan...bring your comments to a close."

Hanahan: "Yeah, I have to explain the Amendment. This is all part of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Oh, I'm sorry."

Hanahan: "And part of the problem on the usage of the needle is they use one that has not been sterilized or a needle that possibly could have been...could...could have been infected by the usage on other horses. So we suggest the method of using needles that are a throwaway type and could only be used once. Some of the other provisions of the Amendment allow the 'Coggins' test, and in fact encourage a voluntary usage of the 'Coggins' test, and we mandated in the areas where a...a horse or an ass is sold in the State of Illinois, that part of the sale shall include a 'Coggins' test result. We take away the rule making power already by the Bill and this is just other Amendments to the law. And I could suggest to the Members of the General Assembly that upon the adoption of this Amendment to the Bill, I still intend to continue working with the Department and with the Veterinarian Department of the University of Illinois, Department of Veterinarian Services, to even further amend the Bill so that we should come to grips with ourselves on the problems of EIA and the ...really the concern of horsemen on the test and slaughter approach to contain this type of disease...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Waddell."

Hanahan: "And I urge the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Waddell."



Waddell: "Tom, in your final negotiations did you have a salvage value?"

In the final negotiations do you have a salvage value for the horses to be destroyed?"

Hanahan: "A salvage value?"

Waddell: "Yeah."

Hanahan: "No, because that's one of the problems that we've...we've uncovered because of the insurance angles. I do not encourage the self...putting down of a horse or an ass because of a Coggins test nor do I encourage an owner to do this. I encourage a quarantine to some...maybe research can be done on the disease, you know, more readily with the University of Illinois. And the salvage of that should come from the insurance of the loss of an animal because the state mandates a quarantine instead of an owner electing to put down the animal."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Hoxsey."

Hoxsey: "Yes, Representative Hanahan, on your Bill. Now this Amendment, and do I understand you correctly, this Amendment states then that there will be a Coggins test made for the sale of animals..."

Hanahan: "Right."

Hoxsey: "Within...have you made any provisions for interstate travel? I know that's a...."

Hanahan: "Yes."

Hoxsey: "Federal regulation."

Hanahan: "Yes. The...the federal regulation stays in...put and on page 5 of the Amendment, 'Not only the Racing Commission may require the negative testing, but an official test report for EIA obtained within the previous twenty-four months shall accompany the sale of any equine within the State of Illinois,' right in the Bill as you requested."

Hoxsey: "All right...One more question, have you made provisions that youngsters showing at state supported or this sort of a function will be required to make the Coggins test?"

Hanahan: "No. Only under the race...racetrack or the Racing Commission. I feel that right now under the...both the State Fair Authority which comes under the parimutuel laws of the state that we passed a couple years ago and the various county fair organizations may adopt and



regulate or any stable or any private facility may adopt that regulation that all animals boarded within may require a Coggins test. There's nothing prohibiting those kind of entities to have a Coggins test in order to have the equine in their stables."

Hoxsey: "All right, thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Christensen."

Christensen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Representative Hanahan, you mentioned a charge of one dollar by the veterinarian. What veterinarian?"

Hanahan: "On page 5 of the Amendment, 'A one dollar fee shall be paid to the Department by veterinarians for each blood sample submitted to the ACID test...testing to the Illinois State Federal Laboratories. Such fees shall be used exclusively for the support of quarantine facilities and for EIA research conducted in conjunction with these facilities'."

Christensen: "Okay."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Rigney."

Rigney: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think this is probably an Amendment that makes a bad Bill worse. But I'm going to vote...or ask everybody to vote for the Amendment so that we de-advance it to Third Reading because Representative Hanahan has given me his word that when they finally do get an agreement worked out with the Department of Agriculture, which will be worked out in the coming...this coming week, that he will bring it back from Third Reading and amend it. Then I think it'll be in a satisfactory form to everyone concerned. And so on that basis I would say let's pass it on to Third Reading."

Hanahan: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion?"

Hanahan: "I will bring it back to Second if the Amendment is agreed upon before we have to move it on Third Reading otherwise in the Senate I...my word is to the Department, that I have, no...this isn't written in granite and we certainly...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Neff."

Neff: "Thank you, a question to the Sponsor. Tom, the way you have the



Bill now with this Amendment on it if it's adopted, no one would have to have their horse, the Coggins Test, unless they sold it or...."

Hanahan: "Training horse."

Neff: "Show or something in a fair, county fair something, and they could demand it be shown or any horse race and so forth."

Hanahan: "That's true."

Neff: "But otherwise just to use that horse they do not, would not be required to have the Coggins Test."

Hanahan: "You're right, Sir."

Neff: "Yeah."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Keats."

Keats: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. You know we're all aware politics makes for strange bedfellows. One minute Representative Hanahan and I are up arguing with each other and the next minute I'm up telling him what a fine Bill he's got here. And I would like to urge everyone to support not only his Amendment but at a later date supporting the Bill. Particularly on this Amendment, or anyone who is either a horse owner or formerly owned a horse you're aware of the terrible problems we've had with these Coggins Tests and for those..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "...Excuse me, do you have any questions on the Amendment?"

Keats: "No, I want to make..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Good. Representative Hanahan moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed 'no'. Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1413, Representative Hanahan."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1413. This Bill's been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Hanahan. Amends House Bill 1413 on page 1 and so forth."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is a Minimum Wage that the teacher, that we would be tied to whatever the federal law



would concern for the amount of minimum wages to be established by the Congress and we would automatically concur. One of the provisions of the state act though that I'd overlooked was that we do have a provision for less than the federal minimum wage for those workers that are under the age of 19, at a lower rate of a \$1.95 an hour. And I...by this Amendment reestablish the differential for those workers under the age of 19 for a lesser rate than whatever the federal rate is. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? All those in favor of Amendment #1 say 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1428, has the fiscal note been filed? 1424, Representative O'Brien, did you file a fiscal note? All right, fine. House Bill 1424."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1424. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I believe there's a fiscal note been requested and a pension impact note requested. Has that been filed?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, Sir, it has. Oh, I'm sorry. I asked if there was...filed, they told....Jack, why don't you respond to him?"

Clerk O'Brien: "There's a fiscal impact sheet here that says no fiscal impact but there's no fiscal note."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Does that satisfy you, Representative...."

Ryan: "No. Who filed...who...who is the note from?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The Illinois Public Employee Pension Law Commission Impact Statements aren't signed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Then you don't know who filed that?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No, it's a..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "What about the fiscal note? There is no fiscal..."

Clerk O'Brien: "It's not filed."

Ryan: "I think you should leave it on Second Reading, Mr. Speaker."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Terzich, the Chairman of the Committee."

Terzich: "Well, Mr. Speaker, this particular Bill there...really isn't any...all it does is expand the membership of the Board of Trustees by five members. There's no impact on there...some trustees do get paid and some do not. The maximum impact could be a thousand dollars if....if that. And this was requested by the foreign impact statements to the Pension Laws Commission and also the Pension System was called. So if there is any impact it would have to be less than one thousand dollars and that has been filed by our staff man as to the impact of this Bill. Now what more Giorgi could want I...I...I really couldn't say."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, if that's the case the reason that the fiscal note is requested is so we can have that information for the agency that's affected. I can ask Representative Terzich that question, you know, any time and get the response."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ryan, let me just point out to you that the Pension Note has been filed, it's quite similar to the fiscal impact. It's based upon the information by Representative Terzich...."

Ryan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm going to withdraw my objection at this time on this Bill but I certainly wish that somebody up there would have a little more regard for the rules about...and watch...about moving these Bills when a fiscal note is requested on them."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Your point is well taken. Third Reading. House Bill 1425, Representative O'Daniel."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1425. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor? Any Committee Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendments. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Sharp, Bartulis. Amends House Bill 1425 on page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Sharp. Representative Bartulis. Not here. What's the...what would the Sponsor like to do? Representative O'Daniel."



O'Daniel: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I don't have any objection to this Amendment and I've agreed to the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Daniel moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. Any discussion? Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Whose Amendment is it?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Sharp and Bartulis."

Ryan: "What does it do?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Neither one of those Gentlemen are on the floor at the present time. Would you care to explain the Amendment, Representative O'Daniel?"

O'Daniel: "Mr. Speaker, I may tell you what I know about it. It requires the EPA to...to make known to the public of any hazardous materials they...they...be in landfills...like in counties."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Daniel moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. Amendment....Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Geo-Karis. Amends House Bill 1425 by inserting after 'new', Subparagraph O' and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Geo-Karis, Amendment #2."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #2 simply authorizes the Department of Microbiology to continue its testing for virus and chemical pollutions in the Fox River in relationship to the diseases such as cancer, viral disease. I've taken this up with the Sponsor of the Bill and he has no objection. I move the passage of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on the Amendment? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I am one Amendment late, I would like...I wonder if the landfill contents at Wilsonville will be made public under the first Amendment. I wonder if I might have leave to have the Sponsor answer that question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, why don't we hold that question until we get through with Amendment #2."

Skinner: "Okay."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ryan on Amendment #2?"



Ryan: "Yes, I was going to ask the Sponsor if she'd speak up just a little bit louder because the 200 kids in the balcony are from her district and they can't hear."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Geo-Karis, would you kindly explain the Amendment once again?"

Geo-Karis: "It simply says the Department of Microbiology will...shall continue to test for virus and chemical pollution of the Fox River in relationship to human diseases such as cancer and viral diseases. I move the passage of this Amendment and I've got the concurrence of the Sponsor of the Bill toward it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Geo-Karis moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #2 is adopted. Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, by leave of my Minority Leader, George Ryan of Kankakee, it is my privilege to introduce a class of about 158 students and instructors from Jack Benny Junior High School of Waukegan, Illinois. It's from the 31st District, served by Representatives Matijevich, Griesheimer and Geo-Karis, in that balcony up there. We're glad to have them here today to watch."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Welcome to Springfield. Now Representative Skinner had a question on House Bill 1425, Amendment #1."

Skinner: "Right. I wonder if this Amendment would require the EPA to reveal the contents of the Wilsonville Earthline landfill or whatever they call it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I believe the Attorney General has filed a suit yesterday on that question."

Skinner: "Well, but he's in a different branch and I wonder if this is... our branch is a...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Would you care to respond to that, Representative O'Daniel?"

O'Daniel: "Cal, it must not be in my Amendment, I...I don't think I could respond to that, I'm not...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Why don't we...we'll move the Bill to Third Reading."

Skinner: "I think my staff is telling me that is the intent of the Amendment..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. O'Daniel. Amends House Bill 1425 on page 4 by deleting lines 33 to 35. and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Daniel."

O'Daniel: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3 re-words the House Bill 1425 to require the EPA to continue the same service for the municipalities as they were before June 30, 1977. I agreed to this Amendment in Committee and I have no objection to it and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative O'Daniel moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #3 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4. Bartulis, Sharp. Amends House Bill 1425 on page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bartulis. Representative Sharp. What's the will of the Sponsor? Representative O'Daniel."

O'Daniel: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, we're in a problem now. It seems to me like they may have had Amendment 1 and were going to table it and put on Amendment 4, but I'm not so sure since they aren't here. About Amendment #4."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Why don't we just take it out of the record then at this time? Amendment #5...is there any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #5. Reed. Amends House Bill 1425 on page 5 by inserting immediately after line 2 the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Reed."

Reed: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment #5 to House Bill 1425."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Reed moves to table, is leave given? Leave. Amendment #5 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Daniel."

O'Daniel: "Mr. Speaker, could we move this to Third and I'd bring it back to Second for the....to clear up Amendments #1 and 4?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes."

O'Daniel: "At a later time."

Speaker Lechowicz: "We'll move it to Third with the intention that he'll



discuss this Amendment with Representatives Bartulis and Sharp. and, if necessary, he'll bring it back to Second Reading.

Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask unanimous leave to have my vote on Amendment #3 to House Bill 730 changed from 'aye' to 'nay'. It will not change the result."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is leave granted? So recorded. House Bill 1431, Representative O'Brien."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1431. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1431 on page 1, line 29 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "House Bill 1431 increases the corporate tax rate for Metropolitan Sanitary District from thirty-seven cents to forty-two cents for an eighteen, seventy-eight or a fourteen percent increase. A forty-eight cent... or a total percent increase in 1979 and a fifty cent for 1980 and thereafter. This represents twenty-six percent increase and would add an additional thirty million dollars for property tax levy for the Metropolitan Sanitary District. The result of this in the ...in last year's Amendment has the effect of doubling the corporate tax levy from forty-two million dollars in 1975 to eighty-four million in 1980. This is all without referendum. Current compensation and conservation plan of the MSD as surveyed by the Civic Federation shows that the average is from eighteen to forty-nine percent above the prevailing wage, wages for their employees. Their pay increases have gone up forty-six percent since 1971. And the cost-of-living has gone up thirty-four percent. My Amendment increases the tax levy to thirty-nine in 1978, forty in '79 and forty-one cents in 1980 and thereafter. And that represents a five point four increase, a two point six increase and a two point five increase. I think this is all that can be reasonably justified for the Metropolitan Sanitary District. I urge the favorable adoption of this Amendment."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "Yeah, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'd oppose Amendment #1 or 2? Is this Amendment 1? My understanding was that Amendment #1 was going to be tabled and that Amendment #2 was going to be put on. Can you clarify that for me, please? There is an Amendment #2 which is next."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Brien moves to table Amendment #1. Any discussion?"

O'Brien: "Mr. Chairman and Members of the House...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Wait. Amendment #1 is tabled. Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1431 on page 1 line 29 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Abramson, Amendment #2."

Abramson: "Amendment #2 does the same thing that Amendment #1 does but in addition to that, it would grant the MSD they are looking for in their original Bill if it's put to a referendum. This is...this will require, this will give them their five point four increase in 1979, two point six in 1979 and two point five in 1980. And they would get their additional request that they're asking for...the fourteen percent in 1978, the twelve percent in '79 and the two percent in 1980 upon referendum. I urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative O'Brien."

O'Brien: "I move that Amendment be tabled."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any...any discussion? Representative O'Brien moves that the Amendment be tabled. Request for a Roll Call. Those in favor will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 46 'ayes', 39 'nays', 1 recorded as 'present'. Amendment's tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1432."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Taylor."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1432. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Taylor. Amends House Bill 1432 on page 1, line 5 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Taylor. Taylor's Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Taylor. Representative Taylor's Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Taylor moves the adoption of Amendment #1. Any discussion? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1436, Representative Matijevich."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1436. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1436 on page 1, line 10 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "I'm in agreement with the Sponsor of the Bill that this will go to Third Reading and he agrees to bring it back for my Amendment. I think the two staffs are discussing the effect of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, yes, I have agreed to move the Bill to Third and the two staffs are trying to figure out what Mike's trying to do. and then we'll bring it back to Second whenever they finally come to some agreement. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "So you withdraw Amendment #1. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Oh, I'm sorry, Representative Abramson, yes, Sir."

Abramson: "Do you have to withdraw the Amendment to take it to Second Reading?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "At this time. Yeah. Third Reading. House Bill 1437, Representative Dan Houlihan."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1437. A Bill...this Bill has been read a second time previously. No...no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Daniels. Amends House Bill 1437"



on page 1 by deleting all of lines 18 and 19 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Daniels. Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Representative Daniels is the Sponsor of this Amendment. He apparently is not on the floor. He indicated to me that he might not be able to be here when this was called however this is an agreed Amendment. The effect of the Amendment is applicable to DuPage County, as well as Cook County, the provisions of the Bill for court reporters services. The Amendment was suggested by the Office...Administrative Office of the Illinois Court through Judge Gulley. I have no objection to the Amendment and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Dan Houlihan moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1438."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1438. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Daniels. Amends House Bill 1438 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, this is the same situation in respect to 1438. Amendment #1 is Sponsored by Representative Daniels. This is a companion Bill to House Bill 1437. Again, the Amendment was suggested by the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts through Judge Gulley. It is an agreed Amendment and I move its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Houlihan moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1442, Representative Brady. 1442, Representative Brady."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1442. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Brady: "Mr. Speaker, I believe that there was an Amendment filed with the Clerk by Representative Lauer."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Lauer. Amends House Bill 1442 on page 2, line 28 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Lauer. Representative Lauer."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Brady."

Brady: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, when we voted this Bill out of Committee, I told Representative Lauer that I would be agreeable to the Amendment that he is presenting from the floor today even though he isn't here. What this Amendment does is add public notice before referendum and I'm agreeable to it and urge its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Brady moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye'...I'm sorry, Amendment #2...on the opposed... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1456."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1456. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment: #2. Mahar. Amends House Bill 1456 on page 2, line 25 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #2 amends the Chicago Park District Code and provides for a referendum. The Bill calls for a tax increase to provide additional funds, provide workmen's comp fund and this just simply asks for a referendum. I urge its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Farley."

Farley: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise



in opposition to Amendment #1. We've never had to do this and... in the City of Chicago in these types of matters. And I think the Amendment is untimely at this point in time. So I would oppose the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor signify by saying 'aye' of the adoption of Amendment #2. All those opposed.... Amendment #2 is defeated. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1456 as amended in Section 19 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "As the Sponsor of Amendment #2, at this time I move to table that Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave? Amendment #2 is tabled. Any further Amendments? Three. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1457."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1457. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Mahar. Amends House Bill 1457 on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1457 amends the Chicago Park District Code to increase the tax for aquariums and museums. This simply again asks for a referendum. I urge its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise in opposition to this Amendment. In reality it would be self-defeating. The purpose of these Bills is to raise approximately five to ten million dollars for the operation of the museums in the City of Chicago. The cost of the referendum in this area is approximately three million dollars so that the adoption of this Amendment would simply work in opposition to the purpose of the Bill. I request a negative vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1



signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed 'no'. Amendment #1 is defeated. Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1457 on page 2 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Wait a minute, will you? Please proceed. Amendment #2, Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "Mr. Speaker, as Sponsor of Amendment #2, at this time I ask for leave to table that Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "...Leave is granted. Amendment #2 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1458."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1458. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "...Amendment..."

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Mahar. Amends House Bill 1458 on page 1, line 18 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman, I ask leave to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave granted? Amendment #1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1458 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "Mr. Speaker, as Sponsor of Amendment #2, at this time I ask for leave to table that Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave granted? Amendment #2 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1460."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1460. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Mary Lou Kent. Amends House Bill 1460 on page 1 by deleting lines 1 through 4 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Kent."

Kent: "Yes, this Amendment will place other employees...the Bill itself is for the Bureau of the Budget to have that under the Personnel Code and Senate confirmation. This...this...this Bill just adds other agencies like the Attorney General and the State's Attorney, Deputy Comptroller and all. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I believe the Amendment calls for the Assistant Attorney General, the Assistant Deputy Comptroller, the Assistant Secretary of State's Office be confirmed by the Senate. Is that correct?"

Kent: "Correct."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I move for the...I concur with the adoption of the Amendment--this is my Bill--and these people all have to be confirmed by the Senate. Mrs. Kent moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Madison, for what purpose do you arise?"

Madison: "Mr. Speaker, have we lost all of our patronage?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Not to my knowledge, we'll try to find you some."

Madison: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Katz, for what purpose do you arise?"

Katz: "I rise, Mr. Speaker, to request a recess until 4...till 5 p.m. today for the purpose of a Democratic Conference in Room 114."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Katz moves that we...yeah, but unfortunately Representative Hart is excused because of illness today...moves that we have a conference in Room 212 with the House reconvening at 5 o'clock. Representative Ryan. Representative Ryan. Representative Mahar, I'm sorry."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I ask for a Republican Conference in Room 118 immediately."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Now that means the Republicans will meet in 118,



the Democrats in 114. And we will reconvene back on the House floor at 5 o'clock. We stand in recess till 5 o'clock."

RECESS

Speaker Lechowicz: "The House will come to order. Second Reading is House Bill 1471. Representative Ewell. Ray Ewell, turn him on."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1471. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ewell."

Clerk O'Brien: "Ewell. Amends House Bill 1471 and so forth."

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, this simply amends the amount that we give for credit hour to the junior...public junior colleges. It went from a minimum of 17.61 to a minimum of \$24.00. This was in error...well, it wasn't in error, it was sent out of Committee knowing that it would be changed to reflect the immediate needs and then a subsequent scale. Very simply, Amendment #1 sets it out that it would be 19.50 for fiscal year June 1978, 21.50 for the fiscal year ending June '79 and \$24.00 after June 1979."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is there any discussion? Representative Gaines, do you have any questions? You went to second the Amendment. Very good. All those in favor of Amendment #1 signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1473, Representative McLendon."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1473. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Johnson. Amends House Bill 1473 on line 14 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Johnson. Representative McLendon. Let me just take that one out of the record temporarily. Agreed Resolutions."



Clerk O'Brien: "Agreed Resolutions. "

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi on the Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 223, Lynn Martin. 224, Lynn Martin. 225, Geo-Karis. 226, Madigan. 227, Beatty. 228, O'Daniel. 229, Kelly. 230, Simms. 231, Chapman."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, these are the Agreed Resolutions. 223 by Lynn Martin honors the Girl Scouts of Rock River Valley on a mini-park. House Resolution 224 by Martin honors Pierce Barker. 225 by Geo-Karis talks about the Waukegan Exchange Club. 226 by Madigan talks about St. Turibius Parish. 227 by Beatty honors Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers. 228 by Cunningham talks about Frank Staggs on his 60th wedding anniversary. 229 by Kelly talks about John K. Diehl the Athletic Director who is Athletic Director of the Year. 230 by Simms talks about the Local Government Affairs Committee. And 231, Chapman, honors the Arlington High School Cardinals. And I move for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi moves the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Messages from the Senate."

Clerk O'Brien: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has concurred with the House in the adoption of the following preamble and Joint Resolution, to-wit: House Joint Resolution #34. Concurred in by the Senate, May 6, 1977. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

A message from the Senate by Mr. Wright, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives the Senate has concurred with the House in the adoption of their Amendment #2 to a Bill of the following title, to-wit: Senate Bill #485. Concurred in by the Senate, May 6, 1977. Kenneth Wright, Secretary."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Introduction and First Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2390. Catania. A Bill for an Act making an



appropriation to the Commission on the Status of Women. First Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2391. Stuffle. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense to the Illinois State Scholarship Commission. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Committee on Assignments. House Bills Second Reading. House Bill 1473, Representative McLendon."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1473. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Johnson. Amends House Bill 1473 on line 14 by inserting the following after 'election'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Johnson. Is the Gentleman on the floor? Any...any further Amendments there, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Why don't we just hold that Amendment and move the Bill to Third Reading and then he can discuss it with Representative McLendon? 1474?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1474. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Johnson."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Johnson. He's not here. Same disposition. We'll hold the Amendment and advance the Bill to Third Reading. House Bill 1500, Representative Getty?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1500."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Was that previous one, 1474?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, Sir."

Waddell: "And 1473, those were Agreed Amendments with McLendon and Johnson."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, okay, we'll...as soon as we get back with 1500 we'll move back on those and move the adoption of the Amendments. House Bill 1500."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1500. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. No floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any... Third Reading. House Bill 1473, Representative McLendon. Representative Waddell, do you want to explain the Amendment? Representative Waddell moves the adoption of the Agreed Amendments. Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. 1473, Third Reading. House Bill 1474."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1, Johnson."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Waddell moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1501, Representative Beatty. It's on Third Reading. 1501."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1501. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "We have the Committee Amendment that's in the Bill, is not shown on the Calendar. Now we have a floor Amendment that is marked Amendment #1. Kempiners."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners on the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Should be changed on its face to be Amendment 2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave to change the Amendment on its face to Amendment 2? Leave is granted. Representative Kempiners on Amendment #2. Change your board, Jack."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #2 to House Bill 1501 provides for a...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me. Representative Houlihan, for what purpose do you arise?"

Houlihan, J: "Representative Beatty isn't here at the moment. Is this an Agreed Amendment with...."

Kempiners: "No, I don't believe it is."

Houlihan, J: "I wonder if we could hold this for a moment until we could



find Representative Beatty and then go back to the...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All right. Take it out of the record. House Bill 1519, Representative Taylor. 1519. Let's go."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1519. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions? Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Taylor. Amends House Bill 1519 on page 2, line 8."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Taylor, Amendment #2. Taylor."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker, I move for the adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1519."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Mrs. Stiehl."

Stiehl: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor please explain the Amendment?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates that he'll yield."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker, will you please take that out of the record for a moment? I don't have the Amendment in front of me."

Speaker Lechowicz: "We'll take it out of the record temporarily. House Bill 1537, Mrs. Younge."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1537. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Getty. Amends House Bill 1537 on page 1, line 25 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I ask leave to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Could you repeat that?"

Getty: "I asked leave..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative...has leave to table Committee Amendment #...his Amendment #1. Hearing no objections leave is granted, Amendment's tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment... Amendment #2. Getty. Amends House Bill 1537 on page 1, line 25 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Getty, Amendment #2."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #2 adds to the language where the Energy Resources Commission will investigate use and development of energy



in urban areas. The additional words of 'suburban and rural areas', so that their efforts are not limited only to urban areas. I've discussed this Amendment with the Sponsor of the Bill and she has no objection and I would move for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Getty moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all opposed.... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1547, Representative Bowman."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1547. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1562. Has the fiscal note been filed? Representative Pouncey."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1562. There's a pension impact note filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Okay."

Clerk O'Brien: "But not a fiscal note."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Pouncey."

Pouncey: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, according to the Superintendent of the Department, no fiscal note is requested only the pension impact statement."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any...any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1562. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1501, going back to Beatty's Bill. 1501."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1501. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Committee Amendment #1 was adopted. Floor Amendment #2. Kempiners. Amendments House Bill 1501 on page 1, line 11 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "I think, Mr. Speaker, if you'd recognize Representative Houlihan, we talked about this."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan. Houlihan, Dan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, as I discussed with Representative Kempiners who is the Sponsor of Amendment #2, Representative Beatty is not here. However, on behalf of Representative Beatty, if we can move the Bill to Third, then he will move the Bill back to Second for consideration of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is that agreeable with you, Representative Kempiners? He indicates that it is."

Kempiners: "As long, as long as we have the agreement it will be moved back for consideration of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Okay."

Kempiners: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1519, Jimmy, are you ready? Representative Taylor, 1519."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1519. This Bill has been.. we were on Amendment #2. Taylor. Amends House Bill 1519 on page 2, line 8 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Stiehl asked what the Amendment did. Representative Taylor on Amendment #2. Taylor."

Taylor: "Mr. Speaker, will you have the Clerk to read the Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amends House Bill 1519 on page 2, line by inserting immediately after the period the following, this area underlined. 'Taxes levied pursuant to the provisions of this Act shall appear separately on tax bills since the taxpayers and shall be designated as the tax to pay the cost of unemployment insurance'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion on Amendment #2? Representative Taylor moves the adoption of Amendment #2. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any additional Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Terzich on House Bill 1563 for Representative Kornowicz. Yes, 1563."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1563. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. A pension impact statement has been filed. "

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"



Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1575."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1575. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1575 on page 2, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "Mr. Speaker, as Sponsor of Amendment #1, I move to table that Amendment at this time. We have Amendment...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment #1. Leave granted? Hearing no objection the Amendment is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amend...Amendment #2. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1575 on page 2, line 9 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "As the Sponsor of Amendment #2, at this time I request leave to table Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment #2. All those in...is leave granted? Hearing no objection Amendment #2 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1575 on page 2, line 9 and so forth."

Abramson: "Amendment #3 keeps appointment of...of vacancies of the members of the Sanitary District with the Governor but he fails to act within 90 days the majority of the main members of the board can appoint to fill a vacancy. This...this Amendment has been worked out in agreement with the Governor's Office and the Sponsor of the Bill. I urge the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan on the Amendment. No question. Representative Steczo. Steczo."

Steczko: "Mr. Speaker, I concur with the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion on Amendment #3? All those in favor of Amendment #3 signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed? Nay? The 'ayes' have it, Amendment #3 is adopted. Any



further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1576."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1576. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Committee..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Floor Amendment #3. Keats. Amends House Bill 1576 as amended by deleting Section 2 and 2.1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is Marovitz or Kelly here? Take it out of the record. Representative....Let me also point out to the Membership that the question was raised with the Speaker of the House, as an agenda for the remaining portion of the day. As an indication to us in our conference was that he was hopeful that we would be able to get through with the items on Second Reading by the hour of 7:30 or 8 and in turn we should be going home by 8 o'clock this evening. with the intention of returning back to the...back to Springfield on Monday at noon. So that's....to the best of my knowledge, Mr. Ryan, Representative Ryan, what the intentions of the Chair are. And if I'm up here I'll guarantee we'll try to get out of here as quickly as possible. Yes, Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well, thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I would like to introduce the King of the Pickle Capitol, the former Member of the Illinois House is here with us today, the Honorable Senator John Grotberg is with us today."

Speaker Lechowicz: "There's been a slight change in the Adjournment Resolution, Gentlemen, Ladies and Gentlemen. We'll be going in at 12 o'clock in Perfunct and in...Regular Session at 4 o'clock Monday. Now we shouldn't have any fights for the rest of the day. Representative....1585. Are you going to handle that one? All right, 1579."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser will handle it for Representative Marovitz."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1579. This Bill has been read a second...."



previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Schlickman. Amends House Bill 1579 on page 1, lines 11 and 19 by deleting 'age'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I don't believe the Gentleman's on the floor. Representative Telcser on the Amendment?"

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Representative Marovitz has asked me to handle his Bill. He tells me the Amendment which Representative Schlickman is offering is an Agreed Amendment between he and Representative Schlickman. It simply takes out the age as a ...exemption for discrimination in issuing credit cards. I move the adoption of Amendment #...what is that...1?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "1. Any discussion? On this Agreed Amendment, Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Yes, I have a question of the Sponsor."

Speaker Lechowicz: "He...he indicates that he'll yield."

Houlihan, D: "What's the rationale for deleting age...when you cannot discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin?"

Telcser: "...Cause it could be a...a seven, eight, nine, ten-year-old person. It's a question of a minor. No, a young child who obviously may not be responsible to issue a credit card to."

Houlihan, D: "Oh, all right."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, there's been some question...there's an Appropriations Meeting, Monday at 1 o'clock."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yeah, well, they'll be in."

Ryan: "They'll still be in, that's correct, I want them to know."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And the House will be in Perfunct at 12; they'll come back in a Regular...Regular Session at 4. So the Appropriations Committee can meet at 12 or 1 o'clock till 4 o'clock. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, in that regard, there are quite a few Commission



Bills that are in Subcommittees of both Appropriations I and II.

So I would suggest those Sponsors of Bills be in either one of those Subs Monday, somewhere between 1 and 4. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Thank you. Representative Barnes."

Barnes: Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I want to...since a couple of the Members of the Appropriations Committee has raised that question, I would like to alert them that our Committee Meetings will still be at noon Monday. So if you are on Appropriations, we're not talking about you coming at 4, Appropriations, noon, Monday. And for the Appropriations II, the Democratic Members on Appropriations II, we are meeting at 11 a.m. Monday. 11 a.m. I just want to make that announcement before anyone gets away."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative...Representative Kozubowski."

Kozubowski: "Thank you very much. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Appropriations I Subcommittee dealing with Commission Bills will meet promptly at 1 o'clock on Monday afternoon in Room 114. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Thank you. Any further announcements? Mrs. Macdonald."

Macdonald: "Thank...thank you, Mr. Speaker...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Jack, listen to this."

Macdonald: "I'd like to ask for the privilege of suspending the appropriate rule to be recorded 'no' on Amendment #3 on House Bill 730."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Are there any objections? Hearing no objections, the Lady will be so recorded. Now back to House Bills on Second Reading, House Bill 1585, Representative Darrow."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1585. This Bill has been read a second time... This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Darrow. Amends House Bill 1585...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Darrow."

Darrow: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #1 requires the Attorney General to give written opinions on constitutional or legal questions to individual Members of the General



Assembly. And also to advocate the interest of the state according to the direction of the agency among other changes. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Porter. Porter."

Porter: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates that he'll yield."

Porter: "This Bill...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me....could we have a little order in the chamber please? Could we have some order in the chamber please? Thank you. Please proceed."

Porter: "This is a floor Amendment to your Bill, isn't it, Clarence?"

Darrow: "That's correct."

Porter: "This wasn't offered in the Committee?"

Darrow: "No, it was not."

Porter: "Okay. Well, I'd like to address the Bill. I hope the Members are awake enough to see that what we have here is basically, as I can... as I analyze it, a shell Bill. The Amendment is really what's intended here. And it's a complete change in the law relating to the Attorney General of this state. Plainly, it seems to me, that the Amendment is an attack on a Constitutional officer of this state. What the Amendment says, is that the Attorney General will work under the direction, the specific direction that is, of the agency or office or employee of the state that he represents. And if, for any reason, that agency or that officer or that employee doesn't like what the Attorney General does in reference to the matter, then that individual or agency can, in effect, fire the Attorney General, can hire outside counsel. And pay for that outside counsel out of the AG's appropriation. So what we have here is a Constitutional officer of this state, elected by the people, being fired by an employee or agency of this state and his appropriation turned to benefit private counsel. Now it seems to me that this is a direct attack, as I say, on a Constitutional officer. It seems to me that we've sent up a shell Bill here to be filled with that attack and I would certainly urge the Members to reject this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, Representative Porter hit



the nail on the head. Here's a classic example of a shell vehicle Bill being introduced and moving out of Committee...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Point of order by Representative Darrow."

Telcser: "What's his point, Sir?"

Darrow: "My point is, this is not a shell Bill. It...it was a piece of legislation I introduced and I'm going to go with it whether this Amendment is adopted or not."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House,...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "I think the Members of the House ought to look very closely at the Amendment. In the first instance the Amendment says, I believe, that the Attorney General will issue opinions for all Members of the Legislature. That's fine and that's been a subject of controversy for some time but I don't know but the Gentleman has introduced an appropriation Bill for the Attorney General to hire enough staff to provide that service to the Legislature. I think trying to make the Attorney General a service unit for the Legislature is not what that office was intended to be. The second principle purpose for the Gentleman's Amendment is to say that the Attorney General has to work at the direction of the agency whom he is representing. Now for those of you who are attorneys in this House, I wonder if you would practice law at the direction of your client? It seems to me when I go to my attorney with a problem, I put my faith and confidence in that attorney's ability to represent my interest. I don't try and tell that man how to practice law or what to do and that is what Representative Darrow is trying to do with his Amendment. He is attempting to put restrictions and burdens on the Attorney General which are absolutely impossible to live with...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Bring your remarks to close, please."

Telcser: "No one can live with those restrictions. Let me also add that the Gentleman is adding an additional burden on the state. Who is going to pay the bills for the attorneys who are hired when the agency wants to go and hire their own attorneys? I think that the Gentleman knows full well that that Amendment would render his Bill unconstitutional. It's a waste of this House's time to debate this Amendment let alone adopt it. I think any responsible Member of this Legislation



should...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Darrow..."

Telcser: "Vote 'no' and proceed with the rest of the business in this House."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Darrow to close."

Darrow: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, first of all, House Bill 1585 is not a shell Bill, it's some substantive legislation. The reason I am introducing this Amendment is that I did not have it drafted in time to be a separate piece of legislation. Now, as far as the expense involved in this, the agencies or departments may have their own attorney hired but at the same time the Attorney General then will not have to have some of his staff hired. So, the fiscal impact will be nil if this is adopted and passed. I feel that on a number of occasions Members of the Attorney General for legal questions and constitutional questions. That comes up frequently here. We've asked him for those opinions and he's denied us. He will not furnish us with the...any legal information at all yet we are continually told that we are passing laws that are questionable...constitutional value. For these reasons I have asked that this Amendment be adopted and I move that it be adopted. I ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Darrow moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Roll Call is requested. All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'nay'. Representative Geo-Karis to explain her vote and the timer's on."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think the...this Assembly should know that last summer there was a case that was settled by the Supreme Court of Illinois, 'Rice versus Someone' which decided that the agencies cannot choose any attorney they want. They have to go through the Attorney General. So I do think that this Amendment would be unconstitutional and I...and I explained my vote against it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. Representative Davis, for what reason do you seek recognition?"



Davis, J: "I was...I was seeking recognition to explain my vote but you've taken Roll Call."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Still want to explain it?"

Davis, J: "At this point I don't think so."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schisler, for what purpose do you seek recognition? We'll dump that Roll Call and start all over.

On the question whether Amendment #1 should be adopted, all those in favor will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'nay'. Ladies and Gentlemen, let me point out to you this is a very heated Amendment and in turn, I'm sure, will be verified. I would hope that you would just vote...have everybody vote their own switch. And I want to say this there's a little bit of time of this House, we will dump this Roll Call and start all over again, but please, vote your own switch. And I want to be voted as 'aye'. Twice. Representative Davis."

Davis, J: "Mr. Speaker, now I would like to explain my vote. As a Member of the Executive Committee and I...I apologize for not having the total recall that I should have, but a Bill almost identical to this Amendment was presented to us in that Committee and was soundly defeated with bipartisan support...support from both sides of the aisle. And I think that should be pointed out to the Membership and that's why I'm voting 'no'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "At the appropriate time I'd like a verification and poll of the absentees."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. Mr. Davis. Representative Davis."

Davis, J: "Like to see a polling of the absentees, please. And at the appropriate time a verification of the Affirmative Roll Call."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mrs. Geo-Karis has already asked for a verification."

Davis, J: "Sorry I missed that."

Speaker Lechowicz: "That's all right. Representative Kane, for what purpose do you rise? Representative Kane. Oh, I'm sorry, that Kelly's desk."

Kane: "Is a motion to adjourn in order, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, it is not. Representative Darrow."



Darrow: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in order to get out of here sooner I'll withdraw the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Bill will remain on Second Reading. Pardon me? Third Reading. Withdrew the Amendment and we advanced it to Third Reading. House Bill 1586. House Bill 1586."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1586. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the Committee?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Lechowicz."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Move to table Amendment #1. Is leave granted? Hearing no objection Amendment #1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1598. Representative Skinner."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1598. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Levin. Amends House Bill 1598 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Who's....Representative Levin. Representative Skinner, do you want to make a motion on the Amendment? Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Oh, yes, I would move to table the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any objection? Representative Skinner moves to table the Amendment. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #....tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Levin."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Same motion?"

Skinner: "....Yes."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any objection? Amendment #2 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1607. Representative Tim Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to have unanimous consent to be recorded as voting 'aye' on Amendment #3 to House Bill 810. It will not



change the Roll Call."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any objections? Leave is granted."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1607. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. Amendment...Floor Amendment #2. Amends House Bill 1607 on page 1, lines 1 and 5 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to withdraw that Amendment, please."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #1...2 is withdrawn. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1621. Representative Mulcahey."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1621. This Bill has been read...this Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Luft. Amends House Bill 1621 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Luft."

Luft: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to withdraw that Amendment, please."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is there leave? Hearing no objection, Amendment #1 is withdrawn. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1622."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1622. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. 1622."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "...Do you know if there's an Amendment 2?"

Jacobs: "No...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "No. There was a Committee Amendment on both..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, those have been adopted."

Jacobs: "1622, 1623, they were a package deal and the Amendment was that you had to have an honorable discharge in order to be qualified."



Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments. No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1624."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1624. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Ryan. Amends House Bill 1624 on page 1, line 20 by inserting before the period the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Ryan. Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this Amendment changes the effective date, it's..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Let's read the Amendment."

Clerk O'Brien: "After inserting the following 'nor to Executive Orders which created a legal contractual relationship with any entity while that relationship continues to exist'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser moves the adoption of Amendment #1. Any discussion or... Representative Pouncey. Representative Dan Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Well, before he moves the adoption of the Amendment will he explain what the Amendment does? He incorrectly referred to it as an effective date Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "That's why I had the Clerk read the Amendment."

Houlihan, D: "...Any...anything to do with an effective date."

Speaker Lechowicz: "It is not an effective date Amendment, Representative Telcser. The Clerk read the Amendment and it does not concur with the... your statement was on the floor. I believe you have the incorrect Amendment."

Telcser: "Could the...could the Sponsor hold it for a second?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yeah, we'll hold it and we'll get back to you."

House Bill 16...take it out of the record. House Bill 1625.

Representative Sharp."

O'Brien: "House Bill 1625. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment...Committee Amendment 1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. Floor Amendment #2, Skinner, is...is



improperly numbered, should get leave to change it to 3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative...Representative Skinner asks leave to change it on its face from 2 to 3. Hearing no objections leave is granted, it's now Amendment #3. Please proceed with Amendment #3."

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Skinner."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Skinner, on 1625."

Skinner: "Yes, this is a sneaky little Amendment that says that if a school board wants to hold...wants to raise taxes without a referendum that the backdoor referendum which they are forced to allow the people to have under this...under a prior Amendment. That the petitions for such backdoor referendums must be available at the school board office so the individual won't have to go out and pay legalistic...legal fees to get a petition drawn up. It seems the least we can do to give the citizens an even chance."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Dan Houlihan. Any discussion?"

Skinner: "I'm sure the Sponsor will accept it..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All right, Sir. Representative Sharp."

Sharp: "Yeah, I think it's a good idea, I'll accept it."

Skinner: "He is a gracious Sponsor."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion? Representative Skinner moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #3 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #...misnumbered 3 should be changed to 4."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Luft. Representative Luft asks leave to change on its face Amendment...."

Clerk O'Brien: "3 to 4."

Speaker Lechowicz: "3 to 4. Leave granted? Hearing no objections, Amendment #4. Representative Luft on Amendment #4."

Luft: "I...I will ask leave to have this Amendment withdrawn please."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any hearing...not hearing any objections Amendment's withdrawn. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1630, Representative Hanahan. Representative Giorgi will handle the Bill for him."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1630. This Bill has been read a second time



previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor? Thank you."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Hanahan. Amends House Bill 1630 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi on the Amendment."

Giorgi: "Move the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Giorgi moves the adoption of the Amendment. Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1686."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1686. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Stearney. Amends House Bill 1686 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Stearney. Take it out of the record. House Bill 1693, Representative Schneider."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1693. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Schneider. Amends House Bill 1693 on page 1, line 23 and so forth."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, the Amendment to 1693 comes at the request of the Minority Spokesman on the Committee, Tom McMaster, think he was fearful that county election officials would not be able to conduct their purchasing functions. I've amended the Bill to allow that to take place and I think he would find that satisfactory. So I would move its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Schneider moves the adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1703, Representative Totten."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1703. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note filed. No Committee Amendments, no floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Third Reading. Ladies and Gentlemen, the Clerk has informed me that due to a printer's error, House Bill 1642 which should be on House Bills Second Reading was omitted on the Calendar. All right? Now, leave to hear House Bill 1642 which is by Representative Yourell. There's no Amendments filed, just a Committee Amendment. Oh, I'm sorry, Ryan's got an Amendment too. 1642."

Clerk O'Brien: "House...House Bill 1642. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Amendment #2. Ryan. Amends House Bill 1642 by adding at the end of the Bill, the following: 'Section 3. This Act takes effect January 1, 1979'."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is the error we had on 1624. Whoever typed up our Amendment transposed 24 and 42. That's why we had the confusion....Representative Houlihan's Bill. Representative Ryan asks me to file this Amendment for 1624, we thought we did and we didn't pick up the clerical error in the title which was transposed to 1642. So I guess the proper procedure would be to table..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #1."

Telcser: "Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Yes, that's right, 1642 is on Third Reading. on the Calendar. It was moved...moved yesterday."

Speaker Lechowicz: "According to the Clerk it was not. He says he had the Amendments and they took it out of the record yesterday. So we better do it this way..."

Yourell: "All right. Okay."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Let's table Amendment #2, there being...are there



any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill...House Bill 1714,
Representative Lauer."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1714. This Bill has been read a second time
previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1715, Representative
Tipsword."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1715. This 'Act' has been read a second time
previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions...."

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Tipsword. Amends House Bill 1715 on page 1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, this Amendment merely
changes the reference in the Bill from the Department of Revenue
to the State Fire Marshal. I would move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Tipsword moves the
adoption of Amendment #1. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye',
'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further
Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1718. Representative
Schneider."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1718. This Bill has been read a second time
previously. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted...adopted in Committee.
There's a motion to table Amendments 1 and 2 by Representative
Schneider."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider on the motion."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendments #1 and 2 did the following
thing. Number 1 was a technical change...dealt mostly with spelling
and punctuation. Amendment #2 deleted references to what appears to
be old Bills that the Reference Bureau threw into my Bill and I...I



deleted those in Amendment #2. However, in the process of doing all of that, there was some conflict with 1 and 2 so I would move that we table those Amendments and then I would like to move to adopt #3 which incorporates the corrections of 1 and 2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider moves to table Amendments 1 and 2. Leave granted? Hearing no objections, Amendments 1 and 2 are tabled. Amendment #3."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3. Schneider."

Schneider: "Amendment #3, then, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, takes out the conflict between 1 and 2, puts them in the proper order with the same changes. I move its adoption."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Schneider moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #3 is adopted. Any further Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Ladies and Gentlemen, Ann...Mrs. Ann Willer just came up to my desk and said that there is an unpaid-for chicken dinner at her desk. Whoever ordered it kindly find yourself to Mrs. Willer and with the necessary monetary value. House Bill 1749, Representative Schisler."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill...House Bill 1749. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments. No floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1762."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1762. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "None.....House Bill 1784. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Neff. Amends House Bill 1784...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Neff."

Neff: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #1 to House Bill 1784 is an Amendment that the Secretary of State asked to have put on it to clear up some language. At the Motor Vehicle Laws Committee Hearing they



asked if I would make this change and I told the Members of the Committee I would make...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion?"

Neff: "...To make the change. Therefore I move the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 1784."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Neff moves the adoption of Amendment #1 to 1784. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1785."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1785...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes, it's on Third Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "This Bill's been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Steczo. Amends House Bill 1785 on page 1, lines 2 and 3 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I move that we table House...Amendment #1 to House Bill 1785."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment #1. Hearing no objection...Amendment #1 is tabled."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2. Steczo. Amends House Bill 1785 on page 1, line 2 and so forth."

Steczko: "Amendment #2 which comes about from a promise made to the House Insurance Committee that I would amend it on the House floor, it deletes the Section in the prepaid legal insurance pursuant to conversion rights on group legal policies. And I move for the adoption of Amendment #1...#2 rather."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on Amendment #2? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1791."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1791. This Bill has been read a second time previously. 1791. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Madigan. Amends House Bill 1791 on page 1 by deleting lines 14 through 24 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan. Moves the adoption of Amendment #1. Any discussion? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1793."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1793. This Bill's been read a second time previously. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed. Floor Amendment #3. Madigan. Amends House Bill 1793 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Houlihan moves the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 1793. Any discussion? Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Speaker yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates that he will."

Waddell: "What are the provisions of the Amendment?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #3. Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #3 is an Agreed Amendment with the Sponsor of the Bill. It is similar to... Amendment which was just adopted on the companion Bill 1791. It exempts out counties, exempts out Cook County and the City of Chicago from the provisions of the Bill. And I move its adoption. It is an Agreed Bill with the Sponsor...or an Agreed Amendment with the Sponsor."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative...any further questions? Representative Houlihan moves the adoption of Amendment #3. All those...signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... Amendment #3 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1794."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1794. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1794 on page 1, line 18 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson on 1794."

Abramson: "House Bill 1794 provides that the state shall pay the entire cost of Circuit Court Judges and Associate Judges. The Illinois Constitutional, Article VI, Section 14 provides that Circuit Court and Associate Judges shall receive an additional compensation from counties within their districts where a Circuit Court has been provided by law. This Section of the Bill as it reads now will be unconstitutional. My Amendment, Amendment #1, provides, changes 'shall' to 'may', thereby saves the Bill. I move the favorable adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Your Amendments makes it from 'shall' to 'may'?"

Abramson: "Right."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative....Bradley on that Amendment."

Bradley: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I...I rise to oppose the Gentleman's Amendment because he really is gutting the Bill and I don't believe that it's unconstitutional. It...this is provided in the Constitution unless, I think the language, unless otherwise provided by law and that's what we're going to do. And when you remove the word 'shall' and provide the word 'may' you're really taking away the intent of the legislation. And I don't see that it's unconstitutional and I...hope we have the support of the...the House in opposing the Gentleman's Amendment. And I strongly oppose it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson to close."

Abramson: "Well, as I read previously, the Constitution specifically provides that Judges shall receive additional compensation from the county as may be provided by law. This totally eliminates the counties' participation in Judge's salaries. In my opinion it's clearly unconstitutional and I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson moves the adoption of the Amendment. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those



opposed 'no'. The 'noes' have it, the Amendment's defeated.

Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1799, Representative Madigan."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1799. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee. There's a motion to table Amendment #1 by Representative Edgar."

Speaker Lechowicz: "By who?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Representative Edgar."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Edgar."

Edgar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I filed a motion to table Amendment #1 because Amendment #1 would allow the possibility along with the package of either House Bill 1833 or 1934 that \$22,000,000 that the Governor in this year's budget, or next year's budget, could be used to build a sports arena in Chicago. Now, where I'm a lifelong Chicago Bear fan and wish them well, I don't think at this time we can afford \$22,000,000 out of next year's budget to go to this purpose. For that reason I would move to table Amendment #1 to 1799."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to the motion to table this Amendment. I find it rather shocking that Mr. Edgar would file this motion because what the Committee Amendment attempts to do is simply bring the McCormick Place Act into compliance with every other Civic Center Act in the State of Illinois, Mr. Edgar. We have civic centers all across the state. And the statutes which authorize those centers always provided the language, 'sport'. So that this Amendment, and therefore the Bill, simply attempts to provide that the McCormick Place Act will be no different than any other Act. And I certainly know of no reason why that should not occur. Therefore, I oppose your motion."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Edgar moves to...that Amendment #1 be tabled. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all those opposed...signify by saying 'no'. 'No?' 'Noes' have it. Roll Call is requested. On that question, all those in favor will vote



'aye' and all those opposed will vote 'nay'. Representative Mudd,"

Mudd: "In explaining my vote, Mr. Speaker, I think that all the downstate Representatives understand this Amendment and I think...I think that they should...should oppose this particular one because we've...we've debated this time and time again. We had the support of the Chicago people and they helped us pass our downstate legislation and to put these kinds of Amendments on that Bill...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Representative Mudd, point of order."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, why is the Majority Leader walking around putting on red lights? That is a criminal offense as Speaker Redmond pointed out yesterday afternoon."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Kindly vote your own switch. Please continue, Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr...Mr. Speaker, I think that the language, as Representative Madigan pointed out, is necessary for this Bill. It keeps everything in proper context when it refers to this type of legislation. I think to try to do something to...to this piece of legislation was thoroughly aired in...in Committee. There was no problem and to bring it to...to bear at this time on the floor is completely out of order. And I think we should beat this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, in order to explain my vote,..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Timer's on."

Telcser: "I come from Chicago and frankly I would favor a sport complex, favor anything that would help Chicago and its citizens and the economy of the entire state because I firmly believe that Chicago is an extremely important economic factor in this state. In fact I think no one would deny that. But I'm not quite sure. What will the impact of this sports stadium have on the environment, what is it going to do to the lakefront, if anything? Why wasn't the McCormick Place Act originally drafted in this fashion? Why do we have to amend it now to put it in compliance with other civic center legislation which is on the books? I don't...I'm not voting 'yes' because I'm against the sports complex, I'm voting 'yes' because I'm not quite sure what the Gentleman really wants to do..."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Bring your remarks to a close."

Telcser: "Or what the city wants to do. Perhaps if you take this out of the record we could talk about it and tell our Members more regarding what the plans for this facility really are."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Mann."

Mann: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, if we're dealing with the question of a sports complex for the City of Chicago without knowing where it's going to be located, how much it's going to cost and when it's going to be built, with about 90 or 95 Legislators in the House, I would suggest that we take this out of the record because it would be absolutely shameful, it would be disgraceful to vote on a matter of this importance with this few Members in the chamber. And I ask you, Mr. Chairman, and I ask the Sponsor, to take this out of the record."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 57 'ayes', 60 'nays', none recorded as 'present', The Amendment's defeated. Representative Edgar."

Edgar: "I'd like a poll of the absentees and a verification of the Roll Call."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Motion to table has been defeated. No. No, we'll give it to him....we're just waiting for it to come out of the machine. Just relax. Representative Edgar asks for a poll of the absentees and a verification. And we'll give him that opportunity. Representative Kane, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Kane: "Parliamentary inquiry. What was the nature of the motion and the effect of the motion?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He had a motion to table Committee Amendment #1. And it was defeated. Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Point of order, you can't...you can't ask for a verification on a motion that's been defeated. Never heard of that before. The hell you can! Yeah, I believe you can..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "It's a simple majority motion. Representative Schneider." Representative Schneider wants to be recorded as 'aye'. Is there leave? Representative Porter asks leave to be recorded as 'aye'. Okay. In order to save us time, Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I very much enjoyed Mr. Telcser's explanation of



his desire for the well-being for the City of Chicago and they were duly recorded and I'd request, Mr. Speaker, to take this out of the record."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Leave being granted, the request is granted.

1799 out of the record. House Bill 1807, Representative Yourell."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1807. This Bill's been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1809."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1809. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Terzich. Amends House Bill 1809 on page 1, line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor? Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "This is an Agreed Amendment and I move for adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion? Representative Terzich moves the adoption of the Agreed Amendment 1 to House Bill 1809. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #1 is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1812."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1812. This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions. Floor Amendment #2. Rigney. Amends House Bill 1812 on page 1, line 16 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Rigney. Representative Terzich."

Terzich: "Mr. Speaker, this Amendment #2 is for my good friend, Representative Rigney and the farmers of the State of Illinois and I move for adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Terzich moves the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? Representative Ewing, on this Agreed Amendment? All right. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed.... Amendment #2 is adopted... Representative



Mugalian, I'm sorry."

Mugalian: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker; I wanted to...someone to tell us what the Amendment does."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Terzich on Amendment #2."

Terzich: "Yes, what Amendment #2 does it adds on the...the farm equipment the plows, the tractors and so forth, as an exemption under the... the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mugalian."

Mugalian: "Is there an estimate as to what this will cost state revenues... the Amendment."

Terzich: "Yes, we've got a number of different estimates, Representative Mugalian, ranging from 30,000,000 to 200,000,000."

Mugalian: "Okay, this makes a bad Bill atrocious... Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendment #2 has been adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third...Third Reading. On this Bill, Mr. Ewing?"

On House Bill 1812? All right. Still on Second Reading. Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to request the Sponsor or the Clerk to indicate who prepared the fiscal note in this matter?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "That is filed with the Clerk, Sir, and you can come up and take a look at it."

Ewing: "Well, I know who prepared it and I would object to the fiscal note being filed by the Sponsor of the Bill. I think our rules are clear that it should be prepared by the Department, the Department of Revenue, in this case. I would object to this Bill being moved to Third Reading until a proper fiscal note is prepared and filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I believe if you'll read the rules of this House, they're quite explicit as far as fiscal notes and how they're supposed to be filed."

Ewing: "That's...that's correct, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1822. I did."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1822. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None as the request was withdrawn, signed note."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Order of the Consent Calendar
Third Reading, Second Day. Mr. Clerk, please read the Bills."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill:..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "It starts at 1050, Jack."

Clerk O'Brien: "...Reading, Second Day, where does it start at?"

Where's the Bills at, Chalk? House Bill 1050. A Bill for an Act
to amend Sections of an Act in relation to fire protection districts.
Third Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1479. A Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code.
Second...Third Reading of the Bill.

1050 was Third Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1589. A Bill for an Act to vacate an easement in Kankakee
County. Third Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1748. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act.
Second...Third Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 1872. A Bill for an Act to amend the Pension Code.
Third Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2051. A Bill for an Act to authorize the Department of
Conservation to sell real property. Third Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2052. A Bill for an Act to authorize the Department of
Conservation to sell real property. Third Reading of the Bill.

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any challenges? The question is whether these Bills
should pass. All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote
'nay'. Teddy, would give me 'aye'. To the Consent Calendar, Ladies
and Gentlemen. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?
Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 104 'ayes',
no 'nays' and 16 recorded as 'present'. These Bills will be so
recorded. Having received the Constitutional Majority, I hereby
declare it passed. Back to House Bills Second Reading. Pardon me?
Consent Calendar Second Reading Second Day."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 978. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue
Act. Second Reading of the Bill.

House Bill 2220. A Bill for an Act to require insurance companies
to furnish fire officials information. Second Reading of the Bill."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. For what purpose does Mrs. Geo-Karis arise?"

Geo-Karis: "I'm sorry to bother you, Mr. Speaker,..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "You're never a bother, Ad..."

Geo-Karis: "But I'm trying...thank you, that's the nicest thing anybody ever told me. But I...I wonder if I could have leave to vote 'yes' on the Consent Calendar?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Lady asks leave...to be recorded as 'aye' on the Consent Calendar. Is there any objection? Hearing none, the Lady is so recorded."

Geo-Karis: "Thank you. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Now back to House Bills on Second Reading. We're moving right along, Ladies and Gentlemen, House Bill 1833. We'll take that out of the record for a moment. House Bill 1835."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1835. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1843, Representative Robinson for Representative Houlihan."

Robinson: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker..."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1843. This Bill has been read a second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Robinson: "Thank you..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1. Steele. Amends House Bill 1843 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, are these controversial Amendments? Representative Houlihan."

Houlihan, D: "If there's any impression, there's an Amendment here from Representative Reilly, is that correct? Is this the very large Amendment?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Whose Amendment number was it, is that Reilly?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #1 is Steele."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Steele, how many Amendments are there on this Bill?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Two Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Okay, Representative Steele."

Steele: "Mr. Speaker, I move to table Amendment #1, please."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is there leave? Hearing no objection Amendment #1 is tabled. Amendment #2."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Reilly. Amends House Bill 1843 by striking everything after the enacting clause and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Reilly."

Reilly: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this...this is an Agreed Amendment with the Sponsor of the Bill, Representative Houlihan, who is not here. Basically, this Amendment is a second attempt to get before this House a...choice for the voters of the State of Illinois..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I think this is a conservation matter, we'll take it out of the record."

Reilly: "Point of order, Mr. Speaker, on what basis is the Chair taking this out of the record?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, the Sponsor, Jim Houlihan, isn't here."

Reilly: "I have...I have his permission to proceed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well...and there is, you know, one principle co... one Sponsor. If there was a principle Cosponsor with him I could go with it. So we'll take it out of the record right now. ...1855. ...Just heard me. 1855."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1855. This Bill has been read..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "What's your point of order, Representative Robinson?"
Point of order."

Robinson: "I inquired of the Chair if I could handle this Bill for Mr. Houlihan, I had spoken to Mr. Houlihan before he had to leave on family business and...and he wanted me to handle this Bill. I asked you and you said that I could, I haven't heard any ruling before that there was any ruling that controversial Amendments couldn't come up. Now, in fact, only about ten minutes ago a very controversial Amendment was voted upon."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Out of the record. 1855, Representative Mudd."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1855. This Bill has been read a second time



previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Representative Reilly on your point of order."

Reilly: "We're entitled to a ruling. I asked a question. Representative Robinson asked a question. We're entitled to a ruling."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I just...the Sponsor is not present, neither one of these individuals are listed as a principal Cosponsor, I did that as a matter of courtesy, the Gentleman came up to me and asked me if he could handle the Bill. I didn't ask him the appropriateness or the extent of the Bill, I thought he was the principal Cosponsor. He is not. And there are objections and we're on House Bill... took it out of the record...and we're on House Bill 1855 now. Mr. Robinson."

Robinson: "I know that when I asked, I never thought I was a principal Cosponsor. I said that I'd been designated by the Sponsor to handle this Bill. We've already gone through business on this Bill through the First Amendment. We're in the process, on this Bill, it's as if we hadn't started to handle 1843, we were handling it. We got through the First Amendment and it was only at the Second Amendment that any objection was raised."

Speaker Lechowicz: "But it was raised. Representative Mudd."

Mudd "Has there been a written request by the prime Sponsor of this Bill to have leave for someone else to handle it?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "There was not."

Mudd: "Then I suggest we move on."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 1855."

Clerk O'Brien: "No Committee Amendments. Floor Amendment #1. Abramson. Amends House Bill 1855 by inserting after line 19 the following and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Abramson."

Abramson: "House...House Bill 1855 seeks to remove from the power of the Governor a power to appoint public administrator and public guardian in the counties of the State of Illinois. Amendment #1 gives the power to the Governor to appoint in counties over three million in population a public administrator and a guardian. It leaves with the downstate counties power, for the county board with the advice



and consent of the board, to appoint their own public administrator and public guardian. I move for the adoption of Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Mudd." Representative Mudd."

Mudd: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose this Amendment. I think that we've debated on...in the Committee and on the floor different Amendments that would change the Probate Act and make it more uniform. And this...this...certainly the Bill in its form without Amendment makes it uniform throughout the state. And I think that the people in counties that are actually working with the Probate Act as it pertains to citizens of their various communities should be entitled to appoint the administrators of this Act. And I would rise to oppose any Amendment to the Bill because the Bill is in a uniform posture and...and treats everyone in the state equally."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further discussion on the Amendment? Mrs. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, all of a sudden we...for years we've had the public administrators and public guardian conservator appointed by the Governors and then it was changed. I think this Amendment is very good. This Amendment would allow the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, to appoint the public administrator and the public guardian and conservator in counties with a population of more than three million people. I don't see...see anything wrong with the Amendment. I think it would be a very good Amendment. I speak for it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Abramson to close....close."

Abramson: "I urge the adoption...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Oh, I'm sorry, excuse me. There's one other question. Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "Excuse me, will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he will."

Greiman: "Do I understand that if this Amendment is adopted that downstate would be selected by...by the county boards and that in Chicago, it would...or in Cook County it would be by the Governor, is that correct?"

Abramson: "The Bill itself seeks to have the...the county board of... or rather president of the county board, with the advice and consent



of a...of the county board appoint public administrator, public guardians for all the counties of the state. The Amendment exempts the counties...over three million population from this, from the effect of this Bill."

Greiman: "Well, thank you. On...on the Amendment just for a moment.

I don't think the Bill is very good. I...I voted against this same Bill in the last General Assembly. I probably will vote against this one but this Amendment is really, really just a partisan effort, you know to say that...that it's all right to have the Governor appointing a Republican in Cook County at this point but not a Democrat in counties that have never seen...Democrats have never seen the court house. Is just...just a most shameful partisan move. And I'm going to oppose this Amendment. I probably will vote against this Bill when it gets on Third Reading but...Amendment should be opposed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is there any further discussion? Representative Abramson to close."

Abramson: "Urge the adoption of Amendment #1. Request for a electronic Roll Call."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor will be...will vote 'aye', all those opposed will vote 'no'. And Representative Mudd spoke against the Amendment. 'No' on the Amendment, right. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take...the Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 31 'ayes', 56 'nays', 1 recorded as 'present'. The Amendment is defeated. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Order of Resolutions. House Resolution 232."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 232. Committee on Rules."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Katz."

Katz: "House Resolution 232 unanimously reported with a do pass recommendation by the Rules Committee of the House sets up a procedure to try to enable the House in a fair way to handle the heavy workloads that faces it in order to be able to afford every Member an opportunity to have the Bills that will be on Third Reading, as of Monday, heard before the deadline for hearing the House Bills on Third Reading is reached on Saturday, May 21st. What it does is to provide a



procedure under which the Majority Leader and the...correction, the Minority Leader and the Speaker will appoint two individuals who will be reviewing Bills that have come out of each substantive Committee to see if those Bills might appropriately be placed on a Consent Calendar. There will also be a summary, or short debate Calendar, under which Bills will be placed that do not involve major matters of controversy. And under the procedure relating to which a proponent will be heard for two minutes and an opponent for two minutes to fairly apprise the Members of the House of the issues involved in regard to that particular Bill. Members will be able to remove matters from the Supplementary Consent Calendar in the same way that Members can now remove Bills from the Consent Calendar. Similarly, three Members of the Rules Committee may remove matters from the Supplementary Consent Calendar. When matters are removed from the Consent Calendar they will go on the short debate Calendar just described thus permitting fair but limited debate on the issues. It was the unanimous feeling of the Rules Committee that this kind of procedure would enable every Member to have his or her Bill heard between now and May 21st. Would allow ample consideration of large numbers of Bills that do not involve major issues but also would allow full and unlimited debate with regards to Bills that do involve substantial issues on the floor. I would, Mr. Speaker, commend to the Members of the House, House Rule 2...House Resolution 232, which I would point out, is a temporary rule which would by its terms expire on May 23, 1977."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Friedland."

Friedland: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall the main question be put?"

All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... And I believe Representative Katz explained the Resolution. All those in favor vote 'aye' and the opposed vote 'no'. This Resolution takes 89 votes. Representative...would you vote me 'aye', please? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. And, Pete, it's good to have you up and around again, partner. On



this question there are 107 'ayes', 3 'nays', 3 recorded as 'present'.
House Resolution 232 is adopted. To the Order of House Bills on
Second Reading... is House Bill 1871, Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "...I don't think there's any Amendments to it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, we'll see."

Greiman: "Or House...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Clerk will please read the Bill. House Bill 1871."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1871. This Bill has been read a second time
previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Are there any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1883, Representative Adams."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1883. This Bill has been read a second time
previously. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions or Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions or Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1886."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1886. This Bill has been read a second time
previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. House Bill 1898."

Clerk O'Brien: "House..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "Yes, I'm sorry, I was in midst of a conversation. You moved
1883, there is an Amendment filed to that."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Not according to the Clerk, we'll check it though.
House Bill 1883. I'm sorry, we'll bring House Bill 1883 back from
Third to Second. That's okay. Now..."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Sponsor was here."

Clerk O'Brien: "The Amendment is marked #3 incorrectly. It should be
#2, Leverenz. Amends House Bill 1833...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Leverenz asks leave to correct the
Amendment on its face? That is correct. Is there any objections?"



Leave being granted, now it's Amendment #2. Please proceed with Amendment #2."

Leverenz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Amendment #2 would make the Bill applicable to all units of local government whereas it currently is stated it relates to township or township road districts at this time. I move that we adopt Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any discussion on the Amendment? Representative Leverenz moves... Representative McClain...on the Amendment."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, could the...could the Gentleman clarify a little bit more for us?"

Leverenz: "Yeah."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Would you explain the Amendment, please?"

Leverenz: "Certainly. Mike, 1883, right now, exempts the sale of motor fuel, or special fuel, to townships and township road districts. This would expand the same privilege and benefits to all units of local government."

McClain: "Ted, you mean from paying taxes on?"

Leverenz: "That's right."

McClain: "What's the fiscal impact?"

Leverenz: "I do not know. Can't answer that."

McClain: "You have...you don't know what the fiscal impact would be as to...like money to the Road fund?"

Leverenz: "That's correct."

McClain: "Would you be willing to hold this Bill on Second Reading until we got a fiscal note?"

Leverenz: "I ask that we adopt the Amendment."

McClain: "If we adopt the Amendment, I'd like to have a...I'll request a fiscal note. I'll tell you what..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative McClain. Representative McClain...McClain."

McClain: "Couldn't we move this Bill to Third Reading until you got a little more information, Ted, and then maybe the Sponsor would bring it back to Second Reading?"

Leverenz: "Yes."

Speaker Lechowicz: "A request for a fiscal note has just been filed by Representative Skinner."



McClain: "Mr. Speaker, the Gentleman said he'd hold off his Amendment, move his Bill to Third Reading, maybe we'll come back...Second Reading next week until there's some more information on this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I certainly want to know what it will cost."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, we're going to hold the Amendment. We'll move the Bill to Third."

Skinner: "I presume we're also going to hold the Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, we brought it back from Third to Second for the purpose of adopting this Amendment. The Amendment is not being offered at the present time."

Skinner: "The Bill went to the wrong Committee for starters. It didn't go to the Transportation Committee as so many other Bills that rip the state off."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative McClain."

McClain: "...Speaker, Mr. Leverenz has been more than gracious. He said he'd hold off the Amendment and move the Bill to Third until we got more information. I think that's more than we can ask the Gentleman."

Leverenz: "Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Leverenz."

Leverenz: "With the fiscal note on it, now, we did bring it back to Second because it was moved without consideration of the Amendment. With the fiscal note on it now, wouldn't it then hold it on Second?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Adams' Bill. It was moved from Second to Third, there was not an...the Clerk did not have the Amendment with the Bill at the time."

Leverenz: "Well, certainly..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And we brought it back from Third to Second for the purpose of considering your Amendment, which was pointed out quite vividly with the files of the Clerk. At that time Representative Skinner also filed a fiscal note. There's some question as far as with the impaction of Amendment #2 to the Bill. The present fiscal note is adequate as the Bill was originally put in. So I'll move that with the understanding, this Bill will go back to Third Reading, as is.Okay, Adams? Representative Skinner."



Skinner: "That's fine with me but I'll trust that you will attach my fiscal note to the Amendment in case it ever gets back to Second Reading again and the Amendment gets adopted."

Speaker Lechowicz: "It'll be filed, Cal."

Skinner: "Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Okay. House Bill 1898. George. Giorgi, okay. Take it out."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1898. This Bill has been read second time previously. No Committee Amendments. Amendments from the floor. Amendment #1. Emil Jones. Amends House Bill 1898 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Emil Jones on Amendment #1."

Jones, E: "Is the Sponsor here?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Giorgi."

Jones, E: "Wanted me to table the Amendment then."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry, what?"

Jones, E: "Leave to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is this your Amendment, Representative Jones?"

Representative Jones asks leave to table Amendment #1. Is there any objection? Leave being granted, Amendment #1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. Representative Madigan. Representative Bradley. Representative Bradley moves that we adjourn until Monday at 12 o'clock Perfunct. 4 o'clock, Regular Session."

Bradley: "I'm happy to make that motion, Sir."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Bradley moves that the House adjourn until Monday..."

Bradley: "Does the Clerk have any work to do, Mr. Speaker, before we..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yeah, there's one corrective Amendment, one corrective Bill. What is it, Jack."

Clerk O'Brien: "Bring House Bill 1062 from Third back to Second to take off an Amendment that should have been tabled."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Is there leave? House Bill 1062 is back to Second Reading."

Clerk O'Brien: "And we want to..."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Waddell. Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "And in its place, Mr. Speaker, adopt Amendment 3 which we had done earlier."

Clerk O'Brien: "We've adopted 3, we want to table #2. Right."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Representative Waddell moves to table Amendment #2.

Is there leave? Hearing no objection, Amendment #2 is tabled. Third Reading. Representative...Dan Houlihan. I'll be with you in a second."

Houlihan, D: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, on page 5 of the Calendar, House Bill 1029 and House Bill 1030 were being held on the Order of Second and ask for Amendments just solely for the filing of the fiscal note. Fiscal note has now been filed. In the absence of Amendments I'd like that moved to Third."

Speaker Lechowicz: "On House Bill 1020....what was that?"

Houlihan, D: "House Bill 1029 and House Bill 1030."

Speaker Lechowicz: "House Bill 1029, the fiscal note has been filed. There's no...is there any Amendments? Pardon me? Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Mr. Speaker, why...why are we now jumping around the Calendar? I thought we were going to adjourn and go home. And why...why are we jumping around the Calendar?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Dan, that can wait till Monday. Representative Kempiners, for what reason do you seek recognition? Kempiners."

Kempiners: "An inquiry to the ends of the Chair, Mr. Chairman."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry, what?"

Kempiners: "I have an inquiry as to what your intent is on the rest of the Bills on Second Reading? Will we go to that order of business on Monday so that those of us who have Bills with Amendments can proceed...."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I have 19 of them there myself. I sure hope so."

Kempiners: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Okay. Forget about 1029. Let's go home. Representative Bradley."

Bradley: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, before I renew my motion, I talked with the Speaker and he assures me everybody



will be given an opportunity to move those Bills from Second to Third Reading. And nobody will get shut out, Mr. Kempiners, so we'll give everybody their opportunity and their chance. So now I move we adjourn until Monday for a Perfunct and a full Session at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All those in favor of the Adjournment Resolution signify by saying 'aye', 'aye', all those opposed... We stand adjourned. Have a nice weekend. Thank you."
