Conti: "Yes, I understand Mr. Speaker. If you look, notice where 2452 is at the bottom and on these Consent Calendars I'm trying to keep up with them and I just turned to the page when you were calling for the vote. 2452 is one of the last ones, about the third or fourth one from the bottom. Now I have no objection to the Bill at all but I just don't like the idea of the vehicle Bills going in on a Consent Calendar. We do have the objection filed Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Well, this puts me in a great spot. Technically I think you're too late. I think it violates the rule. Now I don't like to..."

Conti: "Mr. Chairman, I'm not going to appeal the rule of your chair. It's not that important but I'm going to put you on notice. I don't want anymore vehicle Bills put on Third... on Consent Calendar."

Speaker Redmond: "I agree with you. And I will colaberate with you on any future action but this did come too late in my judgement. Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 141 aye and 2 no and the Bills having received the Constitutional Majority are hereby declared passed. On the Order of House Bills, Third Reading appears

One provision provides for termination if the franchisee is convicted of a felony. The conviction of which substantially impares the good will associated with the trade mark. Amendment #4 makes it convicted of a felony or other crimes which substantially impares the good will associated with the trade mark and I would move for the adoption of amendment #4."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti."

Daniels: "Has it been reviewed by the Minority Staff?"

Steczo: "Yes it has."

Daniels: "And Mr. Harris has gone over this? I haven't seen it that's why I'm asking you these questions."

Steczo: "Yes he has Lee."



Daniels: "We also had another amendment I thought was going to be proposed on this Bill. Another two amendments. Have they been filed as well?"

Steczo: "They'll be coming up immediately."

Daniels: "I'm sorry. I didn't hear you."

Steczo: "Oh, they'll be coming up next."

Daniels: "Alright. But these three amendments that you're proposing have all been reviewed by the Minority Council and he's approved those?"

Steczo: "Yes."

Daniels: "The language in them?"

Steczo: "Yes they have."

Daniels: "Alright."

Speaker Redmond: "Questions on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #4. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. Motion carried and Amendment 4 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #5, Steczo. Amends House Bill 311 as amended by deleting all of section 4.2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Steczo."

Steczo: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Amendment #5 amends the section of non-renewal of a franchise. It was worked out through discussions this week by representatives of the franchisors and franchisees and basically says that a franchisee shall be paid a full market value or the fair market value of the franchise if he has been barred by the franchise agreement from conducting the same business and if he has not been sent a six month notice prior to the expiration date of the franchise. I would move the adoption of Amendment #5."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Any discussion? What does that signal mean Representative Daniels?"

Daniels: "It means the same thing as on four. It's been reviewed by the Minority Council. He's approved the same. Have you discussed this with the International Franchise Association these amendments? And have they



approved these?"

Steczo: "Yes they have."

Daniels: "So the Bills in the form now that they have worked out with you is that correct?"

Steczo: "One more amendment to go."

Daniels: "When that amendment goes on."

Steczo: "Right."

Daniels: "Alright."

Speaker Redmond: "Questions on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 5. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have and Amendment 5 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #6, Steczo. Amends House Bill 311 as amended in section 4.1, subsection C and so forth. Representative Steczo." Representative Steczo."

Steczo: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Amendment #6 adds another provision to good cause termination. Again, this amendment was agreed upon by representatives of the franchisors and franchisee associations and this includes as a provision repeatedly fails to comply with the lawful provisions of the franchise or other agreement. I would ask for the adoption of Amendment #6."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion. The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 6. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried. Amendment's adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Representative Friedrich, for what purpose do you seek recognition on the question of an amendment? Want to bring something back to Second Reading."

Friedrich: "No, sir. Not right now. Thank you very much. I'm sorry. My light was on. I don't know who turned it on."



Speaker Redmond: "Ok. The Order of House Bills, Second Reading, Short Debate. Appearing on page 4, 2268. Representative Bower is recognized. Will you read the Bill? 2268. Representative Steczo?"

Steczko: "Mr. Speaker, was House Bill 311 moved back to Third Reading?"

Speaker Redmond: "If it wasn't it will be now. Third Reading."

Steczko: "Thank you."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 2268, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #1, Bower, amends House Bill..."

Speaker Redmond: "2268."

Clerk Hall: "Amends House Bill 2268 on page two be deleting lines 30 through 32 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "...four. Representative Bower on Amendment #1 on 2268."

Bower: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentleman of the House, this is an Amendment that I spoke on yesterday and was not distributed. This Amendment was drafted by the Parliamentarian of the House and I agree with. What it would do is merely clarify the language of the statute as to how many propositions could be filed under this statute. The Election Code also has a limitation. This is to clarify the point that only 3 propositions could be filed pursuant to the Revenue Code."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion on the Amendment? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye', 'aye'; opposed 'no'. The 'aye's have it. The motion carried. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

This Bill has been read a second time previously. Amendment #1 was withdrawn. Amendment 2,3, and 4 were adopted and Amendment #5 was withdrawn. Amendment #6, Greiman. Amends House Bill 13 on page one line two by deleting 'of a certain question' and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "There are no motions with respect to Amendments 2,3, and 4. Am I correct on that? They are not... these are not Committee amendments. You said the Calendar indicates they were. Oh, I see. Amendment #6. Who's the Sponsor of that?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment 6, Representative Greiman."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Greiman on Amendment 6."

Greiman: "Well, Mr. Speaker, is Representative Skinner in the House?"

Speaker Redmond: "Yes he is but he's visiting."

Greiman: "Well, actually, I intended to table... I think I have the next two amendments and they were technically in error and Representative Skinner's is next but I did want to, I do have two more in the, in the Legislative Reference Bureau that we would like to put on the Bill or offer and so I've asked the Speaker, the Sponsor to hold it and he says he'll bring it back to Second Reading. This, of course, just as to me. Representative Skinner still has his Bills, his amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Clerk reminds me that we may never pass this way again. So what are we doing with Amendment 6?"

Greiman: "Well... well... I, I think I have 6 and 7. Is that right?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Six, seven, and eight."

Speaker Redmond: "Six, seven and eight."

Greiman: "Well, I have to look at them. They were filed over a month ago."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor of the amendment? Let him look at them. Are they yours? Representative Greiman desires to withdraw Amendment 6. Now any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #7, Skinner. Amends House Bill 13 as amended by inserting after the last sentence of section two and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I don't have any idea how my name got on this amendment, but I would ask permission to withdraw it."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Skinner..."

Skinner: "I don't even know what it says."

Speaker Redmond: "... the alledged Sponsor of Amendment #7 withdraws it. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #8, Brady. Amends House Bill 13 as..."

Speaker Redmond: "Who?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Brady."

Speaker Redmond: "Will somebody get Representative Brady back? Representative Preston, do you desire to pursue Representative Brady's amendment? Nevermind. Well the Sponsor doesn't seem to be here pursuing the motion for the adoption of amendment 8 so... the operation of law, that's withdrawn. That's a new rule. Any further amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendment, amendments?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Greiman."

Greiman: "I just wanted to make clear that Representative Kelly and I have an understanding, I think, that when this comes to Third he can take it back to Second at that time. Is that alright Mr. Speaker? For the purpose of an amendment?"



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly. Quite frankly, the Speaker's getting a little tired of seeing 13 on the Calendar."

Kelly: "Me too."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Kelly."

Kelly: "I've made an agreement to work with Representative Greiman. I certainly hope that we have either one or two amendments and no more than that..."

Greiman: "One. Just one, that's all."

Kelly: "We'll give you, we'll give you a go at it."

Greiman: "OK. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Currently, though there are no further Amendments from the floor. Is that correct?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 15."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 15. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the Illinois Anti-Trust Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 failed in Committee. Amendments 2 and 3 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 2 and 3?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 65."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 65. A Bill for an Act to amend the Fair Employment Practice Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 114."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 114. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."



Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Deuster. Amends House Bill 114 as amended in paragraph T of Section three."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

House Bill 114 relates to the subject of land fills.

Amendment #2, as far as I'm concerned, agreed amendment which takes out a reference to public water supplies.

This is a land fill Bill and it's really not appropriate to cover public water supplies and Amendment #2 takes that out and I would move the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "There any discussion? Questions on the Gentleman's motion for adoption of Amendment 2. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Deuster. Amends House Bill 114 as amended in Section C of paragraph C of Section 39."

Deuster: "Amendment #3 is an Amendment that was suggested in the Committee by Representative Robbins. It is agreeable to all parties involved. It acceptable to the EPA. What it relates to is that when a permit is received for a land fill, notice is given under the Bill to the States Attorney to the Chairman of the County Board to the Members of the General Assembly to the Clerk of each... each municipality within three miles and this Amendment #3 would add that notice would also be given to all owners of property adjacent to the proposed site. It's a good Amendment. It protects the public. I would urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Questions on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 3. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. Motion carried. Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"



Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #4, Deuster. Amends House Bill 114 as amended by inserting immediately after second subparagraph and paragraph D of Section 39 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Amendment #4 is also an Amendment that's acceptable to EPA. It's a good Amendment. It provides that in giving consideration to whether to approve or reject a land fill application that the agency shall give consideration to local use and siting requirements in determining the suitability of a proposed site for a land fill. This doesn't provide it'll be entirely controlling but it does give the EPA the authority to reject the land fill if it's violative of local land use requirements. It's a good Amendment. Acceptable to EPA and I would urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Will the Parliamentarian come to the podium. Any discussion? Questions on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 4. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #5, Deuster. Amends House Bill 114 as amended by inserting immediately after issued in subparagraph 4 or paragraph A in Section 37."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentleman of the House. Under existing law, there's a peculiarity in that if there's an appeal the Pollution Control Board concerning an application for a land fill in your area, and the bureaucrats sit on their hands and don't do anything the law presently provides that after 90 days the permit is deemed to have been granted or approved. This is wrong. We haven't had a problem with it but it could be a serious problem so Amendment #5 provides that where there is that delay and no action that the applicant at his option may deem the permit to be denied and then take



a petition for relief to the local Circuit Court. I think this improves the law and at the same time gives the applicant an opportunity where the bureaucrats are delaying unnecessarily to seek some relief. It does basically protect the public because it changes the law which now says that if the administration does nothing you could have a land fill application approved and that would be a terrible thing to happen I think. So I move the adoption of Amendment #5."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Questions on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 5. Those in favor indicate by voting aye, aye, oppose no. The ayes have it. Motion carried. The amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #6, Robbins. Amends House Bill 114 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Clerk O'Brien: "Robbins."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robbins. Pardon me."

Robbins: "I move to table the Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Robbins withdraws Amendment 6. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #7, Leinenweber-Mahar. Amends House Bill 114 on page one, line one and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Amendment #7 is a rather..."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyer for what purpose do you rise?"

Meyer: "Point of Parliamentary Inquiry, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "State your inquiry."

Meyer: "Is Amendment #7 in conflict with Amendment #1 which was adopted?"

Speaker Redmond: "Will you give us Amendment 1 and 7?"

Representative Jaffe. Parliamentarian advises me that the Amendments are not compatible. Would you like to discuss



fit with the Parliamentarian, Representative Leinenweber?
If you table Amendment 1, that probably would put the
Bill together with Amendment 7 in order, but perhaps
you better talk to the Parliamentarian."

Leinenweber: "I would have to place a motion now to table..."

Speaker Redmond: "To table 1."

Leinenweber: "I would so move."

Speaker Redmond: "Question is... Representative Meyers."

Meyers: "Mr. Speaker, is that motin in writing?"

Speaker Redmond: "Is the motion in writing?"

Meyers: "In addition, he would have to move..."

Speaker Redmond: "That motion, that motion, I've been advised,
is not necessary to have it in writing."

Meyers: "When the, wouldn't the proper motion be, Mr. Speaker,
to move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #1 was
adopted?"

Speaker Redmond: "Is it a record vote? It's a Committee
ment. So the vote by which that was adopted was in Com-
mittee."

Meyers: "I move to table his motion."

Speaker Redmond: "I think probably unless everybody has real
strong feelings about this thing perhaps we better take
this one out of the record. Let Representative Leinen-
weber..."

Meyers: "No, no."

Speaker Redmond: "You want it. Okay."

Meyers: "No, no, no. Mr. Speaker, I withdraw my motion so that
it would be Representative Leinenweber's motion to table
Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay."

Meyers: "Which I would oppose."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I think probably some
explanation to the Membership would be in order in what
we are trying to do. The subject matter of House Bill 114

was whether or not, was additional control on the location and siting of sanitary land fills."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Meyers, for what purpose do you rise?"

Meyers: "Isn't it a motion to table non-debatable Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "No. Not when you table an Amendment.

Proceed Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "All right. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 114 and Amendment #7 which is being proposed, it will be proposed to House Bill 114, are diametrically different ways of attacking the problem of siting sanitary land fills. Last term, House Bill 216, sponsored by Representative Mahar and myself, passed the House and was stymied in the Senate. Amendment #7 will be virtually identical to House Bill 216 with the exception that the Amendment #7 will not preempt home rule. The question of local control over location of sanitary land fills has been around for the last six years because of a, what some of us consider, rather unfortunate Supreme Court decision which determined that the Environmental Protection Act did, in fact, preempt local control zoning power as to location of sanitary land fills and left it solely in the domain of the Environmental Protection Agency which was not equipped to deal with this problem. Consequently, they do not have a hearing procedure. They don't have any specific procedure for, other than the technical determination of whether or not an area might be suitable for land fill but not suitable from the point of view of proper land use controls. Amendment #7 would restore, would turn House Bill 114 into a duplicate, virtual duplicate of House Bill 216 and would once again give the decision-making powers of local land fills to the units of local government. It was a Bill when drafted, it was drafted through the efforts, combined efforts of the Illinois Municipal League and the Environmental Protection Agency. It would supply some needed relief and protection



for non-home-rule counties. Currently, in non-home-rule counties only, home-rule counties retain the right to control the location of sanitary land fills. Non-home-rule units, as of the Supreme Court decision, do not have this right. They can be imposed by the Environmental Protection Agency without the proper credentials for making the determination of local land use policy. We need this Amendment #7 to the Bill. The Speaker, the Parliamentarian says that we must therefore move to table Amendment #1. I, therefore, move to table Amendment #1 with the idea of putting to the vote of this House Amendment #7."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would urge all of you to put a no vote, a red light on this motion. First of all, what Representative Leinenweber is endeavoring to do is to entirely delete and gut the Bill that, House Bill 114, and put his own Bill in place. That's fine. He could introduce his own Bill. He could follow that route, but I object to having the suggestion that an entirely different Bill be put in here in place of a Bill that has been carefully worked out by the three principal Cosponsors, Representative Harris on the other side of the aisle, Representative Meyer, and myself in cooperation with EPA. The agency supports the Bill that we developed and that the Committee recommended and to throw that in the trash can and accept something new that has not been considered, recommended, and approved by the Committee I think would be wrong. Besides that, I would point out that the Amendment which Representative Leinenweber, my good friend, is proposing to place into this Bill has some very arbitrary and I think capricious language that is too strict and just not workable. For example, he provides that no land fill would be approved if within 12 miles there's not 75,000



people involved. Also, the Bill, his Bill does not guarantee a public hearing. The people could be sleeping and there would be no public hearing if it were not requested by local government leaders or if the Director of EPA didn't think it was a good thing. In House Bill 114 the way it is there's a guarantee for a public hearing. I would urge all of you to vote no on this motion so that we can go forward and consider on Third Reading the Bill that Representative Harris, Meyer, and myself have worked out in cooperation with the industry so that they can live with it, with EPA so they can administer it, and a Bill that I think really does protect the public interest in a responsible manner. So I would urge your no vote on this motion."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of the motion to table Amendment #1 because during the, during the drafting and during the subcommittee hearings there was a lot of discussion about this Bill and the result of that is several Amendments to House Bill 114 on the floor in a hasty effort to put the thing in shape. To get in shape for final passage. I don't think, I don't think the measure is in shape and, therefore, I think that the substitution of the Amendment #7 is, is proper. Simply because the Amendment #7 is a, is a result of approximately two years work on this matter in which the EPA and the Municipal League and others sat down to address the language of the Bill. It's unfortunate that it got stalled in the Senate. It was a Bill that was very well received by the Members of this House and therefore should be considered. So I support the motion to table Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Representative Leinenweber to close."

Leinenweber: "Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker. Again, so the issue



is clear. The issue here is whether or not our local municipalities, our local counties should have some control over the location of a sanitary land fill or whether or not we ought to preempt that and give that control solely to the State Environmental Protection Agency. Now when it comes to the technical questions as whether the land is the proper consistency whether drainage is proper and so forth, I would submit that the EPA has the obligation to make these determinations. Our Bill does nothing in regard to that. It does, the EPA, however; is, is unsuited for that question of whether or not it's proper land use planning to locate a particular land fill in a particular area that may be near your community. Now there's one other thing I'd like to point out. It has been charged that this particular Amendment which we'll be offering will prohibit and prevent local municipalities to prohibit the location of a sanitary land fill. This is not true. One of the requirements before a local community may control the location of a sanitary land fill is that they adopt an ordinance which has a minimum standard which will require that on the proper zoning principles that if it can be shown that the particular site falls within those principles which prohibit them from denying that particular use for the land. I submit that this is the proper way to go. This is the best approach. It's an approach that the House accepted last year and I certainly urge an aye motion on the motion to table Amendment 1."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion to table Amendment #1. Those in favor vote aye, oppose vote no. Have all voted who wish? Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House. In explaining my vote I want to point out that there is a distance set into this Amendment that will preclude another land fill being put into the area. Now, we're running short of land. For one thing, there should be no such, no



such statement in any Amendment. Every place you go with the intent of putting in a land fill, you're going to find the people surrounding it and objecting to it. We have to take advantage for the future of this state that any, and for free enterprise system that any land available that is okay with the EPA to be Environmental Protection Agency which I'm sure they'd be surprised to hear me supporting them, should be made available and it should be completely up and the power given to the people in the local county because 100% they're going to be against it. It's just natural way that the folks are. So under present EPA rules of land fills if they carry them out there is no danger. There is not a bad operating place. It's recoverable and I therefore think we should vote no on this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 20 aye and 121 no and the motion failed. My Calendar up there isn't very good, Mr. Electrician. Amendment #7. Yeah, now the Amendment #7, the Parliamentarian advises me that it's out of order. Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, would you examine Amendment #2 to determine if that is out of order?"

Speaker Redmond: "Mr. Parliamentarian. Representative Deuster."

Duester: "I understand we're in the posture of Second Reading for the moment on this Bill and while there's a lull I would like to move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted and ultimately my plan is to withdraw Amendment #2. There's some confusion over that and I... So at this time I would move to reconsider the vote by which Amendment #2 was adopted."

Speaker Redmond: "Was that a Roll Call vote? Voice vote wasn't it? Let's move to table. It was a voice vote."

Duester: "I'll move to table Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion to table Amendment #2. Those in favor



say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried. Amendment #2 is tabled. Seven was out of order. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #8, Yourell. Amends House Bill 114 as amended by deleting the added paragraphs C and Section two."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #8... is it 8? Yeah. Amendment #8 addresses itself to Amendment #1 on page two, Section two, paragraph C. Deletes that language, 'The siting procedures and rules provided for in this Act for regional pollution control facilities shall be excluding siting procedures and rules for such facilities'. I move for the adoption of Amendment #8 to Amendment #1 to House Bill 114."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Subcommittee of the Committee on Environment and Natural Resources worked very hard on this Bill and so did the Committee and they felt that this provision in the Bill that Representative Yourell is seeking to strike out was in the public interest and essentially the reason for that is I think that we all have uniform rules with the respect to the siting of land fills throughout the State of Illinois so that all of the citizens of our state are treated equally. They all have the equal rights and this would be guaranteed by the language that is in the present Bill and so I would oppose this Amendment and appreciate a no vote. Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I certainly urge the Membership to adopt Amendment #8. Now, one of the things that perhaps some of the Members don't know is about a month ago the Illinois Supreme Court ruled that home-rule units do control the location of sanitary land fills."



House Bill 114 seeks to take that power away from home-rule units. To take away what local controls home-rule units were given just one month ago seems to me rather poor policy when those of us who have been trying to stop this proliferation of land fills or at least give the local people some say in the location of them and some say as to how land use ought to be conducted in their...in their communities. So I think, at the very least, we should adopt Amendment #8 which would at least give us what controls we already possess without taking them away more. This is a...this is a vote for local government...for local control, and I certainly urge everybody to vote 'aye' on Amendment #8."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Question... Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of this House.

There is not a proliferation of land fills. The fact is there down to under 600 and any land fill is able to be secured for a community that we better allow them to do it because if you don't, we're going to run out of space. Now, I know something about it. Vote 'no'."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 8. Those in favor vote 'aye'. Opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 21 'ayes' and 105 'no', and the motion fails and the Amendment is not adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 153."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 153. A Bill for an Act to exempt from certain occupation use taxes tangible and personal property. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment one?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"



Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Wait a minute, wait a minute Representative Getty."

Getty: "Has there been a request for a fiscal note filed?"

Speaker Redmond: "On which one? Fiscal note has been requested on 153. It will have to remain on the Order of Second Reading till the fiscal note is furnished. 185."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 185. A Bill for an Act in relation to abuse and neglected nursing home residents. reporting. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1 and 2?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Bullock-Kempiners. Amends House Bill 185 on page six by deleting Section 12."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Bullock."

Bullock: "Thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #3 is an Amendment offered by the Minority Spokesman on Human Resources. The Amendment is merely technical in nature. It deletes section 12 of the Bill and I have no objections to this Amendment and would request adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 185."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Question is on the motion for adoption of Amendment 3. Those in favor say 'aye'. 'Aye'. Opposed, 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The motion carried. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Committee amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 191"

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 191. A Bill for an Act to require nursing homes, shelter care home, and homes for the aged to train certain employees. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reilly. Representative Reilly."

Reilly: "I ask leave to withdraw amendment, the motion to table Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "What was your motion again Representative Reilly?"

Reilly: "I ask leave to withdraw the motion to table Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reilly withdraws the motion to table the Amendment #2. Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #4, Schisler. Amends House Bill 222 on page four by deleting line 27 through line 30."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motions with respect to Amendments 1, 2, and 3? Representative Schisler on Amendment #4."

Schisler: "Mr. Speaker, Amendment #4 just, on page four by deleting line 27 through line 30. And then we have Amendments 5 and 6 that are going to further amend the Bill and Representative Reilly has."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Reilly."

Reilly: "Yeah. Amendment #4 should be withdrawn because it's included in 5 and 6."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the..."

Schisler: "That's right Mr. Speaker. I forgot."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Terzich. What's your re-
sponse to Amendment 3?"

Terzich: "Well, I have no objection to the amendment. As I
understand from my staff personnel that that provision is
already in the Bill and if you want the Amendment #3 it
makes no difference to me."

Speaker Redmond: "OK. Question's on the Gentleman's motion

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Harris. Who's amendment was Amendment 1, have we any idea?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Was offered in Committee by Representative Harris."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, this amendment was offered in Committee by an amendment on the face of the Bill and Representative Harris and I discussed this. I'm a member



of the Committee, the Environment Committee. He agreed to remove this because it made the Bill unacceptable and that, I believe, is his next... I believe there's a Floor Amendment to take care of that."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there an amendment from the floor on this. There will be Amendments 2 and 3 I understand offered on the floor."

Griesheimer: "Yes, that's correct. He..."

Speaker Redmond: "What do we do now with Representative Harris not being here."

Griesheimer: "I don't know. I'm sure he wanted to move on it. The Bill, the amendment originally... but the..."

Speaker Redmond: "Well OK then."

Griesheimer: "I have no objection to holding it."

Speaker Redmond: "Why don't... Guess maybe we better hold it."

Maybe he'll get back from the Ratskeller. 530."

Griesheimer: "Fine."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 530. A Bill for an Act to repeal sections of the Inheritance Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "None."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 543."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 543. A Bill for an Act making appropriation to Helen Dal. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 547."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 547. A Bill for an Act to provide fuel cost relief grants for senior citizens and disabled persons. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."



Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Ewing. Amends House Bill 547 on page four by deleting line eight and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan. Representative Ewing has an amendment on 543... 547. You aware of the amendment? Representative Ewing on Amendment 2."

Ewing: "Mr... Mr. Speaker this amendment merely reduces the amount of the benefits in this Bill. Dropping the total cost from approximately 16,000,000 to 4,000,000. It requires that 25% of the amount of the increase on the home fuel... it reduces it 25% and the household income the minimum amount of payment from \$40 to \$10."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Sharp."

Sharp: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. I rise in opposition to this amendment. I believe that House Bill 547 as reported out in Committee that we introduce is a minimal commitment to trying to help the senior citizens with the escalating costs of utilities. In my opinion, this amendment is an attempt to minimize to the point of really making the program worthless and, therefore; I would rise in opposition of this amendment. I think if the sponsor of this amendment felt that this was the right approach to take them maybe he should have prepared his own proposal. As I said before, the program as we introduced it, as it passed out of Committee and came to the House is a commitment in the range of 16 to \$20,000,000 to help the senior citizens and disable persons living on fixed income to cope with the escalating costs of utilities and I would ask for the Members of the House to oppose this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further?" Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I doubt that there is a Member of this Body who does not want to help the senior citizens regardless of what the cause may be. God on knows they've given years of their life to make our



state and our community a better place in which to live. But I think we're finding ourselves getting into a situation where we're offering false promises to the citizens we represent. I recall earlier this Session, the House had a heated debate about a Bill which provided some money for citizens who, because of the snow, failed to receive aid in the, I believe, it was the school lunch program. But Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, we're winding down toward the last 60 days of the Session. And one of the reasons in my opinion the public has a great disregard for those of us who serve them is that find it difficult to believe us. I don't doubt that every Member of this House recognizes that there are fiscal constraints within which we must live and that when we pass legislation we should pass those Bills recognizing full well what we can deliver on and what really amounts to some type of red herring which can never be fulfilled. Now I don't want to get into the merits of the Bill itself. That can be left for the Order of Third Reading, but Representative Ewing's amendment does is simply pare this Bill down to what may be a realistic assessment of trying to do something for senior citizens who are indeed burdened with excessive fuel costs due to those escalating prices. Representative Ewing does not say by offering this amendment that he has either for or against the concept embodied in the legislation. What he is simply trying to do, in my opinion, is to get down to a realistic level so that in the event this piece of legislation passes we can deliver on the promises made with House Bill 547. The only responsible vote at this time is to support Representative Ewing and then take House Bill 547 on Third Reading for its content alone and for those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I urge every Member of the House to give senior citizens relief that we can deliver upon and, therefore; vote for Representative Ewing's amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further... Representative Madigan."



Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House of Representatives. I rise in opposition to the Gentleman's motion and in opposition to the remarks of the previous speaker. The previous speaker talked in terms of delivering promises to the people that we represent. I agree wholeheartedly with that comment, however; I suggest to you that if we adopt this amendment, the promise that we will deliver will be an empty promise. And the deliverer of the form speeches knows that. He knows that this will be another empty promise by the current administration in Springfield. I think the time has come for all of us to stand up and to say that we are tired of empty promises. We feel that it's time that we do something concrete, something tangible for the senior citizens who are plagued with rising costs of fuel to heat themselves during the winter. I urge a no vote on the amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "There anything further? Representative Ewing to close."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, this, this amendment is very clear. Do we want to help senior citizens or do we want to put pie in the sky? We're reducing this. This is a new concept. We're reducing the amount of household income or utility costs down from 75 to 25. We're reducing the amount of the grant so that this state can afford to do something for the senior citizens. If we want to start with everything, then we know that that Bill will never get signed. Will never become law. If we want to start this concept, we want to start it slowly, then you'll vote for this amendment. And I would ask for your support."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 2. Representative Conti."

Conti: "Well Mr. Speaker I was going to explain my vote."

Speaker Redmond: "OK. "

Conti: "Go ahead."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the



adoption of Amendment 2. Those in favor vote aye, oppose vote no. Have all voted who wish?"

Conti: "Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Conti to explain his vote."

Conti: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

I can remember the last two or three Governor's during the campaign and listening to the rederick how we're going to take the sales tax off of food and drugs. How we're going to help the poor people back home. How we're going to help the senior citizens and I think the credibility of public officials has gone down to the slowest ebb in the last ten years because of campaign rederick. There's no possible way we can keep this promise. There's no possible way we can keep building false hope up for these people and after we adjourn on June 30, we find that we can't deliver some of these Bills that we can go back home and say we passed. I can't imagine all those red votes up there. If they were responsible legislators, they really wanted to be sincere with the people back home let's come down to a realistic figure where we can help them."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 72 aye and 87 no and the motion failed. The Amendment's not adopted. Any further Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 552."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 552. A Bill for an Act concerning mobile home parks and the rights of mobile home owners and mobile home residents. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 563."



Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 563. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Purchasing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Motion to table Amendment #1 by Representative Getty...I think."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty on the motion to table Amendment 1."

Getty: "Mr. Speaker, I would ask that the Parliamentarian take a look at this. I'm moving to table it because it appears to be inconsistent with the title of the Bill. And therefore, it would...if it were to remain on the Bill, it would not be in proper order."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian, please come to the Podium. The Parliamentarian says that Amendment 1 is not in proper form because it does not amend the title. The Bill is Section 9, the amendment is Section 6. Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I have Amendment #2 which will correct the deficiencies in Amendment #1."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. The question is on Representative Getty's motion to table Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye', aye, opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carried, Amendment 1 is tabled. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Mahar, amends House Bill 563 on Page 1 by deleting line 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #2 takes care of the deficiencies in Amendment #1. And I would urge its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion on Amendment 2? The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the...Representative Getty."

Getty: "Mr. Chairman, I would...I'm talking. Mr. Speaker, I



would just question whether it would be germane and ask for the Parliamentarian to look at...to amend 2 Acts, the Capitol Development Board Act and the..."

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian. He questions the germaneness of the...will you repeat your..."

Getty: "The question is, is it germane considering the title of the Bill that we would amend the Capitol Development Board Act as well as the Illinois Purchasing Act?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Parliamentarian advises me that it's satisfactory and it is germane. Representative Getty."

Getty: "Well then I have no objection."

Speaker Redmond: "Okay. The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 2. Those in favor say 'aye', aye, opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it, the motion carried, the amendment is adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Hanahan, amends House Bill 563 by striking the period at the end of the last sentence in Section 1 and 2 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is a simple Amendment that if we're going to have somebody perform work that the minimum wage should be paid. And if they perform in the work of the prevailing wage employee, the prevailing wage be paid. I feel that this is only fair that we...with the zeal of having prisoners work, that the least we can do is compensate them at the proper rate of wages. This issue has been debated many times before. This Amendment is part of the Work Release Law that we now have in Illinois and it should be part of any work program that we adopt in this legislation... proposed legislation of House Bill 563 and certainly is supported by...the Trade Union Movement. But certainly all of those who feel that unemployment should not be encouraged any further in the building trades of this



state and certainly by any exploitation of peonage by workers...work being performed by a person incarcerated in a...in a prison. So this Amendment is offered with that in view that if there is going to be a work performed, that it's at least minimum wage paid or, in the case of the construction work being performed, that it's the prevailing wage determined by the Department of Labor. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to ask, is Amendment #3 in order?"

Speaker Redmond: "Parliamentarian. The Parliamentarian advises me that it's in proper form but it doesn't make any sense. No, I don't know what the posture of the Bill is. The...question...question...Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I like those words. I rise in opposition to this Amendment because I think it is a total red herring. What it is going to do is actually gut this Bill and make it totally useless. The purpose of this legislation is to provide a means by which the many idle people in maximum security prisons can do something in those prisons. The...a Committee of this House last year, bipartisan Committee, visited the prisons, saw all kinds of need for some type of authority to allow the prisoners to work. Now I don't think I can understand the position of the Gentleman that...offered the Amendment. He's concerned about the laboring man in this state. I think we're all concerned about the laboring man, but I think if you went out and ask the laboring man on the street if he was concerned about putting some prisoners to work in the prisons, he'd be all for it. Because it's his tax dollars, like yours and my tax dollars that are paying for these people in there. If they can do something constructive and can



help themselves and get out of these prisons, that's what we want them to do. And I would urge that you soundly defeat this Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Van Duyne."

Van Duyne: "I'd like to ask the Sponsor a question, please?"

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Van Duyne: "Representative Hanahan, do we...if we have to pay this prevailing minimum wage, are we allowed to deduct for their board and room?"

Hanahan: "Yes, I see nothing wrong with that concept, so if you want to charge for whatever, that's fine with me. That has nothing to do with the Bill."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing. Pardon me. Representative Ewing. Davis."

Davis: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I served on the same House Committee last year that Representative Mahar served on. I'm a Cosponsor of this Bill, it was one of the strongest recommendations of that special Committee on Prisons. I've been fortunate enough to be appointed to the new special Committee on Prisons that the Speaker himself has taken a great interest in. And...a Resolution adopted in my insistence some two months ago to invite labor, organized labor, and Mr. Johnson, the President of the AFL-CIO, to join with us in trying to iron out problems that we knew would crop up of this ill. And I have the greatest respect and admiration for the zeal of the Representative from McHenry who pursues the interest of labor in a fashion that I only wish I could pursue the interest of business. And I feel that he is much more effective in many ways than I. However, I would ask him at this point to withdraw this Amendment simply because the Speaker's words were right, it doesn't make a lot of sense. And I would ask you, Representative, to pass on to Mr. Johnson and to labor interests that we're interested in working with you in correcting corrections, if you



will. But this is not a very good start, Representative, and I would suggest to you that it would be wise to withdraw it and work with us on this basis. There are protective devices in the...in the Acts as they now exist to recognize the trades and have inmates work under trade supervision. I hope would that you would withdraw it and if not, Ladies and Gentlemen, I would certainly urge that you defeat this bad Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Stearney."

Stearney: "Will the Gentleman yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Stearney: Representative, I understand this Amendment would provide that the prisoners in the state institutions would be paid a prevailing wage. Is that right?"

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Representative Stearney, that would be correct if they're doing work that was to be performed by a civilian that has not been incarcerated in performing his or her work in lieu of..."

Stearney: "Right, so..."

Hanahan: "...unincarcerated persons..."

Stearney: "...so that individual may make 4 dollars, 6 dollars, 8 dollars an hour?"

Hanahan: "\$10.50, 11...right."

Stearney: "Right. Well, have you provided also for pension benefits in this Bill for the prisoners?"

Hanahan: "No, I don't that the prevailing wage law calls for the pension benefits."

Stearney: "Have you provided in this Amendment sick time for these prisoners?"

Hanahan: "No, that isn't called for in the prevailing wage law either."

Stearney: "Have you provided in this Amendment vacation time for these prisoners?"

Hanahan: "That's not called for in the prevailing wage law



either. You should know what the prevailing wage law calls for before you ask those kinds of silly questions."

Stearney: "That's all the questions I have, Representative."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Just...Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'm always amused when people who are high up in the labor movement get on a little peanut deal like this when their own Members are driving a Toyota...a Toyota car ought to buy a Soni TV set at a store that's manned by nonunion people. I think if they would spend a little more of their time trying to get their own Members to buy American products made by American labor, we'd be better off instead of fooling with this."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Brummer."

Brummer: "I move the previous question."

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman has moved the previous question. The question is, shall the main question be put? Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye', aye, opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. Representative Hanahan to close."

Hanahan: "Members of the House, while some people may think this is frivolous or a less than meaningful Amendment, let me bring back some facts to your mind about what the word peonage stands for. Peonage is...the reason why the Sponsor of this Bill is asking for this law and the worthy work of Represen...other Representatives that were put in on this Bill were put in because there's law and there's statutes right now prohibiting what they're trying to do. You see it isn't something that they're coming up with a new idea. Years ago the General Assembly established that in Illinois we would not allow peonage. That's the statute. Now what they're trying to do is camouflage the issue by saying that they're a bunch of goody-two-shoes and they're really going to do something good for those incarcerated felons that are really sitting



in prison just wasting away. What they would really have you try and believe is that these people somehow are going to be rehabilitated and somehow they're really going to be offering them something good with this House Bill 563. Well if they really wanted to do something good for them, they would insure the fact that not only would they get a good rehabilitation program but be adequately compensated at the same time. So that there would be a desire and work ethic instilled in a prisoner while he is incarcerated. This Amendment goes right to the heart of that. And I'm sorry that it doesn't make sense to some people. And I'm sorry it doesn't fit the Bill as originally introduced and passed on to the floor of this House, that's not my fault. The Reference Bureau drafted this Amendment, I told them what I wanted in it. But as long as this Amendment is in good order and can be adopted to the Bill, the intent of the Legislation can be carried out by the its adoption. And I might point out, Ladies and Gentlemen, that the intention of this Amendment is so that we do not go backwards into the Eighteenth and Nineteenth Century in the way we treat our prisoners. And have them performing work in lieu of our free citizens, putting them on the unemployment scrap-heap, telling them...telling our citizens that are paying the taxes, that you don't deserve to work, that we've got...we could have that work performed by a prisoner who's incarcerated for nothing and you people could pay the taxes when you find work so that you would be stepping backwards into the days when we had peonage. That's trade union movement and all right thinking citizens of Illinois stand against peonage. It is not a new term, it's just sort of been glossed over in the last ten or twenty years. Nobody talks about it anymore. But it's going on in Illinois today and it will even be further enhanced with this kind



of legislation unless you protect yourself. Protect yourself by saying that if a person works, the minimum wage would be what would be paid or the prevailing wage if he's doing prevailing wage work. And if you want to do what Representative Van Duyne said, charge room and board or do any of the other things to cause that prisoner's wages to be deducted to the cost of the incarceration or to repay the victim that maybe that prisoner has caused undue harm for. This is the way you do it. But you don't do it by putting people on the scrap-heap of unemployment in the guise of reform that somehow peonage of the good things in 1979. And I suggest to you, Ladies and Gentlemen, this is a labor issue. This is an issue that separates people who are for the best in life, less prisoners, less crime and rehabilitation in the truest sense...and those that really want to kid us and say there's something right about peonage in 1979. And I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Redmond: "The question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the amendment. Those in favor of the motion vote 'aye', opposed vote 'no'. Representative Conti to explain his vote."

Conti: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd never question the integrity or the intent of the Sponsor that is trying to put this amendment on, but it seems to me, he might be a little bit more sincere if he had put the amendment in better working...in better wording than it is. It's absolutely ludicrous for us to vote...I don't have to talk I can see we've got it defeated."

Speaker Redmond: "Have all voted who wish? Representative Bullock to explain his vote."

Bullock: "Mr. Speaker, I don't think it's necessary. I think the sentiments of this House have been expressed quite profoundly."



Speaker Redmond: "Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there's 32 'aye' and 103 'no'. The Gentleman's motion failed. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #4, Mahar, amends House Bill 563 on page 1, line 1 by deleting...amends Section 6 of and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mahar."

Mahar: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I ask to withdraw Amendment #4?"

Speaker Redmond: "The Gentleman withdraws Amendment 4. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 573."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 573. A Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Income Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment... Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, Schuneman. Amends House Bill 573 on page one line 23 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schuneman. Did you say Schuneman is the Sponsor of Amendment 2? Representative Schuneman."

Schuneman: "I withdraw..."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment 2 is withdrawn. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, Ewing. Amends House Bill 573 on page one by deleting all of line one through 25 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, for some weeks now we have been, some of us have been working to try and put this Bill in shape. I believe that this amendment has been at least cleared



with both sides of the aisle and I'm referring to the problem whereby this General Assembly passed legislation requiring withholding from all out-of-state residents. Unfortunately, the Department of Revenue did not get the regulations out on this until the ninth month of the year in which the businesses in this state were supposed to be withholding. This Bill merely is a Bill to allow grain dealers particularly and others in that area who must get certified audit to be able to get a certified audit even though they haven't withheld this income. It does not relieve those who are obligated to pay the tax nor does it change the withholding law in this state. But it, the amendment is strictly, as I said, it says 'no person subject to withholding requirements of this section for payment made to non-residence during the period January 1, 1978 to January 12, 1979 is liable for any criminal or civil penalties or interests on account of a failure to withhold tax on such payments to a non-resident'. And I would ask for the approval of this amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Mugalian."

Mugalian: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Redmond: "He will."

Mugalian: "I, I just, I haven't seen Amendment 3 which is not the sponsors fault. The Digest only suggests one amendment. I know what the intention of this Bill is. I didn't even know there was an Amendment #2. Could you clarify that Tom?"

Ewing: "Well, Amendment #2 has been withdrawn. Amendment #3 has been put on file for, I'd say, at least two weeks."

Mugalian: "Would you mind just telling me then briefly what the amendment does? Have you got number 1?"

Ewing: "All it, all the amendments have tried to do the same thing. Hold harmless those people who didn't withhold income from out-of-state residence for the period from January 1, 1978 to January 12, 1979. That's when the



Governor's amendatory veto took affect and delayed the effective date of the out-of-state withholding. We have that gray area in there of a year and 12 days when, actually, business was under the obligation to withhold, but for approximately 10 months in that time didn't even realize it. Many of them didn't."

Mugalian: "Amendment 3 is the whole Bill."

Ewing: "Pardon?"

Mugalian: "Amendment 3 is the whole Bill."

Ewing: "Absolutely."

Mugalian: "Thank you."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 3. Those in favor say 'aye'. Representative Madigan, pardon me." Representative Madigan. I can't see you. You've got people standing between me and you. Representative Laurino."

Madigan: "You... You can't see that board in front of you."

Madigan: "He answered by question."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Getty." Getty. No discussion on Amendment 3?"

Getty: "My, my question was answered."

Speaker Redmond: "What was that?"

Getty: "My question was answered by the Sponsor."

Speaker Redmond: "OK. Question is on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment 3. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. They ayes have it. Motion carried and Amendment 3 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 602."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 602. A Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Yourell. Amends House Bill 602 on page one and line 19 and 20 by deleting legal de-



scription and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Yes, thank you Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This amendment, Amendment #1 to House Bill 602, was suggested by the Environmental Protection Agency and I move, do adopt on Amendment #1 to House Bill 60... 602."

Speaker Redmond: "Is there any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 602. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. They ayes have it. The motion carried. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 608."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 608. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #2, Friedrich. Amends House Bill 608 on page one and line one and five and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative McPike. Representative Friedrich. Amendment 2. 608." Representative Friedrich.

Friedrich: "I don't have an amendment on that that I know of, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Who's the Sponsor of Amendment 2? Oh, it's Representative Friedrich. He disowns it. Anyone want to Sponsor Amendment 2? I think Ryan drew it up. Well I guess since there's no Sponsor. Any other amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 625. On House Bill 351. Representative Getty had requested a fiscal note and I understand that that request has been withdrawn. Is that correct Mr. Clerk?"



Clerk O'Brien: "That's correct."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 625."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 625. A Bill for an Act to establish a program of financial protection with regard to catastrophic health care. Second Reading of the Bill. No... No Committee Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Are there any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, Chapman. Amends House Bill 625 on page two by inserting immediately after line 19 the following."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Madigan can you handle Amendment #1? Representative Chapman isn't here. Representative Madigan." Both by Chapman? Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, I believe that both of these amendments are identical and possibly the Clerk would verify that. It appears to me that there's been some error in the Clerk's Office and it, Amendment #1 and Amendment #2 are identical language."

Speaker Redmond: "They are identical."

Madigan: "And therefore, I would move, I move for the adoption of Amendment #1 Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? The question's on the Gentleman's motion for adoption of Amendment 1. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. Motion carried. The Amendment 1 is adopted. Amendment 2 is withdrawn. Any further amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 660." Former Senate Intern. Presently is a Member of the Senate. Senator Prescott Bloom. Up there. Graduate, graduate of Williams College. Peoria. Was he a House intern? 660."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 660. A Bill for an Act to amend sections of an Act relating to alcoholic liquors. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."



Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motion filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. 665."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 665. A Bill for an Act in relation to merit systems of Sheriff personnel. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments 1,2,3, and 4. This Bill has been read a second time previously."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendments 1,2,3, and 4?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #5, Darrow. Amends House Bill 665 on page one, line 24 and so forth."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Darrow."

Darrow: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. This amendment would merely provide for a referendum of... and signature of 1,000 people on a petition calling for that referendum if we went that route in establishing a merit commission."

Speaker Redmond: "Any discussion? Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "This is a good amendment as the Joint Sponsor of the Bill I support the amendment offered by Representative Darrow and it very simply indicates that the referendum which is provided for in the Bill could be by a 1,000 signatures or 5% of the population of the county and I would urge your support of it."

Kempiners: "Well Mr. Speaker it's a good Bill but unfortunately, the, the it's very vague and the Attorney General is beseeched with request for interpretation so we're, it just codifies it."

Speaker Redmond: "Is it 1,000 or 5% whichever is more or whichever is less?"

Kempiners: "It's whichever is less. Fewer. Whichever is few-



er."

Speaker Redmond: "OK. That was one of my prides and joy, you know, that merit system."

Kempiners: "Well, let me tell you Mr. Speaker. If it took you as long as it's taking us to get this passed I can appreciate what you went through."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further discussion on the amendment? Question's on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. The motion carried. The amendment~~s~~ adopted. Any further amendments?"

Hoxsey: "Because of the fact that the Environmental Protection Agency indicated they could not do that proper impact of environmental studies necessary for the farm land evaluation provided for in House Bill 682, Amendment 2 simply changes it from the Environmental Protection Agency to the Institute of Natural Resources. And also provides that the hearing called for in the Bill would be held in the county in which the farm land is located. That's all Amendment 2 does. Changes the agency that's going to give the impact study. What's the problem?"

Speaker Redmond: "Evidently, it's even worse than Representative Hanahan's amendment."

Hoxsey: "You're kidding. What's wrong with it?"

Speaker Redmond: "Few wide of the mark. He says Holy Cow."

Hoxsey: "Is that right? What's the matter with it?"

Speaker Redmond: "Original Bill is limited to exercise of eminent Domain by public utilities. The amendment... Amendment 1 and Amendment 2 have no relationship to that subject."

Hoxsey: "I don't see how that's possible."

Speaker Redmond: "Why don't you take it out of the record and discuss it with the Parliamentarian and we can straighten it out from there."

Hoxsey: "Alright Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Out of the record. 691."

Johnson: "Mr. Speaker, this simply does the same thing as to House Bill 786 the other amendment did it to 785, the effective date. I believe this is also agreed to by the Sponsor. It's just a clarifying amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "No objection I take it. Question's on the Gentleman's motion for the adoption of the amendment. Those in favor indicate by saying 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 788. A Bill for an Act in relation to the sentencing classification of armed violence with fire arms. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendment."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. At ease for a few minutes. 793."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 793. A Bill for an Act to amend the Safe Printers Contract Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Redmond: "Any motion with respect to Amendment 1?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No motions filed."

Speaker Redmond: "Any amendment from the floor?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "No Floor Amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. Will you pay attention.

The rules provide that on the Order of Second Reading we should take those Bills to which no motions have been filed to table Committee amendments and there are no Floor Amendments. Now what I would like to do is to reverse that process and leave those Bills later and take now the Bills that have Floor Amendments or motions with respect to Committee amendments. Now in that way we'll work through the contested matters and then as we get to the wee, small hours there wouldn't be any quarreling about it anyway and the Speaker and the Clerk and Representative Conti will stay here to make sure that things go alright. Now Representative Conti."

Conti: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. I think you're making a wise judgement in doing so. We're going to get out of here



or meet the deadline date. Of course, you all know that I was a strong advocate for not having any deadline date but I can't see no other alternative but to do what you're asking us to do tonight and I can't see an objection to that at all."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, could you explain again what you intend to do?"

Speaker Redmond: "If you look at... If you look at Rule 37 paragraph four, A4 it provides that on the Order of Second Reading you call the Bills to which amendments and motions to table Committee amendments have not been filed. To call those first. We have been going in numerical sequence. We haven't been following that. Now what I want to do is to eliminate those Bills that fall in that category, skip them over them and take those on which we have Floor Amendments and motions to table. Quite frankly, there's no need for any floor attendance when we're just going through the routine matters. I'm trying to save the time of the House because if I followed in this sequence..."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, as I understand it, you want to start calling now Bills that have amendments filed to them."

Speaker Redmond: "Amend... Motions on Committee amendments and Floor Amendments."

Telcser: "Alright. Now Mr. Speaker, you know that there are some Members who are missing tonight. There's some kind of event going on in town where Members are coming up in that and, personally, if I was me if we do this starting tomorrow if we have some advance notice, but I know this evening some Members have been leaving the floor, making an event and coming back and as a result the attendance on both sides of the aisle is up and down as the evening draws, draws on. And they've done that based upon the sequence of calling Bills pursuant to the rules. As I say, as far as I'm concerned, it's fine if we do that at



least if we have one day notice that we know..."

Speaker Redmond: "There wouldn't be any point in doing it because we're not scheduled to be here tomorrow night. I mean, the thing is that if you want to get these Bills to the Order of Third Reading, there's really no reason for complete attendance when we're taking matters where there are no motions on Committee amendments and no Floor Amendments. And we can call those numbers out. Theoretically, if I was following the rules I'd be taking those first and keeping everybody here for the controversial matters. I'm trying to reverse it."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I understand your dilemma and I, as I say, I would agree with you. But you take us by surprise now and you know that... I know that on my side of the aisle there are Members going up and back this evening out of the building to fulfill another obligation and they're doing so based upon what they feel will be called for the hour, hour and a half they're absent. And now..."

Speaker Redmond: "OK. It's alright with me. I'm just trying to save everybody time on this matter. Representative Polk."

Polk: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I disagree with my, one of my leaders but I think the idea, the intent of what you're trying to do is move this legislation and if we get them, if we can agree that, if we have an opportunity later on this evening if we pass some legislation and people and pass some of the Bills and people come back and ask and request that their Bills be heard again, if we can do that, then I would have no objection."

Speaker Redmond: "We'd be turning back that people want to come back. This necessity. There's about 180 Bills in the category I'm talking about. There is no opportunity to devote on the Bills that I'm talking about Representative Telcser. All you do is read it, Second Reading and move it to Third. There's no vote on it. So it doesn't make



any difference if you're here, in the Black Angus, or the caucus room, of St. Nick or where you are."

Telcser: "Why do you say there's no vote Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Redmond: "Well there's no vote when you call, read a Bill on Second Reading and there's no motion to table and there's no Floor Amendment: You just move it to Third Reading."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, I understood you to say that you wanted to begin calling Bills this evening that had amendments or motions filed to them. You want to call Bills this evening that had a Floor Amendment filed?"

Speaker Redmond: "What I wanted, what I wanted to do is in the first run through now the Bills that have Floor Amendments or motions on Committee amendments."

Telcser: "Alright that's..."

Speaker Redmond: "And then when I get through and to take out as we go along to take out those that are merely reading Second Reading in which there is no action to be taken and no vote to be taken. Eliminate those and call and there's about 180 of those. Yeah, what's the number? 682, Representative Hoxsey. Was taken out of the record before we put it back in now. The Bill has been read. We were considering what amendment?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2."

Speaker Redmond: "Amendment #2. Representative Hoxsey."

Hoxsey: "Mr. Speaker, I think we've come to an agreement that the germaness is alright at this point so again I explain it's just, Amendment #2 just simply changes if from the EPA Department to the Institute of Natural Resources because EPA did not feel that they could do the economic or environmental impact statements on farm land that we needed to have done in the Bill and it also provides that the public hearing asked for in the Bill would be held in the area in which the farm land under consideration was to be, that they were looking at and so I ask a favorable..."



Speaker Redmond: "Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Question of the Sponsor, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Redmond: "Proceed."

Hoxsey: "Yes."

Schneider: "What is it that the EPA cannot do? What did they tell you then cannot do on this matter?"

Hoxsey: "The, what I'm asking for, sir, is an evaluation of farm land in regard to its production and whether the economic impact as far as the usage of marginal land over and above the use of prime farm land for the establishment of the energy sight."

Schneider: "Sounds good. It does not include like feed lots and things of that sort."

Hoxsey: "No, it has nothing to do with that. What we're..."

Schneider: "Thank you."

Hoxsey: "Yeah."

Schneider: "That's fine."

Speaker Redmond: "Anything further? Question's on the Lady's motion for the adoption of Amendment 2. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. Motion carried. The amendment's adopted. Any further amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "No further amendments."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading. The Parliamentarian. 501."

Clerk O'Brien: "This Bill has been read a second time previously and held for a fiscal note. The request for a fiscal note has been withdrawn."

Speaker Redmond: "Third Reading." Now our procedure is going to be that according to the rules, 37, we are going to call the Bills on Second Reading that do not have motions with respect to Committee amendments and on which there have been no Floor Amendments filed." And in that category the first one is 851 on page eight."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Hall: "No Floor Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. The Gentleman from Marion, Mr. Friedrich asks that leave of the House to bring House Bill 2485 which is on the Consent Calendar back to Second Reading for an amendment. Is there any objection? Mr. Friedrich. Gentleman on the floor? There he is. 2485. It's on the Consent Calendar. Pa... House Bill 2485. Gentleman from Marion, Mr. Friedrich."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Bill that, this is the



second amendment. The first one was put on the, in Committee which raised the price of the Digest. On this one, has to do with the composition of the legislative Reference Bureau. It still will remain two Members of the House, two Members of the... pardon Mr. Speaker, two by the Minority Leader and the same way on the other side with the Speaker and the President of the Senate as special members. And that's all the amendment does. I would move the adoption of amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Getty. On the amendment."

Getty: "Will the Gentleman yield? Do I understand that if a vacancy occurs that the remaining members are going to fill the vacancy?"

Friedrich: "If...if... if it is not filled by the appointing agency. Now this is, the reason I put that in, the Speaker was in the Executive Committee the other day. He has a Bill which makes this provision on all Committees. If a vacancy isn't filled in 60 days, then it can be filled by the other members."

Getty: "And that was adopted?"

Friedrich: "The Speaker's Bill was passed out of the Executive Committee to do this to all Committees. All Commissions."

Getty: "Alright, and that Bill is on the floor now?"

Friedrich: "Pardon me."

Getty: "Alright. That Bill is on the floor and you would, if that did not pass, you would conform this one back to the law is that correct? This would conform..."

Friedrich: "I'm just adopting the Speaker's idea which went out of Executive Committee Mr. Getty."

Getty: "Alright, I understand. No objection."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Friedrich, according to the Clerk's records one amendment is already worked in the Bill. Now is this Amendment #1 then?"

Friedrich: "This is Amendment #2. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Is that correct Jack? The Clerk asks leave to change the amendment on it's face to Amendment #2. There was a printing error. Is there any objection to. Leave is granted. Then Clerk will kindly change it to Amendment #2. Is there any further discussion on Amendment #2 to House Bill 2485? Gentleman moves that the House adopt Amendment #2 to 2485. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye' aye, all oppose. Amendment #2 is adopted. Any further amendments."

Clerk Hall: "No further amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading."

Friedrich: "Mr. Speaker, I believe this would go on Short Debate at this point, is that right? It came off Consent."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman has to have leave to have the Bill put on Short Debate. Is there any objection? Hearing none. The... House Bill 2485 is on Short Debate. On House Bills Second Reading appears House Bill 800. The... according to the Clerk there are six new amendments at the Clerk's desk and the amendments are not printed will not be able to hear the Bill until the amendments are printed. The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Move the Bill to Third Reading then and I'll move it back after it's gone to Third. I did, did... you had no right to hold the Bill on Second Reading because they didn't have their amendments ready. My amendments in the Committee are ready, the Bills in proper form, and let's move the Bill. If they haven't got their amendments. I'll move it back from Third but I want it to go to Third tonight. With or without amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well, I'm sorry. The amendments are offered."

Hanahan: "The amendments are printed from Committee. They're the only amendments I'm interested in."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well I'm sorry, but the amendments have been offered. There on, by the Clerk's desk. They'll have to be printed and distributed. House Bill 814."



Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Point of order. Under what authority do you have? Where's the rule that allows you to hold that Bill on Second Reading Mr. Speaker. Them rules are for all the Members here."

Speaker Lechowicz: "There's no question about the rules being... I hope you listened to them."

Hanahan: "I'm listening to the rule Mr. Speaker and I'm question the..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "And the amendments have been filed with the Clerk and they'll be printed and distributed and considered. According to the rules. House Bill 814. 814."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 814."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Good. 814. Read the Bill."

Clerk Hall: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Retailers Occupation and Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any amendments... Any motions?"

Clerk Hall: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Hall: "None."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. 821. We'll hear it when the time has come."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 821."

Speaker Lechowicz: "821."

Clerk Hall: "A Bill for an Act to amend the Industrial Development Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions?"

Clerk Hall: "No motions."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Amendments from the floor."

Clerk Hall: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. 824."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 824. A Bill for an Act to amend... to revise the law in relation to township organizations."



Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions from the floor? Alright,
"No Committee amendments? Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Hall: "No Floor Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. 826."



Clerk Hall: "House Bill 826. A Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any Amendment from the floor?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #1, Deuster, amends House Bill 826 on page 1 by deleting line 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 826 amends the School Code to allow the teachers to bargain collectively on all matters, working conditions. And, of course, most people know that bargaining collectively is certainly inconsistent with the provisions of the School Teach Tenure Law which determines how teachers are to be dismissed. It seems to me, and I hope that it will seem to the majority of the Members of the House, you can't have it both ways. You can't have the tenure law that locks you in virtually to a guaranteed job to age 70. And, on the other hand, bargain collectively and negotiate for these matters. So if we're going to have collective bargaining, we should not continue the stringent requirements that are in the School Code relating to the dismissal of teachers commonly known as the School Teach Tenure Law. So Amendment #1 would delete those provisions relating to tenure so that these matters may be collectively bargained. And all of the Members who believe in collective bargaining ought to believe in the right of collectively bargaining over..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Mr. Deuster..."

Deuster: "...all other conditions of employment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster, excuse me for one second.

The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Matijevich. What's your point?"

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, I hate to rise, but I've been sitting kind of quietly and when any one Member, I think is



trampled on by the rules, I just have to get up. And I think under Rule 37, I believe it's 37, that Tom Hanahan was right that you've got to go by numerical order.

You've got to go back to House Bill 800 and you better hear that Bill right now if you don't...if you feel like you're going to operate under the rules."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Matijevich, it's my intent...and I instructed the Clerk's office quickly...as quickly as possible, to print those Amendments so that they can all be heard at the same time. Excuse me. Mr. Hanahan, please put him on."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, there is no exemption in the rules of this House for what you just stated. That rule is specific, you're trampling on the rights of me, it could be you next time or it could be any Member of this House. You're absolutely in error. If there's somebody who wanted to write up an Amendment, they had plenty of time, this Bill isn't hurried through this House."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Tom..."

Hanahan: "I said I'd move it back from Third Reading. I persist under Rule 37 to have my Bill put on that call right this moment and for us to conduct House Bill 800 and hear that on Second Reading."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Tom, it is my intent, that when we get through with this Bill that's up on the Calendar, to go through...to go through to your Bill, to consider the Amendments that have been printed. You've given your word on this House floor you'll bring it back for the additional Amendments that have been filed as of now and that's good enough for me. Alright. We will consider the Amendments as filed, we'll move the Bill to Third Reading and with your intention to bring it back to Second for the consideration for the...of the amendments as filed as of 9 o'clock tonight. Is that correct, Sir? There's no problem, Tom. Right after we get...through



826. The Gentleman from Kankakee, Mr. Ryan."

Ryan: "Well thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm not sure now what the status of House Bill 800 is. Can you enlighten us all now that you've made your deal with Mr. Hanahan."

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, Sir, there was no deal made. I think that it is..."

Ryan: "Well, what's going on here?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "There is no deal made, Sir. I think... we're trying to save a little time of the House and as you...it was pointed..."

Ryan: "You've passed 800. You're in the middle of Representative Deuster's Amendment, I don't know how we can go back to 800."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm on a point of order raised by Representative Matijevich. His point is well taken and it was also brought to my attention by Representative Hanahan and it's my intent after we get through with 826 to back to 800 to consider the Amendments that have been printed with...and if they're adopted or denied, move the Bill to Third Reading with the understanding of the Sponsor to go back and when those Amendments that have been filed and printed for reconsideration on the Bill on Second Reading. House Bill 826. The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the School Code presently allows a school teacher to be dismissed for immorality. I know that a lot of the teachers would like to get that out of the Statute. What is it...morality? I believe the school teachers would like to negotiate and collectively bargain their working conditions and the procedures by which they are to be dismissed. House Bill 826 would do that. But in order to fully implement the objective of House Bill 826, which is to allow free and full collective bargaining, we've got to get rid of the Teacher Tenure Law which puts



forth the conditions by which the teachers are to be dismissed. I don't think the two are compatible. House Amendment...Amendment #1 to House Bill 826 will repeal the School Teacher Tenure Law and allow for the teachers and the school boards to negotiate the manner in which teachers are to be dismissed. This is probably in the best interests of the children and the educational policies and objectives of our state. I would urge your support for Amendment #1."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Darrow."

Darrow: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he will."

Darrow: "Representative Deuster, could you explain this Amendment in greater detail? I notice that there are a number of Sections in this amendment but without having the School Code before me, I don't know what those are. Would you go into more detail?"

Deuster: "Well, I would be happy to, I have the School Code here. These are the Sections that relate to the School Code...to the provisions relating to what is known as continuous contractual service. What that means is that once a teacher passes a probationary period, why they enter into a continual contractual service. And they cannot be dismissed except if you establish that they are guilty of cruelty or immorality or other sufficient cause. And as most of us know, the practical affect of that is that the teachers are pretty much guaranteed a job until age 70 and it's very difficult at all to go through the ...to prove that they are either immoral or incompetent. Incompetent probably means you aren't able to hold a piece of chalk in your hand. Wisconsin, the state to our North, doesn't have tenure. There's nothing sacred or important about tenure. Due rights, due process rights for the teachers can be...undoubtedly will be



collectively bargained and negotiated. I...the Amendment does refer to those Sections that establish tenure. We could discuss tenure for three hours, I don't think we need to do that. Most of the Members know what the tenure procedures are."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Willer."

Willer: "Yes, would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he will."

Willer: "Representative Deuster, if this Amendment is adopted, will you then vote for the Bill?"

Deuster: "I didn't hear your question, there's a little..."

Willer: "If this Amendment is adopted, will you then vote for the Bill?"

Deuster: "Well I'd exercise my judgement at the time of final passage. I...I must say it would be...it would be something I'd reflect upon. First of all, my wife just got tenured, so I would have to consider carefully that. I might not...I might vote 'present' because of the conflict of interest, Representative Willer."

Willer: "Oh, come on."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he will."

Stuffle: "Representative Deuster, is there any reason that you want to discriminate against downstate teachers in the fact that your Amendment only repeals tenure for them and it doesn't repeal tenure for Chicago teachers?"

Deuster: "Well I'm not for any kind of discrimination."

Stuffle: "Let me speak to the Bill, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Please proceed."

Stuffle: "This Amendment only deletes tenure in Article 24 which affects downstate teachers. Representative Deuster didn't bother to delete tenure for Chicago teachers in Article 34. And I think this is a highly



discriminatory Amendment that ought to be defeated for that reason alone. As well as the fact, that deleting tenure, I think, has little to do with this particular Bill on teacher organizing rights. I think teachers would be very happy if they had the situation in the State of Wisconsin where they do have the right to organize and bargain collectively. The Amendment should be defeated for those reasons."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Livingston, Mr. Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman has moved the previous question. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', aye, all opposed... The previous question has been moved, the Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, to close on Amendment #1."

Deuster: "The merit of this amendment is obvious to everyone I'm sure and I would appreciate your green vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall Amendment #1 be adopted? All in favor vote 'aye', all opposed vote 'nay'. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly, to explain his vote. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there's 25 'ayes', 120 'nays', 1 recorded as 'present'. The amendment is defeated. Any further amendments? Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #2, Deuster, amends House Bill 826 on page 1 after..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, on Amendment #2."

Deuster: "Well, Mr. Speaker, this amendment is simple and short and I'll read it. It says that, 'public school teachers shall have no right to go out on strike and those teachers doing so shall be subject to dismissal. That happens to be the present law, the policy of the State of Illinois..the law of the State of Illinois right now



and I'm holding the court decision in my hand. There's a long line of cases that simply say public employees... all public employees have no right to strike and especially school teachers. And the reason for that...this court decision involving a Kankakee case, said the universal view is there's no inherent right of municipal employees to strike against their government employer, whether federal, state or a political subdivision thereof. And that a strike of municipal employees for any purpose is illegal. The underlined basis for this policy against strikes by public employees is the sound and demanding notion that governmental functions may not be impeded or obstructed as well as the concept that the profit motive inherent in the principle of free enterprise is absent in government functions. Public employees and teachers have no right to strike. And the reason behind this..the court laid out, is that if you pick up the Constitution of the State of Illinois you'll find that in Article 10 relating to education it says all of us, that's the state, we shall provide for an efficient system of high quality public educational institutions and services. How can we possibly give the children of the State of Illinois high quality education if we allow teachers to walk out on the kids and go out on strike. That's just inconsistent, it's wrong. The Supreme Court of the State of Illinois has said so and all that Amendment #2 does is to state that policy, that existing policy of our state which is sound and wise and is in the interest of not people who want to organize unions and collect union dues or be union organizers or promote strikes...promote striking, but this Amendment is...is in the interest of the children for whom we are...we have established the education system. Now are we for the kids or are we for...encouraging by adopting a law encouraging the teachers to walk out on their professional



obligations. Amendment #2 simply says, what the court has said, that there's no right to strike. And if they do walk out on their professional obligations, that it will subject them to dismissal. Now for the children of Illinois, let's keep the schools running and adopt Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Winnebago on Amendment #2, Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Yeah, will he yield for a question?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "He indicates he will."

Giorgi: "Tell me, what happens to a member of the Bar Association that represents these striking teachers when he goes in to court and he knows the law doesn't allow it?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Would you repeat the question, please?"

Giorgi: "Yeah, what happens when a member of the Bar Association that goes in to court and represents these striking teachers when the law doesn't allow a strike?"

Dueter: "Well, everyone, even criminals..."

Giorgi: "First of all, does he get his fee?"

Deuster: "Even a person that commits murder is entitled to counsel, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Tell me this, does he get a fee for this? Is there a recommended fee by the Bar Association?"

Deuster: "For what?"

Giorgi: "For representing striking teachers when it's against the law to strike."

Deuster: "Not that I know of."

Giorgi: "There's no fee recommended?"

Dueter: "I'm not aware of any fee, but I..."

Giorgi: "Are the lawyers doing it for nothing?"

Deuster: "Anybody that violates the law, your constituents or mine, you or me or anybody on this floor, has a right under our system to be defended in court. We're not talking about that."



Giorgi: "How many stoppages have we had since September in Illinois? You want to call them strikes or work stoppages? How many have we had in Illinois since September? Are you prepared to..."

Deuster: "I don't know since September. I haven't been counting them."

Giorgi: "I understand there were at least 75 strikes in Illinois by striking school teachers. Did anyone go to jail over it?"

Deuster: "Persons who violate the law are...do so with an awareness of what the consequences might be. Now sometimes school boards, when there's an illegal situation, go to court and seek some relief for the benefit of the community, the children and the taxpayers. That they can do. And I'm fearful that this Bill without the Amendment would destroy that right to...to represent the interest of the children and the public...interest."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Madigan."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise on a point of information for the Body and for Representative Giorgi, in particular. The recommended fee schedule of the Bar Association has been banned by the Supreme Court."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly."

Kelly: "Mr. Deuster, I'm not opposed to a right to strike provision in my particular legislation, but I am very much opposed to having your Amendment which would specifically outlaw the right to strike. I intentionally have taken this provision out to make the legislation more accommodating to people like yourself and I certainly would be very opposed to Amendment #2."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, it is important to point out and remember what Representative Deuster said. He referred to a case in Kankakee and to other cases...it said there



was no provision in the law to allow a strike by municipal employees. Those cases did not deal with teachers and he knows that there is no provision in the law anywhere that says teachers cannot strike. This Amendment says that teachers can be dismissed regardless of how arbitrary or capricious the school board might be in their actions. If they flatly refuse to bargain in good faith, if they flatly refuse to sit down and talk about the issues, if they flatly refuse to except any contract, they do that, they could act in the most arbitrary manner and if any teacher went out with cause to strike, he could...he or she could still be dismissed. This flies in the face of anything that's inherently fair. He knows the teachers have been going out on strike and he knows they're going to go out on strike and he knows that those court cases didn't deal with teachers specifically. They dealt with municipal employees, his own words, he quoted from that particular court case. The law does not prevent strikes anywhere, I reiterate. It's a last chance economic weapon that's necessary to strike and he knows that as well. People don't go out on strike for the sake of it when they're going to lose pay, when they're going to have to walk the picket lines, they go out as a last resort. Representative Kelly's Bill doesn't say anything about the right to strike. This Bill is an attempt to prevent strikes by an orderly process as are the other Bills on this floor. And for those reasons the Amendment ought to be defeated."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Piel."

Piel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I move the previous question."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman has moved the previous question. All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed. The previous question has been moved. The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, to close."



Deuster: "Well Representative Stuffle is normally accurate. I don't know who gave him his information, but I'm holding in my hand the case of the Board of Education of Kankakee, School District #111, decided in September 22, 1970 involving a teacher's union...teachers that went out on strike. And I'm reading from what the court said. It says, 'A strike by school employees is unlawful as being in violation of the expressed public policy of this state.' It said it would cause irreparable damage to the public and it would violate the Constitutional duty to provide the district with a thorough and effecient system of free schools. There's no question but the courts have held that school teachers have no right to strike, that that's unlawful. And anybody that thinks about what the purpose of a public school is will appreciate that. I think you all understand this and I would urge your adoption of Amendment #2 which would codify and express the existing Illinois law."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall Amendment #2 be adopted? All in favor vote 'aye', all opposed vote 'nay'. Billy, vote me 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 39 'ayes' and 100 'nays', 2 recorded as 'present', the amendment is not adopted. Any further amendment?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #3, Deuster, amends House Bill 826 on page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, on Amendment #3."

Deuster: "We are all interested in avoiding conflicts of interests. Amendment #3 provides that no person who is a member of the negotiating union or who has an interest in the outcome of the negotiations which is in conflict with the interests of the school board may participate in negotiations on behalf of the school board. This will



avoid conflicts of interest. It would not allow union presidents and union officers to engage in negotiation where they would benefit..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly, on the Amendment."

Kelly: "I think it's Amendment #3, isn't it? Amendment #3, yes. I rise to oppose Representative Deuster's Amendment. This Amendment just further restricts teachers from engaging in legal activities. I really don't see any need for the Amendment because the Section being deleted merely states, and I quote, 'No person or organization shall interfere with the right of public school teachers to engage in lawful activities of unions.' I can't see anything wrong with that provision. And I certainly am opposed to Representative Deuster's Amendment #3."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, to close."

Deuster: "Urge your adopt...your support of Amendment #3. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall Amendment #3 be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed 'no'. The 'noes' have it, the amendment is defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #4, Deuster, amends House Bill 826 by inserting after line 27 the following."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "We know that you can collectively bargain to give away the store or to provide for pay increases or provisions that would require the expenditure money. And if the local school doesn't have the money, where are they going to get it? They going to write some plaintiff letters down to Springfield and ask us to appropriate the money? Amendment #4 provides that any agreement that is entered into pursuant to this new collective bargaining law, is subject to appropriation by



the school board. And also subject to the management rights of the school board. And I think it's quite clear that the...that any agreement that involves for paying money and that seems to be the principle concern of school teachers, they want more money and that's understandable. But when they do negotiate money and the school board says, 'We don't have it,' that for one reason or another the school aid formula isn't giving us the money we need and that's what we hear day in and day out and everywhere we go at meetings. We were just at one up in Lake County last Saturday, all of us up there hearing them ask for the money that they need to run the school. Now you get into a collective bargaining agreement that involves money, obviously, obviously that ought to be subject to the appropriation of the money by the school board. That's just a clarification really in my mind. No money is going to come unless they appropriate it so let's put it in the law so that it is understood by everybody who negotiates. I would urge your support for Amendment #4 and be happy to answer any questions."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle, on Amendment #4."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I rise again in opposition to Amendment #4. What Amendment #4 specifically says is after an agreement is reached in effect, entered into, signed, reduced to writing, so forth that the school board whether the money is there or not, even if the money is there, that school board can elect not to fund the provisions of that contract, as well as where the money may not be there. Even if the money is there it says they don't have to fund that contract and it says subject to the management rights of the school board. The school board under this Amendment can decide that anything they agreed to in the contract is subject to a



management right and they can delete that part of the agreement. If there's an agreement on tenure, the school board can say that's a management right issue and tenure is out of the contract. If they say that any other provision in the law is subject to their management right after the contract is written even, they can say that's out of the contract. This is the most arbitrary and capricious Amendment that could be offered. It not only destroys collective bargaining rights in the Bill, it even destroys the situation that we have now and it ought to be defeated. It's worse than the other three Amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall Amendment #4 be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all opposed 'no'. Amendment #4 is defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #5, Deuster, amends House Bill 826..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "There is a problem with Amendment #5 and at this time I..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Do you want to table it?"

Deuster: "...I will table Amendment #5."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Why don't you just withdraw it?"

Deuster: "I will withdraw it..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #6, Griesheimer, amends House Bill 826 on page 1, line..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry, what? Pardon me. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly, for what purpose do you seek recognition?"

Kelly: "We've got a copy of the amendment. I was just asking if it was printed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Has the amendment been printed and



distributed, Mr. Clerk? Yes, it has. Please continue Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. As we've been sitting here listening to the review of the first four Amendments to this Bill, the people speaking in opposition to these Amendments have been crying 'Fairness, fairness, fairness.' I now will find out just exactly how fair you really are. Amendment #6 does one thing. It allows the teacher to decide whether he or she will be a member of your labor union. It merely adds the word, after the word 'participation' to include the concept of 'nonparticipating' teachers. If you are truly fair and you wish to attract teachers in to your labor union to collectively bargain, then there is no way that you can oppose the concept of allowing those teachers who are real professionals and not lacheys of labor to not participate. I feel this is a basic element of our American society. If you believe in fairness, you must adopt this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly...Amendment #6."

Kelly: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Amendment is the right to work Amendment. And I can't see where this Amendment would help the Bill and I don't see any...so I would ask for your opposition to House... Amendment #6."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Griesheimer, to close."

Griesheimer: "Ladies and Gentlemen, you see the problem with this legislation. It is being guided through by mindless organizers of unions who could care less for the individual teacher. If you talk to the average teacher in your district, they don't want to have anything to do with the IEA. They don't like the IFT. I would suggest to you that I would like to see the financial disclosures of every Legislator voting for this Bill to find out how



much money they've gotten from the IFT and IEA. This is a despicable position to take that you will not allow professional teachers not to join a labor union. I'm not suggesting that you not be allowed the right to collectively bargain, but what give you the right to force American citizens to belong to a dues paying organization that they do not wish to belong to? Put it right at your feet. You are not fair. You are not representing the teachers, you're after their dollars, their big bucks. That's the way it's always been, that's the way it will always be. I don't think there is an average Illinois citizen that's in favor of this Bill and I would suggest that 90% of the teachers are opposed to it. Those people that are for it are the people down here in the education meetings that are being paid huge salaries by the labor union, the IFT and the IEA, so lobby this Bill through. I urge your support of this Amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Question is, shall Amendment #6 be adopted? All in favor vote 'aye', all opposed vote 'nay'. The Lady from Cook, Mrs. Willer, to explain her vote. Timer's on."

Willer: "Well, just in answer to the previous Speaker. All contributions of 150 dollars and over are a matter of public record and he's free to look up all our contributions. And I'm not ashamed of my contributions."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Coles, Mr. Stuffle, to explain his vote."

Stuffle: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would point out to the Sponsor of the Amendment that we of the mindless persuasion, as Representative Willer pointed out, have our contributions as a matter of public record. We of the mindless persuasion believe that where people in a bargaining unit elect by majority rule to be part of it that then you ought to pay your fair share for what you get instead



of letting the union go and negotiate something and turn around and say I want the benefit, but I don't want to pay for it. And I also know that the 150 dollar plus contribution provision in the law also applies to public disclosure of those donations from the Chamber of Commerce and the Manufacturer's Association."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there is 51 'ayes', 97 'nays', 3 recorded as 'present'. The Gentleman's... is defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #7, Griesheimer, amends House Bill 826 on page..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I now have another Bill that would call upon you to use some of the fairness that you urging in the Deuster Amendments. This would merely add the words to the first paragraph as follows; 'That the persons who are supposedly benefiting from this Bill shall also have the equal right as individuals to refrain from such activities. There is again a basic right of every individual in this nation to participate or not to participate.'"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me, Mr. Griesheimer, there's a point of order being raised on the floor. Mr. Stuffle, what's your point?"

Stuffle: "My point is that all this is the same amendment with different words and it ought to be ruled out of order."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, I suggest the only thing out of order is the comments of that last Speaker who has been out of order for a good many months down here."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Would the Parliamentarian come up to the ...Speaker's well, please? Why don't you proceed with the Amendment. I think the vote is going to be the same. Please proceed with Amendment #7."



Griesheimer: "You have the wisdom of Solomon, Mr. Speaker.

But in any case, again I urge you to consider the fairness of this. It's been suggested by one of the prior Speaker's that by majority vote you will force and coerce people into an activity they do not wish to participate in. It's been suggested that you can do this by majority vote in our society. Well I suggest that when you have a right to free employment, you do not have such a mandatory right. And if you take this away from the people, eventually the people will consume you in any way that they find available to them. The teachers in most areas that I have spoken to do not wish to part of these labor unions. They are professionals, trained professionals, they do not like to strike, they wish to have the opportunity to teach the children of this state a good solid education which affects every one of us. All this amendment does is give the right to those teachers who do not wish to participate the right not to participate, not to pay money to a labor union who will again pass this money on to do whatever their bidding is. So long as it's been indicated by one of the opponents of the prior amendment that there is no secret, I would like those people who have received money from the IEA and IFT to stand up and put their hands wide above their head so that we know exactly what we're dealing with here. I think that would give you a better idea exactly how the IEA and IFT works. I don't wish to embarrass any of the school teachers here because obviously they have a conflict of interest."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly. And Mr. Coles...Mr. Stuffle, the Gentleman from Coles, the amendment is not the same. Mr. Kelly."

Kelly: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is another right to work amendment. And I'll say one thing, these teachers that do not want to participate, there's very



few of them that are willing to take lower salaries. They're very happy in their negotiations that the teams work out for them and I...that goes for in all areas of labor where labor has gone...made great strides for the working person. And I very much oppose this and I ask for the same vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The question is, shall Amendment #7 be adopted? All in favor vote 'aye', all opposed vote 'nay'. Billy. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 44 'ayes', 103 'nays', 2 recorded as 'present'. The amendment is not adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "No further amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Third Reading. On the Calendar is House Bill 800. The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I believe..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The gentle... Excuse me. The gentleman from Cook, Mr. Conti, what purpose seek recognition?"

Conti: "I don't know whether the real Speaker is in the vicinity of my voice but I know one thing that yesterday afternoon, I think, Teddy, you stood up with me last year on the same issue, where the Speaker made an announcement what our work hours were going to be. Now all of us ran for this office. We knew what the hours were going to be. I don't mind it so much, but when he said that we would adjourn at 10:00 tonight you're going to call House Bill 800 tonight with 31 amendments. We're going to be here until 1:30, 2:00 in the morning. You've got Page boys that have been working here since 7:30, 8:00 this morning. My day started at 6:30. You got clerical help upstairs that are not getting union wage scales and everything else. If we don't go home at 10:00 tonight, we'll never be able to believe that Speaker again whenever he sets a schedule. Some of us feel a little different about eating at our



desks. There's quite a few of us that haven't had any dinner yet tonight. Now if we're going to call House Bill 800 and we're going to be here till 1:30, 2:00 it's no wonder that we've got people going around pushing other peoples buttons because they, no one will never again believe the Speaker when he makes an announcement as to a schedule."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Conti, may I just point out to you that we have been here together for a good number of years and the matters that are before the House have to be considered at one time or another and it's in all fairness we are going to the priority of call and the Bill is being called at this time with the understanding that we're going to consider the amendments as printed. Gentleman asked that consideration to be extended and he's in his right to do so and then he must move the Bill to Third Reading, come back to Second Reading for the amendments that have not been printed. I know it's 9:30 exactly this evening and now we're on House Bill 800. Any amendments from the floor? Read the Bill Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Hall: "House Bill 800. A Bill for an Act in relation to the settlement of differences between public employers and public employees and to provide for collective bargaining. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments 1,3,4,5, and 6 were adopted in Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any motions on those amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "No motions filed."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #7."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Yes sir. The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan." What's your point?"

Hanahan: "Now Mr. Speaker, I 'd like to make this point for my colleague, Representative Conti, especially. We spent one hour on a Bill that was out of order in my judgement and I tried to point that out. Right now House Bill 800



is in the posture I'd like to see it moved. I am not even... I would like to see it move right this second. to Third Reading and we wouldn't have to be here for another five minutes as far as House Bill 800 is concerned. But that is now not up to me and it's not my doing that House Bill 800 may be debated into any hours that may be debated. As far as I'm concerned House Bill 800 could right now move to Third Reading. Everyone put it up or down as it is. It's the Sponsor's wishes that the Bill is in as good of form as it should be and if anyone wants to withdraw amendments or they want to put them on, it's those persons who are offering the amendment that are going, can cause you to miss your meal."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman's name has been mentioned in debate, Mr. Conti for a short rebuttle please."

Conti: "Yes, this is short rebuttal. As I said before, Tom I'm not going to argue the merits or demerits of your Bill but we made this Membership sit through a Perfunctory Session here for about an hour and a half when it was 7:00 when we could have been discussing matters as important as this at that time when we're a little more alert. I think an awful lot of the intent of Mr. Hanhan's Bill and I want to give some serious consideration and after 14 or 15 hours of work I doubt whether anyone could vote intelligently on 31 amendments at this time of the night."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Well we're going to try. Amendment #7."

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #7, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended in section 7-6 and so forth. Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Amendment #7, I think, cures a defect that was probably inadvertent on the part of the Sponsor. It is an unfair employment practice to discriminate against employees on the grounds of race, religion, and sex or national origin. Amendment #7 just adds age. I'm sure



that Representative Hanahan would probably concur with this amendment because it is established federal and state policy that we don't discriminate on the grounds of age. So I would urge adoption of Amendment #7 which adds age."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Han... Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "I concur Mr. Speaker. I..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman moves the adoption of the amendment to Mr. Deuster. All in favor signify by saying 'aye' aye, all oppose. Amendment #7 is adopted. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #8, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster,"

Deuster: "I'm sure, I'm sure Representative Hanahan will concur with this too. In the Committee and all the discussions I've heard with respect to this Bill, it is intended to be a Bill to provide these rights for public employees and not private employees at all. Amendment #8 just takes out the subsection relating to definitions which might possibly include private employers. We don't want to include private employers. This would remove all doubt that there involved. It all..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, we have already addressed that Section that Representative Deuster is eluding to on removing that Section. On Amendment #4, you'll find that it's in conflict with the Sponsor's intentions and the Amendment #4 clearly defines exactly the Section he's trying to amend with this amendment. I find it in conflict."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman says that Amendment #8 is out of order because it is in conflict with Amendment #4."

Hanahan: "It would completely confuse the issue there on Amendment #4 as adopted."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Do you want to withdraw Amendment #8 Mr. Deuster? Mr. Deuster, you check with your staff analyst to your right."

Deuster: "My staff man, I think that Section still leaves some doubt and I would just as soon strike out the Section. I know Representative Hanahan said that he was doing that but why don't we just take that subsection out Tom?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "No, I didn't... I want Representative Deuster to listen. Representative Deuster, I know your staff is advising you. Let me assure you the point that was brought up in the Committee was clarified to the objections that the Chamber of Commerce brought to the Committee and Amendment #4 was clarified. Now I mean you could persist in trying to goof up the rest of the Bill which I hope you're not trying to do by trying to adopt this amendment. This amendment would be in conflict with what we debated in the Committee and agreed to adopt with the Chamber of Commerce asked which the small retailers and the retail merchants requested and the Hotel and Restaurant Association requested. We go any further, we could be completely contrate to an agreement we reached in the Committee."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley."

Farley: "Yes, Mr. Speaker. Representative Hanahan is absolutely right and I would oppose Amendment #8 because Representative Deuster is doing exactly opposite of what Representative Hanahan did, in fact, in Committee. And I would oppose Amendment #8."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster:"

Deuster: "The Bill satarted out with a definition saying employers not covered by the National Labor Relations Act and so forth and it said whenever we use the word public the employer..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me. Would the Parliamentarian come



to the Speaker's rostrum please? Yes sir, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "On a point of order. I am not reasoning that his amendment is, it's something like the amendment I offered to Representative Mahar's Bill earlier. It's in order, it just goofs up a part of the Bill that I don't even think Representative Deuster wants to and I'm trying to explain that his amendment goes further than even he is on... It's not out of order. That point I'm not making. I'm just saying it does something that he doesn't realize with the rest of the amendments that have already been adopted."

Deuster: "Well I realize what I'm doing and I'm striking out a Section that might possibly include some private employers and I don't see any reason to refer to federal Acts. We're always talking about the State of Illinois. We hear... We're able to legislate without referring to federal Acts. So let's strike out this reference to the National Labor Relations Act."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Question is shall Amendment #8 be adopted? All in favor vote aye, all oppose vote nay. No. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 40 ayes, 93 nays, 2 recorded a present. The amendment's not adopted. Any further amendments."

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #9, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended by adding..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Amendment #9 states in, to more explicitly reflect in the statement of legislative findings what the Sponsor said in Committee and what I think is the spirit of the Bill that we want to protect the full freedom. That's what the Bill says. The full freedom of association. Well if you have the freedom of association that means that you're free to associate or may be free not to associate. Amendment #9 says..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from McHenry... association."



Deuster: "Yeah, it is further declared to by the policy of the State of Illinois that an individual worker shall have the right not to associate as a member of a labor organization and the exercise of such right of non-association shall be protected."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Hanahan." Amendment #9."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I wouldn't want to presume and the time of the Members of the House of the right to work amendment. I ask a negative vote on it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all oppose. Nos have it. Amendment #9 is defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #10, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended in section 7 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "This is suppose to be a Bill that talks about freedom of associating and yet you'll find if you read the Bill in its present form..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "What does the amendment do?"

Deuster: "I'll get to that."

Speaker Lechowicz: "It's the right to work."

Deuster: "No, it's not a right to work amendment at all. It deletes the provision in the Bill that would force non-union workers to pay something known as an appropriate service fee. Now I'll tell you, I got a phone call this afternoon from a poor, pethetic man out in my district..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Would you address yourself to the amendment. You know, the hour is late. We got a lot of work to do. Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I could almost raise a point of order. Sooner or later it's going to have to be raised. These amendments are right to work amendments in different language but the same intent. It is clear and it's already been defined as right to work. It's a dilatory tactic to tie up and presume upon all the Members of this House



on their dinner hour to continue to debate issues that are defeated two to one. I urge a negative vote. I wish this Sponsor would just table these dilatory amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "'Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster to close."

Deuster: "All of us are elected to be down here and do our work whenever we're called upon. There's nothing dilatory about suggesting that individual citizens of Illinois should not be forced and dragged kicking and screaming into a labor union and be forced to pay dues whether we call them appropriate service fees or anything else. This is a freedom amendment. Yes it is. And it would protect the right of the individual not to be forced when he doesn't join that union to pay union dues. It's a basic American amendment and let's see how many of us are in favor of the freedom not to be forced to pay the dues. I urge the adoption of Amendment #10."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Question is shall Amendment #10 be adopted? All in favor say 'aye', all oppose say 'no'. Nos have it. Amendment #10 is defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #11, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended in section 9 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "A point of order on Amendment #11. Who's amendment is it? Mr. Deuster. Eleven's yours. Point of order by Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, the Gentleman has a technical error on Amendment #11 and it should not be Section 9 it should be Section 10 that you're addressing yourself to. I have no objection should you try and offer it. I'm against the amendment, but if you want... The amendment on its face I have no objection to that but if you want to withdraw it it's alright too. It's a bad amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "What does the Sponsor like to do? Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Representative Hanahan is right. I want to withdraw



... There's a technical problem with this and I do want to withdraw the amendment. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Fine. Leave. Amendment #12."

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #12, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800
111"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Excuse me. Amendment #11 was withdrawn. Amendment #12. 12." What? Did you read Amendment 12?
"Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Amendment #12 provides there's no public employees employed by a public employer shall withhold services to a public employer. I think everybody understands it. Nobody who is a public servant should have the right to walk off and, and abandon their duties of office. I would urge the amend... the adoption of Amendment #12."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I urge a negative vote on this amendment. The question of strikes are completely addressed by the Bill is amended already. It prohibits all strikes by police, fire, and prison guards. It prohibits any strike for recognition. Prohibits any strike during contract. It Prohibits any strikes without having first gone through mediation conciliation and fact finding and with a cooling off period included right now in the Bill. I think this is a bad attempt to try and curtail reasonable discussion nad labor relations and I ask a negative vote."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Deuster to close." Question is shall Amendment #12 be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all oppose 'no'. Nos have it. Amendment #12 is defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #13, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "This amendment provides that any collective bargaining agreement entered in to which is subject to appropriation by the Illinois General Assembly or is subject to appropriation by the Illinois General Assembly. Again, this is



obvious that we've got to appropriate the money. Where is the money coming from? Heaven or the State of Wisconsin or somewhere else. No. We've got to appropriate the money. This Amendment #13 I think should be added to clearly state that all of the..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. We already adopted Amendment #5 which puts in the management rights section. Nowhere in this Act is there any unconstitutional attempt to subvert or to in anyway delineate the right and power of this General Assembly or any other constitutionally formed Body. There is no attempt to collective bargaining to, to in any way defeat the power of this General Assembly from having the right to negate the appropriation that would take place by, that may be necessary to implement any kind of, of award by arbitration or through collective bargaining. No different, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, than the fact that we have a Court of Claims that may make awards to injured citizens of this state. There is no power in the Court of Claims to make me vote to except one of those awards. or to make 89 Members vote for that award. No different in collective bargaining. This is to be negated, it could be negated."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster to close."

Deuster: "Urge you favorable support for Amendment #13. Thank you."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Don't tell me to hold it. Your light wasn't on. The question is shall Amendment #13 be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all oppose. Amendment #13 is ad... defeated. Any further amendments?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #14 Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended by deleting paragraph A and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Fourteen has a technical problem and I would withdraw Amendment #14."



Speaker Lechowicz: "The gentleman withdraws Amendment #14.

Any further amendments.?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #15, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster. Amendment #15."

Deuster: "Amendment #15 is a good one. It says that the cost of fact finding proceedings accept the parties and the fees of the attorneys of the parties shall be born by both parties equally. This, this indicates that those who go in and ask for fact finding they'll both pay their share. They'll have their equal rights to pay what it costs and I would urge adoption of Amendment #15."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan.

Point on a point of order on Amendment #15. What's your point?"

Hanahan: "I hate to put my learned colleagues through this but you're also again in the wrong section of the Bill as amended and I raise this point. The amendment is technically incorrect. It should be Section 9 and the various subparagraphs are in error. I suggest very strongly, Mr. Deuster, I committee myself earlier instead of holding Representative Conti to his chair that maybe we should table these amendments and I told you I'd bring it back from Third Reading."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster on Amendment #15. Mr. Hanahan's point of order."

Deuster: "Well, Mr. Hanahan's got such a complicated Bill maybe he doesn't even remember the Sections numbers but there was an amendment earlier that said all of the Sections will be renumbered with a higher number and so instead of..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "No, the Gentleman's point is well taken."

Deuster: "His Amendment #5 did that..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Any you have to be accurate when you put these amendments on the floor, Mr. Deuster. The amendment's out of order. Any further amendments?"

Amendment #15. You can amend it on its face if you'd like to ask leave. But there's objection being raised so you should



withdraw that amendment. Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Do you have the Parliamentarian looking at the Bill? Representative Hanahan will remember in Committee that he adopted Amendment #5 which rennumbers all those sections and..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Epstein please come to the Speaker's podium. Mr. Hanahan would you kindly repeat you question for the Parliamentarian?"

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, no, I want to withdraw my point of order. Representative Deuster's right on Amendment #5. We did add a Section and they're renumbering a Section and he's attempting to address the right Section." So I'll withdraw my point of order. I'm still against the amendment but I didn't want him to offer a bad, technically a bad amendment."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster to close."

Deuster: "Well, I don't think any of us want to get to Third Reading with a Bill in which all the amendments have been rejected, particularly one that provides for such equality and fair play as saying that the parties on both sides pay their costs. That's what the amendment does. I would urge your consideration of it. This is really a chance to improve the Bill. Let's improve it."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Question is shall Amendment #15 be adopted? All in favor signify by saying 'aye', all oppose. Nos have it. Amendment #15 is lost. Any further amendment?"

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #16, Deuster. Amends House Bill 800 as amended..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "This amendment relates to a subject that has already been considered on several occasions that is that you can't discriminate on the basis of membership or non-membership in a labor union and because the House has already expressed its will and it's late in the evening, I withdraw Amendment #16."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman withdraws Amendment #16. Any



further amendments?" Any further amendments? 16 is withdrawn."

Clerk Hall: "Amendment #17, Skinner. Amends House Bill 800 as amended by Amendment 1 and so forth."

Speaker Lechowicz: "One moment Mr. Skinner. For what purpose does the gentleman from Cook, Mr. Bowman seek recognition?"

Bowman: "I don't believe we have a copy of this amendment on our desks. Is it in order at this time?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "I'm sorry. What?"

Bowman: "I don't believe we have a copy of the amendment on our desks. I don't believe the amendment is in order. I believe we should move this Bill."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Has the amendment been distributed? The amendment has not been distributed. Third Reading. May I point out to the Membership that the Sponsor has agreed to bringing the Bill back. The Bill's... The amendments that were posted. The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner on a point of personal privilege."

Skinner: "I was assured that the Clerk's office was competent to print the amendment. I could have gotten it printed myself. The last time I got it printed myself, the Clerk's office was speedy enough to get it printed. Now if the Clerk's Office is competent fine. If the Clerk's Office is not competent perhaps the Clerk's Office can tell us ahead of time. There he is, right in front of your face."

Speaker Lechowicz: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan. What's that? What? Mr. McHen... Mr. Hanahan from McHenry what's your point?"

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, I believe that the point was made earlier by yourself and by myself very clear that 9:00 p.m. would be the cut off date of any amendments that filed at 9:00 p.m. that were not distributed that we would bring the Bill back. I don't know what time Representative Skinner offered this amendment. I'm going to keep my word. If he submitted it before 9:00 p.m. I'll bring it back for it. But Mr. Speaker, I am informed that it is, was submitted after 9:00 p.m. and no other amendments



were offered at the hour of 9:00 p.m.. The tape was very clear about the specific moment that we would accept amendments."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Tape was very clear Mr. Hanahan. The gentleman from Macon, Mr. Borchers what purpose seek recognition?"

Borchers: "Mr. Bor... Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House. I'm a little tired of all this. I move we adjourn."

Speaker Lechowicz: "You haven't been recognized for that. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten what purpose seek recognition?"

Totten: "Mr. Speaker, thank you. An inquiry of the chair. If the amendments have been filed with the Clerk in timely fashion even though they are not printed, can you move the Bill to Third Reading or must it stay on Second till the Bills are... till the amendments that were timely filed..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "It'll be moved to Third with the understanding we're coming back to Second."

Totten: "By what rule?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "We already moved the Bill."

Totten: "Yeah, but by what rule? I think it's outside your..."

Speaker Lechowicz: "37. Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

SKinner: "Mr. Speaker I must admit that this did not get to the Clerk before 9:00 p.m. and I really don't care what the commitment was on this floor. I know what the commitment was last Saturday morning when Representative Hanahan was in a room with me and Representative Waddell and Senator Schafer. And this commitment was made to this concept because Representative Hanahan said he was opposed to having public employees strike. I ask of a minimum contempt fine to be in the Bill that would equal the salary of the public employee who was striking and he said yes. Now if he wants to break that commitment, that's fine. If he doesn't want to break that commitment I'm willing to work with him."



Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan on a point of personal privilege. His name was mentioned in debate."

Hanahan: "On a point of personal privilege, Mr. Skinner, let me assure you I don't give my word easily and I never renege on it and there's a lot of people here that were around for a long period of time that new I wouldn't break my word. For 94 ballots a couple of years ago for example and a few other things that happened. I said to you that it would be fair to look at the provision and if somebody violates the law, that there should be an examination on the contempt award that a judge could give to somebody who illegally struck and it was found illegally striking. I did not say that I would support an amendment that you introduced under House Bill 17 or Amendment #17 that very clearly takes away the rights of a person to have a fair hearing on whether or not he illegally struck or whether he struck with cause or anything like that. This amendment was not worked out with me and you. This amendment could have been offered and worked out since Saturday morning. Today it happens to be May 3. A long way since last Saturday morning and just two minutes ago a get a copy of an amendment that was not in accordance with what you and I talked about last Saturday morning. And I say to you sir, I don't break my word. If you come to me with an amendment yesterday or the day before we would have worked it out. I need legal help on figuring out when the judge should have a right to give an award and penalty on a contempt citation. That's something I could do in two minutes here on the floor on a Bill I've been working for for ten years and so sir I take offense that you would say to this House that in any way I have, any way, sort of renege on a commitment. I will work with you on that same and I say that publicly here now. I will work with you to see to it that an illegal strike, that an illegal



striker and that an illegal employer have the same penalty for violating this section of the Act."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Farley, what purpose seek recognition?"

Farley: "Yes, what Order of Business are we on?"

Speaker Lechowicz: "Was a point of personal privilege sir."

Farley: "I see."

Speaker Lechowicz: "Now, the Bill is on Third Reading and it'll be brought to Second according to the Sponsor when the rest of the amendments are printed and distributed." According to the Clerk, there were three Bills advanced from Second to Third in error. The fiscal notes were not filed and the Bills were read in advance. And I ask leave of the House to bring three Bills that were advanced from Second to Third with the fiscal notes, the fiscal notes that were not filed in proper order. Those are House Bills 1248, 1258, and House Bill 1737. Those Bills will be placed back on Second Reading awaiting a fiscal note. Any announcements?" Committee Reports."

Clerk Hall: "Representative Capparelli, chairman from the Committee on Executive to which the following Bills were referred, action taken April 3, 1979 and reported the same back with the following recommendations: Do pass House Bill 1225, 1407, 2355, 2369, 2453, 2512, 2657. Do not pass House Bill 1520. Do pass as amended House Bill 1522, 1891, 1944, 1953, 2349, 2616. Do pass Short Debate Calendar, House Bill 1111 and House Bill 2634. Interim Study Calendar. House Bills 1417, 641, 1280, 1917, 2244, 2281, 2454."

Speaker Redmond: "Any further, any announcements? Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, I have a motion asking leave of the House to waive the rule to bring out onto Second Reading a transfer for the Department of Revenue. I'd like to if we could, hear that motion now."

Speaker Redmond: "Representative Matijevich."



Matijeich: "Mr. Speaker, that's been cleared with both sides of the aisle. Their going... They will have pay days and they've got to get that done. So we've all agreed to that."

Speaker Redmond: "Would you state your motion again?"

Ewing: "The motion is to suspend the appropriate rule to allow immediate consideration of Senate Bill 357."

Speaker Redmond: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Representative Matijeich."

Matijeich: "The leave is to bypass, the motion is to bypass Committee and put it on the Order of Second Reading. Right. Thank you. That'll be Second Legislative Day."

Speaker Redmond: "OK. Question is on the Gentleman's motion. Those in favor vote aye, oppose vote no. Bypass Committee and put it on the Order of Second Reading. What's the Bill number?"

Matijeich: "Senate Bill 357."

Speaker Redmond: "357. Have all voted who wish? Come on; come on, come on; come on; come on. This question there's 121 aye and 2 no and the motion carries. Death Resolution. Have you read the Bill? We'll read it tomorrow. Death Resolution."

Clerk Hall: "House Resolution 258. Whereas the Members of this Body will sad to learn of the passing Mrs. Nina..."

Speaker Redmond: "Wait a minute. We can, we can do that tomorrow. Representative Conti. Adjournment Resolution. Motion for adjournment and I'd like to have you read the clock. Tell us what time it is."

Conti: "OK. I think I owe you an apology. It's 10:00 and I'm sure glad that you're keeping your word today. I move for the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution."

Speaker Redmond: "Question's the Gentleman's moved that we now adjourn till 11:00 tomorrow morning. Representative Ryan."

Ryan: "Well thank you Mr. Speaker. I would like to remind the Republican Members to be at the State House Inn in the



morning at 7:30 and we'd like to have you there too if you like."

Speaker Redmond: "What's there?"

Ryan: "Surprise. Why don't you stop by and see."

Speaker Redmond: "7:30 in the morning? Next President of the United States. Is Jimmy Carter there? The question's on the Gentleman's motion to adjourn till tomorrow morning at 11:00. Those in favor say 'aye' aye, oppose 'no'. The ayes have it. Motion carried. At 10:00 we adjourn till 11:00 tomorrow morning."



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
