\$28, Satterthwaite, resolved. by the House of Representatives of the Eighty-Second General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this Resolution, a proposition to amend Section 1 of Article III of the Illinois Constitution to read as follows: Article III. Suffrage and Elections. Section 1. Voting Qualifications. Every United States citizen who has attained the age of 18 or any other voting age required by the United States for voting in State elections who has been a permanent resident of this State for at least 30 days next preceding any election shall have the right to vote at such election. The General Election (sic) (Assembly) by law may establish registration requirements and require permanent residence in an election district not to exceed thirty days prior to an election. The General Assembly by law ma y establish shorter residence requirements for voting for President and Vice-President of the United States. Schedule. This Amendment shall take effect immediately upon its approval by the electors. First Reading of this Constitutional Amendment."
