May 9, 1989

Speaker McPike: "The House will come to order. The Chaplain for today will be Pastor Tim Reynolds from the Mazon Baptist Church in Mazon. Pastor Reynolds is a guest of Representative Weller. The guests in the balcony may wish to rise and join us for the invocation."

Pastor Tim Reynolds: "Thank you, may we pray? Dear Heavenly Father we do thank You that we can be here at this time as these men and women are gathered to consider laws and other matters that would govern all of the affairs of men. Father we know that these men and women stand as Your ministers for all powers that be are ordained of God. And we pray Lord that You would give them wisdom. We ask Lord that You would help them as they make the hard decisions of Government and we pray dear Lord that Your will would be done in each thing that they do. And Lord, we would ask that as they make their decisions that those decisions would advance the cause of Jesus Christ for it is in His name we pray. Amen."

Speaker McPike: "We'll be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Klemm."

Klemm - et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker McPike: "Roll Call for Attendance. Mr. Piel."

Piel: "By the way Mr. Speaker, just in case you were wondering, Representative Hensel and Representative Ropp shop at the same store. We have no excused absences today either Sir."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "None on this side of the aisle, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker McPike: "Take the record, Mr. Clerk. 116 Members answering the Roll Call, a quorum is present. Committee

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Reports."

Clerk O'Brien: "The Corrected Committee Report, House Bill 961 was reported in the Committee on Human Services as 'Do pass as amended Consent Calendar' in error. The Bill was reported 'Do pass Consent Calendar.' Representative Mautino, Chairman of the Committee on Insurance to which the following Bill was referred, action taken May 4, 1989, reported the same back with the following recommendation, Interim Study Calendar, House Bill 2526. Representative Leverenz, Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations I, to which the following Bill was referred, action taken May 2, 1989, reported the same back with the following recommendation Interim Study Calendar, House Bill 2036. Representative Leverenz, Chairman of the Committee on Appropriations I to which the following Bill was referred, action taken May 3, 1989, reported the same back with the following recommendation, Interim Study Calendar, House Bill 1783. Speaker McPike: "Representative Matijeich."

Matijeich: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I move that we dispense with the reading of the Journal and the following Journals be approved, Journal #15 of March 23rd, 16 of March 27th, 17 of March 29th, 18 of March 31st and 19 of April 4th, 1989. My copy says instead of 1989, 2989, we went through a thousand years in a hurry."

Speaker McPike: "You're an old man John. The Motion is to approve the Journal. The question is, 'Shall the Motion be adopted?' All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Motions adopted. It's the intent of

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the Chair to go to Consent Calendar Third Reading as soon as both sides are prepared. In the mean time, we have some requests to take Bills off of Consent Calendar Third Reading, return them to Second for purposes of an Amendment. So if anyone else has a Bill on Consent Calendar Third that needs an Amendment, would you first show the Amendment to the opposite side of the aisle and then call the Chair's attention and we will call the Bill. The first request is Representative Lang and what is your Bill number, Sir?"

Lang: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. It's Bill #15...House Bill 1524. I have discussed this with Mr. McCracken and he has no objection..."

Speaker McPike: "Yes Sir, just a minute. The Gentleman asks leave to return House Bill 1524 to Second Reading. Are there any objections? Hearing none, leave is granted. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1524, a Bill for an Act to amend the Uniform Commercial Code. This Bill has been read a Second time previously. Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Lang."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Lang, on Amendment #1."

Lang: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1524 is a Bill that limits the period of time that a bank customer can lodge a complaint over an improperly paid stop payment order to one year. When we drafted the Bill, we erroneously left out credit unions and they wish to be covered by this Bill and the language in Amendment #1 covers credit unions. And I would ask that we amend House Bill 1524 accordingly."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? Being none the question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All in favor say 'aye',

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opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendments adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman now asks leave to return this to Consent Calendar Third Reading. Any objections? Hearing none the Attendance Roll Call will be used, the Motion carries, the Bills returned to Consent Calendar Third Reading. Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, House Bill 808 on page 62."

Speaker McPike: "House Bill 808. The Gentleman asks leave to return this to Second Reading. Any objections? Hearing none leave is granted. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 808, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relation to counties. This Bill has been read a Second time previously."

Speaker McPike: "Any Committee Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Committee Amendment #1 was adopted previously."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2 offered by Representative Klemm."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #2 allows the county board meetings to be held not only regular meetings, but special meetings at any public building located within the county. Amendment 2 adds the word 'special board meetings' and that's all it does and I move its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman's moved for the adoption of Amendment #2. Is there any discussion? Being none the question is, 'Shall the Amendment be adopted?' All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendments adopted. Further Amendments?"

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Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Gentleman asks leave to return the Bill 808 to Third Reading Consent Calendar. Is there any objections? Hearing none the Attendance Roll Call will be used, the Motion carries, the Bill's back on Third Reading Consent. House Bill 2280, Representative Breslin. The Lady asks leave to return it to Second Reading. This is on page 64. The Lady asks leave to return it to Second Reading, are there any objections? Hearing none leave is granted. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 2280, a Bill for an Act relating to states rights to revision in certain properties of the state sold to the City of Streator. This Bill has been read a Second time previously. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1 offered by Representative Breslin."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Breslin, on Amendment #1."

Breslin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen Amendment #1 provides the legal description that is necessary in order to identify the property that is to...that is in question with the reversionary right. I have already discussed this with Representative McCracken, he agrees that it is a clarifying Amendment and has no objection to it to my knowledge. I move for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #1. Any discussion? Being none the question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendments adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave to return 2280 to Third Reading Consent. Any objections? Hearing none the

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Attendance Roll Call is used, the Motion carries, the Bill is on Third Reading Consent. Does any other Member have a Bill on Third Reading Consent that needs to be brought back for Amendments? House Bill 1196, page 62 of the Calendar. Representative Satterthwaite asks leave to return it to Second Reading. Are there any objections? Hearing none leave is granted, the Bills on Second Reading. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1196, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee."

Speaker McPike: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker McPike: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Satterthwaite."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, Amendment #2 clarifies who is to chair the committee established by this legislation and adds as a Member of the committee a representative from the Department of Agriculture. I believe this is an Agreed Amendment and move for its adoption."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady moves for the adoption of Amendment #2 and on that the Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. A question of the Sponsor?"

Speaker McPike: "She indicates she'll yield."

Black: "Representative, have you cleared this with our spokesman?"

Satterthwaite: "Pardon me."

Black: "I don't see an indication that this has been cleared. I

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would assume, knowing you, that it has been, but can you enlighten me on that. Have you cleared this with our spokesman?"

Satterthwaite: "The Amendment was made at the request of the Department of Agriculture to add them to the list of people on the committee and by agreement with the Department of Transportation that the Director of the Division of Water Resources would chair the committee. I did speak with Representative McCracken about it last week."

Black: "Okay, thank you very much."

Speaker McPike: "Further discussion? The question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?' All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Amendments adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker McPike: "The Lady asks leave to return 1196 to Third Reading Consent. Are there any objections? Hearing none the Attendance Roll Call will be used. The Motion carries, the Bill's on Third Reading Consent Calendar. Representative Kubik. Representative Tate."

Kubik: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. At this time I would move to suspend the Appropriate Rule and move House Bill 1774 to the Order of Second Reading Consent Calendar Second Day."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 126, a Bill for an Act to amend the Open Meetings Act. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 189. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 189, a Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 211, Representative McNamara. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 211..."

Speaker Young: "A fiscal note has been requested. Is a fiscal note filed?"

Clerk Leone: "There is no fiscal note on file."

Speaker Young: "Representative McNamara."

McNamara: "It is my intention to adopt Amendment #1 and then hold the Bill on Second Reading."

Speaker Young: "We are not taking Bills with Amendments at this



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time. The Bill will remain on Second Reading. House Bill 258, Representative Steczo. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 258, a Bill for an Act in relationship to solid waste energy facilities. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. There are no Motions filed and no further Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 273, Representative Johnson. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 273, a Bill for an Act to amend the Liquor Control Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 274, Representative Johnson. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 353, a Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts in relationship to jurors. Second Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Young: "There is a Floor Amendment filed on this Bill. It will remain on Second Reading. House Bill 368, Representative Hasara. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 368, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relationship to the adoption of persons. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 519, Representative Granberg. Out of the record. House Bill 522, Representative Granberg. Out of the record. House Bill 535, Representative McPike. Out of the record. House Bill 564, Representative Cowlshaw. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 564, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relating to the installation of sprinkler systems. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. There are no further Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 566, out of the record. House Bill 577, Representative Cullerton. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 577, a Bill for an Act to amend the Funeral Directors and Embalmers Licensing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 580, Representative Curran. Out of the record. House Bill 598, out of the record. House Bill 601, Representative Cullerton. Floor Amendments, out of the record. House Bill 602, Representative Wojcik. There are Floor Amendments on this Bill also. Out of the record. House Bill 603,

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Representative Wojcik. Representative Wojcik?"

Wojcik: "Okay, Mr. Speaker, there is an Amendment and I would like to have that presented on the Bill."

Speaker Young: "At this time Representative, we are only doing those Bills that do not have Floor Amendments."

Wojcik: "Okay, there is an Amendment on this one."

Speaker Young: "Yes there is. House Bill 603, fiscal note has been requested and has not been filed. Out of the record. House Bill 612, Representative Terzich. Representative Terzich on House Bill 612."

Wojcik: "Representative."

Speaker Young: "Representative Terzich on 612. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Wojcik: "Mr. Speaker, would you turn me off please? Thanks."

Speaker Young: "Representative Terzich on House Bill 612. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 612, a Bill for an Act to amend the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. There are no further Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 616, Representative Ronan. Out of the record. House Bill 633, Representative Lang. Out of the record. House Bill 634, Representative Lang. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk. There is a Floor Amendment also. Out of the record. House Bill 641, Representative Flinn. Representative Flinn on House Bill 641. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 641, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning fees and salaries. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 643, Representative Countryman. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 643, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code

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of Criminal Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was offered in committee...was adopted in committee. There are no further Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 672, Representative Piel. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 672, a Bill for an Act to amend the Mobile Home Landlord and Tenant Rights Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 702, Representative Richmond. Out of the record. House Bill 713, Representative Steczo. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 713, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 716, out of the record. House Bill 737, Representative Dunn. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 737, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Marriage and Dissolution of Marriage Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee Amendments or Floor Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 739, Representative Mautino. Representative Mautino on House Bill 739. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 739, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Utilities Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 753, Representative Woolard. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk. There are Floor Amendments on this Bill. Out of the record. House Bill 757, Representative Countryman. Out of the record. House Bill 760, Representative Countryman. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

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Clerk Leone: "House Bill 760, a Bill for an Act to amend the Telecommunications Excise Tax Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 776, Representative Countryman. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 776, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act providing for the dissolution of corporations in certain cases. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee or Floor Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 777, Representative Countryman. Out of the record. House Bill 790, Representative Giglio? Representative Giglio. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 790, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relationship to sheriffs. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee. There are no further Amendments filed."

Speaker Young: "Third Reading. House Bill 799, Representative Stange. Out of the record. House Bill 822, Representative Shirley Jones. Out of the record. House Bill 852, Representative Matijevich. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 852, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code."

Speaker Young: "There is an Amendment filed, out of the record. Page 57 of the Calendar, House Bills Third Reading. Page 57 of the Calendar, House Bill 209, Representative Saltsman."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 209, a Bill for an Act to amend the Act...an Act regulating wages. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Young: "Representative Saltsman."

Saltsman: "Yes thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is a Bill that passed the House by an overwhelming majority last year and it got stalled in the Senate and what it does it amends the

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prevailing Wage Act to let our contractors here in the State of Illinois have a fair standard of their bidding procedure in setting wage standards for jobs that they will be putting bids on. And I'd ask for its passage."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman has moved for passage of House Bill 209 and on that, is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Dupage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I rise in opposition to this Bill. This Bill would expand from what are truly public projects and the requirements of the prevailing wage laws to private projects in affect guaranteed by municipalities or other local units of government. Currently, these bond provisions or these types of bonds which are available under state law are privately developed projects, privately financed projects. The bonds are sold because they are guaranteed by the municipalities. But the municipalities are not spending money on the project. It, in fact, is a private development project. Now, to the extent that the municipalities want to guarantee these projects or find them desirable that is no reason to impose on these projects the cost, the very substantially increased costs in these construction projects. The public policy is not fairly met. Where public projects are used, where taxpayer money is used the prevailing wage law applies. This is not taxpayers dollars that are funding these projects. This is private money funding these projects. There is no legitimate public policy reason for imposing the prevailing wage law on private projects. This is a very substantially important Bill, could be a very costly Bill to the construction industry in this state. There is no showing made that people out there are not making enough money based on a failure to comply with the prevailing wage law. It's a fallacy and to require these costs of construction



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to be passed on to private projects amounts to a tax. A tax only on a selected industry of our state, the construction industry. A construction industry which is not acting under public finance, under private finance. It is an absolutely awful Bill. It is unfair to saddle one particular industry with these public costs. I stand in opposition to the Bill and hope that my friends will do likewise."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Didrickson...the Lady from Cook, excuse me."

Didrickson: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Would the Sponsor respond to a question or two please?"

Speaker Young: "He indicates he'll yield."

Didrickson: "Representative Saltsman, Representative McCracken just talked about the expansion of the prevailing wage in the State of Illinois and as how he sees the damaging effects. But I'd really like to key in on the Build Illinois portion and ask you why, specifically, you've included Build Illinois projects with regards to the prevailing wage when we explicitly left this out when we put together the Build Illinois program?"

Saltsman: "The reason, this time, that we included the Build Illinois bonds and money coming from that..."

Didrickson: "I'm sorry I can't hear you."

Saltsman: "The reason that we have put this into the Bill this year is because we have funds throughout the State of Illinois that are being used and out of state contractors are coming here and under bidding our contractors because they're paying a lower salary. This Bill protects the contractors in the State of Illinois more than it does the labor union. When this whole program started out, this was a Bill set up for the Contractors Association, it was not a labor Bill. And it still does more good for our

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contractors than it does for the blue collar worker. It gives him the chance to make that person pay the same salary at the wage scale list for that area. And when a person can come into your area and pay a sub-standard wage, it takes the ability of that contractor who has signed labor relations programs with his local unions it takes his powers away from him to be able to bid and bid in competition with these out of state and right to work contractors coming into our area."

Didrickson: "Will this not take away the contractors ability to negotiate these contracts?"

Saltsman: "A contractor has to negotiate his contract with the developer based on the wage scales he's paying his employees and when he is forced to pay his employees that type of a wage scale it's unfair to bring people in here to be able a bid against him and to be able to pay a lower scale. And this...bonds are put up and it is government money that's invested. The government pays those bonds back."

Didrickson: "But you did use the term 'forced'."

Saltsman: "Pardon."

Didrickson: "You did use the term 'forced', that contractor then is forced to pay those prevailing wages?"

Saltsman: "Yes."

Didrickson: "He can't...alright well that's not negotiations..."

Saltsman: "In most areas the large suburban areas..."

Didrickson: "No excuse...Representative Saltsman, then we take it out of the realm of negotiation when you use the terminology 'forced' and in specific when you require prevailing wage to be used. Would that not be correct?"

Saltsman: "I didn't hear you."

Didrickson: "My question to you is you're taking it out of negotiations when you use prevailing wage on these Build

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Illinois projects and that's including the contractors even though there's a differential with regards to the wages that you're talking about. You said 'no' but you used the term 'forced' and when you use the term 'forced' you're taking it out of negotiations and you're going to require these to be expansion of Build Illinois projects and the cost and you're not going to be able to utilize the dollars, the Build Illinois dollars to the same extent that we've been able to, isn't that correct?"

Saltsman: "If you want...it would be correct if you want somebody to be able to bid against our contractors in the state who have wage scales set by their counties and by the negotiations at the bargaining table. If you want somebody to be able to come in and under cut them then that's your business. This is what I'm trying to stop. I'm trying to stop people from coming in and paying an unfair wage with unexperienced people. We had a program that happened in my area where they got 9 million dollars worth of bonds and brought in people from Kansas and paid half the pay scale of the area and our contractors and the bonds that were put up by our city, the men and women working and living there were thrown out in the middle of the street and the out-of-town people got the jobs."

Didrickson: "Okay...Representative Saltsman...Representative Saltsman I would like to key in on your particular area there in Peoria where economic development projects and Build Illinois projects are key. You mentioned that 9 million dollars was spent there, how many jobs did that create?"

Saltsman: "Fifty or sixty part-time...they shut the place down when the price of corn goes up."

Didrickson: "Fifty or sixty jobs, now if you're going to use prevailing wage there, same number of dollars, same number

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of 9 million dollars that you're going to be able to expend, and now you put in the new component of prevailing wage, are you not going to shrink the number of jobs? Yes or no?"

Saltsman: "You're not going to increase the number of construction jobs, no."

Didrickson: "Well to the Bill, Mr. Speaker. To the Bill please. This is an expansion of the prevailing wage and I would just certainly like to alert Members on my side of the aisle and those on the other side of the aisle who are very protective over those economic development dollars for your particular region. It's an expansion of the prevailing wage. It's going to cost money and you're going to receive less in terms of projects. This is a good Bill to defeat."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman from Fulton, Representative Homer."

Homer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, I rise to support the Gentlemen's Bill and to say to you that this is not a new concept. This Bill has been here before. It's passed out of the House on a number of occasions in previous years to be stalled in the Senate. There are few votes that you can make that are both pro-management, and pro-labor. This is one of those votes. The Sponsor has accurately indicated that both the contractor groups and the labor groups working in the construction area support this idea and it's nothing but a logical extension of the prevailing wage law that this General Assembly adopted several years ago. And, at that time, there was a clear public policy stated in this state that the general prevailing hourly rate should be paid on public works projects. These are public works projects. These are projects that would not be completed unless some public entity be the state, county or municipality authorize the issuance of tax free municipal bonds so as to enable the

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developer to save the taxes that otherwise would have been paid. Since that developer takes advantage of the public purpose served by the issuance of these bonds, isn't it then logical that we extend the public policy of the prevailing Wage Act to these projects just as we do to projects that are directly paid for with public funds? The public policy is the same. The winners are the workers in Illinois, the contractors in the locale that don't have to deal as Representative Saltsman said, 'from out of state intruders into that region.' People work, they make a fair living for what their work is and I think it's a vote that all of us should be proud to cast and I will vote 'yes'."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman from Adams, Representative Mays."

Mays: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, as the previous Representative did mention this is not a new idea, but it was a bad idea when it passed out of here before. It was a bad idea when we beat it before and it's a bad idea now. Department of Commerce and Community Affairs in previous years and I don't know about this particular one, did indicate to us that whatever advantage the employer might have by participating in these bonds issued by the government at a lower interest rate that advantage would be wiped out completely by this kind of a requirement and indeed one of the good programs that we have for economic development in this state would again go by the wayside because of the baggage we added to it. I would urge a 'no' vote."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Saltsman to close."

Saltsman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Anyone who votes against this Bill, consider themselves a person who's in favor of right to work. We voted right to work down here six...five or six years ago. We voted right to work down in this General

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Assembly. We didn't want it and if you want to bring these right to work people into this state to get the jobs of our people who are paying the bills, our people who are paying the taxes and using their properties...their properties to serve to issue these bonds then vote against this Bill, but if you want to vote for your construction workers, for your contractors that want nothing more than a fair challenge to go out and bid their programs then you will vote for this Bill. Again, I urge your support for this piece of legislation."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of House Bill 209 and the question is, 'Shall House Bill 209 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Representative McCracken...have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this there are 71 'ayes', 43 'nos'. This Bill having received the...does the Gentleman request his verification?"

McCracken: "I don't believe there's 71 over there, but there may be more than 60, so I'll withdraw it."

Speaker Young: "Representative Jones."

Jones: "Mr. Speaker...Mr. Speaker, are you voting on this Bill? Mr. Speaker, are you voting on this Bill?"

Speaker Young: "Yeah. Mr. Clerk, would you record me as 'aye' please. On this Bill, there are 72 voting 'yes', 43 voting 'no'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed. House Bill 219, out of the record. Representative Flinn for what purpose do you rise?"

Flinn: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'm not one who normally violates the rules and I abhor those who do violate the rules, but upon this opportunity I would like to introduce a group from the community bankers sitting in the Speakers gallery, 50 some

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odd people. And so I'm introducing them and I'll never violate the rules again, I promise you. Would you please stand up folks?"

Speaker Young: "House Bill 219, out of the record. House Bill 268, Representative Giorgi. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 268, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of an Act in relation to prisoners in jails. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Young: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, this Bill amends an Act in relation to prisoners in jails by making the arresting authority responsible for any incurred medical expenses relating to the arrestee until he is placed in the custody of the sheriff, unless the arrest was made at the sheriffs request. We're getting park districts, police departments and airport districts and forest preserve districts, sanitary districts and they're bringing these injured people to jails and the counties picking up the tab. This Bill will make them responsible for their medical costs until the sheriffs accepts them. The second part of this Bill is that it, allows sheriffs to appoint auxiliary deputies to provide non-law enforcement assistance to non-profit organizations which benefit law enforcement activities and also authorizes the sheriffs to supplement police...sheriff police with auxiliaries and seasonal bases to carry out law enforcement activity. I know of no objection to this Bill and it's requested by the Illinois Sheriffs Association. I urge your support."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 268 and on that question, is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Young: "He indicates he will yield."

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Mulcahey: "Representative Giorgi, when you're talking about the arresting party give me an example of what that could be in Winnebago County."

Giorgi: "Arresting party in Winnebago County and even in Stephenson County would be like an Airport Police Department or a Park District Police Department or a Forest Preserve District Department or a Sanitary District and all these little entities of government that have police departments that pick up someone that's injured and they drop them off at the sheriffs office rather than at the hospital where they should be treated for the injury so they can pick up the tab."

Mulcahey: "How about the local police department of a small municipality like the Village of Winnebago?"

Giorgi: "Well it's...if the person is injured, it's his duty to take him to the nearest medical facility anyway so that'll take care of a small entity of government."

Mulcahey: "Well it seems to me that...who's picking up the tab right now on these people that are coming in?"

Giorgi: "Well, the Park Districts have their own budget. The airport has their own budget. The Sanitary District has their own budget and the county has their own budget but why should the county pay for all of these little units of governments medical bills?"

Mulcahey: "Alright, a unit of government I'm talking about, if a local municipality like Pecatonica, the police officer should arrest somebody or should be involved in a case like this, the local municipality will pick up the tab on that right?"

Giorgi: "Until they're placed...until they're placed in the custody of this jail."

Mulcahey: "Right, okay, but who is paying the county tax anyway? It seems like the people in Winnebago County, who happen to



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live in Pecatonica are still paying the county tax anyway. It seems to me that this is a rather...that it's rather unfair that this tab should be put back on the local...on the local unit of government for example the Pecatonica Police Department. They're paying that tax up front at the onset and I don't see why this is..."

Giorgi: "The Park Districts budget doesn't include any money to maintain the jail. The Sanitary Districts budget doesn't include any money to maintain the jail. The City of Roscoes budget doesn't include monies to maintain the jail."

Mulcahey: "I understand that."

Giorgi: "...but the bank was barely breaking even."

Mulcahey: "I understand that, I understand that. Okay, it's a matter of who's paying the taxes at the onset. Who's going to provide the funds for that county facility anyway and it's everybody who lives in that damn county so what difference does it make?"

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Just a question of the Sponsor if I may."

Speaker Young: "He indicates he'll yield."

Klemm: "I was wondering, Representative Giorgi, about preexisting conditions that may affect a prisoner who goes into a detention center overnight or something, has a diabetic condition or something that he's had before and the arresting officials knew nothing about it. Who would have to pick up those continuing expenses and could be very...very large in amount? How is it handled now and how would your Bill change that if anything?"

Giorgi: "In other words, if someone...if someone is ill?"

Klemm: "Let's say you're arrested and you're brought into the

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detention center or the facility..."

Giorgi: "He was brought to the sheriff...if he was brought into the sheriff...in the jail, the sheriff immediately assumes their cost. What's happening here is that there's a..."

Klemm: "Alright, so now...so now, that person ends up having a diabetic coma or something that has nothing to do with falling over a bunk or something, but had a preexisting medical history that the sheriff didn't know about, who is responsible under existing law to handle that and how would your Bill change it if anything?"

Giorgi: "I...if he gets into the jail system, the county becomes responsible. But, if lets say a...park policeman picks a person up and he's battered up pretty bad in a fight or something or fighting with a police officer he takes him to the hospital and leaves him there and they put a guard on him, it's the Sheriff's Department job to receive the prisoner and the Sheriff's Department ends up with the bill. They'd rather see the bill...the liability paid by the people that wrote for it...signed for it. Now you're being...give me a specific example, you're a county official you know what I'm talking about. You're a former County Board member, you ought to be giving some very good examples."

Klemm: "Well...I could probably give you all kinds of examples. I was wondering if that sheriff takes him to the hospital and that person ends up being there for months and months taking care of a condition that wasn't anything to do with being beaten up at a barroom brawl."

Giorgi: "The county maintains the jail. The county's tired of picking up every little government entities bills that they create at the local medical facilities. Let the little units of government pay their own bills. This is the argument, the county boards are strapped for money, don't

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want to be paying anybody else's medical bills. It's very simple."

Klemm: "Alright so...then your answer to me I guess is that it would be the municipality that's picking up the cost that they...were the arresting officer even though it's the sheriff's responsibility to transport him to a hospital. Is that...okay, thank you, I'm just trying to clear that up. Thank you."

Giorgi: "Roll Call."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Hallock."

Hallock: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. I rise in support of this legislation also the Joint Sponsor. This Bill is emanated from Winnebago County where our States Attorney has seen this problem over the years and suggested this legislation. This Bill really seeks equity. It's very clear and fair that the authority that makes the arrest should in fact pay for the expenses. Right now the current problem is the county has to assume all these burdens, it's not fair and the counties just can't afford it. This is a good Bill and I urge it to be adopted. Vote 'aye'."

Speaker Young: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi to close."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'd just ask for an 'aye' vote. This does apply to home rule counties. There's only one in the state and that's Cook."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 268. The question is, 'Shall House Bill 268 pass?' All those in favor vote 'yes', those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 106 voting 'yes', 5 voting 'no'. The Gentleman from Cook,

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Representative Turner...on this question there are 106 voting 'yes', 5 voting 'no', 3 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Hannig in the Chair."

Hannig: "Thank you, Tony and Members of the House. I'm very proud today to have the Teacher of the Year from my District here in Springfield to say a few words for us. So, let me introduce the Teacher of the Year, Peggy Allen."

Allen, Peggy: "Thank you, it's certainly an honor to be...have been named Teacher of the Year. My classroom is a little quieter than this, but I'll try to do my best. It's also an honor to be here in front of you Ladies and Gentlemen and briefly, I'm told I only have a few seconds here. Again, I thank you for allowing me to be presented to you and I would like to let you know that we in education are looking for great things from this Body in the next few weeks and I certainly hope they are to come. Thank you very much."

Speaker Young: "Representative Young, in the Chair. House Bill 302, Representative Breslin. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 302, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Hospital Licensing Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Young: "Representative Breslin."

Breslin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen. This Bill would provide that whenever a patient who qualifies for the Federal Medicare Program is hospitalized, that patient shall be notified at least 24 hours prior to discharge that they are going to be notified. The reason for the Bill is in order to facilitate the orderly transition of the aged and disabled from hospitals to post-hospital care. I would be happy to answer any questions."

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Speaker Young: "The Lady has moved for the passage of House Bill 302, and on that question is there any discussion? Hearing none, Representative Breslin...the Gentleman from Morgan, Representative Ryder."

Ryder: "Would the Sponsor yield for some questions please?"

Speaker Young: "She indicates she will yield."

Ryder: "Representative, we talked about this a little bit in Committee and I'm wondering, have you made any changes on the Bill since Committee?"

Breslin: "Yes. Yes I have."

Ryder: "Would you be able to explain those changes for me please to see if they address the concerns that we had?"

Breslin: "Yes. The first provision strikes the reference to a particular part of the Federal Medicare Program and instead refers only to the Federal Medicare Program. This was at the recommendation of the Hospital Association. As a matter of fact, all these were at the recommendation of the Hospital Association. The second provision would allow patients who wish to waive their rights for 24 hour discharge notice to do so, so that those people who want to get out of the hospital may do so without any incumbrance by this law. And the last provision requires only that the discharge notice be in writing and strikes the information or the requirements that it be in large print and in simple language. All were made at the request of the Hospital Association."

Ryder: "Representative, as a request, as a result of the many changes that you've made, is the Hospital Association now in agreement with the Bill?"

Breslin: "They have never told me that they are. As a matter of fact, I haven't heard from them since."

Ryder: "Would it surprise you to know that they continue to oppose the Bill?"

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Breslin: "Nothing would surprise me in this place."

Ryder: "Okay, thank you. To the Bill. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The Illinois Hospital Association continues to oppose for several reasons. One of which is that the Bill is operating under the premise that hospitals discharge patients. That's not correct. Doctors discharge patients. Additionally, on many occasions we are talking about people who are anxious to remove themselves from the hospitals and would find a 24 hour delay to be unduly necessary. I understand that there may some provision for those who are knowing consumers in this situation to relieve themselves of the responsibility or the rights by waiving that. I'm not sure that that can be clearly expressed to those who are anxious to leave. Additionally, we're talking about some increased cost here in the event that a person is notified at 9:00 in the morning that they're able to leave, but because of this problem they are then required to stay for another 24 hours. That's another day in the hospital, another additional cost which could add up to additional cost on an already overburdened health care industry and health care cost. This increases costs to consumers. It places undue responsibilities on hospitals. The Bill is well intentioned. There is a necessity for some additional time to prevent those situations in which people are dumped from hospitals, and in that I believe the Sponsor is well intended. There are situations in which people do need adequate time in order to make arrangements for long term care because of the already overburdened long term care system, waiting times and waiting periods. For that, I believe the Sponsor is well intentioned. But the Bill as it now stands does not adequately address those, can cause additional cost to our health care system. And it's for those reasons, in addition to the opposition, by the

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Illinois Hospital Association that I stand in opposition of the Bill. Not to say, however, that the Sponsor has not attempted to comply with some of those objections because indeed she has."

Speaker Young: "Further discussion, the Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I wonder if the Sponsor would yield for a question?"

Speaker Young: "She indicates she will yield."

Klemm: "Representative Breslin, this summer, my mother, an elderly woman, who was in the hospital and I was with her having lunch at the time and the doctor came by to check her over and after his examination determined that she could be released and discharged as soon as she finished her lunch. And of course, we were delighted, surprised, but delighted. If your Bill were law, would she be required to have stayed there 24 hours so the hospital could meet it's obligations to inform her that she would be released?"

Breslin: "No, she would not be required to do so. She can waive her rights under this provision. This provision only applies to those people who are surprised and are displeased by the sudden notice and are unable to provide for their post-hospital care in such a short period of time."

Klemm: "So, the patient is the one who determines whether they'll be released prior to 24 hours or if they don't like it and they want to stay longer they could say, 'no, give me 24 hours notice?'"

Breslin: "No, the Bill operates so that the hospital would be required to give the 24 hour notice and should the patient not wish to have to remain for that period of time they can waive their rights. So the doctor would come and say, if

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you want to go home today Mrs. Klemm, you may. Otherwise I'm going to sign release papers for you tomorrow."

Klemm: "Alright, and after the doctor signs those release papers, let's say at the time because that doctor is releasing this woman now, right? Would the hospital, would we sit there and wait until the hospital went to the Administrative responsibility of filling out this form to give to the patient for them to waive their notice before you could leave?"

Breslin: "Well the Bill provides that the hospital set up their own procedure, so I'm sure every hospital would be different. You should know however, that it is common procedure to give a written notice and the post-hospital care plan prior to discharge. So that is commonly done."

Klemm: "Alright, thank you, you've answered my question. Thank you very much."

Speaker Young: "Further discussion? The Lady from LaSalle, to close."

Breslin: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, this Bill responds to a very real problem. Hospitals are discharging patients sicker and quicker since 1983 when Medicare changed it's form of reimbursement to a prospective payment system. Without a careful system for discharging patients, readmissions are more frequent, families and patients are thrown into crisis situations and community services are unprepared to respond. That's the reason for instance, that the Easter Seals Society supports this Bill. It was the actual complaints of seniors and a survey conducted by the Champaign County Health Care Consumers with help from the East Central Illinois Area Agency on Aging that prompted this Bill. It has the support of the Illinois State Council of Senior Citizen Organizations and its 500 participating organizations. I



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think it's a good Bill and I recommend it to you."

Speaker Young: "The Lady has moved for the passage of House Bill 302. The question is, 'Shall House Bill 302 pass?' All those in favor vote 'yes', those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken requests a verification. The Lady from LaSalle, Representative Breslin, requests a Poll of the Absentees. On this question there are 63 voting 'yes', 47 voting 'no', 5 voting 'present' and 2 not voting. Would you poll the absentees, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Leone: "Representative Kubik is the only Member not voting."

Speaker Young: "Mr. Clerk, would you poll the affirmative votes? Mr. Kubik, for what purpose do you rise?"

Kubik: "Record me 'aye', Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Young: "Kubik, 'aye'. Representative Mulcahey, for what purpose do you rise?"

Mulcahey: "Would the Gentleman be so kind as to allow me to be verified now?"

Speaker Young: "Mulcahey has been verified. Poll of the affirmative vote."

Clerk Leone: "Poll of the affirmative. Balanoff. Bowman. Breslin. Brunsvold. Bugielski. Capparelli. Cullerton. Curran. Currie. Davis. DeJaegher. DeLeo. Dunn. Edley. Farley. Flinn. Flowers. Giglio. Giorgi. Granberg. Hannig."

Speaker Young: "Excuse me, Mr. Clerk, for what reason does the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Levin."

Levin: "May I leave to be verified?"

Speaker Young: "Representative McCracken. Representatives Levin and Leverenz asks leave to be verified. Continue to

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proceed."

Clerk Leone: "Continuing with the poll of the affirmative. Hartke. Homer. Johnson. Lou Jones. Keane. Krska. Kubik. Kulas. Lang. Laurino. LeFlore. Leverenz. Levin. Matijeovich. Mautino. McGann. McNamara. McPike. Morrow. Mulcahey. Novak. Phelps. Preston. Regan. Rice. Richmond. Ronan. Saltsman. Santiago. Satterthwaite. Shaw. Steczo. Stern. Sutker. Terzich. Trotter. Van Duyne. Williams. Wolf. Wollard. Anthony Young. Wyvetter Young and Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Young: "Are there any questions to the Affirmative Roll Call? Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, thank you. Representative Mautino."

Speaker Young: "Representative Mautino. The Gentleman is in the rear of the chamber."

McCracken: "Representative Keane."

Speaker Young: "Representative Keane, the Gentleman is in the front of the chamber."

McCracken: "Representative Krska."

Speaker Young: "Representative Krska, Representative Krska. Is the Gentleman in the chamber? Remove him from the Roll."

McCracken: "Representative Shaw."

Speaker Young: "Representative Shaw. Representative Shaw. Is the Gentleman in the chamber? Remove him from the Roll Call."

McCracken: "Representative, did you take Representative Shaw off?"

Speaker Young: "Yes."

McCracken: "Representative Flowers?"

Speaker Young: "Representative Flowers in the center aisle."

McCracken: "Okay, Representative DeLeo?"

Speaker Young: "Representative DeLeo. Representative DeLeo. Is

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the Gentleman in the chamber? Remove Representative DeLeo from the Roll Call."

McCracken: "Representative Turner?"

Speaker Young: "Representative Turner. Representative Arthur Turner. How is the Gentleman recorded?"

Clerk Leone: "The Gentleman is recorded as voting 'present'."

Speaker Young: "Further questions on the Affirmative Roll Call?"

McCracken: "Representative Jones, Shirley Jones."

Speaker Young: "How is the Lady recorded? Representative Shirley Jones."

Clerk Leone: "The Lady is recorded as voting 'present'."

McCracken: "Oh, stay here Shirley. Representative Capparelli."

Speaker Young: "Representative Capparelli is in his seat. Further questions of the Affirmative Roll?"

McCracken: "Nothing further."

Speaker Young: "On this question there are 61 voting 'yes', 47 voting 'no', 5 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 351, Representative Klemm. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 351, a Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Young: "Representative Klemm."

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 351, actually deletes only actually four words of the law, but I think it's an important four words. About two months ago prior to our really getting active down here, I went to a meeting with a number of community leaders about affordable housing, about sharing of homes to try to have the Senior Citizens finding affordable places to live in our county. And in those discussions, I found out that the current law actually would serve against our senior citizens and our college students because in determining the statute, I found that

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if you lived in cohabit together that you would be committing adultery or fornication in Illinois. Now obviously we know and I think most of know what we're talking about for the purpose of adultery and fornication. But it didn't seem that a person, any person who cohabits would be committing adultery should be still in our statutes today. So, when I looked about the number of senior citizens that are sharing apartments and homes together, and I look to see how many college students share homes and apartments, and then I thought about even Lincoln Towers, across the street that have legislators that are sharing apartments together, that I didn't think we needed to have these people in the eyes of society being determined to be adulterers. So, this Bill would simply remove the words cohabit and leave the rest of the legislation intact. I'll answer any questions, but I'd like to move the adoption of House Bill 351."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of House Bill 351. And on that question, is there any discussion. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Young: "He indicates he will yield."

Cullerton: "Representative Klemm, it's my understanding that you do not intend for this to change in the definition of the Criminal Code to have any effect on changing the grounds for dissolution of a marriage under the Dissolution of Marriage Act?"

Klemm: "Well, I'm only tackling these two areas of adultery and fornication in this Bill."

Cullerton: "Alright, but by changing the definition of adultery in the criminal code you don't mean for that to have any affect on the Dissolution of Marriage Act, do you?"

Klemm: "I don't think so."

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Cullerton: "No, I don't think so either. I think this is a Bill made for my District and I certainly support it."

Speaker Young: "Further discussion? Hearing none, the Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm to close."

Klemm: "I just ask for your support on this antiquated Bill, thank you."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 351. The question is, 'Shall House Bill 351 pass?' All those in favor vote 'yes', those opposed vote 'no.' Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? On this question ...Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 86 voting 'yes', 18 voting 'no', and 7 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 365, Representative Novak. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 365, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to provide for the creation and management of Forest Preserve Districts. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Young: "Representative Novak."

Novak: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. May I have leave of the Body to take it back to Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment?"

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman requests leave. Is leave granted? The Gentleman has leave. Second Reading. Are there any Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Leone: "Amendment #3 is offered by Representative Novak, amends House Bill 365 on Page 1 and so forth."

Speaker Young: "Representative Novak on Amendment #3."

Novak: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #3 removes the provisions stating that the disconnection can take place regardless of whether the actual cause of territory remaining in the District to be

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noncontiguous. This simply answers the question of any potential hole in the doughnut theory that could result as a measure of the petition and successful disconnection. I urge it's adoption."

Speaker Young: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Floor Amendment #3 to House Bill 365. And on that question, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Young: "He indicates he will yield."

McCracken: "Representative, does this then prohibit transfers where the remaining property is made noncontiguous?"

Novak: "I couldn't hear you, Tom."

McCracken: "Does this then prohibit the disconnection where the result would be to create a noncontiguous district?"

Novak: "Right, if it creates a noncontiguous district it would prohibit it yes."

McCracken: "Alright, so regardless of intention or reasoning, if it is made noncontiguous, that in and of itself would prohibit it from being done under this Bill as amended?"

Novak: "Correct."

McCracken: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker White: "Representative Novak to close."

Novak: "Thank you. House Bill 365 simply amends the Forest Preserve Act. It allows for townships to petition out by referendum and also makes the referendum districts or the districts that seek the petition out liable for any indebtedness that has happened in the past. This corrects the local problem at home that we've had along the Kankakee River and I ask for your favorable vote."

Speaker Young: "Representative Piel, for what purpose do you rise?"

Piel: "I think the Gentleman was explaining the Bill. We have not adopted the Amendment yet, Mr. Speaker."

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Speaker Young: "Thank you, the Gentleman moves for the adoption of Floor Amendment #3 to House Bill 365. On that...Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "I'm a little confused, and if you would bear with me for just a moment. Our analysis says that your Amendment would allow the disconnection even if it made for noncontiguous territory. Is that wrong?"

Novak: "Representative McCracken, Amendment 3, I work with the Governor's Office on this. It satisfies their concerns about this. If the disconnection would become noncontiguous, then it would be null and void. It wouldn't be allowed."

Speaker Young: "Representative Giglio, in the Chair."

McCracken: "Speaker, alright, thank you. I'm just trying to find where it amends. So you delete 15, 16 and 17."

Novak: "It deletes one sentence, part of a sentence."

McCracken: "And you would put in disconnected. Yeah, that's right. The analysis is wrong. His Amendment would prohibit it where the disconnection makes for noncontiguous territory. Alright, thank you."

Speaker Giglio: "Question is, 'Shall the Amendment be adopted'? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are no further Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Gentleman asks leave to suspend the appropriate rule to have this Bill heard immediately. Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing none, the leave is granted by the use of the Attendance Roll Call. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 365, a Bill for an Act to provide for the creation and management of Forest Preserve District. Third Reading of the Bill."

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Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Novak."

Novak: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 365 is similar to a Bill we passed on Consent Calendar out of here last year. It provides for territories to disconnect from Forest Preserve Districts in counties of population of 125,000 and below. It provides for that disconnection upon court approval and by a referendum. With the added Amendments, it deletes provisions that should a referendum be successful and the territory become noncontiguous the referendum or the Amendment would subscribe that to be null and void. This corrects a local problem at home, along the Kankakee River and I certainly would approve your or appreciate your support on this Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 365 pass?' Excuse me, the Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Weller."

Weller: "Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of this Bill as Representative Novak has stated. This legislation will allow a local township in Kankakee County to remove itself where there's two duplicative taxing bodies and I urge it's adoption and urge an 'aye' vote. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Giglio: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 365 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 108 voting 'yes', 2 voting 'no' and 2 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Novak, on House Bill 385. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 385, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Illinois Vehicle Code. Third Reading of the Bill."



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Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Novak."

Novak: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 385 amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. This is at a request of the Illinois Sheriff's Association to provide a special license plate for municipal vehicles that are driven by the sheriff's and their deputies. It's for a one time, one time license plate fee and the Illinois Secretary of State's Office is in support of this. The effective date is July 1, of 1991. I'd urge for your support."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? Hearing none, the Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

McCracken: "Is Representative Ropp a co-sponsor of this Bill now?"

Novak: "Yes he is, Representative."

McCracken: "And Representative Black?"

Novak: "Yes he is."

McCracken: "Well then I better not criticize this Bill."

Novak: "They're good Representatives."

Speaker Giglio: "Further discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 385 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 116 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting 'present', and this Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 416, Representative Curran, Gentleman from Springfield. Out of the record. House Bill 441, Representative Leitch. Out of the record. House Bill 487, Representative Curran. Out of the record."

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Representative Flinn, 538. Mr. Clerk, read House Bill 536."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 536, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from St. Claire, Representative Monroe Flinn."

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 536 addresses a problem we have in my District and some of the adjoining Districts, but it really is a problem with the Regional Board of School Trustees in that we have a seven person board, elected for a 6 year term and we've got at least two of them who just get elected and don't attend the meetings. What we are asking for in the Bill, in the event we're faced with situations, anyone else and any other districts faced with situations we are there that the majority of the remaining board can replace them for the balance of the term. Now these are elected positions and we have a hard time getting candidates to start with and when we get candidates who really don't care about serving, just want to run to get their name on a ballot it creates a problem. So, I'd ask for a favorable vote and I'll try to answer any questions if there are any."

Speaker Giglio: "The Lady from DuPage, Representative Cowlshaw."

Cowlshaw: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Although I realize the Representative who is Sponsoring this Bill is trying to respond to a problem in his own area. The Bill does apply statewide. I think we have always been very careful about any kind of provision that permits anyone who has been elected to a position to be removed from it for any reason other than the selection and the choice of the voters. This Bill sets a precedent. Let us suppose that we have a Member of the General Assembly who for some reason, perhaps a valid reason, like

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a serious illness, misses more than 50 percent of the Sessions, during a given term. Is that reason why that Representative should be removed from office? I hardly think so. This Bill sets that kind of a precedent and I feel rather uneasy about that kind of thing. The other thing that this Bill does that somewhat bothers me is that it says that the other Members of that Regional Board can remove one of the Members for willful failure to perform his or her duties. What is willful failure to perform his or her duties? Does that mean for example, if that person consistently fails to agree with the others on the issues that that person is willfully failing to perform his or her duties? Having been in the minority ever since I have been here, I am very sensitive to protecting minority opinions and seeing if those opinions are heard. I think that this Bill, although I respect the Sponsor and realize that he has a good reason within his own area for bringing this forward, I think it sets the wrong kind of precedent and therefore, I urge a no vote on House Bill 536."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "I understand what the Sponsor is trying to do and he probably has a good reason for doing it. But I think more importantly we have here is a principle, and that principle is that we do live under a Democratic form of government, Republican form of government and not withstanding the fact that this person maybe not to be doing his job, none the less, he was put there, he was elected there by the people, his constituents, the voters of his districts and it's just going contrary to our whole process by allowing a majority of the Members of a Board to remove him. If we had such a thing as a principle such as a recall in this state, it might be okay but we don't and this is I believe, going

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just a little bit to far."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Flinn to close."

Flinn: "Well Mr. Speaker, in answer to some of the people...the two people who spoke against it, I realize the principle of electing officials and taking them out of office, but the people we're talking about, that caused this Bill to be introduced, are people who refused to answer phone calls, who refused to answer regular mail, who refused to answer registered mail. These are not people who are sick. If someone is sick, that's an plausible excuse for not removing them. But these are people who have served as much as six years and shows up at monthly meetings of two or three out of the six years. Obviously these people don't really care about serving or they would show up at least once or twice a year. And all they got to do is show up occasionally or make some excuse for not showing up and most certainly the remaining board members would not remove them. It's not a matter of vendetta or anything else, it's simply a matter of trying to run the business. On one occasion, the two people we've had the problem with was neither there, another person was on vacation, and a third person was sick and they had to cancel the meeting and was unable to approve the sale of a school building and had to wait for two months until that decision could be made. I think that it's deplorable that we let people stay in office like that, and if we, as Legislators, could get by with that I suspect that there are some here that may, but I kind of doubt it."

Speaker Giglio: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 536 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 48 voting

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'yes' and 48 voting 'no', and 17 voting 'present'. This Bill having failed to receive the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared lost. House Bill 541, Representative Flinn. Do you want to go with 541, Sir? Representative Shaw. Does Representative Flinn want to go with 541? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leon: "House Bill 541, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relationship to Senior Citizens. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from St. Claire, Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Mr. Speaker, what this Bill would offer to do to let the banks, financial institutions and credit unions go into nursing homes and that sort of thing to permit people to do their banking business on the premises rather than have to send someone else or catch a bus or something like that to go into the bank. It's limited to those sort of situations. I got this from the Lady of Snows which is in my district down in Belleville. And there's a Lady down there who asked me to Sponsor the Bill because she's done banking business for a number of other people who are perfectly capable, mentally of doing their business, but physically incapable...incapable of doing it and I would ask for a favorable vote. If there are any questions, I'll try to answer them on this one."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion, the Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Black: "Thank you. Representative, I think, as you've explained it, the idea is indeed a good one. I...perhaps you could give us some clarification on what your thoughts might be

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about how we'll safeguard the senior citizens of financial...you know, a lot of them are going to deal in cash. Some are going to want their right of privacy protected, and I think if the Bill is deficient in any form, and it's certainly a good idea. It might be in that form and you might want to tell us what your ideas are on that?"

Flinn: "Well so far as safeguard is concerned, they have to be doing business with that institution. For example, all it does is save them the problem of either sending people to the regular bank institution or going in themselves, when they are unable to go and it let's the bank or the credit union or the financial institution in case this savings and loan come to them. Now, they would do normal banking affairs. They would not do loans and that sort of thing. It would do just normal banking like deposits, cashing checks and that sort of business. It would be the normal everyday business you would do at a counter and as far as safeguards are concerned they would be dealing with the institution they wish to deal with."

Speaker Giglio: "The Gentleman from Lee, Representative Myron Olson."

Olson: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Would the Gentleman yield?"

Flinn: "Yes, I yield."

Olson: "Representative Flinn, this is a good piece of Legislation. I think it would be fair to assume that the responsible agency would promulgate rules through the Joint Committee of Administrative Rules to make sure that the seniors are safeguarded. Would that be fair to say?"

Flinn: "I would agree with that wholeheartedly. As a Member of JCAR, I most certainly would think that we ought to promulgate rules by which they should operate."

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Olson: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Giglio: "The Gentleman from St. Claire, Representative Flinn to close. The Clerk is working on the Roll Call, so it will be a few minutes. Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, I'm a supporter of this Bill and co-sponsor, I just wanted to inquire of the Chair how many votes are necessary for passage."

Speaker Giglio: "In the opinion of the Chair, this Bill pertains to the Branch Banking and which would allow three-fifths of the Members voting on the question or a majority of the Members elected whichever is greater. With that, Mr. Clerk, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 541 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk take the record. On this question there are 112 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no', 1 voting 'present'. House Bill 541, having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. The Chair now will go back to House Bill 441. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 441, a Bill for an Act in relation to local improvements made by special assessment or special tax in conferring benefits on embedding state property. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Leitch."

Leitch: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a very good Bill which will enhance the relationship for the state and the people who live in our neighborhoods and communities. Very simply, this Bill would permit the State to participate in special assessment projects and neighborhoods where improvements such as streets and sidewalks and other benefits also benefits

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state owned property. Presently, this is not the case but this is a Bill that has passed the General Assembly virtually unanimously on several occasions and I'd very much appreciate a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Giglio: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, would the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Cullerton: "Representative, you've served some time in the Senate, is that correct?"

Leitch: "That's correct."

Cullerton: "Were you able to pass any Bills over there?"

Leitch: "Yes I was."

Cullerton: "Okay so this..."

Leitch: "I passed the CTA Program for the City of Chicago. Senate Bill 2018."

Cullerton: "I see. So this would just be your first Bill in the House then?"

Leitch: "Yes it would."

Cullerton: "If it was to pass that is."

Leitch: "Yes Sir."

Cullerton: "Well, are there any cost that could be involved in this Bill to the State of Illinois?"

Leitch: "I've been talking with State and I believe it will be minimal."

Cullerton: "Minimal?"

Leitch: "Yes."

Cullerton: "Well, a Republicans view of minimal is always different than a Democrats. So how much is minimal, in your opinion?"

Leitch: "Well I think that by the time the Bill is enacted into law and comes out of the Senate we'll have a more precise figure that I'll be able to share with you."



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Cullerton: "So, at this point and time you're not sure how much minimal is? Well that's a pretty good tactic. I ought to try that next time on one of my Bills. So I think this Bill should be treated accordingly since it is his first Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Further discussion? Gentleman from Madison, Representative Stephens."

Stephens: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Stephens: "Representative, don't you think it's a little presumptuous for you to stand on the House Floor and tell us that this is a good Bill. Is that...I mean that is how you introduced yourself. Was that by the Senate's definition or by is that the House definition?"

Leitch: "Well it's a good Bill because my friend, Fred Turk and before him, Bob Day both passed it, and I know they're both fine Gentlemen from this chamber, who served well and distinguished careers here."

Stephens: "Fred Turk, your invoking Fred Turk's name on this House Floor and expecting to pass the Bill. Well, I agree with Representative Cullerton, I think this one is predestined in it's fate."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Well thank you very much Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Black: "Thank you very much. Representative as you explained the Bill and I know things are different in the Senate, they must be, because that's the only way you're going to pass the CTA Bill over here, I'll tell you that. But...a simplified procedure for the State to pay local special assessment property taxes when such assessments improved state property. What is that simplified procedure?"

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Leitch: "Well, Representative, right now it is very difficult for the process to work because as a practical matter the State does not pay it's assessments when these special assessment projects are passed by various local improvement boards. And so while in larger projects very often, screen improvements, sidewalks and the like are made a part of the program. In many smaller projects which add to the value of state owned property, such is not the case. And this would simplify it by merely including the state with other just treat it as it would a residential homeowner or any other property owner along the front footage of a special assessment project."

Black: "Well, thank you very much Representative, I would hope that the procedure would be perhaps simpler than that explanation. But, be that this is your first Bill in the House, we'll go from here. Thank you."

Speaker Giglio: "The Gentleman from Livingston, Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Mr. Speaker, if Representative Cullerton and Representative Stephens are both on the same side of this issue, I think we probably ought to vote 'present'."

Speaker Giglio: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Leitch, to close."

Leitch: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I simply would ask for a favorable Roll Call. Thank you."

Speaker Giglio: "The question is, 'Shall the House Bill 441 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Do you want to explain your vote Representative Leitch? Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Morgan, Representative Ryder."

Ryder: "Speaker, I really think that those who are voting green ought to take a look at this Bill. Apparently there are 16 folks up there that haven't had a chance to read the

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analysis and as a result, they should reconsider. I mean this is an important Bill and that green vote. I see some up there that might even be considered targets, so you better be careful because this Bill has got some problems given the fact that it's his first Bill I frankly don't know why we allowed him to have it. But if we could get up there to about 100 red then I think we would be alright."

Speaker Giglio: "Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 110 voting 'yes', 2 voting 'no', and none voting 'present'. And House Bill 441, having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Cullerton on House Bill 706. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Cullerton on House Bill 706. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 706, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. As of July 1, 1988, the Department of State Police are authorized to collect and disseminate information regarding criminal offenses motivated because of race, color, religion or national origin. What this Bill does is to add to that list physical handicapped or sexual orientation. The collection of this information, of course, is contingent upon the availability of State and Federal funds for such purpose. The Department of State Police and the Police Training Board make available to Police trainees courses to aide in the identification and response to and report of such incidents. The Department of State Police has no opposition to the Bill although they indicated that some time in the future they would

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appreciate some State funding in order to implement the reporting requirements that were passed that went into effect July 1st. I know of no opposition to the Bill. I'd be happy to answer any questions and would appreciate a favorable vote."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Thank you, I rise in opposition to the Bill and I want to ask everybody here, whatever happened to the concept of equal protection under the laws? Whatever happened to the concept of legislation affecting all people impartially and equally? I know the Sponsor's intentions are noble. I know it seeks to cure what some would call a history of discrimination. But really what it does is create a favored class under the law. It really is telling everybody in our society that not only are they a minority but it is a favored class of minority. Now I think the law should be neutral on this. I think this is a moral position in some respects or at least the concept of homosexuality is a moral issue to many people. It is not something that should be legislated. We should not be passing a law that a favored class in this state is the homosexual community. It is wrong. They are already protected under the law. They already have equal protection of the laws. This is just another example of a bad concept going down the wrong road. It started in 1964 with the Civil Rights Legislation. At that time, one of the Sponsors, Senator Humphrey said, no, there will be no quotas, there will be no reverse discrimination. And all we have seen since then is going down the road to reverse discrimination. Discrimination that's worse than anything that ever occurred in the past. Discrimination sanctioned by our laws and it's disgusting. Now this may not be

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exactly reversed discrimination in the sense that it sets quotas. But, it does tell our society that unless you are a homosexual you are not worthy of protection under our Civil Rights Laws, and that is wrong. It should be equal protection under the laws and this concept of special legislation for every conceivable sub-group of humanity is nonsense. They're currently covered by the law protecting them against criminal activity as is every other American, and for that matter, illegal aliens. So there is no class of persons not already covered under the law and subject to the equal protection under the laws. It's a bad idea. It's done to placate an interest group and it's awful legislation."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Preston."

Preston: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of House Bill 706 and respectfully disagree with the diatribe of my learned colleague, Representative McCracken. I think if you read the provision of this Bills you'll see that it is aimed at fighting discrimination not in being discriminatory itself, not in anyway, whatsoever. I think perhaps the ... my learned colleague has not carefully read the Bill. Perhaps, he read an analysis that was incorrect. What this Bill requires is simply that there be statistics kept, information, records kept of crimes that are committed against individuals because they are gay, so that we can have some hard evidence as to whether or not there are crimes committed against the gay and lesbian community or not. Perhaps the information we get back is that there is no need for special protective legislation because there is no discrimination, no attacks that are made against this community because of it's existence. However, on the other hand we might indeed find that this group is discriminated

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against, that crimes are committed against them because and only because of their sexual orientation and with that information the legislature may or may not decide that other further legislation is necessary. This simply gives us, a legislative body, information which today we lack. Now, in response to what Representative McCracken said about we're choosing one community and we ought not to do that, we have special categories of communities right now where special statistics are kept to see if there are crimes that are committed against disabled individuals, whether or not there are crimes committed against children, whether or not there are crimes committed against senior adults. And this would simply say we ought to also keep records as to where and when and if there are crimes committed against the gay and lesbian community to see if there does indeed exist special discrimination which we ought to eradicate in our society. This gives us information only. It's a simple Bill that does nothing more than that and we ought not be afraid of obtaining information. So I'd encourage you to vote 'yes' on House Bill 706."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? Gentleman from Madison, Representative Stephens."

Stephens: "Well thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm having some trouble understanding the motivation behind this Bill. Make no mistake about it, when you're going to get some no votes against this Bill, it has nothing to do with the physical handicap language in the Bill. The opposition to this Bill lies directly connected with the sexual orientation language, and we've got some problems understanding that because year after year in the General Assembly we talk about confidentiality. It's the one thing we want to make sure we don't want to identify someone for being gay or a

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homosexual. And now, we want to train our State Police in how to identify them, so that surely we could keep some extra records. If a couple, a man and a woman, are walking through the park, and they get beat up; we just want to call that a crime. We're not going to give them any special recognition. But if two guys are walking through the park holding hands and they get beat up, let's call out the forces. Let's call out the State Police. let's get out the record books. Let's make sure that we identify these people because, for goodness sakes, we wouldn't want to violate their rights and stop and help that couple that happened to be a man and a woman. We want to run over and take care of the gay couple to make sure that their rights, for goodness sakes, have been protected. And by the way, make sure that we don't devulge their name and identity, because they have this other problem. They don't want to know...they don't want the rest of the world to know who they are, but then they want to be protected. They want to be a special class of society rather than just being red blooded Americans subject to the laws just like everyone of us. What's wrong with being treated by the Constitution of this State, by the laws of this State, the laws that govern this Country, just like a normal human being? Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Hallock. Further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Cullerton to close."

Cullerton: "Well thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think if everyone in this country was treated the same and was treated with respect, perhaps we wouldn't have to pass a Bill like this. But unfortunately we are not all treated the same. People are discriminated against because of race, because of their color, because of

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their religion or their national origin. And so a few years ago, we passed a Bill, which passed overwhelmingly everyone supported it, which just said to the State Police, 'let's collect information concerning these particular types of crimes.' Crimes where the crime itself is committed only because of the status of the victim and we have increased penalties for certain victims. People who are senior citizens, if they're the victim of a crime there is an increased penalty. So we do recognize that in crime certain people can be singled out just because of their status. All this Bill says is that we're going to add to that list, crimes that are committed against someone because of their sexual orientation or because they have a physical handicap. Now, let me just tell you that this is not a radical Bill in any way. As a matter of fact the Bill is referred to as the Hate Crime Statistics Act. It's being Sponsored in the United States Senate and House. The Sponsors in the House include Congressman Henry Hyde, Congressman Lynn Martin and other prominent Republicans and in the Senate, the Senate Sponsor is Senator Orin Hatch. This Bill is an important Bill. It's viewed as an important Bill because there are many people in the gay community that feel that they are the victims of crimes and the motivation of the crime is simply because of the way they choose to be oriented. For that reason, I don't think you have anything to worry about in supporting a relatively simple Bill which just adds two categories to a list that's already on the State Law. For that reason, I would ask for an 'aye' vote, and would appreciate your support."

Speaker Giglio: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 706 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk,



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take the record. On this question, there are 51... Gentleman asks leave to put this Bill on postponed consideration. Does he have leave? Hearing none, leave is granted. The Bill shall be placed on the Order of postponed consideration. House Bill 487, Representative Curran, 487. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 487, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Public Community College Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Clerk Giglio: "Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative Curran."

Curran: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill simply requires the Community College Board to establish annual faculty seniority list categorized by the position. It extends to the Community College System the same responsibilities and privileges that the K-12 system has. I don't think there is any opposition to this and I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from McLean, Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Would the Sponsor yield please?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Ropp: "Representative, is this a requirement that we in fact can already do at the present time?"

Ryder: "I didn't hear the question."

Ropp: "Okay, is it possible to establish this list now in the Community College System or are you just attempting to put this into law so that it's in concrete versus what we can do right now without this law?"

Ryder: "Well, first of all, I would imagine that with great effort, almost anything is possible. This simply extends to the Community College Board, who does not object to the Bill, the same responsibilities and privileges that we give to the K-12 system. I repeat, I don't think there is any opposition to this Bill."

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Ropp: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Giglio: "Further discussion? The Gentleman from Saline, Representative Phelps."

Phelps: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I rise in support of this Bill. I think that since it was amended especially to leave to collective bargaining if any other arrangements would be made that this is not objected to and it is much needed. I would appreciate your support."

Speaker Giglio: "Lady from Champaign, Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "I rise too in support of the Legislation. The Amendment that was adopted in Committee is one that is agreed upon by the Community College people and there is no objection to my knowledge to the content of this Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Sangamon, Representative Curran to close."

Curran: "I think we've discussed it enough, I don't think there is any opposition. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Giglio: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 487 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk take the record. On this question, 114 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no', and none voting 'present'. House Bill 487 having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Klemm, 733. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 733, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm

Klemm: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 733 makes some changes in the Illinois

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Vehicle Code to allow private subdivisions who have petitioned both the counties and the cities for traffic control signs to be able to have them installed by their private contractors and pay the private contractors provided it meets the county and the municipalities approval that, the counties and municipalities passes the ordinances allowing it and to also conform to the Highway Vehicle Code. Some years ago, about 1985, the General Assembly was helpful in adopting these laws and helping the smaller subdivisions in the State of Illinois to allow this traffic control on these private roads and since it was my Bill I thank you for your support then. This tends to clarify and remove some of the restrictions that were inadvertently placed in the original Legislation in 1985. I do ask for your support."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? The question is, 'Shall House Bill 73...' excuse me, Representative, the Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Black: "Representative, I believe you amended this Bill did you not that any such signs do in fact have to be installed in accordance with all applicable rules and regulations?"

Klemm: "Yes, actually the Section did include that it had to conform to the code but for the purpose of clarification I also added Amendment #1 that specifically again repeats that, that was part of the original Bill, to meet all the objections and concerns."

Black: "One last question, if...assuming this becomes law, have you given any thought, or the body that brought this Bill to you given any thought, as to the question of liability in a case where a residential area would put in a sign and

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that results later in the sign creating an accident or someone saying that it did. Would the Highway Superintendent be liable, or the county or what?"

Klemm: "Well last year, there were a number of attempts, I think I amended about 14 or 15 different Bills to give this immunity to the local officials. In fact, I had it on Representatives Hannig's Bill at one time and it did get caught up in the Governor's Veto Message. However, it's felt that with this Amendment, with the change of the local authority, language out of that one sentence they won't need that indemnity and it would resolve that problem that we had."

Black: "Thank you very much, Representative."

Speaker Giglio: "Discussion, Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Klemm to close."

Klemm: "I just ask for your support."

Speaker Giglio: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 733 pass?' All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question 115 voting 'yes', 1 voting 'no', none voting 'present'. House Bill 733 having received required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Novak, are you ready? Out of the record. The next Order of Business, the House Will go back to House Bill's Second Reading Short Debate, on page 5, of the Calendar. Representative Leverenz? Is Representative Leverenz in the chamber? Out of the record. Representative Keane? Is Representative Keane in the chamber? Representative Leverenz, do you want to hear House Bill 5? Or, House Bill 88, I'm sorry. Second Reading Short Debate. Mr. Clerk, House Bill 88."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 88, a Bill for an Act to amend certain

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Acts in relation to airport regulations. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in committee."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Representative Keane in the chamber? Representative Keane. Out of the record. Is Representative Ryder. House Bill 211, Representative McNamara. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 211, a Bill for an Act in relation to fiscal planning and supervision commissions for units of local government. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative McNamara."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative McNamara, Amendment #1 to House Bill 211."

McNamara: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. All Amendment #1 does is put it in it's proper form by changing the direction from the Bureau of the Budget to the Comptroller. I urge for the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? The Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I believe we requested a fiscal note on this Bill. Has it been filed?"

Speaker Giglio: "Mr. Clerk, has the fiscal note been filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The fiscal not has not been filed."

Speaker Giglio: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative McNamara."

McNamara: "It is not my intention to move the Bill at this time, but I do want the Amendment on...in order to get the fiscal

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note in it's proper form."

Speaker Giglio: "Further discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor of Amendment of House Bill 211, signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments?"

Speaker Giglio: "The Sponsor asks the Bill to remain on Second Reading. The Amendment's adopted. Representative Cullerton on House Bill 316. Out of the record. Representative Dunn, John Dunn, 322. That was House Bill 321. This is House Bill 322? 322 is on Second Reading, Representative Dunn. Mr. Clerk, request for a fiscal note. Read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 322, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Has the fiscal note been filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "The fiscal note is not filed."

Speaker Giglio: "The Bill will remain on the Order of Second Reading. House Bill, Countryman, 353. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 353, a Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts in relation to jurors. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Countryman."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Countryman on Amendment #1 to House Bill 353."

Countryman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the

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House. Amendment #1 provides that the account...office of the Administrative Courts in the State of Illinois, can combine the voter registration list and the drivers license list for jury lists purposes across the state and that the Supreme Court shall intend to make appropriate rules for dealing with this. It also, provides that persons to be eligible for jury service must be citizens of the United States of America, and the combination list is not required for Cook County, as the Bill is not applicable for Cook County. I move its adoption."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? The Gentleman from Effingham, Representative Hartke."

Hartke: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Giglio: "He indicates he will."

Hartke: "Representative Countryman, does this mean that 16 year old will be seated on juries possibly?"

Countryman: "No, because when they combine the list, they'll have to determine the age which is something that's appropriately on the driver's license list and they'll only take those over the age of 18."

Hartke: "Okay, thank you."

Speaker Giglio: "Further discussion, Gentleman from DeKalb, Representative Countryman to close."

Countryman: "I just ask for your affirmative vote."

Speaker Giglio: "All those in favor of the Amendment to House Bill 353, signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, The 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. House Bill 370, Representative Hasara. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 370, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to adoption of persons. Second Reading of the

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Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Hasara."

Speaker Giglio: "The Lady from Springfield, Representative Hasara."

Hasara: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1 simply clarifies the intent of the legislation. And what it does is to require all counties in the state to keep adoption records according to the Illinois Supreme Court's Administrative Order on record keeping. At the present time there are about 75 counties under this order, and this would simply extend the number to include all counties in the State."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor of the Amendment signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Representative Giorgi, House Bill 435. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 435, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Representative Weaver, 447. Is Representative Weaver in the chamber? Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 447, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No



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Committee Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Weaver."

Weaver: "I'd like to withdraw Amendment #1 please."

Speaker Giglio: "Withdraw Amendment #1. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Weaver."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Weaver, on Amendment #2."

Weaver: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment is virtually the same as the one we discussed last week. There was a technical difficulty with the one last week that Representative Homer brought to our attention. This Amendment takes care of that problem with Amendment #1 and I'll be happy to answer any questions on this."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion on Amendment #2? Hearing none, all those in favor of the Amendment signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Representative Levin. Is Representative Levin in the chamber? Out of the record Mr. Clerk. Representative Richmond. Is Representative Richmond in the chamber? Representative Richmond. Representative Ryder, House Bill 510. Is Representative Ryder in the chamber? Out of the record. Representative Granberg, House Bill 519. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 519, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to the adoption of persons. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

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Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Are we going to return... we are going to return to House Bill 333, Representative Mays. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman from Adams, Representative Mays."

Mays: "Yes, I'd ask leave to bring this House Bill back to Second Reading for the purposes of tabling Amendment and to adding another one."

Speaker Giglio: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing none, leave is granted. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 333, a Bill for an Act in relation to state occupation and use tax application. This Bill has been read a Second time previously and Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "A Motion to table Amendment #1 by Representative Mays."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Mays."

Mays: "Yes, thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. Amendment #1 substantively was okay, but technically it was not. It was sufficient and as a result I move to table Amendment #1 and follow up with Amendment #2."

Speaker Giglio: "Gentleman asks leave to table Amendment #1? Hearing none, leave is granted and Amendment #1 is tabled. Further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Mays."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Mays on Amendment #2."

Mays: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is the technically correct version of the Amendment #1 and I would move its adoption."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion on the Amendment? Hearing none, all those in favor of the Amendment signify by saying

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'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Representative Granberg, 522. Out of the record. Page 8 of the Calendar. Representative Matijevich, 566. Representative Matijevich, 566. Out of the record. Representative Curran, 580. Representative Curran. Out of the record. Representative Cullerton, 601. Out of the record. Representative Wojcik. Representative Wojcik, House Bill 602. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 602, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1, was adopted in committee."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Novak."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Novak. Representative Wojcik. Amendment #2."

Wojcik: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. What Amendment does to House Bill 602, it just adds a comma in it's rightful place because there is a discrepancy in so far as the comma is concerned."

Speaker Giglio: "Any discussion on the Amendment? Hearing none, all those in favor of the Amendment signify by saying 'aye', those opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Third Reading. Representative Dunn. John Dunn. Representative Dunn. Mr. Clerk, House Bill 603, read the

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Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 603, a Bill for an Act to amend the Hearing Aid Consumer Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Speaker Giglio: "The fiscal note requested."

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Giglio: "Fiscal note request?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note has not been filed."

Speaker Giglio: "Out of the record. Read and held...the Bill was read and held on Second Reading. Representative Cullerton, House Bill 601. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 601, a Bill for an Act in relation to certain injuries. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendments #1 and 2 were adopted in committee."

Speaker Giglio: "Any Motions filed?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed."

Speaker Giglio: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #3, offered by Representative McCracken."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative McCracken on Amendment #3 to House Bill 601. Is Representative McCracken in the chamber? Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Mr. Speaker, I agree with Representative McCracken's Amendment. I would ask leave to handle the Amendment for him. I'm the chief Sponsor of the Bill. I agree with the Amendment. I'd like to have leave to..."

Speaker Giglio: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing none, leave is granted. Proceed Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "In this Bill there is a council..."

Speaker Giglio: "Representative Breslin in the Chair."

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Cullerton: "...which right now is a 25 Member Council. This Amendment would make it to a 29 Member Council. The four new Members would be appointed by the two Minority Leaders of the House. I'm sorry. Two would be appointed by the Minority Leader of the House. There is only one Minority Leader of the House. I apologize. And two would be appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate. So, I agree with the Gentleman's Amendment. I'm sure it was just an oversight that when the Bill was drafted there were no appointments made by the Minorities and I am glad that that was corrected and I would move for the adoption of Amendment #3."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3. And on that question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #3 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. With permission of the Assembly, Representative Black...okay, with permission of the Assembly, we'll now go back to Representative McPike's Bill appearing on Page 7, House Bill 535. Hearing no objection, read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 535, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the State Salary and Annuity Withholding Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Going back to Page 8, the next Bill on the call is House Bill 616, Representative Ronan. Out of the record. House Bill 633, Representative Lang.

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Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 633, a Bill for an Act to Amend an Act to revise the law in relation to husband and wife. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Lang."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Lang."

Lang: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1 becomes the Bill. This amends the Family Expense Act and it simply states that biological parents will be responsible for medical expenses of their children. I've had situations come up in my law practice, where parents of children who are not married try to avoid responsibility for their children's medical expenses. And by adding this sentence to the Family Expense Act we will obviate that problem. I ask...that we adopt, I move that we adopt the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1 to House Bill 633, and on that question, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Piel."

Piel: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Breslin: "He will."

Piel: "Lou, we got a question in reference to the the wording the way it is in there. How would this affect an adoptive situation?"

Lang: "I could not hear the...did you ask how it affects adoptions?"

Piel: "How would it affect the situation adoption? You're talking about biological parents."

Lang: "Well, the purpose of the Amendment is not to keep people that currently have responsibility from paying. What it

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does is clarify the responsibility of the biological parent. An adoptive parent will not have any different responsibilities if we adopt this Amendment."

Piel: "So, there's no way that this could be construed...I'm looking at a situation where the adoptive parents do know who the biological parents are. There is no way this could be construed to where the adoptive parents could go after the biological parents and say, 'hey, I want you to pay part of this.' You know, technically, the adoptive parents are the legal parents of the child."

Lang: "Well, that's certainly not the intention of the Bill. And that's not the way I read it. I think we'll just have a simple situation, where the biological father, for instance, who, is nowhere to be found, is suddenly found by the biological mother who has custody of the child. She can, then make the biological father pay the medical bills."

Piel: "I have no qualms with that Lou. I understand what your point is what you're trying to do but and I have no qualms with that whatsoever. But, what my question dealt with was strictly the area of adoption. So the way that you're putting this in and the way your interpretation is is that the adoptive parents cannot go back to the biological parents and ask them for any medical expenses in the future. Correct?"

Lang: "Well, I understand your concern, Representative. I don't think that problem will occur I think it's written in a way that will alleviate that problem."

Piel: "Okay, thank you, no further questions, Madam Speaker."

Speaker Breslin: "Is there any further discussion? Hearing none. The question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye'. all those opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's

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adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 634, Representative Lang. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 634, a Bill for an Act concerning delinquent debts. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Lang."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Lang."

Lang: "Thank you, Madam Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Amendment #1, becomes the Bill. We all know about the great millions of dollars of debt owed to the State of Illinois. Under current law all state agencies are to report to the Comptroller, once each year, all delinquent debt owed to the state. This Amendment will simply require the comptroller to report that information to the General Assembly and to the Governor and I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #1, to House Bill 634. On the question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 702, Representative Richmond, out of the record. On Page 9, appears House Bill 753, Representative Woolard. Mr. Woolard? Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 753, a Bill for an Act to amend the



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Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1  
was adopted in committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed. Floor Amendment #2, offered by  
Representative Woolard."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Woolard, you have Amendment #2  
filed to this Bill."

Woolard: "It's only correcting some spelling."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, the Gentleman has moved for the adoption  
of Amendment #2 to House Bill 753. He says it only  
corrects some spelling. On the question, Mr. Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker. Just a procedural  
matter, we don't seem to have Amendment #2, whether it  
corrects spelling or grammar or what. Has it been printed  
and distributed?"

Speaker Breslin: "It has not been printed or distributed.  
Therefore, Representative Woolard, what is your pleasure.  
Do you wish to take the Bill out of the record at this time  
or do you want to table the Amendment?"

Woolard: "Take it out of the record."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, out of the record. House Bill 757,  
Representative Countryman. Mr. Countryman is he in the  
chamber? Out of the record. House Bill 777,  
Representative Countryman. Out of the record. House Bill  
799, Representative Stange. Representative Stange? Out of  
the record. House Bill 822, Representative Jones. Shirley  
Jones. Do you wish to call this Bill, Representative?  
Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 822, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act  
creating the Department of Children and Family Services.  
Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

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Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill...excuse me Representative Black. For what reason do you rise?"

Black: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker, we filed a fiscal note on House Bill 822. Has that been filed?"

Speaker Breslin: "The Calendar indicates that it has been filed."

Clerk O'Brien: "Fiscal note is filed."

Black: "I'm sorry, I'll get my glasses cleaned, thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, House Bill 852, Representative Matijevich. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 852, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Matijevich."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Yes, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a Bill of the Illinois Vocational Association and this is their Amendment. It was a Vehicle Bill for Amendment. The Amendment would implement a recommendation that the Committee on Vocational Education an Higher Education Admissions Standards. And it would state that the Board of Higher Education in establishing, announcing or distributing minimum admissions and requirements shall clearly state that any minimum admission requirements or standards are...are not applicable to persons seeking admission to occupational or vocational programs at public community colleges. I would ask for your support in the adoption of Amendment #1."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1190, a Bill for an Act to amend the Public Community College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Ewing."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Yes, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment has been cleared with the Sponsor of the Bill and it deals with the public junior college, which the

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Illinois Community College Board intends to create in an area extending from Pontiac on the North to Lincoln on the South, along the I-55 corridor. This portion of the state was never included in a Junior College District and this legislation is needed to provide for the creation of that district, by the Illinois Community College Board. It does provide for the election of the trustees to this Junior College in separate districts and I would ask for the approval of this Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 1190. On the question, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Just to indicate that Representative Ewing and I have discussed this matter and I concur with the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the chair, the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #3 to House Bill 1199. On the question, the Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker, and I'm sure Amendment #3, does exactly what the Sponsor said it does, but we don't have it. Has it been printed and distributed?"

Dunn: "Put it on Third."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, the Gentleman moves to table, or withdraw his Amendment #3. Are there any further Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1202, Representative Homer. Mr. Homer. Out of the record. House Bill 1203, Representative McPike. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1203, a Bill for an Act in relation to Labor Relations. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1

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was adopted in committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No, no Motions filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Any further Amendments?"

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1207, Representative Ewing. Clerk, read the Bill."

It's an accepted Bill by the Capitol Development Board and I would ask for its approval."

Leitch: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. And accordingly that is the purpose of this Amendment and I think it enjoys everyone's support."

Representative Currie, the fiscal note has not yet been  
complied with so we'll keep the Bill on Second Reading.  
Mr. Black, House Bill 1358. Representative Currie. Clerk,  
read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1358, a Bill for an Act to amend the  
Illinois Solid Waste Management Act. Second Reading of the  
Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Currie."

Currie: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Members of the House. The  
underlying Bill creates an advisory task force on  
degradable plastics. The Department of Commerce and  
Community Affairs informed me that they would like to be

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part of that task force and the Amendment, House Amendment 1, would add DCCA to that group."

Speaker Breslin: "You have heard the Amendment. The Lady moves for the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 1358. On the question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment 1...Representative Black.'"

Black: "Not on the Amendment, Madam Speaker, not on the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall Amendment 1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Now, Representative Black."

Black: "I believe we asked for a fiscal note on this Bill. Is that so reflected?"

Speaker Breslin: "Is that true, Mr. Clerk? On House Bill 1358, has a fiscal note been requested?"

Clerk O'Brien: "I don't have any request on file here."

Black: "We'll bring it down to you, Mr. Clerk."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, we have waited for the fiscal note. Representative Currie has filed that fiscal note. So the Bill, now, moves to Third Reading. With leave, I go back to House Bill 1356, for Representative Currie also, Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1356, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Solid Waste Management Act. This Bill has been read a Second time, previously. No Committee or Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, Third Reading. House Bill 1366, Representative Phelps. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1366, a Bill for an Act to amend an



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Act in relation to prisoners in jails. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Turning to page 14, on your Calendar, Ladies and Gentlemen, appears House Bill 1372, Representative Mays. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1372, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Collection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1384, Representative Cullerton, out of the record. House Bill 1385, Representative Cullerton and Wolf. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1385, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Pension Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. With leave we'll go back to House Bill 1384 since Representative Wolf is on the floor. Clerk, read the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Olson, a fiscal note is requested on this Bill so the Bill remains on Second Reading. House Bill 1400, Representative Phelps. Representative Olson."

Olson, M.: "Yes, Madam Speaker, I believe at the start of today's Session, a Motion was filed with the Clerk to withdraw the fiscal note."

Speaker Breslin: "Mr. Clerk, would you search your records for that? Representative Olson, the Clerk has found your request to withdraw the fiscal note. But another fiscal note has been requested, so you will have to comply with that. So House Bill 1400, Representative Phelps. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1400, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions. No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay, Representative Black, the fiscal note has been filed so the Bill moves to Third Reading. House Bill

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1401, Representative Wait. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1401, a Bill for an Act in relation to livestock. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Wait."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Wait."

Wait: "Thank you, Madam Chairman. Amendment #1, simply deletes the part dealing with cattle dealers. There was controversy in committee and we said we would take that controversial section out. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 1401. On the question is, there any discussion? Hearing none. The question is, 'Shall Amendment 1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'nay'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are no further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1403, Representative Turner. Out of the record. House Bill 1404, Representative...excuse me Representative Black, for what reason do you rise?"

Black: "Madam Speaker, in the absence of Representative Turner, would it be alright if I move that Bill for him? I'm a hyphenated Co-Sponsor."

Speaker Breslin: "Fine, with me if its okay with Repres...oh. Representative Turner is here."

Black: "Do you want to move it? Alright, thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "Out of the record. House Bill...thats one of the times we get in trouble, Ladies and Gentlemen. Let's be sure that our hyphenated Sponsors know the plan on each

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individual Bills so that things can move more smoothly here. House Bill 1404, Representative Davis. Representative Davis? Out of the record. I'll move back with permission of the Body to House Bill 1404. Read the Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

Giglio: "Well, the word it says...it says the line, page 1 line 6, change the word 'the' to 'for'. Just one word." Frank, I may need to get with

Black: "Frank, I may need to get with you because the Amendment that we have says, considerably, more than that."

Giglio: "Is this House Bill 1443?"

Black: "Yes, it is. Could we take it out of the record, just a second, to get together on it."

Giglio: "Take it out...sure...take it out of the record, Madam Speaker."

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Speaker Breslin: "Out of the record. House Bill 14...on page 15, appears House Bill 1451, Representative Kulas. Mr. Kulas. Out of the record. House Bill 1471, Representative Terzich. Mr. Terzich. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1471, a Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No Motions. No further Amendments."

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Amendment. It's a clarifying Amendment. It raises the price of these collegiate license plates to \$88.00, \$25.00 goes to the university. It's agreed to by....I know of no opposition. I move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 1417, and on that question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment's adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Olson."

Olson, M.: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker of the House. I best inquire of the Chair if this Amendment has been



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distributed?"

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment 2?"

Olson, M.: "I have an inquiry of the Chair. First of all, I need to know if the Amendment has been distributed?"

Speaker Breslin: "Representen...it has not been printed and distributed, Representative Myron Olson, so the Bill will be taken out of the record. House Bill 1705. Out of the record. House Bill 1713, Representative Countryman. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1713, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to claims and actions against descendants of states. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1723, Representative Mautino. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1723, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to create the limited health service. Second Reading of the Bill. Amendment #1, was adopted in committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "No Motions filed. No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Representative John Dunn, for what reason do you seek recognition? The Gentleman indicates he is not seeking recognition. House Bill 1723, Representative Mautino. Clerk, read the Bill. 1724, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1724, a Bill for an Act to create the Upper Illinois River Valley Development Authority. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

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Speaker Breslin: "Representative Mautino, a fiscal note has been requested, and is not on file. So the Bill remains on Second Reading. House Bill 1716, (sic House Bill 1726) Representative Pullen. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1726, a Bill for an Act to amend the Abused and Neglected Child Reporting Act. Second Reading of the Bill. There are no Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1737, Representative John Dunn. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1737, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Civil Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1738, Representative John Dunn. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1738, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Civil Procedure. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. House Bill 1741, Representative Cullerton. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1741, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Civil Procedures. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative McCracken."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative McCracken. Representative Black for Representative McCracken."

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Black: "Madam Speaker."

Speaker Breslin: "Excuse me. Representative Cullerton for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Cullerton: "The Sponsor is not here, I don't know if Representative Black, could fully understand the implication of the Amendment. So, I think I would move to table the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Black, the Gentleman objects to your presenting the Amendment."

Black: "Well, that some how takes me completely by surprise. Gee, I don't know what do now. All I was really going to do was ask him if the Amendments had been distributed?"

Speaker Breslin: "That's a reasonable request. Mr. Clerk can you find that out. It has been printed and distributed, Mr. Black."

Black: "Well, Madam Speaker, I wasn't sure about that and I certainly don't object to Representative Cullerton's objection, but since they have been printed and distributed, I'm trying to speak as slowly as I can so that Representative McCracken might come down and enlighten us as to the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Black, Representative Cullerton, has had a change of heart. Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Well, Madam Speaker, all I'm trying to do is accomplish the same thing that Representative Black is trying to do. I'm trying to get Representative McCracken down here as well so I can ask him about some of these fiscal notes he's been filing. When he gets here, I'm gonna take the Bill out of the record."

Speaker Breslin: "I see, and in the meantime what do you suggest we do?"

Cullerton: "Well, I think if I move to table it and then we can vote on that while he debates. ...That would take too long,

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I'll just take it out of the record."

Speaker Breslin: "Thank you, Out of the record. House Bill 1749, out of the record. House Bill 1752, Representative Preston. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1752, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Alcholism and other Drug Dependency Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk Leone: "There are none."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. With leave of the Body, I'd like to go back to House Bill 1724, Representative Mautinos Bill. Mr. Clerk, read that Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 1724, a Bill for an Act to create the upper Illinois River Valley Development Authority, has been read a Second time, previously."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments."

Clerk Leone: "No Motions, no Amendments. A fiscal note has been filed."

Speaker Breslin: "Very good move the Bill to Third Reading. Ladies and Gentleman, we are moving to the Order of House Bills, Third Reading, the Short Debate Calendar. It begins on page 53 of your Calendar. Page 53, this is Third Reading. Please survey this order of business and if you have Bills to present please be in your seat and ready to present it. The first Bill is House Bill 2, Representative Preston. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill #2, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Preston."

Preston: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 2 amends the School Code and requires that all elementary schools in Illinois include in there curriculum in each of grades kindergarten through

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eighth a unit of instruction on drug abuse avoidance. The definition of what a unit is is left to the individual school board to decide. So, it may be as extensive or as minimal as is considered at the discretion of the individual school board. I think at this time in Illinois, we have probably no more meaningful, no more important piece of legislation than this. Governor Thompson indicated in his State of the State Message that he thought that prevention of drug abuse through education is where Illinois ought to be focusing its assets and its energies in 1989 and beyond. That's what the...now our drug czar, who, when he was head of the Department on Education in Washington, indicated also that education is the key to prevention of drug problem in the youth of America. Through this Bill, if we start at an early age, and the key here is starting at an early age, to educate children that even even in kindergarten and first and second grade to tell children that their moms and their dads are the people who give medicines to them and they don't take medicine or pills or drugs from a stranger unless that individual is a doctor or a school nurse or a mother or a father or someone in there...in whose custody and control they're in,...later on a curriculum could become more extensive and through this early repetitive education we will stem a problem, nip a problem in the bud before we have to intervene with corrective measures and with therapy later on."

Speaker Breslin: "House Bill 2. This Bill, Ladies and Gentlemen, is one of those Bills that received no negative votes in Committee. This Bill and all of the other Bills on this order of business therefore, will be under that order where we will recognize people to speak in opposition only. If there are questions that Members would like to ask, you will be recognized for a question. But my first question

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to the membership is: 'Does anyone rise in opposition? If there is, I will recognize that person. Are there questions? Representative Cowlshaw has a question. Proceed Representative Cowlshaw.'

Cowlshaw: "Thank you, Madam Sponsor. Will the Sponsor...Madam Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Breslin: "He will."

Cowlshaw: "Representative Preston we all recognize the importance of early education on this subject. I noticed, however, that you mentioned that one of the provisions of this Bill is that it doesn't say it has to be eight weeks or it doesn't give any specific time commitment, and it's my understanding that that is your response to what might be an objection on the basis that this is an unfunded mandate. Is your reason for doing so in order to preclude there being any validity to that what otherwise would certainly be a valid objection."

Preston: "Yes, Representative it is. That was...it was specifically designed so that a school district who...that did not have necessary funding to do an extensive program, could do a minimal fulfillment of this mandate by (for example) Inviting the local Police Department to make a presentation at an assembly at one time during the year. That would fulfill the mandate. It wouldn't satisfy Preston. I would like to think it wouldn't satisfy Cowlshaw but it would fulfill the mandate so that there can't be an objection 'well we don't have the money.' If you don't have the money, you can do it very inexpensively. If you do have the money as some school districts do and some school districts now voluntarily do beautiful jobs of having Drug Abuse Voidance Education in their schools, the more you can afford the more extensive your program may be and the more that an adjacent school district or some other

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school district might want to emulate your program, might want to copy it and borrow it for use in their own school district without going through the expenditure of a curriculum development. That's a long answer. I guess the simple answer is yes."

Cowlshaw: "Thank you, Representative Preston and thank you for permitting me to ask the question, Madam Speaker."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Dunn, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Dunn: "Not with regard to the Bill, but are you outlining the procedure for debate?"

Speaker Breslin: "Yes, that's the procedure for debate for Bills on the Short Debate Calendar. You recognize the person to speak in opposition. Otherwise we allow people to ask questions. That's always been the procedure. That's not new."

Dunn: "One person in opposition."

Speaker Breslin: "One person in opposition."

Dunne: "Alright."

Speaker Breslin: "Okay. There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 2 pass'. All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 107 voting 'aye', 4 voting 'no' and 3 voting 'present' 'present'. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby edeclared pass. House Bill 43, Representative Pedersen, William Pedersen. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 43, a Bill for an Act in relationship to parks and golf courses. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Pedersen."

Pedersen, W: "Thank you, Madam Speaker Members of the House."

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House Bill 43 would provide the increase from 10 acres to 25 acres, the limitation on which a townships power to acquire lands by purchaser condemnation for public parks or golf courses would be increased to. This was suggested by the township officials of Illinois. Similar legislation has passed in previous sessions. One by Representative Klemm for golf course purposes. This is an answer to some of those townships that want to acquire more open space but do not want to go to the Open Space Referendum and the bonding. I would seek your approval of House Bill 43."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentlemen has moved for the passage of House Bill 43. Does anyone rise in opposition? Hearing none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 43 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record on this question. There are 111 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and 1 voting present. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared pass. House Bill 55, Representative Pedersen. Clerk read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 55, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relationship to Township Community Buildings. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Pedersen."

Pedersen, W: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, House Bill 55 provides that a Township Community Building Board of Managers may receive a salary not to exceed \$25 per day or \$500 per year as determined by the Township Board of Trustees. This Bill passed out of the House, last session, by 110 to nothing vote. It was never released from the Senate Rules Committee, I know of no opposition. I ask for a favorable Roll Call."



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Speaker Breslin: "The Gentlemen has moved for the passage of House Bill 55. Does anyone rise in opposition? Hearing none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 55 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye' all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 111 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority it's hereby declared pass. House Bill 98, Representative Ewing. Clerk read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 98, a Bill for an Act in relationship to Garbage Disposals. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Ewing."

Ewing: "Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill was introduced at the request of one the counties in my district and it provides that in a review of a process for proceedings for sighting of a landfill that the county will be reimbursed for the transcripts. Now, we had this Bill once before and I think you Madam Speaker and I had some disagreement on the Bill but this Bill has been amended and there is an Amendment which says that if the person requesting the transcript is a group that participated in deciding proceedings and is so located as to be affected by deciding that they would not have to pay for these transcripts. I think it's an agreed Bill. It's one that can help our county."

Speaker Breslin: "Does any...the Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 98. Does anyone rise in opposition? No one rising in opposition. Representative Williams has a question. Proceed Representative Williams."

Williams: "Yes, my question is very simple, though. If I'm correct, the Amendments read...in the event the plaintiff is a citizen group... Is the plaintiff in each instance

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here the bringing party? Is there any...sort of explain to me cause I don't truly understand why you said the term plaintiff as opposed to the party that was offering the...It may have even been the defendant in a normal case, I'm not sure how these work so please explain to me why we use the term plaintiff, specifically?"

Ewing: "Your question is, 'why do we use the word plaintiff?...Well, the plaintiff would possibly be the Appellant or it could be the person doing the appealing, I don't know why they drafted it with that the language they used..."

Williams: "Then the the...Are you saying that the appealing party is always the plaintiff?"

Ewing: "Well, according to the way this is written they would be the plaintiff, I think."

Williams: "...I don't have any questions I was just curious as to why you said that?"

Ewing: "I'll be glad to talk to you about it, but I can't answer it beyond that."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 98 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those oppose, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 114 voting 'aye' none voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed, House Bill 100, Representative Novak. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 100, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Novak."

Novak: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Simply, this legislation responds to a situation

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that occurred in our state last year. We're all aware of the devastation of the drought that occurred in Illinois and across the midwest. Many farmers in Illinois went to their local insurance agents, their crop insurance agents and purchased drought insurance with the Chub International Group. When the drought was occurring and going on through June two weeks later to three weeks, they were told, 'you paid your money up front but you can't have insurance. We don't have enough money to fund your coverage.' The farmers got a real raw deal in Illinois and in Ohio, Indiana, and Minnesota and all of our midwestern states. If wasn't for a Federal District Law Suit in Ohio to enjoin the company that is now making payments back to the farmers this situation would occur again. We don't know what the situation in Illinois and the Midwest is gonna be this year as far as moisture for our farmers. This Bill simply mandates that any insurer in Illinois that provides drought insurance shall notify the farmer within ten days whether they're accepted or rejected for their application. I ask you for your support."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 100. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 100 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 111 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 115. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 115, a Bill for an Act allowing for the creation of museum districts. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Olson."

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Olson, M: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Members of the House. At the request of Kelly Cost of the Democratic Staff. I would like to take the Bill out of the record for purposes of a favorable Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "Out of the record, House Bill 124, Representative Preston. Mr. Preston, this is your Bill on Third Reading. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk Leone: "House Bill 124, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Preston: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 124...has been the program really throughout the country, starting in the United States Congress and really in this General Assembly as well, of removing mandatory Retirement Ages, what House Bill 124 does is to remove the mandatory retirement ages for teachers and principals throughout Illinois. Right now there's a mandatory retirement age of 70 which simply makes no sense and we were talking earlier about discrimination. This discriminates against senior adults as a classification rather than requiring seniors to be treated as everyone else on an individual basis. One person at 70...one person at 60 or in the case of perhaps of my seat mate a few years earlier than 60 might be quite incompetent and in other cases somebody who is beyond 70 might be very competent. Rosco Pound, when he was in his 80's wrote a 12 volume treatise on the Chinese Legal System and others we know including President Reagan served as President of the United States way beyond the age of 70. There is no justification whatsoever, to regard an individual as a group, or a group of individuals one single way because a page comes off of a Calendar. The United States Congress wiped out mandatory Retirement Ages for all federal employees except for police officers and military. We in

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Illinois have done that in many categories of employees and this does it for teachers and for principals. I'd be glad to answer any of your questions and I encourage any of your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentlemen has moved for the passage of House Bill 124. Does anyone rise in opposition? The Lady from Dupage, Representative Cowlshaw."

Cowlshaw: "Madam Speaker, I did not vote 'no' on this Bill in Committee. I voted present, but I would like to explain my reason for that position. The fact is that generally the people who have attained a greater age than the average for teachers and principals are those who are receiving the highest salaries and therefore, are the most costly to school districts. When those people retire they are generally replaced by someone considerably younger and because of the way the salaries schedules work both for principals and for teachers many times the replacement individual cost less money for the school district. Of this Bill does have cost factors for school districts, I agree that we ought not to require someone to retire simply because they have reached a certain age and that there may well be people who are 70 or 72 or beyond, who do such an excellent job that they are worth every penny of those rather high salaries that people of that age receive. Never the less, our schools are in severe financial problem. One in every 5 school districts in this state is right now on the watch list of financially troubled school districts as determined by the State Board of Education. That is a deplorable situation. To the extent that this Bill will cost school districts money, I have to vote present."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Preston to close."

Preston: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. With all due respect to my

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learned colleague on the other side of the aisle, I think even to vaguely imply that we ought to cure the financial problems of school districts by discriminating against senior adults who have spent a lifetime as being taxpayers rather than taxeaters and want to continue being taxpayers rather than being retired and becoming pension and taxeaters is quite outrageous. I think that this not only saves money for taxpayers, but it preserves human dignity and preserves the most able of our teachers and principals those with the most experience. This doesn't mean in anyway whatsoever, that someone who is at a given age has to be maintained on a payroll no matter...no matter what. no matter if they're able or not. This just means if some one wants to continue working."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Preston, bring your remarks to a close. You have one minute to close in Short Debate. Representative Preston is recognized to bring his remarks to a close, Mr. Electrician."

Preston: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, I will bring my remarks to a close. People who want to work, are qualified to work and who are able to work ought not to be prevented from working as a class of people simply because one page or one Calendar comes off. People are individuals they ought not to be classified. I encourage your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 124 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 97 voting 'aye', 5 voting 'no' and 7 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. On page 54 appears House Bill 132, Representative Martinez. Clerk, read the Bill."

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Clerk Leone: "House Bill 132, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Martinez."

Martinez: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Members of the House of Representatives. House Bill 132, as amended, amends the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois to require the department to conduct a public information campaign to inform Hispanics, African American and other population groups, at risk of how AIDS is contracted, Methods of prevention and available medical services. I think I was requested of...physical notice but the department says there is none needed here. I ask for your favorable support."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 132. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 13...Representative Kubik, for what reason do you seek recognition?'"

Kubik: "Question of the Sponsor."

Speaker Breslin: "Proceed."

Kubik: "Representative Martinez, according to our files Committee Amendment #1 was adopted?"

Martinez: "Yes, in Committee."

Kubik: "Right and doesn't that change the Bill?"

Martinez: "Not in my opinion. All we did was include African Americans and other ethnic groups."

Kubik: "Our analysis says that it would require the Department of Public Health to establish a program to study the incidence of AIDS within Hispanics in the Hispanic population..."

Martinez: "...That was the case originally but the Amendment changed it to Afro-Americans and other ethnic groups."

Kubik: "O.K. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 132 pass?'"

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All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 112 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and one voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. House Bill 174, Representative Shaw. Representative Shaw. Out of the record. House Bill 185, Representative Black. Clerk read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 185, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Cemetery Maintenance Districts. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much Madam Speaker, Members of the House. House Bill 185 simply authorizes a Cemetery Maintenance District to borrow up to \$50,000 by mortgage for no more than 20 years to purchase land for gravesites. It does authorize districts to except gifts for any legal purpose. There is nothing in here to be construed as a tax levy or permission to do so."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 185. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 185 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 112 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. House Bill 207, Representative Cowlshaw. Clerk read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 207, a Bill for an Act concerning Fire Protection. Third Reading of the Bill."



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Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cowlshaw."

Cowlshaw: "Thank you, Madam Speaker Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 207 has sometime been referred to as the Hinsdale Fire Bill. You will all recall a year ago Mother's Day and Mother's Day is this coming Sunday. A year ago Mothers Day there was a severe fire in the Illinois Bell Switching Station in Hinsdale which resulted in virtually hundreds of thousands of people being without telephone service for quite an extended period of time. An extensive study was done of that fire and House Bill 207 is the result of a consensus among all those concerned. It is opposed by no one...It does something very simple. It simply authorizes Illinois Commerce Commission, the office of the State Fire Marshall and the Illinois Emergency Services and Disaster Agency to adopt joint rules to provide for fire protection and emergency response systems at Telecommunications Service Facilities throughout Illinois. I move for it's adoption."

Speaker Breslin: "The lady moves for the passage of House Bill 207. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 207 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 112 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. House Bill 240, Representative Steczko. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 240, a Bill for an Act relating to Civic Centers. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Steczko."

Steczko: "Thank you, Madam Speaker Members of the House. House Bill 240 seeks to create a Civic Center authority through

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the city of Harvey, Illinois. Harvey, Illinois is located in the South Cook County Suburbs and is in a very strategic location to be able to attract Conventions, Trade Shows, etc., etc., and in fact, borders other communities where a large concentrations of hotels are in the South Suburban area. The South Suburban area that would be covered by the Harvic Civic Center Authority would be able to utilize the facility, would encompass about 900,000 people which is larger than many states in the United States and in terms of drawing convention business and tourism business and trade show business, the city of Harvey has a facility that needs to be renovated in order to do that, a facility that can be expanded and renovated to serve in essence as a incubator for various kinds of trade shows and conventions. In some cases, what's happened before the city has managed to bring in conventions, nurture them until they've grown and then moved off either to Champaign or to Peoria or to Chicago. So in a very important area of the state, a state that certainly needs to have the kind of business that could be brought in by the Convention Center the Civic Center Authority is important. The city, also is also aware that right now, there's a lack of funding for Civic Center Authorites. They are willing to be put on the list and wait their turn, but they feel it is important at least to be considered at some point for the creation of the authority, the renovation of the building in order to attract some of the business that they would be able to attract."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 240. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 240 pass?' Excuse, me Representative Hultgren rises in opposition. Representative Hultgren."

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Hultgren: "If the Sponsor yield for question."

Speaker Breslin: "He will yield for question."

Hultgren: "The Taxing Authority here, is that with a front door referendum...?"

Steczo: "Representative, there is no Taxing Authority."

Hultgren: "Alright, thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Black, for what reason do you seek recognition?"

Black: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker, if I could ask the Sponsor a question?"

Speaker Breslin: "Proceed."

Black: "Thank you, Representative, do you have an idea...I heard you say a while ago about they'd wait their turn, but should this...and I'm sure that you have the requisite number of votes...What are we now, up to on issued obligations for Civic Centers? Are we not up to a considerable amount of money?"

Steczo: "Representative Black, that's a question I really cannot answer. I'm not, I have not been in touch with DCCA or the agencies that fund the Civic Center so I really have no idea what the unfunded liability of the program is."

Black: "By your leave, if I could in the state impact debt note that was filed with your Bill, we're now up to 300.6 million dollars. So it's...I'm sure you'er going to have the requisite number of votes, but one of these days, I guess, we're going to have to get serious about that unfunded liability."

Hultgren: "I would hope we would, and Harvey will be ready to help should the Civic Center Authority be created."

Black: "Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "The question is, 'Shall House Bill 240 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all

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voted who wish? Representative Black, do you still seek recognition? He does not. Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 101 voting 'aye', 4 voting 'no' 7 voting 'present'. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 251, Representative Cullerton. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 251, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Civil Procedure. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill contains not only House Bill 251 but also House Bill 97 that was introduced by Representative Ewing and he asked me if I would add it as an Amendment to his Bill. So first, let me explain what House Bill 251 is. It amends the Code of Civil Procedure to provide that partnerships may sue as well as be sued in the firm name or as individual partners doing business as a partnership or both. Currently a partnership may be sued in the names of the partners and individuals doing business as a partnership or in the firm name or both. So the change is that allows partnership to both sue and be sued under the name of the partnership. Now the second...I better tell you about the second part of the Bill because that's House Bill 97 and that's Representative Ewing's Bill. This provides that when notice by publication is used in a proceeding a plaintiff or his or her attorney rather than the Circuit Clerk shall mail a copy of the published notice to the defendant and file an affidavit stating that the copy was mailed and it provides that the copy of the notice shall be sent by certified mail. A current law...well, let's put it this way, the Bill shifts the burden of mailing copies of the publication notice from the Clerks of

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the Circuit Court to the plaintiff or the attorney for the plaintiff. I'd be happy to answer any questions and appreciate your support."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 251. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 251 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those oppose vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 110 voting 'aye', 1 voting 'no' and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 260, Representative Giorgi. Clerk read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 260, a Bill for an Act to amend the Sanitary District Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Giorgi: "Madam Speaker, House Bill 260 amends the Sanitary District Act of 17 allows annexation of property that is served by any sewer system connected to and served by Sanitary District and also defines what it means to be served by the Sanitary District. And what it means to be served by the Sanitary District is...you're considered to be served by a district if a sewer that is part of district, municipal system or other system served by the district, has been extended to, or across or along the property whether or not the buildings on the property are physically connected to sewer. In other words, if the sewers is available to increase the property and the property is contiguous to the district, it is deemed to be served even if there is an actual physical connection. I urge an 'aye'..."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman ask move for the passage of House Bill 260. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being

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none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 260 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 114 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', none voting present. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 261, Representative Giorgi. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 261, a Bill for an Act to amend the Sanitary District Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Madam Speaker, This Bill allows a district to plan for and establish general and specific locations for conduits, pipes and pumping stations and to refuse to accept those not built in accordance with the plan, allows the district to change its name when two or more of its alleys are within its boundaries and this has been Amendment to include townships at the request of Representative Black. I urge the adoption of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 261. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 261 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question, there are 112 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared passed. House Bill 262, out of the record. House Bill 283, Representative Ryder. Representative Ryder, out of the record. House Bill 295, Representative Ronan. Representative Ronan. Clerk, read the Bill."

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Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 295, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Alcoholism and other Drug Dependency Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Ronan."

Ronan: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 295 amends the Alcoholism and Drug Dependency Act...sites the Department of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse shall implement a program for deaf and hearing impaired persons. There is definitely a break down in our delivering services for these individuals and I think it's important that we deal with this particular constituency group. The estimates in the State of Illinois, there are 10,000 people inflicted with this problem and I think State Government should be doing something about it. Be glad to answer any questions concerning the legislation."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 295. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 295 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk, will take the record. On this question, there are 113 voting 'aye' none voting 'no', none voting present. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 312, Representative Ropp. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 312, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to Counties. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Thank you, Madam Speaker Members of the House. House Bill 312 merely codifies all of county law into one section of our statute so it makes a more logical location to finding law. Here is absolutely no change in this Bill. It just

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puts it in one section of our current statute. I welcome your support."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 312. Does anyone rise in opposition? Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Well, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. It's not in opposition but, I believe that we should waive the what ever the appropriate rule is with regard to this Bill since it has not been printed and distributed to all Members. I believe that there's been limited copies made available to the staffs of both sides."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cullerton has made a motion. The motion is that we waive the appropriate rules so that this Bill could be voted on although the Bill has not been printed and distributed to each individual Member. Is there any objection to waiving that Rule? Bearing no objection, the rule is waived by use of the Attendance Roll Call. Does anyone rise in opposition to the...to the substance of the Bill? Representative Black, for what reason do you rise."

Black: "Just to ask a question of the Sponsor if I might, Madam Speaker?"

Speaker Breslin: "Proceed."

Black: "Thank you very much, Representative...It was very nice of Representative Cullerton to waive the proper rule. I can see why he did so. We don't count this Bill in pages, I think we count it in pounds. We I think you gave us some assurance, but perhaps you can do so again. Anything that must be a thousand pages long...are you you you're gonna give me assurance now there's nothing in here that's changed or been altered or what have ya. Last time I got that assurance I went back home and found out the assurance, wasn't what we thought it was."



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Ropp: "Well, Representative I can assure that, that that's absolutely correct. There's no change. In fact, it is more up to date and more accurate now than ever before. I don't quite think it's a thousand pounds, is it?"

Black: "Oh no, oh no. Probably about a hundred pounds, a thousand pages. Urban Counties' counsel in favor this?"

Ropp: "As far as I know, they are. Yes, Sir."

Black: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 312 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk, will take the record. On this question, there are 111 voting 'aye', none voting 'no' and 4 voting 'present'. This Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority hereby declared pass. House Bill 313, Representative Mautino. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 313, a Bill for an Act to amend the Liquor Control Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Mautino."

Mautino: "Thank you very much, Madam Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 313 does not change anything that hasn't already been established by the Illinois Liquor Control Commission other than it provides for ten permit three days during a twelve month period instead of three. The special event license is provided for civic, social, religious, educational organizations, when they have a function either on their property or on property that is rented or leased from another. The entity must receive, first of all, the authorization from local Municipal Government. The owners of the property, then they submit an application to the Liquor Control Commissioner for authorization and it would be good for no

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more than ten days in any twelve month period. The change was requested by individual Centennial Committees who's function go longer than initial three days that's included in the current provisions. I ask for your support."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman, the Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 313. Does anyone rise in opposition? Hearing none, the quesiton is, 'Shall House Bill 313 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk, will take the record. On this question, there are 105 voting 'aye' 6 voting 'no' and 1 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill, 314 out of the record. Representative Cullerton, in the Chair."

Speaker Cullerton: "House Bill 317, Representative Cowlshaw, out of the record. House Bill 346, Representative Wennlund, Representative Wennlund out of the record. House Bill 354, Representative Hensel. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 354, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Dupage, Representative Hensel."

Hensel: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House Bill 354 amends the Illinois Vehicle Code, and upon the request of the property owner authorizes any law enforcement agency to order any abandoned or unattended vehicle to be towed off private property without liability for the cost of removal, transportation charges, storage charges or any damages caused by the transportation or storage of the vehicle. What this basically does is clarify what's already in the statutes. It pertains basically to a small section of Dupage and Will Counties

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that are outside of the ten mile limit of the relocater of...that have the authority and the Amendment just made technical corrections only. And I just ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman has asked for the passage of House Bill 354. Does anyone stand in opposition. There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 354 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Votings open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk take the record. On this question there are 112 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', 1 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 367, Representative Hasara. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 367, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to authorize certain counties to incur and an indebtedness and in issue bonds. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Lady from Sangamon, Representative Hasara."

Hasara: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Bill 367 eliminates the minimum population requirements for counties to request a referendum regarding issuance of bonds for the construction of county jails and Sheriff's residences. This Act, previous by applied the counties of 80,000 to 500,000. This Bill, simply permits smaller counties to have the same. I move for its adoption."

Speaker Cullerton: "Please move for the passage of House Bill 367. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being no opposition, the question is, 'Shall this Bill pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. The voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 110 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', 1

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voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. On the Calendar on page 55. House Bill 397, Representative Hensel. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 397, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act concerning county storm water and waste management. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman from Dupage, Representative Hensel on House Bill 397."

Hensel: "Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Would it be possible to keep this on Second Reading on Short Debate. I have an Amendment being drafted which is a technical Amendment which I need to put on there prior to...Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Out of the record. I'm sorry, Representative Hensel, did you ask leave to take the Bill from Third Reading back to Second Reading or do you want to leave it on Third?"

Hensel: "Just Leave it on Third Reading for now and then I'll hope to have it, bring it back to Second when I have the Amendment."

Speaker Cullerton: "House Bill 414, Representative Breslin. Out of the record. House Bill 418, Representative Homer. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 418, a Bill for an Act to amend the Code of Criminal Procedure. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Fulton, Representative Homer."

Homer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. There are currently in the Criminal Code over two dozen statutes that contain upgraded offenses where there has been a commission of a first offense, for example, Second commission of the offense of retail theft is a Felony. This Bill clarifies the procedure that should be set forth in the charging document to specify that the defendant is entitled to be

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placed on notice when the prosecutor seeks the enhanced sentence because of the previous conviction. However, because of the overwhelming prejudice that would result if such evidence were allowed to be admitted before a jury trial hears the facts...the Bill specifically provides that such evidence of prior conviction shall not be admissible in the trial of the defendant where the charge which what the defendant is charged unless it is somehow otherwise determined to be relevant. This is a Bill that simply clarifies the law, provides... fairness for defendants to put them on notice when they are being charged but yet keep this prejudicial information from the jury, so that the defendant may be afforded a fair trial I know of no opposition and would urge your support."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 418. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 418 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 111 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 420, Representative Homer. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 420, a Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code. Third Reading."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Fulton, Representative Homer."

Homer: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen. This Bill is similar to the last Bill in that it clarifies current law and rids the confusion that is now in the court system with respect to cases where a defendant is charged with a felony for commission of an offense having a value of more than \$300.00. A year ago, we cleared it up with respect to

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theft prosecutions. This Bill addresses the issue of when someones charged the offense of criminal damaged to property in excess of \$300.00, thereby creating a felony offense that the jury shall have before the issue of the value of the property. It is in fact under this Bill, an element of the offense and not something that should be left for the judge to determine at sentencing. Again, this is a Bill to provide fairness and equity to defendants, to put the burden of proof on prosecutors to prove the element of the offense as to the value to the property that would justify the charging of the Felony offense. Again I think it's an un...noncontroversial Bill that does what we've already done for other criminal offenses. Only this time we're dealing with criminal damage to property to make the Criminal Code uniform and fair and equitable. I would urge your support."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 420. On that question, Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Weller."

Weller: "Mr. Speaker, I do not have a question in response to this Bill. On the last Bill, House Bill 418 I punched my yes button. For some reason, it did not light up. I wish to be rerecord it as voting yes. House Bill 418."

Speaker Cullerton: "The record will so reflect your intent on any discussion on House Bill 420. Representative Dunn. Representative John Dunn."

Dunn, J: "Yes, what is the current procedure for determining whether the value of the property involved crosses the threshold between a misdemeanor;and a Felony?"

Homer: "There's inconsistent applications. Some judges rule that it's an issue to be decided by the judge at the time of sentencing, that the jury should only determine whether there's been an offense of criminal damage and the judge

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will reserve it to himself as to whether the value exceeds three hundred to warrant a Felony. This Bill would say it is an element of the offense to be proven like all the other elements beyond a reasonable doubt."

Dunn, J: "What else does the Bill do?"

Homer: "That's it."

Dunn, J: "Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Any further questions? There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall this Bill pass?' All those in favor, voting 'aye', those opposed voting 'no'. Voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 107 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', three voting present. This Bill, having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 437, Representative Matijevich. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 437, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 437 was approved unanimously by the Insurance Committee. It makes technical corrections changing references to the Clinical Psychologist Licensing Act, Clinical Social Work and Social Work Practice Act, to conform to statutory changes we made last year. It also includes hearing aid dispensers in the Privacy Protection Article of the Insurance Code. That correction was necessary because of our inclusion in law of hearing aid dispensers defined under the Hearing Aid Consumer Protection Act of the Insurance Industry and the Medical Society. We're in Committee and there's no opposition to the Bill and I appreciate your support."

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Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman's moved for the passage of House Bill 437, does anyone stand in opposition? There being no opposition, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 437 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. The voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 112 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. House Bill 437, having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 440, Representative Hallock, out of the record. House Bill 444, Representative Doederlein, out of the record. House Bill 456, Representative McPike. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 456, a Bill for an Act to amend certain Acts in relation to local government. Third Reading of the Bill."

Young, A: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 456 amends the Park District Section of the Municipal Code, allows for two more park districts situated in the same municipality to organize into one park district provided there's a petition and a vote. It also allows for those two park districts to go from Elected Commissioners to Appointed Commissioners if that is also in the vote. This Bill would only apply to the city of Cicero, who's in favor of this legislation. I move for it's adoption."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Young has moved for the passage of House Bill 456. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 456 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those oppose vote 'no'. Votings open. Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 113 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', one voting present. This Bill having received the required Constitutional



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Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 506, Representative Davis. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 506, a Bill for an Act to amend the Medical Practice Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Davis: "Mr. Speaker, we ask leave of the Body to take this back to Second Reading for purposes of an Amendment?"

Speaker Cullerton: "Lady ask leave to bring the Bill back to Second Reading for the purposes of an Amendment. Is there leave? Leave is granted."

Davis: "This Amendment was requested by."

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative Davis."

Speaker Cullerton: "Now, you can go, Representative Davis."

Davis: "Thank you, sir, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment was offered by the Medical Society and it helps to define what experimental treatment is. And it also states that any patient who is the subject of a research program or an experimental procedure as defined under the rules and regulations of the Hospital Licensing Act shall have at minimum the right to receive an explanation of the nature and possible consequences of such research or experiment before the research or experiment is conducted and the patient has the right to give consent or to reject it. The physician may conduct research or experimental procedure on a patient only with informed consent."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Lady's moved for the adoption of Amendment #1. Is there any discussion? There being none, all in favor of Amendment #1, say 'aye', Representative McCracken, Amendment#1."

McCracken: "Thank you, was this or is this Amendment the same as a Bill that was considered in Committee?"

Davis: "No Sir, this Bill states that a physician who violates a

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subsection would be subject to discipline and fined as prescribed by the Medical Practice Act."

McCracken: "Okay, how does this differ from the Bill in Committee?"

Davis: "The other one...the other Bill that you are referring to has set a fine of \$10,000 and made it a criminal act."

McCracken: "I imagine the doctors were opposed to that Bill weren't they."

Davis: "Yes, Sir, they were opposed to the previous Bill."

McCracken: "Are they in support of this Bill?"

Davis: "They are in support of this one, Representative."

McCracken: "Who did you talk to from there?"

Davis: "Mr. Tierney."

McCracken: "Tierney?"

Davis: "Yes, Tierney. This is his Amendment."

McCracken: "Okay. Thank you."

Davis: "Your very welcome."

Speaker Cullerton: "Any further discussion? Question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor, say 'aye'. All those opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Amendment's adopted. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Cullerton: "Third Reading. The lady ask leave for immediate consideration of House Bill 506, is leave granted? Leave being granted by the Attendance Roll Call. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 506, a Bill for an Act to amend the Medical Practice Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Davis."

Davis: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Body. The Amendment actually becomes the Bill. We feel that when a woman goes to the doctor or when a man goes to the doctor and some experimental treatment is to be used

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that at least that patient has the right to be knowledgeable of any consequences that may occur and agree to re-accept or reject that treatment and we feel that this Bill should receive a favorable vote."

Speaker Cullerton: "Lady moves for the passage of House Bill 506. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 506 pass?' Mr. Clerk. All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Votings open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk take the record. On this question, there are 113 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', none voting present. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 530, Representative Hultgren. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien:: "House Bill 530, a Bill for an Act regarding railroad accidents. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman from Warren, Representative Hultgren, House Bill 530."

Hultgren: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill would require the Illinois Commerce Commission to report to the General Assembly annually on railroad accidents in Illinois involving hazardous materials. This is information the Commission is currently compiling. Seems to me that it ought to be available to the Members of the General Assembly who have responsibility for protecting for the Public Health and Safety."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 530. On that question, is there any discussion? Representative Countryman from Dekalb."

Countryman: "Will the...Mr. Speaker, will the Gentleman repeat that I couldn't hear a thing that he said I think he went to Zeek Giorgi's School of pronunciation."

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Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Hultgren, would you care to explain the Bill for Representative Countryman one more time."

Hultgren: "I'd be glad to, Mr. Speaker this Act would require the Illinois Commerce Commission to report annually to the General Assembly on accidents involving hazardous materials on the railroads here in Illinois. This is information the Commerce Commission is currently collecting but not making available to the General Assembly and it seems to me it's information we ought to have available in as much as we have a responsibility for providing for the public health and safety."

Countryman: "Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 530. On that question, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Williams."

Williams: "Yes, will the Sponsor...I just want to know, is there any cost involved in preparing the study of."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Hultgren."

Hultgren: "There will be no cost involved in as much as the Commerce Commission is already compiling this data and they have it all on their computer."

Williams: "So...so somebody is going to be putting together everything free, of charge, donating the papers, compiling the study. Everything's going to be absolutely free outside of the fact that they have the information. It must be some cost involved."

Hultgren: "The information is already compiled and on the computer and the minimal cost would be simply the report that would be distributed to the 177 Members of this Body."

Williams: "But there would be a cost? Correct."

Hultgren: "Very minimal, yes Sir,."

Williams: "Do you have an idea what that cost is?"

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Hultgren: "No I don't but the Commerce Commission has indicated they are in support of the Bill."

Williams: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Dunn do you rise in opposition to the Bill?"

Dunn: "I have a question."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman yields for questioning, proceed."

Dunn: "What does the Amendment do?"

Hultgren: "The Amendment changed the date of the report to the General Assembly at the request of the Commerce Commission. Changed it from February to April."

Dunn: "Wasn't there a provision in the original Bill requiring the Commerce Commission to prepare a report to the General Assembly about perceived inadequacies in the Federal Legislation. Would the Amendment take that out, that requirement out?"

Hultgren: "Yes, the report is strictly to include now, the accidents in both involving hazardous materials and without any judgement by the Commerce Commission as to how those accidents might be prevented."

Dunn: "And a...re the railroads in support of this, do you know? The Illinois Railroad Association?"

Hultgren: "As amended, the railroads are neutral."

Dunn: "Are neutral?"

Hultgren: "That's my understanding."

Dunn: "Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "There being no further discussion. Representative Hultgren, do you wish to close?"

Hultgren: "Would simply ask for a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Cullerton: "The question is, 'shall House Bill 530 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. The votings open. Have all voted who wish? Mr.

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Clerk, take the record. On this question 114 voting 'yes' none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. The Chair would like to acknowledge the presence of a former Member, now a Circuit Court Judge in Chicago, Former Representative Alan Greiman, is on the House or, Representative Greiman, welcome to Springfield. House Bill 546, Representative Mautino. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 546, a Bill for an Act to amend the Civil Administrative Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Mautino, House Bill 546."

Mautino: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 546 is a very simple Bill. It provides that the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs evaluate the effects that we impose upon a segment of our society namely a small business person when we enact laws or provide for rules and regulations, the normal process now is we do economic impact studies before something occurs and is basically a questimale. What this legislation does is says...over the next two years, we evaluate exactly what we have done to or for or against small business people with the enactment of our laws and our legislation. It's a good piece of legislation, I move for its passage."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 546. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none. The question is, 'Shall this Bill pass?' Mr. Clerk. All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there's 113, 114 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required

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Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 548, Representative Brunsvold. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 548, a Bill for an Act to authorize Illinois into a Compact. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Brunsvold."

Brunsvold: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 548 would set up a Quad City Interstate Metropolitan Authority. This is outlined legislation that would be sent to the Attorney General's in each state and then on to Congress for their approval. The voter plate language is set up here for the cooperation of Iowa and Illinois and particularly, Rock Island County and Scott County in Iowa, to cooperate on some mutual interest. For example, 'solid waste disposal, river bridges, riverport development, airports and public transportation.' This is a Compact. It simply has to be okayed by Congress before we can proceed with the technical language and I would ask for your support. By the way, the Iowa House has passed this Bill 98 to nothing. And this is substantially the same language as Iowa has passed."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman's moved for passage of House Bill 548. Does anyone stand in opposition? The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Not opposition, but I'd like to ask a question. Does this grant Taxing Authority and if so can the taxes be levied only pursuant to referendum?"

Brunsvold: "The language that was copied from the Iowa Bill...we started out with the same language. They made some changes in Iowa before they passed the Bill and part of the changes in the Iowa provision were that the authority shall have no independent power to tax. That authority would have to be

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granted by the counties in this case. After the enabling legislation the more technical detailed legislation would be passed, say next year if we would get approval on this language."

McCracken: "So the...the counties would have to authorize the tax and this doesn't address what that authority would require."

Brunsvold: "Yea, the counties would approve, would pass a tax with everything in this provision as is outlined by the Visions Group that worked together to put this together would call for a front door referendum on all these issues. Now, that would be incorporated in the enabling legislation, the Front Door Referendum stipulation would be in the enabling legislation which would come later if this Compact gets approved."

McCracken: "Alright, okay. Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Any further discussion? Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 548. Question is, 'Shall House Bill 548 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 115 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 558. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 558, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act in relation to public graveyard. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi, on House Bill 558."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 558 amends an Act concerning public graveyards, allows a township to levy taxes at a



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rate not to exceed .20 rather than .15 after Front Door Referendum. Front Door Referendum."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 558. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none, the question is...sorry Representative Black on a question."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, I don't want this issue to die before I get a chance to ask a question, if I could?"

Speaker Cullerton: "Yes, Sir."

Black: "Thank you. To the Sponsor if I interpret what your doing here correctly, it's Townships only. Is that right Zeke. It doesn't address cemetery districts, at all?"

Giorgi: "Townships only, yes."

Black: "I wish...I wish before I passed my Bill I'd known this was coming but that answers that question, thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Any further discussions? Question is, 'Shall House Bill 55...I'm sorry, Representative Countryman from Dekalb."

Countryman: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, you have a Circuit Judge on your side of the aisle. We have a Circuit Judge on our side of the aisle, former Representative Kent Slater now a Circuit Judge in the 9th Circuit's here with us."

Speaker Cullerton: "Question is, 'Shall House Bill 558 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 91 voting 'aye', 17 voting 'no', 5 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 575, Representative Wennlund. Out of the record. House Bill 586, Representative Cowlshaw. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 586, a Bill for an Act to amend

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sections of the School Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Lady from Dupage, Representative Cowlshaw."

Cowlshaw: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 586 was suggested by the State Board of Education. It establishes a pre-claim procedure for state aid claims and requires that these pre-claims be filed by March 1 which would permit there to be time to get corrections made in errors in those, those...those claims by the time that the final claims are to be submitted on July 1. Presently, there is only one submission of these claims each year and that is on July 1. The State Board of Education reports that for the 1987-88 school year, the state aid claim as filed by school districts in this state contained more than 1000 errors and more than 80 percent of the districts filing these claims submitted claims that contained one or more errors. There is unfortunately, quite a delay in processing these claims because of the time that is required to detect and then to correct these errors, the State Board believes that by having a pre-claim filed on March 1, they would detect those errors earlier and could get them corrected in a more timely fashion. I urge support of House Bill 586."

Speaker Cullerton: "Lady moves for the passage of House Bill 586. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 586 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. The votings open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there are 110 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 587. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 587, a Bill for an Act in relation to

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health inspections of district cafeterias. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Black."

Black: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I'm joined in this fine piece of legislation by the Chairman of the Elementary and Secondary Education Committee, Mr. Mulcahey. What House Bill 587 does is simply permits Local Public Health Departments to inspect school cafeterias while school is in Session, but without assessing fees for such inspections. I would ask your favorable consideration of House Bill 587."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 587. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 587 pass?' All those in favor vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. The votings open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk take the record. On this question, there 113 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 610, Representative Stern. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 610, a Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Stern: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 610 would permit a Charter Village who appoints its treasurer to have that treasurer live outside the municipality. There are only 3 Charter Villages in Illinois and only one of them appoints its treasurer so this only affects the village of Glencove."

Speaker Cullerton: "Lady moves for the passage of House Bill 610. Does anyone stand in opposition. There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 610 pass?' All those in

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favor, vote 'aye'. All those oppose vote 'no'. Votings open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are...on this question there's 99 voting 'yes', 12 voting 'no', 2 voting 'present'. This Bill having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. On page 56 of the Calendar, Third Reading Short Debate Calendar. House Bill 620, Representative Ropp. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 620, a Bill for an Act to create the Illinois Council on Vocational Education. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from McClean, Representative Ropp."

Ropp: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. The current Carl Perkins Act which is a Federal Law creates the Illinois Council on Vocation Education. In that law it does not establish terms for the 13 Members that are appointed by the Governor. This Bill merely establishes terms to maintain and provide continuity within that council. I welcome your support on this piece of legislation."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 620. On that question. The Gentleman from Saline, Representative Phelps."

Phelps: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Cullerton: "He indicates he will."

Phelps: "Representative Ropp what are those terms?"

Ropp: "Right now under this Bill it would be three year terms."

Phelps: "Three year terms. How many people on the council?"

Ropp: "There's 13 Members."

Phelps: "13 Members have three year terms?"

Ropp: "6 are from the public sector and 7 are from the private

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sector."

Phelps: "How do they span as far as geography in the state?  
There all over the state. South to North."

Ropp: "Yes sir, East to West."

Phelps: "Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Any further discussion? There being none,  
the question is, 'Shall House Bill 620 pass?' All those in  
favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. The  
votings open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question, there  
are 109 voting 'yes', none voting 'no', none voting  
'present'. This Bill having received the required  
Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House  
Bill 623, Representative Steczo. Mr. Clerk, read the  
Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 623, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act  
allocating levies of certain units of Local Government.  
Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Steczo."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House  
Bill 623 validates Tax Levying and Appropriation Ordinances  
for Cook County, the Cook County Forest preserve District  
and the Dupage County Forest Preserve District for the last  
two years. This is something the legislature has been  
doing since 1966 and the purpose is to free up the use of  
what we call the nonsubstantative procedural objections as  
the basis for challenging tax levies and extensions. All  
the other requirements of the law have to be complied with  
and this is as I mentioned something that the legislature  
does every year, after the fact. And I would ask for your  
support."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill  
623. Does anyone stand in opposition? Lady from Cook,

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Representative Pullen."

Pullen: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The Gentleman indicated I believe, that this was for the purpose of removing certain forms of objections. What that actually means I think at least in terms of the answers that I've received in response to questions I've made about this Bill almost every year is that it removes one way that people can protest there property taxes. It says after the fact that it's okay for these certain units of local government such as the county of Cook to make mistakes to fail to line item, their appropriation ordinance and their levy ordinance, to violate the law which sets forth the ways that they are to drop these ordinances. It allows them to do that, then comes back and says after the fact that even though they did it illegally it's okay anyway. And as a consequence, taxpayers who use to before the General Assembly started this very bad practice protest their taxes because the ordinance was drawn illegally, no longer have that avenue. We come along with this Bill, year after year and add yet another year to the approved after the fact violations of law. I think if the County of Cook doesn't want to line item its appropriation ordinance that it ought to come into this House and ask us to approve legislation...that let's them just levy their taxes and appropriate their budget on a total lump sum basis without line items. Let them admit that they don't want to submit to the same rules that we submit ourselves to. After all these years, I still cannot understand why we should do this to the taxpayers for these government officials who are in essence refusing to obey the laws that we enact and then coming down here and asking for forgiveness, instead of seeking Amendments to those laws so that everyone would know before the fact up front

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what it is that they want to do. I really do think that it would be entirely responsible of this House to tell these certain limited numbers of local governments that they should have to abide by the laws that is on the books and the same laws that all other counties and Forest Preserve Districts have to abide by in Illinois. Your Counties and Forest Preserve Districts have to do this. Why shouldn't these. I suggest a no vote. Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Being no further discussion. Representative Steczo to close."

Steczko: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, just a few comments. Number one this Bill does not apply only to Cook County in the Cook County Forest Preserve District. It does apply to Downstate Forest Preserve Districts and if I could just indicate to the previous Speaker that these Forest Preserve Districts in governmental Bodies do attempt to play by the rules, the rules of the Statutes. We heard last year about the Body of case law that's involved which makes is difficult for these local governments even when they follow the rules, to be able to follow them explicitly enough to make certain that the proper job has been done this assist them from getting caught in catch-22 situations where, for instance, the Cook County Forest Preserve District or the County of Cook publishes the Tax Levy Ordinance and it's the size of seven Chicago phone books. The protesting taxpayer comes in on a non-procedural vote...non-procedural argument says, 'it's to big, we can't find all the proper information, it's to cumbersom.' The next year the County of Cook tries to do things more easily and the same person would come in and say, 'it's to small we need more information soley to protest.' There was a case from Dupage County last year, where we were told because the individual who was the presiding officer of the Forest

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Preserve District, failed to put their middle initial on their signature in their signature signing the ordinance that was the basis for one of these tax protests. We're trying to keep the counties within the law that's why we do this after the fact. They do attempt to comply with all the provisions of the Statutes that require them to publish. This Bill just tries to protect them from those non-procedural types of things that do happen where people try to take advantage and we don't want to have people take advantage and I would appreciate your 'yes' vote."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman moves for the passage of House Bill 623. The question is, 'Shall House Bill 623 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed vote 'no'. The voting's open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there 63 voting 'aye', 48 voting 'no', 2 voting 'present'. This Bill having the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 623, Representative Steczo, I'm sorry House Bill 628, Representative Flinn. Mr. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 628, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act limiting indebtedness of counties under 500,000. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman from St. Clair, Representative Flinn"

Flinn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 628 is a package of three Bills. One of which is in the Senate and one of which is on Second Reading now and 628. What 628 offers to do is to remove the limit of debt to the indebtedness the county so that we may finance the building of the Scott Air Force Base Joint Use Air Field. It's not something that we're likely to use but the bonding attorneys in



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Chicago have suggested this needs to be done in order to encourage the financing from the Federal Government. I would move for the adoption of the Bill."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman has moved for the passage of House Bill 628. Does anyone stand in opposition? There being none the question is, 'Shall House Bill 628 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'; all those opposed, vote 'no'. The voting's open. Representative, Gentleman from Madison, Representative Stephens, to explain his vote."

Stephens: "Well, Mr. Speaker I'd like to explain my vote. This is the Bill that we tried to improve last week with Amendments that would have called for a sound proofing program to protect those few families that were negatively impacted by the expansion of the airport. We thought that that was an improvement to the Bill and, matter of fact, the very plan calling for the expansion of Scott Air Force Base calls for a sound proofing plan and I saw no reason why it ought not be part of the statutes. We're also concerned about a negative impact on a few pieces of property and we called for the Equity Protection Act to cause those people who might be negatively impacted from losing their property values. Mr. Speaker the joint use of Scott Air Force Base may be imminent. It may be the best thing that ever happened. And this maybe a necessary piece of legislation. However... however, I would remind the Members of the General Assembly that St. Clair County has..."

Speaker Cullerton: "Gentleman from Morgan, Representative Ryder to explain his vote."

Ryder: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I yield my time to Representative Stephens."

Speaker Cullerton: "The Gentleman has yielded time to Representative Stephens."

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Stephens: "Mr. Speaker, I'll only be about a minute more, if you will."

Speaker Cullerton: "That's all you have."

Stephens: "The St. Clair County has 68 million dollars of bond indebtedness allowed. They have used 14 million dollars of it. They need 10 million dollars for the joint use program. I'm not sure this Bill is necessary, but it looks like it's going to go out. I'm going to vote present. A present vote indicates that I'm in a position to look favorably upon a joint use of Scott Air Force Base when all the information is in. The United Air force is yet to release its environmental impact statement. That impact statement is very crucial to whether this development is going to go or not. If it comes back favorably, we'll make a decision at that time. However, at this time, I think the right vote for a Representative who represents this area is present."

Speaker Cullerton: "Mr. Clerk, take the record. On this question there are 104 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', 10 voting 'present'. This Bill, having received the required Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed." Representative Breslin, in the Chair."

Speaker Breslin: "House Bill 630, Representative Saltsman. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 630, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Insurance Code. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Saltsman."

Saltsman: "Thank you, Madam Chairwoman. This Bill increases the amount of award. That the private sector relief fund can give its members for time loss due to illness or injury. There are no public funds involved in this relief fund and I ask for its passage."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved for the passage of

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House Bill 630. Does anyone rise in opposition? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 630 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye', all those opposed vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish. Have all voted who wish. The Clerk, will take the record. On this question there are 109 voting 'aye', none voting 'no', and 8 voting 'present', and none voting 'present'. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 638, Representative Cullerton. Clerk, read the Bill." Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 638, a Bill for an Act to amend the Child Passenger Protection Act. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill, as when I originally introduced. It dealt with the Child Passenger Protection Act requiring every person when transporting a child under the age of 6 who resides in the state responsible for securing the child in either a child restraint system or in a seat belt. The Department of Transportation had a problem with the Bill and therefore, they drafted Amendment for me which includes in the provision that it applied to the proper vehicles and also that the person responsible for providing for the protection of such child also has an exception in cases of medical emergencies. I'll be happy to answer any questions and appreciate your support."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentlemen has moved for the passage of House Bill 638. Does anyone rise in opposition? The Gentleman from Macon, Representative Dunn in opposition."

Dunn: "Well, I have a question first..."

Speaker Breslin: "Proceed."

Dunn: "By way of clarification does this mean that the tee-ball

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mother who is transporting a car load of children to the tea-ball game has to have a restraint seat for every child under whatever the age limit is...in the car?"

Cullerton: "Yeah. It would be under the age of 4 years. It only is designed to cover birth thru 3 years of age. Those are only the ones that are required to have car seats."

Dunn: "And no one can put a child in their car under age 4 if this becomes law without having the child restraint system available. Is that Correct?"

Cullerton: "Correct."

Dunn: "So that, if grandpa doesn't have one of these in his car, he can't he has to tell his grandchild to stand out in the rain till he goes and gets one I guess."

Cullerton: "No, it simply means that in the child passenger protection system, the car seat follows the child which is what the practice is most people use them now."

Dunn: "Okay, thank you very much."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall House Bill 638 pass?' All those in favor, vote 'aye'. All those opposed, vote 'no'. Voting is open. This is final passage. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 83 voting 'aye', 15 voting 'no', and 11 voting present. This Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative McCracken you are recognized on a motion."

McCracken: "Representative Keane has asked if I would consider restoring a Bill to the Consent Calendar I've looked at it. It has no fiscal impact and I so agree. I don't have the number though..."

Speaker Breslin: "What is the number of the Bill?"

McCracken: "I don't have the number."

Speaker Breslin: "1619 Representative McCracken then moves that

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House Bill 1619 be restored to the Order of the Consent Calendar. Are there any objections? Hearing none, with leave of the Body and use of the Attendance Roll Call, this Bill will be returned to the Order of the Consent Calendar. Second Reading, Second Day. Agreed Resolutions, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 412, offered by Representative Daniels. 414, Petka. 416, Capparelli. 417, Matijevidch. 418, Matijevidch. 419, Johnson. 420, Williamson. 422, Stange. 423, Novak and 425 Kirkland."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevidch."

Matijevidch: "Madam Speaker, both sides of the aisle have examined the Resolutions they are agreed to and I move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevidch moves the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor, say 'aye'. Opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it and the Agreed Resolutions are adopted. Death Resolutions."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Resolution 413, offered by Representative LeFlore. With the respect to the memory of Isiah Cayson, Sr. House Resolution 415, offered by Representative Johnson. With the respect to the memory of Philip Walker. House Resolution 421, offered by Representative Martinez. With respect to the memory of Violet F. Cwick. House Resolution 424, offered by Representative Shaw. With respect to the memory of Vertie B. Freeman."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevidch, on the Death Resolutions."

Matijevidch: "Move the adoption."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Matijevidch moves the adoption of the Death Resolutions. All those in favor, say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have

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it. The Death Resolutions are adopted. Representative Cullerton is recognized for a Motion."

Cullerton: "Thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I would move that the Special Order of Business Real Estate Rewrite be continued...be continued till tomorrow at the call of the Chair."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved that the Ordered of Real Estate Rewrite be continued until the Order of the call of the Chair and on that question, the Gentleman from Morgan, Representative Ryder."

Ryder: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. I noticed that the previous speaker on the maker of the Motion was having trouble not only making this Motion, but following the Motion of his microphone. While he was doing that so as a consequence I wondered if, perhaps he might want to take lessons from Representative Stephens, who is still with us and now has a repaired microphone. So, perhaps, he could offer instructions to the previous speaker. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "Very good. On the Motion, now, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Parliamentary inquiry if someone objects to this would he be required to comply with the rules. And if so could the special order only be rescheduled in three days. Pursuant to notice requirements. In other words if I object, do I have a lot of leverage?"

Speaker Breslin: "It requires only a majority of those voting Representative McCracken. So, it depends on how persuasive you are as determines how much leverage you have."

McCracken: "Then I'll give leave."

Speaker Breslin: "Very good. There being no objections to Representative Cullerton's Motion. The Motion carries. Ladies and Gentlemen you are to be congratulated. We have done a lot of work today. And as a consequence
