Speaker Madigan: "Ladies and Gentlemen, Speaker Madigan in the Chair. If we could have your attention, we have a special guest today. And I would like all of the Members to be in their chairs and I would like the staff to please remove themselves to the rear of the chamber. Very privileged to have with us the French Ambassador to the United States Government in Washington DC. He is travelling today with the French Counsel to the City of Chicago. I'm sure he will cover some of these matters in his remarks, but of course, we all know that there always has been a very strong relationship between our country and France, especially at the time of the American Revolution, which

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led to the founding of our Republic. So, without any further ado, let me give you our good friend, the French Ambassador to the United States of America, Mr. Ambassador."

Emmanuel de Margerie: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, it's an it's a privilege for me to be here among you today with the French Counsel General in Chicago. We want to bring to you a message of friendship from the people of France to the people of this great State of Illinois. We are celebrating the bicentennial of a French Revolution of 1789 and of the Declaration of Rights of Man and of Citizen. Your country is joining in this celebration because the elites of our two nations was so intimately connected at that moment of history, that great momentous period, that it has created bonds which endure. that French officers came to fight for your independence. And that Lafayette and his fellow officers were there with George Washington. And then your soldiers came back to France and we remember with great gratitude what you have done to restore freedom and liberty in our country, when we were occupied. And we remember World War I and World War And a few days ago there was a great ceremony marking forty-fifth anniversary of D-day. And in Normandy at Ste-Mere-Eglise, that little village where American parachuters descended from the sky to start the liberation of France, five hundred American Veterans were there, gathered with the whole French population around them. And moment of festive memories between the two countries. So this is symbolic of what has happened over hundred years. We are now in the process of these two remembering what happened in 1789, when at one months distance, the Declaration of Rights of Man and of Citizen, was published in France and the Bill of Rights was

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published here in this country. And among the people who were entrusted with a task of drafting the Declaration of Human Rights in Paris, there were different groups, but in one of them there was Lafayette. And Lafayette had come here and fought with your people and who'd brought back to France the veneration for Washington and the nostalgia of he had seen being created here. Lafayette was in constant touch at that moment, with the American Minister in France. And that man was none else, then Thomas Jefferson. And Thomas Jefferson could show him the Constitution of the State of Virginia in which the principles were embodied, which we found again Declaration and in your Bill of Rights. So these great events, they have led to momentous decisions in the history of the world, because we have tried to live for these principles. And I think it is very moving to think that a few days ago, the Chinese students in Tiananmen Square were erecting a statue of liberty. Commemorating the great statue, which stands in New York Harbor, and which was offered to this great nation here, by France and by the children of France who collected one by one, the little francs which helped build the statue. So we are united by this bond, by this common attachment to freedom in the world. And there are not so many countries throughout history, which have had such a strong friendship. Ladies and Gentlemen, we in France are celebrating that great moment of the past. We are also looking to the future. You know, that we're going to strengthen the common market and develop it by 1992. The common market will be more of a common market than it already now is. And that will mean a great increase in the economic relationship between your country and mine. I'm happy to say that between the State of Illinois and France, there is already a very strong,

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academic, intellectual and artistic friendship. French businessmen who've become much more interested in your State of Illinois now, consider a number of French investors have come over. So, I see in all this...these close relationships, a very good omen for the future. And before I leave this great Assembly, I would just like to present to your Speaker, as a token of appreciation and admiration for the United States, a medal, which has been struck in France recently, commemorating Bastille Day, the fourteenth of July, 1789, when these great concepts of liberty reverberated...on the worldworld. And I thank you very much for having had the privilege of addressing you. Thank you. Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "I'd like to withdraw Amendment #1, please."

Speaker Breslin: "Withdraw #1. Any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #2, offered by Representative Cullerton."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Cullerton."

Cullerton: "Yes, thank you, Madam Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Amendment allows for the merger of two existing programs, if they are contiguous.

Appreciate your support on the Amendment."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 61. On the question, the Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."

McCracken: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

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Speaker Breslin: "He indicates he will."

McCracken: "What is the significance of the merger of a...what is it a...more than one precinct, is that it?"

Cullerton: "No, this deals with the situation where there's two existing programs. And this allows for those, if they share a common boundary, this allows for their merger, so that you can eliminate, you know, two existing duplicate authorities..."

McCracken: "...Are there...are there two..."

Cullerton: "...So, it...by referendum they would merge."

McCracken: "Are there two currently?"

Cullerton: "Yes."

McCracken: "And what area would be covered by the referendum?

All of the current areas of each program?"

Cullerton: "Both areas."

McCracken: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "Any further discussion? There being none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #2 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted.

Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 176, Representative McNamara. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 176, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act to prevent improper use of the flag. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "Floor Amendment #1, offered by Representative
McNamara."

Speaker Breslin: "Representative McNamara."

McNamara: "Thank you, Mrs...Madam Speaker. This is just a technical Amendment. It tightens up the language of the

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Bill. It's agreed between the House and the Senate."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 176. On the question, is there any discussion? There being none, the question is, 'Shall Amendment #1 be adopted?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. The Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No further Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 481, Representative Barger. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 481, a Bill for an Act to amend the Illinois Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Were there any Committee Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 960, Representative Hoffman. Mr. Hoffman, do you want this Bill called? Clerk, read the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

 Representative Capparelli. There is, Representative
 Terzich. Clerk, read the Bill."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Floor Amendments."

- Granberg: "Thank you, Madam Speaker, Members of the House. I'd like to have Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 240 tabled and the Motion has been filed."
- Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 240. Is that...is that a Senate Amendment or a House Amendment, Mr..."
- Clerk O'Brien: "It's House Amendment #1."
- Speaker Breslin: "House Amendment #1. On the question, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Piel."
- Piel: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. Would the Gentleman mind

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explaining exactly what the Amendment does? Is he the Sponsor of the Amendment and why is he tabling it?"

Speaker Breslin: "Representative Granberg."

Granberg: "Representative Piel, Senate Bill 240, as it came from the Senate, increased a number of enterprise zones from 67 to 74. Amendment 1 decreased that to increase it from 67 to 68, because there is some concern about increasing the number statewide. We've now reached an agreement where we're going to increase it and go back to the original Bill itself. So Amendment #1 limited it. We're going back to the way the Senate Bill was passed in the Senate."

Piel: "Thank you very much."

Speaker Breslin: "There being no further discussion, the question is, 'Shall House Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 240 be tabled?' All those in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair, the 'ayes' have it. And House Amendment #1 is tabled. Are there any other Motions or Amendments, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions or Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. On the Special Order of

Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 28, a Bill for an Act to amend the School Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Are there any Floor Amendments?"

- Cullerton: "Madam Speaker, I don't believe the Amendment has been printed yet?"
- Speaker Breslin: "Mr. Clerk, please advise. Mr. Cullerton, the Clerk informs us that Amendment #2 has been distributed."
- Cullerton: "Okay, well then, since I don't have it, I wonder if he could explain it again."
- Speaker Breslin: "Okay. Mr. Ryder, please explain Amendment #2."
- Ryder: "Sure. Representative, we...the purpose of the Bill is when a hospital is reimbursed by an insurance company and

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the hospital has previously been paid by an individual, that they have a specific amount of time with which...in which to pay or reimburse that individual. And this would cut the cycle to 21 days. We originally asked for seven or fourteen, and that was not enough. Thirty was then amended in the committee and I'm asking to reduce it to twenty-one."

Cullerton: "The way the Bill passed the Senate, it was fourteen days?"

Ryder: "That's correct. So we're giving more latitude to the hospitals by suggesting twenty-one."

Cullerton: "So the shorter period of time, benefits whom?"

Ryder: "The shorter the period of time, the greater the burden on the hospital to pay the money to the individual and the less burden on the individual."

Cullerton: "I see. This is a compromise. This Amendment is a compromise."

Ryder: "Well, certainly. And I should in fairness tell you, that the thirty days was indicated as an Amendment by the hospital association and the committee. And we agreed to it at that point, because that was the only Amendment that was prepared and ready to go. However, in the testimony by the hospital association, they indicated that their normal cycle..."

Cullerton: "...Right, okay..."

Ryder: "...Would be ten to fourteen days. We're giving them an extra week in which to make this. And it's not a payment, it's a reimbursement."

Cullerton: "Well, so it came out of the Senate with fourteen days, it came out of the House committee at thirty days, and your Amendment makes it twenty—one days?"

Ryder: "Right..."

Cullerton: "It sounds like Solomon like..."

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Ryder: "...It was...well, my son helped me with the math and we did the best we could."

Cullerton: "Thank you."

Speaker Breslin: "On the Amendment, the Gentleman from Bureau,

Representative Mautino."

Mautino: "Thank you very much. This is a compromise Amendment, which in effect negates what the committee did, which was too long we felt and I stand in support of the twenty-one day provision for the billing period."

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Northwestern School of Management, an individual who is a retired Ford employee, the man who designed the Mustang and from the people at Argonne National Laboratory. And what the Bill...if this Amendment is successful would do, would be to create a task force to look at ways in which the advanced photon source technology presently being developed at Argonne could be useful to small and medium sized Illinois businesses. I would be happy to answer your questions and would appreciate your support for this Amendment."

- Speaker Breslin: "The Lady has moved the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 1450. On the question, the Gentleman from DuPage, Representative McCracken."
- McCracken: "Yes, thank you. Has this been printed and distributed? We don't have one over here."
- Speaker Breslin: "It has not been printed and distributed,
 Representative Currie. Take the Bill out of the record.
 Representative...Representative Ropp in the Chair."

Speaker Breslin: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."

- Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Senate Bill 1466,
 Representative Peterson. Clerk, read the Bill."
- Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1466. A Bill for an Act to revise the law by correcting multiple enactments and making technical corrections. Second Reading of the Bill. No

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Committee Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Any floor Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. Going back...Representative LeFlore has returned to the Chamber. With leave we'll go to his Bill, Senate Bill 1344. Clerk, read the Bill."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 1344. A Bill for an Act in relation to higher education. Second Reading of the Bill.

Amendment #1 was adopted in Committee."

Speaker Breslin: "Any Motions or Amendments?"

Clerk O'Brien: "No Motions filed, no floor Amendments."

Speaker Breslin: "Third Reading. With leave also we'll go back to Senate Bill 963. This Bill was already read a second time. It was held on second for a fiscal note. The fiscal note has been filed. Move the Bill to third, Mr. Clerk. Ladies and Gentlemen, on page 30 of your Calendar appears Speaker's Table, Short Debate. We will proceed down these Resolutions, so be prepared. The first one is House Resolution 194, Representative Ronan. Al Ronan. the record. House Resolution 336, Representative Hicks. Would you like to present your Resolution? Out of the record. House Resolution 409, Representative Keane. Clerk, read the...do we read the Resolutions? No, we don't even read the Resolution, Representative Keane. present it to us, please."

Keane: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. All that House Resolution 409 does, it urges Congress and the President to preserve tax exempt bonds for state and local government. It's just an attempt by me and other people to try to keep Congress from doing away with tax exempt bonds as a means of financing for state and local government. I'll be happy to answer any questions and ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Breslin: "The Gentleman has moved the adoption of House

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Resolution 409. On the question, is there any discussion? Hearing none, the question is, 'Shall House Resolution 409 pass?' All those in favor say 'aye', all those opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it and House Resolution 409 is adopted. House Joint Resolution #18. Representative Mulcahey."

Mulcahey: "Thank you, Madam Speaker. House Joint Resolution #18 simply creates a Joint Committee on school aid formula in order to study the formula to try to make a determination as to how we can make it more equitable based upon all of the inequitable measures involved in the formula right now. Senate Amendment #1 simply puts this within the framework of the operations of the State Board of Education as opposed to forming a complete new Committee or new Commission, and so it will be administered by the State Board of Education and I would move for the adoption of the Resolution."

Speaker Cullerton: "Representative Cullerton in the Chair. The
Gentleman has moved for the adoption of House Joint
Resolution 18. On that is there any discussion? The
Gentleman from Effingham, Representative Hartke."

Hartke: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Speaker Cullerton: "He indicates he will yield."

Hartke: "Representative Mulcahey, is there a deadline when this should be reported?"

Mulcahey: "As of right now, the deadline, I believe, is 1991.

Don't hold me to that, but it's no sooner, I believe, than
1991."

Hartke: "Okay. Thank you."

Speaker Cullerton: "Any further discussion? The Lady from Champaign, Representative Satterthwaite."

Satterthwaite: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Cullerton: "He indicates he will."

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- Satterthwaite: "Representative Mulcahey, I'm sorry I didn't hear your complete explanation. We're saying now that rather than creating a separate new body, it would be the State Board of Education that would review the guestion?"
- Mulcahey: "Well, as opposed to creating a new body which would take new appropriations and new funding and so on, we are doing within the framework of the State Board of Education.

 Through their...through an office from the State Board of Education. This was a recommendation of the Speaker when we talked to him about that particular Resolution and..."
- Satterthwaite: "Is there any reason why that responsibility would not be given to the Citizens Council on School Problems, which is the body that in the past has done extensive work on the factors involved with the formula?"
- Mulcahey: "I can't answer that. There's probably no reason as to
 why it couldn't be done that way, but...which I'm sure we
 will do with the Citizens Council, but by the same token,
 we felt that an agency to be specifically designed to study
 the formula and possible changes to the formula should be
 created."

Satterthwaite: "Thank you."

- Speaker Cullerton: "Further discussion? The Lady from DuPage,
 Representative Cowlishaw."
- Cowlishaw: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"
- Cullerton: "Representative Mulcahey? Indicates he will."
- Cowlishaw: "Thank you. Representative Mulcahey, does this...I have not read this Resolution. Does this Resolution call for the members of this task force to be...all of them to be Legislators or is there any specific language in the Resolution that indicates who the members of this group would be?"
- Mulcahey: "No, there's no specific language indicating that.

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This would be pretty much up to the State Board as to...this simply is putting the...putting the pressure...not the pressure, but it's mandating that the State Board of Education proceed with this, in this one particular area."

Cowlishaw: "Alright. Representative, you may be aware of the fact that the Citizens Council on School Problems spent a great deal of time studying this issue and held hearings all over the state, including one as I remember in Edwardsville and various other places, I know I attended that one, the one in Rockford and elsewhere and I would hope that this... that although this may not be stated in your Resolution, because a great deal of information was accumulated and a lot of recommendations were devised then by the Citizens Council as a result of all those hearings. I would assume that you would, as the Sponsor of this Resolution, that you would encourage the State Board to make use of all those materials that have already been generated, rather than reinventing the wheel."

Mulcahey: "There's no question about it, Representative Cowlishaw. And not only has the School Problems Commission provided a tremendous amount of information on this, but a number of commissions we've had in the past, there's a wealth of study. We're trying right now to put the thing together...take all this information, put it together and come up with something that is workable with the idea being that they will be...they will be...they've been created to handle one thing, and that is simply the formula. Nothing else."

Cowlishaw: "Just one last question. Did you anticipate that there would be any public hearings involved in the work of this Committee?"

Mulcahey: "I would...I would think not."

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Cowlishaw: "Alright. Well, that's one of the reasons why..."

Mulcahey: "Based upon what you said a second ago."

Cowlishaw: "Representative, one of the reasons why that might not be necessary is because it was just a couple of years ago that the Citizens Council on School Problems had hearings all over the State..."

Mulcahey: "Exactly."

Cowlishaw: "...and perhaps this Committee could simply make use of the material that the Citizens Council has, rather than having to do that whole exercise over again."

Mulcahey: "Exactly."

Cowlishaw: "So, thank you very much and thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Cullerton: "The Gentleman's moved for the passage of House Joint Resolution 18. All in favor say 'aye', all opposed 'no'.

In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the House Joint Resolution #18 is adopted. House Resolution #32, Representative Weller."

Weller: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. House Resolution 32 addresses the Notch Baby issue and many of you have all been contacted by victims of the notch in your district. In summary, the Resolution urges the United States Congress to enact legislation correcting the notch in social security benefits paid to those between...born between 1917 and 1921 and urges the President to sign the Bill. It's a prosenior citizen vote. I ask for your 'aye' vote and I move for the Resolution's adoption."

Cullerton: "The Gentleman's moved for the adoption of House On that is there any discussion? There Resolution 32. being none, the question is, 'Shall House Resolution 32 adopted?' All in favor say 'aye', all opposed 'no'. the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, House Resolution 32 is adopted. House Resolution 180, Representative Curran. Out οf the record. House

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Resolution 407, Representative Breslin."

Breslin: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen, this House Resolution would provide...would request Coca-Cola company withdraw its plastic bottle from the market in Chicago, where they have introduced it. hoping that this plastic bottle will eventually replace the glass bottle and the aluminum can in the...in their market. The disadvantage to us as consumers is that there is no collection process currently available for recycling the plastic bottle, whereas it replaces one of the best products that is being recycled currently on the market, both the aluminum cans and the glass bottles. The drink company really have, I think, been unresponsive to the crisis that we have in Illinois with our filling up landfill space right now by doing such an irresponsible thing as introducing a plastic bottle into the market in Illinois. So this Resolution will request Coca-Cola to take this bottle out of the market in Chicago and introduce it in Chicago or any place in Illinois until such time as a collection process is available for such a product. I urge its adoption by this House."

Cullerton: "The Lady has moved for the adoption of House Resolution 407 on that...is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Coles, Representative Weaver."

Weaver: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor yield?" Cullerton: "She indicates she will."

Weaver: "Representative, just out of curiosity, knowing that there are Pepsi and RC and Seven-up and a number of other bottlers using plastic bottles in the State of Illinois, is there a particular reason that we have singled out Coca-Cola?"

Breslin: "No, Sir. You are incorrect. Coca-Cola is the only company in the State that has introduced the 16 ounce

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plastic bottle in Illinois and that is the one that is... there is no collection process for and it is the most difficult to recycle."

Weaver: "Is that more dangerous than the two liter bottles that we see currently on all the shelves?"

Breslin: "It's not more dangerous, but it is more difficult to recycle. A recycling program for the larger containers is more easily done and there is a process in place in Illinois. It's the 16 ounce bottle and can that we don't have a process for."

Weaver: "Okay. So there is a recycling program for the two liter bottles?"

Breslin: "Yes."

Weaver: "I'd like to know more about that. Thank you."

Cullerton: "Further discussion? There being none, the question is, 'Shall House Resolution 407 pass?' All in favor say 'aye', all opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Resolution is adopted. On the Order of Special Order, Education...House Bill 449. This was taken...this was left on Second Reading because a fiscal note had not been filed. Mr. Clerk, would you please read that Bill? Senate Bill 449."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Bill 449..."

Cullerton: "Representative Curran, I believe we'll have to take
this Bill out of the record. The appropriate note has not
yet been filed. An inappropriate note has been filed.
Representative Curran."

Curran: "I didn't hear you, Mr. Speaker. Did you say that a debt impact note has not been filed?"

Cullerton: "No. There was a request for a fiscal note to be filed and instead a mandates note was filed."

Curran: "And...and...I see. Thank you."

Cullerton: "So if you could take it out of the record. Thank

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- you. Mr. Clerk, please read the Agreed Resolutions. Mr. Clerk, excuse me, before we do that, Representative Saltsman. For an announcement?"
- Saltsman: "Yes, thank you, Mr. Speaker. I ask at this time permission from the House to move House Bill 1456 from the table and have it placed on the Interim Study Calendar and...in State Government Administration Committee."
- Cullerton: "The Gentleman's moved for the...the Motion is to take from the table a...House Bill 1456 and place it on Interim Study. On that question, Representative McCracken."
- McCracken: "I'm just curious, what is the Bill...what's the subject matter?"
- Saltsman: "It's a safety provision with the railroads and we want to have a hearing on it. I checked with your spokesman and the Chairman of the Committee and they both agreed to it along with Representative Churchill."
- McCracken: "Okay. Thank you."
- Cullerton: "Representative Hannig on that question."
- Hannig: "Yes. My only response Mr. Speaker, was to say that this was just an inadvertent error. This Bill was supposed to go to the Interim study Calendar."
- Cullerton: "Okay. The Gentleman's moved for the adoption of the Motion to take House Bill 1456 from the table and place on the Order...on the Calendar...on the Interim Study Calendar. All in favor say 'aye', all opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Motion is adopted. Now Mr. Clerk, if you could please read the Agreed Resolutions."
- Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution 33, offered by Representative Currie. House Joint Resolution...that's Senate Joint Resolution 33, Curran. House Joint Resolution 63, Speaker Madigan. House Resolution 648, Wennlund. 649, Johnson. 651, Balanoff. 653, Doederlein. 654,

- Cullerton: "Representative Matijevich on the Agreed Resolutions."
- Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, we have examined the Resolutions. They are agreed to. I move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."
- Cullerton: "The Gentleman moves for the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions. All in favor say 'aye', all opposed 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Resolutions are adopted. General Resolutions."
- Clerk O'Brien: "House Joint Resolution 61, offered by Representative Weller."
- Cullerton: "Committee on assignment. Death Resolutions."
- Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution 74, offered by
 Representative Weaver with respect to the memory of Danzell

 Representative Johnson with respect to the memory of Doctor

- Cullerton: "Representative Matijevich moves for the adoption of the Death Resolutions. All in favor say 'aye, all opposed say 'no'. In the opinion of the Chair the 'ayes' have it, the Resolutions are adopted.
