2nd Legislative Day

January 14, 1993

Speaker McPike: "The House will come to order. The House will come to order. The guests in the balcony...the guests in the balcony may wish to rise and join us for the invocation. We'll be led in the invocation this morning by the Clerk, Mr. O'Brien."

Clerk O'Brien: "Let us pray. Lord, bless this House and all those that serve and work here. Amen."

Speaker McPike: "Amen. We'll be led in the Pledge of Allegiance by Representative Phelan."

Phelan - et al: "I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America, and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

Speaker McPike: "Roll Call for Attendance. Mr. Kubik."

Kubik: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Let the record reflect that there are no excused Republican absences today."

Speaker McPike: "Thank you. Representative LeFlore is not here. He has an excused absence Mr. Clerk, if you would lock his switch. Take the record Mr. Clerk. 117 Members answering the Roll Call, a quorum is present. Adjournment Resolution."

Clerk O'Brien: "Senate Joint Resolution #2; 'RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE EIGHTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that when the two houses adjourn on Thursday, January 14, 1993, the Senate stand adjourned until Tuesday, January 26, 1993, at 12 o'clock noon; and the House of Representatives stand adjourned until Wednesday, January 20, 1993, at 12:00 o'clock noon; and when they adjourn on that day, they stand adjourned until Tuesday, January 26, 1993, at 12:00 o'clock noon; and when they adjourn on that day, they stand adjourned until Wednesday, January 27,

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1993, at 11:30 o'clock a.m."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Giorgi...Representative Giorgi moves the adoption of the Adjournment Resolution. All in favor say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it. The Adjournment Resolution is adopted. Mr. Clerk, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we're ready to start picking seats by seniority. It's my understanding from Representative Daniels that the Republicans have already finished. All right, the Leadership...the Leadership seats have already been chosen, and we will begin by seniority. Mr. Clerk, you will begin the process by seniority."

Clerk O'Brien: "Starting the seat selection, I'll call Members names if you'll come up and get the ticket, take it back to your selected desk, and stick it on the desk so the electrician can wire the voting machine. The first name for 12 terms is Monroe Flinn; down to the 10th term is Wyvetter Younge; down to the 8th term is Gary Hannig and Ellis Levin; moving on to 7th term is Don Saltsman; moving on to 6 termers in random order is Larry Hicks, lottery #1, and then Tom Homer, followed by Michael Curran and then Robert LeFlore, Joel Brunsvold, followed by Bob DeJaegher. If all of the 6 termers are finished, going on to the 5th term, Benjamin Martinez; followed by Chuck Hartke; followed by David Phelps; followed by Charles Morrow; followed by Lou Jones."

Speaker McPike: "Mr. Electrician, would you turn on Representative Schakowsky? Not Bugielski, Schakowsky."

Schakowsky: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would like to invite all of you to celebrate the appointment of Barbara Flynn Currie to Leadership with a piece of cake over here. So, everybody come and join us. Thank you."

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Clerk O'Brien: "If all the 5th termers have selected their desks, moving on to 4th termers in random order...I'm on 4th term...Lou Lang; followed by Monique...followed by Larry Woolard; followed by Monique Davis; followed by John Philip Novak; followed by Bob Bugielski; followed by Shirley Jones. If all the 4th termers have selected their seats, moving right on to 3rd termers...3rd termers is Clem Balanoff; followed by Jan Schakowsky...Jan Schakowsky; followed by Jim Phelan; followed by Santiago. If all of the 3rd termers has selected their desks, please place these name signs by your name on the desk so the electrician can identify where you want to sit. The voting machine will be wired according to where these signs are stuck on the desk. Have all 3rd termers selected? Shirley Jones, are you finished? Have you selected your desk? Have you selected your desk? All right, going on to 2nd termers is Daniel Burke; Jeff Schoenberg; Mike Rotello; David McAfee; Jay Hoffman; Terry Deering; Jack McGuire; and Frank Mautino. Continuing on with 2nd termers is Judy Erwin; Coy Pugh; Todd Stroger; and Carol Ronen. If anyone hasn't selected their seats yet, please raise your hand before I go on with freshmen. Anyone other than freshmen. Is there anyone that hasn't selected your desk yet? All right, going on with freshmen in random order are John Ostenburg; followed by Harold Murphy. Harold Murphy. Harold Murphy; followed by Rod Blagojevich. Rod Blagojevich. Blagojevich."

Speaker McPike: "Blagojevich."

Clerk O'Brien: "...Followed by Laurel Prussing; Lauren Gash; Pennie von Bergen Wessels. Representative Rotello, have you picked your seat yet? All right, moving on is Representative Joseph Kotlarz; followed by Barb Giolitto.

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Representative Giolitto, have you found your desk?
Representative Giolitto. Giolitto. Are you finished?
Next name is Eugene Moore. Please put your name signs on
your desks so the other Members can see what's available.
Stick this on your desk where everyone can see the desk is
taken. Next is Representative Edgar Lopez. Next is Vickie
Moseley; followed by Representative Frias. Moving on, the
next is Gerald Hawkins; followed by John Sheehy.
Representative Sheehy, did you find a desk? And Nancy
Kaszak. There's one desk left somewhere. Can anyone help
Nancy Kaszak find her desk? Does anyone see a desk on the
Democrat side without a...here it is Nancy. Are there any
Democrat Members that has not selected a desk yet? Any
Members at all? Representative Harold Murphy, would you
raise your hand? Harold. Do you know where his desk is?
Mark O'Brien. Mark O'Brien. Mark, are they set there? Is
he set? Are all Democrat freshmen...now have their name on
a desk? If there's anyone that doesn't have their name on
a desk, panic now! Can I have your attention please.
Senior Members that had telephones on their desks and they
had numbers programmed into them, they can disconnect that
phone and take it to your new desk, but then please make
sure the phone that you're replacing gets returned to
whoever it belonged to. The telephones that have numbers
programmed into them may follow the Members. Let me also
announce that the drawers in the desks are not
interchangeable. The drawers are not interchangeable.
Their locks are numbered to match the desks. There's a new
schedule...calendar schedule that was distributed by the
Speaker today. A Session schedule, which has been revised
was distributed to all Members today. Be sure you get one
and review it. We're ready to start parking assignments

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for Democrat Members. Parking assignments will be by Leadership first, then seniority. There's a map here and the spots that are colored in are the Democrat parking spots assigned to us by the Secretary of State. If the Members will stand back from the map, and let Leadership look at it first, and then I'll call out by seniority, so they can go up to the map and select their seats (sic - spots). Behind my podium, is a list of the parking spots available. Those are the parking spots that are not taken at this time."

Speaker McPike: "Representative Currie...Representative Currie moves that the House now stand adjourned until 11:30 a.m. January 27th. All right, we'll hold that Motion until we do Agreed Resolutions. We'll hold that Motion. We're going to do Agreed Resolutions. Mr. O'Brien, can we do the Agreed Resolutions so we can adjourn. All right. Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk McLennand: " Introduction and First Reading of Constitutional Amendments. House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment #6, offered by Representative Novak. 'RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, That there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at

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the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution to read as follows: ARTICLE VIII FINANCE SECTION 2. STATE FINANCE

(a) The Governor shall prepare and submit to the General Assembly, at a time prescribed by law, a State budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The budget shall set forth the estimated balance of funds available for appropriation at the beginning of the fiscal year, the estimated receipts, and a plan for expenditures and obligations during the fiscal year of every department, authority, public corporation and quasi-public corporation of the State, every State college and university, and every other public agency created by the State, but not of units of local government or school districts. The budget shall also set forth the indebtedness and contingent liabilities of the State and such other information as may be required by law. Proposed expenditures shall not exceed funds estimated to be available for the fiscal year as shown in the budget.

(b) The General Assembly by law shall make appropriations for all expenditures of public funds and all other funds administered by the State. No unappropriated public funds or other funds administered by the State may be expended. Appropriations for a fiscal year shall not exceed funds estimated by the General Assembly to be available during that year. SCHEDULE This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon its approval by the electors of this State.' Introduction and First Reading of House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment #6.
