I know that we've had a real problem with the exodus of jobs to those other states and I'm wondering if since the Legislators are coming over, is that our way to try to make that money back is to bring them over and provide housing for them in the State of Illinois? I didn't know."

Speaker Mautino: "Representative Mayfield is seeking recognition."

Mayfield: "I come to you in regard to Black History Month. I'd like to tell you about the first African-American Baptist church in Savannah, Georgia. The first African-American Baptist church was founded in 1788, and is one of two of the oldest claimed black churches in North America. The church remains standing and operates in Franklin Square located in historic downtown Savannah. Several companies, given agreed upon guided tour of the city and during the portion of the tour that goes through Franklin Square, it is never mentioned that slaves were bought and sold in that square. It also happens to be the only renovated area of the mostly historic and protected downtown Savannah. There are several remarkable facts about the construction of this church that it one of the most remarkable engineering construction projects of our history. The church played a major role in the Underground Railroad because of its location along the Savannah River and railroad tracks

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traversing the eastern seaboard. The church was built by free African Americans and slaves who were actually allowed plantation after their leave the day's participate in the construction and then return at night. It was the first building constructed of brick to be owned by African Americans in the State of Georgia. The building is listed in the National Registry of Historic Places as a contributing property of the Havana Historic District. Unlike most buildings built during that time and even today, the walls of the church were constructed and erected first instead of starting with the laying of the foundation. Like other parts of the world during this time, slaves and free African Americans all spoke different languages due to the fact that they were intentionally not taught English so they would not be able to communicate and organize revolts. Holes in the sanctuary flooring formed a design meant to look like a tribal symbol, but were actually air holes for escaped slaves who would hide in the church in a four-foot space beneath the sanctuary floorboards. The church served as a stop on the Underground Railroad and housed many runaway slaves during the Civil War. The nine-square ceiling served symbol to show that the church was part of Underground Railroad. All of these facts come together to tell quite a story of black history. The first has to do selflessness and sacrifice. During the construction of the church, slave owners would count slaves leaving participate in the construction project by counting stones. Once they had returned, the owners would never realize that the people returning were not the same people who left as

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long the number of the stones matched. Facing the threat of severe violence and death, freed African Americans were returned to the plantations in place of their counterparts and then be able to escape safely because of their freedom status. Due to their unique construction techniques, workers were able to dig tunnels from under the church beneath city hall to banks of the Savannah River and the Eastern Seaboard railroad tracks completely undetected. Along the Underground Railroad, freedom seekers needing to rest would travel the tunnel from the banks of the river to the church and be able to safely rest until continuing their journey. Once inside, freedom seekers would look up to the roof made of nine holes which would lead them to the next stop on their path to freedom. To the untrained eye, these patterns and symbols looked like nothing more than patterns on a quill on the roof, but to freedom seekers it gave instructions on how to safely continue their journey. When slave owners and police would come looking for runaway slaves, little did they know that beneath their very feet sat freedom seekers. The hidden runaways would be given advance notice that police and slave owners were coming by the singing of coded songs by churchgoers that would alert them of the danger and give instructions on what to do. Not only does this story talk about bravery and brilliance, but it talks about what America and Illinois as a great place to live. These people invented a way to make life better for themselves. They did not accept the status quo and through pure ingenuity dug themselves out of a hole and into freedom. Thank you."

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- Speaker Mautino: "Further discussion? Representative Jerry Mitchell."
- Mitchell, J.: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Point of personal privilege."

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend the Illinois Constitution by adding Section 2.5 to Article IV and by changing Section 2 of Article 5 as follows:

ARTICLE IV

THE LEGISLATURE

#### SECTION 2.5. TERM LIMITS

A person may not hold the office of State Senator or State Representative or a combination of those offices for more than 20 years; provided that service before the second Wednesday in January of 2013 shall not be considered in the calculation of a person's service.

ARTICLE V

THE EXECUTIVE

SECTION 2. TERMS

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- (a) These elected officers of the Executive Branch shall hold office for four years beginning on the second Monday of January after their election and, except in the case of the Lieutenant Governor, until their successors are qualified. They shall be elected at the general election in 1978 and every four years thereafter.
- (b) A person may not serve more than 2 consecutive terms of office within the same Executive Branch office. A person who has served 2 consecutive terms within the same Executive Branch office may not serve another term of office in that office until 8 years after the conclusion of the person's second consecutive term. A person is considered to serve a term of office for the purpose of this subsection if the person is elected or appointed to serve any portion of the term.

#### SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act and applies to the election of officers of the executive branch in 2014 and thereafter. RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article IV of the Illinois Constitution by changing Section 6 as follows:

#### ARTICLE IV

#### THE LEGISLATURE

#### SECTION 6. ORGANIZATION

- (a)A majority of the members elected to each house constitutes a quorum.
- (b) On the first day of the January session of the General Assembly in odd-numbered years, the Secretary of State shall convene the House of Representatives to elect from its membership a Speaker of the House of Representatives as presiding officer, and the Governor shall convene the Senate to elect from its membership a President of the Senate as presiding officer. A person may not serve more than a total of 10 years in the office of Speaker of the House of

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Representatives, President of the Senate, Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, or Minority Leader of the Senate; provided that service before the second Wednesday in January of 2014 shall not be considered in the calculation of a person's service.

- (c) For purposes of powers of appointment conferred by this Constitution, the Minority Leader of either house is a member of the numerically strongest political party other than the party to which the Speaker or the President belongs, as the case may be.
- (d) Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings, judge the elections, returns and qualifications of its members and choose its officers. No member shall be expelled by either house, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to that house. A member may be expelled only once for the same offense. Each house may punish by imprisonment any person, not a member, guilty of disrespect to the house by disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence. Imprisonment shall not extend beyond twenty-four hours at one time unless the person persists in disorderly or contemptuous behavior.

#### SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act. This has been the First Reading of House Joint Resolution Constitutional Amendment #20. There being no further business, the House Perfunctory Session will stand adjourned."
