SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

10 ILCS 5/1A-60 new	
10 ILCS 5/7-10	from Ch. 46, par. 7-10
10 ILCS 5/8-8	from Ch. 46, par. 8-8
10 ILCS 5/10-5	from Ch. 46, par. 10-5
65 ILCS 20/21-28	from Ch. 24, par. 21-28

Amends the Election Code. Requires the State Board of Elections to create a pilot program to allow petition signatures to be gathered electronically. Provides that a statement of candidacy shall include a space for a candidate to include his or her telephone number and email address. Provides that a candidate's petition for countywide office in Cook County must contain at least 5,000 but not more than 10,000 signatures (rather than the number of signatures equal to .5% of the qualified electors of his or her party who cast votes at the last preceding general election in Cook County). Amends the Revised Cities and Villages Act of 1941. Provides that a petition for nomination for mayor of Chicago must be signed by at least 5,000 but not more than 10,000 legal voters of the city (rather than 12,500).

1 AN ACT concerning elections.

2 **Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois,**
3 **represented in the General Assembly:**

4 Section 5. The Election Code is amended by changing
5 Sections 7-10, 8-8, and 10-5 and by adding Section 1A-60 as
6 follows:

7 (10 ILCS 5/1A-60 new)

8 Sec. 1A-60. Pilot program for digital petition signatures.

9 The State Board of Elections shall create a pilot program that
10 allows petition signatures to be gathered electronically.

11 (10 ILCS 5/7-10) (from Ch. 46, par. 7-10)

12 Sec. 7-10. Form of petition for nomination. The name of no
13 candidate for nomination, or State central committeeperson, or
14 township committeeperson, or precinct committeeperson, or ward
15 committeeperson or candidate for delegate or alternate
16 delegate to national nominating conventions, shall be printed
17 upon the primary ballot unless a petition for nomination has
18 been filed in his behalf as provided in this Article in
19 substantially the following form:

3 Each sheet of the petition other than the statement of
4 candidacy and candidate's statement shall be of uniform size
5 and shall contain above the space for signatures an appropriate
6 heading giving the information as to name of candidate or
7 candidates, in whose behalf such petition is signed; the
8 office, the political party represented and place of residence;
9 and the heading of each sheet shall be the same.

10 Such petition shall be signed by qualified primary electors
11 residing in the political division for which the nomination is
12 sought in their own proper persons only and opposite the
13 signature of each signer, his residence address shall be
14 written or printed. The residence address required to be
15 written or printed opposite each qualified primary elector's
16 name shall include the street address or rural route number of
17 the signer, as the case may be, as well as the signer's county,
18 and city, village or town, and state. However the county or
19 city, village or town, and state of residence of the electors
20 may be printed on the petition forms where all of the electors
21 signing the petition reside in the same county or city, village
22 or town, and state. Standard abbreviations may be used in
23 writing the residence address, including street number, if any.
24 At the bottom of each sheet of such petition shall be added a
25 circulator statement signed by a person 18 years of age or
older who is a citizen of the United States, stating the street

1 address or rural route number, as the case may be, as well as
2 the county, city, village or town, and state; and certifying
3 that the signatures on that sheet of the petition were signed
4 in his or her presence and certifying that the signatures are
5 genuine; and either (1) indicating the dates on which that
6 sheet was circulated, or (2) indicating the first and last
7 dates on which the sheet was circulated, or (3) certifying that
8 none of the signatures on the sheet were signed more than 90
9 days preceding the last day for the filing of the petition and
10 certifying that to the best of his or her knowledge and belief
11 the persons so signing were at the time of signing the
12 petitions qualified voters of the political party for which a
13 nomination is sought. Such statement shall be sworn to before
14 some officer authorized to administer oaths in this State.

15 No petition sheet shall be circulated more than 90 days
16 preceding the last day provided in Section 7-12 for the filing
17 of such petition.

18 The person circulating the petition, or the candidate on
19 whose behalf the petition is circulated, may strike any
20 signature from the petition, provided that:

21 (1) the person striking the signature shall initial the
22 petition at the place where the signature is struck; and

23 (2) the person striking the signature shall sign a
24 certification listing the page number and line number of
25 each signature struck from the petition. Such
26 certification shall be filed as a part of the petition.

1 Such sheets before being filed shall be neatly fastened
2 together in book form, by placing the sheets in a pile and
3 fastening them together at one edge in a secure and suitable
4 manner, and the sheets shall then be numbered consecutively.
5 The sheets shall not be fastened by pasting them together end
6 to end, so as to form a continuous strip or roll. All petition
7 sheets which are filed with the proper local election
8 officials, election authorities or the State Board of Elections
9 shall be the original sheets which have been signed by the
10 voters and by the circulator thereof, and not photocopies or
11 duplicates of such sheets. Each petition must include as a part
12 thereof, a statement of candidacy for each of the candidates
13 filing, or in whose behalf the petition is filed. This
14 statement shall set out the address of such candidate, a
15 telephone number and email address, if any, for such candidate,
16 the office for which he is a candidate, shall state that the
17 candidate is a qualified primary voter of the party to which
18 the petition relates and is qualified for the office specified
19 (in the case of a candidate for State's Attorney it shall state
20 that the candidate is at the time of filing such statement a
21 licensed attorney-at-law of this State), shall state that he
22 has filed (or will file before the close of the petition filing
23 period) a statement of economic interests as required by the
24 Illinois Governmental Ethics Act, shall request that the
25 candidate's name be placed upon the official ballot, and shall
26 be subscribed and sworn to by such candidate before some

1 officer authorized to take acknowledgment of deeds in the State
2 and shall be in substantially the following form:

10 The petitions, when filed, shall not be withdrawn or added
11 to, and no signatures shall be revoked except by revocation
12 filed in writing with the State Board of Elections, election
13 authority or local election official with whom the petition is
14 required to be filed, and before the filing of such petition.
15 Whoever forges the name of a signer upon any petition required
16 by this Article is deemed guilty of a forgery and on conviction
17 thereof shall be punished accordingly.

18 A candidate for the offices listed in this Section must
19 obtain the number of signatures specified in this Section on
20 his or her petition for nomination.

21 (a) Statewide office or delegate to a national nominating
22 convention. If a candidate seeks to run for statewide office or
23 as a delegate or alternate delegate to a national nominating
24 convention elected from the State at-large, then the
25 candidate's petition for nomination must contain at least 5,000

1 but not more than 10,000 signatures.

2 (b) Congressional office or congressional delegate to a
3 national nominating convention. If a candidate seeks to run for
4 United States Congress or as a congressional delegate or
5 alternate congressional delegate to a national nominating
6 convention elected from a congressional district, then the
7 candidate's petition for nomination must contain at least the
8 number of signatures equal to 0.5% of the qualified primary
9 electors of his or her party in his or her congressional
10 district. In the first primary election following a
11 redistricting of congressional districts, a candidate's
12 petition for nomination must contain at least 600 signatures of
13 qualified primary electors of the candidate's political party
14 in his or her congressional district.

15 (c) County office. If a candidate seeks to run for any
16 countywide office, including but not limited to county board
17 chairperson or county board member, elected on an at-large
18 basis, in a county other than Cook County, then the candidate's
19 petition for nomination must contain at least the number of
20 signatures equal to 0.5% of the qualified electors of his or
21 her party who cast votes at the last preceding general election
22 in his or her county. If a candidate seeks to run for county
23 board member elected from a county board district, then the
24 candidate's petition for nomination must contain at least the
25 number of signatures equal to 0.5% of the qualified primary
26 electors of his or her party in the county board district. In

1 the first primary election following a redistricting of county
2 board districts or the initial establishment of county board
3 districts, a candidate's petition for nomination must contain
4 at least the number of signatures equal to 0.5% of the
5 qualified electors of his or her party in the entire county who
6 cast votes at the last preceding general election divided by
7 the total number of county board districts comprising the
8 county board; provided that in no event shall the number of
9 signatures be less than 25.

10 (d) County office; Cook County only.

11 (1) If a candidate seeks to run for countywide office
12 in Cook County, then the candidate's petition for
13 nomination must contain at least 5,000 but not more than
14 10,000 signatures ~~the number of signatures equal to 0.5% of~~
15 ~~the qualified electors of his or her party who cast votes~~
16 ~~at the last preceding general election in Cook County.~~

17 (2) If a candidate seeks to run for Cook County Board
18 Commissioner, then the candidate's petition for nomination
19 must contain at least the number of signatures equal to
20 0.5% of the qualified primary electors of his or her party
21 in his or her county board district. In the first primary
22 election following a redistricting of Cook County Board of
23 Commissioners districts, a candidate's petition for
24 nomination must contain at least the number of signatures
25 equal to 0.5% of the qualified electors of his or her party
26 in the entire county who cast votes at the last preceding

1 general election divided by the total number of county
2 board districts comprising the county board; provided that
3 in no event shall the number of signatures be less than 25.

4 (3) If a candidate seeks to run for Cook County Board
5 of Review Commissioner, which is elected from a district
6 pursuant to subsection (c) of Section 5-5 of the Property
7 Tax Code, then the candidate's petition for nomination must
8 contain at least the number of signatures equal to 0.5% of
9 the total number of registered voters in his or her board
10 of review district in the last general election at which a
11 commissioner was regularly scheduled to be elected from
12 that board of review district. In no event shall the number
13 of signatures required be greater than the requisite number
14 for a candidate who seeks countywide office in Cook County
15 under subsection (d)(1) of this Section. In the first
16 primary election following a redistricting of Cook County
17 Board of Review districts, a candidate's petition for
18 nomination must contain at least 4,000 signatures or at
19 least the number of signatures required for a countywide
20 candidate in Cook County, whichever is less, of the
21 qualified electors of his or her party in the district.

22 (e) Municipal or township office. If a candidate seeks to
23 run for municipal or township office, then the candidate's
24 petition for nomination must contain at least the number of
25 signatures equal to 0.5% of the qualified primary electors of
26 his or her party in the municipality or township. If a

1 candidate seeks to run for alderman of a municipality, then the
2 candidate's petition for nomination must contain at least the
3 number of signatures equal to 0.5% of the qualified primary
4 electors of his or her party of the ward. In the first primary
5 election following redistricting of aldermanic wards or
6 trustee districts of a municipality or the initial
7 establishment of wards or districts, a candidate's petition for
8 nomination must contain the number of signatures equal to at
9 least 0.5% of the total number of votes cast for the candidate
10 of that political party who received the highest number of
11 votes in the entire municipality at the last regular election
12 at which an officer was regularly scheduled to be elected from
13 the entire municipality, divided by the number of wards or
14 districts. In no event shall the number of signatures be less
15 than 25.

16 (f) State central committeeperson. If a candidate seeks to
17 run for State central committeeperson, then the candidate's
18 petition for nomination must contain at least 100 signatures of
19 the primary electors of his or her party of his or her
20 congressional district.

21 (g) Sanitary district trustee. If a candidate seeks to run
22 for trustee of a sanitary district in which trustees are not
23 elected from wards, then the candidate's petition for
24 nomination must contain at least the number of signatures equal
25 to 0.5% of the primary electors of his or her party from the
26 sanitary district. If a candidate seeks to run for trustee of a

1 sanitary district in which trustees are elected from wards,
2 then the candidate's petition for nomination must contain at
3 least the number of signatures equal to 0.5% of the primary
4 electors of his or her party in the ward of that sanitary
5 district. In the first primary election following
6 redistricting of sanitary districts elected from wards, a
7 candidate's petition for nomination must contain at least the
8 signatures of 150 qualified primary electors of his or her ward
9 of that sanitary district.

10 (h) Judicial office. If a candidate seeks to run for
11 judicial office in a district, then the candidate's petition
12 for nomination must contain the number of signatures equal to
13 0.4% of the number of votes cast in that district for the
14 candidate for his or her political party for the office of
15 Governor at the last general election at which a Governor was
16 elected, but in no event less than 500 signatures. If a
17 candidate seeks to run for judicial office in a circuit or
18 subcircuit, then the candidate's petition for nomination must
19 contain the number of signatures equal to 0.25% of the number
20 of votes cast for the judicial candidate of his or her
21 political party who received the highest number of votes at the
22 last general election at which a judicial officer from the same
23 circuit or subcircuit was regularly scheduled to be elected,
24 but in no event less than 1,000 signatures in circuits and
25 subcircuits located in the First Judicial District or 500
26 signatures in every other Judicial District.

1 (i) Precinct, ward, and township committeeperson. If a
2 candidate seeks to run for precinct committeeperson, then the
3 candidate's petition for nomination must contain at least 10
4 signatures of the primary electors of his or her party for the
5 precinct. If a candidate seeks to run for ward committeeperson,
6 then the candidate's petition for nomination must contain no
7 less than the number of signatures equal to 10% of the primary
8 electors of his or her party of the ward, but no more than 16%
9 of those same electors; provided that the maximum number of
10 signatures may be 50 more than the minimum number, whichever is
11 greater. If a candidate seeks to run for township
12 committeeperson, then the candidate's petition for nomination
13 must contain no less than the number of signatures equal to 5%
14 of the primary electors of his or her party of the township,
15 but no more than 8% of those same electors; provided that the
16 maximum number of signatures may be 50 more than the minimum
17 number, whichever is greater.

18 (j) State's attorney or regional superintendent of schools
19 for multiple counties. If a candidate seeks to run for State's
20 attorney or regional Superintendent of Schools who serves more
21 than one county, then the candidate's petition for nomination
22 must contain at least the number of signatures equal to 0.5% of
23 the primary electors of his or her party in the territory
24 comprising the counties.

25 (k) Any other office. If a candidate seeks any other
26 office, then the candidate's petition for nomination must

1 contain at least the number of signatures equal to 0.5% of the
2 registered voters of the political subdivision, district, or
3 division for which the nomination is made or 25 signatures,
4 whichever is greater.

5 For purposes of this Section the number of primary electors
6 shall be determined by taking the total vote cast, in the
7 applicable district, for the candidate for that political party
8 who received the highest number of votes, statewide, at the
9 last general election in the State at which electors for
10 President of the United States were elected. For political
11 subdivisions, the number of primary electors shall be
12 determined by taking the total vote cast for the candidate for
13 that political party who received the highest number of votes
14 in the political subdivision at the last regular election at
15 which an officer was regularly scheduled to be elected from
16 that subdivision. For wards or districts of political
17 subdivisions, the number of primary electors shall be
18 determined by taking the total vote cast for the candidate for
19 that political party who received the highest number of votes
20 in the ward or district at the last regular election at which
21 an officer was regularly scheduled to be elected from that ward
22 or district.

23 A "qualified primary elector" of a party may not sign
24 petitions for or be a candidate in the primary of more than one
25 party.

26 The changes made to this Section of this amendatory Act of

1 the 93rd General Assembly are declarative of existing law,
2 except for item (3) of subsection (d).

3 Petitions of candidates for nomination for offices herein
4 specified, to be filed with the same officer, may contain the
5 names of 2 or more candidates of the same political party for
6 the same or different offices. In the case of the offices of
7 Governor and Lieutenant Governor, a joint petition including
8 one candidate for each of those offices must be filed.

12 candidate for nomination shall be printed upon the primary
13 ballot unless a petition for nomination shall have been filed
14 in his behalf as provided for in this Section. Each such
15 petition shall include as a part thereof the oath required by
16 Section 7-10.1 of this Act and a statement of candidacy by the
17 candidate filing or in whose behalf the petition is filed. This
18 statement shall set out the address of such candidate, a
19 telephone number and email address, if any, for such candidate,
20 the office for which he is a candidate, shall state that the
21 candidate is a qualified primary voter of the party to which
22 the petition relates, is qualified for the office specified and
23 has filed a statement of economic interests as required by the
24 Illinois Governmental Ethics Act, shall request that the
25 candidate's name be placed upon the official ballot and shall

1 be subscribed and sworn by such candidate before some officer
2 authorized to take acknowledgment of deeds in this State and
3 may be in substantially the following form:

26 interests required by the Illinois Governmental Ethics Act must

1 be filed with the petitions for nomination as provided in

3 All petitions for nomination for the office of State
4 Senator shall be signed by at least 1,000 but not more than
5 3,000 of the qualified primary electors of the candidate's
6 party in his legislative district.

7 All petitions for nomination for the office of
8 Representative in the General Assembly shall be signed by at
9 least 500 but not more than 1,500 of the qualified primary
10 electors of the candidate's party in his or her representative
11 district.

12 Opposite the signature of each qualified primary elector
13 who signs a petition for nomination for the office of State
14 Representative or State Senator such elector's residence
15 address shall be written or printed. The residence address
16 required to be written or printed opposite each qualified
17 primary elector's name shall include the street address or
18 rural route number of the signer, as the case may be, as well
19 as the signer's county and city, village or town.

20 For the purposes of this Section, the number of primary
21 electors shall be determined by taking the total vote cast, in
22 the applicable district, for the candidate for such political
23 party who received the highest number of votes, state-wide, at
24 the last general election in the State at which electors for
25 President of the United States were elected.

26 A "qualified primary elector" of a party may not sign

1 petitions for or be a candidate in the primary of more than one
2 party.

3 In the affidavit at the bottom of each sheet, the petition
4 circulator, who shall be a person 18 years of age or older who
5 is a citizen of the United States, shall state his or her
6 street address or rural route number, as the case may be, as
7 well as his or her county, city, village or town, and state;
8 and shall certify that the signatures on that sheet of the
9 petition were signed in his or her presence; and shall certify
10 that the signatures are genuine; and shall certify that to the
11 best of his or her knowledge and belief the persons so signing
12 were at the time of signing the petition qualified primary
13 voters for which the nomination is sought.

14 In the affidavit at the bottom of each petition sheet, the
15 petition circulator shall either (1) indicate the dates on
16 which he or she circulated that sheet, or (2) indicate the
17 first and last dates on which the sheet was circulated, or (3)
18 certify that none of the signatures on the sheet were signed
19 more than 90 days preceding the last day for the filing of the
20 petition. No petition sheet shall be circulated more than 90
21 days preceding the last day provided in Section 8-9 for the
22 filing of such petition.

23 All petition sheets which are filed with the State Board of
24 Elections shall be the original sheets which have been signed
25 by the voters and by the circulator, and not photocopies or
26 duplicates of such sheets.

1 The person circulating the petition, or the candidate on
2 whose behalf the petition is circulated, may strike any
3 signature from the petition, provided that:

4 (1) the person striking the signature shall initial the
5 petition at the place where the signature is struck; and

6 (2) the person striking the signature shall sign a
7 certification listing the page number and line number of
8 each signature struck from the petition. Such
9 certification shall be filed as a part of the petition.

11 (10 ILCS 5/10-5) (from Ch. 46, par. 10-5)

12 Sec. 10-5. All petitions for nomination shall, besides
13 containing the names of candidates, specify as to each:

14 1. The office or offices to which such candidate or
15 candidates shall be nominated.

16 2. The new political party, if any, represented, expressed
17 in not more than 5 words. However, such party shall not bear
18 the same name as, nor include the name of any established
19 political party as defined in this Article. This prohibition
20 does not preclude any established political party from making
21 nominations in those cases in which it is authorized to do so.

22 3. The place of residence of any such candidate or
23 candidates with the street and number thereof, if any. In the
24 case of electors for President and Vice-President of the United
25 States, the names of candidates for President and

1 Vice-President may be added to the party name or appellation.

2 Such certificate of nomination or nomination papers in
3 addition shall include as a part thereof, the oath required by
4 Section 7-10.1 of this Act and must include a statement of
5 candidacy for each of the candidates named therein, except
6 candidates for electors for President and Vice-President of the
7 United States. Each such statement shall set out the address of
8 such candidate, a telephone number and email address, if any,
9 for such candidate, the office for which he is a candidate,
10 shall state that the candidate is qualified for the office
11 specified and has filed (or will file before the close of the
12 petition filing period) a statement of economic interests as
13 required by the Illinois Governmental Ethics Act, shall request
14 that the candidate's name be placed upon the official ballot
15 and shall be subscribed and sworn to by such candidate before
16 some officer authorized to take acknowledgments of deeds in
17 this State, and may be in substantially the following form:

 14 attached thereto a certificate stating the names and addresses
 15 of the party officers authorized to fill vacancies in
 16 nomination pursuant to Section 10-11.

17 Nomination papers filed under this Section are not valid if
 18 the candidate named therein fails to file a statement of
 19 economic interests as required by the Illinois Governmental
 20 Ethics Act in relation to his candidacy with the appropriate
 21 officer by the end of the period for the filing of nomination
 22 papers unless he has filed a statement of economic interests in
 23 relation to the same governmental unit with that officer during
 24 the same calendar year as the year in which such nomination
 25 papers were filed. If the nomination papers of any candidate
 26 and the statement of economic interest of that candidate are

1 not required to be filed with the same officer, the candidate
2 must file with the officer with whom the nomination papers are
3 filed a receipt from the officer with whom the statement of
4 economic interests is filed showing the date on which such
5 statement was filed. Such receipt shall be so filed not later
6 than the last day on which nomination papers may be filed.

8 Section 10. The Revised Cities and Villages Act of 1941 is
9 amended by changing Section 21-28 as follows:

10 (65 ILCS 20/21-28) (from Ch. 24, par. 21-28)

11 Sec. 21-28. Nomination by petition.

12 (a) All nominations for alderman of any ward in the city
13 shall be by petition. Each petition for nomination of a
14 candidate shall be signed by at least 473 legal voters of the
15 ward.

16 (b) All nominations for mayor, city clerk, and city
17 treasurer in the city shall be by petition. Each petition for
18 nomination of a candidate, except for mayor, must be signed by
19 at least 12,500 legal voters of the city. Each petition for
20 nomination for mayor must be signed by at least 5,000 but not
21 more than 10,000 legal voters of the city.

22 (c) All such petitions, and procedure with respect thereto,
23 shall conform in other respects to the provisions of the
24 election and ballot laws then in force in the city of Chicago

1 concerning the nomination of independent candidates for public
2 office by petition. The method of nomination herein provided is
3 exclusive of and replaces all other methods heretofore provided
4 by law.
