

101ST GENERAL ASSEMBLY State of Illinois 2019 and 2020 SB2134

Introduced 2/15/2019, by Sen. Jason A. Barickman

SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

740 ILCS 14/20 815 ILCS 505/2Z

from Ch. 121 1/2, par. 262Z

Amends the Biometric Information Privacy Act. Deletes language creating a private right of action. Provides instead that any violation that results from the collection of biometric information by an employer for employment, human resources, fraud prevention, or security purposes is subject to the enforcement authority of the Department of Labor. Provides that an employee or former employee may file a complaint with the Department alleging a violation, within one year from the date of the violation, by submitting a signed, completed complaint form. Provides that any violation of the Act constitutes a violation of the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act and may be enforced by the Attorney General. Makes a corresponding change in the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act. Effective immediately.

1 AN ACT concerning civil law.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- Section 5. The Biometric Information Privacy Act is amended by changing Section 20 as follows:
- 6 (740 ILCS 14/20)

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- 7 Sec. 20. Violation Right of action.
- 8 (a) Any violation that results from the collection of
 9 biometric information by an employer for employment, human
 10 resources, fraud prevention, or security purposes is subject to
 11 the enforcement authority of the Department of Labor. The
 12 Director of Labor shall adopt rules necessary to administer and
 13 enforce this authority.
 - (b) An employee or former employee may file a complaint with the Department of Labor alleging a violation of this Act by submitting a signed, completed complaint form. All complaints shall be filed with the Department of Labor within one year from the date of the violation.
- 19 (c) Any violation of this Act constitutes a violation of
 20 the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive Business Practices Act. The
 21 Office of the Attorney General or the appropriate State's
 22 Attorney's Office has enforcement authority of the provisions
 23 of this Act and may enforce a violation of this Act as an

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1 unlawful practice under the Consumer Fraud and Deceptive 2 Business Practices Act. Any person aggrieved by a violation of this Act shall have 3 right of action in a State circuit court or as a supplemental 4 claim in federal district court against an offending party. A 5 6 prevailing party may recover for each violation: 7 (1) against a private entity that negligently violates a provision of this Act, liquidated damages of \$1,000 8 9 actual damages, whichever is greater; 10 (2) against a private entity that intentionally or 11 recklessly violates a provision of this Act, liquidated 12 damages of \$5,000 or actual damages, whichever is greater; 13 reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, including expert witness fees and other litigation expenses; and 14 (4) other relief, including an injunction, as the State 15 16 or federal court may deem appropriate. 17 (Source: P.A. 95-994, eff. 10-3-08.) 18 Section 10.
