## SYNOPSIS AS INTRODUCED:

510 ILCS 70/2.01i new 510 ILCS 70/4

from Ch. 8, par. 704

Amends the Humane Care for Animals Act. Prohibits a carnival from offering, awarding, or giving away any live animal in a game, contest, or tournament involving skill or chance. Provides that the carnival may offer a coupon, certificate, or voucher to obtain the live animal from a licensed pet store as the prize. Defines "carnival".

# Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly:

- 4 Section 5. The Humane Care for Animals Act is amended by 5 changing Section 4 and adding Section 2.01i as follows:
- 6 (510 ILCS 70/2.01i new)
   7 <u>Sec. 2.01i. Carnival. "Carnival" has the meaning ascribed</u>
   8 to that term in the Carnival Regulation Act.
- 9 (510 ILCS 70/4) (from Ch. 8, par. 704)

10 Sec. 4. Prohibited acts. No person may sell, offer for 11 sale, barter, or give away as a pet or a novelty any rabbit or any baby chick, duckling or other fowl which has been dyed, 12 13 colored, or otherwise treated to impart an artificial color thereto. Baby chicks or ducklings shall not be sold, offered 14 for sale, bartered, or given away as pets or novelties. 15 16 Rabbits, ducklings or baby chicks shall not be awarded as 17 prizes.

No person may allow for the adoption, transfer, sale, offer for sale, barter, or give away any animal forfeited or relinquished under Section 3.04 or 3.05 of this Act to the person who forfeited the animal or a person residing in that person's household. No carnival may offer, award, or give away any live animal as a prize in a game, contest, or tournament involving skill or chance. A carnival may offer a coupon, certificate, or voucher to obtain the live animal from a licensed pet store as the prize.

A person convicted of violating this Section is guilty of a Class B misdemeanor. A second or subsequent violation is a Class 4 felony, with every day that a violation continues constituting a separate offense.
