1 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 2 WHEREAS, Adoption has a lifelong impact on individuals and 3 families; and WHEREAS, There are more than 2 million adopted children in 4 the United States and more than 60,000 adopted children living 5 6 in Illinois; and 7 WHEREAS, Adopted children deserve support to thrive; and 8 WHEREAS, Illinois seeks to be a welcoming home for adopted 9 children; and WHEREAS, Children, including those who are adopted, spend 10 11 much of their time at school and school-related events; and 12 WHEREAS, School mental health professionals, including 13 school social workers, school counselors, and school 14 psychologists, provide support to all students and may provide mental health care to students with identified need; and 15 16 WHEREAS, Being adopted approximately doubles the odds of having contact with a mental health professional; and 17
