Mr. President -- I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has adopted the following joint resolution, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

WHEREAS, The State Board of Education presently gives out an annual award, the Illinois Teacher of the Year Award, to deserving educators who have proven themselves to be caring and committed to bettering the lives of others through quality education; and

WHEREAS, Willard Carl Widerberg spent more than 30 years of his life in teaching and school administration; he was called to teaching at a very early age and has been credited with building the foundation for numerous co-op, special education, and school administrative programs still in use today; he developed innovative educational and administrative programs working for DeKalb Community Unit School District 428, the United States military, and the National Science Program at Northern Illinois University; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Widerberg became an elementary school principal in 1954; during the following years he served as principal in several schools within DeKalb Community Unit School District 428; during the summer months, he worked with the National Science Program at Northern Illinois University, which teaches new and existing elementary and high school teachers nationwide the foundations of various science disciplines; he also taught an Americanization class at De Kalb High School for more than 10 years, working with immigrants from numerous countries; and

WHEREAS, He retired in 1979 after 32 years in teaching and administrative roles within DeKalb area schools; throughout his career, he volunteered with numerous local and State organizations focused on developing and enriching the educational environment, as well as the community's wellbeing; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Widerberg received the very first Illinois Teacher of the Year Award in 1954; in addition, that same year he was the first Illinois teacher to be recognized as the National Teacher of the Year; and

WHEREAS, Willard Carl Widerberg has proven over the years that his heart is all about education; he has shown his determination to teach, to lead, and to place others on a path that pushes them towards a brighter future; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the State Board of Education to rename the Illinois Teacher of the Year Award the Willard Carl Widerberg Illinois Teacher of the Year Award in honor of Mr. Widerberg's many achievements and dedication to education in the State of Illinois: and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the State Board of Education.

Senator Maloney offered the following Senate Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE RESOLUTION NO. 87

WHEREAS, It is critically important for job-creation and job-retention that the Illinois Domestic Products Act be observed in the use of public funds for investment in our nation's aging infrastructure, especially in Illinois where manufacturing is essential to the State's economy; and

WHEREAS, All State agencies are urged to discourage the outsourcing of manufacturing and the purchasing of products to the detriment of U.S. suppliers, including suppliers located in Illinois servicing those industries and businesses that receive public sector financial assistance; and

WHEREAS, Leaders of the National Governors Association (NGA) and the National Conference of State Legislatures (NCLS) have called on the new administration and Congress to take early action on the severely weakened economy, mired in what is estimated to be the most serious economic downturn in 30 years; the economic downturn is causing high unemployment and accompanying hardships for American workers and their families, including families in Illinois where the unemployment rate is escalating; and

WHEREAS, Congress is drafting economic recovery legislation for the President to sign as soon as possible; this "economic stimulus" legislation is expected to channel billions of dollars in state block grants to help economically stressed states take immediate action to initiate significant job creation through massive public works investments to rebuild our nation's aging infrastructure including: roads and accompanying guardrails, utility poles, rest areas, maintenance buildings, highway bridges, energy pipelines, rail and air transportation networks, electrical grid expansion, water and sewerage improvements, environmentally friendly nonresidential renovation, new construction of state-of-the-art schools and hospitals, and other vital infrastructure needs; and

WHEREAS, Modernizing and upgrading Illinois' statewide infrastructure system will improve the overall quality of life for all Illinois families, create significant new job opportunities and economic growth, and help revitalize and advance Illinois' manufacturing sector; in Illinois, the manufacturing industries are huge purchasers of State goods and services including the following goods and services: health care, education and training, utility generated electricity, natural gas and alternative fuels, and advanced technology to enhance competitiveness and environmental quality; and

WHEREAS, Illinois has taken previous efforts through the Procurement of Domestic Products Act to encourage the use of domestically manufactured products in public works, and it is now critically

important that all State agencies do everything possible to enforce these provisions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that all State agencies are encouraged, whenever possible, to purchase domestically made products for any construction project or other procurement funded by the State; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Illinois Procurement Policy Board work with all chief procurement officers to advance the purchase of domestic products, including those made in Illinois, through all necessary means, including collaboration between agencies, the proposal of rules, and the creation of a list of domestically made products commonly procured using State funds; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Illinois Procurement Policy Board, the President of the United States, and all members of the Illinois congressional delegation.

Senator J. Jones offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

WHEREAS, Fishing is a vital industry in the State of Illinois, from the small lakes of downstate Illinois to Lake Michigan; the tourism created from fishing destinations like Carlyle Lake also generate revenue for the citizens of this State; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois High School Association has made Illinois the first state to have bass fishing officially sanctioned as a high school sport; the first official high school bass fishing State finals will held at Carlyle Lake in Carlyle, Illinois' largest in-land lake, on May 8 and 9, 2009; and

WHEREAS, In order to help promote the Bass Fishing Finals, the City of Carlyle is organizing the Bass Celebration & Fishing Expo, which will include fishing booths, food, and entertainment for the general public; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we designate the month of May 2009 as High School Bass Fishing Month in the State of Illinois in recognition of the importance of bass fishing to the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to Bill Gruen, Carlyle City Administrator, as a symbol of our esteem and respect.

Senator Hunter offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20

WHEREAS, Local School Councils were established under the Chicago School Reform Act of 1988, as a vehicle for parent, community, teacher, and student empowerment in the Chicago Public Schools (CPS); and

WHEREAS, Local School Councils are part of the late Mayor Harold Washington's legacy of accessibility and accountability to the public; and

WHEREAS, Local School Council members are publicly elected, and Local School Councils stand as a national model for local site management and democracy in public education; and

WHEREAS, Research by Designs for Change on 144 schools that have made consistent improvement over the past 15 years indicates that Local School Councils have been a critical component to school improvement in the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Research by the Consortium on Chicago School Research summarized that "the vast majority of LSC's are viable governance organizations that responsibly carry out their mandated duties and are active in building school and community partnerships."; and

WHEREAS, There is no research that suggests that Local School Councils are not effective vehicles for local school leadership; and

WHEREAS, There is significant public sentiment that there is insufficient institutional support for Local School Council support and development; and

WHEREAS, Research by the University of Illinois at Chicago and the Kenwood Oakland Community Organization chronicles the negative impact of central office decisions on the education of low-income children when community wisdom is ignored; and

WHEREAS, Recommendations from 2 major studies have called for more support for Local School Councils; and

WHEREAS, There are major initiatives sponsored by community-based and non-CPS organizations that provide models for support and training of Local School Councils; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we support the empowerment of Local School Councils as effective local, publicly-elected decision-making bodies in the City of Chicago and will sponsor subject-matter hearings on the needs of Local School Councils to ensure their continued success.

Senator Clayborne offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21

WHEREAS, The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change and the National Academy of Sciences have found that the continued buildup of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere adversely impacts the global climate; and

WHEREAS, The greenhouse gas emissions of developing countries are rising more rapidly than the emissions of the United States and have surpassed the greenhouse gas emissions of the United States and other developed countries; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois accounts for only 0.68% of total global greenhouse gas emissions; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gas emissions must not eliminate American jobs and diminish the ability of American industry to compete in the global marketplace; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gas emissions must not add to the already high costs of power or gasoline; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gas emissions must reward, and not punish, early adopters of energy-efficient technologies and practices; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gas emissions must adopt an international component to prevent "emissions leakage" and ensure that emissions do not simply migrate to another state or

nation; and

WHEREAS, The only manner to quantify these emissions is through a domestic and international greenhouse gas emissions registry that is uniform, transparent, and verifiable; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gases must ensure that the adopted regime does not result in the off-shoring of international trade-sensitive industries; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois has already lost 246,200 manufacturing jobs since 1998; and

WHEREAS, Manufacturing accounts for \$77 billion of the Illinois Gross State Product and is the number one contributor to the State's economy; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gas emissions must ensure the availability of sufficient, affordable energy, including clean energy, before restricting emissions in a manner that could reduce the volume of energy available to consumers; and

WHEREAS, Any system to regulate greenhouse gas emissions must provide credits or allowances to support operations, such as recycling, that reduce greenhouse gas emissions; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that we express the opinion that the United States and the State of Illinois should combat global climate change and reduce the emission of greenhouse gases in a manner that is structured to promote American jobs, save American citizens and industry from higher energy prices, reward early adopters of efficient practices and technologies, prevent "emissions leakage", and champion the global competitiveness of American industry.

Senator Lauzen offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was ordered printed and referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

SC0022

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article III of the Illinois Constitution by changing Section 3 as follows:

ARTICLE III SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS

SECTION 3. ELECTIONS; SECRECY OF BALLOT

(a) All elections shall be free and equal.

(b) The right of the people to vote by secret ballot is fundamental. The right to vote by secret ballot in an election under State or federal law for public office or on an initiative or referendum, or to designate or authorize employee representation, may not be infringed.

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

SC0023

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend Article IV of the Illinois Constitution by adding Section 16 as follows:

ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

SECTION 16. APPROPRIATIONS VOTE

The General Assembly may not vote on final passage of any appropriations bill unless the bill has been filed or last amended, whichever is later, at least 7 calendar days prior to the vote.

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.

Senator Brady offered the following Senate Joint Resolution, which was ordered printed and referred to the Committee on Assignments:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

SC0024

RESOLVED, BY THE SENATE OF THE NINETY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to add Section 8.1 to Article IV of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

SECTION 8.1. PASSAGE OF REVENUE BILLS

A bill that would result in the increase of revenue to the State by an increase of a tax on or measured by income or by an increase of a tax on or measured by the selling price of any item of tangible personal property may become law only with the concurrence of two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the General Assembly.

SCHEDULE

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.
