(Secretary reads title of bill) 2nd Reading of the bill. The Committee on Higher Education adopted

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Amendment No. 2.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. Senator Aquino, on Senate Bill 1836. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1836.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

2nd Reading of the bill. No committee or Floor amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. With leave of the Body, we're going to go back to Senate Bill 525. Senator Aquino. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 525.

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(Secretary reads title of bill)
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2nd Reading of the bill. No committee or Floor amendments reported.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. With leave of the Body, we're going to go to Senate Bill 563. Senator Aquino. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 563.

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(Secretary reads title of bill) 2nd Reading of the bill. The Committee on Executive adopted Amendment No. 1.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Have there been any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

...further amendments -- no further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. With leave of the Body, we are going to go back to page 7 on your printed Calendar. We're going to call on Senator Sims, on Senate Bill 2183. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2183.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

2nd Reading of the bill. Committee on Executive adopted Amendment No. 1.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor -- I'm sorry. No further amendments reported.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. Ladies and Gentlemen, we are moving on to 3rd Readings. This is final action. Please come to the Floor. We are going to be sort of skipping around through our Calendar because we are going to skip over some bills that may be candidates to be on the Agreed Bill List. We are also going to be reading bills that have amendments that need to be adopted and then we will be leaving them on 3rd Reading. Again, those will be for the

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Agreed Bill List. Ladies and Gentlemen, we are now on 3rd Readings and we are going to start on page 10 of your printed Calendar, towards the bottom, with Senate Bill 50. Senator Crowe. Do you wish to proceed? Senator Peters, with Senate Bill 64. Senate Bill 80. Senator Tracy. This is a candidate for the Agreed Bill List, but we do need to adopt the amendment. Do you wish to do that? Senator Tracy seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 80 -- 80 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 80. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Tracy. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Tracy, would you like to describe your amendment? SENATOR TRACY:

Yes. Thank you, Madam Chairman -- or Madam President. This makes some minor technical changes to the amendment {sic} as was passed in committee. And so I would ask that it be adopted. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. With leave of the Body, we're going to go back to Senate Bill 64. Senator Peters. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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Senate Bill 64.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

Senate Bill 64, it -- it allows restorative justice options for victims, like -- and has support from the Illinois Coalition Against Domestic Violence and CAASE, so that they're able to get some healing in the court process. And I ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Senator Barickman, for what reason do you seek recognition?

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Questions of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Sponsor indicates he'll yield. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Yeah, you moved on me. You moved on me. Not my question. Thank you, Madam President. Senator, let's start this off. I guess tell me about these restorative justice practices. Who are the individuals? I'm looking for the -- the language in them. Who... The -- the -- Senator, the facilitators who conduct these practices, what are -- what are the qualifications of these individuals? Are they licensed? What's their background? Tell me some more about them.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Peters. SENATOR PETERS:

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The qualifications -- so this comes from -- with the support of the Cook County judges. The qualifications are -- look -- it's a program from the judges, from the courts, to support it -support victims and folks to be able to be made whole. So this is a decision made by the court.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Right. Okay. So I understand this is a -- this would be a new process that is designed to create some collaboration among crime -- potential defendants and victims and I think the bill says stakeholders. But these aren't organic, right? These aren't just people meeting in their -- in people's living rooms? The bill talks about facilitators as an individual who convenes these. And I'm looking to understand the background of the facilitators? Are they licensed? Are they -- are they therapists? Are they prosecutors? Are they attorneys? Like, who are these people? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

This is administered by a restorative judge -- a restorative justice court. A judge is the one facilitating and administering this process.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

So -- so these are judicial proceedings? Or these are outof-court proceedings? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

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Senator Peters. SENATOR PETERS:

These are judicial proceedings and they're not brand-new. They actually currently exist. This is just to make sure that people feel like they are secure in restorative justice court and that we can have a clean and fair -- fair process specifically for victims who want to make sure that they're entering into a healthy process.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman, did you have more questions? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

I do. Yeah, thank you, Madam President. Okay. The -- when these -- when these -- tell us more about, I guess, who participates in these collaborations? Who are the parties that participate 'em -- in them and what's being discussed -- what's being discussed there?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

So victims who've experienced abuse and pain can choose to go into a restorative justice court with the person who's perpetuated that pain and for them to find some mediation with each other. So the only way this process works is by making sure that all parties feel whole in the making of the process. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

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Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Do -- do -- is it only the victim who gets to initiate this process? In other words, if a victim wants to do this, do they

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have that discretion? Can anyone else force a victim to…? So this only occurs at the discretion -- the election of the victim? The victim has the sole discretion to choose to participate in this?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

Yes. This is -- this requires the victim and the person to be in agreement to go to restorative justice court. The main piece here is that you can't force the victim to come into something in terms of restorative justice without them supporting and having buy-in. Because what's important here is, again, this is a bill supported and driven by victims like the Illinois Coalition Against Domestic Violence, like sexual assault survivor organizations. So, just to repeat one more time, because I know you were having some discussion here, I want to say, again, it has the support of victims' rights organizations and that -- the fact of the matter is, they have to have buy-in to get in -- to -- to be able to do restorative justice court.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

There's a -- there's a privilege component to these collaborations that I think - my understanding - gave some pause in committee. Is this creating a new privilege, meaning -- I --I think some think of privilege as the ability for individuals to meet with their lawyer, discuss things that remain confidential, or privileged. Is that same concept being extended here? And, if so, to whom? Because I'm trying to -- again, this isn't just a

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lawyer and a victim; this is a group of people. And so I'm trying to understand that privilege piece. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

Yeah. So victims want to have privilege in this process. So victims who are in restorative justice, they want privilege in this process to ensure that the defendant who's -- who is engaging in it is engaging in it in a real and wholesome way with the victim. So, at the end of the day, to repeat this, because it's so supported by victims, or survivors, of assault and -- and pain and hurt, that they want to have trust in the process and they want to trust that the person they're engaging with is going to be honest and real with them. So to -- to sort of reiterate this, we want to make sure that people, particularly victims, can have faith in the process itself.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Okay. Thank you, Madam... Thanks to the bill sponsor. Thank you, Madam President. No further questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Tracy, for what reason do you seek recognition? SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill, please. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill.

SENATOR TRACY:

We heard this bill in Judicial {sic} Committee and it -- it

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did have some very compelling aspects of it. The witnesses -- or the -- the -- some of the witnesses had been victims, and certainly the merit was that someone, as part of their healing process after they'd been victimized, especially in a sexual assault, that this restorative justice event would advance their healing process. And it is true that several advocacy groups against domestic violence or sexual assault do support the bill. However, when I visited with my local agency against sexual assault and domestic abuse, I - they -- they brought the bill to my attention - I said do you -- have you ever felt like many of the sexual predators, the perpetrators in a sexual assault or domestic abuse situation, are manipulative, that they're manipulative and they feed on tormenting their victims continually even as they apologize? And they said, "Absolutely. By far, most of them." Also, imagine a situation where you have a privileged communication and a perpetrator confesses to another crime as part of this event, this restorative justice meeting, and there's a mandated reporter there. What is the result then? This bill has merit, but it's just not ready to go into law. I -- I think there's many aspects that still need to be worked on. And so, at this point, I would urge a No vote. I think that a manipulative perpetrator can further do damage to his victim unless we tweak some of this language and process that this bill seeks to address. So, with that, I would urge a No vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Peters, do you wish to close? SENATOR PETERS:

So I say this as a survivor who grew up in an abusive

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household, as a victim, which I think is an important piece here, that when we think about the restorative justice process, this is entirely laid out to make sure that countless organizations, when it comes to domestic violence and sexual assault, support this, and at the end of the day, I want to make people who are survivors of abuse and of violence be able to be made whole. I ask for an Aye vote, especially a bill that has such -- the unique support from so many people who are survivors of this pain. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 64 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? For those voting remotely. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes. Senator Harris votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator -- Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Lightford. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Lightford votes Yes. Senator Pacione-Zayas. SENATOR PACIONE-ZAYAS:

Senator Pacione-Zayas votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Pacione-Zayas votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Plummer votes No. Senator Van Pelt. Senator Van Pelt, are you on mute? I'm going to move on to Senator Wilcox.

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SENATOR WILCOX:

Senator Wilcox votes No. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Wilcox votes No. Senator Van Pelt. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 39 voting Aye, 17 voting No, and 0 voting Present. Senate Bill 64, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Moving on to Senate Bill 81. Senator Stoller. This is another candidate for the Agreed Bill List if we adopt the amendment. Do you wish to proceed? Senator Stoller seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 81 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 81. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Stoller. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Stoller, on your amendment. SENATOR STOLLER:

I request the amendment be adopted, please. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. Senator Villivalam, on Senate Bill 100. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 100.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Villivalam, on your bill.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 100, as amended, requires a person who uses Medicaid spend-down to qualify for Medicaid assistance to be provided up to six consecutive months to submit and have medical receipts and bills processed by HFS as evidence of payment of the person's monthly spend-down amount before becoming ineligible for medical assistance. And I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Seeing -- seeing none, Senator, do you wish to close?

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you. I ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 100 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? For those voting remotely, we're going to go to Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Harris votes Aye. Senator Lightford. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

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Lightford votes Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Lightford votes Aye. Senator Pacione-Zayas. SENATOR PACIONE-ZAYAS:

Pacione-Zayas votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Pacione-Zayas votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes. I vote Yes. Van Pelt votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox. SENATOR WILCOX:

Senator Wilcox votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Wilcox votes Yes. On that question, there -- oop. Take the record. On that question, there are 59 Ayes. Senate Bill 100, having received the -- required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Feigenholtz, on Senate Bill 109. SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam Chair {sic}. Senate Bill 109 is a bill... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Feigenholtz seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 109 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 109. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

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ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Feigenholtz. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor... I'm sorry. Senator Feigenholtz, I'm skipping over letting you describe your amendment.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

These are all technical changes that were agreed to and were put in the bill because LRB couldn't get the amendment out fast enough.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 109.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, would you like to describe your bill? SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

This is the wage adjuster bill. It's been agreed to by all parties. I'd appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Oh! Senator Feigenholtz, would you

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like to describe Senate Bill 109?
SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 109 is -- is a -the final step in aligning Illinois State law with national standards by removing the witness signature. We had a series of amendments that were proposed by interested parties. But currently, until we pass this, Illinois is one of only two states that still requires a witness requirement for POLST forms. Fortythree other states already do this. So I would appreciate your Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill. I would note that ... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To -- to the bill. SENATOR TRACY:

To the bill - that I would note that the Pro-Family Alliance and several other groups of that nature did oppose. They -- they thought for this type of end-of-life measures that it preserves a great deal of -- more validity when two signatures are required, much like as when we do a will and the process. So I just would note that. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Rose, for what reason do you seek recognition? SENATOR ROSE:

Thank you. To the -- to the bill, if I may. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill.

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SENATOR ROSE:

Thank you. And I rise in -- in opposition. I hate to do that 'cause I'm -- have a great deal of respect for the -- the sponsor. But just because, you know -- I mean, it's like -- yeah, two states -- she says we're the last two states in the country. Well, there's a reason why you have these witness slips. Because once you are done, you're done. There's no taking that back. So you better make sure that the document that people are making the decision to pull the plug on is the right document and it's been done properly and it's been done in the right state of mind of the individual before they -- when they're executing it. The reason you have the witness is, is so someone can put eyes on the person who's signing the form and say, yes, they are of sound mind and body. They are executing this as -- as their wishes, not because they're somebody that, unfortunately, has Alzheimer's or somebody who has dementia or somebody who has something else, but because they are of sound mind and body. You know, this kind of reminds me of, you know, lemmings running off a cliff. You know, just because forty-eight other states have done this, doesn't make it the right thing to do. And, you know, at the end of the day, the medical provider making -- has got to -- that's going to pull that plug has got to know that this is the actual wish of the person. And the way they know that is by having a piece of paper in front of them that was witnessed, where the witness can say, "yes, this is this person's specific intent. This is their wish and they are of sound mind and body." And I just -- you know, I frankly don't care what everyone else has done. I'm not going to run off that cliff. So, thank you, Madam President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

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Senator Barickman, for what purpose do you seek recognition? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you, Madam President. To the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Madam President, I guess to the -- to the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Sponsor indicates she'll yield. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

My -- my -- more of a point than a question, Madam President. My -- my view on this issue and the work that I think the sponsor has done relates to the question of how individuals make choices about life-sustaining treatments performed to them. My view is that individuals should have the right to make those types of life decisions. The sponsor's legislation, I think, makes it easier for those individuals to make those choices, and as a result, I intend to vote Yes. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any further discussion? Senator McConchie, for what purpose do you seek recognition? SENATOR McCONCHIE:

To the bill, Madam President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill. SENATOR McCONCHIE:

Let me just say that I agree with the previous speaker in that I do believe people in this very difficult point in life need to have the opportunity to be able to make decisions. In my -- my

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Master's degree program, we studied end-of-life issues and we talked about the -- the things that can come up and what -- what types of pressures sometimes may be on people when they're making decisions. I believe that it is fundamentally necessary to have a witness just simply verify. I am unaware of any circumstance in which the witnessing of -- of this is serving as an impediment to someone exercising their own freedom and right to be able to determine how to have life-sustaining treatment or not. And as a result on that, I would encourage a No vote, despite all the good work the sponsor's done in -- in all the other aspects of this bill. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Feigenholtz, would you like to close? SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

I would. Thank you. And I appreciate all of the comments that my colleagues on the other side of the aisle have made. And I just want to clarify a few things. This is a voluntary document. If -- if it is not filled out, all life-sustaining treatment is given and provided to the patient. Currently, this POLST form can only be executed between the patient and their doctor or health care provider. It currently just removes an additional witness. And I'm sorry if I was not clear when I brought that to your This is for people who are at home, who are very attention. terminally ill, who do not want to be resuscitated, who have decided that the last thing they want to remember is not having their ribs cracked or other life-sustaining things that will make no difference in the outcome of their life. And it is a private document between them and their health provider, who is actually with them. So that additional witness remove -- in removing them,

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removes that barrier when the surrogate is enrolled in hospice. I hope that that clarifies some of the concerns. I know that this is very difficult subject matter. Keep in mind, though, that a patient cannot complete a POLST form on their own. It is only valid when the patient and their healthcare practitioner execute it together. It simply removes that additional third person. It does -- it does not force them. This is not -- there's no malintent. It's actually a voluntary document that will actually have someone's wishes be respected, not violated. I would appreciate your support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 109 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Going to go our remote votes. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Harris votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Harris votes Aye. Senator Lightford.

SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Lightford votes Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Lightford votes Aye. Senator Pacione-Zayas. SENATOR PACIONE-ZAYAS:

Pacione-Zayas votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Pacione-Zayas votes Aye. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Plummer votes No. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

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Plummer votes No. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

Wilcox votes No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Wilcox votes No. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 43 Ayes, 15 Nays. Senate Bill 109, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senator Feigenholtz, we are now ready to proceed with... Oh! Oh, we're not. With leave of the Body, we are going to Senate Bill 134. Senator Stadelman. 136. Senator Morrison. Mr. Secretary, read the bill. ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 136.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Morrison, on your bill. SENATOR MORRISON:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 136 is a bill that will go a long ways towards assisting students who are seeking to become professionals in child welfare. This is a stipend program that will be administered through the Department of Children and Family Services. This bill actually originated with Senator Pat McGuire, one of our former colleagues who combined his knowledge and love of higher education with child welfare. Happy to answer

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any questions that the Body may have. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Yes. Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Feigenholtz. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, would you like to describe your amendment? SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

These -- this amendment is based upon the recommendation of some of my colleagues from across the aisle to add affidavits to this bill. And that's it.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 139.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, please explain your bill. SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

...President. Senate Bill 139 is an initiative of Toni Preckwinkle and the Clerk of Cook County, and it's also supported by clerks around the State of Illinois. It allows a person that is currently married to request a certified copy of their marriage license with nongendered identifiers and allows both parties to a prior marriage who are still currently married to ask the clerk to update their gender identifiers to a new gender, making the change permanent if desired and technology permitting. I'm happy to answer any questions. Basically, you can go from "bride" or "groom" to "spouse".

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Senator Tracy, for what reason do you seek recognition? SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Madam President. I would just like to speak to the bill, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill.

SENATOR TRACY:

Again, I would note that we did have opposition to this bill and felt like there was really no reason, valid reason, to change it. And so there is opposition to this bill and I'd like to note that. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman, for what reason do you seek recognition? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

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To the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

First of all -- Madam President, thank you. First of all, to the sponsor, I appreciate the work that you did on this legislation, including the amendment that -- which -- that we just adopted, which I think is helpful, especially to the clerks who will implement this. To the substance of the bill: The U.S. -the United States Supreme Court has opined and declared the law of the land, which this legislation proposes to implement at a local level, to acknowledge the wishes of those who have been married. And as a result, I urge that -- I -- I intend to vote Yes. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Feigenholtz, do you wish to close? SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Madam President. I always want to say Madam Speaker, but I'll get over that. This is the refugee row, what can I tell you? I appreciate the comments of my colleague, Senator Barickman, who has so eloquently talked about the law of the land. And this bill is designed to create uniformity statewide so that clerks around the State are doing the same thing in the spirit of other bills that we have passed out of this Chamber and out of this Body and the House. And so I would appreciate an Aye vote. Thank you.

This bill ensures that such firefighters receive the same reciprocity as Tier 1 firefighters in the event that the Tier 2 employee moves to a new employer who's covered by a different downstate fire pension fund. And I urge an Aye vote. Thank you.

This bill, as amended, amends the Energy Assistance Act to do the following: It excludes those with a household income above sixty percent of the median income level for IHEAP {sic} (LIHEAP) and PIPP eligibility; offers a priority for LIHEAP application period; prohibits the transfer of LIHEAP and PIPP; increases the energy assistance each year more

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than eighty percent of the available LIHEAP {sic}; permits energy assistance charges; encourages the PIPP program to spend at least eighty percent of its annual funding and double the 2020 program; extends the PIPP grace period; declares LIHEAP and PIPP must be available to all eligible low-income residents, regardless of the income status; and requires DCEO to submit an annual report to the General Assembly, ICC, Public {sic} (Policy) Advisory Council regarding the findings. I'll answer any questions, Madam President.

Madam President, Members of the General Assembly, that last bill that we had just passed is one of our staffers' first bills, but the story behind our staffer today is that Miss Ward was a young lady who had graduated from college not knowing what she wanted to do with her life. She chose to go to law school after the fact. And I'm proud to see her today with her first bill passed. And -- and it's just really a great story, 'cause she comes from a long line of family members back in the south suburbs that really, truly helps people and really, truly cares about people. And I think it's just a great testament to her family that she's here today, working on behalf of the Illinois State Senate and the people of Illinois. I just want to give her a round of applause on her first bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Congratulations. Still on page 12. We are going to move down to Senate Bill 267. Senator Villanueva. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 267.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

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Senator, did -- you like to describe your bill? SENATOR VILLANUEVA:

Yes, Madam President. Thank you. Student parents are a growing population nationally. More than one in five college students identify as a parent. In Illinois, our best estimate now is about fourteen percent of all students are parents, but, unfortunately, that's a rough estimate, based on what little -little data we know. This bill would -- would require public community colleges and universities in the State to collect data about students who are also parents, because we want to better understand the needs of student parents at our institutions of higher education. The amendment to this bill was added in order to address privacy concerns raised by IBHE and the ICCB. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Muñoz, please describe your bill.

SENATOR MUÑOZ:

Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. This bill would allow a retired member of the Chicago Fire Department who's been retired less than five years and is under sixty-three years of age, who develops an occupational

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disease or cancer covered by the existing pension code to revert to an occupational disability in order to seek care. There are far too many newly retired firefighters who develop what we know to be job-related disease and cancers. This would allow them to temporarily forgo their pensions and revert to an occupational disability, thus receiving an appropriate medical coverage to fight their disease, if they do so choose. When reverting the occupational status, most members would be taking a reduced benefit, less than their pension calculation. The City is the only one who had some opposition to it. We did explain to them in committee there's only a handful of retired firemen that actually do this. I will attempt to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 307 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. Voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Harris votes Aye. Senator Lightford. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

Senator Crowe, how would you like to proceed? Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 338.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, would you like to explain your bill? SENATOR CROWE:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 338 provides the administrator of the Illinois State Treasurer with the ability to enter into an interagency agreement with the Secretary of State and the State Board of Elections to compare information to locate owners of unclaimed property that is valued at two thousand dollars or less. The data match provision with the Secretary of State and the State Board of Elections is similar to a current program with the Department of Revenue for unclaimed property at the same value.

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This bill also requires business associations that have no unclaimed property to report -- to submit a report to the Treasurer's Office of no property. It also provides that virtual currency is considered unclaimed if five years have passed without an indication of interest in the property, and expands its jurisdiction to include tax-exempt retirement accounts. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Senator Barickman, for what reason do you seek recognition? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

To the bill. To the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank -- thank you, Madam President. Just for the Body, we heard this bill in committee, and while it incorporates a number of good concepts, I think the concerns at the committee level were the requirement of a new mandate on business. What this legislation proposes is more bureaucracy, more reports, and more mandated duties on businesses. And as a result, we had some concerns in committee and some -- and as a result, I'm urging a No vote on the Floor. Thank you, Madam President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Thank you. Senator Tracy, did you seek recognition, or have you turned off your light? Seeing no more discussion, Senator Crowe, would you like to close? SENATOR CROWE:

Thank you, Madam President. Just one point of clarification

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regarding the negative reporting. This bill merely proposes reinstituting an old requirement of filing negative reports and it actually doubles the thresholds for exemptions in that case. I'd ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Thank you, Madam President, Members of the Senate. Senate Bill 460 amends the Chicago Municipal Article of the Illinois Pension Code. Provides that all contracts for investment services be awarded by board of trustees using a competitive process that's substantially similar to the process required for procurement of professional/artistic services under the Illinois Procurement Code. This is work that was done out of the -- out of the committee that we had for minority investments over -- over the summer. And there's no opposition to the bill and I request a favorable vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 460 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

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2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 493. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Syverson. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, would you like to describe your amendment? SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Madam President. This amendment just addresses some of the concerns from the Department of Insurance. And, with that, it addresses all of the concerns; there's no opposition to this. And I appreciate it being added to the Agreed Bill (List). Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Mr. Secretary, are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

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Senator, please describe your bill. SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 515 extends the optional valuation method available to large public utilities acquiring water and sewer utilities to public utilities with fifteen thousand or more water or sewer customers. This optional valuation method is currently only available to public utilities with thirty thousand or more water or sewer customers. And I'll answer any questions, and there are no opponents to the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? It appears that we have Senator Rezin.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, Madam Chairwoman {sic}. To the bill, please. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill.

SENATOR REZIN:

Yes, this is a bill that we worked on. I do appreciate the sponsor for bringing this bill and opening up the market to more companies to compete in this area. So that's exactly what this bill does; it allows even smaller water -- private water companies to be able to come in and purchase -- purchase a system, hopefully creating more of a competitive market. I ask for a Yes vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

I'm sorry. What bill number was that? SENATOR S. TURNER:

Senate Bill 1-3-6.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

That will be recorded.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Moving on to Senate Bill 548. Senator Connor. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 548.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, please describe your bill.

SENATOR CONNOR:

Thank you very much, Madam President. SB 548 is an initiative of the Illinois Security Professionals Association. It increases training standards - in particular, requirements on firearms training - in order to ensure that anyone who obtains licensing here in Illinois is better trained. It also makes some modernization -- changes to our security professionals and, based on recommendations from the Illinois Department of Professional Regulation, implements those changes in a way that brings us to a higher level of professionalism for security professionals. I

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know of no opposition and I'd ask for an Aye vote. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 548 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 564.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, would you like to describe your bill? SENATOR ELLMAN:

Yes, Madam President, I would. Thank you. Senate Bill 564 requires schools to include in history education the study of the contributions made by Muslims and Muslim Americans to society. It also creates a new commemorative holiday on January 17th, which is the birthday of Muhammad Ali. I know of no opposition to this bill and I request an Aye vote. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 564 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Harris votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Harris votes Aye. Senator Lightford. SENATOR LIGHTFORD:

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Lightford votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 46 Ayes, 3 Nays. And Senate Bill 564, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Moving to the middle of page 13. Senator Glowiak Hilton, on Senate Bill 5-9-0. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 590.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Glowiak Hilton, would you like to explain your bill? SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

I would, yes. Thank you, Madam President. This bill, Senate -- Senate Bill 590, requires a county to authorize a site under its control to display a container to be used for the disposal of medical sharps. It makes it optional for a municipality to do

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that as well. The amendment amends the Environmental Protection Act so that these sites are considered household waste drop-off points so that each site is not required to obtain a permit for this. And I -- I wondered if there are any questions on this. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? It appears Senator Barickman. For what reason do you seek recognition? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Madam -- question of the sponsor, Madam President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Sponsor indicates she'll yield. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Senator, I think there's a question about the mandate that may exist on counties versus municipalities. Can you explain the different treatment and where there may be a mandate versus where this may become permissive, I guess, in nature? Could you explain that for us?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Glowiak Hilton.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thanks for that question. I'm really happy to explain this. We had worked and worked with those who are interested in the bill to find out exactly what to do with it. And we worked on this so that at least one place, one authorized site per county, would be taking the disposed mental -- medical sharps. So it -- but we decided it would be optional for municipalities to do it, but it would be allowed under the EPA so that these sites could be considered household waste drop-off points. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

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Senator Barickman, do you have further questions? SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Yes. Thank you, Madam President. So why the disparity, though, between making something permissive for the municipalities but mandating it upon the counties? Why -- why have you distinguished between the two?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Glowiak Hilton. SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

I appreciate that question too. Because we -- we, in discussing this with many people who are interested in the -- that kind of question, we figured if each county has one drop-off location that that would be at least one place for people to put sharps that would be out of the household waste stream and not make it mandatory for each municipality to do that on their own. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

To the bill, Madam President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

To the bill. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you, Madam President. I guess I just call into question the -- the mandate that is being imposed here upon county governments that is distinct from an option, maybe, that municipalities may have. I'm sorry we didn't have a chance to talk about this bill before the Floor debate. But I -- I guess I'd also add - and, you know, maybe you'll discuss this in closing - I believe there's a program in Illinois called the P2D2 Program,

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which is a State fund for which local units of government can apply for funds to create disposal containers in their communities. I'm aware of that program only because it was an initiative of high school students from within my district some years ago, from Pontiac High School. It's called the Prescription Drug Disposal I believe {sic} (Prescription Pill and Drug Disposal) Program. that fund today has dollars in it available for communities to utilize for these purposes. And so, to me, rather than mandating upon them to do that, this might be the -- the existing program may be a suitable carrot for those communities who are interested in -- in that. So, for the bill's purpose, I would urge a No vote, simply based, not on the merit -- not on the -- the intent of the sponsor, but because of this mandate that would be placed on, especially, downstate communities who would not have the choices that some of our municipalities would have under this language. The mandate's concerning to me, and as a result, I'd urge a No vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Glowiak Hilton, would you like to close? SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

That the -- that program that you're talking about I think, perhaps, only refers to prescription drugs, not sharps. So this has to do with sharps. And -- and I know that a lot of municipalities do have these locations where people can drop off their used prescriptions and they will take that and dispose of them, but most of them say they do not take sharps. And that's the problem here. So I saw a need for this because we have a -a drive for people to come and drop off things like used paint and -- and paper and sharps, and what happened was we had truckloads

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and truckloads of these boxes of sharps because people had no place to put them. So I saw a need in our community and thought that we should be able to fulfill that need by at least allowing a place in each county for people to be able to drop off their used hypodermic needles and other sharps. So that's why I did it. I urge a Yes vote. It is -- I do have sponsors on both sides of the aisle, and I would appreciate your Yes vote. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 590 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Harris votes Aye.

Senate Bill 603.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Cunningham, would you like to explain your bill? SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

Thank you, Madam President. Senate Bill 603 amends the Chicago (Firefighter) Article of the Pension Code. It's designed to correct an inconsistency between the Code and the City ordinance on retirement age. Sixty-three is the mandatory retirement age for firefighters in Chicago, and right now, the Pension Code is aligned with that. However, firefighters who are trained and work as paramedics are allowed to work after the age of sixty-three because of the shortage of paramedics. What this bill would do, would allow those paramedics to continue to participate and pay into the firefighter's pension after they reach the age of sixtythree and continue to work. I know of no opposition. Would be happy to answer any questions and would appreciate the Chamber's support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall

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Senate Bill 603 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Harris votes Aye.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Harris votes Aye. Senator Lightford.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Peters. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator, would you like to describe your amendment? SENATOR PETERS:

Yes. This amendment removes opposition. I move for adoption and will discuss on 3rd.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

3rd Reading. We're next going to go to 1624, which is on page 46 of your printed Calendar. Senator Doris Turner. Senator Doris Turner seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 1624 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 1624. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Doris Turner. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Senator Doris Turner, would you like to explain your

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amendment?

SENATOR D. TURNER:

I move that we adopt the amendment and I'll explain it on 3rd Reading.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HOLMES)

Thank you. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Mr. Secretary, are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

Out of the record. Senate Bill 662. Senator Gillespie. Out of the record. Senate Bill 667 {sic}. Senator Villivalam. 677. Senator Villivalam. Ram, do you want your bill? (remote audio bleed-through) We're going to skip all of the… (remote audio

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bleed-through) Senator Van Pelt, you're on the speaker. We're going to skip through all the President's and the Leader's shell bills. (remote audio bleed-through) We're going to go to page 46. And, again, if we skip over you, your bill will be on the next Agreed Bill List. Senate Bill 1536. Senator Muñoz. Senate Bill 1572. Senator Martwick. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1572.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 2nd -- 3rd -- 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick, to explain your bill. SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Mr. -- Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 1572 creates a property tax homestead exemption of up to five thousand dollars for police and firefighters who have qualifying duty-related disabilities. And this would only apply if the qualified police officer or firefighter's home has an EAV of less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. I -- I know of no opponents -- actually, that's not true. I apologize. There are a couple of opponents on this bill. But I would ask for an Aye vote.

Did you say "employment"? This is called the human trafficking recognition bill. Senate Bill 1600 requires a restaurant or truck stop to provide his employees -- its employees a training in the recognition of human trafficking or protocols for reporting observed human trafficking to the appropriate authority.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1600 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Bennett, to explain your bill. SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you, Mr. President. 1693 creates the Illinois Industrial Biotechnology Partnership Act. Essentially what it's trying to do is recognize that Illinois is in a unique position to lead the bio-renewable industry and capitalize on the success that we've already had. But one big hurdle that we face is, in biorenewable advancement, is the large capital investment required to build a pilot program and facility. States like Iowa and Minnesota, but even New York, have already set up venture capital funds to allow for this growth. What this bill would do was -- is create an actual partnership, which is basically a -- a receiving -- that's what I'm looking for -- a receptacle, I suppose, for State grants through DCEO that we could then put in money as -- as we're -- as it's available to create grants for -- biotechnology workforce development grants. Maximum of one million dollars. This, again, does not put any money into those grants at this point, but creates the receptacle for that. I would ask for your Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

So, if you hate red tape, this is your chance to address it and make sure that universities are able to put money where it needs to go, into classroom experiences and not in unnecessary administrative costs. I'd ask for your Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Mr. Secretary, is there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? Oh, I'm sorry. Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Is there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd is Senate Bill 1706. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1706.

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(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Castro, to explain your bill. SENATOR CASTRO:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1706, as amended, amends the -- Tobacco Products (Tax) Act to clarify that cannabis vaping devices are taxed under the Cannabis Regulation and Taxation {sic} (Tax) Act and are not taxed as electronic cigarettes. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1706 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. We'll go to our remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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Senator Wilcox votes Yes. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 1706, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. We'll go to Senate Bill 1730. Senator Jones. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1730.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Jones, to explain your bill. SENATOR JONES:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 1730 amends the Business Corporation Act to provide when a corporation is a publicly held domestic or foreign corporation with its principal executive offices located in Illinois, LGBTQ people or -- and self-identified sexual orientation of the members of the board of directors should be included in the annual report submitted to the Secretary of State. Happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Any discussion? Senator Anderson. SENATOR ANDERSON:

To the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

I would like to start out to the sponsor. I understand your

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intent, and we had a discussion offline about this. And I just -- I -- I want to talk through a couple things. Number one, I --I think we need to take pause with legislation like this, because, number one, this is the proverbial camel's nose under the tent. Where do we draw the line here with -- with government getting involved in business? And two, I think it's important that -that we clarify exactly what the language of this bill does. This language does not mandate that somebody -- that they say what their sexual orientation is; this is just saying that you can report it if you want to. So a couple concerns about that is, number one, there may be several people on boards that are -- have a different sexual orientation that choose not to talk about it because they don't think it's the proper place in the business field to be talking about that in the first place. I understand, too, from the language that part of the intent is for data collection to make sure that the LGBTQ community is properly represented in the business -- in -- in the corporate world, which I understand that, but this is not a mandate. This is rather just putting some -some pressure to say it's okay to bring that out and say what you are -- or what sexual orientation you are. So if it's -- if it is not mandated and it's for data collection, how do we not know that the LGBTQ community is not already properly represented and they just don't want to talk about it 'cause they don't think it's the proper place to talk about their sexual orientation in the business world? As I spoke to you, Senator, offline, I think this is a step in the wrong direction. I think if people in 2021 want to come out in the business world and say whatever their sexual orientation is, great. I don't think we should be putting pressure on them to do so if they don't want to.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator -- Senator, are you finished with your comments? SENATOR ANDERSON:

Yeah, I was just waiting for people to quiet down. As I said, Senator Jones, in -- in our conversation, I think one of the biggest things we can do to help the LGBTQ community, the -- the so-called racial divide that we have in our country, is we need to simply stop talking about it. We need to treat each other as human beings and not what color our skin are {sic}, not what creed we are, not what sexual orientation we are, and treat each other as humans. Things like this are causing more of a divide than anything else, especially in the business world. Business is business. If you want to come out and talk about your sexual orientation, great, I don't care. But let's not try to force people to do something that they don't want to do. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Jones, to close.

SENATOR JONES:

Thank you, Mr. President. Yes, Senator Anderson - Senator Anderson - thank you for the -- your comments. And, yes, we did talk offline. I believe you can't heal unless you do talk about it. Some things you do need to talk about. We changed the law a few years ago to add gender and minorities to these reports. What we're doing with this legislation is just expanding that. This is not required. This legislation does not require anybody to out themselves, just those persons who self-identify. This legislation will help us move forward and, hopefully, you know,

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develop policy that reflects the diversity of the State of Illinois. I look for a favorable roll call and thank you for your support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 1730 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes No. Senator Van Pelt.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Wilcox votes No. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 37 voting Yea, none -- 18 voting Nay, and none voting Present. Senate Bill 1730, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. We're going to return to, with leave of the Body, to page 13 and Senate Bill 645. Senator Hastings. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 645.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Hastings, to explain your bill. SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 645 amends the Employee Sick Leave Act by removing a line that exempts airline employees from coverage. This change permits airline employees to use already earned sick time to care for sick family members. It does not create any entitlement to sick leave or any additional entitlement to sick leave. This bill came to me from a -- a constituent who had fallen on some tough times. And sick leave, according to her company policy - that falling under the Railway Labor Act - it did not allow her to take that sick time for a family member. Taking sick time for a family member is afforded to every other class of employee in the State of Illinois except for airline employees and railway workers, and that was by a narrow carveout that took place in a previous General Assembly. This bill seeks to remedy that situation. And I'll answer any questions, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Rose. SENATOR ROSE:

...you -- thank you, Mr. President. To the -- to the bill, if I may.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

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SENATOR ROSE:

So, thank you, everyone. There's a reason why and, as laudable as the goal here is, there are some issues that we can't solve that, frankly, require the federal government to solve. I asked the sponsor at the hearing how you defined an "Illinois resident". And it's really based on duty station. Well, here's the problem. You could have a duty station of O'Hare Airport, but live in Miami and you catch a -- hop a flight up, you get on and you go. You could actually -- within the airline community, there is the opportunity, if you've got childcare issues, you can swap flights. So, if you live just north of the Illinois border in Wisconsin and your normal duty station is Milwaukee, but you swap enough flights out of O'Hare because you've got childcare issues, this could now cover you even though you're not an Illinois resident. All this goes to say, that this is a very real problem. But it's a very real problem that requires a federal standard so that it applies applicably whether you live in Illinois, Wisconsin, or Florida. There's another issue here and it's -- it's -- I'll be -- I'll be clear. I'm not -- I will be absolutely clear that it's a potential issue. But there's a very potential problem with the Dormant Commerce Clause of the United States Constitution that this would violate, because -- exactly because we are -- attempting to apply Illinois law to residents of another state. And so, even though on the face of it, that's not the application, if and when one of these other items happens, you could run into a serious constitutional impediment, and then all we've done is made a false promise to these people. So I want to be clear: The goal is laudable. Frankly, this does need a solution, but it does need a solution at the federal level so it's applicable across the United

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States of America. And the reason -- and this is it - think about this, folks - the reasons there are two sectors that are exempt, railroading and the airline industry, is because the employees are absolutely mobile on any given day of the week in multiple states and, frankly, countries, in the United States and around the world. Again, this is why the federal government has, I believe, exclusive jurisdiction. I also believe this will cause a Dormant Commerce Clause problem - but, again, at the end of the day, that's not my area of expertise. I freely admit that. But, really, you know, it needs a solution; unfortunately, we are the wrong venue to solve this problem. So I'll be voting No, unfortunately, but I appreciate everyone's indulgence in explaining why. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there further discussion? Senator Hastings, to close. SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Mr. President. First, let me address the distinguished attorney from the Champaign-Urbana area as to his interpretation of the Dormant Commerce Clause. I'd also like to acknowledge the -- the highly esteemed, distinguished other attorney from Champaign, who probably gets more business. Thank you. I want to -- I want to address a few things. Number one is the -- you know, the good -- the distinguished Senator from the other side of the aisle, he had spoke about the federal government and this requires a federal government fix. Well, where the federal government fails to act, the power resides in the State's hands to help encourage the federal government to pass a federal law, just like other states in the country have done on a myriad of different issues. That's the -- I just want to make sure we respond to the first point. And to your second comment towards

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the Dormant Commerce Clause, our federal circuit court, the 7th Circuit Court, in Hirst versus SkyWest, Incorporated, which was decided in 2018, the 7th Circuit Court upheld state regulations of labor rights for airline workers. I want to make sure that's very clear to everybody in this Chamber who may be wavering on the other Senator's point of view. It's the case law, which has been determined by our Circuit Court in the 7th Circuit. But what's most important here is this, is that every other working-class man and woman in the State of Illinois can use their sick leave for their family time, to take care of someone in need, whether that's a senior citizen, whether that's their kid. I'm going to tell you a story, just a vignette, quick story, 'cause I know we're -- we have other things to do today. But there's a lady in my district, a lady in my district whose husband suffered from renal failure, from renal failure, and this was pre-COVID - pre-COVID. He went in; he had to get his dialysis treatment. She could not take time off when he had to get his treatment. Her daughter comes home from Spain, after COVID has kicked in to full swing. She comes home and he is on -- he has to go get dialysis. So the company where he has to go get the dialysis, they don't have the ability or the protocols at the time to deal with COVID. They just don't. He's got to go to a hospital. The hospital over-dialysizes {sic} him. He says, "I'm not leaving the hospital because I -- I -- I feel -- I don't feel healthy. I don't feel like I can continue with the day." No, going to discharge you because -- "We have to discharge you because we need the hospital beds here at the hospital." About twenty minutes later, he falls off the examination table and he dies. He dies two weeks later. In all that time, all that time, where the company was denying her her

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sick time that she could have used for her husband, her husband, that precious time, if it would have been given to her where she was compensated for it, not forced to take nonpaid leave, she would have that time back with her husband, with her husband. He's dead now. There ain't no -- that's not -- she's -- he's not coming back. That's why this law is important. The airlines have various flight attendants on reserve in the event that they need to help offset someone calling off. Every other company in America's able to figure it out. They should be able to figure it out too. This is for working-class people who -- who deserve the same rights as every other class of citizen in the State of Illinois. And that's why I'm going to urge an Aye vote. It's for those people who literally go to work every day and show their love on their airline to other people. It's a darn shame when those airlines don't show the love back to them. I ask for an Aye vote, Mr. President. Thank you very much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Question is, shall Senate Bill 645 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes No. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

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Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Wilcox votes No. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 38 voting Aye, 17 voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 645, having received the constitutional majority, is declared passed. We're going to go back to page 47. We're going to go to the middle of the page, where we left off. Senate Bill 1753. Senator Hastings. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. Senator Hastings seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 1753 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order of 2nd Reading -- on the Order of 2nd Reading, Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Hastings. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Hastings, to explain your amendment. SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Mr. President. This is a gut and line -- replace amendment. I'll explain it on 3rd Reading. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

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No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 1753. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1753.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Hastings, to explain your bill. SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'm going to try and spice this bill up a little bit, because this is probably the most boring piece of legislation I'll run all Session. But this amendment allows the producer to make a diligent effort annually to the master policy or program, instead of individually for each insured that will be covered. The amendment eliminates the diligent effort for commercial wholesale transactions. I would love to debate this on the Floor if anyone has any questions. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1753 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll now go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Aye. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

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SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

And Senate Bill 1753, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. We'll go to Senate Bill 1779. Senator Murphy. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. Senator Murphy seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 1779 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading is Senate Bill 1779. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Murphy. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, to explain your amendment. SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. It adds language to inform consumers that different rights may apply if the manufactured home is located on the land owned by a consumer pursuant to the Illinois

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Conveyance and Encumbrance of Manufactured Homes as Real Property and Severance Act and includes the definition of "manufactured home" as defined in the Mobile Home Park Act. So I'd move for adoption.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

There any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 1779. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1779.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY:

In addition to that, what this really does is it applies truth in lending to mobile home purchasers. A mobile home purchase is not eligible for a standard mortgage. They acquire a chattel loan and then this will require that all of that loan and interest information is disclosed. So there's some provisions that it doesn't apply if your -- own an individual parcel and you want to put a manufactured home on that. It applies only to those that are within mobile home parks. So, there was some discussion in committee and I'm happy to entertain any questions.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1779 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1784.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

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3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, to explain your bill.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is -- simply allows a student to have a more modified uniform for sporting activities, for gym activities, and it -- the amendment changes it from the school board to allow the school themselves to make that decision. There is no cost incurred from the school district. It is simply permissive if a student wants to do this, rather than having to apply for the IHSA for permission. So I don't know of any opposition and I would ask for an Aye vote or I can entertain any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1784 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Yes. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, to explain your bill.

SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1786 amends -- oh! It makes it subject to appropriation. So this -- this would require that the Department of Human Services maintain a resource page for secondary education of social services that are available. And it would be subject to appropriation. Don't know of any opposition. Happy to answer any questions. Ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1786 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

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Senator Harris votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

We'll turn the page to page 48. At the top of the record -- top of the page, we'll go to Senate Bill 1817. Senator Crowe. We will skip down and go to Senate Bill 1830. Senator Loughran Cappel. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 1830.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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Senator Loughran Cappel, on your bill. SENATOR LOUGHRAN CAPPEL:

SB 1830 provides that one year -- or a semester of a financial literacy course may count toward the social studies requirement to graduate high school. As with the drafted amendment, there's no opposition on this, and so I ask for a Yes vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1830 pass. All those in favor will say {sic} Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting -- the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill expands the scenarios when unfounded reports of child abuse or neglect may be available in court or for investigative purposes. This would apply to matters evaluating the welfare of a child who was the subject of a report, other children who live in that child's household, and other alleged perpetrators in the child's household. This is an initiative of the Cook County Public Guardian. I know of no opposition.

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 1966 creates the Interstate Contracts for Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder Treatment Act. This will allow Illinois and Wisconsin residents

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who are involuntarily admitted on an inpatient basis for the treatment of mental health to obtain appropriate treatment across state lines in qualified private hospitals and facilities that are closer to their homes than facilities available in their home states. This only applies to private mental facilities. This is an initiative by Lake Behavioral Health in Wisconsin {sic} (Waukegan), and there are {sic} no known opposition. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 1966 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker {sic}. This piece of legislation allows people who have a property tax exemption, who have a disability, to not have to have to... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Hold your microphone closer. We can't hear you. SENATOR FINE:

Sorry. This piece of legislation allows people who have a disability not have -- to not have to apply for their property tax exemption every year. I know of no opposition to the legislation. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1975 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll now go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

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higher education institution issues student identification cards to its students that it will put on the back of those cards the mental health resources and suicide prevention opportunities that are available on campus, and it will apply to all new identification cards.

There any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2014 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll now go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

And the new repeal date is December 31st, 2023.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2017 pass. All those in favor, say Aye -- or vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2065 amends the Illinois Housing Development Act to provide that the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds held by the Housing Development Authority may not exceed 7.2 billion. Currently, it's 3.6 billion. I know of no opposition. I ask for a favorable vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall

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Senate Bill 2065 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll now go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Senate Bill 2066, as amended, amends the retailer occupations {sic} (retailers' occupation) tax to provide that marketplace facilitators do not include persons licensed under the Auction License Act, except for Internet auction listing services, and provides that marketplace facilitators who collect sales tax set to be made exempt from January 1st, 2020 to December 31st, 2020, may file a claim for a credit. This was a -- a long thing coming, since the lame-duck Session, and I know of no opposition. So I ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2066 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Castro, to explain your bill.

SENATOR CASTRO:

Thank you, Senate -- Senate -- Mr. President. So, with the amendment, it becomes the bill. It is a result of negotiations with the National Immigrant Justice Center, the Illinois Council {sic} (Coalition) for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, the Cook County State's Attorney, and many Illinois immigration practitioners. It requires designated certifying officials to provide written notice to requesters explaining why an individual does not meet the criteria for a victim of -- of qualifying criminal activity. It reduces the certifying agency's time to respond to an appeal from sixty days to thirty business days. Additionally, requesters need to not exhaust administrative remedies with designated certifying officials before seeking equitable relief in the circuit court for a completed certification form. Really what this bill does is

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brings more transparency for someone who has applied for that certification. Makes the agency have to respond to why or why not they're not getting that document. And, honestly, for folks who have been victimized already, this is an opportunity to bring some clarity to that process. I ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

There any discussion? Senator Barickman. Senator Barickman. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

...indicates she will yield. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

There's a -- the initial question is whether the amendment that is put forward -- I don't believe that amendment went through committee. It's not clear -- it did? It's -- it's not clear to me whether that did. So let's start there with whether the amendment went through committee or not. You're saying yes? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Castro.

SENATOR CASTRO:

It does not. What I did leave it at is if the Sheriff Association had a better way to make this bill better, they would be -- I'll be more than happy to entertain language. But they never provided anything to me.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick, to explain your bill. SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2093 allows Chicago's contract school teachers from the four contract schools in Chicago to participate in the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund. And it allows employers of the contract school a conditional grace period to provide the payroll information and pay the pension contribution. I know of no opposition. Ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Barickman. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Sponsor indicates he'll yield. Senator Barickman. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Senator, our analysis suggests that maybe there was testimony -- this didn't go through my committee, but maybe there was testimony regarding opposition of the Hope Learning Academy, suggesting that if this legislation were to pass, they would have to shut down their school. Can you speak to that

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opposition?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick.

SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Senator, for the question. I -- I cannot speak to that. I -- it was not communicated to me directly. I did speak to the representatives of the Chicago Public Schools and they -they voiced no opposition to the bill and they're not listed as opponents.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Barickman.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Okay. To the bill. To the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To -- to the bill, yes.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Yeah. Thank you, Mr. President. Okay. I -- my understanding is, maybe that opposition came in late. But just to be clear for the record, our understanding is that this legislation is an amendment to the Pension Code, the result of which would - we're being told - would close the Hope Learning Academy. As a result of that, I would urge a No vote. Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Martwick, to close. SENATOR MARTWICK:

I ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2093 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all

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voted who wish? Now we'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes No. Senator Van Pelt.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Wilcox votes No. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 34 voting Yea, 18 voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 2093, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2107. Senator Martwick. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. Senator Martwick seems {sic} leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2107 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading now is Senate Bill 2107. Mr. Secretary, is there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Yes. Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Martwick.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick, to explain your amendment. SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Mr. President. I ask that Floor Amendment No. 2 be adopted and I explain it on 3rd Reading. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2107. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2107.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick, to explain your bill. SENATOR MARTWICK:

Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, Senate Bill 2107 amends the IMRF, Illinois Municipality {sic} (Municipal) Retirement Fund, by requiring employees of the Firefighters' Pension Investment Fund and the Police Officers' Pension Investment Fund to participate in IMRF. I know of no opposition and ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate

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Bill 2107 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll now go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Senator Harris votes Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Wilcox votes Yes. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 2107, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Go to Senate Bill 2116. Senator Peters. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2116.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters, to explain your bill.

SENATOR PETERS:

2116 is just an expansion on a program -- on a bill that we passed that helps give young people who are coming out of juvenile

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detention an opportunity to learn about their government and civics education and their rights. We also do this for the Department of Corrections. This is supported by the Department of Juvenile Justice. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2116 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll now go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is Senator Plummer still with us? Senator Plummer. Senator Van Pelt.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Wilcox votes Yes. Senator Plummer. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 2116, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. We'll go to Senate Bill 2122. Senator Peters. We'll go to Senate Bill 2129. Senator Peters. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

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Senate Bill 2129.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters, to explain your bill. SENATOR PETERS:

Yes. Thank you. Senate Bill 2129 allows prosecutors, at their discretion, to motion to resentence a defendant in the interest of justice and gives the court the discretion to resentence to a lower -- lesser term of imprisonment. It preserves the rights to -- established by the Rights of Crime Victims and Witness {sic} (Witnesses) Act and allows the court to consider postconviction factors, including prison disciplinary records, evidence of rehabilitation, and reduction of a risk to society due to age or physical condition. I ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2129 pass. I'm sorry. Senator McClure. SENATOR McCLURE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor yield for a question?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Sponsor indicates he will yield.

Senator, is -- in this instance of a resentencing, does the victim get a veto power?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters. Senator McClure, could you repeat the question, please?

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SENATOR McCLURE:

Yes, Mr. President. Can the victim of the crime veto the ability for the State's Attorney to look for a lesser sentence for this -- this person who's already been convicted? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

It is in line with the Rights of Crime Victims and Witnesses Act, so the judge can determine based off of that and the petition made by the prosecutor. And, to repeat, this is a -- at the discretion of the State's Attorney of what -- of the county that they represent. It is not a universal project.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator McClure.

SENATOR McCLURE:

Is it on?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator, just one -- one second. Technical difficulties. I think we've got it back on.

SENATOR McCLURE:

Do I have to...(inaudible)...my chair, Mr. President? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator McClure. Please proceed, Senator. SENATOR McCLURE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Just for clarification, so the answer is no. A victim can't say, "Madam Prosecutor/Mr. Prosecutor, I don't want this person to be resentenced." The victim can't -- does not have power to do that? Just for clarification.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

The victim can't unilaterally do that. There are circumstances where the victim may.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator McClure.

SENATOR McCLURE:

Now the other question is, is -- are the crimes that are eligible for this limited?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters.

SENATOR PETERS:

I don't think so. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator McClure.

SENATOR McCLURE:

Is there any time limit? You know, can this be done ten days after a first sentencing hearing? Can it be done ten years after the first sentencing hearing? How does the time work as far as when a prosecutor can bring this before a judge? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Peters. SENATOR PETERS:

Let me first say, there's, a, no specification and, b, I --I think that this is at the discretion of the prosecutor in making sure that -- you know, that member of that law enforcement, whatever decision they -- they see fit. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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Senator McClure. SENATOR McCLURE:

Thank you, Senator Peters. Mr. Secretary, I'd like to speak to the bill now.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR McCLURE:

So this is a situation where -- we hear a lot of testimony in this building, from survivors of sexual assaults, for example. And they talk about how traumatic it is to have to do the sexual assault kit. They talk about the revictimization that exists in their mind when they're experiencing this. They talk about that same revictimization when they have to go through a trial and they have to testify against the very person who did unspeakable things to them. They then have to participate in a sentencing hearing and again face that same person. At what point do these victims have the right to stop being revictimized? At what point can a person, after going through so much, on some of the most horrific crimes any of us have to see as former prosecutors or as current prosecutors, at what point do they have peace to say, "Okay, this is the sentence; I can live with that"? The victims deserve peace. And, unfortunately, this bill causes them to potentially be revictimized over and over and over again. And guess what, they can't say, "No, I don't want this person to get a lesser sentence, because of what they did to me." We have to be very careful with our victims these days. We've got a very severe crime problem. It's across the entire State, including here in Springfield. There's already a process right now where the Governor, which he's been doing quite frequently, can commute sentences. The -- the

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Prisoner Review Board reviews these sentences; they make parole recommendations. The Governor can pardon. There's a process to do that. And this Governor has been doing that very frequently. What I don't want to do is to cause these victims to get in any more pain. It would be different if the crimes were limited. So murder, violent sexual assault were taken off the table. It would also be different if there was an additional component where the victim could say, "No. I am done. I deserve the right to live in peace myself. And I'm not going to go through another sentencing hearing and be retraumatized." At some point, we need to start sticking up for these victims, and I think we can do that with this bill. Because of that, I encourage a No vote. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Peters, to close.

SENATOR PETERS:

I would just like to say, I had a bill earlier today, supported by every victim group in the State, that was pushed by survivors and I care deeply about victims and survivors and what they think and that's why I pushed that bill and pushed that green button. I'm not here to have people who just decide to preach about survivors and victims, but they can't press a green button when they bring a bill. Mind you, the sponsor of this bill is a survivor of sexual -- the -- the advocate is a survivor of sexual assault. So I ask for an Aye vote - because I'm not here for talk, I'm here for action. And for any of us who's had to live through pain and trauma and not talk about it, we know what it's like to be a victim and how to stand up and walk forward. So, please, for

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everybody here, to make sure that there's justice in this State that goes beyond talking points, I ask for an Aye vote and to move this on to the House. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2129 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Plummer votes No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes No. Senator Van Pelt.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

No.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Wilcox votes No. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 31 voting Yea, none -- 17 voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 2129, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2137. Senator Collins. Senator Collins, on Senate Bill 2137. We'll go to the top of the page 51. Senator -- Senate Bill 2141. Leader McConchie. Leader McConchie

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wishes to have Senate Bill 2141 returned to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading now is Senate Bill 2141. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? I'm sorry. Take that out of the record. We're on Senate Bill 2141. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2141.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Leader McConchie, on your bill.

SENATOR McCONCHIE:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is very similar to what we've passed multiple years before, which exempts tax-exempt postsecondary religious institutions, which train ministers, missionaries, imams, religious leaders, from the Private College Act and Academic Degree Act. I'd be happy to take any questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2141 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Go to the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

Senator Anderson wishes to --Senator Anderson seeks leave of the Body to return Senate Bill 2168 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading now is Senate Bill 2168. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Yes. Floor Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Anderson. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Anderson, to explain your amendment. SENATOR ANDERSON:

It provides technical changes. I'll explain it on 3rd, Mr.

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President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2168. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2168.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Anderson, to explain your bill.

SENATOR ANDERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2168 is an effort to give TRS beneficiaries that overpaid their -- their money back. We worked out an agreement, which is in the amendment, with CMS and the Teachers' Retirement System. Everything is agreed to. There's no opposition. I would ask for an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2168 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote No. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? We'll go to the remote voters. Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration? Please read the bill for the third time. We're going to go to Senate Bill 2192. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2192.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims, to explain your bill. SENATOR SIMS:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. 2192 exempts local governments from complying with the requirements of Grant -- the Grant Accountability and Transparency Act for funds received for Local -- for Local Government Distributive Funds {sic} (Fund), the Personal Property Tax Replacement Fund, the Motor Fuel Tax Fund, or the Transportation Renewal Fund. I ask -- ask for a favorable roll call, Mr. President. And answer any questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2192 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, No -- No. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? To the remote voters. Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox. SENATOR WILCOX:

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims, to explain your bill.

SENATOR SIMS:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. 21 -- Senate Bill 2194 is an initiative of the Department of Children and Family Services. Proposal is intended to reduce barriers in permanency for youth in care that are unable to safely return to the care of their parents or other persons for whom -from whom they were removed. In other words, the bill -- the bill is necessary so that guardianship may be pursued at the same time as adoption so kids can get a permanent resolution. I'd answer any questions and ask for a favorable roll call. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2194 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

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SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

Senate Bill 2201.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims, to explain your bill.

SENATOR SIMS:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

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Senate Bill 2201 amends the Counties Code, the Township Code, and the Municipal Code to prohibit a zoning ordinance or regulation that would ban or restrict the construction of an industrial residential structure or manufactured home. I'd answer any questions and ask for a favorable roll call. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Tracy. SENATOR TRACY:

Yes, Mr. President, will the sponsor yield? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicates he will yield.

SENATOR TRACY:

Senator Sims, one of the things I was wondering is, does this preempt a zoning code that a -- a local government body would -- would usually do?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims.

SENATOR SIMS:

Thank you -- thank you, Senator. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator, if it restricts the construction of a manufactured home, then, yes, it would -- it would restrict a zoning ordinance. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

So your bill would override the local authority's right to zone this area where you -- the manufactured housing would go? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims. SENATOR SIMS:

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Senator Tracy, that's concurrent jurisdiction that we already have. So what -- what the -- what the bill does is makes sure that we -- we allow for that current jurisdiction for -- for the -- the -- for the zoning for manufactured housing. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

And as I look at this analysis, the bill also would present -- preempt home rule powers of a municipality. Correct? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims.

SENATOR SIMS:

Senator Tracy, yes. On a concurrent basis, that is correct. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

And the reason I'm asking is, is our analysis still indicates that the Illinois Municipal League opposes this legislation for that -- those reasons. And I'm -- I'm not recalling if, in committee, we actually heard testimony from the Illinois Municipal League, but I'm wondering if you have had conversations with them and if they've told you why they oppose your legislation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims.

SENATOR SIMS:

Senator Tracy, no, I have not talked to the Municipal League about -- about that. But, however, as -- as you know, I'm willing to talk to anyone. But, as we -- as I mentioned, this is concurrent jurisdiction and that's -- that's -- the -- the purpose is allow

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-- will allow for the creation of -- for -- for the -- the establishment of the -- the manufactured housing, but it -- this also establishes that concurrent jurisdiction. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you. That concludes my questions. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there further discussion? Senator Barickman. SENATOR BARICKMAN:

I just want to speak to the bill, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

...bill.

SENATOR BARICKMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President. Here's -- here's the concern that I have as I read the -- the bill. The concern is that local communities, municipalities, counties around the State have a set of zoning rules. We empower them to make those decisions locally and this legislation would -- would seem to take away the power of those local communities to make those decisions. As a result of that, I would urge a -- a No vote. Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there further discussion? Senator Sims, to close. SENATOR SIMS:

Thank -- thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I think it's important to note that zoning ordinances that have been placed -- have been put into place have been -have been drafted specifically on the -- the change of aesthetics or the -- focused on the aesthetics of the manufactured homes.

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That is why this legislation has been drafted, so that we can have that concurrent jurisdiction and make sure that a -- a municipality cannot simply bar or prohibit a manufactured home, which is oftentimes affordable housing, from -- from being used in a municipality. So while I understand and I -- and I respect my friends on the other side of the aisle, however, the -- the reality is that this -- this provides for an affordable option for individuals who choose it. And this -- the -- the ability for -for this concurrent jurisdiction allows for the -- for this to be an appropriate use of this authority. I'd ask for an Aye vote, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2201 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

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Yes.
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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2204.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Sims, to explain your bill. SENATOR SIMS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Bill 2204 amends the offense of stalking to provide that a person commits stalking when he or she knowingly makes threats that are part of a course of conduct and they are aware that -- that they are aware of the threatening nature of their -- their speech. This -- this came about from the Illinois Supreme Court's annual report based on cases that they've identified that need clarification in the statute for -- for them as they make their decisions. I'd answer any questions and ask for a favorable roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2204 pass. All those in favor will say -- will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

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Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2225.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Glowiak Hilton, on your bill.

SENATOR GLOWIAK HILTON:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill, Senate Bill 2225, amends the Telephone Solicitations Act and it provides that a person,

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business, or organization may not spoof a caller's information or otherwise misrepresent the origin of a telemarketing call unless the person, business, or organization has the right to use the name and phone number displayed. Maybe we've all experienced this. We're trying to prevent it. Requires telephone solicitations placed in a manner other than by a live operator to immediately disclose identity and the purpose of the call and prompt the recipient of the call to consent to the solicitation. I'm happy to take any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2225 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Van Pelt votes Yes. Senator Wilcox.

SENATOR WILCOX:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And Senate Bill 2225, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Senate Bill 2244. Senator Murphy. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2244.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Murphy, to explain your bill. SENATOR MURPHY:

Thank you, Mr. President. As amended, because this changes the effective date, but it provides that for the taxable year 2020, the maximum income limitation under the senior citizens assessment finance {sic} (freeze) homestead exemption would be raised to seventy-five thousand dollars for counties with less {sic} than three million inhabitants, which is currently sixty-five thousand. For taxable year 2021 and thereafter, the median {sic} income limitation under the senior citizen exemption {sic} (assessment) freeze homestead exemption is seventy-five thousand dollars for all counties, which would be currently sixty-five thousand. So, there is one opposition to this, the Illinois Municipal League, that filed a slip late. But other than that, I know of no opposition.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2244 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed,

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Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt.

SENATOR VAN PELT:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2265.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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Senator Syverson, to explain your bill. SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you, Mr. President, Members of Committee {sic}. This is legislation that's been worked out with all the parties, and appreciate all the -- the bipartisan support on this. This is just dealing with a program that would allow guardians, along with the family and the -- and the doctors, to work out a -- a prescription regiment program. Be happy to answer any questions. But, again, it's been worked out with all the parties. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2265 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris. SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Plummer votes Yes. Senator Van Pelt. SENATOR VAN PELT:

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The record will reflect your intentions. Senate Bill 2278. Senator Stadelman. Yes, Senator DeWitte, for what purpose do you seek recognition?

SENATOR DeWITTE:

Mr. President, I was slow on the draw. I would ask that I show as a -- a Aye vote on 2265, please. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The record will so reflect your intentions. SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you, Mr. President. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Stadelman. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill...

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Stadelman seeks to recall the -- Senate Bill 2278 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd Reading now is -- Senate Bill 2278. Mr. Secretary, are there any Floor amendments approved for consideration?

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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Floor Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Stadelman.
PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Stadelman, to explain your amendment. SENATOR STADELMAN:

I move the amendment be adopted. I'll explain it on 3rd. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? All those in favor will say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it, and the amendment is adopted. Are there any further Floor amendments approved for consideration? SECRETARY ANDERSON:

No further amendments reported. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

3rd Reading. Now on the Order of 3rd Reading is Senate Bill 2278. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2278.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Stadelman, to explain your bill.

SENATOR STADELMAN:

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. What 2278 does is, for counties who have enacted a referendum that uses sales tax dollars to pay for mental health services and addiction services, this requires the formation of a mental health board to help administer those funds. I think you can argue that if a county passes a referendum, that mental health advocates and professionals should be included in the decision-making process in

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how those funds are to be used. This follows a similar requirement regarding use of our so-called 708 boards that more than fifty counties across the State use, to use property tax dollars for paying for mental health services. They are required to form this mental health board. This simply mirrors that language and require those counties, again, that use sales tax money for mental health services and addiction services to form this mental health board so they can help make sure that the board's intent that these services go for mental health programs are enacted. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator DeWitte. SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Want to compliment the sponsor on his modification of this bill to clarify it. We had a long discussion in committee last week. Those issues were rectified today. I'm happy to support this initiative and I would urge an Aye vote. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there further discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2278 pass. All those in favor will say -- will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer. SENATOR PLUMMER:

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Stadelman, to explain your bill. Out of the record. Senate -- Senate Bill 2291. Senator Bennett. Senator Bennett, on Senate Bill 2291. Senator Bennett. Senator Bennett. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2291. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Out of the record. Senate Bill 2296. Senator Gillespie. Senate Bill 2304. Senator Gillespie. Senate Bill 2323. Senator

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Feigenholtz. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill. SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2323.

(Secretary reads title of SB 2312)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Feigenholtz, to explain your bill.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Mr. President. I'm sure that many of the folks in this Body remember a few news stories that came out of the Department of Children and Family Services... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Excuse me one second. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill,

2323.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senate Bill 2323.

(Secretary reads title of bill) 3rd Reading of the bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Feigenholtz, to explain your bill.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, again. There were stories in the newspaper over the last few years about how the Department of Children and Family Services was transporting youth in care wearing metal shackles. That story made it around the world, actually. I had friends in Europe emailing me about it. I know the Department has done a great deal of work on this. And sometimes it's worked and sometimes it hasn't, because they've put this in rule, or procedure, actually. But today, what I'd like to do is indulge

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you and ask you to vote for this bill so that it can be statutory and that it is clear that, as we move forward, we're going to prohibit the use of restraints on youth in care during transport that is arranged by the Department of Children and Family Services, and it will require a process for the use of soft restraints. It requires the Department to prepare an individualized traumasensitive transport plan for kids who are being transported from psychiatric hospitals or residential treatment centers that -- and collaborate with caseworkers and clinical treatment professionals. I'd appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Syverson. SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you. Question for the gentle lady. Senator ... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

She indicates she will yield. You need to hold that real close to your mouth.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Senator, we -- we talked about this in committee and -- and -- and maybe you could just help answer this. The question that was raised when -- when we talked in committee about in those cases when they're dealing with some of the most violent individuals who are a danger to themselves or to others in transporting, without them being able -- the use of -- of restraints, what is the plan for those individuals in those particular cases when you're transporting the most violent of -- of those individuals? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Feigenholtz. SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

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I think the general belief, Senator Syverson, is that any child that is that ill shouldn't be transported. And it would require a clinical event, and that once that child was able to be transported, it likely would be by a medical professional and it would be the -- a physician and an ambulance driver, not a DCFS worker or the Department, who would be responsible for making that decision.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Syverson. SENATOR SYVERSON:

So, in those particular cases, we're not saying that there may not be a need for that; it just would not be handled by DCFS. DCFS would work with some other -- either law enforcement or other medical professionals to help transport those -- those particular individuals.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Feigenholtz.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

DCFS caseworkers are not trained to handle children who have those kind of psychiatric behavioral health problems, Senator. They're not. It -- that -- when children are in that kind of a situation, they need to be with medical professionals who know how to handle it and who can manage the transport. Do you understand what I'm saying? So they're the ones who will decide to use... PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

No. Thank you. I just needed -- wanted that clarification and I certainly am very supportive. So appreciate it.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

There further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Feigenholtz, to close.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

I'd like to see this practice end. It doesn't make us look very good as a state. So I'd appreciate an Aye vote. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall Senate Bill 2323 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris votes Yes. Senator Plummer.

Senator Feigenholtz, to explain your bill.

SENATOR FEIGENHOLTZ:

Thank you, Mr. - I almost said Speaker - Mr. President. This is a bill that amends -- that requires HFS to establish a process that allows for ambulance service providers under Medicaid feefor-service, rather than just ground ambulance service providers of non-emergency medical transportation, to appeal a decision by HFS regarding payment for services when no denial had been received prior to the time of transport in special cases, for -- for appeals on or after December 15th, 2012. Very specific and narrow bill. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2325 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

Thank you very much, Mr. President. This is an initiative of the solar industry and it is to change the property tax handling concerning solar cells that are installed on rooftops. I know of no opposition and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall Senate Bill 2365 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Senator

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Harris.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)
