Senator Joyce, on your bill.

SENATOR JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Good afternoon, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 1146, as amended, has been a project that we've been working on since last year's Session. It's an initiative of the Illinois Soybean Association, that's good for the Illinois farmers, and also good for the environment. Currently, Illinois has biodiesel at B11 sales tax incentive that has a sunset that expires in '20 of '23 {sic} (December 31, 2023). I would like to thank all the stakeholders that have been in the meetings in the past several months and have been -- helped develop this negotiated bill. Negotiations have been in agreement, including Illinois Soybean Association, Illinois Fuel and Retail Association, IRMA, IMA, Department of Revenue, BSNF. I appreciate

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all the hard work that the stakeholders have made to get this bill where it is today. Currently, we have B11. This bill would take 2024 up to B14, in 2025 to B17, and in 2026 to be B20. This -- this gradual build out would allow for storage and manufacturers to have the time and stability for the plan -- for planning their purchases. The bill also allows for a winter blend -- blend of B11 in the cold winter months of December, January, February, and March. It allows for renewable diesel language and a "right to blend" definitions to get all parties to neutral or supportive. This is an initiative, as I said before, of the Illinois Soybean Association and will help support Illinois' number one industry of agriculture. It'll also make a significant improvement on Illinois highway emissions. Biodiesel is environmentally friendly, reducing carbon emissions by fifteen percent. One semi, burning B-20 when this is fully implemented, would be like removing 5.5 cars from the highway. When fully implemented, the legislation will reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 160,000 metric tons per year. Happy to answer any questions, ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you, Sir. A question for the sponsor.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you. Senator, we had some discussion about this bill and I'm on it as well. First of all, we want to make sure that the truckers who are hauling all of our - the goods and services all around the -- the country, we want to make sure that you've

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committed that you're going to bring this forward with an amendment later on, to make sure that they have the needs met that they wanted.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Joyce.

SENATOR JOYCE:

Thank you for the question, Senator. Yah, I've talked to Midwest truckers who slipped in late on this bill. We're continuing commitments and conversations, so that we can get the bill to where everyone's going to be agreed on.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

So, you will be bringing this back in November to address those concerns in legislation?

Again, thanks for the question. We are going to proceed with the bill, as drafted, currently. It's a four year build out we won't have their concerns of B20 and some of the OEM requirements for B20 is in 2026, and talking to the Midwest Truckers, I think that everyone has come to an agreement on, we've got time that if we need to do adjustments in this, because of OEM restrictions, that we will absolutely address those concerns as we go and Midwest Truckers seem to agree with that, so.

House Bill 4306 amends and creates the Holistic Mental Health Care for Youth in Care Task Force to review and make recommendations regarding mental health and wellness services provided to youth in care, including a program of holistic mental health services, provided 30 days after the date upon which a youth is placed in foster care. Happy to answer questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Harris, on your bill.

SENATOR HARRIS:

Thank you, Mr. President and Members of the Senate. House Bill 4313, as amended, enabled the Illinois Insurance Guaranty Fund to more efficiently process and pay claims of insolvent insurers by permitting the Department to provide the Fund with advanced access to confidential claims information. There's no opposition and I request a favorable vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Connor, on your bill.

SENATOR CONNOR:

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Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. HB 4316 follows up last year's Faith's law, which expanded the definition of "grooming" to educator related situations not covered in criminal law. This bill updates various parts of the School Code in situations where a prosecution doesn't occur for a predatory teacher. This permits the school districts to track that information and share it with other districts statewide. As a prosecutor, I encounter child exploitation situations involving educators, in which, teachers just went from school to school after something occurred. This bill is going to address that problem and allow those individuals to be tracked. I want to say thank you, first and foremost, to Faith Colson, a survivor of educator assault, and a tireless advocate on this issue, as well, to the House Sponsor, Representative Michelle Mussman for the, literally, more than dozens of meetings in order to put this legislation together. I know of no opposition and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick, on your bill.

SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Senate Bill 4320 is a technical correction to the six percent exemption that applies to pensions under Illinois law. Employers are required to pay the pension of benefits attributable to salary increases exceeding six percent during an employee's final rate of earnings period. However, the fiscal year 2021 Budget Implementation Bill, created a new permanent exemption to this requirement, specifically for years immediately following emergency declarations. But, because the Act became effective on June 17th, it doesn't cover the entire academic year of 2021, and it does not a pay--play---apply to payments made prior to June 17th. This clarifies that the exemption applies to those payments made in the academic year beginning on or after July 1st, 2020, to incapsulate that year. I know of no opposition and ask for a favorable vote.

Senator Morrison, on your bill.

SENATOR MORRISON:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is brought by members of the insurance industry. It permits an insurance producers active membership in a State or national professional insurance

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association to provide the producer with up to four hours of continuing ed credit per biennial reporting period. This credit does not satisfy ethics education requirements, however. I know of no opposition. I ask for an Aye vote.

Research shows, that compared to women, men are more likely to smoke and drink alcohol and generally lead less healthy lifestyles. So, this will be an excellent addition to the Department. The bill ensures that Illinoisans have the same rights, obligations, and protections available to them under Illinois law as enjoyed under federal law. SENATOR CUNNINGHAM:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4629 amends the Athletic Trainers Practice Act. It allows athletic trainers, who have received a referral from a physician, to provide services to individuals who are not part of an athletics teams. It also gives

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authority to the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation to take disciplinary action against licensed trailers {sic} if they fail to keep proper paper work. Know of no opposition to this bill and I would appreciate the Chamber's support.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Rose.

SENATOR ROSE:

Thank you. As excited as I am to vote for the majority Leader's bill, I'm currently locked out of LIS system and can neither read it, nor see it, nor look at our analysis. And I do believe under the Constitution, so part, such and such, we have to hold on until I can actually see the bill to know what it is I'm voting on. This is not a joke. I can't get into the system.

Which, subject to appropriation, provides loan repayments and scholarships for health care professionals, who agree to serve in Illinois' medical facilities for a specified period of time. I know of no opposition and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4645 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question there are 54 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4645, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4665, Senator Jones. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SENATOR JONES:

Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. House Bill 4645 {sic} (4665) amends the Regulatory Sunset Act. I know of no opposition. Look for a favorable roll call

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4665 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4665, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4674. SENATOR HUNTER:

House Bill 4674 requires IDPH to establish continuing education guidelines for nursing home surveyors and requires surveyors to complete at least ten hours of continuing education, annually. The bill also requires the substance of a complaint to be provided to a nursing home upon commencement of an onsite inspection and establishes certain reporting requirements regarding nursing home surveyors. I know of no opposition. This is an initiative of the Health Care -- Health Care Council of Illinois and I would ask for an Aye vote.

Senator Holmes, on your bill.

SENATOR HOLMES:

Thank you so much, Mr. President. House Bill 4680 would remove provisions that would require resident veterans to apply in person for a fishing, hunting and sportsman combination license and the camping fee. Additionally, it certifies that veterans returning from service abroad or mobilization by the President of the United States as an active-duty member of the Armed Forces, the National Guard and the Reserves of the Armed Forces are eligible for the veteran's license fee discounts for fishing, sportsman combination, and hunting licenses. In addition, the bill provides some definitions of acceptable verification and services abroad. I'd appreciate an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4680 pass. All those in favor will say Aye - vote Aye. Those Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4680, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4690, Senator Belt. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.



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SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Senator Belt, on your bill.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4690 makes a change to the provision that currently allows teachers to have dismissal - to have their dismissal hearing paused. My bill would allow dismissal hearings to move forward for the most egregious dismissal cases, teachers accused of sexual abuse, grooming, physical abuse and corporal punishment of students. I know of no opposition and I would ask for all favorable votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Rezin.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you. For the Members on this side, I'd like them to know that this is a good bill and that I support my colleagues bill, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Belt, to close.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you -- thank you Senator for -- for -- for the support. I would ask for all favorable roll call, thank you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall House Bill 4690 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4690, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4703, Senator Gillespie. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4703.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Gillespie, on your bill.

SENATOR GILLESPIE:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4703 aligns State law with the federal No Surprises Act. Targeting the problem of patients being treated at an inpatient facility but then being billed at out-of-network rates for providers such as anesthesiologists or ER doctors who are not part of the in-network agreement. It requires health insurers to ensure that cost sharing requirements are applied as though the services had been received from an in-network provider and that the insured or any group policy holder or plan sponsor shall not be liable to or billed by the health insurance issuer, the out-of-network provider or the facility, beyond the cost sharing amount. I would urge an Aye vote.

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Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4703 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4703, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4716, Senator Glowiak Hilton. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4716.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Glowiak Hilton, to explain your bill.

SENATOR GLOWIAK:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Committee Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 4716 clarifies that the national standards may be adopted to meet Illinois drivers ed requirements. There are -- traffic crashes are the leading cause of teens deaths between the ages of sixteen and nineteen and this bill is just going help include the standards that are now for novice drivers. I appreciate some support, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4716 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4716, having received the required

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constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4724, Senator Bennett. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4724.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Bennett, on your bill.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4724, and I just want to draw a distinction. There are two bills that I have this year dealing with textbook savings. This is not the one that would remove all costs from textbooks for in-State residents. We're going to continue to work on that bill over the summer. But House Bill 4724, it's an initiative of the University of Illinois and it would address the issue of inclusive access. That is a process where students in a specific section of a class, pay for their materials, off and on-line materials, at the time of registration. That's become the normal practice throughout the United States and Canada, in about -- over the last decade and by doing this all students can receive course materials at the same time and then the cost to publishers usually saves quite a bit of savings, could be sixty to seventy-five percent lower than hardback text books. The problem is that the University of Illinois doesn't use this currently because the Retail Sales Act law does not allow them to charge student accounts who did not receive financial aid. Under this bill, that would permit higher education institutions in the State to provide a credit to students accounts for course materials at registration, if the institution can provide significant cost

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savings at a retail store. It came through unanimously through the House, as it did through the Senate committee, I'd ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4724 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4724, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4728, Senator Pacione-Zayas. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4728.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Pacione-Zayas, on your bill.

SENATOR PACIONE-ZAYAS:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4728 is the adopted recommendation from the Professional Review Panel, changing how organizational units calculate the equalized assessed value, the EVA, to determine the local capacity target for Evidence-Based Funding. The recommendation is to calculate EVA from the two-year average, instead of the average of the previous three years. If the most recent year of the EVA represents ten percent or greater declined, compared to the prior year, EBF calculations will use the lesser of the most recent year, or the three-year average. This is a modest change that is more responsive to significant

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loss in the EVA and it is an anticipatory change during an economic downturn. I know of no opposition and I urge an Aye vote, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4728 pass. All those in favor will... I'm sorry, Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Mr. President. I know you're trying to keep a good prompt Calendar and I'll be brief. To the bill, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Senator Pacione-Zayas for bringing this bill. I -- I recognize that you have ISBE's recommendation and their Board of Review also signed off, that they promoted this bill. My concern and I just want to make it known to the Body is -- we got our Evidence-Based Formula, in effect, and it's working really well for the State of Illinois school children and the school system in Illinois. It's-- it's -- it's a good - been a great thing. It's one of the best things I've seen that we've accomplished in many years. I'm just wanting us to be cautious. It makes me a little squeamish that we are starting to erode the -- some basic parts of it. And -- and I just want us to be conscious, that going forward, we recognize that this was a negotiated piece of legislation that's serving public education better than ever in Illinois and that we just be cognizant not to try to whittle away at it, even in small pieces. But I support your legislation, I see what it's trying to accomplish. But I do

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want us to be aware that we've got to protect what we have in place that's working very well, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Pacione-Zayas, to close.

SENATOR PACIONE-ZAYAS:

Thank you, I really appreciate that comment. I think the main thing for folks to understand is when the fundings appropriated the lower EAV used in the Evidence-Based Funding formula could result in an intentional tier dollars to offset a loss in local contributions to be more responsive and to stabilize funding. I urge an Aye vote. I think that this is a common-sense approach to what we know is happening with economic downturns and how our local contributions may be affected, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall House Bill 4728 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 voting Yea, 1 voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4728, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4739, Senator Doris Turner. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill -- House Bill 4739.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Turner, on your bill.

SENATOR TURNER:

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Thank you, Mr. President. This bill amends the Procurement Code by allowing agencies to submit quarterly reports instead of a report for each grant exceeding 20,000 dollars that is funded through monies held outside the State treasurer {sic} (treasury). Changes to deadline for agencies to submit the offices Acts and Doings Report to January 7th and clarifies approval for late execution waivers falls under the responsibility of the chief procurement officer and there are no known opponents.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4739 pass. All those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4739, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4797, Senator Villa. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4797.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villa, on your bill.

SENATOR VILLA:

Thank you, Mr. President. HB 4749 {sic} (4797) will make an exemption to the Clinical Social Work and Social Work Practice Act by enabling a person who is not a resident of the State of Illinois to perform social work, via telehealth in Illinois, for Illinois visitors and nonresident students if they had a previously



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established therapeutic relationship. Therapeutic services should not have to stop because of the location of a resident. HB 4797 will ensure that nonresidents receive the continued care that they need. I'm happy to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4797 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4797, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4798, Senator Loughran Cappel. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4798.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Loughran Cappel, on your bill.

SENATOR LOUGHRAN CAPPEL:

Thank you, Mr. President. HB 4798 amends the Educator Licensure Article of the School Code to allow currently enrolled students in educator preparation programs in Illinois that have earned ninety credits to be qualified for a substitute teaching license. I'm happy to answer any questions and I encourage a Yes vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4798 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed,

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Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Aye, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4798, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4821, Senator Fowler. Senator Fowler. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4821.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler, on your bill.

SENATOR FOWLER:

Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President. This is probably going to come down to -- as one or more fun -- fun bills we've had this legislative Session. House Bill 4821 actually amends the State Designations Act and designates the Eastern Milksnake as the official State Snake of the State of Illinois. So, it was recently brought to my attention that the State of Illinois does not have a state snake. Therefore, eleven-year-old snake enthusiast, Gentry Heiple, of Williamson County, which is in my district, of course, reached out to the Governor, as well as State Representative Dave Severin to shed light on this issue. It is his recommendation that we make the Eastern Milksnake the official State snake. I support his recommendations and thank him for his extensive research and interest in this legislation. I would be happy to try to do my best to answer any questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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Is there any discussion? My word, there is. Senator Bryant.

SENATOR BRYANT:

Thank you, Mr. President. I actually thought that the Senator, from the other side of the aisle, was going to speak first. But since I'm first, I want to encourage an Aye vote on this and then after this passes, because it's such an awesome bill, Senator Fowler and I would like to invite you down to Jackson-Union County to visit Snake Road, which I've talked to a few of you about, which I believe is closed right now because we don't want anyone stepping on any of the snakes and harming them as they pass through that area. So, after we pass this bill, please come down and visit us at Snake Road in Jackson and Union counties.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion, Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicates he will yield.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Mr. Senator, Senator Fowler, rather. I wish I could share Senator Bryant's enthusiasm for this bill. I can't think of an issue that I've disagreed with her on the entire time we served together in the Senate. But this case... Can you hear me? But this case, I question the judgment of this young snake enthusiast and I just wonder if you can agree with me. Illinois does not list in the top ten milk producing states in the country but we are No. 2 in corn production. So, why wasn't the corn snake considered as a tribute to the many agricultural leaders in this State?

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

My understanding is it actually was considered from this eleven-year-old snake enthusiast, it was considered. But he - after a lot of research on this legislation, it was his choice on, and I applaud his leadership and passion toward, you know, these are the kind of people that are going to be leaders one day, to be able to pass legislation in his honor. And he actually - was his choice, to designate the Eastern Milksnake as the official State snake for the State of Illinois.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Bennett.

SENATOR BENNETT:

Who am I to question the judgment of a wise snake enthusiast? Lastly, Senator, I know that we've talked a lot about our concerns of the census and how we're losing population in rural areas, including your district. And I just, I wonder if maybe this bill is a misguided attempt that your Milksnake would bring all the boys to the yard and -- and that migration that we've seen in the last decade. Can you address that?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

I'm not -- not sure I can, Senator, honestly. But I will say there's actually, you know, I currently represent thirteen counties in the 59th District. And, I will say, that there has been population growth in about four of my counties in the 59th District. So, you know, you never know this could be attributed

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to that, so, yah.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion? Senator Simmons.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Fowler this is a wonderful bill. I just want to admit to you though, as a nature lover, I am very afraid of snakes and so, I just want to know is this a toxic snake or is this non venomous?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

Great question. I appreciate it, and to be quite honest with you, I'm not a huge fan either, okay. So, I'm just going to get this out there. I'm not the snake -- snake enthusiast this eleven-year-old is. But obviously, since this legislation came to my attention, I did do a little bit of research, which is what you should do on very, very important legislation. So, what I did find out, that the Milksnake is a species of the Kingsnake. Many decades ago, many decades ago, the common name Milksnake actually originated from a belief that these snakes milked cows. This -- I -- google it -- google it, trust me, so this myth probably began when farmers sought some excuse for why a cow was producing less milk than usual. The snakes drawn to the mice in the barn were convenient culprits. They provide humans a valuable service, since many of them prey, as adults, includes rats, mice, moles and other rodents commonly found in agricultural areas and considered pests. The Milksnake is an opportunistic hunter, therefore, ridding the farmer of many rodents. So, that's kind of a little bit of the research that I did Senator, so. Thank you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion? Senator McClure.

SENATOR McCLURE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question to the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

He indicates he'll yield.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

So, Senator Fowler, when Senator Koehler had his bill for the State microbe of Illinois, he brought in a strain to show all of us what the strain was like. We got to see it. Have you provided us with glasses of snake milk that this snake has produced for us to taste?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

First of all, I -- I -- I want to address the -- the -- the snake is for, Senator Simmons, the snake is nonpoisonous, okay, so I want -- so I want to get that out there. It is nonpoisonous. So, actually, no, I'm kidding. I'm -- but -- but yah, I did consider that. I -- I'm not aware, I've yet to see any snake milk in the grocery store yet. Not to mention that they won't come, but anyway, I'm off target on what your question was, I'm sorry. I -- I -- I was looking for my snake and I actually did consider it and we would like to bring one to, you know, when this important legislation is passed. I would like to bring it to let everybody be introduced to the Eastern Milksnake as the State snake for the State of Illinois.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator McClure.

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SENATOR McCLURE:

Okay. I -- I look forward to seeing that snake when it arrives in the Capitol. In the meantime, I will vote Yes on the bill. Thank you, Senator.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

And the final speaker is Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Question for the speaker.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicates he'll yield.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Senator Fowler, since this is your first bill, can you tell us the dimensions of these snakes?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

First of all, I want to clarify, this is not my first bill. It is, however, it is my first snake bill, which I'm extremely proud of. But my understanding is they do come in different sizes. I don't have the actual length of that, but when I do bring the snake to the State Capitol, I'll make sure that I bring it into your office, personally, and you'll have an opportunity to see the size. Actually, actually, thank you, Senator Bryant just said it's 24 to 36 inches. So, it -- it'll definitely fit in your -- in your desk drawer.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Hunter.

SENATOR HUNTER:

Thank you very much for those dimensions. Just remind me, a

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week ahead of time, before you bring the snake, so I can I bring my shotgun with me, okay?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

I'm sorry, there was one other speaker that wanted their recognition, Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicates he'll yield.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

Senator, it's my understanding that there's two subspecies of this -- this snake and that one half of it is in the northern one half of Illinois and then one half of it is in the southern State of Illinois. Why is the name the Eastern Milksnake?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler.

SENATOR FOWLER:

That's a great question. If -- if you don't.. Eastern portion of the continental US, actually. Actually, I was going to get my eleven-year-old on the phone and kind of get that answer for you. But, so yah.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Hastings.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

To the bill, Mr. President. I'm so happy that..

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR HASTINGS:

...you had to consult with your legal counsel for that question



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- the answer to that question. Now that we have that clarified because there's one half in the north, one half in the south and it's the Eastern Milksnake. It's going to fit in, just well in Illinois. So, thank you very much, Mr. President. I urge an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fowler, do you wish to close.

SENATOR FOWLER:

I was looking for some more questions but, no, I guess were good. I -- thank you everyone for - it's good to have a little fun in the Chamber. So, I know, this is something I've had people looking at me like this, you know, throughout the last few weeks and, you know, giving me all these kinds of signals everything but I would just like to applaud this eleven-year-old for his initiative. This is something that'll go down in history for him. So, I applaud him and I want to congratulate him, on this legislation because this is something that he will be able to carry with him for the rest of his life. And I look forward to bringing, at least one of the Eastern Milksnakes into -- into the Senate so everyone will know and see what -- what we've - this legislation - important legislation we passed. Just enthusiastically ask for a Yes vote, please. Thank you so much.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

And so, the question is, shall House Bill 4821 pass. All those in vote Yes -- in favor vote Yes. All those Opposed, vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 54 voting Yea, 2 voting Nay, 2 -- and none voting Present. And House Bill 4821, having received the required

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constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4825, is Senator Morrison. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4825.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Morrison, on your bill.

SENATOR MORRISON:

Thanks, Mr. President. This bill provides that an application for vehicle registration, the Secretary of State shall provide a space for voluntary disclosure of a medical condition or disability that impedes or may impede effective communication with a peace officer. It also provides that the Secretary of State will provide the vehicle registration info to the LEAD System. This is one of the most effective ways that -- that I have heard, of allowing a peace officer who pulls over a car in a routine stop, or otherwise stop, that there may be a person in the car who has a disability and cannot effectively communicate. There was a young man that initially brought this bill to the House sponsor that had a twin brother - that has a twin brother who is autistic and is a new driver. I would ask for your Aye vote on this.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4825 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4825, having received the required

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constitutional majority, is declared passed. We're going turn the page now to page 8, top of the page, House Bill 4922, Senator Bush. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4922.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Bush, on your bill

SENATOR BUSH:

Thank you very much, Mr. President, Members of the Senate. House Bill 4922 allows for the Department of Financial and Professional Regulations to issue a certified registered nurse anesthetist license to an advanced practice registered nurse. This is a proponent -- proponents of the bill, would like to increase success ability to licensure. I know of no objections and I would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4922 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4922, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4924, Senator Martwick. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4924.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

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3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Martwick, on your bill.

SENATOR MARTWICK:

Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentleman of the Senate. House Bill 4924 amends the Downstate Firefighter Article of the Illinois Pension Code by removing a requirement that the treasurer of a municipality be bonded in their capacity as a custodian of the Article 3 Pension Fund. This is become unnecessary as the - they -- they no longer ask, as the custodians now, that we have consolidated the holding of the funds in the Firefighter Pension Investment Fund. There's no opposition. I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4924 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4924, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4986, Senator Sally Turner. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4986.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Turner, on your bill.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is regarding the Theatre

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in the Park. It's located at Lincolns New Salem, at the historic site. It's a 500-seat outdoor theatre that presents summer productions. The theatre promotes awareness of Lincolns New Salem historic site and contracts with directors and performers to provide family-oriented entertainment. And this was brought forward to us by one of our constituents, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4986 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 53 voting Yea, 2 voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4986, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4990, Senator Villivalam. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4990.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villivalam, on your bill.

SENATOR VILLIVALAM:

Thank you -- thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4990 is an initiative the Illinois Department of Transportation. It amends the Downstate Public Transportation Act to clarify that a participant shall submit an independent audit to the Department of Transportation, no later than 180 days after the end of a participant's fiscal year, rather than the State's fiscal year, among other items. I know of no -- I know of no opposition and I

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would ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4990 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4990, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4994, Senator Belt. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4994.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Belt, on your bill.

SENATOR BELT:

Thank you, Mr. President. I -- I have another good bill to present. House Bill 4-9-9-4 amends the School Safety Drill Act, within the School Code, to ensure that the Board's threat assessment procedures and the members of their threat assessment team are filed with the local law enforcement agencies and the appropriate regional education authority. I know of no opposition to the bill and I ask for a favorable roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4994 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that

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question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4994, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4998, Senator Sally Turner. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 4998.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Turner, on your bill.

SENATOR S. TURNER:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill is regarding new data reporting to be annually submitted to the General Assembly on the number of military veterans receiving services or benefits under the Emergency and Transitional Housing Program, the Emergency Food Program, and the Homeless Prevention Program, and the Supporting Housing Program. This also, it makes a minor change to the bill that reports also are received through the Prince Home at Manteno, the Veterans Home.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4998 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4998, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 4999, Senator Villanueva. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

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House Bill 4999

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Villanueva, on your bill.

SENATOR VILLANUEVA:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 4999 requires all early intervention services to be initiated as soon as possible, no later than 30 calendar days after the consent of the parent or guardian for individualized family services plan. The -- earlier intervention services that we're talking about are basically a range of therapeutic, developmental, and social, emotional services that families receive to support further -- and further the gains of their children. The amendment to this bill was part of negotiations with the Department of Human Services and it puts them in to neutral. I know of no other opposition or no opposition and I ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 4999 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 4999, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill 5003, Senator Joyce. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5003.

(Secretary reads title of bill)



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3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Joyce, on your bill.

SENATOR JOYCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. House Bill 5-0-0-3 is initiative of the Illinois Vocational Agricultural Teachers and the Future Farmers of America. It amends the Illinois State Board of Education Special Purpose Trust Fund portion of the School Code to ensure that royalty payments made to ISBE are deposited into ISBE Special Purpose Trust Fund, as has been the general practice for these payments for license agreements entered into by ISBE. I know of no opposition. I ask for a favorable roll call.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Seeing none, the question is, shall House Bill 5003 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 5003, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. House Bill -- House Bill 5014, Senator Johnson. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5014.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Johnson, on your bill.

SENATOR JOHNSON:

Thank you, Mr. President. According to the American Heart

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Association and the American Stroke Association, stroke is the fifth leading cause of death and the leading cause of adult disability in the United States. On average, someone in the U.S. suffers a stroke every forty seconds and nearly 795,000 people suffer a new or recurring stroke. And we need to do more in terms of promoting stroke awareness in - throughout Illinois. Therefore, House Bill 5014 establishes a partnership between IDPH and Governors State University's College of Health and Human Services to develop a public awareness campaign that promotes stroke recognition and -- prevention strategies for the communities at high risk, particularly, in the Chicago Southland area, and, as well as, just other targeted high-risk communities throughout Illinois. I know of no known opposition and ask for Aye votes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator Syverson.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

Thank you. To the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR SYVERSON:

I stand in support of this legislation, but, and I talked to the sponsor earlier about this, it would be nice for us to find out of all the other stroke awareness programs we have in Illinois, what they are doing or what they're not doing. We know that there are many other organizations that are getting grants to do this and it sounds like we can't really quantify, at all, what the results of those other programs are. And maybe we need to do a review of those programs to see if they need to be continued and maybe those dollars transferred over to what this program is trying

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to do. But we need to hold all those organizations accountable that are getting funds today to do this very same thing that you're trying to do. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Johnson, to close.

SENATOR JOHNSON:

Thank you, Senator. I just would ask for all Aye votes, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Question is, shall House Bill 5014 pass. All those in favor, will say Aye -- vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there is 56 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 5014, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Go to House Bill 5016. Senator Simmons seeks leave of the Body to return House Bill 5016 to the Order of 2nd Reading. Leave is granted. Now on the Order on 2nd Reading is House Bill 5016. Continuing on 3rd Reading, correction on that. We're now on House Bill 5016. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

House Bill 5016.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Simmons, on your bill.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you -- thank you very much, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. HB 5-0-1-6, as amended, provides that

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alternative learning opportunities programs may include high school completion programs to allow students that are eligible for remote learning to complete their education while incarcerated in a facility or institution of the Department of Corrections and creates a pilot program, subject to appropriation, for qualifying remote learning students of the Consuella B. York Alternative High School, that are in custody of the Department of Corrections to continue their course requirements to receive a diploma with the assistance and supervision of the Department of Corrections' educators. The underlying amendment, would basically, include collective bargaining agreements as part of the overall process for this pilot. I know of no opposition and would respectfully request an Aye vote. Thank you, Mr. President.

SECRETARY ANDERSON:

Is there discussion? Senator Rezin.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, Mr. President. To the bill, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR REZIN:

Thank you, I like to commend the sponsor. I know originally, we had some issues we needed to work out with the DOC, but in general, you did work through them. They are neutral now, and I ask for an Aye vote on this bill. Thank you for your work, Senator.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion, Senator Rose.

SENATOR ROSE:

Thank you. To the bill, if I may?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

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To the bill.

SENATOR ROSE:

I'm going to stand in support of this. This is smart. This is smart that we're trying to actually rehabilitate people. And I've listened, many times on this Floor, when they talk about rehabilitation. And the truth is, when you look at what DOC actually offers, they don't offer anything. You know, you can enroll in drug treatment, but there is no drug treatment. Vocational industries has been, you know, hollowed out. And you have people returning, as they parole out or whatever, without any ability to earn gainful employment. Vocational industries in this State, thirty years ago, meant something, you could get a job. It's been hollowed out. It's been zeroed out. And, I'm not going to get in the hypocrisy of being lectured to about how people should or shouldn't get drug treatment, when there is no drug treatment. But in this case, if you're a kid, you should complete your degree. And with online learning, we can do that cheaply and efficiently. So, I'm going to vote for it. And, I'm going to thank you for bringing it to my attention.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Further discussion, Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Thank you, Mr. President. Questions of the sponsor, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Sponsor indicates he will yield.

SENATOR TRACY:

Senator Simmons, I also think this is a good concept and a good idea. But what I was wondering, doesn't the Department of Corrections have within it the ability for learning opportunities

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for residents that are incarcerated there?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Simmons.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank you, for that question. I believe that they do not have the remote learning capacity for the students at the Consuella York Alternative School and thus, this legislation was introduced.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Tracy.

SENATOR TRACY:

Well, I was concerned, and I understand this one's remote. But I thought that the Department of Corrections, and also the Juvenile Justice System, were required to provide educational opportunities for our inmates. And I was just concerned, that by seeing your bill, that in fact, that's not being done. And so, I just want to make sure that your program, but likewise all educational opportunities, are out there because, I know, I actually taught classes at Western Illinois University for - I contracted with a college and I taught through the college, but they also had GED programs to -- and they also had skill -- still -- skill equivalency programs to bring somebody up to an eighth grade reading standard there, as well. So, I just wanted to be sure that we make the inquires of -- of Department of Corrections that everybody has educational opportunities and of course with a remote learning this will be another facet, so thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Simmons.

SENATOR SIMMONS:

Thank -- thank the Senator for the question. There -- there

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are educational opportunities for those in custody of IDOC. I'm not in the position to speak to detail to what those curriculum offerings are, but I agree with you that this remote option will -- will definitely fill a void in a systemic gap there.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

So, the question is, shall House Bill 5016 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 55 voting Yea, none voting Nay, none voting Present. And House Bill 5016, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed. Sorry, the Illinois Times seeks leave of the Body to do photos. Seeing no objection, leave is granted. House Bill 5018, Senator Fine. Mr. Secretary, please read the bill.

ACTING SECRETARY KAISER:

House Bill 5018.

(Secretary reads title of bill)

3rd Reading of the bill.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fine, on your bill.

SENATOR FINE:

Thank you, this bill creates an innovative way to meet the needs of affordable housing. It creates the Cook County Housing Trust Fund. The monies in the fund can be used for housing projects, properties acquisitions, new construction and rehab projects. The fund will result in much needed affordable dignified housing.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Is there any discussion? Senator DeWitte.

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SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Question of the sponsor, please.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Indicates she will yield.

SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Fine, thank you very much for this legislation. As we discussed in committee, we are big fans of affordable housing across the State of Illinois. And I think we still have a long way to go with regards to providing more. I do have concerns about this legislation. Can you tell me, specifically, what these grants will be allowed to be used for, with regards to establishing more affordable housing?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fine.

SENATOR FINE:

Yes, the fund can be used for housing projects, including the cost of property acquisition, new construction, rehabilitation of property, property improvements, developer fees, consulting and legal fees, capitalized revenues, equity investments in project owners and loans to project owners.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator DeWitte.

SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you. So, in fact, will this fund be used to buy raw land for the construction of additional affordable housing?

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fine.

SENATOR FINE:

It could be. I believe in committee we discussed the fact



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that without this fund it is very difficult for Cook County to compete in buying property from private developers, and this would enable them to purchase those properties to build more affordable housing.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator DeWitte.

SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you, Senator. To the bill, Mr. President.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

To the bill.

SENATOR DeWITTE:

Thank you, Senator, for this legislation. The concerns I have with regards to this fund is the fact that this could potentially put a government entity in the business of providing affordable housing in direct conflict, and in competition with not only the commercial home building industry and trade, private industry. It could also put them in competition with private property owners, who may wish to, also, acquire some of these potential parcels of property that may be available. I think it's great that this fund can be used to rehab existing properties. There's probably not a community in this State that doesn't have property that could, potentially, be rehabbed to provide more housing. But I have great concerns about these funds being used to compete with private industry and private landowners across this State, particularly in Cook County, with regards to your legislation. For that reason, I remain opposed to this legislation and would ask my colleagues to support the same, thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

Senator Fine, to close.

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SENATOR FINE:

Thank you. Yes, and part of the funding could also be used for public private partnerships. And as we know, and as we saw through covid, affordable housing is a great problem that we have, not only in Cook County, but throughout the State. And this is one of many solutions that we can put on the table to help people have that housing that they so need and deserve. I ask for your Aye vote.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR KOEHLER)

The question is, shall House Bill 5018 pass. All those in favor, vote Aye. Opposed, Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 39 voting Yea, 16 voting Nay, and 0 voting Present. And House Bill 5018, having received the required constitutional majority, is declared passed.
