3. to order. Will the members please be at their desks and the guests  
4. in the Gallery please rise. Our prayer this afternoon will be by

6. RABBI BARRY A. MARKS:

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Thank you, Rabbi. Reading of the Journal.

10. SECRETARY:

11. Wednesday...3rd Special Session...Wednesday, October the 3rd,  
12. Thursday, November the 1st, Tuesday, November the 6th, Wednesday,  
13. November the 7th, Thursday, November the 8th, 19...the year 1979.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Senator Johns.

20. SENATOR JOHNS:

21. Mr. President, may I take a privilege and wish you a Happy  
22. New Year and to all of my colleagues, the best wishes. I move  
23. that the Journals just read by the Secretary be approved unless  
24. some Senator has additions or corrections to offer.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. You've heard the motion wishing everybody a Happy New Year  
27. and moving approval of the Journals. All in favor signify by  
28. saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. So ordered. Senator  
29. Rhoads, for what purpose do you arise?

30. SENATOR RHOADS:

31. Mr. President, pursuant to our rules, I move admission to  
32. the Floor today for former Senators Jim Soper, Harber Hall and  
33. Terrel Clarke and acknowledge their presence on the Floor.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. They are always welcome. Gentlemen, Happy New Year. If I  
3. can have the attention of the Senate. We are awaiting a Message  
4. from the House requesting our presence at a Joint Session to be  
5. convened in about ten minutes. After the Joint Session, after the  
6. Message from the Governor that we will receive in the Joint Session,  
7. it is the plan of the leadership of the Senate to reconvene and  
8. have a caucus. Each party has requested a caucus immediately  
9. after the Joint Session, after which we will return to the Floor,  
10. handle some business and then adjourn until tomorrow, the time to  
11. be explained in the caucus. Senator Shapiro, for what purpose do  
12. you arise?

13. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

14. ...on a point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. State your point, Sir.

17. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

18. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. It is  
19. my distinct honor and the honor of the Republican side of the  
20. aisle to introduce to the membership Senator Graham's replacement,  
21. Senator...let's see now, what's the name? John Friedland. John,  
22. do you want to stand up and take a bow?

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Senator Friedland, we will let you make one speech. This is  
25. it for 1980 now, you understand that.

26. SENATOR FRIEDLAND:

27. Thank you, Mr...Mr. President...colleagues...it's...I can't  
28. think of a worse possible way, perhaps, for a person to succeed  
29. to an office. I did lose a close friend and colleague of yours,  
30. a distinguished twenty year career. I feel that when we lost him  
31. we lost a little piece of Illinois. Someone can take his place,  
32. no one can fill his shoes. You may not always agree with his  
33. positions, but you knew where he was. I served with twenty-one  
of you in the other Body and I'll try to do my best in the future

1. to serve with you here. Thank you.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. A message from the House.

4. SECRETARY:

5. A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

6. Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that the

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Savickas moves for the suspension of the rules and  
14. the immediate consideration and adoption of House Joint Resolution 70.  
15. All in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it,  
16. the rules are suspended. Senator Savickas moves the adoption of  
17. House Joint Resolution No. 70. All in favor signify by saying Aye.  
18. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The resolution is adopted. Committee  
19. reports.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Senator Johns, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, appoints  
22. the following members to wait upon the Governor and escort him to  
23. the House of Chambers to deliver the State of State Message. Senators  
24. Hall, Sangmeister, Savickas, Geo-Karis and Mitchler. Signed, Senator  
25. Gene Johns, Chairman of the Committee on Committees.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. All right, if we can have the...if we can have the attention  
28. of the membership, those five members who have been designated to  
29. escort the Governor, will meet the Governor at the door of the  
30. House Chamber. We will all momentarily walk as a group to the  
31. door of the House and be admitted to the House and those five will  
32. wait upon the Governor and escort him down the aisle. Senator Moore,  
33. for what purpose do you arise?

1. SENATOR MOORE:
2. For the purpose of an announcement, Mr. President.
3. PRESIDENT:
4. Yes.
5. SENATOR MOORE:
6. There will be a Republican caucus immediately following the
7. Joint Session for the Republican members in Senator Shapiro's
8. office. That will be immediately following the Joint Session.

10. Senator Johns.
11. SENATOR JOHNS:
12. Thank you, Mr. President. Wish to advise Democratic members,
13. immediately leave this...the Joint Session, come to the President's
14. office, posthaste...for a caucus.
15. PRESIDENT:
16. All right. Any further business? Senator Maragos.
17. SENATOR MARAGOS:
18. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I'd like to advise
19. the members of the Illinois Economic Fiscal Commission, Senator
20. Walsh. The members of the Illinois Economic Fiscal Commission, that
21. we have recessed this morning's meeting till 4:00 p. m. this after-
22. noon or after adjournment of this Session. In Room 212.

- 10. SECRETARY:
- 11. I move that Rule 5 be waived and that the Committee on Elementary
- 12. and Secondary Education be discharged from further consideration of
- 13. House Bill 26...House Bills 26...20...1264 and 1910 and that these
- 14. bills be read a second time, be placed on the Calendar on the Order
- 15. of 3rd reading. Signed, Senator Nedza.
- 16. PRESIDENT:
- 17. Senator Nedza.
- 18. SENATOR NEDZA:
- 19. Thank you...thank you, Mr. President. Ladies and Gentlemen
- 20. of the Senate, it is necessary to discharge these bills to provide
- 21. the necessary vehicles for the pending legislation that we're
- 22. anticipating and I so move that we all concur.
- 23. PRESIDENT:
- 24. Senator Berman.
- 25. SENATOR BERMAN:
- 26. On this motion...which I support, I have asked the Clerk and
- 27. I want the record to show that I've requested that I assume the...
- 28. and I'm asking leave to assume the sponsorship of House Bill 1264.
- 29. Merely as background, this bill was read into...the Journal on
- 30. May 31st when it came over from the House and it was recorded as
- 31. ...with the sponsorship of Senator Gitz. On that day he had requested
- 32. that he be removed as the chief sponsor. He thought it was a bill
- 33. that could be used for purposes of...addressing retirement problems

1. of teachers and when he discovered that it was a bill that applied  
2. only to Chicago, he indicated that there was other vehicles that  
3. were available and he did make that request on May 31st. So that  
4. technically there is, at this moment, prior to my request, no sponsor  
5. of 1264 on the record and I'd ask for leave to assume that sponsor-  
6. ship and join...and join in the motion.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. You've heard Senator Berman's request. Is leave granted?  
9. Leave is granted. Senator Berman will be shown as the sponsor  
10. of...Senator Berman will be shown as the chief sponsor of House  
11. Bill 1264. Further discussion? Senator Wooten.

12. SENATOR WOOTEN:

13. Yes, Mr. President, I respectfully rise in opposition  
14. to Senator Nedza's motion. The issue that is under consideration  
15. is one of critical importance to the City of Chicago and I think  
16. to the State of Illinois as a whole. One of the things that distresses  
17. me in the process is that the time table is for us to discharge this  
18. bill, have a Committee of the Whole hearing, and then take action  
19. on it. I do not for a moment believe that all wisdom in the State  
20. reposes in this Body, nor in any witnesses that we can summon on  
21. a day's notice. I think it would be to the best interests of the  
22. people of Illinois, if the State is and...to the people in this  
23. State, if the bill is printed and generally available for three  
24. or four days before we get around to hearings. I think the suggestion  
25. of a Committee of the Whole is a good one, but I think it is important  
26. that that bill be in general circulation for at least three or four  
27. days so that we have an opportunity to take a careful look at it.  
28. It is not a simple subject. I am told that the bankers have the  
29. gun at our head. I suggest to you that gun will be there still  
30. a week from now and the opportunity for them to make money will  
31. be there a week from now. We are dealing with some close deadlines,  
32. but I don't think in this case we ought to move with haste. There  
33. are some serious questions which are going to be explored along

1. the way, but I think we ought to leave the bill in committee and  
2. follow a regular legislative process.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Further discussion? Senator Washington.

5. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

6. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I concur wholeheartedly  
7. in the remarks by Senator Wooten. As Senator Nedza said, it was  
8. necessary to discharge committee and place these bills on the  
9. Order of 2nd reading or some such...parliamentary device in order  
10. to discuss and deal with the question of the Chicago School System  
11. and the oversight committee and the bonding entailed in that  
12. discussion. I submit...I submit that it is not necessary, there  
13. are other methods of doing this and I would suggest that the method  
14. that we use would be to follow the ordinary course of the legislative  
15. process, giving due consideration to both Houses of this bicameral  
16. system. And I think we should not forget that this system of bicam-  
17. eralism was not placed here for the convenience of Legislators, it  
18. was not placed here for the convenience of bankers, it was not  
19. placed here for the convenience of the Governor. The system was  
20. devised and over a period of years has proved efficacious because  
21. it was devised to get maximum citizen input at every step of the  
22. procedure, particularly in those cases which involved a drastic  
23. turn about or change in a statutory process in which people have  
24. put repose and trust and so forth in. It is unfortunate that  
25. throughout the entire process of this crisis in Chicago, at no  
26. point, at no point, has there been ordinary citizen input. The  
27. bankers talked to the Governor and the Governor talked to the  
28. Mayor and the Mayor talked to the president of the school board  
29. and sometimes they talked to the labor leaders. Nobody talks to  
30. the public, no one asks their opinion. Even the press, even the  
31. press, to me have been extremely negligent in not covering this  
32. issue. They have presented an X party pleading to the people in  
33. Cook County and one would read the paper and assume that there



1. was no alternative, reasonable or otherwise, to the so-called  
2. Big Mac. The press has been woefully negligent. They have not  
3. covered my community and there has been protests all over the  
4. landscape. They have not asked our opinion and I submit that they haven't  
5. asked the opinion of substantial portions of the people of the City  
6. of Chicago who have school children in that system. Now we are  
7. told that unless this bill is on the Governor's Desk by Friday  
8. that the bankers are going to willy-nilly run away. I submit that  
9. the problem was created by the bankers and as was said earlier  
10. to me, and I asked for permission to paraphrase, it seems to me  
11. that what's happening is that this whole business is an attempt  
12. to make it clear to the Mayor of the City of Chicago that she  
13. can't run the banking industry or attack it with impunity, that  
14. may be right, it may be wrong. But irrespective of the base of  
15. motive, we are entitled to talk about this business. Now, why  
16. is Friday the deadline? I haven't heard anyone stand up and  
17. say publicly in a responsible position from the banking institution  
18. that it must be done by Friday. It makes no sense to me. Is it  
19. because we have to get home? I submit it's our responsibility  
20. to stay here. If you can't deal with the school system you have  
21. no business here. We only need five or six days, we'll be here  
22. three this week and two next week or three, we could come back and  
23. deal with this problem. My whole position is this, irrespective  
24. of the merits or demerits of the oversight committee, we have a  
25. responsibility to make certain that our people thoroughly understand  
26. this complicated fiscal house of cards, which has been put up here.  
27. And I've had it from...from some people that I rely upon that the  
28. whole house may crumble because it's built up on cards. I urge  
29. you, if you have work back home and you have decided that you don't  
30. want to come back, it's your responsibility to do so. I urge you,  
31. for the good of the stability of the City of Chicago, not just  
32. tomorrow, but in the future, make certain that we have those committee  
33. hearings. Let's bring the whole retinue of...individuals involved

1. in this thing down here. I would like to hear from the disappearing  
2. President of the...of the Chicago Board of Education, Mr. Carey.  
3. Where is he? Why did he leave? I would like to hear from Mr. Hannor.  
4. What happened to him? I was not satisfied with his TV performance.  
5. Where are the fiscal managers who disappeared or resigned, rather?  
6. We want Rohter down here, we want the whole board now here, but  
7. above all we want the citizens, the mothers and the fathers and  
8. the various community institutions who safeguard their interest  
9. to come in here and give their opinion and ask their questions.  
10. And I think less than that, we would be remiss in our responsibilities.  
11. Don't...out of here, don't hasten out of here. Because if  
12. you do, you might well come back in here in a year or two and have  
13. to explain a big sorry mess. I oppose this motion, I think this  
14. bill should go through the regular process.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

17. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

18. Well, I don't really have very much to say. The last time I  
19. spoke here, I think I was apprehensive of a consumation of a  
20. marriage, a political marriage. And that marriage did get con-  
21. sumated and my mother told me that after a marriage was consumated,  
22. the first thing you could expect was the package. I think we're  
23. getting that package, you know...and I'd just like to open it  
24. up and look at it and not necessarily in a crowd and I'd like to  
25. examine it. I'd want to try to find out if it was a boy or a  
26. girl and I'd want to try to find out a lot of other things about  
27. it before I accepted that package, might have to take it anyway.  
28. But, I just feel here that we've got a package that the people  
29. are entitled to open up and look at it. It hasn't even been  
30. fully drafted yet and the place to do that is in the committee  
31. system. I saw Committees of the Whole here over a ten year period  
32. and they, very frankly, don't do the job. They...obfuscate, they  
33. confuse, there are too many people, people do not feel the responsibility

1. to ask questions where...when they're the eleven member committee,  
2. like the Education Committee, they will ask questions. You feel  
3. a little bit confused and lost here when you have a Committee of the  
4. Whole and it doesn't get fully discussed. It's all hurry, hurry,  
5. hurry, a lot of witnesses and the thing doesn't get fully examined.  
6. Let's examine the package. If we don't, I'm afraid we're going  
7. to be with Miss Bossy just about like...Ferdinand felt after  
8. he jumped that high fence to get over on the same side as Flossie.  
9. And she said, I'm glad you're over here with me now, Ferdinand  
10. the bull. He said, just call me Ferdinand, that barbed wire  
11. fence was higher than I thought it was.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Further discussion? Senator Chew.

14. SENATOR CHEW:

15. Thank you, Mr. President. They say, haste makes waste.  
16. To have the president of the school board here in Springfield  
17. is not going to shade one light, one iota of light, on the  
18. conditions of the school board, other than what we have heard  
19. coming from her and it seems that she says what she wants us to  
20. hear. There are some disgruntled school board members in Chicago  
21. and as I have said before, that I would like to have hearings  
22. held by the Educational Committee here in the Senate, in Chicago  
23. and somewhere downstate, if not here in Springfield. But to gobble  
24. up a deal that's been made over this past week-end with all deliberate  
25. speed, to me, doesn't make sense. The School Board in Chicago didn't  
26. just happen two weeks ago to get into a financial straightjacket.  
27. It's been in a financial straightjacket for several years. It's  
28. just been a cover up job, half done by those that make the decisions.  
29. But here, where we have to either approve or disapprove this deal  
30. that has been made, at least we ought to have people of interests  
31. of educating the children and not making pretty speeches to be heard.  
32. We don't know, as no one in this room that knows, what has happened  
33. to the financial situation that has caused the schools to be in the

1. mess it's in. And hearings are designed to have these kind of  
2. things brought out in public. I don't know how Joe Hannon got  
3. fired. I don't know what was told to him. Somebody is responsible  
4. ...for what has happened because the State has allocated not only  
5. the amounts of monies that would do the schools, but they've even  
6. operated now on two advance payments. I don't see any need, Mr.  
7. President, that we should have to swallow on a day certain to pass  
8. anything as enormous as the kind of monies in bonding that's been  
9. discussed. I want to be able to intelligently vote, one way or  
10. the other, but at least I want more input than what I have now.  
11. I have not seen the amendments that's being discussed. I have  
12. not heard from any school board member. I don't know how the  
13. board is going to be structured. I don't want a board that's  
14. structured where it will become a rubber stamp to whoever is  
15. making decisions. And above all, I don't want control of Chicago  
16. schools to be in the suburban areas of Chicago. I don't want the  
17. bankers to control the board. I want everything to be out on  
18. the table where we all will have an opportunity to see exactly  
19. what to expect in the future and what has caused this to be as  
20. it is today. So I would not support a discharge of committee. I  
21. want a complete hearing of what we're talking about.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

23. Senator Newhouse.

24. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I want to share  
26. some thoughts with the members of this Body because I think  
27. that there is probably every member of this Body who believes  
28. that government works best when it's closest to the people who are being  
29. served. The history of the School Board...of the City of Chicago  
30. has been that the majority of the board members qualified for  
31. the board in exact proportion to the disinterest, to the disinterest that they  
32. have in Chicago school children. The majority of the members of the  
33. Board of the City of Chicago have never had children in the Chicago

1. Board...School System. And have interests other than school children  
2. as their principal reasons for being on the board. That's the  
3. focus of our problem. That's precisely where our problem began.  
4. People who have children in the schools in that City have no say  
5. over what happens to those funds. Now what has happened over a  
6. period of years, is, that our great financial community has stood  
7. by and supervised the systematic weight of the dollars in that  
8. system. And they've stood by with their fiscal knowledge and  
9. integrity and watched those funds get switched around and listened  
10. to the administration deliberately lie to the school board, that's  
11. what happened. And now we come down with the proposal that suggests  
12. that we move the operation of the schools even further from people  
13. who have children in the school system. We're not talking about  
14. a board that is, in fact, going to be in place for twenty-five  
15. years, because that's the length, that's the term of the bonds  
16. that are going to be issued. And the members of that board are  
17. going to come from the suburbs and not the City of Chicago and  
18. they're going to take that direction from bankers in New York.  
19. So the School System of the City of Chicago is going to be run  
20. from New York City, that's what we're talking about doing. And let's  
21. make that issue clear. Now, we've got a Mayor in the City of Chicago  
22. that talked about an evil cabal of men, you remember that expression.  
23. There was an evil cabal of men and she named them by name, who were  
24. responsible for the problems of the City of Chicago. Every member  
25. of that evil cabal of men is now in a group that is in arms around  
26. the neck, buddy-buddy group, with the Mayor. A result of that has  
27. been another kind of cabal and that's a cabal between the Mayor of  
28. the City of Chicago and the Governor of the State of Illinois. And  
29. I give you four quick examples of what that produced for us in this  
30. past Legislative Session. The Transportation Bill, which was written  
31. in the dark, and downstate Legislators, I understand you can smile  
32. over that one because we gave up the kitchen sink. The Income Tax  
33. Bill or rather the Sales Tax Bill, the same thing. The County Hospital

1. Bill, the Park District Bill, everyone of those bills was anti-urban,  
2. even though they were under the auspices of the Mayor of the City  
3. of Chicago. Now we come along with a con game to talk about a bill  
4. that nobody has seen and a fiscal operation that's the greatest  
5. piece of prestidigitation I've seen in life and we're being asked  
6. to end the blind, vote for it. Well, I'll tell you something. Our  
7. teachers don't know what's going on down here because we're saying  
8. that if we get a bill out in a hurry, they'll get a paycheck on  
9. the eighteenth of...is there anybody here but me...because we're saying  
10. that we have to...act expeditiously so they'll get a pay...paycheck  
11. on the eighteenth of this month. Well, we better tell them at the  
12. same time that when they pick up their check on the eighteenth of  
13. this month, that's going to be among the last of the paychecks picked  
14. up for between two and seven thousand of them and that's a pretty  
15. tough option to take. Meanwhile, they've had no opportunity to  
16. either listen to discussion or to have any input. As a matter of  
17. fact, if we want to talk about having government close to the people,  
18. we're going to have a one day hearing in Springfield...in Springfield,  
19. to talk about the Chicago School Board and the questions of the City  
20. of Chicago. Now, like everybody in this room, I certainly do not  
21. want to see the Chicago School System shut down for one minute, but  
22. this is a choice that we have. In the old days, Jesse James stuck  
23. up the banks, tomorrow, the banks are going to stick up Jesse James.  
24. Someone in our...in our caucus said that, I think it was John Knuppel,  
25. and John I wish you would permit me to quote you as closely as I  
26. can, saying that if he were Jesse James today, he would not go out  
27. robbing banks, he'd form school districts. And I think that's the  
28. proper...interpretation. Thank you, very much gentlemen, both for  
29. your attention and your disinterest.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

31. Senator Rock.

32. SENATOR ROCK:

33. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

1. I think we have frankly, gotten off the track. The motion before us  
2. is a motion to discharge two bills which the sponsor of the motion  
3. has admittedly said, will be used, if at all, as vehicles for amend-  
4. ments which we will consider at a Committee of the Whole at 1:00 o'clock  
5. tomorrow. What we are suggesting here is that this will afford us  
6. the opportunity to discuss at some great length the proposal that  
7. was apparently agreed upon over the weekend by the Executive Branch,  
8. by the School Board and by the financial community. I don't think
