21. conversation around my desk, so I would specifically ask that I
22. be shown as a No vote but on top of that, I would implore the staff
23. or whoever has to do with the red, green, yellow lights to check
24. out not necessarily whether the lights light, but whether they are
25. being recorded on the roll call. Not that it made a particle of
26. difference whether I voted one way or the other because it's nice
27. to be in an in between situation sometime on these things.

29. It made a difference to some of us, Senator.

31. But it would have only enhanced the value for the anti-
32. vote anyway and everybody in the whole room knows where I stand on
33. that one, but would somebody please check the Yes, No and yellow

27. You have heard motion which is put before the Body by Senator

32. Is there any discussion? If not, all those in favor signify
33. by saying Aye. All those opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. For what purpose does Senator Rock arise?

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.

6. While we are kind of at ease, we are awaiting the committee
7. report from the Committee on Assignment of Bills, I have prepared
8. and discussed with the joint leadership, a Senate schedule for the
9. month of March which will include the designated times for
10. the hearings of the respective standing committees and I would
11. ask if we could find the Sergeant-at-Arms or some Pages to pass
12. these out. One thing I would call to your attention...two things
13. to call to your attention, one is that we are...will be scheduled
14. to be in Session on Friday, March 2nd so that when we adjourn
15. today, we will return here on Thursday March 1, at the hour of
16. noon and plan to be in Session on March 1 and March 2. Additionally
17. if you look at the last page, we are suggesting in order to
18. facilitate the work of the Reference Bureau, we are suggesting that
19. your submissions to the Bureau to have bills prepared should be into
20. the Bureau no later than Thursday, March 29. I think that will
