29. Rules Committee. WAND TV has requested leave to shoot

32. It looks like it's going to be one of those days, Senator Walsh.
33. SENATOR WALSH:

1. We're off to a good start. Mr. President, a point of  
2. personal privilege. We have in the gallery, apparently  
3. sitting on the wrong side of the Senate, the Democrat side,  
4. nine students from your district, Elmwood Park High School,  
5. and with them their teacher, Gary Wool. If they would stand  
6. and be recognized.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Will our guests please stand and be recognized. Welcome.  
9. Yes, Senator Walsh.

10. SENATOR WALSH:

11. Does this mean that I'm out of business for the rest of  
12. the day?

13. PRESIDENT:

14. I sure hope so. Senator Lemke.

15. SENATOR LEMKE:

16. I'd just like to have the sponsorship changed on House Bill  
17. 3152 from...to Senator Egan, and remove me as the sponsor.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. All right, you've heard the request of Senator Lemke. Is  
20. leave granted? Leave is granted. So ordered. Yes, Senator  
21. Netsch.

22. SENATOR NETSCH:

23. Thank you, Mr. President. I have two of those also. Would  
24. you...would the record show Senator Savickas as a hyphenated co-  
25. sponsor of House Bill 1517, of which I am the principal sponsor at  
26. the moment, and in addition we believe that House Bill 1407  
27. has not yet shown a change of sponsorship from Senator Merlo  
28. to myself, although we did leave a note to that effect. May  
29. I have leave?

30. PRESIDENT:

31. All right, you've heard the request of Senator Netsch.  
32. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. So ordered. Senator  
33. Keats, for what purpose do you arise?

1. SENATOR KEATS:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like House Bills 3075  
3. and 3156 and I have discussed it with the sponsor, Senator  
4. Lemke, that they become the hyphenated Keats-Lemke bills.  
5. They're already in the Rules Committee.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. All right, you've heard the request. Is leave granted?  
8. Leave is granted. So ordered. Senator Schaffer, for what purpose  
9. do you arise?

10. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

11. To request leave of the Body to be added as a co-sponsor  
12. to Senate Bill 1834.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. You've heard the request by Senator Schaffer. Is leave granted?  
15. Leave is granted. So ordered. All right, with leave of the Body  
16. we'll move to page 2 on the Calendar. Senate Bills on 2nd reading.  
17. Senate Bills 2nd reading. 615, Senator Maragos. 1454, Senator  
18. Joyce. Senate Bills 2nd, top of page 2. 1457, Senator Sangmeister.  
19. On the Order of Senate Bills 2nd reading, is Senate Bill 1457.  
20. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

21. SECRETARY:

22. Senate Bill 1457, there was a request for a fiscal note  
23. which has been complied with.

24. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

25. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Revenue offers one  
26. amendment.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Sangmeister.

29. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

30. At this time I would move...this puts the bill in the form  
31. that we now want it, and I would move for the adoption of Committee  
32. Amendment No. 1.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. All right, Senator Sangmeister has moved the adoption of  
2. Committee Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1457. Is there any  
3. discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All  
4. opposed. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Further  
5. amendments?

6. SECRETARY:

7. No further committee amendments.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Any amendments from the Floor?

10. SECRETARY:

11. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senators Regner and Grotberg.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Regner.

14. SENATOR REGNER:

15. Yes, Mr. President, and members. What this amendment does,  
16. it repeals the one cent reduction in the...that we passed last  
17. year, unfortunately, I think, of the sales tax on food and drugs.  
18. It restores that penny, and then it reduces the overall percentage  
19. of sales tax reduction to 3.8 cents, which is the same dollar  
20. amount that this bill now would affect by reducing the Sales Tax  
21. on food and drugs one more cent. As we all know the problems  
22. that have occurred since we passed that legislation on behalf  
23. of the Governor last year and the pressure he was under to do  
24. something. It's cost the retailers substantial amounts of...more  
25. money to administer this. It's caused confusion at the grocery  
26. stores, at food establishment stores. Just yesterday in Joint  
27. Committee on Administrative Rules, we had a great long debate  
28. about some rules that the Department of Revenue was setting forth  
29. regarding the Sales Tax on food establishments, whether it should  
30. be four cents, three cents, or what, whether it's a carry out  
31. store or a keep in store and that. I think it would be a very  
32. equitable proposal to do this, to...dollar amount of the tax relief,  
33. is exactly the same under this amendment. It makes it easier to

1. administer, and the entire cost can go to the citizenry, not  
2. the cut that the retail establishments have to take in order  
3. to administer the bad Act that we passed last year, and I'd  
4. move for the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 1457.

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Regner has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2  
7. to Senate Bill 1457. Is there any discussion? Senator Grotberg.

8. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

9. Thank you, Mr. President, and fellow members. This could  
10. be our last chance to do something right with what has been  
11. consistently a botched up program of rearrangement of the Sales  
12. Tax of the State of Illinois. I cannot recommend strong enough  
13. that you should support this opportunity to get more than one  
14. debate going on how to grant relief at the cash register for  
15. not only the consumer but for every businessman and paper  
16. shuffler in the State of Illinois. We have created a nightmare,  
17. for Heaven's sake, let's help straighten it out. Keep this alive.  
18. Vote Aye on this amendment.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Further discussion? Senator McMillan.

21. SENATOR MCMILLAN:

22. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I'll be very  
23. brief. I would echo Senator Grotberg...Grotberg's comments  
24. of all the proposals that we have dealing with Sales Tax Relief,  
25. this is the one which would provide the least loss of help for  
26. the taxpayer, because it is simple to implement, it doesn't  
27. add to the costs of the retailer, and therefore, he doesn't have  
28. to raise his prices in order to implement whatever program we  
29. have. If we really want to provide Sales Tax relief for taxpayers,  
30. this is by far the best approach and I would support it.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Further discussion? Senator Maragos.

33. SENATOR MARAGOS:



1. Mr. President. I...I rise in opposition to this amendment  
2. because of the fact that we are going to try to help and...all  
3. the Sales Tax approach, the person who needs it most, and that  
4. is the young family people and the...the elderly who's incomes  
5. are not that great that they can buy fancy cars or buy anything  
6. else of...nature which would not mean subsistence for them. If  
7. adopt, this amendment that means the Rolls Royce buyer as well  
8. as the Pinto buyer will have the same benefits proportionately  
9. as the price of the car. I think that what...the bill that has been  
10. done and handled by Mr. Sangmeister...Senator Sangmeister is  
11. a good approach, but let's not use a sledge hammer when we  
12. can use a tack hammer to do it judiciously and with restraint.  
13. I ask that you defeat this amendment.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Further discussion? Senator Gitz.

16. SENATOR GITZ:

17. Well, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I'm sure  
18. that the intentions of the sponsor of this amendment are honorable,  
19. however, I think they fail to understand why we had the differential  
20. Sales Tax in the first place. Illinois is the only large industrial  
21. State that still has a Sales Tax on food and medicine. Now,  
22. we recognize the budget impact, that's why we couldn't take  
23. off all five cents all at once. So, there was a phase-out.  
24. The intention of this amendment is not to recognize that we  
25. shouldn't tax food and medicine, the intention of this amend-  
26. ment is to reduce the Sales Tax in every commodity regardless  
27. of whether you're buying jack hammers, food at the store,  
28. commodities at the dime store, a new car, farm machinery, et  
29. cetera, and that's exactly, I think the wrong approach. Nobody's  
30. comfortable with the problems that retailers have had with the  
31. bill, but I would also remind you of one other simple fact, and  
32. that is that every grocery store owner now has the cash registers.  
33. The problems of shifting to the system, have all ready been

1. addressed. If there was a time for this amendment, the time  
2. was last Fall, not now. Finally, I would add in closing that  
3. Senator Sangmeister has in his bill an approach that will take  
4. the Sales Tax off of all food and medicine in increments. It  
5. takes off all medicine this year, and it also goes by category  
6. of food. I think that that is a much sounder approach than  
7. an amendment, which simply says we're going to reduce the  
8. Sales Tax in everything when, in fact, this legislation should  
9. be addressed at those who are most in need, and for that reason  
10. I think it is a bad amendment.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

13. SENATOR NETSCH:

14. Thank you, Mr. President. I think that Senator Gitz has  
15. made most of the points now, very persuasively. I would point  
16. out again just that as I said at the time that we voted against  
17. discharging your own bill, Senator Grotberg, the...your theory  
18. is understandable, but it does go completely contrary to the  
19. objective that most of us had in attempting to pass the phase-  
20. out of the Sales Tax on food and medicine to begin with. The  
21. point is that that is where the Sales Tax falls most heavily  
22. on those in low to moderate income bracket, that is Sales Tax across the board  
23. on food and medicine. We were not trying...idealy it would be  
24. fine to take the Sales Tax off of everything, but we know that  
25. is not feasible, what we really needed to do was to provide  
26. some relief given inflation, and an across the board Sales Tax  
27. on those items that are most critical and most burdensome to  
28. people of moderate income. This is completely contrary to  
29. that philosophy, and for that reason the amendment should be  
30. defeated.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. Further discussion? Senator Egan.

33. SENATOR EGAN:

1. Yes, thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate.  
2. I...as I recall there were two bills in the Revenue Committee,  
3. Senator Regner, that...that the retailers supported. This  
4. is one of the bills that the retailers agreed would solve  
5. their problem as best that we can, consistent with the  
6. intention to take the Sales Tax off all...of food and medicine,  
7. and also it should be noted, I think, that Senator Daley, who  
8. crusaded for the elimination of the Sales Tax in food and  
9. medicine all over the State of Illinois, has acceded to this  
10. method of doing what he was attempting to do over the past  
11. months, and I think that the record should show that. I  
12. accede to Senator Sangmeister about the details, but I did  
13. want to point those two facts out to you, and I think that  
14. you should agree, Senator Regner, that this is totally consistent  
15. with the intention of the...of all of the people that are in-  
16. volved in trying to eliminate and alleviate the tax burden, this  
17. does it best, and it's a better idea. Don't try to kill it.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there further discussion? Senator Sangmeister.

20. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

21. Well, thank you. I think most of the arguments have been  
22. made, but you have to realize that this amendment of Senator  
23. Regner's completely changes the whole concept. This has nothing  
24. to do with removal of Sales Tax from food and drugs, this is  
25. across the board. It's an entirely different concept, one that  
26. I think was discussed thoroughly in the committee and was defeated  
27. there, it should be defeated here, and as far as the retail merchants  
28. are concerned, they're entirely happy with the way I've got the  
29. bill drafted. This will solve their problems as well. So, we  
30. don't need to look at it from that standpoint, and on that  
31. basis, I urgently urge an No vote on this amendment.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Further discussion? Senator Grotberg, for the second time.

1. SENATOR GROETBERG:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. I would like to respond to  
3. Senator Netsch. Yes, in principal you are correct, but every-  
4. time we fool around with a multiple program for collecting  
5. a tax we are driving up the cost of doing business. We  
6. have effectively raised the price of groceries and medicine  
7. by dinging around with the program. There is no possible way  
8. that a merchant of any kind can accommodate his shop to this  
9. program without passing it on to the customer. The customer  
10. is paying more for groceries and medicine, because of the  
11. approach we're in now, and they will do likewise with the ap-  
12. proach that we are about to take through Mr. Sangmeister's bill.  
13. There is only one simple method to keep prices down and be  
14. fair across the board, and this concept is the one. Of course,  
15. the retail merchants accepted both of them on principal, you  
16. know why, they know damn well who's going to win. They didn't  
17. have the votes on my issue, or on Senator Regner's issue. They  
18. probably have the votes on Senator Sangmeister's issue, and they're  
19. not stupid. Vote for this bill.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Further discussion? Senator Egan.

22. SENATOR EGAN:

23. Yes, I'm sorry to...but I...I just want to make absolutely clear  
24. the fact that I am unalterably opposed to the amendment. I'm  
25. speaking to the merits of the bill, to Senator Sangmeister's  
26. bill, that Senator Daley has acceded to, and we're in favor  
27. of...I'm speaking in favor of the bill, and against the amend-  
28. ment. I'm sorry I may have not been clear.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Any further discussion? Senator Regner may close.

31. SENATOR REGNER:

32. Yes, Mr. President. Now that Senator Egan is clear, I  
33. still am in opposition to what he said. I think we should, as

1. Senator Grotberg said, do something right for a change. Let's  
2. not change the law and have a fake tax relief measure that's  
3. going to have to have added costs to administer. This is a good  
4. amendment, it makes the bill right, and it makes it the way  
5. it should have been last Fall when it was voted upon. I ask  
6. for a favorable roll call.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Regner has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
9. Senate Bill 1457. Those in favor of the amendment will vote Aye.  
10. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted  
11. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
12. question, the Ayes are 26, the Nays are 30. None Voting Present.  
13. The amendment fails. Further amendments?

14. SECRETARY:

15. No further amendments.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. 3rd reading. 1464, Senator D'Arco. On the Order of Senate  
18. Bills 2nd reading, is Senate Bill 1464. Read the bill, Mr.  
19. Secretary.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Senate Bill 1464, there was a request for a fiscal note, which  
22. has been complied with.

23. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

24. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Are there amendments from the Floor?

27. SECRETARY:

28. Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator D'Arco.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator D'Arco.

31. SENATOR D'ARCO:

32. What the bill originally did was reduced the Motor Fuel Tax  
33. for gasohol from seven and a half to two and a half cents, and  
we thought that was a laudable idea, but we also thought that  
it would be appropriate to phase-in the Motor Fuel Tax after a

1. period of time, so the loss of revenue would be much less.  
 2. And, in fact, the amendment provides that after June 30th,  
 3. 1982, it will go from two and a half to three and a half cents,  
 4. and progressively each year until the seven and a half cents  
 5. is reinstated, and it also changes the definition of the  
 6. word gasohol...doesn't change the definition, it changes  
 7. the spelling from A to O. So, that's what it does.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. All right, Senator D'Arco has moved the adoption of Amendment  
 10. No. 1 to Senate Bill 1464. Is there any discussion? If not,  
 11. all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes  
 12. have it. The amendment is adopted. Any further amendment?

13. SECRETARY:

14. No further amendments.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. 3rd reading. 1486, Senator Daley. 1497, Senator Berning.  
 17. On the Order of Senate Bills 2nd reading, is Senate Bill 1497.  
 18. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Senate Bill 1497.

21. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

22. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Revenue offers one  
 23. amendment.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Berning.

26. SENATOR BERNING:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. I have on the Secretary's Desk  
 28. a replacement amendment which does exactly what the committee  
 29. amendment does except to clarify and make it absolutely certain  
 30. that the funds collected by the County Treasurer will be credited  
 31. to the County Treasurer. So, with that explanation, the inclusion  
 32. of two words, four percent of, I would like to move to Table the  
 33. committee amendment so that we may adopt the Floor amendment.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. All right, Senator Berning has moved to Table Committee  
3. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1497. Is there any discussion?  
4. If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The  
5. Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1 is Tabled. Further amendments,  
6. Mr. Secretary?

7. SECRETARY:

8. No further committee amendments.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Are there amendments from the Floor?

11. SECRETARY:

12. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Berning.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Berning. Senator Berning.

15. SENATOR BERNING:

16. Thank you, Mr. President. As I indicated, this is the  
17. committee amendment with the inclusion of two words, four  
18. percent of, to make it absolutely certain that the funds  
19. collected by the County Treasurer are credited in the same  
20. amount to...I'm sorry, collected by the State Treasurer are  
21. credited in the same amount to the County Treasurer as those  
22. funds which are collected by the County Treasurer, four  
23. percent.

24. PRESIDENT:

25. Senator Berning has moved the adoption of Amendment No.  
26. 2 to Senate Bill 1497. Is there any discussion? If not, all  
27. in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have  
28. it. The amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?

29. SECRETARY:

30. No further amendments.

31. PRESIDENT:

7. Amendment No. 3 offered by Senator Carroll.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Carroll. Senator Carroll yields to Senator Maragos.

10. Thank you. Senator Maragos. Senator Savickas.

11. SENATOR MARAGOS:

12. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. This amendment  
13. was discussed in committee and the sponsor of the bill did  
14. not have any objection to it. What it does, it makes sure  
15. that when we defer the tax payment on Inheritance Tax that it'll  
16. be a reasonable rate of interest from six to twelve percent a  
17. year, because as you know, the inflated rates cause many taxpayers  
18. not to pay the taxes because they could make more money by  
19. being delinquent in taxes than they can by paying their taxes  
20. which they should. In fact, our State and our counties pay  
21. more money for the interest on warrants or even bonding  
22. procedures than we do by...than the taxpayer does when he...  
23. being delayed on this his tax payments. So, I'm in favor  
24. of the bill, however, I think, we should not reward any delinquent  
25. taxpayer if he's going to take...the deferred action approach,  
26. which has been in Senator Berning's bill, and I ask for  
27. adoption of Amendment No. 3.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. All right, Senator Maragos has moved the adoption of  
30. Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 1497. Is there any discussion?  
31. Senator Keats.

32. SENATOR KEATS:

33. The...the reason I wanted to object to this particular amendment,



1. is when you think about the initial logic as espoused by  
2. the sponsor of the amendment, it sounds reasonable, but there's  
3. only one point we have to remember. Whose money is this we're  
4. talking about to begin with? Is this the Government's money,  
5. or is it your own...or is it your money, and if we're going  
6. to argue that the Government can make more money with your  
7. money than you can, well you're probably right, but the point  
8. is it's your money to begin with. So, I would ask you to defeat  
9. this amendment, that it simply is a way for the Government to  
10. take more money from you faster.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Is there any further discussion? Senator Berning. That's  
13. why we have that little white switch, so I can...Senator Berning.

14. SENATOR BERNING:

15. I beg your pardon. Thank you, Mr. President, and members  
16. of the Senate. In contemplating this proposed amendment, I have  
17. to point out to you that to the best of my knowledge from in-  
18. formation furnished to me by our Secretary...our State Treasurer,  
19. the Internal Revenue Service only charges four percent on the  
20. first million dollars, and in the view of the representative  
21. Treasurer's Office, our proposal at six percent is entirely  
22. reasonable. It doesn't appear to me that we can justify prof-  
23. iteering on people who are all ready under stress. As you well  
24. know, this bill is proposed for the sole purpose of attempting  
25. to protect heirs who are suddenly confronted with a huge Inheritance  
26. Tax payment as the result of the demise of the principal be  
27. it a farmer or a small business operator. There is no loss  
28. of revenue to the State, it is merely a deferral and we are  
29. actually providing an interest rate at six percent, which in  
30. my opinion, and as I say the representative of the State  
31. Treasurer, is adequate. For that reason, Mr. President, and  
32. members of the Senate, I would beg the members of the Senate,  
33. to consider the plight of these people we are trying to help.  
We're not giving them anything, they are paying a reasonable

1. rate of interest, and I point out to you that interest rates  
2. are starting to go down now. When we fix this it probably is  
3. fixed for some time. The Federal Government on the other hand  
4. every two years, or thereabouts, can go up or can go down. I  
5. don't believe that we ought to react entirely to the Federal  
6. Government's rate and that...for that reason I do not recommend  
7. the four percent, but do recommend the six percent, and I think  
8. it is totally reasonable, and I would respectfully suggest that  
9. Amendment No. 3 ought to be rejected.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Is there further discussion with respect to Amendment No. 3?  
12. Senator Maragos may close.

13. SENATOR MARAGOS:

14. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Please under-  
15. stand what we're trying to do here. Right, now, when somebody  
16. inherits money or property he has to pay an Inheritance Tax  
17. in cash within the nine month period or twelve month period  
18. whenever the...period that the death took place. We are saying  
19. with this bill, with...which we supported in Revenue, and I support  
20. it now, he can defer, he or she, the heir can defer payment  
21. on Inheritance Tax for ten years, and pay it in installments.  
22. That is fine, except that we're saying you had to pay six  
23. percent interest throughout those years, and at the same time  
24. when that person, if he...if he defaults on his payment, he loses  
25. six percent interest. He doesn't loses, she...he or she does  
26. not have any incentive to pay on time, even under the deferred  
27. payment. We aren't giving them a big break, and we agree with  
28. it, and I have many clients who are in this particular situation.  
29. All we're saying with this amendment is that they pay just like  
30. you do with your Real Estate Taxes if you're delinquent, twelve  
31. percent a year, and why...if you can be delinquent in your Real  
32. Estate Tax and pay twelve percent, why can't you do it with your  
33. Inheritance Tax, and it's a more realistic figure in today's inflated

1. market, and I ask for the support of Amendment No. 3.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Senator Maragos has moved the adoption of Amendment No.  
4. 3 to Senate Bill 1497. Those in favor of the Amendment will  
5. vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open.  
6. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take  
7. the record. On that question, the Ayes are 25, the Nays are  
8. 28. The amendment fails. Further amendments?

9. SECRETARY:

10. No further amendments.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. 3rd reading. 1507. 1518. 1538, Senator Lemke. 1559,  
13. Senator Rhoads. 1572, Senator Weaver. On the Order of Senate  
14. Bills 2nd reading, is Senate Bill 1572. Read the bill, Mr.  
15. Secretary, please.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate Bill 1572.

18. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

19. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations II  
20. offers two amendments.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. Senator Buzbee.

23. SENATOR BUZBEE:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. The first amendment makes a  
25. reduction of one million four hundred forty-two thousand six  
26. hundred dollars to conform to...the bill to the Governor's level,  
27. and I would move its adoption.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Senator Buzbee has moved the adoption of Committee Amendment  
30. No. 1 to Senate Bill 1572. Is there any discussion? If not,  
31. all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have  
32. it. The amendment is adopted. Further amendments?

33. SECRETARY:

Committee Amendment No. 2.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Senator Buzbee.

3. SENATOR BUZBEE:

4. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 2 increases the  
5. Personal Services appropriations to the University of Illinois  
6. by two million two hundred and ninety-six thousand four hundred  
7. dollars to provide additional funds for salary increases equal  
8. to eight and a half percent of one hundred percent of the Personal  
9. Services base. The Governor's budget includes funds for salary  
10. increases equal to eight percent on ninety-five percent of the  
11. Personal Services base and I would move its adoption.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Buzbee has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to  
14. Senate Bill 1572. Is there any discussion? If there's no  
15. further discussion...Senator Regner.

16. SENATOR REGNER:

17. Senator Buzbee's feelings would be hurt if I didn't talk.  
18. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I'm not even going  
19. to mention the dollar amount involved in this bill and ensuing  
20. bills that come up regarding higher education, but the real fallacy  
21. of this amendment is, they are now saying there are two kinds of  
22. State employees, those that work for higher education and those  
23. that work in the rest of the State, and I think, Senator Buzbee,  
24. you're flying right into the face of your own amendments on various  
25. other administration bills that are before us. This isn't an  
26. eight percent increase like we're providing for all other agencies,  
27. it's not an eight and a half percent, as Senator Buzbee...called  
28. it. Simply because it's based on a hundred percent instead of  
29. ninety-five percent, it's actually a nine percent increase. So,  
30. what we're doing with an amendment like this, we're providing  
31. about twelve percent more for employees of various universities.  
32. We've taken a hardline stand in both Appropriations Committees  
33. regarding new jobs, and the elimination of long term vacancies.

1. With the universities there's no elimination of new jobs.  
2. Every single new job they ask for, they get. There's no  
3. elimination of vacancies either short or long, and there is  
4. no phase-in of pay increases which we're allowing in various  
5. other agencies. We're saying here's the money, you have it  
6. from July 1 on, and the real ludicrous thing of the whole  
7. ...whole issue is, we have less students this year, we're  
8. going to have less students next year, and ensuing years,  
9. and the universities admit it, and they show it on various reports,  
10. and what we're doing is, we're increasing the base for  
11. numbers of employees, increasing the base for the pay of  
12. employees, and they're going to have less and less work to  
13. do each year and you can bet your bottom dollar they're going  
14. to come in and ask for new jobs next year. So, all I say is  
15. defeat this amendment. The universities will still be treated  
16. a lot better than the other State agencies, but not quite as  
17. well as they're asking for. I urge a No vote on this Amend-  
18. ment.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. Further discussion? Senator Sommer.

21. SENATOR SOMMER:

22. Mr. President, and members. We have all heard the concern  
23. of the university faculty members, and the fact that they  
24. have not been...Mr. President, can we have an order back here?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Yes, will those not entitled to the Floor, please vacate,  
27. and if the staff has any conferences, will they please adjourn  
28. to a different room. Senator Sommer.

29. SENATOR SOMMER:

30. Well, Mr. President, we have heard the concern and this  
31. is an attempt by Senator Buzbee to respond to that concern, that  
32. we're losing faculty, that we're not rewarding our faculty  
33. sufficiently, and that's something that's arguable.

1. The Governor picks a figure, and we pick one, and we can argue  
2. about it here, and it's not a great concern of mine, frankly,  
3. what we do. The thing that does concern me is that we are  
4. rewarding, by Senator Buzbee's action, the high paid admin-  
5. istrators of these universities basically to a greater extent  
6. than...than we're rewarding the faculty members. The high paid  
7. administrator is going to get a big raise under this kind  
8. of proposal, the faculty member is going to get a small one,  
9. and we've done that year and year and year. Why don't we some  
10. time, Senator Buzbee, reward the people we say we're going to  
11. reward?

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Is there further discussion? The Chair has been asked  
14. leave, there's a Gentleman in the Press Box who wishes to take  
15. still photographs. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Further  
16. discussion? Senator Weaver.

17. SENATOR WEAVER:

18. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I  
19. think there should be a few comments made about some of the  
20. accusations here that universities, higher education, has not  
21. been cut one single job. Unlike the agencies of State Government,  
22. the...the Board of Higher Education does a whole lot of cutting  
23. before we ever get their budgets. Now, to say, Senator Regner,  
24. that there's been no cuts, no cut in program, no cut in requested  
25. personnel, is absolutely wrong, and I think you know very well  
26. that there are two classes of State employees. There has been for  
27. many years. Just for example, comparing State Civil Service  
28. employees, with University Civil Service employees, we've been  
29. trying to play catch-up for many years. Back in 1976, univeristy  
30. employees were 19.37 percent behind State employees. '77, they  
31. were seventeen and a half percent. '78, we got up to only 6.6,  
32. but then again in '79 they went back up 11.85 behind State employees.  
33. 1980 they're 13.37 behind State employees. So, you are

1. absolutely right, there are two classifications of employees.  
2. We've treated janitors in the State Capitol differently than  
3. we have in Higher Education by paying them about...on an  
4. average thirteen percent more to work in the Capitol than  
5. to work at any institution of higher education. We've been  
6. trying to play catch-up for years. This is a half of one  
7. percent more to try to continue to reverse that differential  
8. for all State employees.

9. PRESIDENT:

10. Is there further discussion? Senator Carroll.

11. SENATOR CARROLL:

12. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
13. Senate. While I rise in support of the amendment, I had asked  
14. that the bill be held and the grouping of bills, and I will  
15. ...I have, of course, withdrawn that request of the sponsorship  
16. with the understanding that I may ask them to bring it back  
17. prior to passage, and I do that for a reason. I support the  
18. concept that we have, in fact, underfunded the employees of  
19. these systems, because they have not gotten the increases we  
20. have given the State employees, as Senator Weaver so well  
21. pointed out, and they are, in fact, falling behind especially  
22. in the lower levels. However, the systems have been less than  
23. fair and honest with us. When we've asked them, can they  
24. find dollar for dollar the monies to provide these necessary  
25. salary increases, and take them from other areas of their  
26. budget, they, of course, came back and said absolutely not. While  
27. they feel that salaries may be necessary, it is not their  
28. priority, and I can read you, which I won't bother, their responses,  
29. or make them available, where each of the systems have said to  
30. us, in writing, to me, that they...this is not their priority  
31. they would, in fact, rather not have salaries for their employees  
32. than to eliminate some boondoggles, and if you read through the  
33. approach, no one has suggested taking away monies from necessary  
items, other than themselves. They said, gee, we'd have to do

1. without equipment, we'd have to do without lab supplies, we'd  
2. have to do without maintenance. Nobody is suggesting that.  
3. What we're saying is, things like...why should we be spending  
4. such a substantial portion, more than half of every dollar  
5. that goes to higher ed. goes for non-instructional costs.  
6. Sometimes as high as two-thirds of the dollars we provide  
7. to higher education goes to non-instructional costs.  
8. We spend great deals of money on all kinds of other programs  
9. totally related to the quality or quantity of education we're  
10. providing to the school children in higher ed. Why? I can't  
11. get an adequate answer from these systems other than; don't  
12. tell us not to give money for such things as intercollegiate  
13. athletics or for giving doctors who we are paying salaries  
14. money in the clinics to also provide what we say is free  
15. medical help to people in need. So, that one, they get  
16. paid a salary, and two they get paid...and equivalent of a  
17. per diem every time they give a service at a clinic. The  
18. administrative boondoggles are where this money should come  
19. from. I have no objection, and think we must, we must provide  
20. this extra half percent, but the monies shall come from these  
21. types of non-instructional costs. If I cannot accomplish it  
22. through this Chamber, this Session, it will not be the end  
23. of the try, and I have asked the sponsors, and they've agreed  
24. while moving it along in the process if we can come up with  
25. a solution, before the bills get out of here they would  
26. bring it back. If not, we will either try in the House or  
27. in Conference Committee, should they get there, or by resolution,  
28. looking at such things as, the unit costs studies. Looking at  
29. such things as what we are providing by rate equivalence, that  
30. really have shown that we are not giving the quality education  
31. for the dollar that we think we are spending the money for.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.



1. SENATOR RHOADS:

2. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate.  
3. As usual, Senator Carroll is staggering to the polls and  
4. voting dry. Senator Carroll has made some excellent arguments  
5. against this amendment, and then tells us that he's going to  
6. vote in favor of it. Senator Carroll.let's...let's go over  
7. the ground rules one more time, we're not talking about a  
8. half percent, we're talking about a full percent. We are  
9. talking about it all at once, rather than phased-in as Senator  
10. Regner alluded to. Now, after our meeting in the Approp. II  
11. Committee,the Vice-President of the University of Illinois, and  
12. Sam Baker came to see me as I'm sure they did...came to see  
13. other members of the committee to make their case. I'm still  
14. not convinced, and I hope a lot of you are listening to this  
15. debate, I know you have other concerns, but when you go back  
16. to other State employees in your district, and some of you  
17. have Corrections personnel, some of you have State Troopers,  
18. some of you have Department of Public Aid people in high  
19. concentrations. When you go back to those people, and defend  
20. one standard for the aristocracy of our university system  
21. and another standard for them a lower paid increase for  
22. them, I hope you remember and reflect back on this vote  
23. and think about it. This is a full percent more and it is  
24. all at once, and it's something that is inconsistent with  
25. what we're providing for other State employees.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Is there further discussion? Senator Hall.

28. SENATOR HALL:

29. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
30. the Senate. I would like for all of the Senators here today  
31. to make note that this is a red letter day. The House is not  
32. only going to vote on ERA, the Big 4 today, there has been a  
33. leak. The Big 4 is breaking up. Make note on your Calendar.

1. At long last the Big 4 is breaking up.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Further discussion? Senator Martin.

4. SENATOR MARTIN:

5. Would the sponsor yield?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. The sponsor indicates he will yield. Senator Martin.

8. SENATOR MARTIN:

9. Is it true, Senator Buzbee, that even though the different  
10. schools in the systems may have different requirements and needs  
11. in terms of salaries for its employees, that all of the  
12. schools in higher education will be treated alike through  
13. your series of amendments?

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Buzbee.

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(END OF REFL)

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1. SENATOR BUZBEE:

2. That is correct, Senator.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Martin.

5. SENATOR MARTIN:

6. Could you tell me, and I think you do remember, how many people  
7. applied for the job of President, or Chancellor, excuse me, of S.I.U.?

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Senator Buzbee.

10. SENATOR BUZBEE:

11. Yes, I would remind you we're talking about the University  
12. of Illinois Bill, at this time; but I...to the best of my  
13. knowledge, something like two hundred applied...or rather  
14. two hundred were considered by the Search Committee, I should  
15. say, rather than applied for the job of Chancellor of S.I.U.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Martin.

18. SENATOR MARTIN:

19. Then I would like to comment. And, I think, because all  
20. the bills are alike, in effect, whether we are talking about  
21. one university which may need it, or another, they are being  
22. treated identically. One of the reasons you do give pay  
23. increases, is not only to attract, but to get people into jobs  
24. because there aren't enough people that want to fill them at  
25. the rate at which you are paying. Could we pound a little?

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Yes, I think so. All right, will the members please  
28. be in their seats?

29. SENATOR MARTIN:

30. I would remind, probably everyone here, that especially  
31. at the higher levels in the university hierarchy; and  
32. especially at some of the schools, there are lines of people  
33. that want these, supposedly horrible jobs. We are graduating

1. people that are so eager to teach at any university, that  
2. the applications for almost every field are overflowing the  
3. file cabinets. Now, if this is so terrible; and it is so  
4. awful, for instance, to be a president of a university; two  
5. hundred people applied for S.I.U., to be chancellors and  
6. vice-chancellors, the numbers are incredible. In the fields  
7. of Liberal Arts, there are so many people that would like  
8. a job as an assistant professor or full professor, that I  
9. think it does boggle the mind. I don't know that there has  
10. been proof, especially at the higher levels, that this is  
11. the kind of increase that is needed; and I would remind  
12. you, that none of those involved were willing to say that  
13. they guaranteed they wouldn't take the pay increase, or  
14. that they would take a very low pay increase to pay those  
15. down further in the system that may well need the increase.  
16. This is just sort of throwing money at them all, and that  
17. isn't fair, it isn't right and it isn't just.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there further discussion? Senator Wooten.

20. SENATOR WOOTEN:

21. Couple...just a couple of questions. First, one of Senator  
22. Buzbee. Is this nine percent increase going to be applied  
23. equally to community college employees as well as to those  
24. in higher ed?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Buzbee.

27. SENATOR BUZBEE:

28. Yes.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Senator Wooten.

31. SENATOR WOOTEN:

32. A question for clarification of Senator Carroll. Senator  
33. Carroll, you mentioned an astounding percentage of dollars

1. that are spent on noneducational functions. Would not most  
2. of that...just for satisfaction of my own thought, would not  
3. the bulk of that be taken up with the fact that they are  
4. residential...these are residential schools, and doesn't much  
5. of that money go for that purpose?

6. PRESIDENT:

7. Senator Carroll.

8. SENATOR CARROLL:

9. No.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Wooten.

12. SENATOR WOOTEN:

13. Then what does it go for, specifically?

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Carroll.

16. SENATOR CARROLL:

17. All types of things. Operations and maintenance,  
18. executive type budgeting items, such as public relations,  
19. such as administrators, such as grants; all types of things.

20. PRESIDENT:

21. Senator Wooten.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. That doesn't make sense. I...I would think that...that  
24. you mentioned physical plant, I...if what you say is true,  
25. then, obviously, you should cut the program by a good...by  
26. more than a third in every dollar. It just doesn't make sense.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Is there any further discussion? Senator Buzbee may  
29. close.

30. SENATOR BUZBEE:

31. Thank you, Mr. President. I feel it necessary to rebut  
32. some of the arguments that have been made; and also, to clarify  
33. some of the comments. First of all, as Senator Weaver so

1. aptly pointed out, the statement that was made that there  
2. had been absolutely no cuts in the university systems, the  
3. community college system and so forth, is simply not correct.  
4. The reason it's not correct is, as these budget requests  
5. went before the Board of Higher Education; the Board of Higher  
6. Education cut a total of forty-two million dollars from the  
7. five-systems requests. That is the University of Illinois,  
8. Southern Illinois University, the Board of Regents, the Board  
9. of Governors and the Community College System. They had sub-  
10. mitted requests from their budget...in their budget request  
11. forms of some forty-two million dollars more than was allowed  
12. by the Board of Higher Education. Reference was made to the  
13. unit cost study; this is something that the Appropriations  
14. II Committee has been extremely interested in for at least  
15. two years now, actually we started dealing with it...year  
16. before last; so this, actually, is the third year that we  
17. have started addressing it. I have a personal interest in  
18. the unit cost study. I have said to the president, or to the  
19. head of each of the systems and to the various campus presidents,  
20. this is something we are absolutely serious about. We intend  
21. for you to continue to get your house more and more in order,  
22. as it pertains to operation and maintenance costs, as it  
23. pertains to administrative costs, as it pertains to the whole  
24. cost of operating higher education. They are getting their  
25. systems and their houses more and more in order. The Board  
26. of Higher Education has made substantial reallocations over  
27. the past two years of dollar requests, based on areas where  
28. they have identified that were inefficient in their operation.  
29. They have said to the various campuses and the various systems  
30. that you will get your house in order. In some cases, they  
31. have not gone far enough, in my opinion. We intend to stay  
32. on them. We intend to hound them, if you will. We anticipate  
33. in the fall, having the fiscal oversight hearings once again,

1. and we intend to, at that time, have the Board of Higher  
2. Education come in and tell us exactly what they have been  
3. doing to continue the reallocation of dollars. Comment  
4. was made about the difference between pay to university  
5. employees and other State employees. I would like to  
6. correct another common misconception. Senator Weaver pointed  
7. out that university employees are not on a step-rate pay  
8. plan as are our other State employees. As an example, if  
9. you are a State employee and you are covered under the  
10. Personnel Code, and you're in steps one through four; you  
11. automatically get a five percent pay increase each year.  
12. If you are in steps five and six, you get a five percent  
13. increase each year and a half. On top of that, of course,  
14. is the contractual arrangement which the Governor has made  
15. with the various State Employee Unions and with other persons  
16. who are employed by the State of Illinois who are not covered  
17. by a Union, that allows anywhere from a seven to eight percent  
18. or ten percent increase, in fact, in some cases, for other  
19. State employees. What we have done with the imposition of  
20. the eight percent solution on various State agencies, is to  
21. simply say that, okay, you go ahead and give those pay in-  
22. creases to those other State employees, we have no control  
23. over that, Governor; or we have no control over the Personnel  
24. Code, but you will live within the eight percent overall guide-  
25. line. What we are doing with the universities, is simply  
26. saying, again...once again, trying to catch up just a little  
27. bit. We won't near begin to catch up with this amendment,  
28. but just try to make up some of the difference. Mention was  
29. made of the State Troopers. You will recall that last year  
30. we gave the State Troopers a pay increase that amounted to  
31. close to five thousand dollars...

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator, will you conclude, please.

1. SENATOR BUZBEE:

2. Certainly. I would also like to point out that in  
3. the case of the University of Illinois, not one dime is  
4. spent out of this budget for athletic scholarships; mention  
5. was made of that. I would also like to say, in closing,  
6. Senator Hall, as far as the Big 4 are concerned, we are  
7. not breaking apart, we have just simply bent a little bit  
8. on this particular issue; we'll be back together again in  
9. just a few minutes, and I think it's a good...I think it's  
10. a good amendment, and it ought to be adopted.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Senator Buzbee has moved the adoption of Amendment No.  
13. 2 to Senate Bill 1572. Any further discussion? If not, all  
14. in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have  
15. it. The amendment is adopted. Further amendments?

16. SECRETARY:

17. No further amendments.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. 3rd reading. 1573. Senator Carroll, for what purpose  
20. do you rise?

21. SENATOR CARROLL:

22. Thank you, oh, Mr. President. It is with great pleasure  
23. that I introduce a former member of this Chamber, who spent  
24. many a day talking like this. Senator Marshall Korshak, Papa  
25. Marsh.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. Senator, welcome. 1573. Yes, Senator Regner.

28. SENATOR REGNER:

29. Mr. President, back here, Senator Sommer and myself and...  
30. several other members did ask for a roll call on that last  
31. amendment.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. You are entitled to a roll call. The question is the



1. adoption of the amendment on...Amendment No. 2 on 1572.  
2. Those in favor of Senator Buzbee's amendment will vote Aye.  
3. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have  
4. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the  
5. record. On that question, the Ayes are 33, the Nays are  
6. 14, none Voting Present. The amendment is adopted. Further  
7. amendments?  
8. SECRETARY:  
9. No further amendments.  
10. PRESIDENT:  
11. 3rd reading. Senator Buzbee, 1573? On the Order of  
12. Senate Bills 2nd reading, the bottom of page two, is Senate  
13. Bill 1573. Read the bill, please, Mr. Secretary.  
14. SECRETARY:  
15. Senate Bill 1573.  
16. (Secretary reads title of bill)  
17. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations II  
18. offers two amendments.  
19. PRESIDENT:  
20. Senator Buzbee.  
21. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
22. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 1 reduces by  
23. four hundred eighty-nine thousand eight hundred dollars from  
24. the bill; it makes that amount of reduction to put it in the  
25. Governor's Level of Funding and I would move it's adoption.  
26. PRESIDENT:  
27. Senator Buzbee has moved the adoption of Amendment No. 1  
28. to Senate Bill 1573. Is there any discussion? If not, all  
29. in favor signfiy by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have  
30. it. The amendment is adopted. Further amendments?  
31. SECRETARY:  
32. Committee Amendment No. 2.  
33. PRESIDENT:  
34. Senator Buzbee.

1. SENATOR BUZBEE:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. This is the amendment for  
3. Southern Illinois University, that we just had the discussion  
4. concerning the University of Illinois. This increases the  
5. Personal Services appropriations to Southern Illinois  
6. University by nine hundred twenty-three thousand dollars,  
7. to provide additional funds for salary increases equal to  
8. eight and a half percent on one hundred percent of the  
9. Personal Services base, and I would move its adoption.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Buzbee has moved the adoption of Amendment  
12. No. 2 to Senate Bill 1573. Is there any discussion? Senator  
13. Regner.

14. SENATOR REGNER:

15. Yes, Mr. President and members. All the same arguments  
16. hold true for Amendment No. 2 on this bill as Amendment No.  
17. 2 on the previous one. I do ask for a...an unfavorable  
18. roll call, but I would like to ask the sponsor a question.

19. PRESIDENT:

20. He indicates he will yield. Senator Regner.

21. SENATOR REGNER:

22. Senator Buzbee, might you consider, tomorrow, bringing  
23. this bill back for a further amendment that I would like to  
24. possibly offer and that is that we take the entire Personal  
25. Services line item and break it out into administration,  
26. faculty and other workers.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Buzbee.

29. SENATOR BUZBEE:

30. Senator, you know that I will certainly honor your  
31. request to bring the bill back at any time. I would like  
32. to get the bills out of here this week or early if we can;  
33. however, I can assure you, at this point, that I would

1. oppose your amendment; but I would certainly give you that...  
2. that opportunity.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

5. SENATOR RHOADS:

6. A question of the sponsor of the amendment.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. He indicates he will yield. Senator Rhoads.

9. SENATOR RHOADS:

10. Senator Buzbee, I asked you in committee a similar question  
11. to Senator Regner's and I...you didn't give an answer at  
12. that time. You said you would give me an answer on the Floor,  
13. regarding breaking this out for those people making over thirty  
14. thousand dollars a year. As Senator Sommer had pointed out  
15. earlier, we are in a position where the highest paid in-  
16. dividuals are getting the biggest increases, because it is  
17. an across the board percentage increase. And, yet, the  
18. argument was made in committee, in testimony, that the  
19. people that we are trying to...help here, or that you are  
20. trying to help with your amendment, are the middle-income  
21. faculty between twenty and thirty thousand dollars a year.  
22. What's wrong with having a cutoff, since this, as they say,  
23. is their policy, anyway? Would you support such an amend-  
24. ment?

25. PRESIDENT:

26. Senator Buzbee.

27. SENATOR BUZBEE:

28. In...in response to your last question, Senator, the  
29. answer is no, I would not support such an amendment. But  
30. I would like to address the issue just a second, and that  
31. is that all of the systems, have for the last several years,  
32. as a matter of fact, and for this year, have once again  
33. indicated that their percentage of increase for the higher

1. paid administrators, as you point out, will be a much smaller  
2. percentage of increase than for the lower paid faculty and  
3. staff members...the middle income and the lower income; that  
4. the lower the income, the higher percentage. In other words,  
5. they don't give a flat across the board increase...percentage  
6. increase to everybody. They give a smaller percentage in-  
7. crease to the higher paid personnel, and then as they come  
8. down to the lower paid personnel, they give a higher per-  
9. centage increase.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

12. SENATOR RHOADS:

13. Well, then, speaking to the amendment, as Senator Buzbee  
14. well knows; even though the percentages may be smaller at  
15. the upper end, because of the base that they are based on,  
16. in real dollar terms we are talking about three thousand dollars  
17. for somebody making over fifty thousand dollars a year, and,  
18. perhaps, eleven hundred to fifteen hundred for the average  
19. faculty member. Now, remember, we are talking about a Chancellor,  
20. here, who has his house paid for by the State, a State car,  
21. all kinds of expenses picked up by the State that ordinary  
22. citizens, as Senator Martin said in committee, just aren't  
23. entitled to. I...I...I think it's a...a perfectly reasonable  
24. request to make, Senator Buzbee, and I hope you would change  
25. your mind tomorrow, and support the amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. Is there further discussion? Senator Buzbee.

28. SENATOR BUZBEE:

29. In...in closing, Mr. President, I would say again, Senator  
30. Rhoads, that this is a discussion we've had with the univer-  
31. sities for years; and you will recall back when Senator Harris  
32. was the President of the Senate, Speaker Blair was the Speaker  
33. that there was an amendment which was offered in the House of

1. Representatives, which tied up all of higher education budgets  
2. for several days, as a matter of fact; that wanted to break  
3. out by one particular occupational group in...in the  
4. universities to identify the exact dollars that they were  
5. going to get. There was, the eight years that I've been  
6. here, the only time that I'm aware of, a joint caucus in  
7. the Senate of the Republicans and Democrats to discuss that  
8. amendment, and it was unanimously agreed at that time, that  
9. we would not support that amendment...if they did not get  
10. their house in order, as the days went on, as the years  
11. went on, that we might, in fact, start doing that sort of  
12. thing; not just for one occupational group, but for all  
13. of them. As it turned out, I am convinced, that they have  
14. been getting their house in order. The University of  
15. Illinois, Southern Illinois University, the Board of Governors,  
16. the Board of Regents and the Community Colleges have all,  
17. over the years, attempted and have, in fact, succeeded in  
18. making sure that the lower and the middle paid employees get  
19. a higher percentage increase than the administrators, who  
20. are at the top end of the...of the...of the stick.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. The question is, shall Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill  
23. 1573 be adopted. Those in favor...there is a request for a  
24. roll call. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay.  
25. The voting is open. Have all those voted who wish? Have  
26. all those voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
27. the Ayes are 32, the Nays are 13. Amendment No. 2 is adopted.  
28. Are there further amendments?

29. SECRETARY:

30. No further committee amendments.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

32. Are there amendments from the Floor?

33. SECRETARY:

1. Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Johns.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

3. Senator Johns.

4. SENATOR JOHNS:

5. Thank you, Mr. President. This amendment lost in  
6. committee seven to seven. And, this amendment is to allow  
7. the prevailing wage to be paid to the...to the Laborers  
8. Union on the campus up at S.I.U. For several years now,  
9. S.I.U. and its administration has held this group back...  
10. continually...working them over, so to speak, and...and  
11. breaking their backs. They utilize them for electricians,  
12. plumbers, bricklayers, whatever; yet, they refuse to pay  
13. them the prevailing wage. This is two hundred thousand  
14. dollars to take care of that wage, and...and the administration  
15. told me, "yeah, we'll pay it if you can get it." The Governor  
16. told these union people at a...at a tax conference in Carbon-  
17. dale, "get it on there and I'll approve it." So, here's  
18. his chance, for the administration and for the Governor, and  
19. I move for its favorable adoption.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

21. Senator Regner.

22. SENATOR REGNER:

23. Mr. President, you know this...this is very humorous,  
24. Senator Johns' sponsoring an amendment such as this. The  
25. labor, as he is talking about, got their deal several years  
26. ago when they got full-time work, and now, they want to renege  
27. on their deal. I see no reason we should support them in  
28. the renegeing on a deal they made several years ago; and I  
29. would urge the defeat of this amendment.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

31. Is there further discussion? Senator Keats.

32. SENATOR KEATS:

33. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Regner brought up

1. the key point that the laborers involved were given full-time  
2. work, so there are times when they are being paid to do  
3. nothing; but here's the second factor, the prevailing wage  
4. does not happen to be the prevailing wage in the general  
5. vicinity of where they work. This is a prevailing wage that  
6. is figured, that in some cases, is actually several hundred  
7. miles away, so they would be getting, not only a renege on  
8. their deal of full-time work when they aren't always working  
9. full time; but the second point, they are getting a prevailing  
10. wage that doesn't happen to be the prevailing wage in their  
11. area to begin with. I would ask you to vote against it.  
12. Thank you.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

14. Senator Berning.

15. SENATOR BERNING:

16. Thank you, Mr. President. In all good conscience, I  
17. have to rise in opposition to this amendment. Since it  
18. appears to me that we are not taking into consideration that  
19. the same individual type employee in the private sector, who  
20. has to work to pay the taxes to pay these wages and the other  
21. expenses of this State of Illinois, are not guaranteed year  
22. round employment. It's an insult to those other working class  
23. people, and in my opinion, there is no justification for this  
24. amendment; and I strongly urge the defeat.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Is there further discussion? Senator Hall.

27. SENATOR HALL:

28. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
29. the Senate. I rise in support of this amendment. I would  
30. just like to know from Senator Regner, when you say they  
31. reneged, what are you talking about, Senator Regner? What...  
32. what did they do? He strikes like the invisible...get over  
33. there, 4. You're back here trying to make a deal; you're

1. trying to get...if I could just get that breach widened...now...  
2. now, you made a statement...what have you got to back that  
3. up? What do you mean they reneged, with the cost of living  
4. and everything rising today, are you trying to say that...  
5. that...when you say they reneged, what are you talking about?

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

7. Senator Regner may respond.

8. SENATOR REGNER:

9. The...the deal they made, Senator Hall, was if they  
10. received the prevailing wage rate, that they would be satisfied  
11. with that amount, as long as they got full-time work. Now  
12. they are wanting to have extra increases, and that is  
13. reneging on your word from...not your word, but their word,  
14. from several years ago.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

16. Senator Hall.

17. SENATOR HALL:

18. Well, I rise in support. All they are asking is the  
19. prevailing wage. Now, to stand here and say, today when  
20. the cost of living, when everything else has risen, we have  
21. given a raise to everybody; we even...we took a raise. Every-  
22. body needs a raise today. To say that you want them to  
23. stay at a wage that they agreed to some years back; it's  
24. just not right. This amendment should go on, and I hope  
25. that everybody supports this amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. Is there further...Senator Regner.

28. SENATOR REGNER:

29. Just...just to point out to Senator Hall that they are  
30. receiving a raise, but they're under...under this amendment,  
31. they are receiving an extra raise, and they don't deserve  
32. it.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)



1. Is there further discussion? Senator Newhouse.

2. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I rise  
4. as one who is opposed to the notion of prevailing wages.  
5. What it does is protect a very few laborers at the expense  
6. of a very many, as Senator Keats said, and he's right there.  
7. The problem, of course, is that we're doing it all over  
8. the city, and all over the State; and to exclude this group,  
9. seems to be just patently unfair. The Governor came out  
10. and made a big speech in favor of prevailing wages; we  
11. ought to wipe it out completely, but if we don't wipe it  
12. out, we certainly ought not penalize a group that...that  
13. is not making prevailing wages where others are making  
14. that scale. I rise in support of your amendment, Senator.  
15. It's a good amendment.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

17. Senator Weaver.

18. SENATOR WEAVER:

19. Well, thank you, Mr. President. I think that we have  
20. taken enough away from the administrators. We've taken away  
21. their power to negotiate for salaries, and has been pointed  
22. out, they are going to participate in this increase in  
23. appropriations; there will be more money for the universities,  
24. whether it be Southern or whatever to negotiate, and I think  
25. they should be allowed to have that privilege. So I would  
26. urge a defeat of this amendment.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

28. Is there further discussion? Senator Johns may close.

29. SENATOR JOHNS:

30. Mr. President, these people have suffered long enough.  
31. I would like for the Democratic Party to stand up and show  
32. that they really care about the laboring class of people.  
33. We've heard all kinds of...speeches today about administration,

1. staff, secretaries, everything else. Here's...here's the  
2. downtrodden. We need to take care of them. Thank you, Mr.  
3. President.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

5. The question is shall Amendment No. 3 be adopted.  
6. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The  
7. voting is open. Have all those voted who wish? Take  
8. the record. On that question, the Ayes are 24, the Nays  
9. are 26. Amendment No. 3 fails. Are there further amend-  
10. ments?

11. SECRETARY:

12. No further amendments.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

14. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1574, Senator Shapiro. Read  
15. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

16. SECRETARY:

17. Senate Bill 1574.

18. (Secretary reads title of bill)

19. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations  
20. offers two amendments.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. Senator Buzbee.

23. SENATOR BUZBEE:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 1 reduces the  
25. Board of Regents funding request to the Governor's allocation  
26. level; a reduction of five hundred fifty-nine thousand dollars  
27. in General Revenue, and I would move its adoption.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

29. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment  
30. No. 4 to Senate Bill 1574 be adopted. Those in favor indicate  
31. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
32. No. 4 is adopted. Just a moment...it's Amendment No. 1, the  
33. board...didn't display that number. It is Amendment No. 1 to

1. Senate Bill 1574. Are there further amendments?

2. SECRETARY:

3. Committee Amendment No. 2.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

5. Senator Buzbee.

6. SENATOR BUZBEE:

7. Thank you, Mr. President. This amendment...increases

8. the Personal Services appropriations for the Board of Regents

9. system by eight hundred seventy-five thousand dollars, to

10. provide additional funds for salary increases, equal to

11. eight and a half percent of one hundred percent of the Personal

12. Services base. This is doing, for the Board of Regents,

13. what we have just done for the University of Illinois and

14. for Southern Illinois University, and I would move its

15. adoption; and I understand, to save time and debate, if I

16. just ask for a roll call, at this point, that we can go

17. ahead and make our points with our electronic voting marvel.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

19. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment

20. No. 2 be adopted. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed

21. Nay. The voting is open. Have all those voted who wish?

22. Have all those voted who wish? Take the record. On that

23. question, the Ayes are 34, the Nays are 13. Amendment No.

24. 2 to Senate Bill 1574 is adopted. Are there further amendments?

25. SECRETARY:

26. No further amendments.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

28. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1571, Senator Buzbee. Do you

29. wish to call 1571? Senator Buzbee?

30. SENATOR BUZBEE:

31. Yes, but I would prefer to go ahead and get 1575 dealt

32. with first, then back to 1571.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

1. All right. Senate Bill 1575. Read the bill, Mr.  
2. Secretary.

3. SECRETARY:

4. Senate Bill 1575.

5. (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations  
7. II offers two amendments.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

9. Senator Buzbee.

10. SENATOR BUZBEE:

11. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment...Amendment No. 1,  
12. reduces the Board of Governor's funding request to the  
13. Governor's allocation level; a reduction of four hundred  
14. eighteen thousand three hundred dollars, and I would move  
15. its adoption.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

17. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment  
18. No. 1 to Senate Bill 1575 be adopted. Those in favor indicate  
19. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
20. No. 1 is adopted. Are there further amendments?

21. SECRETARY:

22. Committee Amendment No. 2.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

24. Senator Buzbee.

25. SENATOR BUZBEE:

26. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 2 increases  
27. the Personal Services appropriation for the Board of Governors'  
28. system by seven hundred ninety-four thousand one hundred dollars,  
29. to provide additional funds for salary increases...equal to  
30. eight and a half percent of one hundred percent of the Personal  
31. Services base. This is the amendment that does for the  
32. Board of Governors, exactly what we have done for the University  
33. of Illinois, Southern Illinois University and the Board of  
34. Regents. I would move its adoption and ask for the roll call.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
2. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment  
3. No. 2 be adopted. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye.  
4. Those opposed. There is a request for a roll call. The  
5. question is shall Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 1575 be  
6. adopted. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The  
7. voting is open. Have all those voted who wish? Have all  
8. those voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
9. the Ayes are 33, the Nays are 16. Amendment No. 2 to  
10. Senate Bill 1575 is adopted. Are there further amendments?

11. SECRETARY:

12. No...no further committee amendments.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

14. Are there amendments from the Floor?

15. SECRETARY:

16. No Floor amendments.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

18. 3rd reading. Senator Buzbee, do you wish to return  
19. Senate Bill 1571? Do we have leave? Leave is granted.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Senate Bill 1571.

22. (Secretary reads title of bill)

23. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations  
24. II offers three amendments.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Senator Buzbee.

27. SENATOR BUZBEE:

28. Thank you, Mr. President. This amendment makes the  
29. following changes, as per the Governor's allocation:  
30. reduction from eleven million dollars to ten million nine  
31. hundred thousand for the private higher education; a re-  
32. duction of a total of one hundred thousand dollars, educational  
33. T.V., a reduction of two hundred fifty thousand dollars,

1. fifth pathway medical grants, a reduction of six hundred  
2. dollars, and the health education grants, a reduction of two  
3. hundred ten thousand nine hundred dollars; for a total  
4. reduction of five hundred sixty-one thousand five hundred  
5. dollars to reflect the Governor's allocation, and I would  
6. move its adoption.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

8. Is there discussion? The question is shall  
9. Amendment No. 1 be adopted. Those in favor indicate by  
10. saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
11. No. 1 is adopted. Are there further amendments?

12. SECRETARY:

13. Committee Amendment No. 2.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

15. Senator Buzbee.

16. SENATOR BUZBEE:

17. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 2 increases  
18. the Personal Services appropriation of the Board of Higher  
19. Education by nine thousand three hundred dollars, to provide  
20. additional funds for salary increases equal to eight and a  
21. half percent of one hundred percent of the Personal Services  
22. base. This is doing exactly, for the Board, what we have  
23. done for the four systems so far, and I would move its adoption  
24. and ask for a roll call to save time.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Senator Sommer doesn't want to save time. Senator  
27. Sommer.

28. SENATOR SOMMER:

29. Senator Buzbee, we hear a great deal of concern about  
30. pay for faculty members; my mail is full of it. How many  
31. faculty members and teachers work for the Board of Higher  
32. Education?

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

1. Senator Buzbee.

2. SENATOR BUZBEE:

3. Senator, it's my understanding that...that all of them  
4. are either...are previous faculty members or administrators.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

6. Senator...Senator Sommer.

7. SENATOR SOMMER:

8. Did you say "previous faculty members?" Are they  
9. faculty members today? Of course they're not faculty members.  
10. You're rewarding the bureaucrats again. Take a look at their  
11. salary schedules, those of you who don't know, they're all  
12. high. They are really high, and he's doing the same thing  
13. that he did before with the universities; but in this case,  
14. it's not at all defensible.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

16. Is there further discussion? Senator Kenneth Hall.

17. SENATOR HALL:

18. I would just like to relinquish my time to Senator  
19. Sommer. I love this going on between the Big 4. I re-  
20. linquish my time.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

22. He doesn't want anymore. Is there further discussion?  
23. Senator Buzbee may close.

24. SENATOR BUZBEE:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. I would say that...that in  
26. rebuttal, these are the folks that we are going to give ninety-  
27. three hundred dollars, total, for the salary increases that  
28. we're talking about. These are the folks that protect us  
29. from all of those moneygrabbers that you folks are concerned  
30. about in the higher education field. These are the folks that...  
31. that...that protect us from the taxeaters. These are the  
32. folks...these are the folks that cut forty-two million dollars  
33. out of higher education requests this year, and since they

1. are not under the Personnel Code as are other State employees,  
2. what's good for the goose is good for the gander; or  
3. whatever. So, I am asking for ninety-three hundred dollars  
4. and would ask for a roll call.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

6. The question is shall Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill  
7. 1571 be adopted. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed  
8. Nay. The voting is open. Have all those voted who wish?  
9. Have all those voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
10. question, the Ayes are 24, the Nays are 23. Amendment No.  
11. 2 to Senate Bill 1571...there is a request for a verification,  
12. by Senator Sommer. Will the members please be in their  
13. seats...and I assume it's for the affirmative vote. Will  
14. the members please be in their seats. The Secretary will  
15. read the affirmative vote.

16. SECRETARY:

17. The following voted in the affirmative: Becker, Berman,  
18. Bruce, Buzbee, Carroll, Collins, D'Arco, Davidson, Donnewald,  
19. Egan, Hall, Joyce...Jerome Joyce, Maragos, McClendon, McMillan,  
20. Merlo, Nash, Netsch, Sangmeister, Savickas, Vadalabene,  
21. Washington, Weaver, Mr. President.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

23. Senator Sommer.

24. SENATOR SOMMER:

25. Senator Egan?

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. Is Senator...Senator Egan is in the aisle. On that  
28. question, the Ayes are 24, the Nays are 23. Amendment No.  
29. 2 to Senate Bill 1571 is adopted. Are there further amend-  
30. ments?

31. SECRETARY:

32. Committee Amendment No. 3.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)



1. Senator Buzbee.

2. SENATOR BUZBEE:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 3 is a good

4. amendment. I...I just now found it. I know it's a good

5. amendment. This is a two hundred fifty thousand dollar...

6. allocation to match Federal funds for transportation centers,

7. and I would move its adoption.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

9. Senator Regner.

10. SENATOR REGNER:

11. What is it really?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

13. Senator Carroll.

14. SENATOR CARROLL:

15. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of

16. the Senate. I'm jumping in, Senator Buzbee. It is my...

17. my recall is that this is a consortium of all of the higher

18. ed institutions doing a transportation grant...a study...of...

19. Federally funded study of public transportation that has

20. been allowed even with the cuts proposed by Congress. And

21. this consortium would be of all the institutions of higher

22. ed, and this is a match that is necessary in order for us to

23. obtain this program.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

25. Senator Buzbee.

26. SENATOR BUZBEE:

27. I would just expand on that, it is...it is matching funds

28. to a consortium of all of the institutions of higher education

29. in the City of Chicago, including the privates; and this is

30. our match for that, and it's a good amendment, Senator Egan.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

32. Senator Berning.

33. SENATOR BERNING:

1. Just a question of the sponsor. What is a transportation  
2. center? That's what you said this was for.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

4. Senator Buzbee.

5. SENATOR BUZBEE:

6. Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Berning.  
7. It is a consortium, Senator, that's the only thing I can  
8. tell you, because that's all that I know. It's a con-  
9. sortium, all of the institutions of higher education in the  
10. City of Chicago, to be able to...to pick up funds from the  
11. Feds that would allow for the transportation of students  
12. among the various universities in the City of Chicago.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

14. Senator Berning.

15. SENATOR BERNING:

16. Mr...Mr. President, I don't want to challenge the integrity  
17. of the sponsor; but now, we have been told that this is for  
18. a transportation center, and I was interested in what a  
19. transportation center is. It seems to me that could be a  
20. garage, or it could be an RTA Terminal; but to say that it's a  
21. consortium, now, to study transportation; and perhaps, pro-  
22. vide transportation for students, I think, is begging the  
23. issue. I don't really know how much money is involved here;  
24. but whether it's Federal money as bait again, or not, the  
25. inevitable course of these things is to increase year after  
26. year after year. Now I notice, that in this Senate Bill 1571,  
27. we have in Section 1, fifty-eight thousand two hundred dollars  
28. for travel. And, in Section 7, for travel, we have another  
29. five thousand dollars; and in Section 8, we have another  
30. travel, six thousand dollars, and another one for six hundred  
31. seventy dollars. What I am attempting to point out is, that  
32. we seem to be appropriating an inordinate amount of money  
33. for travel, which is essentially transportation. And I am

1. curious as to how we dovetail what we are already considering  
2. in this appropriation bill, with the concept that we ought to  
3. be funding along with Uncle Sam and his doling out of our  
4. dollars, a consortium or transportation center study; the  
5. objectives, of which, I'm not just sure that anybody has...  
6. given us at this point.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

8. Senator Sommer.

9. SENATOR SOMMER:

10. Just a brief question for Senator Carroll. Have you  
11. gotten your instructions right from the gallery?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

13. Senator Carroll.

14. SENATOR CARROLL:

15. He reminded me to respond to Senator Berning, that  
16. this is not for transportation of people; it has nothing to  
17. do with physical operations, it is strictly a research project;  
18. and those are the instructions from the gallery.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

20. Senator Regner.

21. SENATOR REGNER:

22. Yes, Mr. President, just to finish the question that I  
23. had asked prior to this, before I was interrupted. Did the Board of  
24. Higher Education request this project, Senator Carroll?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

26. Senator Carroll.

27. SENATOR CARROLL:

28. They generally don't speak to me, right now. They had  
29. approved...my understanding is that they had approved it, and  
30. it was not in the Governor's budget; we don't bother with Dr.  
31. Bob's fiction book that often. It was not in the fiction  
32. book, but it has...my understanding is, it has met with the  
33. approval of all approving bodies.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

2. Senator Regner.

3. SENATOR REGNER:

4. Well, my understanding B.H.E. cut it out themselves  
5. before they even presented it. Your answer...your first  
6. part, was right...or wrong; your second part was probably  
7. right that you're never sure what's in the green book.  
8. But this request was not asked for by the Board of Higher  
9. Education in their final request; they cut it themselves  
10. before they even presented it to the Bureau of the Budget.  
11. My understanding is that it's the same as a subsidy to  
12. mass transportation. Now, last fall, as you all know, we  
13. took away all subsidies for the RTA; so, if we are going to  
14. do this, where it really belongs is in the Department of  
15. Transportation as a subsidy to mass transit to the RTA area  
16. going back to where we were before. I objected to the Governor's  
17. position, as you know, last fall allowing subsidies to stand  
18. for downstate; taking them all away from the RTA area and  
19. having that area pay for it themselves. I think it's wrong  
20. and I think, if, Senator Carroll, you are persistent in this,  
21. I think what you should do is withdraw it from this particular  
22. bill and add it to the Department of Transportation bill as  
23. a subsidy to the RTA.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

25. Senator Carroll.

26. SENATOR CARROLL:

27. Senator Regner, just to ease your mind and misapprehensions,  
28. this was not, as I am informed, this was not turned down by  
29. B.H.E. In fact, the potential grant came in after the sub-  
30. mission of the budget, which is why it was not included with  
31. the budget. The potential for the grant came in much later  
32. in date, and that's why it was presented direct to us, and  
33. met with approval. It has nothing to do with the RTA. It

1. is not a grant to the RTA, nor to my knowledge to any employee  
2. of the RTA. It is a consortium of the institutes of higher  
3. learning to do research on transportation, which could go  
4. within or without the RTA area. There is no coordination of  
5. the two.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

7. Senator Martin.

8. SENATOR MARTIN:

9. Good staff work over here is going to come to the rescue  
10. of Senator Carroll and Senator Buzbee. The staff is now  
11. aware of what this is for. It's for Medley Moving.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

13. Senator Rhoads.

14. SENATOR RHOADS:

15. Well, Senator Carroll the...Senator Carroll, the key  
16. question is do we have a letter from Dr. Bob on this amount?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

18. Senator Carroll.

19. SENATOR CARROLL:

20. We have letters from Dr. Bob on any subject at any  
21. time.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

23. Senator Rhoads...Senator Rhoads.

24. SENATOR RHOADS:

25. Let's...let's not evade the question, here...has the  
26. Bureau of the Budget signed off on this? You made the re-  
27. presentation that Board of Higher Ed has reversed itself on  
28. this, is that correct?

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

30. Senator...Buzbee.

31. SENATOR BUZBEE:

32. We do not have a letter from Dr. Bob on this particular  
33. issue, Senator. This is...is Federal funds that came in;

1. the B.H.E. became aware of, after the budget proposal had  
2. been submitted; and this is simply...and this is simply  
3. their attempt to capture those Federal funds for this study,  
4. which is needed. And, so, that's why the...the funds are  
5. being requested with this amendment.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

7. Senator Rhoads.

8. SENATOR RHOADS:

9. I thought you were using two hundred and fifty-two  
10. thousand of State dollars here to match...to recapture a like  
11. amount of Federal funds; but there is an expenditure of  
12. State dollars, and you do not have a letter from Mandeville,  
13. right?

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

15. Senator Buzbee.

16. SENATOR BUZBEE:

17. You are correct, Senator.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

19. Senator Grotberg.

20. SENATOR GROTBURG:

21. Thank you, Mr...President...this may be my last speech.  
22. I am going to support the Scholarship Funds that have been  
23. much more controversial than this, but we've got Chicago  
24. Area Transportation Study Committee, we've got the Commission  
25. on Transportation, we've got the Northwestern University  
26. Transportation Center, the University of Illinois Transportation.  
27. It's just like the Energy Department; everybody studies it,  
28. and nobody does anything about it. We are throwing millions  
29. of Illinois taxpayers'dollars down the sewer already, on  
30. impossible studies that they mail out to us and nothing ever  
31. happens on. I just regret that the proponents of this bill happen to be  
32. good friends of mine, because I am going to vote No, and I  
33. would urge everybody else to vote No. If there's one thing

1. we don't need, it's another study on transportation.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

3. Is there further discussion? Senator Buzbee may close...

4. or do you wish a roll call?

5. SENATOR BUZBEE:

6. I would ask for a favorable vote. No, Sir, I don't  
7. wish a roll call. I would just like to have a favorable  
8. voice vote.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

10. There is a request for a roll call. The question is  
11. shall Amendment No. 3 be adopted...on Senate Bill 1571.  
12. Those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting  
13. is open. Have all those voted who wish? Have all those  
14. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the  
15. Ayes are 20, the Nays are 28. Amendment No. 3 to Senate  
16. Bill 1571 fails. Are there further amendments?

17. SECRETARY:

18. No further amendments.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

20. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1576, Senator Bruce. Read  
21. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Senate Bill 1576.

24. (Secretary reads title of bill)

25. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations  
26. II offers two amendments.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

28. Senator Buzbee.

29. SENATOR BUZBEE:

30. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 1 reduces the  
31. Community College Board Funding request to the Governor's  
32. allocation level; a reduction of two million twelve thousand  
33. eight hundred dollars in General Revenue, and I would move  
34. its adoption.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

2. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment  
3. No. 1 to Senate Bill 1576 be adopted. Those in favor indicate  
4. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
5. No. 1 is adopted. Are there further amendments?

6. SECRETARY:

7. Committee Amendment No. 2.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

9. Senator Buzbee.

10. SENATOR BUZBEE:

11. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 2 increases  
12. the appropriations to the Illinois Community College Board  
13. by one million six hundred sixty-seven thousand two hundred  
14. dollars, to provide additional funds for salary increases  
15. equal to eight and a half percent of one hundred percent of  
16. the Personal Services base. This does for the Community  
17. Colleges exactly what we have done for the four senior...  
18. four senior systems, and I would ask for a roll call and save  
19. the debate.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

21. Is there discussion? Senator Keats.

22. SENATOR KEATS:

23. Senator Buzbee, I am asking a question, this is not debate.  
24. You are saying that Community College instructors are getting  
25. eight and a half percent. We are being told that they are  
26. getting twelve and a half percent, where the fact...example  
27. U of I will get, call it nine percent or...we want. It  
28. is my understanding the Community Colleges are, in reality,  
29. getting twelve and in some cases twelve and a half percent.  
30. Have you, in this amendment, cut them back to the eight and  
31. a half-nine percent bracket, or is there from some other mis-  
32. chievous manner, a way that they are going to come up with a  
33. three percent above the members of the senior universities?



1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

2. Senator Buzbee.

3. SENATOR BUZBEE:

4. Well, I would respond, Senator...you'll recall the funding  
5. formula for Community Colleges, they get their revenue from  
6. three sources; State dollars, tuition and local property  
7. taxes, as opposed to the senior institutions which only get  
8. State dollars and tuition. So, as a result, approximately  
9. fifty percent of their funds come from...or maybe, I guess  
10. it's somewhat less than fifty percent, but anyhow, a significant  
11. portion of the Community Colleges' funds come from local  
12. property taxes. This allows...whatever the local board  
13. decides, and I know in the case right here in Springfield,  
14. as an example, two people that we know pretty well in this  
15. Chamber, serve on that Community College Board; and they can  
16. allocate those dollars as they see fit. The only thing we're  
17. saying is, we're putting the same...restriction, or the  
18. same increase, whichever way you look at it; the glass is  
19. half full or half empty; we're putting the same...rules as  
20. far as the State dollars are concerned on the Community  
21. Colleges that we put on the senior institutions, and if there  
22. is any difference that they can add on for the Community  
23. College professor, it is due to their local property tax revenue.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

25. Senator Keats.

26. SENATOR KEATS:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. In other words, to...to put that  
28. in plain English, yes, the Community College teachers are getting  
29. twelve and a half and thirteen percent where U of I is in  
30. reality, going to get nine percent. In other words, by supporting  
31. this particular amendment, we are giving Community College  
32. teachers, with less credentials and a slightly different job,  
33. substantially more pay than the faculty at the U of I, who

1. have higher credentials and a substantially tougher job. I  
2. think, perhaps, we should reconsider that amendment. Thank  
3. you.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

5. Senator De Angelis.

6. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

7. Thank you, Mr. President. A question of the sponsor.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

9. He indicates he will respond.

10. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

11. I guess I should really direct this to Senator Buzbee  
12. rather than Senator Bruce. Senator Buzbee, are the TRE grants  
13. still in this, or have they been diminished, or have they been  
14. eliminated completely?

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

16. Senator Bruce indicates that he will respond.

17. SENATOR BRUCE:

18. Senator, those will be taken out on the next bill, 1577,  
19. and the amendment will be offered by Senator Nimrod, which I  
20. plan to support and that will take out the...Tax Rate Equal-  
21. ization. That is not in the appropriation. Oh...I'm...I'm  
22. sorry, but the appropriation was eliminated in Amendment 1,  
23. not this amendment. So, it is out, right now. The substantive  
24. language will be taken care of by Senator Nimrod on 1577, the  
25. next bill.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

27. Is there further discussion? Senator...Senator Buzbee  
28. requests a roll call. The question is shall Amendment No. 2  
29. to Senate Bill 1576 be adopted. Those in favor indicate...  
30. those in favor vote Aye. Those opposed Nay. The voting is  
31. open. Have all those voted who wish? Have all those voted  
32. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are  
33. 31, the Nays are 16. Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 1576 is

1. adopted. Are there further amendments?  
2. SECRETARY:  
3. No further committee amendments.  
4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
5. Are there amendments from the Floor?  
6. SECRETARY:  
7. No Floor amendments.  
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
9. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1577, Senator Bruce. Read the  
10. bill, Mr. Secretary.  
11. SECRETARY:  
12. Senate Bill 1577.  
13. (Secretary reads title of bill)  
14. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Higher Education  
15. offers one amendment.  
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
17. Senator Bruce.  
18. SENATOR BRUCE:  
19. Either I or Senator Nimrod can explain...Senator Nimrod,  
20. do you wish to explain it?  
21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
22. Senator Nimrod. Would the doorkeeper please keep the door  
23. closed to avoid all that clatter.  
24. SENATOR NIMROD:  
25. Yes, it...thank you...thank you, Mr. President. We would  
26. like to move, at this time, to Table Committee Amendment No.  
27. 1 for replacing it with a amendment...that's technically incorrect.  
28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
29. Is there discussion? Senator Nimrod moves to Table  
30. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1577. Those in favor indicate  
31. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
32. No. 1 is Tabled. Now, Senator Nimrod...

17. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment  
18. No. 2 to Senate Bill 1577 be adopted. Those in favor indicate  
19. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
20. No. 2 is adopted. Are there further amendments?  
21. SECRETARY:  
22. Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Bruce.  
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
24. Senator Bruce.  
25. SENATOR BRUCE:  
26. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. This amendment changes  
27. the rates to reflect the...the credit grants, to reflect the  
28. increase made by Senator Buzbee in 1576. They were drawn up  
29. by the Board of Higher Education, I believe they meet the  
30. approval of every member. I'd move the adoption of Amend-  
31. ment No. 3.  
32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
33. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment

1. No. 3 to Senate Bill 1577 be adopted. Those in favor indicate  
2. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment  
3. No. 3 is adopted. Are there further amendments?  
4. SECRETARY:  
5. No further amendments.  
6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
7. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1578, Senator De Angelis.  
8. Senate Bill 1579, Senator Weaver. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.  
9. SECRETARY:  
10. Senate Bill 1579.  
11. (Secretary reads title of bill)  
12. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Appropriations II  
13. offers two amendments.  
14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)  
15. Senator Weaver. I'm sorry, Senator Buzbee.  
16. SENATOR BUZBEE:

1. have been working together on...on this idea for several  
2. years, and we have been doing it the last few years. But  
3. we are finally bringing everybody who is connected with  
4. universities...into where their pension allocations...their  
5. pension dollar allocations, are made into one...one amount,  
6. and this is the...into one system; taking it out of the  
7. universitys' system, and this is the amendment that would  
8. do that for the University Civil Service Merit Board, the  
9. State Geological Survey, the State Natural History Survey  
10. and the State Water Survey, and I would move its adoption.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONNEWALD)

12. Is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment  
13. No. 2 to Senate Bill 1579 be adopted. Those in favor indicate  
14. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment

18. dollars to the Military and Naval Department's FY '81 budget.  
19. The money is the unspent portion of the department's FY '80  
20. appropriation for rehabilitation and minor construction at  
21. armories and camps and I would move its adoption.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Buzbee moves  
24. the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1623. Those  
25. in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes  
26. have it, Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Any further  
27. amendments?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Buzbee.

32. SENATOR BUZBEE:

33. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 2 reduces the

1. FY '81 appropriation to the Military and Naval Department  
2. by four hundred and eleven thousand, three hundred dollars,  
3. by applying the eight percent formula and phasing new positions.  
4. When we put this amendment on, we suspected that perhaps we'd  
5. gone a little bit too deep, in their case, but that is going  
6. to be corrected with an amendment that Senator Regner is  
7. going to offer next. So, I would the adoption of this with  
8. the understanding that a little bit of it will be put back  
9. with the next amendment.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Buzbee  
12. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill

26. we did put the Amendment No. 2 on which went pretty deep. It  
27. eliminated about two hundred and sixty thousand dollars in  
28. personal services from those people that will be one hundred  
29. percent State funded. We also took a hundred and twenty-four  
30. thousand and some odd dollars of those positions that we  
31. phased on a twenty-five, seventy-five ratio. That is the  
32. part where we have the problem. So, what this amendment does,  
33. it puts seventy-five thousand back into Personal Services,

1. eighty-one hundred into Retirement and thirty-one hundred  
2. into Social Security, for a total of eighty-six thousand, two  
3. hundred dollars, the money put back in on the seventy-five,  
4. twenty-five...five percent ratio of Federal State Funds for  
5. payment and I'd move its adoption.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Regner  
8. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 1623.  
9. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The

25. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
26. the Senate. This is an eight percent solution reduction as  
27. well as elimination of certain grants that it was felt were  
28. not necessary to expend the funds for at this time. I would move  
29. adoption of Amendment No. 1.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Carroll  
32. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1642.  
33. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The

11. Senate Bill 1678, Senator Gitz. Senate Bill 1709, Senator
12. Coffey. Senate Bill 1726, Senator Donnewald. Senate Bill
13. 1726. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
14. SECRETARY:
15. Senate Bill 1726.
16. (Secretary reads title of bill)
17. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Labor and Commerce
18. offers two amendments.
19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
20. Senator Donnewald.
21. SENATOR DONNEWALD:
22. Mr. President and members of the Body. I would ask leave
23. that those two amendments be considered in my discussion because
24. they are...the purpose of the two, the No. 2 Amendment is to
25. make additions that were inadvertently omitted in Amendment No. 1.
26. Do I have leave?
27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
28. You heard the motion. Is leave granted? Leave is granted.
29. SENATOR DONNEWALD:
30. All right. Well, Mr. President and members of the Body,
31. for some six months in a bipartisan effort, we have attempted
32. to tighten up the Unemployment Insurance Laws in this State.
33. We began this study and work, I think some seven months ago,

1. and this is part of the product, the next two bills were also  
2. a part of that effort. We...

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Excuse me, Senator. Gentlemen, Ladies, could we have  
5. some attention, these are the bills that you've been getting  
6. a lot of mail about, it's the Unemployment Insurance and  
7. the Workmen's Comp. bills that are coming up now. So, could  
8. we have some attention, some quiet back there, break up those  
9. conferences.

10. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

11. To give some background to what has transpired, there  
12. was and is a...an agreed bill process and that agreed bill  
13. process came forth with a bill subsequent to the time that  
14. we instituted the effort that produced the bill that I'm  
15. about to discuss. We went through and Amendment No. 1 and  
16. 2 amends the so-called agreed Bill process to where I believe  
17. and many of us in this Chamber believe, will be effective  
18. and will be meaningful. The present law of the Unemployment  
19. Insurance...Statutes that we have today imposes a disqualification  
20. for benefits upon one who voluntarily leaves his work without  
21. good cause. And it also charges an employer for benefit  
22. wages received by an employee who has voluntarily left that  
23. employer without good cause. Very briefly, what this does,  
24. when an employee...when an employee, quits an employer, after  
25. twelve weeks, he is then eligible for Unemployment Compensation,  
26. chargeable against the employer, whom he quit. What this does  
27. is alleviate that burden on employer number one. That, I think,  
28. is about as brief as I could state what...what the meat of the  
29. bill is. I know there will be a lot of discussions. There  
30. are exceptions to this. Our particular bill restricts good  
31. cause for voluntary leaving work for reasons attributable  
32. to the employing unit with the following exceptions; leaves  
33. work to accept other employment and works at that job for at

1. least two weeks or earns at least two times his weekly benefit  
2. amount; leaves work upon the advice of a licensed and practicing  
3. physician because of illness or illness of a spouse, child or  
4. parent and notifies the employer in writing of the reasons for  
5. his absence and returns to find his regular work or comparable and  
6. suitable work unavailable; leaves work rather than bumping another  
7. employee. Those are the exceptions that we have included in  
8. this legislation. It is somewhat tighter than the so-called  
9. agreed bill and I might add here, Mr. President and members of  
10. the Body, the so-called agreed bill was allegedly represented  
11. by all facets, unions, labor, management and so on, who...stated  
12. that they were represented by small business. This is really  
13. aimed to assist the small businessman. But, when I asked the  
14. question of one of the members of the agreed...so-called agreed  
15. bill process, asked what they considered small business, the  
16. answer was around a hundred and fifty employees. Well, now  
17. down where I live, that's a big employer. I'm trying to give  
18. relief and assistance to those small employers and I'm talking  
19. about ten or twelve or fifteen employees. And, Mr. President  
20. and members of this Body, there are far, far, many...far more  
21. employees of the small businesses than all of the large employers  
22. combined in this State. That's who I'm trying to give relief  
23. to, we are trying to give relief to. I would urge adoption  
24. of Amendments 1 and 2.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Is there further discussion? If there...Senator Donnewald  
27. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 and No. 2 to Senate Bill  
28. 1726. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed.  
29. The Ayes have it, Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Senator Donnewald  
30. now moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 1726.  
31. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The  
32. Ayes have it, Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Are there further amend-  
33. ments?

1. SECRETARY:  
2. No further committee amendments.  
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
4. Any amendments from the Floor?  
5. SECRETARY:  
6. Amendment No. 3 offered by Senator Donnewald.  
7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
8. Senator Donnewald.  
9. SENATOR DONNEWALD:  
10. Yes, Mr. President. This is...this is language that was  
11. requested by the department and I've already alluded to it in  
12. my main address, but it is language that they requested that  
13. we include in the...proposed legislation. I...I would there-  
14. fore move for its adoption.  
15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
16. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Donnewald  
17. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 1726.  
18. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The  
19. Ayes have it, Amendment No. 3 is adopted.  
20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
21. Further Floor amendments?  
22. SECRETARY:  
23. Amendment No. 4 offered by Senator Grotberg.  
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
25. Senator Grotberg is recognized on Amendment No. 4.  
26. SENATOR GROTBORG:  
27. Thank you, Mr. Chairman, members. Senator Donnewald  
28. alluded to the alleged agreed bill process, we have all  
29. alluded to the agreed bill process, the alleged agreed bill  
30. process. I've been in the Legislature eight years and every  
31. year, it's an alleged agreed bill process. And it hasn't  
32. worked very well and it hasn't worked at all. I am here  
33. to submit then, Ladies and Gentlemen of this Senate, that

1. the best representatives are the people who reside in these fifty-  
2. nine seats, we don't have to cut a deal with management and  
3. labor and sit around the table with unelected, appointed  
4. officials to write the laws of Illinois. I am sick and tired  
5. of the agreed bill process because it's lousy. This amendment  
6. merely strikes, for once and for all, out of the Unemployment  
7. Compensation Act, the agreed bill process so that we can  
8. go on with the business of the people as elected officials  
9. and work as we always have to work, till midnight on June  
10. the 30th, the morning of July 1st and still find out that  
11. there is no such thing as an agreed bill. Let's rip it  
12. off, get it out of the Statutes and get back to legislating  
13. a fair and just program for both the employee and the employer  
14. as the elected representatives of the people. I would ask  
15. that you vote in favor of this good amendment.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. The motion is to adopt. Discussion? Senator Donnewald.

18. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

19. Mr. President and members of the Body. I understand the  
20. feelings of my colleague, Senator Grotberg. I...I do agree  
21. that the alleged agreed process in this particular instance  
22. didn't function at all, but I do believe in an effort by  
23. everyone concerned and representing all facets, small,  
24. big and middle businesses, I think we should keep the  
25. agreed bill process, subject to our approval. I would...I  
26. would...therefore resist this amendment.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Further discussion? Senator Keats.

29. SENATOR KEATS:

30. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen. I am  
31. in basic support of this piece of legislation with Senator  
32. Donnewald, but on this amendment we differ slightly. One  
33. of the reasons I feel it's important we do away with the

1. agreed bill process is because the agreed bill process, if there  
2. ...ever was such a term, is probably what caused ninety percent  
3. of the problems we have today. To give you historical  
4. perspective when you think about it, that agreed bill process  
5. over the year, kept coming out with bills that, to put it  
6. mildly, were one-sided, but due to certain majorities in  
7. the Legislature, we just ram those bills through anyway.  
8. And one side in that agreed bill process just said you wait,  
9. and one of these years we're going to get the majority and  
10. we're going to stick it right back to you. Well guess what  
11. happened in 1974, and so what happened, we got stuck with  
12. a series of bills, when I say, we, I'm saying the entire  
13. Legislature, and even the people who supported the bills  
14. at a time admitted that perhaps they're a little too much but  
15. they're making up for the excesses of thirty years in the  
16. past. By allowing an outside group to decide on legislation  
17. and then having the Legislature just simply ratify this program,  
18. led to legislation that has caused serious problems for Illinois.  
19. Now, regardless of what side you are on prior to '74 or after  
20. '74, it doesn't make any difference, you only have to realize  
21. that half the reason we had the fights we had after the '74  
22. election was because of the inability of the agreed bill process  
23. to fairly deal with everyone. Now, this does not prohibit  
24. business, the leaders of business or labor, the leaders of  
25. labor, from sitting down and talking to us, talking to  
26. independent groups, talking to themselves, Lord knows it's  
27. harder to get them to talk to each other than to talk to us,  
28. but, this does not prohibit that in any way. So what we're  
29. saying is, let's do away with the process that has caused  
30. a great deal of problems and say to the parties involved,  
31. if you want to talk to each other, great, go ahead, but there  
32. is no Legislative mandate and we will deal with legislation  
33. in what is in best interests...in the best interest of the people

1. of the State of Illinois, not simply what is in the best  
2. interests of a certain special interest groups in the  
3. State of Illinois. I would ask you to support this amendment.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Senator Washington.

6. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

7. Mr. President, I can agree with Senator Keats and Grotberg  
8. that the agreed bill process has been extremely frustrating  
9. in the past. I can recall any number of hours when I was  
10. on a subcommittee waiting for the agreed process to trigger  
11. so that we could be released and go on about our business.  
12. It has been frustrating. But I think the agreed bill process  
13. is the culmination of some rather sound wisdom. We're dealing  
14. with two powerful competing institutions in our community and  
15. often times we can't really...really resolve those questions.  
16. I think with the agreed bill process, even though it may be  
17. a misnomer in many cases, it's a useful tool to at least  
18. bring the parties together and try to resolve what might  
19. take us an interminable period of time to resolve. I don't  
20. think we should throw, as they say, the baby out with the  
21. bathwater and the fact that it may have failed six out of  
22. ten times, doesn't necessarily mean it should be discarded.  
23. I think it...it's a good process. But in our frustration,  
24. Senator Grotberg, I don't think we should just throw the  
25. thing out and say...a plague on both your houses,  
26. because it's not going to resolve the basic and fundamental  
27. conflict between these two powerful institutions, we got  
28. to deal with it. And I think if they can go through  
29. the preliminary stages, even though sometimes it may be  
30. a sham, I think on balance, we're best maintaining this  
31. posture. And so I would oppose the amendment.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Maragos.

1. SENATOR MARAGOS:

2. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I was not intending  
3. to talk on this amendment until I heard some misconceived reports  
4. ...or statements made, especially on the other side of the aisle  
5. about the agreed bill process. You would not have had the  
6. "abuses" that management has been saying for the last five  
7. years if...the agreed bill process had been working. The  
8. agreed bill process had broken down several years before  
9. '75, Senator Keats, and that's why you went overboard in the  
10. passage of the bills of '75 to which everybody has been  
11. smarting since. Who...what is the agreed bill process? It's  
12. a process which has been asked for by the Governor, it's been  
13. asked for by the leaders of the Legislature and...asks these  
14. parties on both sides of the aisle to come in and sit down  
15. between management and labor and say to them, okay, you  
16. come with agreed bills so we will not have the tugging and  
17. fighting year in and year out. That was the original purpose  
18. of the agreed bill process. And what concerns me this year,  
19. is the fact that now we say, please have an agreed bill come  
20. out of management and labor and then once it arrives on our  
21. desks, we say, we don't like this point, we don't like that  
22. point, therefore, we're not going to support it. I think we  
23. are...not ask...saying that we should forego our legislative  
24. functions or delegate any authority to anybody else, but  
25. when we ask these economic interests on both sides of the  
26. aisle to come down and sit down and come out with an agreed  
27. bill process, then we should honor that commitment once we  
28. asked them on behalf of our leadership and of the Governor  
29. of this State. And let's not try to state that we...there's  
30. many things I didn't like in the agreed bills in the past  
31. when they were...when the...when the system was working  
32. effectively. But I voted for it because I said, well this  
33. was what we could get and this is what should be worked out.



1. I think we're going to make a big mistake if we scuttle this  
2. process because it's going...in your...to the detriment of  
3. everyone, not only this Legislature, but the people of the  
4. State of Illinois.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. Further discussion? Senator Wooten.

7. SENATOR WOOTEN:

8. Thank you, Mr. President. I...I've been trying to figure  
9. out...first of all, I've been looking for the amendment...Senator  
10. Maragos, I can't find it. I'm...but more than that, I've been  
11. trying to figure out what useful purpose this serves. One of  
12. our problems in dealing with unemployment and Worker's Comp. is  
13. that we really don't know that much about it. Even our staff  
14. members who analyze this, do not have the benefit of experience  
15. in actually dealing with cases. And so, I imagine most of  
16. the members are like me, you go around and talk to Comp. lawyers,  
17. to businessmen, to people in labor, trying to figure out, point  
18. by point, what makes sense. And I find that what people say  
19. publicly often differs with what they say privately. This is  
20. one of those things, I think, that keeps us captives, Republicans  
21. and Democrats, that we are characterized as being strictly pro  
22. business or pro labor. We don't have quite the technical experi-  
23. ence, a few of our members do, but most of us don't. And I  
24. think the important thing about the agreed bill process is  
25. that we want some people who involved in the give and take to  
26. deal with a subject before we do, that will give us some  
27. indication. Now, it's true, there are times when we have  
28. gone right straight through with what has been recommended.  
29. And that's because I think we generally don't want to get  
30. involved in a labor-management dispute. We have  
31. recognized, I think, the flaws in that approach and that

1. is quite often, special segments, particularly small businesses  
2. are not represented. I don't think the State Chamber accurately  
3. reflects the concerns of small business, but that's an  
4. awareness that dawns on you after awhile. To jettison the  
5. whole process, will put us all in the position of that Agreed  
6. Bill Committee and I think just in the interest of doing our  
7. job here, we can't spend all of our time on these subjects.  
8. We really need to have that kind of input. Staff input is  
9. essential, but it will not do the whole job. The advice  
10. of those who are practiced in this kind of law is helpful,  
11. but even that does not do the whole job. It just seems  
12. to me that maybe, you know, if you think that the Chamber  
13. is all going to be one way next year and we want to do away  
14. with any attempt at some kind of objective dealing with it,  
15. maybe it would make sense in that way, but even that  
16. supposition may be premature. I...I just don't think this  
17. is a well-advised move.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Further discussion? Senator Nimrod. I have Senator  
20. DeAngelis and Rock on my list.

21. SENATOR NIMROD:

22. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
23. I would call your attention to what we're really voting  
24. on here in this amendment, it is not on the agreed bill  
25. process. The agreed bill process has absolutely nothing  
26. to do with what we're talking about with this amendment.  
27. All we're doing here is striking the words that apply  
28. to the Employment Security Advisory Board and that Advisory  
29. Board is made up of nine members, recommended, three of the  
30. employee class, three of the employer class and three not  
31. either...associated with the employers or employees. I  
32. would call your attention to the fact that we are still  
33. leaving...the Department of Labor makes these appointments...

1. we're still leaving the Advisory Board to the Department of  
2. Labor of five members, intact. So, I think that...although  
3. I am one who supports the agreed bill process, that when  
4. labor and management can get together and come with us with  
5. suggestions, this particular board is an advisory board to  
6. the Department of Labor, which is in conflict with the  
7. agreed bill process. I think that's what we have to  
8. remember, if, in fact, we want the agreed bill process to  
9. succeed, then we don't need another advisory board in  
10. the Employment Security Advisory Board that's appointed  
11. by the Department of Labor by the Director, to be in  
12. conflict with the...with the agreed bill process. So, the  
13. agreed bill process has nothing to do with what we're doing  
14. here. I think it's about time that we strike these provisions  
15. that do, in fact, delete the provisions here that call for  
16. this advisory board which has been unable to come up with  
17. any effective answers and which, in fact, has been a hindrance  
18. to the agreed bill system. So, I would think that those of  
19. us who are talking about this and what this amendment does,  
20. Senator Grotberg, I do commend you for it and I do whenever  
21. ...however, point out the fact that it is not the agreed bill  
22. process or the agreed bill system, it has nothing to do with  
23. it, it is only a Employment Security Advisory Board to the  
24. Department of Labor, which has been unable to come up with  
25. any effective answers and 1726 would certainly not be  
26. effective or be involved. This fine piece of legislation  
27. would not even be before us if we did nothing but refer  
28. to this advisory board. It's come as a result of efforts  
29. within the Legislature and within efforts of independence  
30. between business and labor that have come about and made  
31. some reports. So I would hope that you would not conflict the two  
32. and certainly support this amendment.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Further discussion? Senator DeAngelis.

2. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. My comments are not designed  
4. to influence any members of this General Assembly on how  
5. to vote. But I do want to point out that in the process,  
6. in the process, of trying to develop a bill along with Senator  
7. Donnewald, it was implied that he and I had both broke the  
8. intent of the agreed bill process by doing this. I would  
9. like to point out that there was no intention on our part  
10. to, in fact, violate that process or to, in fact, subvert  
11. it. And I think therein lies the evil of the agreed bill  
12. process. It is automatically assumed that nine people, acting  
13. outside of this General Assembly, can, in fact, come up with  
14. suggestions and then mandate that we, in the General Assembly,  
15. accept these and those who, in fact, either want to embellish  
16. them, delete or expound, are, in fact, in violation of that  
17. particular agreement. Thank you.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Further discussion? Senator Rock.

20. SENATOR ROCK:

21. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
22. Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 4 and, frankly,  
23. I'm surprised it was even offered. This is the age of open  
24. government. We have sunset laws and sunrise laws and open  
25. air and open meetings and everything else and what we are  
26. suggesting here is a matter of public policy, as we have done,  
27. I might add, with respect to virtually every Cabinet Department  
28. in the Executive Branch of Government, as we have afforded the  
29. citizenry who are directly involved, a role in the operation  
30. of government, namely, as an Advisory Council. Now, I, for one,  
31. sure don't want to be recorded on a roll call voting against  
32. the advice of the citizenry of Illinois. There's no mandate  
33. that we accept their advice, but the fact of the matter is that

1. they have a right to be heard. And we have provided for that,  
2. Statutorily and to take it out at this point simply doesn't  
3. make any sense. I urge a No vote.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Further debate? Senator Grotberg may close...Senator Keats,  
6. a second time.

7. SENATOR KEATS:

8. I apologize for speaking a second time, but the President  
9. has raised...raised some interesting points. You have to  
10. remember we're talking about open government. The Advisory  
11. Board we're referring to, attempted to close their meetings, and  
12. only through pressure were they forced to open the meetings.  
13. So when you talk about open government, I'm afraid you're...probably  
14. should be voting No...I mean your No vote is inaccurate, you  
15. should vote Yes if you're...open government because  
16. people have far better access to us than this particular group  
17. who attempted to close their meetings from any outside interference,  
18. whatsoever. And not simply from the Legislature, I mean from  
19. everyone. So in that sense..in that sense I would say to you,  
20. while I praise your laudatory comments, they are sort of irrelevant  
21. to this particular amendment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Further discussion? Senator Grotberg may close.

24. SENATOR GROTBORG:

25. Thank you again, Mr. President and members. There's  
26. no malice in this amendment, whatever. If the Agreed Bill  
27. Committee or the Advisory Committee wants to answer my mail  
28. from labor and from industry, let them come down and sit down  
29. and write and answer the letters. We take all of the heat,  
30. very little of the light, Ladies and Gentlemen, but all of  
31. the heat on these issues. I am reminded of Senator Donnewald's  
32. remarks about small business, we're the only ones left in Illinois  
33. that represent small business and we represent them one at  
34. a time. The Advisory Board has never been replete with small

1. business advisors. It's a heavy weight group, the heavy  
2. weight groups can get to all of us individually and it's  
3. about time they did. Nobody will miss this Advisory Council,  
4. including business and labor. The only thing that will be  
5. missed is a bad idea that's never had anything going for it  
6. and let's kill it before it has little ones again. Please  
7. vote Aye.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. The motion is to adopt Amendment No. 4. Those in favor  
10. say Aye. Opposed Nay. It's the opinion of the Chair, the  
11. Nays have it, the amendment is lost. There's been a request  
12. for a roll call. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed  
13. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
14. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question  
15. the Ayes are 26, the Nays are 31, the amendment is lost.  
16. Further amendments?

17. SECRETARY:

18. Amendment No. 5 offered by Senator Savickas.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Senator Savickas on Amendment No. 5.

21. SENATOR SAVICKAS:

22. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I've talked  
23. to the sponsor of the bill regarding Amendment No. 5 and it  
24. tries to rectify a condition that's been caused when in 1977, the  
25. municipalities and local government units were brought in  
26. under the Unemployment Act. We have a problem where people  
27. that have been under suspension for disciplinary reasons are  
28. able, under the provisions of the Act, to collect unemployment  
29. benefits while they are under suspension and through this  
30. amendment we're hoping to rectify that problem. I would urge  
31. its adoption.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? Senator Geo-Karis.

1. Senator Donnewald.

2. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

3. Yes, Mr. President, I have no objection to this amend-  
4. ment. We've...I...I would move that we support it.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. The motion is to adopt. Discussion? All in favor  
7. say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it, Amendment No. 5  
8. is adopted. Further committee amendments? Or further Floor  
9. amendments?

10. SECRETARY:

11. Amendment No. 6 offered by Senator Collins.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Senator Geo-Karis, for what purpose do you arise?

14. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

15. Senator Bruce, I rise on a point of...personal privilege.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. State your point.

18. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

19. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
20. I'd like to introduce to you ninety students from the Central  
21. Junior High School from Zion, Illinois with Bill Velarugo, Elaine  
22. Collins, Brenda Hatch, Karen Cambaras, Kathy Miller, Jerry Zofil  
23. their instructors. We're welcoming them here to Springfield  
24. today on a very auspicious day.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Would you please rise and be recognized by the State Senate, please.  
27. Senator Collins, on Amendment No. 6.

28. SENATOR COLLINS:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment...No. 6 adds three  
30. provisions that was deleted in the Senate and the Labor Committee  
31. that had been worked out after careful deliberations through  
32. the agreed process. Although we've heard much debate here  
33. about the need for continuation of the agreed process, we

1. still recognize that it is, maybe with all of its faults, it  
2. is the best approach that we have to deal with the problem.  
3. Some of us may feel that it does not do the job that it was  
4. intended to do, but at the same time, the 59 bodies here  
5. that I heard someone mention, have not come up with a solution  
6. to address the problem. One of the problems with the agreed  
7. process and one of the reasons why it does not work and we  
8. cannot expect it to work, if in fact, after long hours of  
9. deliberation and we go into committee without having looked  
10. at or carefully evaluating the content of its work and then  
11. we criticize it, I think that is...we're undermining the whole  
12. idea behind the agreed process itself. And this is what  
13. exactly happened in committee. Because I think three of  
14. those provisions dealing with the volunteer quit leave in  
15. this bill that had been worked out through the agreed process  
16. is necessary. And the deletions that was made in the additions  
17. by Senator Donnewald in committee does not make sense, good  
18. sense. And for that reason Senate...Amendment No. 6 is an  
19. attempt to put back into that bill those three provisions  
20. dealing with the volunteer quit section of the bill.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Further discussion? Senator Donnewald.

23. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

24. Well, yes, Mr. President. Of course, if we were to  
25. adopt this amendment it completely guts the...or the bill as  
26. introduced and amended on this Floor. Senator Collins, I might  
27. say that what you're attempting to do is charge an innocent  
28. employer with the burden of Unemployment Insurance of one  
29. employee that quit...that quit him. And I don't think that most  
30. ...most of us here want that to happen and I would strongly  
31. urge that this...amendment be...defeated.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Further discussion? Senator Rock.



1. SENATOR ROCK:

2. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
3. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 6 and  
4. let me explain for a couple of reasons. There is a bill  
5. pending in the House sponsored...cosponsored by Representative  
6. Lechowicz and others that does, in fact, contain the so-  
7. called agreed bill. What Senators Donnewald and DeAngelis  
8. have done, and I think rightfully so, is take the major  
9. provisions of that agreed bill and then they've gone a  
10. step or two further and we, I think, have an obligation  
11. on behalf of this Senate, to send that bill over to House  
12. for its consideration. I am sure that the agreed bill will  
13. come to this Chamber for our consideration. But I think  
14. we have made a dramatic step forward, and the adoption of  
15. Amendment No. 6, in my judgment, would be a step backward  
16. and I urge its defeat.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. Further discussion? Senator Maitland. Senator DeAngelis.

19. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

20. Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, stand in opposition  
21. on Amendment No. 6 and I would like to point out to members  
22. of the Body that the sponsor of this amendment did, in fact,  
23. vote for Senate Bill 1726 in committee in the form that it  
24. was when it hit this Floor.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Further discussion? Senator Washington.

27. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

28. Will the sponsor yield to a question?

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Indicates she will yield. Senator Washington.

31. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

32. What are the three leaving categories which were summarily  
33. deleted in which you wish to return...restore?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Collins.

3. SENATOR COLLINS:

4. First of all, Senate...in...in the Senate Committee on...  
5. one of the amendments required that the...that the employee  
6. state in writing to the employer the reasons for quitting.  
7. It was negotiated, I understand, then...through the agreed  
8. process and in...and agreed and, as well as in other states  
9. that this was not a necessary provision. It was also agreed  
10. that the employee in case of illness, had to return to that  
11. employer first to apply for suitable work. Now, quite frankly,  
12. that does not even make sense because if you have a condition  
13. by which you...if you're ill, you cannot return or if someone  
14. is critically ill in your family and there is no available  
15. suitable work at your current employer to meet that schedule,  
16. then it...it doesn't make sense for you to have to return  
17. back there to seek work. But it does make sense, however,  
18. if, in fact, that someone is ill in your family, for example,  
19. and you work one shift and someone else in the family come  
20. in and take care of that person and you can go out and seek  
21. employment at another shift, that makes sense and you are  
22. ...able and...and available for work. So, under the Donnewald  
23. amendment, that person then, would...would not...would be  
24. disqualified from benefits simply because that particular  
25. employee did not have a nine to five shift of which that person  
26. had to take care...an ill person in the family.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Washington.

29. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

30. Was there another category which...provided for leaving  
31. because of sexual harrassment known to the employee unit?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Collins.

1. SENATOR COLLINS:

2. Yes, this amendment also adds back that provision also.

3. Because under the Donnewald amendment, it simply...it says

4. that if the employee harrass...sexual harrassment, based on

5. the part of the employer. However, there are many instances

6. where other employees, can, in fact, or even salesman, people

7. connected with doing services with that employer, can in fact,

8. ...sexually harrass the person and under the Donnewald Amend-

9. ment that person would be disqualified for benefits.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Washington.

12. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

13. Well, very briefly, what the opponents of this amendment

14. are saying is that a person who is leaving because of illness

15. or illness in the family or who has been the victim of sexual

16. harrassment, should bear the burden of lack of income for that

17. intermit period. It seems to me to be somewhat ludicrous.

18. What's the purpose of this Act, anyway. It is designed to

19. protect a gainfully employed employee who, for reasons beyond

20. their control, are an unemployed. And it seems to me that if

21. one cannot accept the very simple fact that a woman who has

22. been the result of sexual harrassment and forced to leave

23. her employment, if she can't be protected, it seems to me

24. that that is running afoul of the entire purpose of the Act.

25. I support the amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Further discussion? Senator Martin.

28. SENATOR MARTIN:

29. Just...just to relieve almost...Congressmen over there,

30. there is a bill that has come over from the House that discusses

31. the area over which you have some concern, the area of sexual

32. harrassment on the job and those, either men or women who have

33. to endure that. That bill is in the Senate, I'm sure it will

1. be heard by the Senate and Senator Collins' amendment destroys  
2. an otherwise good bill in the area of concern that you say you  
3. are concerned about is covered in a full new bill that will  
4. be coming before you soon.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. Further discussion? Senator Washington.

7. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

8. I...I assume that was a question. And I'll respond to  
9. the...about to be Congresslady. I've waited in vain  
10. many a day for a bill to come over to solve a problem, which  
11. an amendment I had would solve right then and there and often-  
12. times I've been extremely frustrated. And when you've been  
13. here as long as I have been, you will never accept that as  
14. an adequate excuse for not voting for the issue before you.  
15. I think it's irrelevant. If the Body feels this is important,  
16. we should put it on here. If we vote out a bill which has  
17. that category in it and it goes to the Governor's Desk we  
18. can have the House take it off.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

21. SENATOR NIMROD:

22. Thank you, Mr. President. I don't care whether you  
23. support or not support a...a agreed bill system. I do think  
24. that there is a bill here before us that they're attempting  
25. to change somewhat from what was presented by the agreed  
26. bill process. And we in the Legislature have the right to  
27. do that and for that basis I think that we ought to support  
28. Senator Donnewald on this particular bill and oppose this  
29. amendment.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

31. Further discussion? Senator Collins may close.

32. SENATOR COLLINS:

33. Thank you, Mr. President. I agree it doesn't matter

1. whether we support the agreed bill process or not the agreed  
2. process in reference to this particular amendment. It is  
3. whether or not we believe in basic fairness in the protection  
4. of the unemployed, who have to leave their work for...for  
5. good cause. And that's what this amendment is trying to  
6. provide. The other provision of this amendment which was  
7. deleted from the Donnewald amendment, which I think is  
8. very significant, and that is the incentive for people  
9. who are unemployed or laid off to go out and seek lesser  
10. employment or undesirable employment as a need for, you  
11. know, continue to be employed. But under the Donnewald  
12. amendment, it actually discourages that person from going  
13. out, taking a lesser pay job, if they get laid off, and they  
14. are penalized under the Donnewald amendment. I think this  
15. is a good amendment, it does not make any real...other drastic  
16. changes in the Donnewald bill and I ask for a favorable vote.  
17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. The motion is to adopt. All in favor say Aye. Opposed  
19. Nay. The opinion of the Chair...the opinion of the Chair, the  
20. negatives prevail. The amendment is lost. Further amendments?  
21. SECRETARY:

22. No further amendments.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. 3rd reading. Oh, for what purpose does Senator Keats arise?  
25. SENATOR KEATS:

26. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise on a point of personal  
27. privilege. On behalf of Senator Berman and myself, on the  
28. pause between bills, we often pass birthday resolutions for  
29. constituents of some of ours who are friends or people we  
30. think very highly of. And at this time, I wanted to take  
31. one second while we pause to say that for a change, someone  
32. who is having a birthday and we passed a resolution for, happens

9. there any amendments, Mr. Secretary? Read the bill, Mr. Secretary,  
10. please.

12. Senate Bill 1739.

13. (Secretary reads title of bill)

14. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Labor and Commerce  
15. offers three amendments.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Who will be explaining the committee amendments? Committee  
3. Amendment No. 1, Senator Maragos.

4. SENATOR MARAGOS:

5. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Committee Amend-  
6. ment No. 1 was adopted by the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee  
7. for the purpose of removing one item from the bill as it was  
8. presented in that it would make a more equitable approach  
9. and leave the discretion of the medical...oh...

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Maragos.

12. SENATOR MARAGOS:

13. I stand corrected. That was the wrong...this is the...Senate Amendment No. 1  
14. is the amendment which the sponsors of the bill have introduced  
15. ...have presented to change...which is really the bill itself,  
16. because it takes everything from the enacting clause and...and  
17. changes it around. This is the bill, itself, which should  
18. be adopted, and it was unanimously adopted by the Senate Labor  
19. and Commerce Committee.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? Senator  
22. De Angelis.

23. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. What Senator Maragos says is  
25. correct. The bill was seventy-four pages long, and the process  
26. of drafting rather than correcting all the things in it, we  
27. decided to rewrite the bill, and amendment No. 1 is the bill,  
28. and I move for its adoption.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Motion is to adopt. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay.  
31. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Further committee  
32. amendments?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. Senator Maragos on Amendment No. 2.

4. SENATOR MARAGOS:

5. Yes, this is also an amendment which was sponsored by  
6. the...Senator De Angelis and Senator Donnewald in that  
7. it had the question of...subsequent injuries because the  
8. language was rather ambiguous. It had brought some problems  
9. as it was in the bill...in Senate Amendment No. 1 and...at  
10. the sponsor's request,we adopted Senate Amendment No. 2 and  
11. ask for its adoption.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Discussion? Senator De Angelis.

14. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

15. Thank you, Mr. President. That is correct. There was  
16. one other part that was added to it, and that was the areas  
17. that dealt with standards were expanded to include hearings  
18. by the affected interest involved, and standards which were  
19. the lawyers, the insurance companies, the unions, and  
20. business.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Discussion? The motion is to adopt. All in favor say Aye.  
23. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 2 is adopted.  
24. Further amendments?

25. SECRETARY:

26. Committee Amendment No. 3.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Maragos on Amendment No. 3.

29. SENATOR MARAGOS:

30. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Senate Amend-  
31. ment No. 3 was adopted by the committee,not a unanimous vote  
32. but it was adopted, with the understanding that the standards  
33. which were set in the bill as amended be removed, because it was



1. felt by many that it's very difficult to keep standards on  
2. certain issues, and especially when people differ in their  
3. employment, they differ in their thresholds of pain, they  
4. differ in many other actions, and therefore we felt...and I  
5. may also state that many who are in the Workmen's Comp. field  
6. themselves, including the arbitrators, including even some  
7. members of the commission feel that standards are not the  
8. best way to approach this problem, that's why this amendment  
9. was adopted by the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee, and I  
10. ask for its adoption.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. The motion is to adopt. Discussion? Senator De Angelis.

13. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

14. I have a question of the sponsor. Senator Maragos, is  
15. this your Amendment No. 3 or Amendment No. 4?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Senator...

18. SENATOR MARAGOS:

19. Mr. President. Senator De Angelis, Amendment No. 3 was  
20. withdrawn because you...you had problems with it, and therefore  
21. this is Amendment No. 3. This is Amendment No. 4 which is now  
22. Amendment No. 3.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. All right. All the Secretary has would be...are three  
25. amendments from the committee and I think Senator Maragos has  
26. indicated that evidently 3 was offered and withdrawn and  
27. this, in fact, is 3. Senator De Angelis.

28. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

29. Anybody else want to talk?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

31. No, not that I know of. Discussion of the motion to  
32. adopt.

33. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

1. Thank you, Mr. President. I stand in opposition of  
2. what is now Amendment No. 3, which was Amendment No. 4 in  
3. committee, offered by Senator Maragos, which removes from  
4. the bill..which removes from the bill, the adoption of standards  
5. by the Industrial Commission. Both Senate Bills...1739 and  
6. 1740, which will follow very shortly are an attempt on a  
7. bipartisan basis...Senator Netsch, this is not merit selection  
8. but I think it's important. You know I'm on that one, too.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator De Angelis.

11. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

12. Senate Bill 1739 and 1740 are an attempt on a bipartisan  
13. effort to deal with the problems and abuses of the Worker's  
14. Compensation Act. In the process of dealing with this problem  
15. and abuse for about eight months, it was determined that they  
16. lie in the inconsistency and the litigious nature of the Act  
17. itself. The standards are a critical length in the development  
18. of consistency and in a diminution of the adversarial processes  
19. that lead to litigation. Written decisions which are part of  
20. this bill, limitations of attorney fees which are all part of  
21. this bill as well, and measuring the reserves of insurance  
22. companies which is part of 1740, are, in fact...or have little  
23. value when the standards are, in fact, taken from this bill.  
24. The abuses which is the concern that labor and industry should  
25. both have, the abuses of overpayment, and underpayment would  
26. continue to occur as well. However, my strongest opposition to  
27. Senator Maragos' amendment comes from the fact that it really  
28. strikes at the heart of the legislative process. The contents  
29. of this bill were carefully thought out and the subject of long  
30. and continuous discussions and research for many, many months, in  
31. fact, since last October. At the eleventh hour...at the eleventh  
32. hour prior to the third committee meeting, in the thirteenth  
33. hour of hearing on a single bill, an affected and  
special interest group appeared and was successful in imposing its

1. will on the members of the General Assembly. Thus...thus  
2. violating both the intent of the bipartisan process and  
3. more important the intent for recognizing the issue for  
4. what it was, and that is, that the issue is not political  
5. but economic in nature. Even the Chairman of Labor and Commerce  
6. had to shelve his own amendment which was amendment No. 3,  
7. on behalf of this particular group. The people who worked  
8. on this bill continuously are against the changes and intrusion  
9. of special interest groups, that we should let the amendment  
10. prevail, provoke strong resentment on my part and should  
11. on your's as well. Now, it will be said at some point by those  
12. who vote in support of this amendment that they are, in fact,  
13. voting for the little people. Well, I would submit that when  
14. you go back to your district, and you walk in the Fourth of  
15. July Parades, and go to the picnics as I do, and you go back  
16. and talk to little people, I just hope, I just hope that the  
17. shadow of the big people who force you into this decision will  
18. not blur the faces of those little people. I stand in opposition  
19. to Amendment No. 4...or No. 3.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Further discussion? Senator Wooten.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. Thank you, Mr. President. This is another one of those  
24. extremely difficult matters to deal with, and even Senator  
25. De Angelis is couching it in little people, big people. You  
26. tend to deal in the contrast here, when we discuss...the plain  
27. fact is, we're not quite sure of what this will amount to.  
28. I have talked to people once again on both sides, because  
29. when you deal in a bill of this complexity you necessarily  
30. begin dealing in shorthand, and standards quickly has become  
31. the phrase about this bill, and whether or not standards are  
32. adopted suddenly becomes the key element. I understand that  
33. we are to be rated on the vote on this amendment, simply because

1. it is mostly likely, most Republicans will support it and  
2. most Democrats will oppose it, and thus it becomes a handy  
3. barometer that yields an effect that you can predict. But  
4. really this ought not to be that partisan a consideration.  
5. I have talked to lawyers who deal on both sides of the issue,  
6. and believing those people with whom I have discussed the issue  
7. in private, to be honorable, this is what they have told me, and  
8. I hope you listen carefully to this. One of the...the Commerce  
9. Commission has always had it within its power to establish some  
10. kind of standards. The simplest way would be through case  
11. law. I'm advised that that's what the commission is now  
12. doing. It is releasing its findings in a timely manner. It  
13. is publishing the reasons for overturning some decisions, and  
14. the...we are having built up standards that are based on  
15. actual experience in the State of Illinois, and thus the  
16. adoption of standards becomes more a symbolic victory than  
17. something that is really needed. I ask business does this really  
18. save you money, and their answer is, well it cuts both ways.  
19. It would seem in some states the experience is, it doesn't save  
20. us money. Why then do you want it? I think the only honest  
21. answer I got is it gives us something to deal on in the House.  
22. Well, I think I've stated bluntly and publicly what I've  
23. been told in private on both sides, that the Commerce Commission  
24. is doing its work now finally. We are obviously developing  
25. standards now that are based on something real in the State.  
26. The question then comes to be, why do we need standards in the  
27. bill? Because it has been adopted as some kind of symbol. I  
28. really don't think the symbol merits adoption. I think we ought  
29. to take standards out. Let the Commerce Commission keep...pardon  
30. me, the Industrial Commission keep right on doing what it is,  
31. in fact, doing, and that is developing standards that have  
32. some real meaning in the State of Illinois.  
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Further discussion? Senator D'Arco.

2. SENATOR D'ARCO:

3. Thank you, Mr. President. When the bill arrived in  
4. Labor and Commerce, we decided at that point, I think, that  
5. it deserved some type of revision, because all of the provisions  
6. in the bill seem to be pro-business, and anti-labor, and in  
7. order to accommodate both sides, business and labor, we thought  
8. that we would give a little and take a little, and I think that's  
9. what we've done in this bill. We've...we've given business  
10. the...precondition, injury provision,..preexisting...condition  
11. provision. We've given them a very important piece in this  
12. bill, the impartial panel of doctors, and labor was accused of  
13. doctor shopping, by having the defendant go around to various  
14. doctors and pick the one of his choosing, that would accommodate  
15. him best, and the impartial panel of doctors, which is one  
16. provision in the bill took away that right of the claimant,  
17. and that was a pro-business position in the bill. The only  
18. provision that labor seemed not to be able to accommodate  
19. business on was the standards, and it seemed that everyone in  
20. the committee, at least on the Democratic side was in accord  
21. with that. So, we want to send the bill out as it presently  
22. is constituted, and I would ask that we vote against this  
23. amendment.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER:(SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Further discussion?

26. SENATOR D'ARCO:

27. I'm in favor of it.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator D'Arco, have you concluded? Senator Washington.

30. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

31. Yes, very briefly, Mr. President. I want to assure Senator  
32. Wooten that my determination is not based on party, but on  
33. plain experience. It was my pleasure to be an arbitrator  
with the Industrial Commission for four years, and I agree with

1. Senator Maragos and Senator Wooten, that if you're chasing  
2. the illusive thing called standards you're simply wasting  
3. your time. These cases have to be resolved on a case by  
4. case basis and they are resolved on a case by case basis,  
5. and I don't see any useful or meaningful substitute for that.  
6. I'd like to see the standards you're talking about. I've  
7. looked at some prototypes from other states, I wasn't impressed.  
8. I think the Industrial Commission, the arbitrators, and the  
9. commissioners on appeal are doing a very admirable job under  
10. the circumstances, but fundamentally what they're dealing  
11. with is a plethora of cases, dealing with a tremendous ramification  
12. of different types of injuries. I don't see how you could draft  
13. meaningful standards which in the final analysis would do  
14. justice to the injured employee. I think you're...chasing  
15. a mirage at best it's a political boondoggle, and I would  
16. suggest we support the amendment, and strike that part of it.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. Further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

19. SENATOR NIMROD:

20. Thank...thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen  
21. of the Senate. I might read from a letter from the Governor  
22. so, you might know that his concerns are those which have  
23. the Department of the Industrial Commission under his jurisdiction  
24. and I might tell you that this is from his letter and it's  
25. written to the Leadership and the sponsors of this bill  
26. says, "standards to guide the determination of disability  
27. can be a useful tool for both the employer and the injured  
28. worker." It goes on to say that, "but reasonable standards can  
29. be developed to take into account the expected residuals,  
30. and many states have done so. Illinois must join the ranks.  
31. Standards can go a long way toward assuring that similar cases  
32. are decided similarly by arbitrators and the commissioners to  
33. bring greater equity to the system." Now, I think that that

1. pretty well defines what the need is. I think it gives pretty  
2. well...guidance for the department. If, in fact, the Industrial  
3. Commission had authority to do this...since it doesn't have  
4. funds, and doesn't have the other thing, I think they're looking  
5. for guidance from the Legislature and I would think that we  
6. ought to stand by and support them.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Further discussion? Senator Rock.

9. SENATOR ROCK:

10. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
11. the Senate. I rise in support of Amendment No. 3 and would  
12. piously hope that there will be thirty-two, at least, affirmative  
13. Democratic votes. So, that that way it seems to me the roll  
14. call can be perfectly plain. We engage from time to time around  
15. here in an exercise called demagoguery, and I suggest to you that  
16. the buzz word standards is now such an exercise. I would like  
17. to point out that when the pro-business bills, as they are  
18. known, were introduced into this Chamber under the sponsorship  
19. of six members of the other side of the aisle, standards were  
20. not included in those bills. All of a sudden this has become  
21. a monumental issue, and I suggest to you, the reason it has  
22. become an issue is so that the issue will remain alive. I  
23. am suggesting to you that some who are engaging in this form  
24. of demagoguery really don't want to have any meaningful change,  
25. and if we are to effect some meaningful change on behalf of the  
26. business community of this State, and at the same time protect  
27. the rights of the working people and organized labor, we have  
28. a bill by which we can do that, but this amendment has to go  
29. on, otherwise it's an exercise in futility. I urge an Aye  
30. vote on Amendment No. 3.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Further discussion? Senator Shapiro.

33. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

1. Well, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
2. Senate. Notwithstanding the high regard in which I hold  
3. the President of the Senate, it's been my opinion, the information  
4. that has been presented to me by experts in this field, and  
5. I'll grant to you that in this Chamber there are fifty-eight  
6. people who know more about this subject than I do, that any  
7. Workmen's Comp. bill without standards in it is meaningless,  
8. and on that basis, just on that one basis alone that we ought  
9. to send the strongest bill out of here that is possible. I  
10. would urge everyone to resist this committee amendment, get  
11. the bill to 3rd reading so we can pass it over to the House  
12. in good shape.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

14. Further discussion? Senator Keats.

15. SENATOR KEATS:

16. There's just one last comment I wanted to make here, and  
17. I don't want to take a strong stand one way or the other.  
18. Specifically to say, in committee when we talked about this  
19. everyone keeps talking about labor and the standards and working  
20. men, that is sort of a misrepresentation, we're talking about  
21. what was pro-business, what was pro-labor. That's not really  
22. what happened. What we have is a provision here that has  
23. little to do with...with labor, certainly has nothing to do  
24. with business, tends to be the trial lawyer's amendment. Now,  
25. I'm not saying good, bad, or indifferent. You judge it however  
26. you want, but don't say this is the working man's amendment,  
27. because it's unrelated. This happens to be the trial lawyer's  
28. amendment, and if you feel that the trial lawyer should have the  
29. right to make a substantial amount of money in this particular  
30. area, fine, but don't claim you're protecting the working man  
31. when you're protecting the trial lawyers. Now, in terms of  
32. what the amendment does, it is that plain and that simple. This  
33. is not a business/labor issue. This is a trial lawyers



1. issue, and that is it, and there is no other relationship. If  
2. you exclude standards from this bill, you have simply said  
3. that the trial lawyers may continue to run the Industrial  
4. Commission as they do today, and you will simply say that the  
5. working men...and women of Illinois are going to get no particular  
6. improvement. The working men and women of Illinois will not  
7. be getting better benefits or worse benefits, but I'll say  
8. one thing, the trial lawyers will live well on this deal.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Berman.

11. SENATOR BERMAN:

12. Thank you Mr. President. I thought the last Senator's  
13. comments require some rebuttal. We happen to have a system  
14. in this country which is called advocacy, and the problem  
15. with standards is not for the trial lawyers or against the  
16. defense lawyers. It happens to be that you want to try to  
17. have people on equal footing, and give everyone a fair break.  
18. We're dealing with injuries, and one person's injury may differ  
19. from another person's injury even though on a chart it looks  
20. the same, and you have to take into consideration the individual  
21. and how that charted injury has, in fact, affected that person's  
22. ability to operate and function. When you put in standards,  
23. you are trying to substitute the subjective problems of an  
24. individual for a chart. That is not the American system, we  
25. have a system of advocacy, and if you allow standards you're  
26. going to put the person who is injured at a considerable  
27. disadvantage, because he doesn't understand it, and the  
28. people that represent the people in opposition to him, the  
29. insurance companies and the businesses that are trying to pay  
30. him as little as possible, you're putting him in...that injured  
31. person at a disadvantage because the people are opposing him  
32. are experts and the injured person has no expert. Don't try  
33. to substitute an individual's frailties, an individual's injuries  
for what is printed on a chart. It doesn't work, it has never

1. been adopted in this country. We have an advocacy system, and  
2. it has worked. I urge an Aye vote on Amendment 3.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Senator Bloom.

5. SENATOR BLOOM:

6. Thank you, Mr. President, and fellow Senators. I think  
7. the points made by the previous speaker really underscored  
8. the fundamental differences and approach. What he is advocating  
9. is, administrative tort law, and that was not repeat not, the  
10. purpose of the Worker's Compensation Act. It was to remove  
11. advocacy, and it was to provide quick and easy payments to  
12. the injured worker, and in return for, in return for giving  
13. up certain tort rights, the injured worker would get money  
14. quickly by some kind of standards, and I think that really this  
15. is at the heart of the question, and that what we need are  
16. an amendment that puts in meaningful standards and stops this  
17. crazy quilt, administrative tort law, which really has turned  
18. into a monster and a drag on the economy. Thank you.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Further discussion? Senator...Senator Maragos....or  
21. Senator Wooten.

22. SENATOR WOOTEN:

23. Thank you, Mr. President. I'm sorry to rise a second time,  
24. but I've...I've found the previous speakers to be very instructive  
25. and I think I see something coming into focus that probably ought  
26. to be highlighted. The statement is made that...Senator  
27. Shapiro repeated what I've heard other people say, usually people  
28. not conversant with the law, that without standards any bill  
29. is meaningless. The more I talk to people the more I realize  
30. that, it seems to me that standards really aren't that relevant,  
31. and as I said the commission is developing its standards. Why  
32. then, would we bandy about that statement and I've heard it many  
33. places, that without standards which I don't think will be

1. on the bill when it comes out, the law is meaningless. I think  
2. that perhaps relates to insurance premiums. We are leading  
3. people down a garden path perhaps to let them think that  
4. with or without standards premiums are going to go down. On  
5. Mars maybe, but not in Illinois, and by putting up something that  
6. is not altogether reasonable to keep in the bill, standards,  
7. and when that goes out the premiums stay, and if you can say,  
8. see, it's the fault of keeping standards out of the bill. That's  
9. why your premiums don't drop, that will not be true. With or  
10. without the standards, the premiums are going to stay up there  
11. until we get competition into the insurance industry or until  
12. we perhaps set up some kind of pool in this State that they  
13. have in other states that have dropped those premiums thirty  
14. percent plus paying dividends. It's not a bad approach for  
15. the little businessman. I think we ought to seriously consider  
16. that, but that may be what the talk of standards is about, to  
17. let people think that maybe the premiums will go down with  
18. standards knowing full well that we're probably not going to  
19. adopt them. That's simply not true. With or without premiums  
20. they're going to stay up there until we take some direct  
21. action.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Lemke.

24. SENATOR LEMKE:

25. Just a point to my colleagues on the other side of the  
26. aisle. I read over two bills which was sponsored for you, and  
27. which were drawn up by business, 1795 and 96. When those  
28. bills were originally filed, there was no standards in those  
29. bills. So, apparently business don't want standards, and  
30. standards is usually a type of word that we're using as a  
31. political thing, because now we are trying to do something  
32. in Illinois to help business on the Democratic side and now  
33. we've got to keep a political issue and call it standards. What-  
ever we would do would be wrong. If...if standards were so

1. important, then why wasn't it in your bill, 1795 and 96? It  
2. wasn't in there, it's just a political ploy. You...I don't  
3. think the Republican party wants to help business, they  
4. want to keep this as a political issue so they can contact  
5. business and say, let's...let's get money and we're...we're  
6. going to fight those terrible Democrats who put these...these  
7. ...these Workmen's Comp. laws and everything else...but we  
8. do nothing to regulate insurance companies, we do nothing  
9. to regulate anybody, and that's the culprits. It's not  
10. business or labor, it's...the culprit is the insurance industry  
11. and when you get that in your mind, standards is an insurance  
12. industry tool. So, they can put their computers up and save  
13. money in the administration of laws, but still keep the premiums  
14. and keep raising them higher. I...I ask you to go along with  
15. Senator Maragos on this amendment.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Several lights have come on, and if I can just...Senator Regner,  
18. and then De Angelis and then Maragos. Senator Regner.

19. SENATOR REGNER:

20. Yes, Mr. President, and members. Just to throw a little  
21. light on the debate on 1795, which never did get out of committee.  
22. Unfortunately as the chief sponsor, I filed the wrong bill. On  
23. the day, I did have the one in there with standards in it, but  
24. I put the wrong package in for filing. I...I admit it, but  
25. any of the other fifty-eight that have never made an error  
26. raise their hand, but...but...you're all liars. But as  
27. 1795 exists right now in the Labor and Industry Committee,  
28. it does have standards in it. The amendment was put on in  
29. committee. So, if you want to let that bill out and we'll debate  
30. that bill, I'd be delighted.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. ...discussion? Senator De Angelis.

33. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

1. I guess when Senator Lemke talks, it does turn  
2. on a lot of lights. Let me clear up one thing, either by  
3. application or by my thin skin it's implied that I'm acting  
4. on behalf of the business community in this particular bill.  
5. The bill, the reason that standards are in it, is because on  
6. a bipartisan basis, after eight months of conversation and  
7. after looking at the total thrust of the bill, it was  
8. determined through that process that standards be in it, and  
9. might I remind you that you might look at Senate Bill 1740  
10. along with this and you cannot, in fact, reconcile the fact  
11. of the validity of written decisions, limitation of attorneys  
12. fees on noncontested cases and the review of insurance  
13. reserves for losses without standards and that was the reason  
14. standards were in the bill. It had nothing to do with business,  
15. it had nothing to do with the trial lawyers, as far as I was  
16. concerned. It was designed to put the bill in its proper  
17. form, and there was no regard for any affected interest other  
18. than getting the bill in the form that would, in fact, significantly  
19. reduce the abuse and bring about reform, and that's how it was  
20. introduced.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Further discussion? Senator Maragos may close.

23. SENATOR MARAGOS:

24. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I like to say  
25. to Senator De Angelis, who I respect as a outstanding Senator,  
26. and he represents his district well, that it took me many times  
27. four and five years to get a bill after joint..and consultations  
28. with both sides of the aisle before a bill succeeds. So, do not  
29. mock the legislative process, and don't think that eight months  
30. itself makes it...the product worthy, when our constitutional  
31. fathers took...almost took them twenty years to get the Con-  
32. stitution, and we still have problems with it, and we amend it  
33. today. The thing that I'm trying to bring out to you Ladies and

1. Gentlemen, is the main reason why the howling has been through-  
2. out the State for the last five years is that the costs of  
3. premiums and insurance, costs in the Workmen's Compensation  
4. area have increased so much that the average businessman is  
5. suffering an undue burden, and through all these hearings  
6. we had on these bills, and other bills, not only this year  
7. but last year as well, in the Labor and Commerce Committee,  
8. no time, at no time was there any guarantee given, concomitant  
9. guarantee that if we took this item out there would be reduction  
10. in the costs of the policies, or the costs of Workmen's Compens-  
11. ation Coverage. Each case, and...before the commission stands  
12. on its own. I agree with Senator Bloom that it is not a tort  
13. case like with the jury trial. You don't try the issues there of  
14. guilt or not guilt, you try the issues of the extensive injury,  
15. but when you say to the commission, or to the commissioner,  
16. you...you're going to adopt the AMA standards or any other  
17. standards which in themselves have a...a variable of thirty-  
18. five percent in many cases, you are just putting on a figment  
19. and a lie and a myth that these are going to be the standards  
20. ...by which all the answers can be solved. I say to you, that if  
21. you notice the commission today, in the last three or four  
22. years that it's a commission under your Governor on that  
23. side of the aisle, not a Governor elected by our side of the  
24. aisle, that they have been more consistent in their decisions,  
25. there's been less vacillation among the various arbitrators,  
26. and therefore, it has also been admitted by members of that  
27. commission that they can today adopt similar types of status  
28. without legislation if they thought they were necessary. But  
29. evidently they, who are the experts in the field, on the front  
30. line everyday don't feel that these standards are necessary,  
31. and I say to you let us not give up something that the worker  
32. or the injured party may enjoy for a myth on the other...  
33. of the cut costs, and I ask for the support of this amendment.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. The motion is to adopt. All in favor...is there a request  
3. for a roll call? There's been a request for a roll call. Those  
4. in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The  
5. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
6. wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 30,  
7. the Nays are 26. None Voting Present. Amendment No. 3 is  
8. adopted. All right, there's been a request for a verification  
9. of those who voted in the affirmative. Would the members  
10. please be in their seats, and answer when the Secretary calls  
11. your name.

12. SECRETARY:

13. The following voted in the affirmative: Berman, Bruce,  
14. Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Collins, D'Arco, Daley, Demuzio, Donnewald,  
15. Egan, Hall, Jeremiah Joyce, Jerome Joyce, Lemke, Maragos, McLendon,  
16. Merlo, Nash, Nedza, Nega, Netsch, Newhouse, Rupp, Sangmeister,  
17. Savickas, Vadalabene, Washington, Wooten, Mr. President.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Do you...do you question the presence of any member? Is  
20. Senator Daley on the Floor? Strike his name. Is Senator Nash  
21. on the Floor? Senator Nash. He's at Senator Lemke's desk.  
22. Do you question the presence of any other member? On a verified  
23. roll call, 29 Ayes, 26 Nays. Amendment No. 3 is adopted.  
24. Further amendments? Further committee amendments?

25. SECRETARY:

26. No further committee amendments.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Are there amendments from the Floor?

29. SECRETARY:

30. Amendment No. 4 offered by Senator De Angelis.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Senator De Angelis on Amendment No. 4. Senator De Angelis  
33. on Amendment No. 4.

1. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:  
2. Thank you, Mr. President. Senate Amendment No. 4...  
3. Senator D'Arco, doctor shopping or the elimination was not  
4. in the bill, but it was an excellent suggestion, and you will  
5. have an opportunity to vote for it in Senate Amendment No. 4.  
6. Senate Amendment No. 4 limits the amount of free choices to  
7. two for a physician and in addition to that, exempts from the  
8. Act the following areas: activities, including but not  
9. limited to athletics, hobbies, picnics, and parties, rest and  
10. relaxation of traveling employees, use of employer owned or  
11. operated parking lots and transportation arrangements, and  
12. alcoholic and drug treatment programs offered by the employer  
13. to the employee.  
14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
15. Is there further discussion?  
16. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:  
17. I...I move for its adoption.  
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
19. Senator D'Arco.  
20. SENATOR D'ARCO:  
21. Now, as I understand the amendment, you're limiting the  
22. choice of doctors that the claimant can go to. Is that what  
23. you're saying in part of the amendment?  
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
25. Senator De Angelis.  
26. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:  
27. The free choices.  
28. SENATOR D'ARCO:  
29. You're...limiting to two doctors. He has the free choice of  
30. going to two doctors.  
31. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:  
32. Yes, subsequent referrals are not included, but two free  
33. choices.



1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator D'Arco.

3. SENATOR D'ARCO:

4. Okay, and the other part of the amendment has to do with  
5. work related injuries, and you're trying to exclude areas that  
6. the Supreme Court of Illinois has, either by way of interpretation  
7. or otherwise decided are or are not considered to be work  
8. related injuries, and they, in fact, have interpreted those  
9. activities one way or the other. Is that correct? You're  
10. nodding in agreement...

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator De Angelis.

13. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

14. I would think you're...basically correct, Senator D'Arco.  
15. There has been indicated and, although labor might not agree  
16. with the expansion of the exemption, they have, in fact,  
17. expressed concern for the abuse in that particular area, and  
18. they, in fact, have also indicated that they are not really in  
19. favor of doctor shopping.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. Senator D'Arco.

22. SENATOR D'ARCO:

23. There's no question about that, but that was the reason  
24. why we put in the...the impartial panel of doctors to avoid  
25. doctor shopping. That's exactly why we did that. In fact, I  
26. had the amendment that would do what you wanted, in lieu of the  
27. impartial panel of doctors amendment that was put in the bill.  
28. Now, you can't have your cake and eat it too, and let's vote  
29. down the amendment, and go home.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Donnewald.

32. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

33. Well, Mr. President, and members of the Body. I certainly  
agree almost to the point of voting for it, but I think we're

1. going a little bit too far. Now, I have an Amendment No.  
2. 5 that's next in line, if we defeat this, we will adopt  
3. an amendment that was agreeable on the part of all parties  
4. concerned earlier. This expands the exemptions to areas  
5. that Senator De Angelis had described, and the Drug Abuse  
6. Program and all...which are under the direct supervision of  
7. the employer. I would...I would state that we can go as far  
8. as saying accidental injuries incurred, which is in my amendment  
9. by the way, so I won't have to explain it again, "while partic-  
10. ipating in voluntary recreational programs including, but not  
11. limited to athletic events, parties, and picnics, that do not  
12. arise out of, and in the course of the employment even though  
13. the employer pays for some of the cost thereof. This exclusion  
14. shall not apply in the event that the injured employee was  
15. ordered or assigned by his employer to participate in the program."  
16. I would urge that we adopt...that we defeat this amendment, and  
17. adopt the amendment forthcoming.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. Senator Geo-Karis.

20. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

21. There's so many amendments here. Is your LRB number...does  
22. it end up in JDVAM 09? 09. Good, that's all I wanted to  
23. know.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Lemke.

26. SENATOR LEMKE:

27. The concept of limiting free choice of medical is a good  
28. concept, but the only problem I can see with it is we have  
29. a problem with a man that's injured, if you limit it to two,  
30. sometimes he has to go to two or three specialists for treatment.  
31. I mean a guy could get injured on the job, go to a general  
32. practitioner, want to go to an eye doctor, want to go to a hearing  
33. expert, and you get into specialists. So, if you're limited to two,

1. he's stuck, he can't go...keep going to a specialist. So, I  
2. think that the concept is good, but I don't think this amend-  
3. ment is any good, and I think we should resist it.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Collins.

6. SENATOR COLLINS:

7. My concern, I think, would be taken care of in Senator  
8. Donnewald's amendment. Senate...question of the sponsor, please.  
9. Senator De Angelis, could you just run through on your...this  
10. amendment now, those exempt areas that you're talking about?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator De Angelis.

13. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

14. Yes, Senator Collins. Before I do that, let me just address  
15. myself to Senator Lemke, I know he's busy passing out his own  
16. amendments, and probably doesn't have enough time to read this  
17. one, but the specialist is a referral and would, in fact, be  
18. eligible under this bill, Senator Lemke. You're really wrong  
19. on where you're going with it, okay. Now, to address myself  
20. to yours, Senator Collins. What you're exempting is risks re-  
21. lated to...recreational programs and activities including but  
22. not limited to athletics, hobbies, picnics and parties, rest  
23. and relaxation of traveling employees, use of employer owned  
24. or operated parking lots, and transportation arrangements, which  
25. by the way, are covered by different forms of law, and alcoholic  
26. and drug treatment programs offered by the employer, and I want  
27. to mention something here. You know, all through this we've  
28. heard about how employers are reluctant to engage in rehabilitation  
29. how insurance companies don't, in fact, encourage rehabilitation  
30. and now you're saying..or the courts are saying that if you,  
31. in fact, attempt to rehabilitate somebody, but during the course  
32. of that rehabilitation something should happen to them, you become  
33. responsible under Worker's Comp. Well, you can't have it both

1. ways either John, you can't have your cake and eat it, too.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator Collins.

4. SENATOR COLLINS:

5. Yes, but Senator De Angelis, I think Senator Donnewald's  
6. amendment addressed that issue in a more reasonable way. The  
7. other thing that bothers me about your...this amendment that  
8. you exclude employee...employer owned parking lot. Supposing  
9. there's some hazards out there and a person gets hurt,  
10. you exempt that person that gets hurt into...to...to a parking  
11. lot that's owned by the employer?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Senator De Angelis.

14. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

15. Senator Collins, that would be covered under liability  
16. insurance, anyhow. We're not exempting them from all forms  
17. of insurance, we're only exempting them from Worker's Compen-  
18. sation under that particular situation. It's not a work  
19. related injury, and I want to differ with you. Senator  
20. Donnewald's is much more restricted than this, it only covers  
21. recreational and amusement.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Collins.

24. SENATOR COLLINS:

25. The...the other concern is the...the alcoholic treatment  
26. program. If it's totally operated and provided by the employer  
27. then why wouldn't that employer be liable for whatever dis-  
28. abilities occur to that person as a result of treatment there,  
29. at least partially responsible?

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator De Angelis.

32. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

33. Senator Collins, those centers are not operated by the

1. employer, they're generally hospital or rehabilitation facilities  
2. so, he has no control over that facility. But I guess if you're  
3. really concerned about that, the better alternative would  
4. probably be not to take the risk and attempt to rehabilitate  
5. the person, and then we don't have any problem at all.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Collins.

8. SENATOR COLLINS:

9. I disagree, and I'm opposed to your amendment.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Wooten.

12. SENATOR WOOTEN:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. I am sorry to contribute  
14. to this all taking time, but this may be the most important  
15. thing we do this Session, and I'd hope we'd get it right this  
16. time. I talked also about doctor shopping, and I think both  
17. sides agree that that is a problem. I just...Senator De Angelis,  
18. and Senator Donnewald both, just a rhetorical question, but  
19. I hope you hear it, Senator De Angelis. No, I say this is...  
20. I don't expect a precise answer, but I want to put a thought  
21. in your mind as well as Senator Donnewald's, and I'm trying to  
22. read both amendments. What do you do about doctor shopping on  
23. the other side? I've talked to lawyers on both sides and they  
24. both freely admit that in some cases the employer shop around  
25. for doctors, just the way the employees do, and I don't see  
26. any restriction on that. Maybe we can count on good faith  
27. to take care of it, but I just noticed it..I don't think  
28. it's covered in either one. Secondly, I believe that Senator  
29. Donnewald may have taken care of a problem that could arise  
30. with a single choice in just saying there are going to be two  
31. because it will occur that a man will go to a doctor, be referred  
32. to a specialist who will refer him to Mayo's, and so on. I  
33. just want to be sure that that is all covered, and I...I don't

1. see a precise addressment of a specific case where an employee,  
2. I believe, was required to take alcoholic treatment as a  
3. condition of continuing to be employed, a tremendous award  
4. was made because he was injured in that treatment, and I  
5. believe that your expression says if it's voluntary, and  
6. I don't think Senator Donnewald addresses that at all. So,  
7. quite frankly, I don't know which is the best option to go  
8. here. I...I'm not sure that either amendment completely  
9. addresses all of the concerns that I have heard.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Was that a question, Senator? Do you expect an answer?  
12. Senator Rock.

13. SENATOR ROCK:

14. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
15. Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 4, and would  
16. strongly suggest to the members on this side and to the  
17. members in the Chamber, that Amendment No. 5 is a better approach.  
18. It is...admittedly does not go as far as does Amendment No. 4,  
19. however, again, I think we are back to the real world. We are  
20. attempting to do something meaningful, but let's do what is  
21. doable, and let's not play games. I urge the defeat of Amendment  
22. No. 4.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Washington.

25. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

26. Yes, Mr. President. I concur with Senators Donnewald  
27. and Rock for a change. Senator De Angelis, you place a limitation  
28. on the concept of arising out of...in the course of employment, and  
29. you deal with voluntary recreational programs, and I won't  
30. quarrel with that part, but you say that...in your amendment,  
31. that unless these activities arise out of the principal activities  
32. of the employee, then he would not be covered under the Act,  
33. and I think that's an unnecessary restriction and burden. Senator

1. Donnewald's amendment, however, on lines 18 and 19 of Amendment  
2. 5, state that if one is ordered or assigned by the employer  
3. to do that, then that...any injury which he had would arise  
4. out of...in the course of employment. Well, clearly a lot of  
5. these recreational activities are strictly promotional...or  
6. promotional and designed to enhance the image of the employer  
7. and there's nothing wrong with that, but if they order someone  
8. to do so, or if that's part of their function to do so, then  
9. it seems to me that they should certainly come under the  
10. coverage of the Act, and your bill precludes that, in other  
11. words it's too restrictive even assuming that that's a good amend-  
12. ment. I think it's a fatal flaw in your amendment, Sir.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Senator D'Arco for the second time.

15. SENATOR D'ARCO:

16. No, I don't want to speak.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Lemke.

19. SENATOR LEMKE:

20. I'm not on.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Well, you were, I put your name down on the list. Is  
23. there further discussion? If not, Senator De Angelis moves  
24. for the adoption of Amendment No. 4 to Senate Bill 1739. Senator,  
25. do you wish to close debate?

26. SENATOR DE ANGELIS:

27. Just a...thank you, Mr. President. Just to narrow down  
28. the decision to an easier basis. The provisions for doctor  
29. shopping are identical...this amendment and the next amendment.  
30. So, Senator Wooten, your decision is limited to only fifty  
31. percent of this particular amendment. Now, the reason...and I  
32. would agree, that it is quite more expansive than Senator  
33. Donnewald's but we, in fact, have to address ourselves to the

1. abuses in this particular area. An employee who walks through  
2. a parking lot, and slips and falls in the snow, will, in fact,  
3. be compensated by another form of insurance. Why should he,  
4. in fact, be compensated by Worker's Comp. as well, or instead  
5. of? The other thing is, and I go back to the point. We're  
6. trying to encourage people to rehabilitate people, and I might  
7. point out, that the person that you referred to that died  
8. did not die because something was done to him while he  
9. was rehabilitated. He died because he happened to be there  
10. while he was being rehabilitated, and given the three hundred  
11. thousand dollars. I urge your support for Amendment No. 4.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. The question is, shall Amendment No. 4 be adopted. Those  
14. in favor will indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed No. Roll  
15. call has been requested. Those who wish to adopt Amendment No.  
16. 4 to Senate Bill 1739 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote  
17. Nay, and the voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have  
18. all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the  
19. Ayes are 27, the Nays are 30. None Voting Present. Amendment  
20. No. 4 having failed to receive a majority vote is declared failed.  
21. Any further amendments?

22. SECRETARY:

23. Amendment No. 5 offered by Senator Donnewald.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Donnewald.

26. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

27. Yes, Mr. President. I...I think that we've really discussed  
28. the amendment in the previous debate on Amendment No. 4, and I  
29. would urge that Amendment No. 5 be adopted.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

32. SENATOR NIMROD:

33. Yes, I...question of the sponsor, in that area pertaining  
to where we're defining recreational areas. Are we not falling



1. into a very serious pitfall by describing, in fact, picking  
2. on one or two things and saying that they're exempt and then  
3. the employers become liable for everything else? And this is  
4. one of the big problems of the whole area that we're talking  
5. about, and that's why I'm afraid that your...your particular  
6. bill is going to make the employer really be responsible and  
7. involved in a lot more liability than I think that even exists  
8. today. So, that's one reason I cannot support your bill. Don't  
9. you feel that that's the same problem, Senator Donnewald?

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Donnewald.

12. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

13. No.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Donnewald  
16. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 5 to Senate Bill 1739. Those  
17. in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have  
18. it. Amendment No...Amendment No. 5 is adopted. Any further  
19. amendments?

20. SECRETARY:

21. Amendment No. 6 offered by Senator Nimrod.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Nimrod.

24. SENATOR NIMROD:

25. Thank you, Mr. President. For those of you that have the  
26. amendments there, you'll look at Amendment No. A is on your  
27. desks, this addresses itself to loss...the standard...loss  
28. of hearing standards. It concerns itself with the subject  
29. where we presently have no definitions today. Whereas the result  
30. of the changes in the Workmen's Compensation Act that in most  
31. cases in loss of hearing there were no cases or maybe one case  
32. inside of a year, and one company alone in Caterpillar there  
33. were over three hundred cases involved in the loss of hearing.  
Now, the Industrial Commission has held some hearings, and they

1. have put those hearings aside...before they make any decisions,  
2. and what's happening is that, in fact, on this very basis, the  
3. Governor has, in fact, instructed the department...the Industrial  
4. Commission to not make any decisions on that and looking for some  
5. direction from the Legislature, and it says here, the determination  
6. of the hearing loss has provoked considerable debate. The  
7. General Assembly may wish to clear guidance of the commission  
8. on that issue. I've instructed the commission to place the  
9. question of casual connection of hearing loss and determination  
10. of percent liability on a holding...to hold pending legislative  
11. action. I think what we need to do is to give them some direction  
12. and seeing that this is a vital...of concern, it does affect the  
13. premium costs to employers. I think it's something where we  
14. need a definition and some standards to be set. Since we've  
15. turned down the medical standards, we should, at, least, adopt  
16. and accept...that...the hearing loss standards which is a serious  
17. problem, become a part of this particular bill. I would move  
18. for the adoption of this amendment.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator D'Arco.

21. SENATOR D'ARCO:

22. Again, Mr. President, we're trying to adopt standards  
23. in a bill that we have discussed over and over again, and it  
24. ...and just because it's hearing loss standards, it's just as  
25. much standards as medical standards, and I would oppose the  
26. adoption of Amendment No. 6.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Rock.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
31. Senate. I rise in opposition to Amedment No. 6, and I will  
32. rise in opposition to the succeeding thirty or so amendments  
33. that have been filed. I think the bill with amendments that have

1. been considered and adopted, frankly, is in the shape it  
2. should be in. I congratulate publicly both Senators  
3. DeAngelis and Donnewald, for their untiring efforts in this  
4. regard, but I think it was fully discussed in committee. It  
5. has been fully discussed in enumerable conferences held  
6. in this building, and I think the bill is now in final  
7. form, as we should send it to the House, and we ought to  
8. resist just out of hand every single amendment including  
9. No. 6, and I urge a No vote.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Is there further discussion? Senator Wooten.

12. SENATOR WOOTEN:

13. Serious point of order. I know you want a roll call on  
14. each and every one of these, can't we do them all at once? Oh,  
15. come on guys. Okay.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Nimrod, you may close debate.

18. SENATOR NIMROD:

19. Well, it seems to me that what we're doing is saying look,  
20. here's your package, you take it the way we're giving it to you  
21. or you don't get it at all, and if you want some meaningful  
22. change, and you want something to happen here that's not  
23. demagoguery, Mr. President, then I think that what we have to  
24. do is to address ourselves to the increasing costs of premiums.  
25. I tell you outside of preexisting conditions, you have basically  
26. done nothing with the proposal in the bill that's been presented  
27. to us today. It's vital, in fact, if we're going to have any  
28. kind of relief for business, or address the business climate  
29. that we adopt some of these changes. Now, in one fell swoop  
30. in 1975, you, on that side of the aisle, made one hundred and  
31. twenty one changes in the Workmen's Compensation Act, and all  
32. we're trying to do is to provide something reasonable.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. For what purpose does Senator Rhoads arise?

2. SENATOR RHOADS:

3. Just...just to call for a little order, Mr. President.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Could we have a little order in the Chamber. Could we  
6. break up those conferences, Senator Keats, Senator Philip,  
7. Senator...DiPrima, if you'll take your conference off the Floor. Senator  
8. Nimrod, you may close.

9. SENATOR NIMROD:

10. I would move for adoption of this amendment.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator Nimrod moves for the adoption of Amendment No. 6  
13. to Senate Bill 1739. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye.  
14. Those opposed. The Nays have it. A roll call has been requested.  
15. Those in favor of adopting Amendment No. 6 will vote Aye. Those  
16. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who  
17. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
18. the Ayes are 25, the Nays are 29. None Voting Present.  
19. Amendment No. 6 having failed to receive a majority vote is  
20. declared failed. For what purpose does Senator Rhoads arise?

21. SENATOR RHOADS:

22. Yes, on a point of order, Mr. President.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. State your point.

25. SENATOR RHOADS:

26. You know, the remarks just made a minute ago by the President  
27. of the Senate border on being almost a little irresponsible.  
28. Now, this is a Legislative Body, it's a deliberative Body, I'm  
29. hearing cat calls from the Democratic side of the aisle, well,  
30. we're wasting time, it's all cut and dried, it may be. It may  
31. be that every single roll call on every single amendment may be  
32. the same numbers, I don't know, but these sponsors deserve a  
33. hearing. They've drafted these amendments. As members of this

1. Senate, they have a right to present these amendments, and  
2. we owe them the courtesy, any sponsor of any amendment at  
3. time on any bill, members of the committee or not members of  
4. the committee, whether they've been involved in prior delib-  
5. erations or not, they are owed the courtesy of a hearing on this  
6. Floor and a roll call on this Floor and they deserve that  
7. courtesy without any undue harassment by Leadership on either  
8. side.

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(END OF REEL)

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Donnewald, for what purpose do you arise?

3. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

4. A point of personal privilege. I...

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. State your point.

7. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

8. ...I've been here...second in...in time, and I think, that  
9. Senator Rhoads was here at one time when a fine man on the  
10. opposite side of the aisle, he is now deceased, Russell W.  
11. Arrington; and I remember, vividly, when it was about nine-  
12. teen to thirty-seven or thirty-eight or whatever it was.  
13. We're not trying to take away the right of debate at all;  
14. I think we all know what the outcome will be. If you want  
15. a roll call, we'll have one on each bill, but I do remember,  
16. so very well, 1966, 67, 68...

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Bruce.

19. SENATOR BRUCE:

20. Since we are on the order of publicly expressing concerns,  
21. let me express a concern that I heard given by Senator Nimrod  
22. that he had personally contacted the Industrial Commission  
23. and ask them to put on hold their consideration of hearing  
24. standards until we had taken action. I don't know what the  
25. Governmental Ethics Act says about involvement of Legislative  
26. people in the Executive Branch, but I, frankly, bristle at  
27. the fact that people in this Chamber call up the Industrial  
28. Commission and say don't do anything on hearing standards,  
29. or don't do this on something else depending on what we do.  
30. They are the Executive Branch of Government; they have the  
31. right to operate; and to direct them from here, depending  
32. what we want to get done on the Legislative Floor, frankly,  
33. just rubbed me the wrong way a little bit, too. Just so we

1. can express, publicly, all of our concerns.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. For what purpose does Senator Regner arise?

4. SENATOR REGNER:

5. I was just wondering if Senator Bruce thinks that

6. applies to the IEA, also.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. For what purpose does Senator Buzbee arise?

9. SENATOR BUZBEE:

10. Mr. President, I just wondered if this is the time

11. for us to all stand up and say who we are mad at. I'm mad

12. at Senator Regner because he opposed me this morning.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Senator Nimrod, for what purpose do you arise?

15. SENATOR NIMROD:

16. Yeah, Mr. President, just to clarify the record, if...

17. if Senator Bruce had been paying attention, he would have

18. known that I was reading from a letter from the Governor;

19. and it was the Governor of this State that asked the Department...

20. Industrial Commission to hold aside, and put aside those

21. hearings standards; not Senator Nimrod.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Bruce.

24. SENATOR BRUCE:

25. Then I publicly apologize, Senator, I...I did not hear

26. the fact that you were reading a letter. I thought that

27. that was from you, and that would have been improper. I

28. apologize for the misunderstanding. There is a little dis-

29. order on the Floor, but I should have paid closer attention.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator D'Arco, for what purpose do you arise?

32. SENATOR D'ARCO:

33. I remember when I first came to this Senate, and Senator

1. Graham was on the other side, and I gave a prayer; and it  
2. was bordered on being sacrilegious, and he got up and...  
3. he said, "you know, you shouldn't do that; it's wrong."  
4. And I got up and I apologized to him, and I really think  
5. that...President Rock's remarks...were very understandable,  
6. and very precise and President Rock has always done a fine  
7. job as President. And I think Senator Rhoads' remarks,  
8. concerning President Rock's remarks, bordered on being  
9. irresponsible.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
11. Senator Shapiro.

12. SENATOR SHAPIRO:  
13. Mr. President, let's move on with Amendment 8.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
15. Are there further amendments, Mr. Secretary?

16. SECRETARY:  
17. Amendment No. 7, offered by Senator Nimrod.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
19. Senator Nimrod.

20. SENATOR NIMROD:  
21. This is No. 7?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
23. No. 7.

24. SENATOR NIMROD:  
25. No. 7, really gets to the core of what we adopted, partly  
26. in No. 5, Senator Donnewald; and it addresses, also, what  
27. Senator De Angelis was attempting to be done. And in all  
28. seriousness, I do know that we are all attempting to come up  
29. with a solution that will affect the whole climate...the business  
30. climate in this State. It seems to me, for a long time, what  
31. we have been crying about are definitions in an attitude.  
32. And this amendment, in fact, goes into the crux of the very  
33. thing, and it says that what we need to do is to define and



1. let the insurance companies and let the public know the whole  
2. attitude...the Industrial Commission and everyone know about  
3. what we mean by accidental injury, arising out of and in the  
4. course of...and risks peculiar to the employment. I think  
5. if we were to be able to address ourselves to define these  
6. particular problems, I think we would go a long way in solving  
7. the problems with the present Act that addresses us in the  
8. Workmen's Compensation Act. I would move for the adoption  
9. of this particular amendment.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Is there further discussion? Senator Rock.

12. SENATOR ROCK:

13. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to  
14. Amendment No. 7. As I indicated, I think, in a general way,  
15. I intend to oppose each succeeding amendment, having gone  
16. over most of them, if not all of them. I think an attempt,  
17. like this, although it is certainly within the members' right;  
18. these bills have been subject of a great deal of negotiation.  
19. I think they are and should remain in the form in which they  
20. are currently, and I oppose Amendment No. 7.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Nimrod  
23. moves the...Senator Nimrod, do you wish to close debate?  
24. Senator Nimrod moves the adoption of Amendment No. 7 to Senate  
25. Bill 1739. All those in favor indicate...roll call has been  
26. requested. All right, is there going to be a roll call re-  
27. quested on the rest of these, too? All those in favor will  
28. vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open.  
29. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take  
30. the record. On that question, the Ayes are 26, the Nays are  
31. 30, none Voting Present. Amendment No. 7, having failed  
32. to receive a majority, is declared failed. Any further  
33. amendments?

1. SECRETARY:  
2. Amendment No. 8, offered by Senator Nimrod.  
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
4. Senator Nimrod.  
5. SENATOR NIMROD:  
6. Thank you, Mr. President. Briefly, Amendment No. 8  
7. addresses the Selection Medical Panel...was attempted to  
8. address this. I think we need a much a broader definition  
9. to it, and I would move for the adoption of this amendment.  
10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
11. Is there further discussion? Senator Rock.  
12. SENATOR ROCK:  
13. I think this subject matter has been discussed in both  
14. Amendments No. 4, and we have adopted Amendment No. 5. I,  
15. therefore, rise in opposition to Amendment No. 8.  
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
17. If there's no further discussion, the question is shall  
18. Senate...shall Amendment No. 8 be adopted to Senate Bill  
19. 1739. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will  
20. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
21. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
22. the Ayes are 25, the Nays are 29, none Voting Present.  
23. Amendment No. 8, having failed to receive a majority, is  
24. declared...failed. Any further amendments?  
25. SECRETARY:  
26. Amendment No. 9, offered by Senator Nimrod.  
27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
28. Senator Nimrod.  
29. SENATOR NIMROD.  
30. Yeah...Amendment No. 9, basically, covers medical stand-  
31. ards. It's in a different form. We've discussed it very  
32. effectively. I would call for a roll call in the vote.  
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Rock.

2. SENATOR ROCK:

3. I rise..thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentle-  
4. men of the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No.  
5. 9. It seems to me, we are at this point, really engaging  
6. in a form of demagoguery. This horse has already been whopped.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. If there is no further discussion, those in favor of  
9. adopting Amendment No. 9 will vote Aye. Those opposed will  
10. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?  
11. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
12. the Ayes are 26, the Nays are 30, none Voting Present.  
13. Amendment No. 9, having failed to receive the majority,  
14. is declared failed. Any further amendments?

15. SECRETARY:

16. Amendment No. 10, offered by Senator Nimrod.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Nimrod.

19. SENATOR NIMROD:

20. Amendment No. 10, changes the time limitation that you  
21. have time to file a claim. It changes it from three years  
22. to two years, to make it similar to the Civil Law. I would  
23. move for the adoption of this very simple amendment.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Rock.

26. SENATOR ROCK:

27. Thank you, Mr. President. Although the amendment is  
28. simple in terms of changes; it, in fact, has a great deal  
29. of impact, and it was the subject of some lengthy negotiation.  
30. I would urge the defeat of Amendment No. 10.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. On that question, those in favor of adopting Amend-  
33. ment No. 10 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.

1. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted  
2. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are  
3. 27, the Nays had 29, none Voting Present. Amendment No. 10,  
4. having failed to receive the majority, is declared failed.  
5. Any further amendments?

6. SECRETARY:

7. Amendment No. 11, offered by Senator Nimrod.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Senator Nimrod.

10. SENATOR NIMROD:

11. This...this amendment, probably addresses itself to the  
12. premium charge...or change, probably the most effectively.  
13. It's the one area, I think, that does deserve some thought,  
14. on most of our parts. What it is, it addresses the permanent-  
15. partial part, where it changes the present basis from  
16. six and two-thirds to fifty percent of the average weekly  
17. wage. What that means is when a person goes back to work,  
18. and he is getting fully paid for his disability...for his  
19. employment, on a full pay; then he will not be continuing  
20. getting sixty-six and two-thirds percent of his money, for  
21. the time he is working...for the number of weeks that he has been  
22. awarded. It seems to me that this ought to be a more  
23. reasonable kind of approach; and it's an area, I think, that  
24. really affects the premium costs, and I would ask the adoption  
25. of this particular amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Rock.

28. SENATOR ROCK:

29. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
30. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No...No. 11.  
31. I think any attempt, at this point in time, on this bill  
32. to drastically reduce the benefits to the injured party,  
33. simply is going nowhere; and I would urge the defeat of  
34. Amendment No. 11.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. On that question...Senator Nimrod.

3. SENATOR NIMROD:

4. Just...just in closing. This would still leave Illinois  
5. probably No. 1 in the country in benefits to the employees  
6. on the basis of permanent-partial.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. The question is shall Senate...Senate Amendment No. 11  
9. be adopted. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed  
10. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who  
11. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
12. question, the Ayes are 22, the Nays are 33, none Voting  
13. Present. Amendment No. 11, having failed to receive a  
14. majority, is declared failed. Any further amendments?

15. SECRETARY:

16. Amendment No. 12, offered by Senator Lemke.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Lemke. Senator Lemke has graciously offered  
19. to Table all his amendments. I think that was ten in number.

20. SECRETARY:

21. Amendment...Amendment No. 12, offered by Senator Regner.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Regner.

24. SENATOR REGNER:

25. Mr. President, I think that first amendment  
26. I have offered is in conflict with the amendment of Senator  
27. Donnewald's, as adopted; I would suggest it just be pulled  
28. from the record.

29. SECRETARY:

30. Amendment No. 12, offered by Senator Regner...It's  
31. Number 2.

32. SENATOR REGNER:

33. Yes, Mr. President, what this amendment does, it

1. eliminates automatic awards, such as not less than sixty weeks  
2. for each fractured vertebrae or a hundred weeks for a loss  
3. of spleen; provides that they be covered under the man-as-  
4. a-whole provision. Presently, an individual may have five  
5. fractured vertebrae; at . under this section, it would constitute  
6. three hundred weeks of compensation, yet have no lasting  
7. disability. This amendment would not deprive any disabled  
8. individual from compensation; but would just eliminate the  
9. present mandate for unwarranted benefit payments, and I  
10. move its adoption.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Is there further discussion? Senator Rock.

13. SENATOR ROCK:

14. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
15. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 12, and  
16. wish to relate to the Body, that this subject matter, in  
17. specific terms was discussed by both Senators Donnewald  
18. and De Angelis. It was decided, at this point, that it was  
19. not a good idea. It is still not a good idea, and I would  
20. urge the defeat of Amendment No. 12.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Is there further discussion? If not, the question is  
23. shall...do you request a roll call? Shall Senate Amendment  
24. No. 12 be adopted. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those  
25. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted  
26. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On  
27. that question, the Ayes are 25, the Nays are 30. Amendment  
28. No. 12, having failed to receive a majority, is declared  
29. failed. Any further amendments?

30. SECRETARY:

31. Amendment No. 13, offered by Senator Regner.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. For what purpose does Senator Berning arise?

1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. On a point of personal privilege. I would like someone,  
3. hopefully, to explain to me whether or not the statement made  
4. by Senator Regner in reference to the previous amendment is  
5. correct. Does a person with two fractured ribs qualify for  
6. a hundred and twenty weeks? Something has to be absolutely  
7. wrong, if we are going to say that because a person has one  
8. fractured rib, there is...I don't care if it's vertebrae,  
9. rib or what it is. If one qualifies for sixty weeks; two,  
10. the same injury, is going to make it a hundred and twenty  
11. and on up, that is totally unrealistic. Is that the explanation,  
12. Mr. President?

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Well...evidentially, no one wishes to answer your question,  
15. Senator.

16. SENATOR BERNING:

17. Well, then I have to assume that my assumption is correct;  
18. and I think we are, really, demagogues.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Are there any further amendments?

21. SECRETARY:

22. Amendment No. 13, offered by Senator Regner.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Regner.

25. SENATOR REGNER:

26. Yes, Mr. President and members. This amendment eliminates  
27. optional methods of recovery by stipulating that the injury  
28. must be compensated for under the provisions of the applicable...  
29. subsection, rather than allow a choice between that and man-as-  
30. a-whole. The problem has been the interference with equitable  
31. settlements. The Act originally provided for recovery under  
32. the specific section, based on the nature of the disability.  
33. Now, the law permits a choice between the man-as-a-whole; so,

1. litigation has increased and the settlement process impeded.  
2. For example, a mangled leg used to be covered under the  
3. Specific Loss Schedule; but, now, the employee can choose  
4. to be considered under the man...as-a-whole. This amend-  
5. ment eliminates that choice by limiting coverage to the  
6. designated section. I'd move its adoption.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Senator Rock.

9. SENATOR ROCK:

10. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
11. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment 13. This  
12. matter, also, was specifically discussed. There is no way  
13. to reach any kind of an agreement on this subject matter at  
14. this time, in this bill; and I would urge the defeat of  
15. Amendment No. 13.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. The question is shall Amendment No. 13 be adopted. Those  
18. in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The  
19. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted  
20. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are  
21. 25, the Nays are 29, none Voting Present. Amendment No. 13  
22. having failed to receive a majority is declared failed. Any  
23. further amendments?

24. SECRETARY:

25. Amendment No. 14, offered by Senator Regner.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER:

27. Senator Regner. For what...

28. SENATOR REGNER:

29. Yes, Mr. President and members. This amendment lowers  
30. the cap on permanent and partial awards from one hundred per  
31. cent of the State-wide average weekly wage, now two hundred  
32. and sixty-five dollars to sixty-six and two-thirds...percent  
33. of the State-wide average weekly wage, which would be



1. approximately a hundred and...which is a hundred and seventy-  
2. seven dollars at present. Persons whose earnings are less  
3. than the State-wide average weekly wage will still receive  
4. two-thirds of their prior weekly wage. Under this amendment,  
5. the rate for permanent-partial awards would stay at sixty-  
6. six and two-thirds percent of the...individual's pay, but  
7. we...would be capped at sixty-six and two-thirds percent of  
8. the State average weekly wage, and instead of the present  
9. one hundred percent of the State weekly...average weekly wage.

10. I move for adoption of Amendment No. 14.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator Rock.

13. SENATOR ROCK:

14. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
15. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 14. This,  
16. again, is an attempt to cut back on existing benefits to the  
17. injured party. It simply should not go anywhere and I would  
18. urge the defeat of Amendment No. 14.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. The question is shall Amendment No. 14 be adopted. Those  
21. in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The  
22. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
23. wish? Take the record. For what purpose does Senator Grot-  
24. berg arise? You're in the middle of a roll call, Senator.  
25. On that question, the Ayes are 23, the Nays are 32, none Voting  
26. Present. Amendment No. 14 having failed to receive a majority  
27. is declared failed. Any further amendments?

28. SECRETARY:

29. Amendment No. 15, offered by Senator Regner.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Regner.

32. SENATOR REGNER:

33. Yes, Mr. President. This is in conflict with the amendment

1. of Senator Donnewald's, and I just ask that it be withdrawn.  
2. And, also, the next one is standards, and we have debated that  
3. earlier. So, that one should also be withdrawn. So, it would  
4. be actually No. 7 of mine that I do want to talk about.

5. SECRETARY:

6. Amendment No. 15, offered by Senator Regner.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Senator Regner.

9. SENATOR REGNER:

10. Mr. President, this amendment simply redefines the average  
11. weekly wage for the...purposes of computing compensation, to  
12. make the section less confusing and to provide that a part-time  
13. or casual worker would be compensated on the base of actual  
14. part-time earnings instead of assuming that the individual  
15. is working full-time. And, I don't think anything could be  
16. more fair than that and I move its adoption.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Rock.

19. SENATOR ROCK:

20. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
21. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 15. I  
22. can readily assume, I think, correctly, that the redefinition  
23. of the average weekly wage would result, ultimately, in a  
24. lowering, again, of the benefits available under the existing  
25. law to the injured party. I just don't think it should go  
26. anywhere and I would urge the defeat of Amendment No. 15.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. On that question, those in favor of adopting Amendment  
29. No. 15 will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The  
30. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted  
31. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are  
32. 26, the Nays are 29, none Voting Present. Amendment No. 15  
33. having failed to receive the majority is declared failed.  
34. For what purpose does Senator Grotberg arise?

1. SENATOR GROTBORG:  
2. To verify the negative vote.  
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
4. There has been a request for a verification of the negative  
5. vote. Will all the members please be in their seats, and  
6. answer as your name is called. Mr. Secretary, call the roll.  
7. SECRETARY:  
8. The following voted in the negative: Berman, Bruce,

17. Is Jeremiah Joyce...  
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
19. Is Senator Joyce...Jeremiah Joyce on the Floor? There  
20. he is.  
21. SENATOR GROTBORG:  
22. Senator Netsch?  
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
24. Is Senator Netsch on the Floor? Senator Netsch? Strike  
25. her name.  
26. SENATOR GROTBORG:  
27. Senator Savickas. Sorry. Great compliment to you, Mr.  
28. President, I'm sorry. Senator Maragos. I don't know, you  
29. multiplied awful fast there, folks. Thank you very much.  
30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)  
31. The roll call is verified and the roll call is 26 Ayes,  
32. 28 Nays. Amendment No. 15 is failed. Any further amendments?  
33. SECRETARY:

1. Amendment No. 16, offered by Senator Nimrod.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Senator Nimrod.

4. SENATOR NIMROD:

5. Yeah, thank you, Mr. President. One...one question I  
6. wanted to ask. I think we have skipped an amendment; not  
7. that I'm going to call it, but I think it's among the group  
8. there. My number H...I'm sorry, G, which is LRB 311 SJDAM 08. And  
9. I don't think it was called, but that's okay. It has to  
10. do with Occupational Diseases. I won't bother with that.  
11. The...this amendment is a clarifying amendment, because of  
12. a Senate Bill 1541, which involved us in the conservation  
13. of energy pertaining to employees and car pooling and left  
14. us with the problem of van pooling, with the employer being  
15. liable and the employees not. And, what this does is just  
16. clarifies the situation; it says that if you're going to  
17. participate in ridership or car pooling or van pooling, or  
18. arrangement operated by any employee, whether it's an employee  
19. or an employer, or any other person between his or her home  
20. and the place of residence, that it gives them the exemption.  
21. And, I think it's only fair to clarify the law under that  
22. basis, and I would move for the adoption of this amend-  
23. ment.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator Rock.

26. SENATOR ROCK:

27. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of  
28. the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 16, having  
29. just received a copy of it. We have a series of bills that  
30. directly address this problem, and I...do not think that  
31. the proper vehicle, at this point, is 1739. There are a  
32. series of four or five bills that were sponsored by  
33. Senator Lemke, that directly address this problem on

1. behalf of the business community. They have, I am told, been  
2. agreed to and we should stay with that agreement; and I  
3. would urge the defeat of Amendment No. 16.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Is there further discussion? Senator Nimrod.

6. SENATOR NIMROD:

7. Thank you, Mr. President. In closing, I don't know who  
8. the bills have been agreed to by; and, number two, is those  
9. bills are no longer in the Senate. So, it seems to me, that  
10. we don't have an opportunity to amend those bills; and,  
11. certainly, there is no agreement with anyone that I know of,  
12. and this is certainly a flagrant violation of saying that  
13. it's okay for employees, but certainly bringing out the fact  
14. that employers are, in fact, liable. I think this is a  
15. very fair and...amendment, and it certainly should be in-  
16. cluded...if we are going to have any consideration of con-  
17. servation of energy. Otherwise, we will find that employers  
18. will be discontinuing those particular services. Right after  
19. that bill...Senate Bill 1541 left this Chamber, and it was  
20. voted down, I had a call from several companies, and, in fact,  
21. I did get a direct telegram from Zenith Corporation who said,  
22. for example, they would have to discontinue their van pooling  
23. if Senate Bill 1541 passes.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Is there further discussion? Senator Lemke, for what  
26. purpose do you arise? That was closing arguments.

30. The question is shall Amendment No. 16 be adopted. Those  
31. in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The

2. having failed to receive a majority is declared failed. Any

15. Senator De Angelis. Senator Maragos.
16. SENATOR MARAGOS:
17. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I am offering
18. this...Committee Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1740, which
19. is the sponsor's wish; and it puts the bill in the shape...
20. with the technicalities as he wishes it, and I move its...
21. for its adoption.
22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
23. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? All in

24. (Secretary reads title of bill)  
25. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.  
26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
27. Are there amendments from the Floor?  
28. SECRETARY:  
29. No Floor amendments.  
30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
31. 3rd reading...Senate Bill 1771, Senator Savickas.  
32. Read...Senate Bill 1777, Senator Lemke. Senate Bill 1781,  
33. Senator Nedza. Senate Bill 1810, Senator...Davidson. Read

1. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

2. SECRETARY:

3. Senate Bill 1810.

4. (Secretary reads title of bill)

5. 2nd reading of the bill. Oh, by the way, this had a request

6. for a fiscal note which has been answered. 2nd reading of

7. the bill. No committee amendments.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Are there amendments from the Floor?

10. SECRETARY:

11. Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Davidson.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Senator Davidson on Amendment No. 1.

14. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

15. Yes, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Amendment

16. No. 1...puts this bill into the phase-out of the distilling

17. equipment...alcohol distilling equipment on the same basis...

18. it's already in the Law on Machinery and Equipment Sales,

19. on sales tax exemption that's being phased-in. I'd move the

20. adoption of Amendment No. 1.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. The motion is to adopt Amendment No. 1. Discussion?

23. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it.

24. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Further...further Floor amend-

25. ments?

26. SECRETARY:

27. Amendment No. 2, offered by Senator Davidson.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Davidson.

30. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

31. Mr. President and members of the Senate. Amendment

32. No. 2 is an amendment that was drawn in relation to what

33. was raised, that the possibility that cities, counties or



1. the RTA would not be able levy their one-cent sales tax on  
2. this distillery equipment if, in the future, whatever needed  
3. to be done by those governmental bodies...this was the  
4. language that was requested. We had to adopt all three  
5. different areas, city, county and RTA tax...this just says,  
6. that if any one of those three governmental bodies do want  
7. to levy that one-cent sales tax, they have the option to do  
8. it. I move the adoption of Amendment No. 2.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? Senator  
11. McMillan.

12. SENATOR MC MILLAN:

13. Mr. President and members of the Senate. I...I rise  
14. in opposition to this amendment. I don't believe it is  
15. either necessary or wise. In the first place, Senator  
16. Davidson's bill is designed to deal with only those instances  
17. in which a farmer, for instance, is purchasing distilling  
18. equipment in order to produce gasohol, which he can...can  
19. produce for his own use and not for resale. It has already  
20. been established that the equipment is going to be exempt  
21. under the regular Machinery and Exemption Tax for any...  
22. distilling equipment that's...that's purchased to produce  
23. gasohol for sale. So, we're really talking about a farmer  
24. who is using this kind of a still on his own operation to  
25. produce gasohol for his own use. So, that person's likely  
26. to be out in the country. It's not going to be in the RTA  
27. area or in a municipality or anywhere else. Secondly,  
28. I think we're getting into a real serious problem when we  
29. eliminate this particular tax and then say that the local  
30. unit of government can go ahead and collect it, when in  
31. fact, the local...the local tax is a piggyback tax; and we  
32. are eliminating that upon which they piggyback, and would  
33. impossible for anybody to collect. I really don't think

1. that there is going to be any loss to the municipalities;  
2. there's no need for this particular amendment, and it creates  
3. a...an administrative problem to which there is no good  
4. answer. I would ask that it be defeated.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. Further discussion? Senator Regner.

7. SENATOR REGNER:

8. Yes, just a question of the sponsor. I'm not sure what  
9. he said. Senator Davidson, did you say that your...your  
10. bill originally was to eliminate the tax on this kind of  
11. equipment, Statewide? Your amendment says that in the RTA  
12. area it can be added back on.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

14. Senator Davidson.

15. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

16. No, there was some debate as to whether it could be  
17. added back on, and this amendment applies to city, county  
18. or RTA area, if they voluntarily...if they chose to put it  
19. back on. This amendment was drafted at the request, last  
20. week, from representatives from those different governmental  
21. bodies.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Regner.

24. SENATOR REGNER:

25. So...so, in other words, what your amendment says is  
26. Cook County could levy it again if they wanted to?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Davidson.

29. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

30. Yes, if...by action of their County Board.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. Further...Senator Regner.

33. SENATOR REGNER:

1. I, then, urge a No vote.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. The motion is to adopt. Senator Davidson, do you

4. wish to close? The motion is...the motion is to adopt.

5. Those in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. In the opinion

6. of the Chair, the Noes have it. The amendment is lost.

7. Further amendments?

8. SECRETARY:

9. No further amendments.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1814, Senator Rupp. Insurable

12. Risks. Okay. 1815, Senator Grotberg. Read the bill, Mr.

13. Secretary, please.

14. SECRETARY:

15. Senate Bill 1815.

16. (Secretary reads title of bill)

17. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Are there amendments from the Floor?

20. SECRETARY:

21. Amendment No. 1, offered by Senator Grotberg.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Grotberg is recognized.

24. SENATOR GROTBORG:

25. Thank you, Mr. President.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. May we have some order, please. Senator Grotberg.

28. SENATOR GROTBORG:

29. For...for those...for those of you who recall the

30. discharge motion on the...terminally ill subject matter

31. bills of mine, this is the one regarding the creation of...

32. within the Department of Health a concern for and the ability

33. to deal with the...hospice concept. The amendment is now

1. the bill, and it simply gives the power to the Director of  
2. the Public Health Department to adopt minimum standards  
3. for the development and operation of hospices and the  
4. training of the hospice personnel. They think they have  
5. such powers now, this simply clarifies it; and goes on to  
6. describe that a hospice means a facility, any part of a  
7. facility where we need a few hospital beds, or a program,  
8. and that's the homecare portion of it, that provides  
9. specialized care for the terminally ill. I move its adoption.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. The motion is to adopt. Discussion? All in favor say  
12. Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1 is  
13. adopted. Are there further Floor amendments?

14. SECRETARY:

15. No further amendments.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1827, Senator Egan. Read  
18. the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

19. SECRETARY:

20. Senate Bill 1827.

21. (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Revenue offers  
23. one amendment.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

25. Senator Egan to explain Amendment No. 1.

26. SENATOR EGAN:

27. Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate.  
28. The...the homestead improvement exemption for certain multiple  
29. dwelling units, in its present condition, is...is not clear  
30. as to the...the number of the dwelling units that we are in-  
31. tending this to apply to. In counties with one million in-  
32. habitants and more, the exemption for the homestead improvements  
33. will apply to residential buildings having more than six dwelling

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1. units and fewer than fifty-five. The original bill simply  
2. states less than fifty-five; it's a clarifying amendment  
3. in that respect.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. The motion is to adopt. Discussion? All in favor  
6. say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Amendment No.  
7. 1 is adopted. Further amendments?

8. SECRETARY:

9. No further committee amendments.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Are there amendments from the Floor?

12. SECRETARY:

13. No Floor amendments.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 1831, Senator Maragos.  
16. Senator Maragos, 1831. Senate Bill 1834, Senator Berman.  
17. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

18. SECRETARY:

19. Senate Bill 1834.

20. (Secretary reads title of bill)

21. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Public Health,  
22. Welfare and Corrections offers two amendments.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Is Senator Washington on the Floor? Who will be ex-  
25. plaining the committee amendments? Senator Berman? Oh,  
26. all right, are these Senator Chew's amendments? Senator  
27. Chew is recognized on Committee Amendment No. 1.

28. SENATOR CHEW:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. No. 1, Committee Amendment,  
30. is an amendment to take out the language of the bill as it  
31. was structured; that deleted Canadian nurses...

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. All right, Senator Berman offered Amendment No. 1 in

1. committee. Senator Berman to explain Amendment No. 1.  
2. SENATOR BERMAN:  
3. That was a...an amendment that made some...technical  
4. changes as to the way the bill was originally drafted, to  
5. indicate the changes in accordance with some requests from  
6. the Department of Registration and Education, primarily  
7. dealing with the force that the opinions of the board would  
8. have. There was no controversy regarding Amendment 1; I  
9. move the adoption.  
10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
11. The motion is to adopt Amendment No. 1. Discussion?  
12. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it.  
13. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Further...committee amendments?  
14. SECRETARY:  
15. Committee Amendment No. 2.  
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
17. Senator Chew is recognized on Amendment No. 2.  
18. SENATOR CHEW:  
19. Amendment No. 2, Mr. President, deletes the language  
20. that provided for Canadian nurses to practice in the State  
21. of Illinois, without a competitive examination. I move its  
22. adoption.  
23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
24. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? Senator  
25. Berman.  
26. SENATOR BERMAN:  
27. Because this was adopted in committee, Amendment 3, that  
28. I will offer next, addresses the same subject. I have no...  
29. objection, at this time, to adopting Committee Amendment No. 2.  
30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
31. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? All in  
32. favor say Aye. Senator Washington.  
33. SENATOR WASHINGTON:

1. I think some explanation is in order, because the two  
2. do bear upon each other. 2 which is pending, and 3 which  
3. Mr. Berman is going to offer. Unfortunately, Senator  
4. Collins is not here. She wants to address herself to this  
5. amendment. But, this amendment was thoroughly discussed in  
6. the Health, Welfare Committee; both sides had exhaustive  
7. hearings, the Committee and its wisdom, decided that, as  
8. Senator Chew stated, that section giving exemption to Canadian  
9. nurses to have to comply in a manner and form with nurses  
10. examinations in the State of Illinois, that section was  
11. deleted after thorough debate. I think it's a good amend-  
12. ment, and I think it bears upon the whole question of...this  
13. State's treatment toward licensed nurses in foreign countries.  
14. As you know, the State has reciprocity with other States,  
15. which permits them to come in and practice nursing if they  
16. are certified in other states. That exemption has never  
17. been extended to foreign nurses. The problem the committee  
18. was confronted with is what reason would Illinois depart  
19. from a longstanding tradition of not permitting foreign  
20. nurses to come in without going through the requisite exam like  
21. every other citizen of the State, and the committee decided  
22. that was not a good policy; and, therefore, adopted Senator  
23. Chew's amendment, which struck that language from 1834. I  
24. think it's a good amendment, and should stay on.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. I...just would...there are several other people who  
27. wish to speak, but the sponsor's suggestion was that this  
28. one be...adopted, and he would offer a conflicting amend-  
29. ment, I think, which is Amendment No. 3. That was his wish.  
30. Is there further discussion on Amendment No. 2? The motion is  
31. to adopt. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes  
32. have it. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Further committee  
33. amendments?

1. SECRETARY:  
2. No further committee amendments.  
3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
4. Are there amendments from the Floor?  
5. SECRETARY:  
6. Amendment No. 3, offered by Senator Berman.  
7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
8. Now, Senator Berman on Amendment No. 3.  
9. SENATOR BERMAN:  
10. All right, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and  
11. Gentlemen of the Senate. In accordance with some of the  
12. discussion that was held in Committee, Amendment No. 3 is  
13. being offered. Let me explain what Amendment No. 3 does.  
14. No...Amendment No. 3 allows Canadian nurses, who have passed  
15. the Canadian Nurse Association Testing Service examination  
16. in the English language, to be granted a license as a...  
17. Registered Professional Nurse, and to practice in Illinois.  
18. The amendment further provides that that grant of authority  
19. is only effective until June 30th of 1983. It has a self-  
20. destruct clause on there. The reason for this amendment  
21. was because of the scarcity that exists throughout Illinois  
22. in the availability of nurses in our hospitals. We have  
23. distributed, on behalf of the Illinois Hospital Association,  
24. on behalf of the Licensed Practical Nurse Association...  
25. material, and the opponents have also inundated all of you  
26. with material, in opposition to this. Let me say that there  
27. are debate...there is debate on both sides of whether we  
28. should allow Canadian nurses to come in and practice in  
29. Illinois. I think that it boils down to the question of  
30. whether there is going to be, immediately, some infusion  
31. of a corps of nurses to address the patients in our Illinois  
32. hospitals. This is the only way to do it immediately; I  
33. have indicated to the opponents and to all of the people



1. concerned that other approaches, longer range approaches,  
2. are necessary; that doesn't mean that this isn't a workable  
3. program. It is workable. There are other things that  
4. ought to be done, and I am pleased to explore those with  
5. anyone who wishes to explore them. But, this allows an  
6. immediate infusion of some qualified nurses, who have...who  
7. speak English, who have passed an exam that is substantially  
8. equivalent to the Illinois examination, and to come in and  
9. to help our patients in Illinois hospitals. I solicit your  
10. Aye vote on Amendment 3.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. The following Senators have sought recognition. Senators  
13. Grotberg, Chew, Gitz, Collins, Becker, Hall, Schaffer and  
14. Johns. Senator Grotberg...and Senator Ozinga.

15. SENATOR GROTBORG:

16. Thank...thank you, Mr. President. Will the sponsor  
17. yield for a question or two?

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Of the...of the amendment, Senator?

20. SENATOR GROTBORG:

21. Yes.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Berman indicates he will yield. Senator  
24. Grotberg.

25. SENATOR GROTBORG:

26. Senator Berman, do you have any idea, numerically, how  
27. many nurses we are talking about?

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. Senator Berman.

30. SENATOR BERMAN:

31. The number...you mean the number that will be coming  
32. in? Is that...is that your question?

33. SENATOR GROTBORG:

1. Yes, you know, is there one nurse somewhere that needs  
2. a job; or are there a hundred, or...some doctor...

3. SENATOR BERMAN:

4. I'm not aware of any one nurse that needs a job. What  
5. we hope to accomplish by this amendment and by the bill,  
6. is to encourage a recruiting process that will bring in  
7. Canadian nurses to address the scarcity. I don't know if  
8. that's going to be thirty, seventy, three hundred or seven  
9. hundred. That's...really impossible for me to accurately  
10. predict.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. Senator Grotberg.

13. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

14. Well, to the amendment. Thank you, Senator Berman.  
15. I rise in support of this amendment. When I think of the  
16. one hundred thousand registered nurses that are living in  
17. Illinois, that, many of whom have given up working, and mostly  
18. because of conditions in hospitals and nursing homes, and  
19. I represent, in my daily life, nursing homes; and I under-  
20. stand the shortages. I would also submit, that only ten  
21. thousand of those hundred thousand belong to the Illinois  
22. Nurses Association, which is, as far as I am concerned, is  
23. a very fine organization; I have tried to support them.  
24. But, when I think of what the Country of Canada has done  
25. for these United States, when I think...out the risks of the  
26. bilingual problems with our doctor and M.D. programs of the  
27. last few years, coming from all over the world who can't  
28. even speak English, with the high regard that I hold any  
29. exam, given in any Province of Canada, I don't think we need  
30. fear to open the door a crack for anybody from Canada to  
31. come and work in the State of Illinois and we should welcome  
32. them. I move the adoption...the support of this amendment.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. Senator Chew.

2. SENATOR CHEW:

3. Mr. President, my problem is not a language-speaking  
4. nurse. The problem is, if you are going to open the door  
5. for one, from one country, why not open the door for all,  
6. from any country. if there is a shortage of nurses. And  
7. we, subsequently, discovered that the real reason we don't  
8. have...a complement of nurses in our hospitals is because  
9. hospitals refuse to pay nurses a decent living wage. In  
10. our committee hearing, there isn't a hospital in the City  
11. of Chicago that gives a nurse a starting pay of fourteen  
12. thousand dollars per year. And, I might add, the State of  
13. Illinois pays their nurses less than any private or public  
14. facility in the State. So, nurses are leaving the profession  
15. simply because they aren't getting paid. In the last  
16. five years, in these United States, you have had only five  
17. hundred, or approximately, five hundred nurses to migrate  
18. from Canada into the United States, with the examination.  
19. It is discriminatory to allow this to happen in the Dominion  
20. of Canada, and not to allow it to happen in the Commonwealth  
21. of the Philippines. Now, if we are so concerned about the  
22. nursing shortage, why don't we open it up and said any registered  
23. nurse, who can speak English, would have the same privilege  
24. that the registered nurses have here in our country? Why  
25. would we single out Canada? There are states bordering  
26. the Canadian border that do not have this exemption. The  
27. Hospital Association wants it, the Nursing Association do  
28. not want it. The Hospital Association has lobbied Legislators;  
29. the Nursing Association has lobbied Legislators. The Nursing  
30. Associations happen to be right. They feel that anybody  
31. that's coming into these United States ought to be subjected  
32. to an examination that is established by that sovereign state;  
33. they feel that any nurse that comes from a foreign country

1. into the State of Illinois, should go through the same  
2. procedure that our licensed nurses go through here. Why  
3. make the exception for Canada? There are two ways to  
4. cure the nursing shortage. If the hospitals, today, were  
5. to pay them just a fraction of what it costs a patient to  
6. be in a hospital, you would have a flood of nurses ready to  
7. go to work. But, private and public hospitals have refused  
8. to pay a nurse as most school boards have paid teachers.  
9. What they are saying, in effect, is Canadian nurses will  
10. come to this Country and work for less than American nurses  
11. will work for. Now, if we really want to cure the problem,  
12. we ought to just pay these registered nurses in this Country  
13. and that would give us necessary numbers to carry on as before;  
14. but the nurses haven't even gotten substantial raises to  
15. offset inflation. The amendment that's on, Amendment No. 2,  
16. not only should stay there; but Amendment No. 3 should be  
17. soundly defeated, because Amendment No. 3 is a discriminatory  
18. amendment, and it give...gives privileges to a few, and it  
19. takes away privileges from another. So, I would urge that  
20. the members of this Senate would vote to defeat Amendment  
21. No. 3.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Gitz.

24. SENATOR GITZ:

25. Very briefly, Mr. President and members of the Senate.  
26. It seems truly unfortunate that so many times in this Body,  
27. we come up with some crazy amendment or bill in hopes that  
28. it's going to address a problem. And, quite frankly, of the  
29. many amendments that have been debated here, I can't think  
30. of one that has probably been more spurious, more crazy  
31. than this one. I can speak with some...I underscore Senator  
32. Chew's sentiments. My own Mother has been a registered  
33. nurse, she's practiced for thirty-four years; as a matter

1. of fact, for the last ten years she's been in Intensive  
2. Care. She doesn't make eighteen thousand dollars a year.  
3. She doesn't make fifteen thousand dollars a year. As a  
4. matter of fact, she doesn't even make Charlie's starting  
5. salary of fourteen thousand dollars a year. And the reason  
6. that hospital is understaffed, and the reason that people  
7. are leaving, is quite simple; the tension is high, the  
8. work conditions are not the best; on the night shifts there  
9. are too many people and not enough staff. And the hospital  
10. thinks that because nurses are unorganized and they can  
11. afford to try to pay them a very low wage, that somehow  
12. they are going to be able to maintain it. The idea...you  
13. can pass this amendment if you want, but don't think for  
14. one moment that there is going to be more nurses in Rockford,  
15. Illinois or in Bloomington; I'd be highly surprised if you  
16. have but one benefit come out of that. The idea that, some-  
17. how, the Canadian nurses are going to be the resolution of  
18. this problem, is just nonsense. There is one way that you're  
19. going to have nurses returning; there's many that are  
20. qualified, licensed and able to go to work today, is they  
21. are going to have to make some improvements in the wage  
22. scales and working conditions in these hospitals. And, for  
23. that reason, this amendment is just simply spurious, and  
24. I'm, quite frankly, surprised that we're even debating it.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Further debate? Senator Collins.

27. SENATOR COLLINS:

28. Okay. Thank you, Mr. President. I...I think Senator  
29. Gitz just capsuled what I really wanted to say. But, I do  
30. have a question of the sponsor. Senator Berman...Senator  
31. Berman, do you have any idea of how many registered nurses,  
32. in this country, who left their employment simply because  
33. of working conditions or they just couldn't put up with it

1. anymore?

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. Senator Berman.

4. SENATOR BERMAN:

5. I have no...no idea of the numbers, but I am sure that  
6. is a substantial number. This bill does not help or hurt  
7. that situation.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Senator Collins.

10. SENATOR COLLINS:

11. But...but, isn't...isn't that the whole crux of the  
12. situation that we're talking about; the need to have adequate  
13. qualified nurses in the hospitals taking care of the...the sick  
14. patients, and...and...and by bringing in the Canadian nurses,  
15. it's, most certainly, not going to resolve that problem?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Senator Berman.

18. SENATOR BERMAN:

19. I have indicated, in my opening remarks, that this is  
20. only one approach to a multifaceted problem; that the con-  
21. cern that you have, I share. That is not addressed by this  
22. bill. I have indicated to you, and to the Nursing Association  
23. and to the hospitals, that I'll be willing to work on those  
24. other problems which are of a much longer range solution.  
25. This can be done immediately.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Senator Collins.

28. SENATOR COLLINS:

29. But, Senator Berman, in committee, we had considerable  
30. amount of debate; we talked about the Canadian nurses, those  
31. who come here; we talked about the similarities in qualification  
32. and even the...the tests, and that out of the nine...nineteen  
33. that had taken the test here, something like fifteen had

1. already passed it, I think. So, if that's...if it's a question  
2. of whether or not the Canadian nurses can, in fact, pass  
3. the Illinois test, I don't...I don't see the...necessity  
4. for the exclusion...the exemption, because; based on what  
5. we have heard in committee, and based on your argument that  
6. they do have comparable requirements and skills, then, we  
7. should not be worried about them passing the test. Maybe...  
8. the Illinois Hospital Association should just beef up their  
9. recruiting methods in...in Canada, and get more of them to  
10. come here and take the examination, because, apparently,  
11. there...there doesn't...it doesn't seem to be a real problem  
12. with whether or not they can, in fact, pass the test. But,  
13. I think more fundamental to this...this whole issue, and  
14. my principal and primary objective to this whole approach,  
15. is this is the...the usual kind of piecemeal approach that  
16. this Body seems to take when there is a crisis out there  
17. that we need to respond to. I will not debate whether or  
18. not there is a serious shortage of nurses, and there is a  
19. need for more registered nurses in the hospitals out there.  
20. At...nor, would I...feel that the...Canadian nurses should  
21. not be allowed or encouraged to come to this...to the State  
22. of Illinois and...and practice in the hospitals. But, there  
23. are more fundamental issues here, and that is the whole issue  
24. to the need of unemployment...addressing the need of unem-  
25. ployment, and...in the State of Illinois. Illinois probably  
26. has the highest unemployment rate in the Country. There's no  
27. question that there are qualified people out there who are  
28. willing and able to work in the hospitals; and if we're  
29. talking about addressing this problem, without trying to  
30. deal with the reason why we can't get the people in Illinois,  
31. who are on the unemployed rolls, to come back into the hospitals,  
32. or to encourage and promote the development and establishment  
33. of more nursing institutions in the State, then I think,

1. we are just shirking our responsibilities, and we're acting  
2. irresponsibly. If we are going to address this problem by  
3. allowing the Canadian nurses to come here, temporarily, then,  
4. simultaneously, we should be about the business of talking  
5. about opening up Cook County Nursing School...School of  
6. Nursing and other schools of nursing throughout the State  
7. of Illinois. That is, I think, a more responsible way of  
8. dealing with this problem. But, I'm afraid that if we pass  
9. this bill with this amendment on it, we're not going to do  
10. anything to...address the real problem. And, that's why  
11. I'm opposed to the bill.

12.

13. (End of reel)

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1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Further debate? I have the following Senators so you can  
3. be ready when we call: Becker, Hall, Schaffer, Johns, Ozinga,  
4. Shapiro, Newhouse, Lemke. Senator Becker.

5. SENATOR BECKER:

6. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. A  
7. remark was just made by the sponsor of this amendment stating that  
8. there are ninety thousand nurses in the State of Illinois, but  
9. only nine thousand belong to the Association. I want to  
10. say to all of you, they are not members of the AF of L, CIO, or  
11. any union, but if they were them galleries would be loaded with  
12. union officials hounding and pounding everyone of you, to vote  
13. against this amendment. Senator Washington brought it out  
14. beautifully when he said in committee, this bill was debated  
15. long and hard, listening to every argument, and the committee  
16. decided by a vote of 7 to 3 to not allow Canadian nurses into  
17. the United States or Illinois without taking the tests. I say  
18. to you, in 1977, '78 and '79 in the United States, twenty-one  
19. hundred and sixteen Canadian nurses took the tests, sixteen hundred  
20. and ninety passed the test, four hundred and twenty-six did  
21. not, for about a percentage of eighty percent, but let's say that  
22. we brought the four hundred and twenty-six not qualified nurses  
23. into the State of Illinois taking care of your loved ones, and  
24. not knowing the type of injection that's going into your veins  
25. that could cost their life, by not being qualified to pass our  
26. tests. In 1977, we graduated fourteen thousand three hundred  
27. and fifty-three nurses with a BA degree, an Associate degree,  
28. and a plain diploma, of serving two years in a school, and yet  
29. let me say this to you, like Senator Gitz remarked about his  
30. mother. I have three nieces who are three year graduates of  
31. nursing schools, not schools, hospitals, and they frown on the  
32. two year graduates, because they have a head full of theory and  
33. no practical knowledge of operating in a hospital. They also

1. frown on the four year graduates who come in with a rounded out  
2. education, and don't know too much about anything. Yet your  
3. hospital administrators, when they select management positions,  
4. always will select the three year graduate. So, I say before  
5. we vote on an amendment such as we are going to vote on very  
6. shortly, pick up in front of you a statement made by the Philippine  
7. nurses, if the exemptions from taking the Illinois licensing  
8. examination, is afforded to Canadian nurses, and made into law  
9. in Illinois, the Philippine nurses of Chicago want an amendment  
10. also, to exempt nurses from other countries, especially the  
11. Philippines, since the Philippine nurses have a long history of  
12. participating in the delivery of the education towards health  
13. care in Illinois. Philippine and other foreign nurses work in  
14. clinical areas, in leadership positions in nursing services, in  
15. service education and nursing schools as administrators, faculty  
16. members, clinical specialists, nurse practitioners, staff nurses,  
17. head nurses, supervisors, all the way on down the lines. And then  
18. let me say to the Illinois Hospital Association, last year we  
19. paid four million dollars in unemployment checks to the State  
20. of Texas, sixty percent of four million dollars went to nurses  
21. leaving Illinois and the checks being mailed to the State of  
22. Texas. Maybe we should start an investigation. It's my opinion  
23. that this bill should revert right back to the Public Health and  
24. Welfare Committee of which Senator Washington is Chairman. We  
25. should have members of the Public Health, Welfare, of the Hospital  
26. Association of the Illinois Medical Association, members of Higher  
27. Education, and members of the Illinois Association on that committee  
28. to get to the root of this problem. If we're going to continue  
29. bringing foreign nurses in to replace our children who are not  
30. afforded the opportunity of enjoying part of the taxpayers' dollars  
31. that are being paid in the State of Illinois, it's a Cardinal  
32. sin to close the school of nursing at the county hospital, to  
33. close many of our schools of nursing down in Southern Illinois,

1. in Cook County, in Lake County, and then we come back to the  
2. Floor and throw a bill...an amendment, such as we're witnessing  
3. today, and right up above the President I can see the big blinker  
4. discrimination, and some attorneys panting, waiting, them trial  
5. attorneys, to file a lawsuit, a Class Action suit against the  
6. Senate, against the hospitals, when we aren't doing our job.  
7. Let's get that Illinois Hospital Association together, let's  
8. get Higher Education together. If we're spending the tax dollars,  
9. as you read in the Tribune, in the Sun Times, wasting the tax-  
10. payers' dollars at the Circle Campus, in the City of Chicago,  
11. where children can't read or write, let's take them out, let's  
12. put students in there who desire to become nurses, let's  
13. educate them, let's spend our tax dollars in the right direction.  
14. I will vote in favor of Senator Berman's bill, but I will vote  
15. against this amendment and ask for a unanimous vote against it,  
16. and let's protect our American girls, and our children right  
17. here in the State of Illinois.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. We're certainly happy to have our observers of our debate,  
20. but we would appreciate that you do not participate in it, by  
21. giving any signs of approval or disapproval. Senator...for what  
22. purpose does Senator Buzbee arise?

23. SENATOR BUZBEE:

24. A parliamentary inquiry, Mr. President. Do we have a time  
25. limitation on debate?

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. We have...we have five minutes, and Senator Becker, went  
28. over it slightly.

29. SENATOR BUZBEE:

30. I would be glad...I gave him my time also, but I just  
31. wondered if you were going to impose the time limitation.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Senator Buzbee, I started the timer, it went through and  
no one called it, and I thought everyone was interested enough

1. that we would continue with it slightly over his five minutes.  
2. Senator Hall.

3. SENATOR HALL:

4. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
5. Senate. I've always been very supportive of the Hospital  
6. Association, but I think they're making a serious mistake at this  
7. time, when Senator Berman is going to try to take this amendment  
8. off. Now, what really happens if you just stop and think, when  
9. he says one of the reasons that he supports this, is that they're English  
10. speaking. Well, there are a number of other nations that speak  
11. English, and I'm going to try to be brief, but I want to  
12. tell you one thing right here and now, is that you say that  
13. you've got a shortage of nurses, and then when we look around the country  
14. and we see all these nursing schools closed. It's just unfortunate  
15. that we in the Legislature get caught in between these things.  
16. I serve on the Rules Committee and when Senator Berman be...came  
17. before the Rules Committee, the Nurses Association was also  
18. present, and they shared the concern that there is a shortage  
19. of nurses, and I voted to get this bill out of the Rules  
20. Committee, with the hope and understanding that they would  
21. reach some agreement, but to say that you are going to excuse  
22. Canadian nurses and keep all the others from coming in, is  
23. strictly discriminatory. Now, if you just stop and think, and  
24. got this from James Nolan, who is the Director of Registration  
25. and Education, and it says here in 1976, nineteen percent of  
26. hundred and thirty-four...Canadian nurses failed, and in 1977,  
27. twenty-seven percent of two hundred and thirty Canadian nurses  
28. failed on their first try as a...test pool...pool examination.  
29. Now, if this provision passes, this means that these people  
30. would be exempt and even those Canadian nurses who have failed  
31. the Licensing Examination will come in. If you stop and look  
32. around today, that other countries, and nurses from outside of  
33. the United States, other than Canada, have contributed at many  
things toward the health care, and if you walk into any of these

1. hospitals today, especially on night shifts and things, you  
2. will see other than Canadians, there are people from many of  
3. the other countries who are working, and the education, and  
4. Public Health Agencies. It's wrong, it's not right, to take  
5. Canadian nurses and give them something that you deny others,  
6. and to say that they're English speaking, we have a lot of  
7. people who are English speaking, that have just as much right  
8. to be excluded if we're going to exclude Canadian nurses. This  
9. is a bad...you should not take that amendment off.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Senator Schaffer.

12. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

13. Mr. President, we are, in my opinion, debating a rather  
14. small tempest in a rather small teapot, but I guess we had to  
15. do something while the other Chamber debates a more weighty issue.  
16. There were only seven hundred Canadian nurses that came into the  
17. whole country last year. We got twenty, seventeen or eighteen of them  
18. took the test and passed it. Senator Hall, it's intriguing the  
19. Canadian nurses that come over are generally people who've been  
20. in practice for a considerable amount of time, and when that  
21. percentage passes, that's the same approximate percentage that  
22. our people right out of medical school pass. I wonder how many  
23. of many friends who are lawyers here, or other professionals  
24. would like to go take the bar exam, or comparable test right  
25. now, and see if they could pass it. The simple fact of the matter  
26. is, that if the bill passes we aren't going to put that many  
27. more nurses in Illinois. The question isn't nationality, the  
28. question is, competence. No one has said here, that the Canadian  
29. test, and the Canadian schools are not comparable or perhaps  
30. even better than our programs in this country and this State.  
31. It's really a question of, can we get some good qualified  
32. nurses. Now, one other thing that hasn't been mentioned, that  
33. the best qualified, most talented, most dedicated Canadian nurse

1. who hits the streets in Illinois and wants to practice, may  
2. have to wait up to six months, till he or she gets a chance  
3. to even take the test, and there is the real problem. That  
4. is, in fact, the real problem. The middle ground I suggested  
5. to both sides, which was summarily rejected, I might add,  
6. was simply to allow an exemption for a Canadian nurse or  
7. frankly, if you want to stress it any...nurse from a program  
8. that is comparable in all ways to the Illinois program, a  
9. six month waiver, to practice until they get a chance to take  
10. the test. That puts the nurses in the hospital, it also guarantees  
11. us a chance to make sure they're competent. That middle ground  
12. was rejected. I honestly believe though that in my examination  
13. and the testimony I've seen, that the nurses coming from  
14. Canada are as qualified as the nurses who come from Iowa or  
15. any other place. I might add, I believe there's some number  
16. of states that already allow Canadian nurses in. This is  
17. not the best approach. Senator Berman, I think the exemption  
18. approach is best, but we do need nurses, and I think the hundred  
19. and eleven thousand Illinois nurses are hardly going to be  
20. threatened by the probably sixty or seventy additional nurses  
21. this bill will generate, but perhaps, a few people in Illinois  
22. will be helped by those sixty or seventy professionals.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Senator Johns.

25. SENATOR JOHNS:

26. Thank you, Mr. President. I'm going to vote for this bill,  
27. but let me give you some of my thoughts. Canada is a great  
28. country, no other country shows the same and shares the same  
29. ideals as we do, I'm grateful for their support international-  
30. wise to America. One day in the future you're going to see  
31. America and Canada forget about boundaries, and be one people.  
32. The bill is one of expedience, that worries me, because we are  
33. acting rather hastily, and we're not looking back at symptoms

1. as to why we must act with expediency. We do not act best  
2. hastily but really it bothers me, as it should and it does  
3. other Americans who really care for others about adding com-  
4. petition for jobs, competition against our own people. My  
5. research shows that Charlie Chew is right, the responsibility  
6. lies on the doorsteps of one of the most profitable professions,  
7. the AMA. That's where it is, there's no question about it.  
8. I chose to check this out, administrative nurses have said our  
9. young people, now get this, they say our young people do not  
10. want to work at night, do not want to work on week-ends  
11. what an indictment of our younger generation. I cannot  
12. believe that a favorable salary, in a chosen career would still  
13. cause our people to neglect the hours and the responsibility that  
14. they have. I believe that our young people are much better  
15. stuff than that, and I don't buy any part of that indictment.  
16. I talked with our Community College president, and leaders, and  
17. they assured me as our university people have, that they can  
18. turn the nurses out, if we'll fund them properly, and therefore,  
19. we're part at fault. So, I...I accept that responsibility. They  
20. can turn these nurses out, and think about this, in a time's time.  
21. Many of them are waiting for further education as licensed  
22. practical nurses. All we need to do is fund those people, fund  
23. those colleges, put those nursing schools back into order, and  
24. bring our young people back into professions and let them stay  
25. in our country, and in our State, and in our towns. It takes  
26. as long to get one of these nurses into the United States from  
27. the Philippines, it takes as long to...to bring them from  
28. Canada as it does to train them in our colleges, something  
29. seriously wrong here. I agree with Senator Becker, we ought  
30. to have an investigation, and we ought to have some details come  
31. out of this, and tell us what's wrong. Thank you, very much,  
32. Mr. President.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

Senator Ozinga. Senator Shapiro.

1. SENATOR SHAPIRO:

2. Well, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
3. Senate. Some of the things that I was going to address my-  
4. self to have already been spoken to, but I am in total  
5. and complete opposition to this amendment, because one of the  
6. main points that has...that is not addressed in a bill such  
7. as this, is what are the standards for the Health Care Delivery  
8. System in Canada or any other nation in the world, but in  
9. particular...particularly, in Canada, and I would suggest that  
10. they are not, not as high as they are here in the United States.  
11. There's been a sheet passed around showing how the tests in  
12. Illinois and in Canada are comparable, but what it does not  
13. address itself to, is the content of the examination. In other  
14. words, the questions asked in the Canadian examination may be  
15. a lot easier than those asked here in Illinois, and another  
16. thing that this Body ought to keep in mind, is that the graduate  
17. of any accredited medical school or professional school in this  
18. State are acceptable throughout the world, because they are  
19. the best trained and the best graduates of any school in the  
20. world. We cannot say the same about any other state in this  
21. nation, or any other...or any other nation in this world. Another  
22. problem involved in this..for many, many years, this State and  
23. every other state in the nation has accepted the standards  
24. set in the exam by the various state departments by professionals  
25. within that profession, in other words, we accept on the written  
26. exam questions that are set by nurses, not by anyone else, and  
27. this exam is merely administered by the Department of Registration  
28. and Education. If we're going to do the same...if we're going  
29. to do this for Canadian nurses, then we ought to do it for every  
30. other professional group here in the United States and I'm  
31. sure that no one is even suggesting that or would be in favor  
32. of it. I think that the problem...is...are many. Number one,  
33. we have no assurance that the Canadian nurses are...going to



1. want to come to this State to practice anyway. Number two,  
2. salaries in the nursing profession evidently are not high  
3. enough. Working conditions are not the best. Maybe our schools  
4. throughout the State are not producing enough graduates but  
5. certainly the numbers given here earlier sounds to me that  
6. it would be adequate. So, there are many problems and going at  
7. it in this method is not going to solve the problem and the  
8. amendment should be defeated overwhelmingly.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Newhouse.

11. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

12. Thank you, Mr. President. I've got friends on all sides  
13. of this question. They're...I'm going to stay with my friends.  
14. There are several elements involved here, and as of this moment  
15. I've not heard anyone talk about patient care, and it seems to  
16. me that's the bottom line. There are three elements here, one  
17. is patient care health service, one is a question of wages, and  
18. how much people are getting paid, and the third is the question  
19. of standards, not particularly in that order, but I would  
20. say that patient care comes first. I don't know how many of  
21. you have walked through a hospital recently at night. I don't know  
22. how many of you have gone into the emergency room of a hospital  
23. at night in the City of Chicago particularly, I'll tell you  
24. what you'll find. You'll find that they're understaffed and  
25. you'll find that in many instances you will be treated by  
26. persons who cannot handle the English language. That's what's  
27. happening in hospitals in the City of Chicago. There is a  
28. problem and it's a serious one, and it's a problem that someone  
29. ought to do something about, whether it's the Legislature's job  
30. or not is another question, but we had appear before us in  
31. committee two competing interests and they were not about  
32. to compromise. How do we resolve this question? How do we get  
33. health care service delivered, at least, temporarily while we

1. get to the guts of the problem, that is raise the wages to  
2. the scale where they ought to be, and yes, train some people  
3. to go into the Health Care profession. Health Care is the  
4. fastest growing industry in this county, and if I understand  
5. the statistics right, the dollars spent in Health Care are  
6. third in the dollars spent in any industry in this county.  
7. That's a lot...that's a lot of dollars. It means we're going  
8. to have to train a lot of people. We're doing business with  
9. foreign medical grads all over the place. The justification  
10. for Canada is, because there is some comparability, and that's  
11. why the selection was made. I would suggest that this is  
12. a good compromise. It does put a limit on the time which  
13. we will permit to practice in our hospitals...in our medical  
14. profession, people who do not take this Illinois exam. I,  
15. like Senator Schaffer, don't envision any floodgates being  
16. opened. There are not that many people who are going to want  
17. to come, but if this is going to help the hospitals tem-  
18. porarily, then sobeit, but in two years time, I would  
19. hope that the competing interests which would not be competing  
20. at all, the Hospital Association, and the Nursing Association  
21. ought to be talking to each other, and we would hope that by  
22. the devise of this amendment they will have a span of time  
23. in which they can sit down and work out in a rational  
24. fashion, a solution to a problem that may...that may affect  
25. any of us at any time. We don't know sitting here when and  
26. how we'll need the service delivery about which we're speaking  
27. right now. Yes, something does have to be done; This isn't  
28. the perfect amendment, it's not a perfect bill, but it does  
29. provide a time...time factor during which we will get service  
30. delivery and at the same time can begin to address the serious  
31. underlying problems. Did someone say time? I will respect that.  
32. Did Sam...thank you, no, no, no, no. I think that...I want...  
33. this is a very serious matter. I want to keep it in a serious

1. vein. I would suggest that this amendment with a sunset  
2. provision is a good amendment, and the sunset provision  
3. ought to actually sunset, and two years from now, I will  
4. not talk about an extension, and I assume no one else will.  
5. Thank you, I would support this amendment.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

7. Senator Lemke. Senator Lemke on the Floor? Further  
8. debate? Senator Berning. All right. Well, that...Senator  
9. Berman, you may close the debate.

10. SENATOR BERMAN:

11. Thank you, Mr. President. I think there was great debate.  
12. Let me try to summarize quickly. The problems that most of  
13. the opponents to this amendment are addressing, I agree with,  
14. but they...those problems cannot be solved overnight. You  
15. cannot solve the problem and the tragedy of the closing of  
16. Cook County School of Nursing. You cannot solve overnight  
17. whether by legislation or otherwise, the question of the levels  
18. of...of salaries and benefits, and burn-outs by nurses that  
19. can't maintain themselves in this profession. That's a tragedy but  
20. I'm not sure that's a legislative problem, and I want to correct  
21. my friend Senator Chew, when we talk about...he said that no  
22. hospital pays even fourteen thousand dollars, that's not  
23. true. Michael...starting...salary...Michael Reese is starting  
24. at seventeen. Michael Reese Hospital is starting at seventeen.  
25. North Western Memorial Hospital is at sixteen, it's closing  
26. a hundred bed unit, because they can't get enough nurses. There  
27. isn't a hospital in the State, and the Illinois Nurses Association  
28. acknowledges that there is a crisis and a shortage. There's no  
29. argument there. The question is how do we address that. I have  
30. no argument with any of the points made by my friend Senator Becker.  
31. What we are proposing here is a small compromise approach to try  
32. to get in immediately qualified nurses. Senator Newhouse is  
33. right. Senator Schaffer is right. It's the quality of patient

1. care that we're concerned with, or should be concerned with.  
2. This addresses that. I'm not concerned about problems of  
3. turf. I don't want to go for or against the question of who's  
4. representing who. I think it's a tragedy that perhaps the  
5. Nursing Association isn't better organized, to be able to  
6. negotiate higher levels of salaries and finges, but they  
7. aren't. Tonight, today, they aren't. We need competent  
8. care. You have received documentation that the tests are  
9. substantially equivalent. I have passed out contrary to  
10. some internal memos that were passed out on the Floor, I have  
11. a signed letter from the Director of the Department of Registration  
12. and Education, the opening sentence says, "the Department of Reg-  
13. istration and Education supports your amendment on the subject  
14. of Licensure by endorsement of Candaian nurses." The department  
15. feels that this is a good amendment. There are people in  
16. the department that say, the examination in Canada is sub-  
17. stantially equivalent. There is others that say it is not.  
18. The department supports this amendment. I ask you not to be  
19. short-sighted, not to look at the hole rather than the doughnut  
20. we have a crisis, and I have sat down with the nurses, last  
21. Thursday, with Senator Washington present. We offered several  
22. suggestions, several alternatives, one of which was the one  
23. regarding discrimination, that we wouldn't talk about only  
24. Canadian nurses, that we'd talk about others. That amendment  
25. was...was rejected. This is the most limited, the most  
26. conservative, the most practical approach to an immediate  
27. crisis. If we're concerned about our citizens in Illinois,  
28. and the lack of adequate nursing care, this is a fair amend-  
29. ment. June 30th, 1983, they're out of a job unless they can  
30. qualify. This is a fair amendment, to a crisis situation.  
31. I ask for your favorable vote.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. The motion is to adopt. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those

1. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted  
2. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
3. question, the Ayes are 34, the Nays are 23. 1 Voting Present.  
4. Amendment No. 3 to Senate Bill 1834 is adopted. For what  
5. purpose does Senator Berning arise?  
6. SENATOR BERNING:  
7. On a point of personal privilege, Mr. President.  
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
9. Well, Senator, let's...is it on this bill?  
10. SENATOR BERNING:  
11. No.  
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
13. All right. Further Floor amendments?  
14. SECRETARY:  
15. No further amendments.  
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
17. 3rd reading. For what purpose does Senator Berning arise?  
18. SENATOR BERNING:  
19. Again, Mr. President, on a point of personal privilege.  
20. Seated behind me on the gallery to the right side here, is the  
21. student...a group of students from St. Francis School of  
22. Lake Zurich, along with their advisors, observing their government  
23. in action, and I would like to have them rise and be recognized  
24. by the Senate.  
25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)  
26. Would our guests please rise and be recognized by the  
27. Senate. For what purpose does Senator Geo-Karis arise?  
28. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:  
29. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.  
30. I'm happy to tell you that two of my constituents are here.  
31. Bob McCullough, the President of the Lake County Board of Realtors,  
32. and Jack Forney, he was the past President of the Lake County Board  
33. of Realtors, and I believe Mr. Blazer is here who is Senator Friedland's

1. constituent, but I don't see Senator Friedland here. Mr.  
2. Blazer, is the President of the North Suburban Realtors,  
3. he's here with my constituents. And they're back here in  
4. the back, so let's give them a welcome.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. We're happy to have them join us today in Springfield.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. All right, Senator Maragos asks leave to go back to 1831  
9. for the purpose of moving. Is leave granted? On the Order  
10. of Senate Bills 2nd reading, Senate Bill 1831. Read the bill,  
11. please, Mr. Secretary.

12. SECRETARY:

13. Senate Bill 1831.

14. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

15. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Revenue offers one  
16. amendment.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. Senator Maragos.

19. SENATOR MARAGOS:

20. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I move for  
21. the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1831. It  
22. exempts, in this bill, the delinquent taxes that were assessed  
23. under Personal Property. If there's any collections for them  
24. they would not be covered by this bill, but on...on other areas  
25. they would be, and I think it's a good amendment, and I ask for  
26. its adoption.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. All right, Senator Maragos has moved the adoption of Committee  
29. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1831. Any further discussion?  
30. If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed.  
31. The Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Further amend-  
32. ments?

33. SECRETARY:

1. No further committee amendments.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Are there amendments from the Floor?

4. SECRETARY:

5. No Floor amendments.

6. PRESIDENT:

7. 3rd reading. 1832. On the Order of Senate Bills 2nd reading,

8. is Senate Bill 1832. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

9. SECRETARY:

10. Senate Bill 1832.

11. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

12. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Are there amendments from the Floor?

15. SECRETARY:

16. No Floor amendments.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. 3rd reading. 1859, Senator Egan. 1881, Senator Daley.

19. 1884. 1902, Senator D'Arco. 1933, Senator Bloom. 1935,

20. Senator Nimrod. On the Order of Senate Bills 2nd reading,

21. is Senate Bill 1935. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

22. SECRETARY:

23. Senate Bill 1935.

24. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

25. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Agriculture, Conser-

26. vation, and Energy offers one amendment.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Senator Nimrod.

29. SENATOR NIMROD:

30. Thank you, Mr. President. The amendment that was offered

31. in committee was an amendment that clarified the Act, instead

32. of having it for thirty months, it's separated to a five month

33. period...I mean a five year period for sixty months on pollution

1. ...control equipment, and instead of having an Income Tax  
2. deduction, it provides for a credit against that so that there  
3. can be a write-off. I did...did put a fiscal note up on the  
4. Secretary's Desk and I have discussed it with Senator McMillan.  
5. PRESIDENT:  
6. Senator Nimrod had moved the adoption of Committee Amend-  
7. ment No. 1 to Senate Bill 1935. Is there any discussion? If  
8. not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The  
9. Ayes have it. The amendment is adopted. Further amendments?  
10. SECRETARY:  
11. No further amendments.  
12. PRESIDENT:  
13. Amendments from the Floor?  
14. SECRETARY:  
15. No Floor amendments.  
16. PRESIDENT:  
17. 3rd reading. 1957, Senator Demuzio. 1990. 2019, Senator  
18. DeAngelis. The top of page 8, Senate Bills 2nd. Okay. Any  
19. other member have a bill on 2nd he wishes moved at this point?  
20. If not, with...with leave of the Body we'll move to the top of  
21. page 16, there are some supplemental appropriations on the  
22. Order of House Bills 3rd reading. Senator DeAngelis, are you  
23. ready on the top of page 16? On the Order of House Bills 3rd  
24. reading, is House Bill 3040. 3040. Read the bill, please, Mr. Secretary.  
25. SECRETARY:  
26. House Bill 3040.  
27. ( Secretary reads title of bill )  
28. 3rd reading of the bill.  
29. PRESIDENT:  
30. Senator DeAngelis.  
31. SENATOR DeANGELIS:  
32. I think Senator Carroll...Ken Carroll can handle this one.  
33. PRESIDENT:  
All right, Senator Carroll.



1. SENATOR CARROLL:

2. I just request a favorable roll call. This is a supple-  
3. mental for the Department of Revenue dealing with both the  
4. deficit in the monies necessary to fund Income Tax refunds,  
5. some monies for operations and contractual, and I would ask  
6. for a favorable roll call.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Any further discussion? If not, the question is, shall  
9. House Bill 3040 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those  
10. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted  
11. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On  
12. that question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none. 1 Voting  
13. Present. House Bill 3040, 3040, having received the required  
14. constitutional majority is declared passed. On the Order  
15. of House Bills 3rd reading, is House Bill 3042. Read the bill,  
16. Mr. Secretary.

17. SECRETARY:

18. House Bill 3042.

19. ( Secretary reads title of bill )  
20. 3rd reading of the bill.

21. PRESIDENT:

22. \ Senator DeAngelis.

23. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

24. This is a very non-controversial...it flew out of the House.  
25. It's a bill that appropriates an additional two hundred and sixty-  
26. five thousand dollars to INR for matching funds for the  
27. institute building grants program. I urge a favorable roll call.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is, shall  
30. House Bill 3042 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those  
31. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who  
32. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
33. question, the Ayes are 48, the Nays are 4. None Voting Present.

1. House Bill 3042, having received the required constitutional

4. there are four supplemental appropriation bills that should

7. you'll turn to page 12, on the Order of Senate Bills 3rd

10. Senate Bill 1841.

11. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

12. 3rd reading of the bill.

13. PRESIDENT:

14. Senator Newhouse.

15. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

16. Thank you, Mr. President, and Senators. This is the  
17. State Scholarship Commission appropriation for grant awards  
18. for college students, it's a supplementary. The commission  
19. ran out of money again this year. I won't be back before  
20. you again asking you for supplementaries on this Scholarship  
21. ...Committee, but the monies are needed, and I would ask for  
22. a favorable roll call.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Is there any discussion? Senator Buzbee.

25. SENATOR BUZBEE:

26. Thank you...thank you, Mr. President. I would like to  
27. point out to the members of the Senate, in case you're not  
28. aware, which I'm sure you are, that this is the second sup-  
29. plemental appropriation for the Illinois State Scholarship  
30. Commission during this fiscal year, and I can assure you that  
31. if there were fourteen months in a fiscal year instead of  
32. twelve we would have a third supplemental appropriation coming  
33. into us. Because this is an agency that is so incompetent that  
they have absolutely no idea how to project the amount of money

1. that is needed for scholarships for students that are institutions  
2. of higher education. Their incompetency shows through time  
3. after time after time. They ignore the Legislative intent,  
4. time after time after time after time. The Executive director  
5. is leaving after many year of our telling him that we think  
6. his agency is incompetent, but he's not leaving till June  
7. the 30th. When we asked him the other day for...to tell us  
8. what kind of model he's based his projections on, he said well,  
9. we sit down and we look at the figures, we look at what happened  
10. last year and the year before, and so on and so on and so and so  
11. forth. They have no computer model, they have no internal  
12. controls. This is one of the highest paid bureaucracies in the  
13. State Government. Senators Regner and Sommer and Carroll and  
14. myself are sponsoring an amendment to bill that Senator Rhoads  
15. has, which will require this outfit to report through the  
16. Illinois Board of Higher Education, like all other systems  
17. in higher education have to report through. I am led to  
18. believe by one member of the State Scholarship Commission that  
19. in their meeting yesterday, and I'm...I'm reporting without  
20. knowing whether it, in fact, happened, but he told me he had  
21. the votes to get the commission to go on record as saying that  
22. they favored this same concept, where they would have to report  
23. through the Higher Board of Education. I talked yesterday with  
24. the gentlemen who is being interviewed to be the Executive  
25. Director of the Scholarship Commission. I don't know if he's  
26. going to take the job or not, but things can get no...can go  
27. no way but up with this organization. They commit us, they  
28. commit our dollars to students, then the universities and  
29. the private colleges, admit the students on the basis of  
30. betting on the...betting that the Legislature will once  
31. again pick up the tab for the scholarships which they have  
32. committed. They make pay raises, by the way, on the same  
33. basis. They make huge pay raises...give huge pay raises, then

1. they come back to us and ask for transfer bills or whatever to  
2. pay the tab. Now, I started out being opposed to this bill,  
3. and I'm probably going to end up voting for it, against my  
4. better judgment, but the problem is that you don't...by voting  
5. No, you don't hurt Joe Boyd and his group of incompetents.  
6. You...you hurt students that are already in universities and  
7. private colleges, and you hurt those universities and those private  
8. colleges. So, that's why I'm going to end up voting for this  
9. bill, but we expressed for one final time in the Appropriations  
10. II Committee, in the strongest of terms that this is it  
11. fellows, this is the last time. In the future this General  
12. Assembly is going to appropriate the dollars for scholarships  
13. for a whole fiscal year, and that's it. That's absolutely  
14. all you're going to get, and the only way we can back that  
15. up obviously, is with support of this Body and the support  
16. of the House of Representatives. But if we give them an  
17. outside dollar figure for the future and say that's all you're  
18. going to get, then that's all they're going to get. This is  
19. beyond ridiculous, that we have to come in and after voting  
20. some eighty-five or a hundred million dollars for scholarships  
21. that we've got to come in twice more during a year to vote  
22. supplemental scholarships. Incompetency, be damned, let's  
23. get rid of the incompetents, let's fire the whole agency  
24. if we have to, that would probably be the best thing we could  
25. do, and start afresh, put them in Springfield where they belong  
26. in the State Capitol...

27. PRESIDENT:

28. Will you conclude your remarks.

29. SENATOR BUZBEE:

30. I was just getting started.

31. PRESIDENT:

32. That's what I was afraid of.

33. SENATOR BUZBEE:

1.           And this will be...this will be the last time we have  
2.           to put up with this kind of nonsense.

3.           PRESIDENT:

4.           Further discussion? Senator Gitz.

5.           SENATOR GITZ:

6.           Mr. President, I have a question of the sponsor or  
7.           perhaps Senator Buzbee. My question is this, this is a  
8.           supplemental for Fiscal Year '80. Most of the colleges  
9.           and universities are about to adjourn. What gives? It  
10.          seems to me by the time this bill goes through the process,  
11.          it's going to be hitting the Governor's Desk in June. Have  
12.          they made awards and the universities are waiting for the  
13.          money, or how does this work?

14.          PRESIDENT:

15.          Senator Newhouse. Senator Newhouse.

16.          SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

17.          Yes, Senator, you answered your own question. They...they  
18.          have made the awards, and the colleges are waiting for the money.

19.          PRESIDENT:

20.          Senator Gitz.

21.          SENATOR GITZ:

22.          One last question then. If we were not to pass this bill  
23.          for any reason, then what happens to people who have completed  
24.          their academic year, and the money is not in the institution's  
25.          hand. What occurs then?

26.          PRESIDENT:

27.          Senator Newhouse.

28.          SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

29.          There's a problem, Senator, and I'm not sure how they'll  
30.          get it resolved. The...the...the students have gone in on the  
31.          supposition that those dollars are there, and they aren't. So,  
32.          either the college takes a bath or the student takes a bath.

33.          PRESIDENT:

            Senator Gitz.

1. SENATOR GITZ:

2. I did say it was...I do have one further question. Is  
3. it true, as I have heard, 'cause I'm not on Appropriations II  
4. that they have made awards, and said this award is contingent  
5. upon the General Assembly appropriating the funds necessary  
6. for it? Has that been done by the Scholarship Commission?

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Newhouse.

9. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

10. I have no knowledge of that. Do you...perhaps Senator  
11. Buzbee can answer that question.

12. PRESIDENT:

13. Senator Buzbee.

14. SENATOR BUZBEE:

15. You are correct, Senator, except that the way the letter was worded  
16. was, you have been awarded an Illinois State Scholarship  
17. Commission scholarship. However, if the Legislature doesn't  
18. appropriate the money, why we won't be able to give you this,  
19. but those letters went out after the...after a lot of these  
20. kids had been admitted to universities and private colleges  
21. on the basis that...and the admission was made on the basis  
22. that they were going to get the scholarship.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Further discussion? Senator Maitland.

25. SENATOR MAITLAND:

26. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the  
27. Senate. Senator Gitz asked two of my three questions. A question  
28. of the sponsor.

29. PRESIDENT:

30. Yes, indicates he will yield. Senator Maitland.

31. SENATOR MAITLAND:

32. Senator Newhouse, how much money is involved in this  
33. particular sup.?

1. PRESIDENT:  
2. Senator Newhouse.  
3. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:  
4. Four million dollars.  
5. PRESIDENT:  
6. Senator Maitland.  
7. SENATOR MAITLAND:  
8. And is it correct we started out originally at eighty-two,  
9. is that...was that the figure in the original appropriation?  
10. PRESIDENT:  
11. Senator Buzbee.  
12. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
13. Senator, my...my figures indicate that with...we're going  
14. from seventy-five and a half million to seventy-nine and  
15. three quarter million with this appropriation.  
16. PRESIDENT:  
17. Senator Maitland.  
18. SENATOR MAITLAND:  
19. All right, we will now then, be at seventy-nine?  
20. PRESIDENT:  
21. Senator Buzbee.  
22. SENATOR BUZBEE:  
23. That's correct. Seventy-nine and three quarter million.  
24. PRESIDENT:  
25. All right. Senator Maitland.  
26. SENATOR MAITLAND:  
27. Thank you, I would just...you know with a university in  
28. my district too...I...I guess this is the agency that I have  
29. the most problem with, too. Repeatedly I get calls from...from  
30. students and from the university and...and calls by me then  
31. to that agency usually aren't answered and the call doesn't  
32. come back, and I would agree, Senator Buzbee, there needs to  
33. be a house cleaning, and I hope we can get about the business.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Further discussion? Senator Martin.

3. SENATOR MARTIN:

4. Yes, Senator Buzbee was indeed correct, but he said  
5. something even more. Why this has been said in both the  
6. House and Senate every year and why, even with that mope  
7. who now heads it, when he goes it will be continued to be  
8. said. They don't have to clean up, they can keep doing this  
9. because then you've got kids in your own district, and you  
10. say good grief, how do I punish the kid? But guess what,  
11. until we finally say no, until the Legislators again gain  
12. control of these bureaucracies through pursestrings by once  
13. saying no, you're going to have them doing it again and  
14. again and again.

15. PRESIDENT:

16. Further discussion? Senator Regner.

17. SENATOR REGNER:

18. Yes, Mr. President, and members. Just a brief comment.  
19. I would like to commend Senator Buzbee on the statements he  
20. made, they're absolutely true, and I urge him to join Senator  
21. Martin and Senator Sommer and myself and have the guts to  
22. vote No.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Further discussion? Senator Weaver.

25. SENATOR WEAVER:

26. I think there's just maybe one other point to...another  
27. finger to point to, is some of the universities in their  
28. financial aids office have not instructed their students  
29. properly. Incomplete applications have been submitted to the  
30. Scholarship Commission, they've bounced back and forth. And  
31. part of that is the reason for the supplemental. They were  
32. in the pipe line, but due to bad applications, and I think  
33. sometimes the institution has some responsibility for helping



1. those students complete those applications properly.

2. PRESIDENT:

3. Any further discussion? Senator Newhouse may close.

4. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

5. Thank you, Mr. President. I hold...certainly hold no  
6. brief for the commission. I think it has not done the job  
7. in the past. I would hope that the housekeeping is successful.  
8. I don't intend to come back before this Legislature again and  
9. ask for this kind of supplemental money, but...voting No on  
10. this bill is not going to punish Joe Boyd, it's not going  
11. to do the internal job. What it will do is punish some

19. is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish?  
20. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,  
21. the Ayes are 45, the Nays are 12. None Voting Present.  
22. Senate Bill 1841, having received the required constitutional  
23. majority is declared passed. If you'll turn to page 14 on  
24. your Calendar. Yes, Senator DeAngelis, for what purpose do you  
25. arise?

26. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

27. A point of personal privilege, Mr. President.

28. PRESIDENT:

29. State your point, Sir.

30. SENATOR DeANGELIS:

31. In the gallery behind the opposite side of the room, we have  
32. some very nice people from our district. Miss Ann Dicket, who's  
33. President of School Board 161, and fellow boardperson, Dick  
Smith and his wife Judy. Please stand and be recognized.

1. PRESIDENT:

2. Will our guests please stand and be recognized. Welcome.  
3. All right, on top of page 14, Senator Grotberg. On the Order  
4. of Senate Bills 3rd reading, Senate Bill 1980. Read the bill,  
5. Mr. Secretary, please.

6. SECRETARY:

7. Senate Bill 1980.

8. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

9. 3rd reading of the bill.

10. PRESIDENT:

11. Senator Grotberg.

12. SENATOR GROTBORG:

13. Thank you, Mr. President, and fellow members. This is  
14. a transfer bill for the Department of Corrections, no new  
15. added General Revenue dollars at all, in the amount of three  
16. million one hundred and six thousand one hundred dollars.  
17. I would move for a favorable roll call.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Is there any discussion? Senator Maragos. Any discussion?  
20. If not, the question is, shall Senate Bill 1980 pass. Those  
21. in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The  
22. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who  
23. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
24. question, the Ayes are 55, the Nays are none. None Voting  
25. Present. Senate Bill 1980, having received the required  
26. constitutional majority is declared passed. Senator Regner,

31. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

32. 3rd reading of the bill.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Senator Regner.

2. SENATOR REGNER:

3. Mr. President, and members. This bill transfers nine hundred  
4. thousand dollars of Personal Services between various institutions  
5. within the Department of Mental Health, primarily to provide  
6. for deficits in Manteno and Lincoln. There are no new  
7. dollars in the bill, and I ask for a favorable roll call.

8. PRESIDENT:

9. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is, shall  
10. Senate Bill 1982 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those  
11. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted  
12. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On  
13. that question, the Ayes are 51, the Nays are none. None  
14. Voting Present. Senate Bill 1982, having received the required  
15. constitutional majority is declared passed. Senator Becker on  
16. 1985. On the Order of Senate Bills 3rd reading, is Senate Bill  
17. 1985. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

19. Senate Bill 1985.

20. ( Secretary reads title of bill )

21. 3rd reading of the bill.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Senator Becker.

24. SENATOR BECKER:

25. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate.  
26. Senate Bill 1985, is a transfer bill. Eight hundred and  
27. twenty-one thousand forty-one dollars are transferred within  
28. the FY'80 appropriations to provide for a three month funding  
29. of rental expenses for the facility located at 910 S. Michigan  
30. Avenue, in Chicago. Senate Bill 1985 was amended in committee  
31. to make technical changes as well as to correct the Bureau of the  
32. Budget's drafting errors. I ask for a favorable roll call.

33. PRESIDENT:

1. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is, shall  
2. Senate Bill 1985 pass. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those  
3. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who  
4. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
5. question, the Ayes are 49, the Nays are none. None Voting  
6. Present. Senate Bill 1985, having received the required  
7. constitutional majority is declared passed. Resolutions.

8. SECRETARY:

9. Senate Resolution 493, offered by Senator Johns, it is  
10. congratulatory.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. Consent Calendar.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Resolution 494, offered by Senators Mitchler, Chew,  
15. Maitland, and Coffey.

16. PRESIDENT:

17. Senator Mitchler.

18. SENATOR MITCHLER:

19. Senator Maitland and I are offering this jointly. So,  
20. Mr. President, and members of the Senate, this resolution  
21. is one that I've spoken to Senator Chew and Senator Coffey,  
22. the Chairman and Minority Spokesman for the Senate Transportation  
23. Committee, to which this resolution would ordinarily be forwarded,  
24. and they have agreed to bypass the committee and have immediate  
25. consideration of this resolution. It has to do with the Depart-  
26. ment of Transportation conducting a study to improve the  
27. Amtrak stop at Normal, Illinois State University, for the

26. Yes, Mr. President. I've...I've been advised that one of  
27. our colleagues is about to celebrate an anniversary of his birth,  
28. and what I...what I'm going to do is read portions of a re-  
29. solution that I would hope that the Body would adopt.  
30. ( Senator Donnewald reads SR 496 )  
31. So, why don't we all join together and sing Happy Birthday.  
32. ( Senator Donnewald sings Happy Birthday )  
33. PRESIDENT:

1. All right, Senator Donnewald has moved to suspend the  
2. rules for the immediate consideration and adoption of Senate  
3. Resolution 495. All in favor signify by saying Aye. All  
4. opposed. The Ayes have it. The rules are suspended. Now,  
5. on the question of adoption of Senate Resolution 495,  
6. a roll call has been requested. Those in favor will vote  
7. Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have  
8. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted  
9. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are  
10. 40, the Nays are 11. None Voting Present. Senate Resolution
