33. Senator Donnewald, Chairman of the Committee on Assignment

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Executive. Senator Netsch, for what purpose do you rise?

5. SENATOR NETSCH:

6. Thank you, Mr. President. I wonder if I might use this  
7. moment of quiet to make an announcement about a meeting of  
8. the Committee on State Government Reorganization. It was left,  
9. inadvertently, off the schedule. The Committee will meet  
10. at 5:00 o'clock Thursday, June 7, on the Senate Floor. There  
11. is only one bill in the Committee. It had previously been  
12. posted for last week, in any event, and we continued it  
13. until this week, so I think we are in no difficulty. If  
14. there is any question about it, I would then move to waive  
15. the Six Day Notice on House Bill 921, and repeat that we will  
16. then meet on Thursday at 5:00 o'clock on the Senate Floor.

17. PRESIDENT:

18. All right. Yes, the waiver has already taken place. Is  
19. leave granted? Leave is granted. All right.

20. SENATOR NETSCH:

21. Thank you.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. While we are standing at ease, we have a guest with us,  
24. and the Chair will yield to Senators Sangmeister and Mitchler.

25. SENATOR MITCHLER:

26. Mr. President, members of the Senate. It's a pleasure  
27. to introduce a very honored guest this morning to the Illinois  
28. State Senate, Miss Doreatha Young, who is the 1979  
29. Miss Black Joliet. She was in competition with other  
30. contestants in the Joliet area, and this last Sunday, did  
31. compete in the Miss Black Illinois contest, which was also  
32. held in Illinois, I believe over in the Lamont area, so at  
33. this time, I would like to present to you Miss Black Joliet

2. MISS YOUNG:

3. I would just like to say that this is a pleasure for  
4. me to be here today, and that being Miss Black Joliet has  
5. been an experience for me. I feel that every young woman  
6. who has the talent and ability, should go out and try and  
7. be in this Pageant. Thank you.

8. SENATOR MITCHLER:

9. And I would also like to introduce her sister, who's  
10. accompanying her to Springfield today, her sister Iris Young.

11. MISS YOUNG:

12. I'm at a loss for words, because I didn't think that I  
13. was supposed to say anything, but as Doreatha's sister, I am  
14. very honored to be here, and she has thrilled everyone. I  
15. just had a little girl, and I know she's going to be excited  
16. to know that the year she was born, her Aunt has gone and  
17. done something that has never happened in our family before,  
18. and I'd just like to thank everybody for welcoming my sister,  
19. and for her being here and enjoying herself at this meeting.  
20. Thank you.

21. SENATOR MITCHLER:

22. And now, Doreatha, on behalf of the Illinois State Senate,  
23. this is a Senate Resolution that was introduced by myself and  
24. Senator Sangmeister. We'd like to present this to you, which  
25. congratulates you on the occasion of your being the Miss Black  
26. Joliet of 1979. Thank you very much.

27. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

28. Joliet just left Will County.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR HALL)

30. Do we have leave to go to House Bills, 1st Reading?  
31. Leave is granted. House Bills, 1st Reading. I think we have  
32. three bills on that.

8. PRESIDENT:  
9. If I can have the attention of the membership, it's  
10. been suggested that in order to afford everyone an opportunity

7. 3rd reading. All right, with leave of the Body, we will  
8. go to the order of the Secretary's Desk, page twenty-one  
9. on the Calendar. There's an FY-79 deficiency appropriation.  
10. On the Order of the Secretary's Desk, Concurrence. Senate  
11. Bill 668. Mr. Secretary.

12. SECRETARY:

13. House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 668.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Senator Egan.

16. SENATOR EGAN:

17. Yes, thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate.  
18. Amendment No. 1, which was added in the House, to Senate  
19. Bill 668, adds a five thousand dollar deficiency to the  
20. Law Revision Commission. There is no objection, and I move  
21. for the concurrence of Amendment No. 1.

22. PRESIDENT:

23. Is there any discussion? If not, the question is shall  
24. the Senate concur in House Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 668.  
25. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will voted Nay.  
26. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted  
27. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that  
28. question, the Ayes are 48, the Nays are none. None Voting  
29. Present. The Senate does concur in House Amendment No. 1  
30. to Senate Bill 668, and the bill, having received the required  
31. constitutional majority, is declared passed. All right.
