Yes. No, those motions, of course, do not...not of course, but in the ordinary course of events do not show up on this order of business. This is a motion with respect to a committee amendment, which had been adopted.  SENATOR SHAPIRO:

8. Well, Mr...Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
9. Senate. I think the Rules Committee has done an excellent
10. job and if we want to get out of here by June 30th, this is
11. the motion to consider, and I would appreciate affirmative vote on the motion.

I think not. We are going to be pretty busy on Monday. 31. And I hope everybody will be here at the hour of noon, sharp 32. as Senator Rhoads and I say. 33.

1. SENATOR HALL:

Well, I hope everybody votes against this motion then.
 PRESIDENT:

4. Further discussion? Senator Knuppel.

5. SENATOR KNUPPEL:

Well, I...well, I appreciate how hard the Rules Committee 6. worked, and I appreciate everything that Senator Shapiro has 7. said. My mother used to tell me, you know, self...self-brag... 8. what is that. Self-brag, is self-scandal or something to that 9. effect. Anyway, I know they hold themselves in high esteem, 10. but I... I feel that they did this on a piecemeal basis, where 11. they give each of us a crumb and hope that would satisfy us. 12. It may satisfy some, it doesn't satisfy me with...with respect 13. to some of them. There's some of the bills, and I have probably 14. more motions here than anyone else, there's some I don't intend 15. to call, there's others I do. But I... I would like to see them 16. have an opportunity at least. 17.

PRESIDENT: 18.

Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH: 20.

Thank you, Mr. President. I would rise in opposition 21. to the motion, also. It seems to me that a number of people 22. have ... who have been less than happy with the uneven course 23. of the Rules Committee have been relying on their capacity to 24. offer a motion to discharge and at least have a chance at it. 25. Whether or not they're going to be successful, we all know 26. given the fact that many members have already left the...it's 27. not a very high degree of probability, but at least there is 28. an opportunity, and for some of us that is guite important. 29. I, for one, am the sponsor of ... Senator Martin and I, in fact, 30. are the sponsors of some bills that were sponsored by all of 31. the women Legislators, on dealing with a very important subject, 32. and although I kept counting enough votes in the Rules Committee 33. to get them out, for some reason the bills never came out, and

1. I think at least, I would like a chance to...Senator Martin and I would like a chance to discharge one. It seems to me 2. that the... the pattern is sufficiently uneven, that it is not 3. fair to those of us who have been relying on this to just simply 4. out of hand Table all of the motions. And I would resist it. 5. PRESIDENT: 6. Further discussion? Senator Wooten. 7. SENATOR WOOTEN: 8. Mr. President, just an inquiry. The motion about which 9. I inquired, I did not mean to lead it to a mass-execution. Is it... 10. PRESIDENT: 11. It is not involved in this. 12. SENATOR WOOTEN: 13. So, Senator Shapiro's motion only relates to those which 14. are printed? 15. PRESIDENT: 16. That is correct. 17. SENATOR WOOTEN: 18. Oh, thank God, we're not on that list. Thank you, Sir. 19. PRESIDENT: 20. Further discussion? Senator Ozinga. 21. SENATOR OZINGA: 22. Mr...Mr. President, I would say that I think this is a 23. good motion after all the hard work that's been done by the 24. Rules Committee, and this is one way of expressing our feelings 25. to them by voting for this motion. And I would move the 26. previous question. 27. PRESIDENT: 28. Well, as ... in accord ... with our rules, there are three or 29. four members who have indicated prior to that motion. So, if 30. you'll just withhold that, I will recognize you at the appropriate 31. time. Senator Newhouse. 32. SENATOR NEWHOUSE: 33.

1. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, it seems to me that the only recourse that's available to those who have 2. met the fate worse than death in the Rules Committee, is for 3. a general discussion on the Floor and a vote by the members of 4. this Body, and to cut off that kind of vote, it would seem to 5. me would violate all the rules of either democracy or republicanism. 6. And I would suggest that we wouldn't want to be in that position 7. and...might want to consider, seriatim, even thought it...take a bit more 8. time, those motions that Legislators felt seriously enough 9. about to file a written request with the Secretary's Desk. And 10. I would be opposed to the motion, and would hope that my 11. colleagues would join in and let us get on with the business 12. PRESIDENT: 13.

15. SENATOR PHILIP:

33.

Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of 16. the Senate. I might remind our fellow Senators that the Rules 17. Committee did leave out two hundred and thirty-two bills. Now, 18. if I remember correctly, this Session is supposed to be limited 19. to budgetary matters and emergency matters. If you take a 20. close look at those two hundred and thirty-two bills, I'll bet 21. you ten percent of them are not emergency matters. You know 22. we've worked long and hard, I think the Rules Committee did 23. a good job, and we ought to support this motion. 24. PRESIDENT: 25. Further discussion? Senator Lemke. 26. SENATOR LEMKE: 27. ... today, I want to vote on adjournment. 28. PRESIDENT: 29. Yeah, well that motion ... 30. SENATOR LEMKE: 31. It's always in order. 32. PRESIDENT:

That motion is always in order, and it will be so re cognized. Senator Donnewald.

3. SENATOR DONNEWALD:

Well, thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Body.
I think that a vote on this particular motion, if it receives
thirty votes will save all of the members a lot of time, because very frankly, if you have thirty votes to sustain this
particular motion it will also show that none of the motions
on the Calendar as set forth will succeed. So, I would be in

Oh, I...Senator Bruce.

18. SENATOR BRUCE:

Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I 19. rise in opposition to this motion, and let me tell you why. 20. This is a deliberative Body, lead by leadership, which happens 21. to sit on Rules. And we came here Monday with our word to 22. every member who had not gotten a fair shake out of Rules, 23. and I think there's... justifiable reasons why people would feel that 24. they have not gotten adequate consideration in the Rules Committee, 25. that they would have a shot at these motions on Friday. And, 26. by God, I gave my word I would be here to vote on those motions. 27. I have one motion, which I plan to Table when it comes up in the 28. order. But the Rules Committee is not the only opinion and 29. judgment which exists in this Body. There...this Body decides 30. whether any of these bills will be heard and only this Body 31. and I'm not ready to abdicate my responsibility of...of a State 32. Senator to the Rules Committee to have them decide each and 33.

every bill, that's going to come before this Body for debate. ۱. 2. I don't know how many of these I'm going to vote for myself, but I think every Senator who is elected who was told we would 3. get to this Order of Motions, that they would have their shot, 4. their day in court, ought not to be denied that right. 5. The final thing is that if we allow this to happen, by leader-6. ship, each and every member of this Body will suffer because 7. on June 27th or 28th or 29th another list may be prepared 8. containing my bill or your bill or someone else's bill and 9. they'll Table my bill on a motion of thirty votes. I don't 10. want to be a party to that. Every guy here, he wants to take 11. a shot at it, wonderful, but the Rules Committee did not...they 12. were not invested with the right to decide by fiat what's going 13. to happen in this Body, and I oppose strongly this motion. 14. PRESIDENT: 15.

Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

SENATOR RHOADS: 17.

Mr. President, for the same reasons just stated by Senator 18. Bruce, I think it's obvious that there aren't enough people here 19. today to give adequate consideration to these motions. If they 20. were left on the Calendar, and we came back next week and some-21. thing was very important that we had to go to that order of 22. business we can do so by thirty votes at that time. But I think 23. Senator Lemke's motion for adjournment would be the preferable 24. motion at this time. 25.

Senator Buzbee.

SENATOR BUZBEE: 28.

29. Thank you, Mr. President. I resent the implication by another 30. Senator that we ought to not be able to do any business this afternoon because some folks have gone home. Now, I was caught 31. in a box a few weeks ago where I was trying to pass a bill that 32. wasn't all that controversial, and some folks had gone home on 33.

۱. Thursday afternoon and I lost my damn bill. Now, if they don't 2. want to stay here and serve the way they were elected to serve 3. that's not my problem. I'm here, they ought to be here. I 4. think that we ought to go ahead and deal with this motion up 5. or down, I happen to agree with Senator Shapiro in this case. 6. But up or down, let's move on this motion. But let's don't use the excuse, let's put it off till Monday, because there's 7. some folks that have gone home. That's their problem, hopefully 8. their constituents will take care of them the next time. 9. PRESIDENT: 10. Senator Washington. 11. SENATOR WASHINGTON: 12. On a parliamentary inquiry. Am I correct, a motion to 13. Table was lodged by Senator Shapiro? 14. PRESIDENT: 15. Yes, it's a motion to suspend and...and then Table the 16. Motions in Writing. 17. SENATOR WASHINGTON: 18. Suspend... 19. PRESIDENT: 20. It will...it will require thirty affirmative votes, yes Sir. 21. SENATOR WASHINGTON: 22. It's lumped together as one motion? 23. PRESIDENT: 24. That is correct. Senator Shapiro. All right, Senator 25. Shapiro...Senator Shapiro has moved to suspend Senate Rule 26. 5C and all appropriate rules for the purpose of Tabling all 27. motions appearing on the Senate Calendar on the Order of 28. Motions in Writing. Those in favor with that... of that motion 29. will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. 30. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? 29. 3510. Any discussion? Senator Mitchler.

30. SENATOR MITCHLER:

31. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. Yes,
32. this is needed very much for the Quincy Veterans' Home to
aliminate them...filling out this great big stack of forms

1. that will go through, that is not really the intent of the 2. Act and it should have been in the Act to exempt them in the first place, and it's very necessary for their expansion of 3. their facility down there; and I would respectfully ask an 4. affirmative vote. You have had distributed on your desk 5. the positions of the Disabled Veterans and the American Legion; 6. the VFW is behind this, and I would certainly like to be able 7. to go back up there on Saturday to the VFW Convention and 8. report that you did favorably acknowledge their request. 9. Appreciate an affirmative vote on this, please. 10.

11. PRESIDENT:

Senator Knuppel has moved to discharge the Committee on 12. Rules from further consideration of House Bill 3510. Those 13. in favor of the motion will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote 14. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all 15. voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. 16. On that question, the Ayes are 32, the Nays are 7, 1 Voting 17. Present. The motion prevails. 3549, Senator Lemke. 3595, 18. Senator Nimrod. On the Order of Motions in Writing, at the 19. bottom of page 21, is a motion with respect to House Bill 3595. 20. Read the motion, Mr. Secretary. 21.

SECRETARY:

I move to discharge the Rules Committee from further consideration of House Bill 3595 and that it be advanced to 2nd reading. Signed, Senator Nimrod.

PRESIDENT: 26.

Senator Nimrod.

SENATOR NIMROD:

29. Thank you, Mr. President. The necessity for this bill has to do with the fact of the abortion bill, which has been struck down...parts have been struck down by the Supreme Court, and I have an amendment that's been sent to me, that's been endorsed by all the pro-life groups that want to be sure it

1. gets on there. Their attorneys, in fact, have prepared the 2. amendment in order to make it effective. Without that, we 3. have the whole bill...the abortion bill that we pass is all 4. in jeopardy, and has to do with the viable fetus; and the amendment..we have been unable to get it on the other bills. 5. If we could do that, we would have done it. So, I would ask 6. if we...yote to discharge this bill, so we can amend 7. the bill and properly be in conformity with the Constitutional 8. requirements. 9.

10. PRESIDENT:

All right. Senator Nimrod has moved to discharge the 11. Committee on Rules from further consideration of House Bill 12. 3595. Is there any discussion? If not, those in favor of 13. the motion will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The 14. voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted 15. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 16. 19, the Nays are 6, 2 Voting Present. The motion fails. 17. Any further Motions in Writing from any member? Senator 18. Nimrod. 19.

20. SENATOR NIMROD:

21. Going back to the bill 1387, I had...would ask that we
22. try to get it withdrawn, but we're trying to keep this bill
23. alive; we think it's important. Seeing there's no way to
24. do it, I would ask for a roll call. What...so, would you
25. read the bill, please.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. All right. With leave of the Body we will go back to
28. the top of page nineteen, House...there's a motion filed
29. with respect to House Bill 1387. Read that motion, Mr.
30. Secretary.

SECRETARY:

32. I move to discharge the Rules Committee from further33. consideration of House Bill 1387 and that the bill be placed

on the Calendar on the Order of 2nd reading. Signed, Senator
 Nimrod.

3. PRESIDENT:

Senator Nimrod.

5. SENATOR NIMROD:

Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the 6. Senate. This is probably one of the most important bills ... 7. issues to come before us. We were very fortunate the House 8. was able to pass it by an overwhelming vote of 114 votes; 9. and it deals with the repeal of the Inheritance Tax. I've talked 10. to a number of you about it, and given you information and 11. literature about this bill; and this is the one opportunity, 12. I think, to do something not only from keeping millions of 13. dollars from leaving the State of Illinois, but, I think, 14. that the tax loss will be very negligent...very minimal, I mean. 15. And I think one thing, if you're concerned about the loss to 16. the counties, what we're...what we're proposing is that we 17. amend the bill so that the counties will, in fact, receive as 18. much money; maybe give them ten percent of the holding tax, 19. so that...those that are doing the collecting, now, that the 20. counties will have no loss of revenue. But I do think that 21. what it does, it removes this onerous bill which really 22. gives the problem to both those who have no money to pay, it 23. locks up the lock boxes and holds the cash away when the 24. widows need the money the most. At the same time, we have a 25. max...mass exodus of those wealthy people, who are forced to 26. leave, take their estate out of the State of Illinois after 27. they retire, become senior citizens, so that they can avoid 28. the taxes. I think the State is the loser in this area, both 29. in the families and the money; and I... I would think that if 30. we were able to do this that the net loss in this whole bill 31. would almost be minimal. I think it's very important to those 32. in...both in low income and high income, to do away with this 33.

tax...is probably the highest tax of any State in the union.
 I would ask for your favorable consideration.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. Senator Nimrod has moved to discharge the Committee on Rules from further consideration of House Bill 1387. Any 5. discussion? If not, those in favor of the motion will vote 6. Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have 7. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the 8. record. On that question, the Ayes are 25, the Nays are 12, 9. none Voting Present.
