21. If I can have your attention, we are honored today to have
22. some special guests with us, and the Illinois Information Service
23. requests leave of the Body to televise for the purpose of greeting
24. our special guests, immediately after that we will go to the

26. we're going to go to work. If I can have your attention, the
27. Chair will yield to Senator Kent.

28. SENATOR KENT:

29. It gives me great pleasure to introduce to the members of the
30. Senate the 1981 Illinois State Basketball Champions, the Quincy
31. Senior High School Bluedevils. Not only was this fine group of
32. men the large school champs, but recently they were voted the
33. outstanding high school team in the nation by the Basketball Weekly.

1. So much...so much can be said about their ability and their
2. achievement, their perfect season. I know a number of you
3. marvelled at their graceful performance at the State Tournament
4. winning every game by no less than twenty-five points. Their
5. total wins and losses for the past three years is ninety-one
6. wins and four losses. There is, however, another component to
7. this team, aside from ability, that I'd like to talk about. In-
8. dividually, and as a group, they exemplified more than skill on
9. the basketball court, they are a group of disciplined and pri-
10. ncipled young athletes. Rarely did any of them question an
11. official's call, they were always poised and mindful of what
12. the word sportsmanship means. They played with fierce com-
13. petitiveness, but more importantly they won with class. They
14. are a tribute to the community which supported them so loyally
15. and enthusiastically, and to all the people of Illinois. And
16. last but not least, to their great coach, Jerry Leggitt. I don't
17. have enough time to even begin to tell you about the Coach, his
18. record of a hundred and twenty-nine wins and only nineteen losses
19. during his five years at Quincy High School, coupled with all the
20. attributes of sportsmanship displayed by his team are a testimony
21. to his leadership. That says it all. Coach, I'm going to turn
22. this over to you, and just say to my colleagues, if you ever heard
23. him at a banquet or a post...new conference, you'd wish...you're
24. glad he's not your opponent. Jerry Leggitt.

27. PRESIDENT:

28. If you'll turn to page 2 on the Calendar, on the Order of
29. Senate Bills 2nd reading, Senate Bill 1, Senator Egan. Senate
30. Bill 14, Senator Bruce. Senate Bill 16, Senator Berning. Read
31. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

33. Senate Bill 16.

7. Thank you, Mr. President. The amendment...the amendment as

10. adoption of the amendment, Mr. Chairman.

11. PRESIDENT:

12. All right, Senator Berning has moved the adoption of Committee
13. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 16. Is there any discussion? If
14. not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes
15. have it. The amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?

18. PRESIDENT:

19. Any amendments from the Floor?

22. PRESIDENT:

23. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 17, Senator Berning. Senate Bill
24. 19, Senator Collins. Senate Bill 20, Senator Collins. Senate
25. Bill 21, Senator Berning. On the Order of Senate Bills 2nd reading,
26. the middle of page 2, Senate Bill 21. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

27. SECRETARY:

28. Senate Bill 21.

29. (Secretary reads title of bill)

30. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Insurance, Pensions, and
31. Licensed Activities offers one amendment.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Senator Berning.

1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. This bill in itself is to
3. bring our State Pension Systems into...more nearly into conform-
4. ity with the Federal requirements and the amendment is a technical
5. amendment. I would move for the amendment...for the adoption of
6. the amendment, Mr. Chairman.

7. PRESIDENT:

8. Senator Berning has moved the adoption of Amendment...Committee
9. Amendment No. 1 to Senate Bill 21. Any discussion? If not, all
10. in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it.
11. The amendment is adopted. Are there further amendments?

12. SECRETARY:

13. No further committee amendments.

14. PRESIDENT:

15. Any amendments from the Floor?

16. SECRETARY:

17. No Floor amendments.

18. PRESIDENT:

19. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 31, Senator Vadalabene. Senator
20. Vadalabene, for what purpose do you arise?

21. SENATOR VADALABENE:

22. Yes, this is a bill that I've held for about four or five
23. weeks because other committee members had amendments that they
24. wanted to put on...on the Floor, and I think this is a time that
25. we ought to do it, so we can get moving with the bill.

26. PRESIDENT:

27. All right, on the Order of Senate Bills 2nd...Senator Berning,
28. for what purpose do you arise?

29. SENATOR BERNING:

30. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. I, as well as some other members,
31. owe Senator Vadalabene an apology, we have not been able to finalize
32. the amendment that we would like to offer. My only request is to
33. Senator Vadalabene that if we are able to finalize an amendment

1. within a reasonable period of time, would he be willing to bring
2. the bill back to 2nd reading for consideration of that amendment?

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Senator Vadalabene.

5. SENATOR VADALABENE:

6. Yes, I most certainly will, and I really believe that five
7. weeks has been a reasonable amount of time to finalize it, but
8. however, I would do that, Senator Berning.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. All right, the bill is on the Order of 2nd reading. Are
11. there committee amendments, Mr. Clerk...Mr. Secretary? Oh, read
12. the bill.

13. SECRETARY:

14. Senate Bill 31.

15. (Secretary reads title of bill)

16. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Local Government offers
17. one amendment.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Senator Vadalabene to explain the amendment.

20. SENATOR VADALABENE:

21. It requires the...notification of a public hearing concerning
22. formation of coterminous cities. Incidentally, this is Senator
23. Nega's amendment. It's a committee amendment, I'll explain it,
24. but I don't know where Senator Nega is, is that okay?

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Well, Senator, if you can, perhaps we can just expedite it,
27. either that or Senator Nega you're...Senator Nedza, I understand
28. offered the amendment.

29. SENATOR VADALABENE:

30. Okay, I'll...what the amendment does, it requires that not-
31. ification of a public hearing concerning formation of coterminous
32. cities be printed in the newspaper that is published within the
33. affected city...if there is none, in the newspaper published within

1. the county in which the townships are located. And I apologize
2. to Senator Nega, that is my committee amendment that was put on
3. by the Illinois Press Association.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. The motion is to adopt Committee Amendment No. 1. Discussion
6. of the motion. All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have
7. it. Committee Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Further amendments?

8. SECRETARY:

9. No...no further committee amendments.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. Are there amendments from the Floor?

12. SECRETARY:

13. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Gitz.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Senator Gitz to explain Amendment No. 2.

16. SENATOR GITZ:

17. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Amendment No. 2
18. addresses several critical issues on Senate Bill 31 that were brought
19. forth in the Local Government Committee. Essentially, this
20. amendment does three things, first it changes the requirement
21. in the original legislation for townships to be merged from a
22. majority of the registered voters to a majority of those voting
23. in the election. Secondly, it would clearly define out, that
24. cities would have the ability to annex territory, but the township
25. would not necessarily annex with it. And as such that annexation,
26. which is voluntary in nature, could proceed when the property is
27. residential. But in the case of commercial, industrial, or vacant
28. property, it would not be an automatic annexation, and it would be
29. subject to those referendum requirements. This addresses several
30. of the critical issues that were voiced by several of us in the
31. Local Government Committee.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. The motion is to adopt. Is there discussion? Senator Vadalabene.

1. SENATOR VADALABENE:

2. Yes, I had discussed this amendment with the...George
3. Miller of the Illinois Township Officials, and we have no
4. opposition to this amendment.

6. Further discussion? The motion is to adopt. All in favor
7. say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 2 is

15. read that first one, I'm not sure which one it is. Would you

18. I only have one amendment from you, Senator, and this is,
19. "where the territory annexed by the city is less than twenty acres..."

20. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

21. It shall become disconnected from the adjacent township
22. and annexed to the township which has...which was coterminous with
23. the city without having the proposition to annex...submitted to
24. the voters in the townships. I've had experience about eight..
25. ten years as a municipal attorney, and as a township attorney,
26. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. There are
27. many pieces of property, maybe only an acre, and if you required
28. ...or maybe an acre, five or ten or fifteen, if you require a referendum
29. for all these it'll be very, very expensive in...municipalities.
30. What my amendment does is limit it to twenty acres. In other words,
31. a city cannot annex any property without a referendum unless it's
32. twenty acres or less. And I move the adoption of that amendment.

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

1. a bill to abolish the requirement that Constitutional Amendments
2. be mailed out to all of the voters of Illinois. The committee
3. amendment does three basic things, it transfers some functions
4. from the old Index Division of the Secretary of State's Office,
5. functions which it had under the Constitution of 1870 and transfers
6. those functions to the State Board of Elections. It also sets
7. a cap of four million pamphlets to be printed and provides for the
8. State Board of Elections to establish rules necessary to ensure that
9. the pamphlets are distributed evenly throughout the State. And I
10. would move for the adoption of the committee amendment.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. The motion is to adopt Committee Amendment No. 1. Discussion
13. of the motion? All...all in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The
14. Ayes have it. Committee Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Are there
15. further amendments...committee amendments?

17. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senator Grotberg.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Senator Grotberg on Amendment No. 2...Floor amendment.

20. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

21. Thank you, Mr. President, and fellow members. You may want
22. to listen to this, this is my concept of how to handle the large
23. mailing of the explanation of Constitutional Amendments that are
24. mandated as the Act reads now, a committee of the House and Senate
25. still have to write the pros and cons. My concern is the public's
26. right to know and I'm suggesting therefore that the Election
27. Authority shall provide the judges of election in each precinct
28. with a reasonable number of the pamphlets published and distributed
29. in accordance with the provisions of the Act. And then there's...
30. at the end it states that they shall always have one on hand in
31. case they try to give them all away. But this would then put a
32. reasonable number of the pros and cons of any Constitutional
33. Amendment at the precinct on Election Day and let the public debate

1. go on in the media and other ways to try to avoid this horrendous
2. mailing cost and printing cost that gets sent to everyone whether
3. they vote or not. If only forty-nine percent of the families in
4. Illinois are voting and we send explanations like this to a hundred
5. percent of them, there is a question in my mind as to the cost
6. effectiveness of it. Therefore, Mr. President, I would move the
7. adoption of Amendment No. 2.

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END OF REEL

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1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Is there further discussion of the motion to adopt?

3. Senator Rock.

4. SENATOR ROCK:

5. Yes. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen
6. of the Senate. I rise in opposition to Amendment No. 2.

7. I think the Senator has...is rightfully concerned about the
8. public's right to know, but I think to have pamphlet distri-
9. bution of any kind, whether you are for or against, in the
10. precinct polling place is simply untoward. We do not allow
11. any kind of electioneering, as far as I know, in the polling
12. place, much less the distribution of material. I just...I
13. think Senator Rhoads' idea is a good one to save the State
14. some money. To afford the State Board of Elections the
15. opportunity to...to give...to give this information in...in
16. some written form...to the Boards of Election Commissioners
17. and the County Clerks and let them distribute it. But to
18. have it in the polling place, I think, is a terrible idea.
19. I would urge opposition to Amendment No. 2.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Motion...further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

22. SENATOR RHOADS:

23. Well, I rise in support of Senator Grotberg's amendment.
24. He did mention this amendment in committee, Senator Rock, and...
25. and just to clarify what we're talking about. We're talking
26. about the actual pamphlet itself. I'm holding a copy of it
27. in my hand here, the blue pamphlet that had...had formerly
28. been mailed out. I don't really see any difference con-
29. ceptually between having copies of this pamphlet available
30. in the polling place and having a sample ballot available in
31. the polling place. That's...that's really to give voters
32. an idea of just exactly what they're voting on. So I...I
33. don't think Senator Rock's opposition is...is well founded,

1. I think...Senator Grotberg's amendment is a very reasonable
2. one and deserves support.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Further discussion? Senator Collins.

5. SENATOR COLLINS:

6. A question of the sponsor...

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Indicates he will yield. Senator Collins.

9. SENATOR COLLINS:

10. Okay. I think Senator Rock...raised...you know...my...
11. my same objections, but there was one other question that I...
12. I didn't hear. Are you saying that the judges of election of
13. each precinct prior to Election Day would be responsible for
14. disseminating the pamphlets and in addition to having them
15. available in the polling places on Election Day?

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Senator Grotberg.

18. SENATOR GROTBERG:

19. The intent of this amendment, Senator Collins, is that...
20. as a precinct committeeman, I know about how many people vote.
21. The County Clerk knows from historical records. On the day...
22. on Election Day, he should have a...a reasonable number in
23. there for the number of voters who are expected to vote and right
24. along with their ballot get the explanation. And I believe
25. for Senator Rock's clarification, the pros and cons are both
26. in the same document. So, we're only talking about one
27. piece of paper and it's the public's business. It's not
28. a political issue...as a rule. But...that is the thrust
29. of this thing. That every voter could pick one up...at the
30. polls,...Senator.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Further discussion? Senator Bruce.

33. SENATOR BRUCE:

1. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I
2. rise in opposition to this proposal. Each year we have a
3. proposal on the ballot that affects someone that is running
4. or not running. It's a possibility, I suppose, that some-
5. day someone will propose a Constitutional Amendment saying
6. that Governors cannot be elected for more than two terms.
7. If that were on the ballot at the same time that Governor
8. Thompson were running for reelection next time, he might
9. not be enthusiastic about having that distributed...in
10. some six thousand polling places across the State of Illinois.
11. Now, maybe his opponent might be, and even with the pro
12. and con discussion...it certainly affects the guy that's
13. running for the third term, because it brings up the issue.
14. If someone were running for Attorney General, if someone
15. were running for Secretary of State, they can, in fact, get
16. something distributed at the polling place that either helps
17. or hinders their particular cause and if they are identified
18. with that Constitutional Amendment, they will be benefited
19. by that distribution. We have never allowed...discussion
20. of issues within the polling place and that ought to be the
21. way it remains. Outside the flags you can do anything you
22. want to. You can harass the people as they walk in, you can
23. shake hands, smile and do everything you want to, but once
24. they get inside that polling area, I don't think the judges,
25. Democrat, Republican, Independent, or anybody else ought to be
26. handing the voter anything but the ballot on which he is
27. supposed to be knowledgeable at the time he arrives at the
28. polling place. Nothing more than that. Senator Grotberg,
29. I think this is a bad idea to say that our judges, who have
30. been independent from all pressures, are now going to be
31. involved in handing out pamphlets, pro and con, on any
32. issue.
33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. ...there further discussion? Senator Ozinga.

2. SENATOR OZINGA:

3. I just have a question of the sponsor. If my memory
4. serves me right, I believe where it says that there's a limi-
5. tation of time for a person to be in the polling booth.
6. Now, are we going to eliminate the time in there in order
7. to give them time to read this thing? Have you seen any
8. Constitutional Amendments, lately, that have been less than
9. five, six, or ten pages?

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Grotberg.

12. SENATOR GROTBORG:

13. A point well taken, Senator. The answer, of course,
14. is no. We didn't change the time. And yes, I've seen
15. these pamphlets come out from the Secretary of State's...
16. publication or the Board of Elections' publication, now,
17. of our committee results pro and con. These are truly
18. public issues...you know...vote your conscience on it, all
19. I wanted to do is to make doggone sure that after we give
20. it to the Board of Elections and the County Clerk, that
21. there are some counties that may never get any further than
22. the County Clerk if we don't put some teeth in it. I'd
23. just like to have a few of them around the polling place.
24. As a precinct committeeman, I...show up on Election Day
25. pretty regularly in my precinct. And I'm here to tell you,
26. people have honest inquiry about public information. And
27. I think of the propositions, only as public information.
28. I'm not talking about candidates, and I appreciate the
29. commentary that's made on some candidate that may have a
30. pro or con on...on a Constitutional Amendment. But if they
31. could get hung out to dry, because of lack of knowledge of the
32. voter, this would certainly make it rather helpful to a lot
33. of the people who come in and don't know what the heck they're

1. voting on, maybe they don't watch TV, or maybe they don't
2. subscribe to the paper.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Grotberg
5. moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to Senate Bill 183.
6. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.
7. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
8. who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are
9. 17, the Nays 35. Amendment No. 2 having failed to receive
10. a...majority vote is declared failed. Any further amend-
11. ments?

12. SECRETARY:

13. No further amendments.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Any amendments from the Floor?

16. SECRETARY:

17. No further amendments.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 199, Senator Philip. Read
20. the bill, Mr. Secretary.

22. Senate Bill 199.

23. (Secretary reads title of bill)

24. 2nd reading of the bill. Committee on Revenue offers one
25. amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Philip.

28. SENATOR PHILIP:

29. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
30. Senate. Amendment...Committee Amendment No. 1 does two things,
31. basically. It puts a lid on the amount of income to qualified
32. people of thirty thousand dollars and changes the effective
33. date to January 1, 1982. I'll answer any questions and I

1. move the adoption.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. we're changing, simply, one word, the word is to are. I
20. move the adoption.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Is there further discussion? Senator Demuzio.

23. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

24. Senator Philip,...pardon me, I was...only partially
25. paying attention. What's the revenue impact to amendment...
26. to the amendment that you just put on?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Philip.

29. SENATOR PHILIP:

30. Senator Demuzio, I didn't hear the question.

31. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

32. What is the revenue impact to the State of Illinois by
33. the amendment that you just put on and is there a fiscal note attached
34. to this bill?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Philip.

3. SENATOR PHILIP:

4. The amendment I just put on, Senator, changes one
5. word, the word is to are. There is no revenue effect
6. to that at all, to my knowledge.

7. SECRETARY:

8. There...there is a statement of policy objective,
9. there is a fiscal note attached to the bill.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Demuzio.

12. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

13. Yes. I understand that. You have the current amend-
14. ment, which you're discussing now. My question was, what
15. is the revenue impact to the Amendment No. 1 that you just
16. put on the bill?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Philip, that is the committee amendment.

28. SENATOR MCMILLAN:

29. Mr. President and members of the Senate, the purpose of
30. this amendment is to make sure that the proposals made by
31. this commission have to be approved by a record vote of a
32. majority of those members elected to each House of the General
33. Assembly before the raises would be enacted. If you read the

1. bill as already amended, this commission comes forth with a
2. proposal for a pay raise, but what it really says is that
3. less than a majority of those in the Body may favor it and
4. it may still be enacted. The purpose of this amendment is
5. to say that if we wish to have the pay raises recommended by
6. this commission, we must accept them as a positive act. And
7. I would move its adoption.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Further discussion? Senator Rhoads.

10. SENATOR RHOADS:

11. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I rise
12. in support of Amendment No. 4 to Senate Bill 269. First of
13. all, I want to compliment Senator Berman on what he's trying
14. to accomplish in this bill and particularly compliment him
15. on the adoption of Committee Amendment No. 3, which would
16. provide for a prohibition on lame duck salary increases of
17. the kind that occurred in November of 1978 in House Bill 802.
18. However, unless Senator McMillan's amendment is adopted, we
19. have, here, in Senate Bill 269 ticking away a more explosive
20. time bomb than that which went off in November, 1978. For
21. without the McMillan amendment, if this bill passes in both
22. the House and Senate and is signed by the Governor, we will
23. be guilty of a far greater travesty than that...which was
24. perpetrated on the taxpayers of Illinois in November, 1978.
25. The reason is very simple. As Section 4, of the bill on page 2
26. now reads, if the board fails to file a report or the General
27. Assembly disapproves the report, as provided in Paragraph B,
28. which is a majority vote, then the new salaries would go
29. into effect automatically. As Senator McMillan has already
30. pointed out, this would mean that there might not ever be
31. any recorded roll call vote on a pay raise for Legislators,
32. members of the Judicial and Executive Branches. Now, some people
33. have said, well, what's good enough for the scoundrels in

1. Congress, is good enough for us. The only thing this bill
2. doesn't do is key our salaries to inflation. The problem is
3. that, what about the deeper philosophical implications of
4. this? Sure it's tough to vote on pay raises, it's tough
5. to vote on tax raises, it's tough to vote on spending in-
6. creases. But heaven help us if every time a controversial
7. bill comes along, we simply abrogate our responsibility and
8. delegate that tough vote to a commission of some sort. Which
9. commission will come up with the recommendation and have their
10. recommendations go into effect automatically without
11. there ever being a roll call vote of the General Assembly?
12. We might as well just reduce ourselves to voting on happy
13. birthday resolutions and never again face any tough issues.
14. It's certainly...safer for us in facing re-election campaigns.
15. But it isn't really doing the job that we were elected to do.
16. I can't urge strongly enough support for Senator McMillan's
17. amendment, because if that amendment does not go on or go
18. on in the House, then we're going to hear a far greater out-
19. cry from the public once they find out what's going on, than
20. we heard in November, 1978.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. Is there further discussion? Senator Berman.

23. SENATOR BERMAN:

24. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to this
25. amendment. With this amendment you don't need the bill. The
26. purpose of the bill is to create a panel that will hold public
27. hearings that will take testimony and that can evaluate based
28. upon criteria spelled out in the bill, whether there should be
29. any change. And I say change, because...it's within the
30. power of the board to decrease...recommend decreases as well
31. as increases in salaries. But to make recommendations for
32. changes in salaries in both the...in all of the Legislative
33. and Judicial Branches and in certain categories of the

1. Executive Branch. I am sure that nobody in this Body...can
2. honestly say that there isn't one or many persons that will
3. happily lead the charge, by filing a...resolution of dis-
4. approval...to the recommended changes in salary. There are
5. always people that will not wish to and cannot vote for
6. pay increases for any branch of government. Those people
7. will always be in the House or in the Senate and those people
8. will leap to the opportunity to introduce a resolution of
9. disapproval. So that...I can assure you that everyone will
10. have an opportunity...to cast their vote on the question of
11. salary increases for the three branches of government. The
12. difference is that with this amendment...there has to be an
13. affirmative action...and I am not sure that we have to under-
14. take that kind of an obligation to recognize the need for
15. reasonable salary increases...especially in the Executive and
16. Judicial Branches of government. We have judges that are
17. going off the bench because they can't afford...to be judges
18. at the salary levels of State government. That's even
19. happening at federal level where they get more money than
20. our judges. This approach that's in this bill, without this
21. amendment, still will require every person to be on record.
22. But this amendment, in effect, guts the bill. And I would
23. ask...that you make your determination as to the merits or
24. demerits of this bill on 3rd reading. Don't gut it on
25. 2nd reading and I would ask for a No vote on Amendment No. 4.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Is there further discussion? If not, the question is,
28. shall Amendment No. 4 be adopted. Could we have a voice
29. vote on this? Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
30. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish?
31. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question,
32. the Ayes are 18, the Nays are 27, none Voting Present. Amend-
33. ment No. 4 having failed to receive a majority vote is declared

2. SECRETARY:

3. Amendment No. 5, offered by Senator Sommer.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Sommer.

6. SENATOR SOMMER:

7. Mr. President,...this amendment goes towards the panel
8. that will be established to...to make determinations on salary.
9. It has three provisions, the amendment does. It...it
10. prohibits people who are registered lobbyists from serving
11. on this panel...for obvious reasons. It prohibits members
12. who were formerly officers who would benefit by this from
13. serving on the panel, thinking that the relationship was too
14. close and thirdly, it creates a panel that...in which half of
15. the members, there...there would be eight members, four are
16. appointed by the...the various leaders of the Legislature,
17. one each, and four would be drawn at random by lottery from
18. the public. One of those seats, from the public, would be
19. guaranteed to Cook County, the other three would be drawn
20. throughout the State all of the time as they would revolve
21. through the various...times in which they would serve on
22. this...this particular board. This would require that those
23. people who are insiders in the system and who would arrive
24. at a predetermined result on salaries would at least have
25. to sell that result to one member of the public. Just one.
26. Hopefully all of them would...would agree, but at least one
27. drawn at random would have to go along. And that's what
28. this amendment does.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

30. Is there further discussion? Senator Gitz.

31. SENATOR GITZ:

32. Not on this bill, Mr. President, but...we closed
33. the switch a little quickly on Amendment 4 and I'd like the

1. record to reflect that I wish to be recorded Aye on it.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. The record will...so indicate. Senator Berman.

4. SENATOR BERMAN:

5. Thank you, Mr. President. I rise in opposition to this
6. amendment. As the bill presently is structured there will be
7. twelve members of this board. They will be appointed, three each, by
8. the President of the Senate, the Minority Leader of the Senate,
9. the Speaker of the House and the Minority Leader of the House. I
10. think that we have seen...throughout our government that
11. when there is a...requirement of responsibility that that
12. responsibility is exercised...with a...with credibility. When
13. we pick at random,...which is the purpose of this amendment,...
14. there is no responsibility. And people will come off the wall,
15. so to speak, with all kinds of ideas. I think the way the bill
16. is presently structured...the people who are responsible,
17. mainly the leadership of the General Assembly, will have to
18. take either the heat or the credit for the caliber of people that
19. they put on this board. I have confidence in Senator Shapiro
20. and Senator Rock, as our present leadership, to appoint people
21. that will be objective, honest, credible, and will act with
22. total integrity. I urge the defeat of this amendment.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Is there further discussion? Senator Bloom.

25. SENATOR BLOOM:

26. Thank you. I rise in support of this amendment. I, too,
27. have confidence in our leaders. I have confidence in Senator
28. Rock, confidence in Senator Shapiro, but the touchstone and
29. the key to this is credibility. And there has, heretofore,
30. been no acceptable way to set compensation in the Legislative
31. Branch. And by doing it in a random manner, you are telling
32. the electorate that, indeed, you try it. I think that that
33. carries within it its own credibility. Thank you.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Is there further discussion? If not, the question is,
3. shall Amendment No. 5 be adopted. Those in favor will indicate
4. by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Nays have it. Amend-
5. ment No. 5...the question is, shall Amendment No. 5 be
6. adopted? Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed
7. will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
8. wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. My
9. hearing was right on target. The...the Yeas are 24, the
10. Nays are 25, none Voting Present. Amendment No. 5 having
11. failed to receive a majority...for what purpose does
12. Senator Sommer arise?

13. SENATOR SOMMER:

14. ...verification of that roll call.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. I will announce that the Yeas are 24, the Nays 25, none
17. Voting Present. Senate...Amendment No. 5 having failed to
18. receive a majority...is failed. Senator Sommer requests
19. a verification of the roll call. We'll start with
20. the Ayes. ...requested a verification of the roll call,
21. Senator. Of the negative roll call. We'll start with the
22. negative roll call. Will all the Senators be in their seats.
23. And will the Secretary read the negative votes.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Joyce. Senator Joyce. Strike him from the
3. record. Any further...

4. SENATOR SOMMER:

5. Senator Degnan?

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Senator Degnan. Is Senator Degnan present? Senator
8. Degnan. Strike him from the record. Any other questions?

9. SENATOR SOMMER:

10. Senator Carroll?

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Senator Carroll is on the Floor. For what purpose does
13. Senator Hall arise?

14. SENATOR HALL:

15. Well, when you finish, I want a verification of the
16. affirmative.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. You'll be granted that...option. There's been a request
19. for a verification of the affirmative vote...roll call. Will
20. those Senators please be in their seats and will the Senator...
21. or would the Secretary call the roll.

2. Senator Simms?

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Senator Simms is in his seat. He's in his seat. Are
5. there any...

6. SENATOR HALL:

7. Senator...he's there. Okay.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. The roll call has been verified and the Ayes are 24,
10. the Nays are 23. And Amendment No. 5 has been adopted.
