PRESIDENT:

SECRETARY:

Senator Vadalabene, Chairman of the Committee on Executive Appointments, Veterans Affairs and Administration to which was referred the Governor's Message of May the 20th, 1982, reported the same back with the recommendation that the Senate advise and consent to the following appointments.

PRESIDENT:

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. I move that the Senate resolve itself into Executive Session for the purpose of acting on the Governor's appointments set forth in the Governor's Message of May 20th, 1982.

PRESIDENT:

All right. You've heard the motion as placed by Senator Vadalabene. Any discussion? If not, all in favor signify by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. The motion carries. It is so ordered. The Senate is now in Executive Session. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. With respect to the Governor's Message of May 20th, 1982, I will read the unsalaried appointments to which the Committee on Executive Appointments, Veteran Affairs and Administration recommends that the Senate do advise and consent. And after reading those appointments, I intend to ask leave to consider all of the unsalaried appointments on one roll call unless any Senator has objection to any particular appointment.

To be a member of the Commission for Economic Development for a term expiring June 30, 1983, Robert H. Waddell of Illiopolis.

To be Public Administrator, Guardian and Conservator of Clay County for a term expiring December 2nd, 1985, James L. Padgett of Clay City.

To be members of the Health Facilities Planning Board for a term expiring June 30, 1984, James E. Mann of Chicago and Thomas W. Hestand of Marion.

To be a member of the Capital Development Board for a term expiring January 16, 1984, Perry J. Snyderman of Highland Park.

And to be a member of the Ohio Valley Water Sanitation Commission for a term expiring January 4, 1988, Cordell McGoy

of Cairo.

And to be a member of the Illinois Farm Development Authority for a term expiring January 17, 1983, Patrick R. Scates of Shawneetown and Robert F. Nickel of Concord.

And to be members of the Illinois Farm Development Authority for a term expiring January 16, 1984, Roy Safanda of Geneva and Harold E. Rice of DuQuoin.

And to be a member of the Illinois Farm Development Authority for a term expiring January 21, 1985, Ross M. Camp of Champaign.

And to be members of the Illinois Farm Development Authority for a term expiring January 20, 1986, John F. Rundquist of Butler and Marjorie A. Albin of Newman.

And Mr. President and members of the Senate, having read the unsalaried appointments, I now seek leave to consider these appointments on one roll call unless some Senator has objection to a specific appointment.

PRESIDENT:

You've heard the request of Senator Vadalabene. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Thank you, Mr. President. Will you put the question as required by our rules.

PRESIDENT:

The question is, does the Senate advise and consent to the nominations just made. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes are 55, the Nays are none, none Voting Present. A majority of the Senators elected concurring by record vote, the Senate does advise and consent to the nominations just made. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

cations process to the courts of the State of Illinois and to
the Supreme Court where we feel that they are overstepping
their constitutional authority in making law. And I would
ask only that anyone who wishes to co-sponsor it, please, now
is the time to fish or cut bait and I'd be glad to have any
co-sponsors. Thank you.
