20. All this bill does, is...is puts Senate Bill 26 on this
21. bill, which is Senator Bowers and my inheritance tax bill, which
22. didn't get out of the House committee, because there wasn't
23. enough people to vote. I ask for its adoption.
24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
25. The motion is to adopt Amendment No. 1. Discussion?
26. Senator Coffey, any comment? The motion is to adopt. All in
27. favor say Aye. Opposed...Senator Coffey.
28. PRESIDENT:
29. Senator Coffey.
30. SENATOR COFFEY:
31. Well, Mr. President. I would like to request of the sponsor
32. of this amendment, that he go into a little detail...explain
33. this amendment, because it is a costly amendment, and I think

1. the Body ought to...to listen to this amendment prior to us
2. accepting it.

3. PRESIDENT:

4. All right, could we hold the caucuses down. There's been
5. a request the sponsor further explain Amendment No. 1. Senator
6. Lemke.

7. SENATOR LEMKE:

8. What this amendment does, is simply put Senate Bill 26,
9. which we passed out of here about 54 to...to 2, or something,
10. on...onto this bill. What it does is just sets up for widows,
11. as to the inheritance tax exemption. It gives them an eighty
12. thousand dollar exemption for jointly...you know...property
13. they held with their deceased spouse. I think it's a good
14. amendment, it's...it...it allows us to give some relief, tax
15. relief, for inheritance taxes. And it had no problem in the
16. Senate when we passed it out, and the only problem in the House
17. was they got that rule where you've got to have ten votes out
18. of nineteen, and when they only have nine...ten or twelve people
19. at a committee meeting you'll never get the vote, so it never
20. got out of committee. It wasn't voted down, it just didn't
21. get enough votes out of committee because there wasn't enough
22. people there.

23. PRESIDENT:

24. Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

25. SENATOR NETSCH:

26. Well, thank you. My question was the same, I...this is a,
27. I think, a major substantive provision, and it's being offered
28. as an add on to a bill that had nothing to do with this particular
29. subject matter even though it's an amendment to the same Act. And,
30. you know, what's the fiscal impact of this, are we...is this the
31. beginning of seeing every bill that didn't make it...as an amendment
32. to a bill that is floating through the House?

33. PRESIDENT:

Senator...

1. SENATOR NETSCH:

2. Well, Senator Carroll just answered that question, yes, for
3. me, but...but apart from that, can you give us the fiscal note
4. on this?

5. PRESIDENT:

6. Senator Lemke.

7. SENATOR LEMKE:

8. That...we had the fiscal note, Senator Bowers and I. I think
9. the...the fiscal impact was about, was it four million or some-
10. thing? It was very little, it was three to four million dollars,
11. I think. It was Senator Bowers' amendment, we worked it out with
12. the Attorney General's Office, everybody was happy. The committee
13. passed...our Senate committee passed the bill out with no opposi-
14. tion, we passed it out of here. I think the only opposition was
15. Dawn because she thinks she's got the key to the Treasury. But
16. ...but I think this is a bill that leads forwards to something
17. that we have promised the people, and that's tax relief. And
18. it's only a minor tax relief, it doesn't create disaster, and
19. it doesn't really take effect for a year. So, it doesn't
20. affect this year's budget. It really doesn't take effect until
21. a year from now.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Is there further discussion? Senator Bowers.

24. SENATOR BOWERS:

25. Well, I just...thank you, Mr. President. I just want to
26. echo what Senator Lemke said right at the end, and that is the
27. fact that this is the kind of tax relief that shouldn't have
28. any impact at all on this year's fiscal budget. Frankly, it
29. doesn't take effect until people who die after January 1st of
30. next year, then if, as you know, in...as far as the collection
31. of inheritance tax is concerned, it isn't due until ten months
32. after the date of death. So, what we're...what we're actually
33. talking about, are dollars in the next fiscal year. Now, if

1. you want...if you want to say that you don't want any...anything
2. that has any tax impact on the years to come, then, of course,
3. perhaps you want to vote against this bill. All the bill does,
4. is raise the exemption as between husband and wife up to a hundred
5. thousand dollars. Now, it does raise the second exemption, as
6. you know, there is a straight twenty thousand exemption, then
7. there was an additional exemption put on with a cap on it. And
8. there's a cap on this one, so that in effect, the people in the
9. high brackets don't save any more money than do the people in
10. the low brackets. The cap is at the lowest bracket. Under
11. the circumstances, I think it's an excellent provision with the
12. cost of real estate skyrocketing like it has, the exemption as
13. we raise it, is not going to mean any more to the average home
14. owner than ... than the old exemption did, simply because their...
15. their homes have gone up to the point where what should have been
16. a rich man's tax has become a poor man's tax. I think it's excel-
17. lent legislation, and I would hope that we would vote for the
18. amendment.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator Netsch, I'm sorry I interrupted your question. Senator
21. Netsch.

22. SENATOR NETSCH:

23. Well, yes, I was just...I can address the question to either
24. one. Now, I'm...I'm...I gather this was not distributed? Well,
25. I couldn't find it on my desk, I had to borrow a copy from the
26. file. You...Senator Bowers, you said it was a one hundred thou-
27. sand dollar exemption, that does not appear to be what the amend-
28. ment says, and I gather when you say it does not apply...until
29. next year, it's because there's no other effective date specified
30. in the Act as it stands at the moment, is that correct?

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Senator Bowers.

33. SENATOR BOWERS:

1. Well, I guess, I first have to confess, that I have not seen
2. the amendment, I'm speaking with reference to the bill, and I'm
3. assuming the statement that the amendment is exactly the same
4. as the bill, is an accurate statement. Assuming that's true,
5. then the bill became effective January 1st of next year. What
6. I'm saying to you, is that...for people who died after January
7. 1st of next year, under the...you know there's ten months before
8. the tax is actually due, and then there's a filtering process
9. after the tax is paid to the county before it gets down to the
10. State. That's the basis of my statement that there's no impact
11. on this year's revenue. Now, as to the exemption itself, it is
12. an add on to the...to the second exemption. There is a twenty
13. thousand, and an additional twenty, that brings the additional
14. twenty up to eighty so that the total exemption will, therefore,
15. be a hundred. There is a cap on the eighty, of which, in effect,
16. brings the...the...the maximum down to the point of its lowest
17. denominator, so that those in the higher brackets will get the
18. same savings as those in the lower brackets, dollar savings. If
19. you didn't put the cap on, obviously you're taking it off the
20. top. If you're in a ten percent bracket you're going to save
21. a heck of a lot more money than you are if you're in a two
22. percent bracket. So, what we've done is capped it, the additional
23. eighty, not the original twenty, we've capped it so that the
24. lower bracket figure is the cap.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Senator Netsch.

27. SENATOR NETSCH:

28. The cap is the twenty-two hundred dollars, is that correct
29. Senator Bowers? All right, thank you.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there further discussion? Senator Coffey.

32. SENATOR COFFEY:

33. Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. As I understand, not this year, but in the future, it will cost between

1. eight and ten million dollars on this amendment, will be the
2. cost possibly to the State. I will accept this amendment, except
3. I would like to request in the future, as we have before, that
4. if an amendment is going to be attached to someone's bill, that
5. they would bring the amendment to them prior to offering that
6. amendment so we can eliminate some of this discussion.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

8. Your suggestion is well-taken. Is there further discussion?
9. If not, Senator Lemke may close debate.

10. SENATOR LEMKE:

11. I just ask for a favorable vote.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Senator Lemke moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to
14. House Bill 725. Those in favor will indicate by saying Aye.
15. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1 is adopted.
16. Any further amendments?

17. SECRETARY:

18. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Coffey.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator Coffey.

21. SENATOR COFFEY:

22. Yes...Mr. President, and members of the Senate. This
23. amendment amends Section 9 of the Inheritance Tax Act regarding
24. the transfers of decedent's assets. This amendment would make
25. an exception to those provisions authorized...authorizing the
26. immediate transfer of the...decedent's personal property when
27. the decedent's assets are valued at fifteen thousand or less,
28. notwithstanding...notwithstanding would be required. The transfer
29. would require to file a notice within fourteen days of the trans-
30. fer to the Attorney General's Office on a form provided by the
31. Attorney General's Office. I'd ask for a favorable roll call.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Is there any discussion? If not...if not, Senator Coffey
moves the adoption of Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 725. Those

1. in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have
2. it. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Any further amendments?

3. SECRETARY:

4. No further amendments.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. 3rd reading. Senator Rhoads, for what purpose do you arise?

7. SENATOR RHOADS:

8. A point of personal privilege.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. State your point.

11. SENATOR RHOADS:

12. By way of announcement, Mr. President, on page 2 of the
13. Calendar, there are five bills dealing with the subject of re-
14. apportionment. I've asked to be distributed on each member's
15. desk an amendment to Senate Bill 49, which is a first attempt
16. by the Reference Bureau to draw some legal descriptions for
17. the fifty-nine Senatorial districts. In an effort to proceed
18. in an orderly fashion, we've asked that this be distributed
19. today so that people can have a chance to look at it. I've
20. talked with Senator Rock, hopefully later in the week we'll
21. have a chance to offer amendments to these various bills, have
22. them sit over the weekend, and take some action on them early
23. next week. But please don't throw that amendment way, it won't
24. be voted on today, but we did want to distribute it so you all
25. had a chance to look at it.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. I'm sure the membership is eternally grateful for your
28. concern, Senator. Senator Bruce on 726. Read the bill, Mr.
29. Secretary.

30. SECRETARY:

31. House Bill 726.

32. (Secretary reads title of bill)

33. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Any amendments from the Floor?

3. SECRETARY:

4. Amendment No. 1 by Senator Bruce.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. Senator Bruce.

7. SENATOR BRUCE:

8. Thank you. This is my commitment to the committee, this
9. bill originally had two annuitants added, it would add the one
10. that we agreed to in committee, and the committee let it out
11. with that understanding. I would now move its adoption.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Is there any discussion? Senator Berning.

14. SENATOR BERNING:

15. Well, Mr. President. Not on this amendment, but my...after
16. the action on this, I'd like to request of the sponsor that
17. either he hold it or agree to bring it back. Our amendment from the
18. Reference Bureau is not ready.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Senator Bruce indicates he's willing to bring it back.
21. Senator Bruce moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House
22. Bill 726. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed.
23. The Ayes have it. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Any further
24. amendments?

25. SECRETARY:

26. No further amendments.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. 3rd reading. Senate Bill 744, Senator Nash. Read the bill,
29. Mr. Secretary.

30. SECRETARY:

31. House Bill 744.

32. (Secretary reads title of bill)

33. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Executive offers one
amendment.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Nash.

3. SENATOR NASH:

4. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Amend-
5. ment...Committee Amendment No. 1 was an amendment that was worked
6. out between the Department of Registration and Education, the Governor's
7. Office, and the House sponsor.

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Is there any discussion? If not, Senator Nash moves the
10. adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 744. Those in favor
11. indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it.
12. Amendment No. 1 is adopted. Any further amendments?

13. SECRETARY:

14. No further amendments. But the amendment...the bill had been
15. rereferred to Insurance and Licensed Activities, and it is their...

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. And that was a committee amendment?

18. SECRETARY:

19. Right.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

21. Any amendments from the Floor?

22. SECRETARY:

23. No Floor amendments.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. 3rd reading. Senator Netsch.

26. SENATOR NETSCH:

27. There is a Floor amendment. It's marked Bloom-Netsch or
28. Netsch-Bloom. It's been distributed, and I've turned it in...it
29. was turned in up there.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Is there leave to take Senate Bill 744 back to the Order
32. of 2nd reading? Leave is granted. On the Order of 2nd reading,
33. House Bill 744. Further amendments?

1. SECRETARY:

2. Amendment No. 2 offered by Senators Bloom and Netsch.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

4. Senator Bloom.

5. SENATOR BLOOM:

6. Thank you, Mr. President, and fellow Senators. What the
7. amendment does, is basically embody the minority report and
8. recommendation from the Sunset Committee Report. The State
9. should require individuals and organizations that conduct pro-
10. fessional boxing matches to obtain a permit for the event. But
11. the primary purpose of regulation here should be to protect
12. the safety of the professional boxer, and that is the thrust of
13. this amendment. I'd be glad to answer any questions, and...
14. otherwise seek its adoption.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Is there any discussion? Senator Netsch.

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. Thank you, Mr. President. If I might add and underscore
19. what Senator Bloom has said. The report of the...the Sunset
20. Commission, as I understand it, almost unanimously recommended
21. that the State get out of the business of promoting and running
22. boxing and other athletic events, as such, that the conditions
23. that lead sixty-five years ago to the very detailed involvement
24. of the State in really running a monopoly type activity, with
25. respect to sporting...expositions...exhibitions was no longer justified. And
26. so you had really, to begin with, a unanimous recommendation that
27. the State cease that kind of activity as the Sunset Law would, in
28. fact, bring about on October 1 of this year. Unfortunately, the
29. amendment which was just adopted, the committee amendment, puts
30. the State back in the business of promoting and otherwise being
31. deeply involved in the exhibition itself, and that is exactly
32. contrary to what the unanimous Sunset Commission recommended.
33. It is true, however, that a minority...a minority of the commission
felt very...in fact, I guess, really a majority of the commission

1. felt that there was a responsibility for the safety of the...
2. those who are involved as contestants, the boxers specifically.
3. And a minority of the commission, lead by Senator Bloom, and
4. I believe, also Senator Gitz had strongly recommended that the
5. State continue to impose some...requirements that related dir-
6. ectly to the one question that the State does have a police
7. power interest in, and that is the health and safety of those
8. who are actual participants. Senator Bloom's and my amendment
9. does, in fact, reflect that point of view. But I would point
10. out again, that even the committee amendment that was just
11. adopted is contrary to the unanimous recommendation of the Sunset
12. Commission, that it is no longer justified for the State to be
13. a promoter, regulator of the exhibition itself.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Senator Nash.

16. SENATOR NASH:

17. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. It
18. would have been nice if the sponsor of this amendment had talked
19. to the sponsors of the bill, or the House sponsors. This is the
20. first we hear of the Floor amendment, and I ask the sponsor of
21. this amendment to withdraw it, and we'll...hold the bill on 2nd
22. reading.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator D'Arco. Senator Bloom...

25. SENATOR D'ARCO:

26. Thank you...

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Wait...wait, Senator Bloom.

29. SENATOR BLOOM:

30. Your point is well-taken, Senator. I...I was unaware that
31. you had not been talked with. If you'll hold it on 2nd, we can
32. talk about it, and we won't take up the Body's time any further.
33. Is that fair enough?

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
2. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill...House Bill 757,
3. Senator DeAngelis. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary.
4. SECRETARY:
5. House Bill 757.
6. (Secretary reads title of bill)
7. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
9. Any amendments from the Floor?
10. SECRETARY:
11. No Floor amendments.
12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
13. 3rd reading. House Bill 760, Senator DeAngelis. Read
14. the bill, Mr. Secretary.
15. SECRETARY:
16. House Bill 760.
17. (Secretary reads title of bill)
18. 2nd reading of the bill. The Committee on Executive offers one
19. amendment.
20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
21. Senator DeAngelis.
22. SENATOR DeANGELIS:
23. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. Committee
24. Amendment No. 1 is a technical amendment. It redefines non-public
25. funds as funds which are not public funds, and redefines by law.
26. I urge its adoption.
27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
28. Is there any discussion? If not, Senator DeAngelis moves
29. the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 760. Those in favor
30. indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Amend-
31. ment No. 1 is adopted.. Any further committee amendments?
32. SECRETARY:
33. No further committee amendments.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Any amendments from the Floor?

3. SECRETARY:

4. No Floor amendments.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

6. 3rd reading. House Bill 803, Senator Egan. Read the bill,

7. Mr. Secretary.

8. SECRETARY:

9. House Bill 803.

10. (Secretary reads title of bill)

11. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Any amendments from the Floor?

14. SECRETARY:

15. No Floor amendments.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. 3rd reading. House Bill 811, Senator McLendon. Read the
18. bill, Mr. Secretary.

19. SECRETARY:

20. House Bill 811.

21. (Secretary reads title of bill)

22. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Any amendments from the Floor?

25. SECRETARY:

26. Amendment No. 1 offered by Senator Carroll.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Carroll.

29. SENATOR CARROLL:

30. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
31. Senate. Amendment No. 1 would be the equivalent of...Senate
32. Bill we did pass out dealing with limitation of hospital days.
33. to fifteen days with an oversight review in case of an emergency.

1. And I would move adoption of Amendment No. 1.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

3. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Carroll moves
4. the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 811. Those in
5. favor indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have
6. it...Senator Totten.

7. SENATOR TOTTEN:

8. Thank you, Mr. President. Would the sponsor yield to a
9. question?

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. He indicates he will.

12. SENATOR TOTTEN:

13. Could you explain, precisely, what this amendment does to
14. this bill, Senator Carroll, please.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Senator Carroll.

17. SENATOR CARROLL:

18. Yes, Senator Totten. As we briefly explained, I think every-
19. body was aware of the topic, Amendment No. 1 would provide that
20. in lieu of the pull the plug dollar limitation established by
21. the Governor, we would limit it...limit stays in hospitals to
22. a fifteen day, with a peer review of the utilization review
23. process for those extreme cases that require longer stays. The
24. purpose of the review is to put into the Department of Public
25. Aid, Public Health, and the other State agencies, Bureau of the
26. Budget, et all, the right to review these longer stays for
27. cases of neonatal care, for burn units, for things of that nature
28. that obviously require longer stays. But from the department's
29. first estimates to us, it would appear as if we could save, based
30. on '82 rates, a hundred and sixty-four million dollars of...of
31. State tax money by asking for a modest limitation on the amount
32. of time a person is in the hospital. We would also give the
33. power to the State to review those people who stay less than

1. fifteen days. Now, right now, they use a utilization review
2. process, whereby there are two nationally accepted standards,
3. those hospitals that have moved to the newer standard find that
4. they can...eliminate about one day's stay, that will be about
5. twelve and a half percent of the seven hundred and eighty-one
6. million we are now spending on hospital stays in Illinois.
7. The purpose of this is, as I said, not to require them to pull
8. the plug, but rather to say that, let them get paid for what
9. they do, but to limit the amount of days people are in hospitals,
10. and let them go to a lesser expensive, alternate form of
11. medical treatment like in-home health care, or like a skilled
12. nursing bed.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Senator Totten.

15. SENATOR TOTTEN:

16. Did we pass a similar bill like this over to the House?

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Carroll.

19. SENATOR CARROLL:

20. Yes, we did and through some miraculous means, the House
21. Assignment of Bills Committee didn't assign it until it was too
22. late for it to be posted to be heard in a House committee. They
23. had it for over two weeks, and for some strange reason, it appears
24. as if the second floor did not want a hearing by the House, so
25. the second floor, I am told, prevailed upon that committee not
26. to assign it to a committee which we always do, regardless of
27. sponsorship or topic, our Assignment of Bills Committee puts it
28. out right away. They held it for over two weeks, so that by
29. the time they assigned it to a committee, that committee had
30. already met and could...it could not be posted for a hearing, they
31. had already finished their activities.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Totten.

1. SENATOR TOTTEN:

2. The...Senator Carroll, the...the department indicates that
3. although this is purported to be a cost containment measure, that
4. they say this would actually cost the State between twenty-seven
5. and thirty-seven million dollars, because they would be unable
6. to implement several of the cost containment measures that they
7. have proposed. How do you respond to that?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Senator Carroll.

10. SENATOR CARROLL:

11. I respond that your information is about ten days late.
12. After they again met with Doctor Bob, as did I, they now agree
13. that it is a cost savings. What they tried to say in that memo
14. that you probably have a copy of, is that only five percent of
15. those now on that type of medical assistance, would, in fact,
16. stay over fifteen days. That is exactly contrary to their own
17. figures, and the figures they gave us before they knew what
18. questions we were asking. When they did not know where we were
19. coming from, they gave us more honest answers, now all of the
20. sudden they've come up with some figures which they now disavow,
21. I might add, that, in fact, they...they felt it would cost money.
22. Well, when they went over it again, that is not true, where they
23. are coming from in that memo also, is yes, many of us feel this
24. is an alternative to the program presented by the Governor. This
25. is an alternative to a more costly program presented by the
26. Governor. This is an alternative to pulling the plug on these
27. kids who are born with birth defects, which is what the Governor
28. was proposing. This is an alternative to pulling the plug on
29. people in burn units and people with...cardiac care, on
30. people with...who have any type of kidney dialysis needs. Yes,
31. this is an alternative to pulling the plug, this is also an
32. alternative to eliminating the Governor's idea of not giving
33. canes or crutches to people. The Governor proposed that we do

1. not give those types of devices, canes, crutches, and bandages
2. in order to get people out of hospitals or nursing homes. And
3. he said that would save money. Well, if you talk to any provider,
4. if you can't send them home with a cane you've got to keep them.
5. And you've got to keep them in a bed, and you've got to keep
6. them either in a nursing home bed or you've got to keep them in
7. a hospital bed, that costs money. This is an alternative
8. to all of that, and this will save substantial dollars, and even
9. the department now, through the good offices of Doctor Bob,
10. admits that that memo is inaccurate, that it will, in fact,
11. save money. And, in fact, as of yesterday, they are looking
12. to move towards this, so you'd better get updated information.
13. They want to adopt our program.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Is there further discussion? Senator Totten.

16. SENATOR TOTTEN:

17. Well, I...I don't know unless Senator Schaffer has any further
18. information than I do, but the language that's on page 7 of
19. the bill, the department, I think, still feels is restrictive
20. and would not provide for the cost containment that the sponsor
21. of the amendment alludes to. And if...if that is the case, we
22. may be embarking on a course that may cost us more than we're
23. purporting to save. And this amendment ought...deserves a...a...
24. some real scrutiny before we either defeat it or adopt it, and
25. maybe it ought to be held.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Schaffer.

28. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

29. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I...I just never
30. fail to be inspired by Senator Carroll's ability to paint a
31. picture the way he wants it painted. His ability is inspirational.
32. It...it just amazes me, I guess, Doctor Bob did, in his own inim-
33. itable way, give them about a half an inch on what it would do to the

1. cost containment measures of the department, although, frankly,
2. cost containment measures by the Department of Public Aid in
3. the past have usually come to naught. But I believe the
4. department is now saying, yes, it might save a buck or two, but
5. I think they're talking in the terms of five million dollars.
6. Senator Totten, the problem, if I can cut away all the rhetoric
7. is, the problem with this proposal is, it is being...touted as
8. a major cost containment, or cost savings mechanism on public
9. aid, which will make it unnecessary for us to address those
10. real cuts that we have to address if we wish to balance the
11. State budget. If I can, in my opinion, the end result of the
12. adoption of this bill, is...amendment on this bill on passage,
13. is to give justification to the membership, who don't really
14. want to make those tough cuts, and very few of us do, that
15. they can say, well, gosh I voted for the containment plan and
16. now it turns out it didn't work, and gosh I guess we're bank-
17. rupt. I personally have to view this, as the February 1982
18. State Bankruptcy Act, and only because I think it will prevent
19. us from taking the real hard look...we have to at public aid,
20. to cut that budget down. Not by the way to decrease it, but
21. only to increase...decrease the amount of the increase. But
22. if we allow ourselves to be convinced we don't have to make
23. real cuts, and this is what I think the purpose of this bill is,
24. then we'll be back here next year, and even our mileage checks
25. will bounce.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. If there's no further discussion Senator Carroll may close
28. debate.

29. SENATOR CARROLL:

30. Senator Schaffer has a decent way, not a good way, of trying
31. to obfuscate, and you can look up the dictionary definition of
32. that, the true issues. Yes, this is an alternative, and we
33. have said that loud and clear throughout all the debate on this.

1. And, yes, the Governor was afraid of having the House review a
2. true better idea. But last night, the Department of Public
3. Aid said maybe it is a good idea, and they sent over a program
4. to me, obviously not to their side of the aisle, where they would
5. like to pick up this concept. Now, they say it'll save some
6. forty-eight, forty-six million dollars. Not the five they wrote
7. to you two days ago, or two weeks ago. But now the new figures
8. come out, because they realize where they're at. What you were
9. talking about Senator Totten, is existing law, they're claiming
10. that they should not pay for care they are giving, yet the law
11. today requires that payment in order for them to get reimbursement
12. from the Federal Government, they must meet that cost. And the
13. way they do it, is by two years later under existing law, coming
14. up with a reallocation of dollars. They pay what they came up
15. short in the initial instance and pay it back two years later,
16. but not under their four hundred dollar cap. Under their four
17. hundred dollar cap, when the cash register reaches that amount
18. they must cut off service, not be paid for it. And it's not
19. only a problem at Michael Reese, and at the Univeristy of
20. Chicago, and at County Hospital, it is also a problem at Saint
21. Mary's in East St. Louis, it is also a problem in Wood River,
22. it is also a problem at Saint John's here in Springfield, at
23. Saint Francis in Peoria, at Proctor in Peoria, at Saint Mary's
24. in Decatur, and on, and on, and on. Each one of those hospitals
25. would be forced to stop giving service to the severely ill under
26. the Governor's program, and what else is in that program, yes,
27. we are saying give prescription drugs, not in this bill, but yes,
28. it's our idea that if this passes there is sufficient money to
29. give canes and crutches to those who need it. To give prescription
30. drugs to those who need it. To not require a person who has
31. a broken arm to be hospitalized, as the Governor's plan will,
32. because there's no other way to treat them. So, you're going
33. to spend three, four hundred dollars putting them in a hospital
overnight, instead of spending thirty, or sixty dollars to treat

1. them in an emergency room. Those are the types of things that
2. were in the Governor's plan, that I might add, they're running
3. to back off of, but forgot to tell you. And in our proposal,
4. we are saying, cut about an average day's stay, which the hospitals
5. can and will do, and save the State enough money to keep us from
6. going bankrupt, but to provide the services the people need, to
7. not pull the plug on them, and to be realistic in our approach
8. to public aid. And I urge adoption of Amendment No. 1.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. Senator Carroll moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1
11. to House Bill 811. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye.
12. Those opposed. The Ayes have it. Was there a request for a
13. roll call? Those in favor will indicate by voting Aye. Those
14. opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who
15. wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take
16. the record. On that question, the Ayes are 26, the Nays are
17. 30, 1 Voting Present. Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 811,
18. having failed to receive a majority is declared lost. Senator
19. Carroll, for what purpose do you arise?

20. SENATOR CARROLL:

21. Seek to verify the negative.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. Senator Carroll has requested a verification of the
24. negative. Would all the Senators please be in their seats.
25. Will the Secretary, please call the negative roll.

26. SECRETARY:

27. The following voted in the negative:

33. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

1. Senator Carroll, do you question any of the Senators?
2. SENATOR CARROLL:
3. Senator Friedland.
4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
5. Senator Friedland is standing in the aisle.
6. SENATOR CARROLL:
7. Okay. Senator Philip.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
9. Senator Philip. Is Senator Philip...standing in the aisle.
10. SENATOR CARROLL:
11. Senator Walsh come back yet? Oh, okay. Senator Weaver is
12. back isn't he?
13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
14. Senator Weaver is in his seat.
15. SENATOR CARROLL:
16. How about Senator Becker.
17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
18. Senator Becker is in his seat.
19. SENATOR CARROLL:
20. Okay.
21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
22. On a verified roll call, the Ayes are 26, the Nays are 30,
23. 1 Voting Present. Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 811, having
24. failed to receive a majority vote is declared lost. Any further
25. amendments?
26. SECRETARY:
27. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Totten.
28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
29. Senator Totten.
- 30.
31. (END OF REEL)
- 32.
- 33.

1. SENATOR TOTTEN:

2. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of
3. the Senate. Amendment No.2 attempts to establish some
4. cost containment perimeters for the department. The...
5. material in Senate...in Senate Amendment No. 2 is similar
6. to Senate Bill 748 that passed out of this Body and was
7. defeated in committee. What it deals with is the lump
8. sum payment problem where there is nothing in the law
9. today that prevents a...recipient who may say, win the
10. lottery or something like that, from going out and
11. spending the money and still receiving aid. They would
12. have to use the lump sum to...allocate against public
13. aid...receipts. It establishes a copayment system, it
14. establishes a monthly reporting system that...the department
15. would like to do. The department estimates that there is
16. considerable cost savings by adopting this amendment and
17. it is similar to a bill that we did pass here by a rather
18. big margin and I would solicit your favorable vote.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Is there any discussion? If not...Senator Nash.

21. SENATOR NASH:

22. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
23. I rise in opposition to this amendment. This amendment
24. was contained in Senate Bill 748 that received the nice
25. hearing in the Committee on Public Health. It passed
26. the Senate...it was...couldn't get out of the committee,
27. the House committee across the...the Rotunda. Senator
28. Totten's amendment received...all the proper attention
29. on this side of the aisle and on their side of the aisle
30. in...in this House and I urge for the defeat because the
31. House isn't going to put on...pass it.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Hall.

34. SENATOR HALL:

1. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
2. Senate. Senator Totten...if the sponsor would yield for a
3. question, please.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. He indicates he will.

6. SENATOR HALL:

7. Senator Totten, I notice that you're...what did you
8. say about a public aid recipient could win...a lottery
9. and still remain on public aid, is that...is that what you...
10. is this the genesis of this, is this why you want to put
11. that in?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Senator...Senator Totten.

14. SENATOR TOTTEN:

15. Thank you, Mr. President. Present law says that any
16. lump sum payment, whether it be an inheritance, lottery
17. winning, no matter what it may be, there is no...there is...
18. there is no way that that, under present law is reported.
19. So that a person who may be receiving aid could receive
20. a lump sum payment in any form, no matter what it may be.
21. I used the lottery as an illustration...could go out and
22. dissipate the receipts from that lump sum payment, whether
23. it be a...a five thousand, fifty thousand or a hundred
24. thousand and still receive...public aid. That's not the
25. purpose of the public aid system, the public aid system
26. is to help those who are truly needy. If a person
27. receives money in this fashion, the money received would
28. be allocated in lieu of...the...normal receipts than if
29. that money was dissipated and a person was still on aid,
30. they would go back on aid.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. Senator Hall.

33. SENATOR HALL:

1. You know, it...never ceases to amaze me, around here,
2. how, that every time it looks like that there's going to
3. be some way that a...a person on public aid. You know, you...you
4. make it appear is that people on public aid should have dignity
5. like everyone else. I don't know where that impression seems
6. to expound around here, to use the term that a person on
7. public aid might win a lottery and not report it, withdraw
8. some aid, now that's pretty far fetched. I'd think for you
9. to get up and use that as an example, you, could happen to...
10. you, you might have illness, something may befall you and
11. you may end up on public aid. There's nothing...there's
12. great dignity, why should people be used in that manner.
13. I think it's wrong and I think you're wrong in attempting
14. to put an amendment on and using that as a term. This is
15. a bad amendment and it should be defeated.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. Senator Carroll.

18. SENATOR CARROLL:

19. I think there's another point in here that Senator
20. Totten may have alluded to. There was such commotion
21. around here, Senator Totten, that I couldn't quite hear.
22. This would provide for copayments as well, would it not?
23. What copayment amounts would it provide for? Are there
24. any limitations on what the department could ask for?
25. I mean they could ask for a hundred dollar copayment
26. under your bill, could they not?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Totten.

29. SENATOR TOTTEN:

30. Mr. President, the amendment on Page 5 or Page 3 of
31. the amendment provides that the Department of Public Aid
32. may establish rules and regulations providing for a sliding
33. scale copayment system as authorized by the U.S. Code.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Carroll.

3. SENATOR CARROLL:

4. So again, there's no limitation, there could be a
5. hundred dollars or anything else that the department wants
6. the recipient to pay as a copayment. And isn't this a
7. bill that failed in the House?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

9. Senator Totten.

10. SENATOR TOTTEN:

11. First...first of all, it has to be reasonable as
12. provided by the Federal Code, secondly the bill was defeated
13. in committee.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

15. Senator Newhouse.

16. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

17. Thank you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I think the
18. Senators...the theory of this...amendment is unassailable.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Would you break up that conference in front of
21. Senator Newhouse.

22. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

23. The theory of this amendment is unassailable, I wouldn't
24. want to assail the theory. I was off the Floor momentarily
25. when that last vote was taken on...Amendment Number, I believe
26. 9. Let me tell you what's happening. We're talking about
27. the health care system now, folks, we're talking about
28. the health care system. We're talking about the elderly
29. and we're talking about children. The amendment we just voted
30. down could result in a number of hospitals around this State
31. closing their outpatient departments, period, outpatient
32. departments which become the primary care source for many
33. of the elderly and children around this State. If those

1. sources aren't available to these persons, the sickness rate
2. is going to increase phenomenally. Right now, the State of
3. Illinois has the highest infant morbidity rate, the second
4. highest in this nation. Their incidents of illnesses among
5. young children is as high in this State as it is in many
6. of those Latin American countries that we send missionaries
7. to because of their health care problems, that's what happening.
8. Now, we've rejected a bill that...an amendment, rather, that
9. would have aided that health care problem, that would have
10. permitted the hospitals, at least to get over an adjustment
11. period while they change whatever serious problems that they
12. do have. They don't have that period now and it means that,
13. for example, right in my district, and I want you downstate
14. fellows to listen to this, I'm going to tell you what's going
15. to happen in my district. In my district, Michael Reese
16. Hospital is going to lose about twenty million dollars.
17. They are going to immediately lay off about seven hundred
18. people. They will probably be forced to close down their
19. outpatient department. The University of Chicago will lose
20. about fifteen million and will have to go through a similar
21. process. Now, why do I select those two institutions, for
22. two reasons. First for the terrible beating that they're
23. going to take and for the dollars that are involved. Now,
24. your smaller hospitals are going to suffer a loss in a
25. smaller amount, but it doesn't take much to dislocate one
26. of our smaller hospitals. For example, when Woodlawn Hospital
27. loses three hundred and fifty thousand dollars, their whole
28. balance sheet arrangement changes and they have to seriously
29. figure how they're going to keep their doors open and some
30. of your hospitals may be in exactly the same position. Now,
31. we get to the copayments. What we are talking about is,
32. people who right now, are buying dog food to

1. exist and who are looking in garbage cans, will have to, before
2. they can get health care services, come out of their pockets
3. with dollars that they don't have. Some elderly people, folks,
4. are going to die. Health care problems are going to reach a
5. pressure point, the emergency rooms of your hospitals are going
6. to become the primary care source at three times and four times
7. the cost in your outpatient departments. So be aware of what
8. you're doing, 'cause that's precisely what we've just done
9. with the rejection of this last amendment and if we adopt this
10. present amendment, it'll aggravate a very serious problem.
11. So I rise in opposition to this amendment and I should hope it's
12. defeated resoundingly and that the last amendment will
13. somehow surface again, so our health care system won't be
14. completely disrupted. Thank you.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

16. Is there further discussion? Senator Berning.

17. SENATOR BERNING:

18. Well, thank you, Mr. President. My question is to
19. the last speaker. Senator, maybe we are looking at different
20. printed material. Are you referring to the amendment to
21. House Bill 811, which requires the reporting of lump sum
22. income?

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Newhouse.

25. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

26. If my understanding is correct, and I...the sponsor...
27. answered this question, it does include copayments provisions.
28. And I'm talking about the copayment provision, Senator. The
29. sponsor is shaking his head, yes, it does include that.

30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

31. Senator Berning.

32. SENATOR BERNING:

33. Well, I...I'm impressed by much of what you say, Senator

1. Newhouse, but I...I've been a little bit at a loss to equate
2. what you say to the matter under consideration. Certainly
3. all of us, I hope, have compassion for those who are unable
4. to take care of themselves. Of course, Senator, I...I think
5. you will have to agree with me that a good many of our fellow
6. citizens, if they had a little bit of encouragement as well
7. as a little bit of forced self-reliance, they might be taking
8. a different attitude toward where their rights and responsibilities
9. end and your and my responsibilities to support them, begin.
10. Unfortunately, there are many interwoven factors, I really
11. don't know how we get at them, Senator, but infant mortality
12. undoubtedly is tied to young persons' heavy indulgence in
13. alcohol and drugs. We know that a teenager utilizing drugs
14. and alcohol, even to a moderate degree, are going to have
15. babies who are prone to health problems and perhaps even born
16. with a serious health deficiency. All the money in the City
17. of Chicago or the State of Illinois isn't going to prevent
18. that. And my question, I guess, to you is, how do you
19. and I attempt to protect the taxpayer's hard earned dollars
20. while attempting to provide some help, but not necessarily
21. providing all the help, for those people who have absolutely
22. no sense of responsibility as evidenced by their own actions.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Newhouse.

25. SENATOR NEWHOUSE:

26. Senator, first of all, I...I have to take issue with
27. the assumption that drug and alcohol abuse are the primary
28. reasons for the high morbidity rate. The...I...I don't know
29. if you have any evidence to show that that's true, I certainly
30. don't. A good deal of malnutrition takes place and some other
31. kinds of things. If...if you're asking where and how, what...
32. if...if you...if the question is, how do we fit this within
33. the fiscal situation, then I'd like to respond to that. Because
34. the amendment that we just refused to adopt would have done

1. precisely what we're suggesting. That by the limitation
2. on the hospital stays, the projection was that...that...a
3. substantial number of dollars would be saved. Those dollar
4. savings then would be used within the system to provide the
5. care that we're talking about. That's why I hooked the two
6. things together because they are related. Now, on the copayment
7. matter, sure everyone ought to...ought to...ought to show some
8. responsibility. But, Senator, when you start receiving
9. the Social Security check and the rent amounts to three-quarters
10. of what that check amounts to and you have to make some primary
11. choices as to whether you are going to eat or go to the doctor
12. or whether you can get transportation down to the doctor, those
13. are very difficult choices and I would suggest to you that those
14. people who are on Social Security, in most instances, have all...
15. have paid a great debt to society, they've used their productive
16. years as taxpayers and as producers. I think we owe them something
17. a little extra. I think that if we can...if...we're not going to
18. increase the Social Security, we're not going to have some other
19. benefits accrued to them, so the choices they have to make are
20. very serious ones, that's the point that I would make. I don't think
21. there are...or rather my suggestion is that the discretionary
22. funds simply don't exist and this is another source of having
23. to make some kinds of choices of people who are by virtue
24. of their age, ill, and they're going to get sicker.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

26. Senator Carroll, for the second time.

27. SENATOR CARROLL:

28. Yes, if everyone else has spoken first, let me just...
29. excuse me. The reason I rise a second time, Mr. President, is
30. that most of the initial discussion was on that provision
31. which dealt with lump sum payments. Now that we've gotten
32. into the real heart of the matter, as I think it is, the copayments,
33. let me just explain a moment...more what, in fact, the department

1. is asking us to do. Instead of, once again, well thinking
2. out a program, and I happen to be a believer in a form of
3. copayment, they did not do so. It's not appropriate for
4. us to say to a person on Social Security, who is diabetic,
5. it is not appropriate for us to say to a person who is
6. in cancer treatment therapy, chemotherapy or some other
7. form, that the department may charge you any amount it
8. desires for you to get that type of treatment. There
9. are areas of abuse, in my opinion, no question about it,
10. or a copayment plan where a person has to make those
11. hard choices with where they will spend their check, is
12. appropriate. But it is not appropriate to a person who
13. is diabetic, to a person who is on chemotherapy or any
14. of those others that are lumped into this one program,
15. no exceptions. No matter what your state is, for an
16. elderly person, living on a Social Security check with
17. medical assistance, to take from that income in order to,
18. each and every day, have a life sustaining treatment, you
19. are denying them that access. I don't want to vote for
20. that.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

22. If there's no further discussion, Senator Totten
23. may close debate.

24. SENATOR TOTEN:

25. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
26. ...the Senate. I guess it never ceases to amaze us when
27. we are looking at something that is really driving up the
28. costs of this State and why it is driving up. What this
29. amendment does, is very nominally get at some of those
30. matters which are driving up costs. It in no way, attempts
31. to eliminate aid to those who are truly needy and deserving.
32. In fact, it probably does more to insure that those payments
33. will continue in the future than any measure we've had before

1. us. For what it says, that in those specific cases, where
2. a recipient may have additional income brought to him through
3. some windfall in a...form of a lump sum payment that the
4. Department of Public Aid and the State taxpayers need not
5. keep them on public aid, that that is used. Isn't that
6. what the system is all about, to keep those who are truly
7. needy in...to have some means? All this does is provide
8. the department with a way to recover that. In the case of
9. copayments, all it does is deal with medical services, it
10. requires reasonable ability to pay before the department
11. can even go about implementing a copayment system, isn't
12. that what the system is all about? The system is not for
13. providing all things to all people at all times. This amend-
14. ment insures that those who are truly needy will receive
15. aid when they need it and those who may not need it, at
16. times do not get it. And I would solicit your favorable
17. support.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

19. The question is shall Amendment No. 2 be adopted.
20. Those in favor will indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed
21. Nay. The Nays have it, Amendment No. 2 is...there's been
22. a request for a roll call. Those in favor of adopting
23. Amendment No. 2 will vote Aye. Those opposed vote Nay.
24. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Would you
25. vote me No, Senator. Have all voted who wish? Have all
26. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the
27. Ayes are 29, the Nays are 29, none Voting Present. Amend-
28. ment No. 2 having failed to receive a majority is declared
29. lost. Senator Totten, for what purpose do you arise?

30. SENATOR TOTTEN:

31. I...verify the negative, please.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

33. Senator Totten has requested a verification. Will all
34. the Senators be in their seats and will the Secretary read the

1. negative vote.
2. SECRETARY:
3. The following voted in the negative: Berman, Bruce,
4. Buzbee, Carroll, Chew, Collins, D'Arco, Dawson, Degnan, Demuzio,
5. Donnewald, Egan, Gitz, Hall, Johns, Jeremiah Joyce, Jerome
6. Joyce, Marovitz, McLendon, Nash, Nedza, Nega, Netsch, Newhouse,
7. Sangmeister, Savickas, Taylor, Vadalabene, Mr. President.
8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
9. Is there any question of the negative vote? Hearing...
10. Senator Totten.
11. SENATOR TOTTEN:
12. Senator Buzbee.
13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
14. Is Senator Buzbee on the Floor? Senator Buzbee. Senator
15. Buzbee. Take his name from the roll.
16. SENATOR TOTTEN:
17. Senator Sangmeister.
18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
19. Senator Sangmeister is...right next to you, Senator.
20. SENATOR TOTTEN:
21. Senator D'Arco.
22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
23. Senator D'Arco is in his seat. Senator Egan is in his
24. seat.
25. SENATOR TOTTEN:
26. ...That's it.
27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
28. On a verification of the negative, there are 28 verified
29. votes. Senator Hall, for what purpose do you arise?
30. SENATOR HALL:
31. Verification of the affirmative vote.
32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)
33. There's been a request by Senator Hall for a verification

1. of the affirmative votes. Will all the Senators be in their
2. seats and will the Secretary read the affirmative votes.

3. SECRETARY:

4. The following voted in the affirmative: Becker, Berning,
5. Bloom, Bowers, Coffey, Davidson, DeAngelis, Etheredge, Friedland,
6. Geo-Karis, Grotberg...Keats, Kent...Lemke, Mahar, Maitland,
7. McMillan, Nimrod, Ozinga, Philip, Rhoads, Rupp, Schaffer, Simms,
8. Sommer, Thomas, Totten, Walsh and Weaver.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. Senator Hall.

11. SENATOR HALL:

12. Senator Rupp.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Is Senator Rupp...on the Podium.

15. SENATOR HALL:

16. Senator Simms.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

18. Senator Simms is in his seat. Are there further questions
19. of the affirmative?

20. SENATOR HALL:

21. Senator McMillan...oh, here he is back...oh, over here.
22. Okay.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator McMillan has moved over to the right side of
25. the aisle. On a verification, the Ayes are 29, the Nays are
26. 28, none Voting Present. Amendment No. 2 to House Bill
27. 811, having received the majority vote is declared adopted.
28. Any further amendments?

29. SECRETARY:

30. No further amendments.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

32. For what purpose does Senator Degnan arise?

33. SENATOR DEGNAN:

1. Thank you, Mr. President, having voted on the prevailing
2. side on Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 811, I move to reconsider
3. the vote.

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. Senator Degnan has moved...having voted on the prevailing
6. side, has moved to reconsider the vote by which Amendment No. 1
7. to House Bill 811 has been adopted...was lost. Those in favor
8. indicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. The Ayes have it, the
9. motion to reconsider is...before us. We have reconsidered
10. the vote...the Amendment No. 1 is presently before this Body,
11. this is Senator Carroll's amendment. On Amendment No. 1,
12. Senator Carroll. For what purpose does Senator Totten arise?

13. SENATOR TOTTON:

14. Question of the Chair, Mr...President. The...a board
15. carried the prior amendment as Amendment No. 1.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

17. According to our electronic marvel, the board carried
18. Amendment No. 2. Senator Totten.

19. SENATOR TOTTON:

20. Mr. President, I assume that Senator Carroll is now
21. going to try and move to adopt his amendment. I would question
22. the Chair as to the...whether his amendment is in order now
23. that we have adopted Amendment No. 2.

24. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

25. Senator, can you tell me on what grounds you would base
26. ...an amendment being out of order? Amendment is always in
27. order..whether it's...whether it keeps the bill in its proper
28. form is another question.

29. SENATOR TOTTON:

30. Yes, the question I have is...because we have now
31. adopted Amendment No. 2, Amendment No. 1 as drafted, I
32. believe is, cannot be put on because it would be technically
33. ...incorrect, you could not amend it because of Amendment No. 2.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Yes, Senator...the Chair will rule that this amendment
3. is in order. If you will read the amendment, it says that
4. by deleting lines 1 and 2, and inserting in lieu thereof, the
5. following and it strikes the enacting clause so what it
6. will do is effectively eliminate Amendment No. 2, which
7. is the bill at this point. So, Amendment No. 1, Senator
8. Carroll's Amendment is in order and it's germane to the
9. bill. On...on the amendment, Senator Carroll.

10. SENATOR CARROLL:

11. Can we have a little order, Mr. President.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. Can we have some attention and some order here. Senators,
14. would you break up your conferences on the Floor. Senator
15. Rhoads, Senator Joyce, Senator Lemke. Senator Carroll.

16. SENATOR CARROLL:

17. Thank you, Mr. President. On Amendment No. 1, I do
18. believe the membership should be fully informed of how
19. they are voting. The amendment itself, and I...I honestly
20. don't believe that some of the membership understand the
21. entire concept. The amendment itself says, as a way of
22. containing costs, let us create a system. If other states
23. have done and other states have saved proportionately,
24. exactly what the original department figures showed us,
25. before they knew where we were coming from, Illinois could
26. save by what is an overutilization of the system. Amendment
27. No. 1 says that the State will create a review of the
28. utilization in the hospitals committees' decisions. That
29. they will review all decisions over fifteen days. That
30. all decisions over fifteen days will have to be subject
31. to an intense scrutiny, but not to automatically throw
32. people out. Neonatal problems, chemotherapy type problems,
33. gunshot wound type problems, those obviously have to stay

1. in a hospital setting for fifteen days and longer. But
2. we have also said, in order to avoid a...and a...and a
3. potential abuse below fifteen days, that this review can
4. also look at all stays, those less as well, to make sure
5. that a normal three day stay doesn't become five to make
6. up the money. This will produce, according to the
7. Department of Public Aid's original figures, before they
8. figured out where we were coming from and I tend to
9. trust those, a hundred and sixty-four million State
10. dollars. I trust those because we also cross checked
11. that with the other states...because we also cross
12. checked those with the other states that are using
13. this type of peer review and producing the exact
14. same percentage of savings that the hundred and sixty-
15. four million would equate to. Yes, we call this an
16. alternative, a more sensible, sane, alternative to
17. what the Governor has proposed. Yes, we passed this
18. bill and, yes, the Governor kept the House from considering
19. it because he was afraid they would pass it also because
20. what is it an alternative to. Now we provide for some
21. chiropractic treatment, that would not be allowed under
22. his program and an orthopedic surgeon would probably
23. be the alternative at probably four or five times the
24. cost. Yes, we provide for pharmaceutical drugs, in
25. an outpatient basis in our program as opposed to hospitalization
26. at three, four, six and seven hundred dollars a day in order
27. to get that same type of medication. Yes, we will hope to
28. provide, for...for podiatry, for optometry, for other types
29. of less expensive service and not require hospitalization
30. and yes, we provide for emergency rooms, which is not within
31. the Governor's program. These are less expensive alternatives,
32. if you're a thinking person...to what the Governor is proposing
33. because he is mandating that if a person has a broken arm,

1. they be hospitalized overnight in order to have that compensated
2. and not have to pay out of their pocket, which they cannot
3. afford to do. Yes, it is that alternative and much more important,
4. in my opinion, it is not pulling the plug. And I say that again,
5. the Governor's program was based on 1979 costs, at which four
6. hundred dollars a day in a neonatal care situation may have
7. worked, these are the kids born with birth defects, where
8. the cost of treating them is running over four hundred
9. dollars a day here at St. John's as well as Michael Reese
10. and Children's Memorial and County Hospital. It is running
11. as high as seven hundred and fifty-two dollars a day and
12. he's saying no, treat them till one o'clock in the afternoon
13. and pull the plug, there will be no more money. And where does
14. that hold true, there's no adjustments in later years, like
15. there is now to make up those cost differences, four hundred
16. is it. And according to the Department of Public Aid, the
17. costs have risen even under four hundred figure to at least
18. five twenty today. And yet he is saying, we will only pay
19. four hundred, then either pull the plug or find a property
20. tax increase at home to pay for those services. I think
21. that's again a way of being either inhumane or sticking
22. it to the taxpayer at home in his property taxes. In either
23. case, this General Assembly should go on record, that we
24. are willing to pay the cost, if we can contain some of it
25. for actually treating people for taking care of those with
26. renal dialysis, for taking care of those children born with birth
27. defects, for taking care of gunshot wound cases and not
28. saying when the cash register hits four hundred, let the
29. guy die. That's what's in the Governor's proposal and this
30. is, yes, a reasonable and realistic alternative that has
31. worked, has worked in this country and can work here in
32. Illinois to save substantial dollars and do so in a realistic
33. way and I urge support.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Schaffer.

3. SENATOR SCHAFFER:

4. Well, we are getting into discussing the issue. As
5. I understand the figures that were given to Senator Carroll,
6. and the figures he is now quoting, I...I really have to point
7. out that I think we're talking about comparing apples and
8. watermelons and bananas. As I understand it, the department's figures
9. are based on a fifteen day...the original figures, I think
10. they just say, what happens if we got everybody out of the
11. hospital within fifteen days and the department gave them
12. a range. And now, we have a proposal and the department has
13. taken a look at the proposal and said, basically, hey, we're
14. already doing that, we aren't...letting people stay in
15. hospitals longer than they're supposed to, we're not letting
16. people stay in hospitals that should be in nursing homes.
17. And they're, you know, I think in honesty they admit that
18. perhaps if they tighten the wheel down much harder than
19. they have up to this point and probably much harder than
20. you and I would have tolerated up to this point because
21. up until now, I don't think the wolf was at the door. Maybe
22. they can save ten million dollars if they really spin the
23. wheel down with this proposal. They don't save a hundred
24. and sixty-four million. I really don't have any objection
25. to the idea of tightening down overutilization or improper
26. utilization of hospitals, but I think the department already
27. through their rules and regs has enough authority to do
28. that job in spades. The fallacy of the bill and the fallacy
29. of the argument is, that this is a cure-all for our financial
30. problems in the Public Aid budget and it is not. What
31. the Governor is saying with his alternative and, by the way,
32. I have to say, Senator Carroll, I think your thought that
33. the Governor has absolute control over the House of Representatives

1. is one that I do not concur in, I just don't think he
2. quite has that much influence there. But what the Governor's
3. proposal is saying is four hundred dollar a day ceiling for...for
4. regular care. In other words, what he is saying is, we can't
5. afford to send you to the Cadillac hospitals anymore, you'll
6. have to go to the Chevy hospitals along with all the rest of
7. the people. Now, I understand that impacts on some hospitals
8. and I also understand where those hospitals are, and I under-
9. stand that most of them are teaching hospitals and that's
10. why their costs are so high. And maybe...maybe there should
11. be some other way that those hospitals should be subsidized
12. other than through public aid because of their teaching costs.
13. And I understand that Cook County Hospital has some unbelievable
14. costs compared to other hospitals and maybe something ought to
15. be done about that. I think if it were up to the Legislature
16. there probably would be. But the simple fact is, and I guess
17. we're all going to do what we want to do here, but please
18. don't anybody think that this is really going to save a hundred
19. and sixty-four million and that that somehow gets you off the
20. hook for voting for the other cuts that are going to be
21. proposed as we move through the budget process. 'Cause the
22. bottom line doesn't matter, if you take twenty million dollars
23. away from a hospital with this proposal or that proposal, the
24. bottom line is in February if those checks don't go to the hospital
25. in total or if those checks get there and they bounce, everything
26. else really just is insignificant. What we're talking about is
27. balancing the State budget. I think the Governor's plan, with
28. modifications, certainly I don't expect anyone to accept it,
29. carte blanche, will put us in a posture where next year, when
30. all of us are running around our districts, campaigning in
31. the primary, that we won't have to be explaining why all the
32. newspapers are saying that the State is bankrupt and that the
33. hospitals in our districts aren't getting paid a nickel. We

1. have some hard decisions to make. I have to conclude that this
2. is a smoke screen to keep us from making those hard decisions
3. and to keep us from making the cuts, which we have to make, unless
4. we are willing to increase taxes and I haven't seen much enthusiasm
5. for that. I think the amendment ought to be defeated, I think
6. we ought to move forward with a real cost containment program
7. and...I think we all ought to be interested in the State being
8. solvent.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

10. Senators, I'd like to bring...your attention, that we are
11. using the timer, the debate has been extremely long on each
12. issue here and also that the Channel 3 News requests permission
13. to film. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Newhouse.
14. Senator Grotberg.

15. SENATOR GROTBORG:

16. Well, thank you, Mr. President. I rise to offer the
17. middle ground in hoping to...encourage everyone again to turn
18. down Senator Carroll's amendment. Now, I understand, Senator
19. Carroll, that you are deeply in love with this amendment and
20. you're emotionally involved in it. I think the director was
21. emotionally involved in his four hundred dollar a day cap.
22. But last week after our hearing in...in the Appropriations
23. Committee, I urged the director to go back and find middle
24. ground. And he found some middle ground and yesterday I got
25. it and I'm sorry, Senator Carroll, it was just last night
26. that I was able to present it to you, but it truly gets at
27. the problem, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Mr. President,
28. hospitals are people, hospital boards make decisions and doctors
29. make decisions, we need another layer deciding on midnight, June
30. the 23rd whether I'm going to go into my sixteenth day. I don't
31. need a State bureaucracy to okay the next day in case...my fever
32. rises just before my discharge. Those kinds of things are past
33. ...preaching, they're meddling. Hospitals do have that innate

1. ability to run themselves. The new middle ground then, Ladies
2. and Gentlemen of the Senate, and I will be offering this amend-
3. ment on everything I can find to see how the people feel about
4. it, simply says that...hospital by hospital, we will take the
5. average length of stay of the last year and ask them to drop
6. it one day in...in the year...FY '82. Thereby allowing them
7. to make the decision on cost containment as we have charged
8. them to do by so many Statutes. This would, in fact, in
9. Illinois, in FY '80, for instance, of two hundred and...two
10. million, three hundred and eighty-five thousand hospital
11. days for an average length of 8.3. We would give any given
12. hospital...

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

14. Senator, would you bring your remarks to a conclusion.

15. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

16. ...one at a time. I will try, but I have heard a
17. lot of gas on this subject and...if you'll allow me to finish,
18. it'll just take another minute. This is the most sensible
19. approach that I have seen or I would not be sponsoring it.
20. Hospitals have saved my life time after time and I intend
21. to make sure that they save other lives, at their discretion,
22. not at the discretion of the Legislature or the Department of
23. Public Aid. They can charge all they want to, Senator Carroll,
24. but at the end of the year and by quarterly evaluation, must
25. show progress toward reducing the average length of stay of
26. public aid patients in their hospital by one day and it would
27. net forty-three million dollars in savings or twelve percent
28. of three hundred and fifty-five million. And I submit for those
29. reasons, and...those alone, let's keep the vehicle alive, but
30. turn down Senator Carroll's amendment because the dichotomy
31. can go on forever, we still need middle ground and we have
32. found it. I'll be glad to take suggestions on this one, Senator
33. Carroll.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

2. Senator Bowers.

3. SENATOR BOWERS:

4. A parliamentary inquiry. We're on now, Amendment No. 1,
5. is that correct? And Amendment No. 2 has been adopted?

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. Yes.

8. SENATOR BOWERS:

9. What will be the status of the bill if we...if the vote
10. is to reconsider and Amendment No. 1 is adopted? What's the
11. status of Amendment No. 2 at that point?

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. At that point, I would...imagine that Engrossing...Enrolling
14. and Engrossing would determine if there's any conflict in it
15. and where it's at. I...Amendment No. 2 has been adopted, Amend-
16. ment No. 1 now is...being reconsidered. It will...if it is
17. adopted, it will go on after Amendment No. 2. Senator Bowers.

18. SENATOR BOWERS:

19. Then I have an inquiry, I suppose either of the Chair
20. or Senator Carroll. Is there language, and I understood that
21. there may be, language in Amendment No. 1 that will, in effect,
22. repeal Amendment No. 2 and if it goes on later...I...I'm just
23. curious as to what happens. And then, I would like to know,
24. whether or not, assuming that I'm correct that if Amendment
25. No. 2 does drop off, can Amendment No. 2 then be reoffered
26. by...by Senator Totten. I...I think we ought to know the
27. status of the bill if this amendment goes on, that's all.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

29. There is nothing in the bill, I...that repeals Amendment
30. No. 2, nothing in Amendment No. 1. We will not know the status
31. of both amendments till Enrolling and Engrossing...get a look
32. at it and work it out.

33. SENATOR BOWERS:

34. All right, then...then assuming Amendment No. 1 goes

1. on, the message to the House will read that we have adopted
2. Amendment No. 1 and Amendment No. 2, assuming the bill passes,
3. is that correct?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

5. It will be...the message will read that we adopted Amendment
6. No. 2, we reconsidered Amendment No. 1 and Amendment No. 1 may
7. be adopted...

8. SENATOR BOWERS:

9. Well...will...will the message say that Amendment No. 2
10. is adopted? That's the only question I have.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

12. Yes. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator...
13. Senator Buzbee.

14. SENATOR BUZBEE:

15. In...in a short retort to Senator Grotberg. As you very
16. well know, Senator, I don't know where you got to, the plan that
17. you just described, we have been talking about with Doctor
18. Mandeville, in fact, we have a meeting tomorrow morning in
19. his office to do that in conjunction with the Carroll approach,
20. it will be a dual savings. So I don't see why you're opposed to
21. his...to his approach because we have been talking about your
22. plan along with the Carroll approach as a compromise, we have
23. a meeting with Doctor Mandeville again tomorrow morning to
24. discuss that one more time. So I think you ought to vote for
25. this and we can vote for yours later.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

27. Senator Carroll may close debate.

28. SENATOR CARROLL:

29. Thank you, Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the
30. Senate. Let me just say, also to Senator Grotberg et'all, this
31. is the year..what you discussed is the plan I offered to Doctor
32. Bob at our meeting last week that the four appropriations
33. people had with him, as what the effect of my amendment, would,

1. in fact, do. In language that even strengthens that effect
2. is even all the more better and I think we should look at that
3. very closely 'cause I said to you that the total effect of
4. this should take us from 8.3 days to somewhere around 7 days
5. and that would save substantial dollars and that's what I'm
6. in favor of, if you'll recall, that's what I offered. And
7. merely in...in response to Senator Schaffer, we're not talking
8. about Cadillac's, you're not even giving them crutches so that
9. they can walk home. I would ask for adoption of Amendment No. 1.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Senator Carroll moves the adoption of Amendment No. 1
12. to House Bill 811. Those in favor indicate by saying Aye. Those
13. opposed. The Ayes have it. A roll call has been requested.
14. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay.
15. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted
16. who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that
17. question the Ayes are 30, the Nays are 28, none Voting Present.
18. Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 811, having received the majority
19. is declared adopted. Any further amendments?

20. SECRETARY:

21. No further amendments.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

23. 3rd reading. Channel 17 has requested permission to
24. film. Is leave granted? Leave is granted. Senator Rupp and
25. Senator Davidson have some special guests here that they'd
26. like to introduce to you. So if we can have your attention
27. for a few minutes. Senator Davidson.

28. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

29. Mr. President and members of the Senate. It is my pleasure
30. to present to you the lady who is Miss Congeniality for Illinois,
31. but more importantly Miss Congeniality for the National Miss
32. Teenager DeDe Butts from Springfield, Illinois. Many of you
33. know her as the daughter of Gaylord Hall, the Deputy Director
34. of Labor. DeDe.

1. DE DE HALL:

2. (Remarks given by DeDe Hall)

3. SENATOR DAVIDSON:

4. DeDe, on behalf of myself and all the members of the
5. Senate, Senate Resolution 242, I'd like to present to you
6. on behalf of the Senate congratulating you on both your
7. title as Miss Illinois Congeniality as well as Miss National
8. Congeniality.

9. SENATOR RUPP:

10. Thank you, Mr. President. I have a young lady, a Sherry
11. Smith and you'll never guess where she's from, Decatur, Illinois.
12. We are real proud of Sherry, she has been selected as Miss
13. Illinois National Teenager, 1981. Sherry graduated from Eisen-
14. hower High School and all she had was an A average and she
15. ranked twelfth in her class of two hundred and seventy-seven.
16. Usually I see Sherry every Sunday, that's in church, and I
17. think this is another aspect of this young lady that you should
18. appreciate, I know I do. She is in church every Sunday, she's
19. in the choir and actually my wife and I, you know, we just
20. had two boys. But if we had had a girl and she turned out
21. like Sherry, we would be real proud parents. Sherry. I...I
22. do that in...every Sunday in church too, so it makes it all right.

23. SHERRY SMITH:

24. (Remarks given by Sherry Smith)

25. SENATOR RUPP:

26. Good luck Sherry. Thank you, Mr. President.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

28. Senator Rock.

29. SENATOR ROCK:

30. Thank you, Mr. President. While we're...momentary
31. lull here, I just want to refresh the recollection of the member-
32. ship, you have until noon to file any protests or...or...removal
33. petition from the Agreed Bill List. I've spoken with Senator

1. Weaver and it seems a better course of action, rather than
2. break up the flow and read the Agreed Bills at noon, we
3. will do that as the last order at about two-thirty. But
4. you have until noon to file whatever you wish to file with
5. respect to that list.

6. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

7. House Bill 813, Senator...Senator Nash, for what
8. purpose do you arise?

9. SENATOR NASH:

10. Mr. President, Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate.
11. While we have a lull, for purposes of an announcement.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

13. No, Senator, we're not at that order at this point.
14. Senator Berman, 813, read the bill, Mr. Secretary.

15. SECRETARY:

16. House Bill 813.

17. (Secretary reads title of bill)

18. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

20. Any amendments from the Floor?

21. SECRETARY:

22. Amendment No. 1 by Senator Berman.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

24. Senator Berman.

25. SENATOR BERMAN:

26. Thank you, Mr. President. This amendment was discussed
27. in committee. What it does is to change the process for eligibility
28. for persons over age sixty-five. This amendment requires an
29. election within four months after the date of entry of the

25. vail in the high school districts and the elementary districts.
26. The bill, as it was approved by committee, does not have a
27. front door referendum. Some of the tax rates would...increases
28. that would be approved by the board would require a backdoor
29. referendum. Senator Maitland's amendment would impose a front
30. door amendment...a front door referendum for the increase of
31. any of these rates. I would suggest to you and I ask that
32. you defeat Amendment No. 2, because the adoption of this amend-
33. ment negates the bill. The school districts could, at the

1. present time, increase their rates...with referendum. So,
2. that the amendment really doesn't add anything that the
3. present law doesn't already provide. I would suggest to
4. you in order to address this question the way it should
5. be in the proper legislative...perspective that Amendment 2
6. be defeated and you debate on 3rd reading whether you want
7. to allow the local school boards to increase their tax rates.
8. The...adoption of this amendment would, in effect, kill the
9. bill. The...this amendment was adopted two weeks ago in
10. committee and last week at our meeting it was taken off
11. because it, in effect, nullifies the bill. As sponsor of the
12. bill, I would suggest that the merits of this...amendment
13. will, in fact, be debated on 3rd reading. I ask that it
14. be defeated.

24. says that the school districts can raise their rates without

26. money situations. Isn't that so?

32. It's Senator Maitland's amendment.

7. proposed amendment, Senator Maitland, if I understand it

10. increases and...and in order to correct the present bill,
11. which, obviously, does not give the right to the people to
12. decide on these increases, not even with a backdoor referendum,
13. and the real important issue of great money...expenditures.

26. a good education budget, I can tell you the people in my
27. district would be very incensed if they had a bill that did
28. not give them a right to act as to how much is to be spent
29. and, therefore, I speak in favor of the amendment.

33. ...Senator Geo-Karis,...Senator Geo-Karis, I don't think,

1. and I apologize for rising a second time,...the question that

25. and...Fire Prevention and Safety.

27. Senator Geo-Karis.

28. SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

29. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the...of the
30. Senate. I still speak in favor of Mr....Senator Maitland's
31. amendment.

32. PRESIDENT:

33. Alright. Any further discussion? Senator Maitland, do

1. you wish to close?

2. SENATOR MAITLAND:

3. Yes, Sir. Thank you, Mr. President. First of all,
4. this amendment...the front door referendum does not totally
5. ...totally abolish all of the provisos in the bill. For
6. example,...with the...legislation with the amendment on or
7. off...transportation...can go to forty cents anyway. So,...
8. so, it doesn't totally negate the whole intent of the bill.

13. SENATOR NETSCH:

14. Thank you, Mr. President. I hope everyone is listening
15. to...what Senator Totten is on the verge of doing again. The...
16. it is true that this Body did pass the indexing bill, but I
17. think, and if I'm not mistaken, it was primarily your own
18. party that did it to you in the House, Senator Totten. I
19. believe that the indexing bill is effectively dead over there.
20. I...opposed it when it was here and I oppose it again and it
21. seems to me that if...if we needed any more reason...what's
22. happened to the budget and a number of other matters just in
23. the few weeks since this bill left the Senate...is cause
24. enough to continue to oppose it. But let me make two main
25. arguments...in opposition. One, is that, while I don't
26. have my notes here, my recollection is that this bill is going
27. to cost us thirty-nine to some...about thirty to thirty-nine
28. million dollars in revenue in Fiscal Year '82. That is more
29. than we can absorb at this stage of the game. Secondly, on
30. the merits, while indexing is on...is superficially a very
31. attractive idea, it has been pointed out time and again by
32. those who study the impact of...fiscal matters that it is
33. most important where you have a graduated...

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Netsch, if you would...Senator Netsch...if...if
3. we could have some order. Senator...if we can clear off all
4. these conferences...if we can take some of our conferences
5. off the Floor, if...the Sergeant-at-Arms would clear some of
6. these aisles we'll get down to the business of the Senate.
7. Senator Netsch.

8. SENATOR NETSCH:

9. Thank you. If I may go back to that point. It has been
10. pointed out time and again by those who are generally sympathetic
11. with the concept of indexing that where it is most important
12. is where you have graduated, and particularly steeply graduated,
13. tax rates. At the Federal level economically...and fiscally
14. from both the...from the taxpayers' point of view it makes
15. a great deal of sense. Whether or not it can be afforded is
16. something else again. But at...in the State of Illinois where
17. we have a flat rate income tax to begin with, it is not nearly
18. as defensible, even on philosophical grounds. When you add
19. to that the fact that it will cost us revenue which we can
20. ill afford in Fiscal Year '82, it seems to me that it is an
21. idea whose time ought not yet to have come.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Further discussion? Senator DeAngelis.

24. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

25. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. A
26. question of the sponsor.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Indicates he will yield. Senator DeAngelis.

29. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

30. Senator Totten, don't you have possibly another place to
31. take your amendment and put it onto?

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Would you repeat your question, Senator DeAngelis? If we can...

1. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

2. Yes. Senator Totten, is there anyplace else you could
3. possibly put your amendment on?

4. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

5. Senator Totten.

6. SENATOR TOTTEN:

7. Well, if there...if there is and...I...I can't find it
8. right now. But this seemed to be the...most...available bill
9. to put it on and one that is going to provide new revenue
10. and makes more sense to put it on than any other one.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. Senator DeAngelis.

13. SENATOR DEANGELIS:

14. Well, Senator Totten, you are a strong advocate of supply-
15. side economics. You are jeopardizing a supply-side concept
16. that, I think, is acceptable to the General Assembly and
17. putting on an amendment that might, in fact, kill the bill.
18. I would urge you to think a little bit about that because the...
19. the legislation itself is extremely good for keeping economic
20. resources and monies in the State of Illinois and you're going
21. to jeopardize it by your amendment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Further discussion? Senator Carroll.

24. SENATOR CARROLL:

25. Yes, I think just to show that sometimes we attempt to be
26. fair, in fact, all the times we attempt to be legitimate, we
27. are concerned with the revenues and spending side of State
28. Government and I believe the Governor and Doctor Bob have
29. convinced us that we just can't afford indexing this time.
30. He obviously convinced the House Revenue Committee of that
31. and I do believe that the impact of indexing this year because
32. of the recession and what that does to our tax income,, how
33. we are some nine to ten months behind the effects of that, I

1. think would be very devastating to the health of the economy
2. ...the fiscal condition of the State of Illinois and do great
3. disservice to our bond ratings and everything else and I
4. think it would be a very poor idea right now.

5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. Further discussion? Senator Rock.

7. SENATOR ROCK:

8. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
9. Senate. I, too, rise in opposition to Amendment No. 2. As
10. was pointed out...when I opposed the original bill, the cost
11. to the State is roughly forty million dollars, which would
12. average out to two dollars or less per taxpayer. The State
13. simply cannot afford this kind of relief at this time and
14. I sincerely object to the attempt to put an amendment on
15. this bill. This bill concerns itself with international
16. banking facilities. It will be a great boon to the city that
17. I represent in terms of the financial community. It will,
18. after the next fiscal year, probably result in increased revenue
19. to the State of Illinois and will make Chicago second to
20. no one. The State of New York has already passed a bill
21. similar to House Bill 1435. We had better get our act to-
22. gether and...and make Chicago the kind of financial community
23. that we can be proud of. I urge the defeat...summary defeat
24. of Amendment No. 2.

1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. Thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I
3. rise in support of the amendment. Point out to you fellow
4. Senators, that we are constantly being confronted with plausible
5. arguments to increase tax spending for one laudable purpose or
6. another, yes, even including additional pension benefits, but
7. we seldom keep in mind the little taxpayer back home. It might
8. only be two dollars, Mr. President, but two dollars is a lot of
9. money when you have to dig deeper to find it. Mr. President,
10. and members of the Senate, I think we ought to again enact this
11. amendment so as to show the folks back home that we are sympathetic
12. with their plight.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

14. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Totten
15. may close.

16. SENATOR TOTTEN:

17. Well, thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of
18. the Senate. It makes...it's apparently...I think to put this
19. amendment on this bill makes more sense, maybe than what we did
20. in the first place. House Bill 1435 is going to raise additional
21. revenues. If we allow the State to keep spending those revenues
22. in all the fashions that we have, we're going to have the constant
23. cost pushes on our budget. The tax indexing amendment, as
24. related to House Bill 1435, which is going to produce revenues,
25. will produce an area to disburse those revenues back to the tax-
26. payers through the form of tax indexing. I think this Body time
27. and time again, I know the House has, has agreed that tax indexing
28. is an eminently fair way to correct an unjust tax. And so, it
29. would appear that the wisest place to do this...this tax indexing
30. proposal, is to do it on a proposal that's going to raise revenue.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. Senator Carroll, you have an amendment to 143, driving under
13. the influence.

14. SENATOR CARROLL:

15. Is this the...the per se. You want to hold this, or...

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Senator Chew.

18. SENATOR CHEW:

19. No, Senator, I know you talked to me about the amendment,
20. you gave it to me in committee, and I asked that no amendment be
21. accepted on the bill. I am...I was not aware that you were going
22. to pursue this on the Floor.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Senator Carroll.

25. SENATOR CARROLL:

26. Senator Chew, no, I think you will recall that we admitted in
27. the committee that there was a mistake in the amendment, and it
28. dealt with two parts. But then I talked to you about this amend-
29. ment for the Floor which just deals with the per se portion, not
30. with the two tests. And then you said it would be..that you, in fact,
31. agreed with us, and that we would be offering this on the Floor.
32. If...if you...if you...if the bill is on 2nd I'll proceed to
33. explain the amendment. I don't think you had any problem with it.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Chew.

3. SENATOR CHEW:

4. Senator, I would have a problem with any amendment at this
5. stage, because the Secretary of State does not want the bill amended,
6. at all. The per se law, I subsequently found, that even the fifty-
7. five mile an hour law, we abide by here, is also a per se law.
8. And if you'd be kind enough not to pursue this amendment, I'd
9. certainly appreciate it, and if you pursue it, and I certainly
10. don't want to resist you, or your efforts because we work too
11. closely together. But I would have to resist the amendment. If
12. you would withdraw it, I'd certainly appreciate it.

13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

14. Senator Carroll.

15. SENATOR CARROLL:

16. No, Senator Chew, and if we are at odds, we are at odds, what-
17. ever happens, happens. The Secretary of State, I'm sure, mis-
18. informed you, or misinterpreted, there is a substantial difference,
19. and that's why we suggested this in committee, and why I'm pur-
20. suing it on the Floor. Let me explain the difference. The way
21. this bill was drafted, were a piece of equipment, a piece of
22. technical equipment, faulty or not, and even these can be faulty,
23. were it to produce a number, that is a conclusive presumption,
24. a conclusive presumption that can never be challenged. And that
25. is a substantial change from existing law, and I think improper.
26. There is no piece of scientific equipment that is that accurate
27. all the time. And in the fifty-five speed limit or any other
28. law, there is appropriately a presumption, but it is not conclu-
29. sive. If a radar machine says that you are going over the posted
30. speed limit, you have the right, and the courts have recognized
31. that, to challenge the accuracy of the equipment. And on occasion
32. when the equipment is even admitted faulty, then you are pre-
33. sumed not to have speeded...to have sped, if, in fact, the equipment
was faulty. That presumption, when a policeman gives you a

1. ticket for going over the speed limit, that is not a presumption
2. of guilt. The policeman testifies based on the equipment, what
3. the equipment said, and it's up to the trier of the facts to be-
4. lieve the equipment or to believe the testimony and that you
5. can challenge the equipment. The way this is now drafted, how-
6. ever, says, no, once that machine has produced a reading, that's
7. the end of the case, you can never challenge the reading, you
8. can never challenge the operator, you can never challenge
9. the machine. We didn't realize that in the other bill, because
10. there's a second section that repeats some stuff, but at the very
11. beginning of the bill, they create, in the very first section they
12. refer to, the crime of having blown that number on a machine.
13. And that makes it a conclusive presumption, we do...we do not do
14. that in death penalty cases, in Class X cases, but here they're
15. offering it for the first time in Illinois law as a conclusive
16. presumption, not challengeable in these cases. I think that's
17. the wrong way to go, I think we should have very strict penalties,
18. I think we should have very severe enforcement. But there should
19. always be the right to take a piece of scientific evidence and
20. say it's faulty, and this amendment would allow for that...type
21. of challenge.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Further discussion? Senator Coffey.

24. SENATOR COFFEY:

25. Mr. President, and members of the Senate. I think this
26. amendment actually guts the bill, and makes the bill a nothing
27. bill. And I would ask the Republican side of the aisle to
28. oppose this amendment, and leave the bill in its present form,
29. in a way that it will do the job, and...and take care of the
30. DWI's like we intended for it to. And I'd ask for a No vote on
31. this amendment.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. Further discussion? Senator Rock.

1. SENATOR ROCK:

2. Thank you, Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
3. Senate. I rise in support of the amendment, and I would point
4. out to the members on this Chamber on either side of the aisle,
5. that, I think, Senator Coffey has misrepresented what the
6. fact is. What it says in Section 11-501 at page 13, it says
7. driving while under the influence of alcohol, other drug or
8. a combination thereof, and that's the heading of the section.
9. The part that Senator Carroll is trying to delete would est-
10. ablish conclusively, that the...if the alcohol concentration
11. in such person's blood or breath is 0.10, or more, based on
12. the definition of blood and breath units in Section 11-501
13. that what...it's a substantial change in the current law. Right
14. now there is a rebuttable presumption, and you are, as...in a...
15. as a matter of fact innocent until proved guilty even if you
16. blow the machine, but you have to overcome that presumption.
17. Now, there are approximately eleven hundred Breathalyzer tests
18. a month in the County of Cook, and to establish this as a
19. conclusive presumption with no chance, I'm surprised the American
20. Civil Liberties Union and Senator Netsch, and her friends aren't
21. crying out for justice. This establishes conclusively that, if
22. in fact, you blow the machine, as you are required to do under
23. this bill, and it pops at .10 and over, you're...you're dead
24. in the water, you have no defense. And I have seen in my limited
25. experience as the chief prosecutor in the Chicago Traffic Court
26. on behalf of the State's Attorney of Cook County, I have seen
27. instances where either the machine didn't register correctly
28. or there was, in fact, a very heavy reading on the Breathalyzer
29. for some other...whether medical or chemical reason. This says
30. you're presumed, you're conclusively presumed guilty. And I don't
31. think even the Secretary of State, as much as this means to him,
32. wanted to do that. I object, frankly, to the fact that these
33. bills were not put in the Judiciary Committee and given the scrutiny

1. of those who understand the legal technicalities. But this
2. is much, much more than a legal technicality, this says you
3. have to blow the machine, if it comes up .10 or over, you are
4. concluded to be guilty. And I think we ought to reject that.
5. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

6. Further discussion? Senator Bowers.

7. SENATOR BOWERS:

8. Excuse me, Mr. President. Senator Chew, would you have any
9. objection to holding this for ten minutes. Our side of the aisle
10. seems to have some disagreement as to whether or not this is a
11. conclusive presumption. Quite frankly, if it is a conclusive
12. presumption, I totally agree with Senator Carroll. I don't
13. think we ought to write that into the law. We have some staff
14. that indicates that they don't really see that it is a conclusive
15. presumption, and frankly, we're not quite sure on this side of
16. the aisle. And if you wouldn't mind holding it for ten minutes,
17. I'm sure the Chair would give you leave to get back to it.
18. That's my request.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Senator Chew.

21. SENATOR CHEW:

22. Senator, I'll hold it for Carroll, myself, you, and anybody
23. else, even Senator Rock, for us all to get together and work
24. out whatever the problems are, and let's solve them. I have no
25. problems with that.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Senator Chew, you want to take it out of the record for
28. awhile?

29. SENATOR CHEW:

30. We can take it out of the record, and we can all get together
31. as it has been suggested, and work out for the benefit of justice.

32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

33. All right, the sponsor has taken it out of the record. Is

1. there leave? Leave is granted. Take it out of the record.
2. 161, Senator Nash. Read the bill, Mr. Secretary, please.

3. SECRETARY:

4. House Bill 161.

5. (Secretary reads title of bill)

6. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Are there amendments from the Floor?

9. SECRETARY:

10. Amendment No. 1 by Senator Grotberg.

11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

12. Senator Grotberg on Amendment No. 1.

13. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

14. Thank you, Mr. President, fellow Senators. Amendment No. 1,
15. and we're now talking about the Commission on Health Assistance
16. Programs, a commission that hasn't done anything, is not about
17. to do anything, and still wants a hundred thousand dollars,
18. the bill extends the reporting date for a year and the life
19. of them. Mine puts it back so that it all drops dead as of...
20. August 31st, 1981, giving them time to file the report, and
21. quietly close the door. I move the adoption.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. The motion is to adopt Amendment No. 1. Discussion?

24. Senator Nash.

25. SENATOR NASH:

26. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I
27. rise in opposition to this amendment. The commission was organized
28. December 1980, we've got to give them time to do the job that it
29. wants to do, and it's not enough time, that's why we're asking
30. for the extension to October 1, 1982.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. On the motion to adopt...Senator Rock.

33. SENATOR ROCK:

1. Well, my understanding is that the bill was put in to accom-
2. plish or effect an extention. And Senator Grotberg's now pro-
3. posed amendment, just nullifies even the existence for the bill.
4. My question to you, Sir, is what...what's the matter with this
5. commission? We have so many others, what's the matter with this
6. one?

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Senator Grotberg.

9. SENATOR GROTBORG:

10. I've tried on several, Mr. President. Some of our commissions
11. need some sunset, and this is one of the commissions that I feel
12. has outlived its usefulness the day it was created, and would
13. seek the support of the Body in helping me understand...that.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Further discussion? The motion is to adopt. All in favor
16. say Aye. Opposed Nay. The opinion of the Chair, the Nays have
17. it. The amendment is lost. Further amendments?

18. SECRETARY:

19. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Nash.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Senator Nash.

22. SENATOR NASH:

23. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. Amend-
24. ment No. 2 changes the composition of the Special Events Commission
25. to make it equal representation between the two political parties.
26. Presently the commission is made up of three members from the
27. majority party in the Senate, and three from the majority party in
28. the House, and two from the minority party from each House. What
29. it does, it changes it to make it three from each political party
30. appointed by the President of the Senate, the Minority Leader,
31. and the Speaker, and the Minority Leader of the House. And four
32. public members appointed, one by each legislative leader, and four
33. by the Governor. I move for its adoption.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. The motion is to adopt. Discussion? Discussion? Senator
3. Netsch.

4. SENATOR NETSCH:

5. Thank you. Before we increase the size of the commission, I
6. thought...I was trying to listen to that earlier discussion, but
7. I'm still not clear in my own mind what this commission does. I
8. swear I've never heard of it before.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Nash.

11. SENATOR NASH:

12. Senator Netsch, it's the Special Events Commission, it does
13. not increase the size of the commission, it has no appropriation,
14. it's a legislative commission. It was created in 1969, all
15. we're doing is making equal numbers of member from each side
16. of the aisle, which it doesn't have equal representation.

17. SENATOR NETSCH:

18. What...what does it do?

19. SENATOR NASH:

20. It...it...

21. SENATOR NETSCH:

22. That it needs to be so bi-partisan.

23. SENATOR NASH:

24. It deals with special events in the State of Illinois.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

27. SENATOR NETSCH:

28. You mean like my birthday, or something of that sort?

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. Senator Nash.

31. SENATOR NASH:

32. If that's a special event, then this commission would deal
33. with it.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Netsch. Any further discussion? Senator Keats.

3. SENATOR KEATS:

4. I just rise to basically second what Senator Netsch is saying.
5. I'm a member of this commission, and you want to know...you guys
6. may think the commission is worthless, but you don't know it, I'm
7. on the commission, and I know it's worthless. I'm mean, I cannot
8. figure out...and nothing personal to the sponsor, but we ought to
9. just abolish these stupid things. I'm on this commission, they
10. do nothing of value whatsoever, why fool with the membership, let's
11. just get rid of it.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Senator Bowers.

14. SENATOR BOWERS:

15. Yes, in my freshman year down here, I was on that commission,
16. and let me tell you about the first meeting. We had a hundred
17. and fifty thousand dollars left over, and we had a staff and we
18. had all these...all these expenses, and we were going to live
19. off the interest. And I figured it up, and said, gee, the interest
20. is going to be twelve thousand dollars, you're spending about
21. fourteen on staff and so what are you going to spend for the
22. benefit? One of them leaned back and said you're going to be a
23. good member of this commission, Frankly, I agree with Senator
24. Keats, there is no reason in the world for this commission to
25. continue, it's a leftover from the...from the Bicentennial or
26. the Centennial celebration, and I think we ought to abolish it.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Further discussion? Senator Nash may close.

29. SENATOR NASH:

30. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate...

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. I'm sorry, Senator...Senator Nash hold it. Senator Grotberg.

33. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

1. Thank you, Mr. President. I want to come to Senator Nash's
2. rescue now, because us old show business people, Senator Nash and
3. I, have something in common on this commission, which is about
4. to be activated. Nobody knows better than the Governor of Illinois,
5. that this has been a nothing commission, but he's about to activate
6. it, and go full bore to bring the arts...and...and...enhance the
7. lives of...of Illinois people with this...Events Commission and
8. do a much better job, that was his personal commitment to me, I
9. stand here representing our distinguished Governor, and his
10. commitment to resurrect this thing from the ashes, to make a full
11. bore process out of it, and do something. Otherwise, he'll be
12. the first one to say too...but I think he just discovered the
13. commission, I really do, and we got a lot more to show him. But
14. this...this one that Jim Thompson is for, if that helps it or
15. ...or I don't know. But let's try to get this one extended, and
16. do the best we can, because that's his personal commitment to
17. me on this commission.

18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

19. Further discussion? Senator Nash may close. Oh, Senator Collins.

20. SENATOR COLLINS:

21. Yes, a question of the sponsor, please?

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Indicates he will yield.

24. SENATOR COLLINS:

25. You said that there were no appropriations involved with this
26. commission, at all? It operates without money?

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Nash. Senator Nash.

29. SENATOR NASH:

30. Senator Collins, the commission, like it was stated earlier,
31. hasn't had a meeting in the past two years. It does not extend
32. the date of the commission. We're trying to revive the commission,
33. all we're doing is changing the composition of the commission with

1. this amendment.

2. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

3. Senator Collins.

4. SENATOR COLLINS:

5. You still didn't answer my question. Will there be an ap-
6. propriation for this commission, because most legislative commissions
7. operates with some kind of budget?

8. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

9. Senator...Senator Nash.

10. SENATOR NASH:

11. Well, if we can put it on one of the Christmas Trees, it
12. will probably be a small appropriation, because as of right now,
13. there is no appropriations.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. Further discussion? Senator Collins.

16. SENATOR COLLINS:

17. Yes, Senator Grotberg came to his defense and said this was
18. something that the Governor wanted, and he...he made reference to
19. him being a old show guy, and I just wanted to know was this commission
20. being reactivated to put on shows for the Governor, or what? I
21. think we have a lot of shows already going on free, and we don't
22. need anymore shows, I don't think, Senator Grotberg. And unless
23. you can tell me whether or not there is an appropriation, and what
24. is the Governor's intentions for this commission, I say...I join
25. with those who say we should just wipe it out.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Keats.

28. SENATOR KEATS:

29. I...I apologize for rising a second time, but Senator Collins
30. you just hit it, I just remembered. This is the one that they're
31. going to tack on the appropriation for the trip to Europe and
32. the trip to California. Perhaps Senator Nash could explain it,
33. this is the rumor going around about that California trip and the

1. ...the Europe trip, talking about movies or something like that.
2. This is the pork barrel one on it, it just finally hit me, Senator
3. Collins hit it right on the head, there's no appropriation today,
4. but boy there's going to be a lu lu coming through shortly.
5. So, I would be very careful and get this one killed while we
6. can.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Further discussion? Senator Bowers.

9. SENATOR BOWERS:

10. Well, I just wanted to alert Senator Collins to the fact
11. that, at least, when I was on the commission they had a hundred
12. and fifty thousand dollars left over from...from the Centennial
13. celebration, and they were going to live on the interest on a
14. hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Now, I...I totally agree
15. with what's been said here, that it's not going to be able to
16. live on the interest of a hundred and fifty thousand dollars, if
17. it does anything, because it carries a considerable overhead
18. with staff and the whole thing. Now, I suspect there will be
19. an appropriation come through. Incidentally, when I went on that
20. commission, the chairman had just resigned, apparently he was
21. a pretty good chairman, and said the commission ought to go out
22. of business. And he resigned because there was nothing to do.
23. And I...I've got to tell you, that there...this commission has
24. nothing to do that the...that the Governor doesn't have fifteen
25. different staff people already doing, and wereally ought to do
26. away with the commission.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Nash may
29. close on Amendment No. 2.

30. SENATOR NASH:

31. Mr. President, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. The
32. hundred and fifty thousand, Senator Bowers is referring to was
33. returned to General Revenue Fund. This commission, right now, has

1. no appropriations. All this amendment does, is change the composi-
2. tion...of the commission, the commission is going to still go on
3. whether this amendment goes on or not. All it does, is change the
4. composition of the commission to have three members from each side of
5. the aisle from the House, three from the Democrats, three from the
6. Republicans in the House, and three from the Democrats and three
7. from the Republicans in the Senate. I move for the adoption of Amend-
8. ment No. 2.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. The motion is to adopt Amendment No. 2. All in favor say Aye.
11. Opposed Nay. Senator Nash requests a roll call. Those in favor
12. will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open.
13. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all
14. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, the Ayes
15. are 29, the Nays are 23, none Voting Presnet. Amendment No. 2

19. Could we go back to 419? There were two...two different
20. amendments...and it should not have been moved to 3rd without
21. considering the...Amendment 2, which was a Floor amendment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. All right. There's...is there leave to return to 419?

24. Leave is granted. Senator Berman moves to...to...Senator
25. Berman, we'd like to just leave it on 3rd reading if we could
26. and put it on a recall list. Perhaps that would give us...there's
27. a...there's a good deal of confusion...I'm afraid we may confuse
28. the matter more, if that's with your consent. Senator Berman.

29. SENATOR BERMAN:

30. That's fine with me.

31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

32. All right. We'll put it on the recall list. 520, Senator...
33. Dawson. Senator Dawson on the Floor? House Bill 541, Senator

31. ...Senator Berman.

32. SENATOR BERMAN:

33. There was a Floor amendment...on 567.

5. SENATOR BERMAN:

11. The motion isto adopt Amendment No. 2. Discussion of the
12. motion? All in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have it,
13. Amendment No. 2 is adopted. Further...further amendments?
14. SECRETARY:
15. No further amendments.
16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
17. 3rd reading. Senator Dawson was...caught on the elevator
18. bringing down his file on 520. Is there leave to return to 520?
19. Leave is granted. House Bill 520. Mr. Secretary, read the bill,
20. please.
21. SECRETARY:
22. House Bill 520.
23. (Secretary reads title of bill)
24. 2nd reading of the bill. No committee amendments.
25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
26. Any amendments from the Floor?
27. SECRETARY:
28. Amendment No. 1 by Senator Gitz.
29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)
30. Senator Gitz on the Floor? Senator Gitz. You have an amend-
31. ment, Senator on a barge fleeting area bill. Senator Gitz, we're
32. ...we're bringing you one, right here.
33. SENATOR GITZ:

1. My apologies, Mr. President. This amendment, which is offered
2. at the request of the Department of Transportation would amend the
3. bill and say contrary... barge fleeting areas established prior to
4. January 1st, 1980, without a department permit, shall be exempt
5. from the requirement of department rules to deal with the impacts
6. of barge fleeting areas and natural conditions of public water,
7. if an application for a permit for the barge fleeting area is submitted
8. to the department prior to July 1st, 1982.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. The motion is to adopt. Discussion of the motion. Senator
11. Dawson.

12. SENATOR DAWSON:

13. Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate. I
14. oppose Amendment No. 1 and I ask that it do not be adopted.

15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

16. Further discussion? Senator Sommer.

17. SENATOR SOMMER:

18. Mr. President and members, I also oppose the amendment.
19. Perhaps it would be instructive to understand the genesis of
20. the bill. There are those who object to certain barge fleeting
21. areas, particularly in southern Illinois. Those people apparently
22. went to the Department of Transportation and asked them to engage
23. in some regulation of barge fleeting, which is like railroad
24. marshalling, it's a place where you... you place the barges together
25. to build the strings to go to New Orleans and Chicago. And the
26. owners of these operations have little tugboats and they run
27. around and put a barge here and a barge there, it's very much
28. like a railroad yard. And there... there's... there was a request
29. from the... by the Department of... or to the Department of Transportation
30. to regulate... this function. The Department of Transportation then
31. issued some tentative rules which I think, and I've seen them, went
32. way beyond the regulation of... of how you park the barges on... on
33. the banks or how you fleet them. They... they got into an area
34. which is really now governed by the United States Coast Guard in

1. relation to...to the conduct of...of operating barges and particularly
2. barge fleetings. I...I represent as much waterway as anybody in
3. the State, over a hundred miles on the Illinois River with
4. numerous barge fleetings and...and we don't wish...mine may not
5. leave, but I'll tell you the ones on the Mississippi River and
6. any one of them...who can get out, will get out and some of mine
7. will get out. We will lose an industry in the event that the
8. Department of Transportation...overregulates...this area, and they...
9. they have indicated the desire to overregulate. Now, there may
10. be no objections to...to decent regulations and...and...the
11. movement of this bill may cause a situation in which we can
12. obtain some decent regulations that won't overregulate an industry
13. and drive it out. And therefore I oppose the amendment, so
14. this time, hoping that we can, before the Session is over,
15. work out an agreement with everybody to...as to how we should
16. proceed on this matter.

17. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

18. Further discussion, Senator Coffey.

19. SENATOR COFFEY:

20. Yes, Mr. President, I have a question of the sponsor of
21. the amendment.

22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

23. Senator Coffey.

24. SENATOR COFFEY:

25. Yes, would you explain that amendment again, Senator Gitz,
26. please.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Gitz.

29. SENATOR COFFEY:

30. I'm sorry, I didn't get...

31. SENATOR GITZ:

32. Thank you, Senator Coffey. I think it would be helpful
33. to clarify the amendment and at the proper time, Mr. President,

1. I want to address some remarks, particularly to Senator Sommers.
2. This amendment would return the permit issuing process to IDOT,
3. but it allows existing barge operators, who were in business,
4. without permits, to continue in operation. And it would allow
5. those fleeting operations that were in business on January 1st,
6. 1980, without permits to continue if they...completed a permit
7. application and returned it to IDOT by July 1st, 1982.

8. So basically, all those folks, which everybody contends they are
9. worried about and the status quo would be taken care of. And, if
10. I may also add, kind of parenthetically, Senator Coffey, one
11. of the things that disturbs me is...is that, I don't think that
12. all of the story has been brought out. There's been a lot of
13. attempts to try to issue free permits to meet some of these
14. objections. Like Senator Sommers, I would very much like to
15. see this bill held and work out some of the agreements, but
16. there are certain individuals who seem intent at ramming this
17. through, no matter what the implications. But I...I hope that
18. addresses your question in terms of what the amendment does.

19. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

20. Further discussion? Senator Coffey.

21. SENATOR COFFEY:

22. Yes, Mr. President, I rise in favor of that amendment. I
23. ...I feel that...we've discussed this bill in committee. I too,
24. would rather see us work out between the ones concerned, a...a
25. mechanism that would make this a workable situation. But I'd
26. like to point out to this Body, if we don't...if...if we continue
27. to go on with this bill as...as proposed without an amendment or
28. without some workable situation, and you have a problem, and you
29. have waterways...in your area and you have a problem in those
30. waterways, then if you're going to go to the Corps of Engineers
31. to get those problems solved. Now, you might not like the
32. Department of Transportation, that's fine, then give the
33. authority to someone else. But before these regulations that

1. the department is proposing, they go before our joint committee
2. and if we have any faith in our joint committee to deal with those
3. regulatory...regulations, then we shouldn't be concerned, otherwise,
4. I think someone in the State should be responsible for our shores
5. of our waterways and if this bill passes without any amendments
6. on it, we certainly won't have any control over those waterways.

7. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

8. Further discussion? Senator Grotberg.

9. SENATOR GROTEBERG:

10. Well, thank you, Mr. President. Like Senator Sommers, I
11. guess I have the rest of the Illinois River in my district.
12. This is Representative Hoxsey's approach to the subject and
13. she and I share this problem along with Representative Ewing
14. and Breslin. That for heaven's sake, keep the cotton-picking
15. thing uncomplicated and let people use their barges in a
16. manner in which God intended through Federal regulation of...
17. of the Corps of Engineers and other...plenty...plenty of
18. regulatory bodies without having the State of Illinois, IDOT
19. and others messing around complicating the paper work, the
20. permitting, the...all of the things that go with that bureaucracy,
21. we can't even get them to agree on where we're going to build
22. the roads in Illinois. You know, let's not stick them any
23. further with, waterways. They're lucky to keep the water
24. running these days, get off the backs of our barge, I...urge
25. the defeat of this amendment.

26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

27. Further discussion? Senator Vadalabene.

28. SENATOR VADALABENE:

29. Thank...thank you, Mr. President, members of the...Senate.
30. I happen to have the mighty Mississippi in my area, which could
31. swallow up the Illinois River, however, let me tell you, I've
32. been to Washington for the last three times and you give more
33. authority to the Federal Government. Now, since I've been here,

1. all we've been saying is, let's stop having the Federal Government
2. blackmail us. But now we're coming along and we're sending some
3. more...some more administration duties to the Federal Government,
4. and try to get things accomplished with them. This is a good
5. amendment...the...as Chairman of the Mississippi River Parkway Commission
6. we have taken a position to enhance our great Mississippi River.
7. Now, there's some historical sites, and this...this commotion
8. has started in our legislative district. This is where all the
9. problem is...and they're...trying to put barges all up and
10. down those historical sites, Senator Grotberg. There's alternatives
11. to be made and they can be made, but by taking that permit away
12. from IDOT, we're going to run into some...some severe problems
13. and troubles. And I wish my colleagues on both sides of the
14. aisle would support this amendment until we can get something
15. worked out.

16. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

17. Further discussion? Senator...Sangmeister.

18. SENATOR SANGMEISTER:

19. Well, I just...the President of the Senate just indicated
20. to me, I...I don't know why I didn't have that support before,
21. but he says what an excellent opportunity to put the barge tax
22. on, to...to solve all the transportation problems. I...just
23. got by me, I just wondered whether the sponsor would hold the
24. bill long enough for me to get that amendment filed.

25. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

26. I'm sure Senator Dawson would accommodate you. Senator
27. Totten. Senator Thomas.

28. SENATOR THOMAS:

29. Thank you, very much Mr. President. And with due respect
30. to my chairman on the commission, Senator Vadalabene, I also
31. have a large portion of the Mississippi River in my district
32. and I would just say that I concur with Senator Sommer when
33. he says that we're talking about a great deal of jobs here and

1. I'm afraid that we're going to be seeing a number of these operators
2. go to other locations, so I would rise in opposition to the amendment.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Further discussion? Senator Demuzio.

5. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

6. Well, thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of
7. the Senate. Just to reiterate some of the comments that have
8. already been made here. I think Senator Vadalabene has made
9. the...the case. The...the major thrust of the argument right
10. now...resides in the legislative districts that both Senator
11. Sam and I...represent. And I agree wholeheartedly that this
12. amendment should go on this bill. The...the fact of the matter is,
13. is that we have people who have rights as well, and I would
14. not think that the Federal Government ought to have the sole
15. authority over issuance of...of permits to barge lines, at
16. least on our side of the...the river. I don't know whether
17. or not it's applicable on the Missouri side or as you go up
18. and down the...the river, those states that are to the...east
19. of us...west of us. But I too rise in...in support of this
20. amendment and I would hope that our colleagues on both
21. sides of the aisle would retain this authority with the State
22. Illinois Department of Transportation. Thank you.

23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

24. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator...Gitz
25. may close.

26. SENATOR GITZ:

27. Well, Mr. President and members of the Body, I...I hope
28. everyone will take a very careful look at this amendment. Now,
29. I would like to give you a little bit of background. In my area
30. of the State in East Dubuque, the Army Corps of Engineers said,
31. we will not act in any barge dredging operations until the State
32. of Illinois has issued the permits. And in fact the red tape
33. and the follow-ups and the hang-ups were all from the Federal

1. Fish and Wildlife. Without the active intervention of the Department
2. of Water Resources, that project, which is vital to that area,
3. supported by the Farm Bureau, would not be a reality today.
4. Now, what I am rather dismayed about, and the sponsor is we're
5. mixing several things together here and apples and oranges. They're
6. talking about the barge traffic going up and down the river, no
7. problem, and those people are not going to be dislodged, they're
8. going to be there. But there's another problem and that's when
9. you need to do dredging along those shorelines and the fact of
10. the matter is, is the Army Corps doesn't cover all that area.
11. The fact of the matter is, they want State participation in
12. it, the fact of the matter is that is vital. Now I don't say
13. that this amendment is the answer to the whole ball game, but
14. there are people that insist that we're just going to close our
15. eyes, eliminate everything and that's going to solve the problem.
16. Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, if you do that, if you reject the
17. amendment, there will be no further negotiations. Any you're
18. going to be back here next year with some real problems. And
19. a lot of people are then going to be in an embarrassing situation,
20. saying, but we didn't know what we bought into. This, at least,
21. gives us some latitude in terms of saying, hey, if you want to
22. have it grandfathered in, you got it and that has been offered
23. by the department. Now, the subsequent amendment is going to
24. say that all these permits are issued without charge. Talk about
25. doing people a favor, that's more of a favor than we're doing for
26. a whole lot of other operations. I think that this is a reasonable
27. amendment and I would ask for your favorable consideration.

28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

29. The question is on the adoption of Amendment No. 1 to House
30. Bill 520. Those in favor will vote Aye. Those opposed will vote
31. Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all
32. voted who wish? Take the record. On that question the Ayes
33. are 15, the Nays are 38. Amendment No. 1 to House Bill 520 is
34. lost. Further amendments?

1. SECRETARY:

2. Amendment No. 2 by Senator Gitz.

3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

4. Senator Gitz, on Amendment No. 2.

5. SENATOR GITZ:

6. Well, this amendment was to say that there was no charge
7. for these permits and since Amendment No. 1 was rejected, it's
8. superfluous.

9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

10. Senator Gitz withdraws Amendment No. 2. Amendment is withdrawn.
11. Further amendments?

12. SECRETARY:

13. No further amendments.

14. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

15. 3rd reading. For what purpose does Senator Demuzio arise?

16. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

17. Do I understand that the sponsor has agreed to bring this
18. amendment back...this bill back to the Order of 2nd reading for
19. ...another amendment?

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

21. Senator Dawson.

22. SENATOR DAWSON:

23. Mr. President, we've had two different committee hearings
24. on this bill. There have been all kinds of people testifying
25. and...I feel that they've had...adequate time to present any
26. amendments.

27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

28. Senator Gitz.

29. SENATOR GITZ:

30. Well, I find it remarkable, Senator Dawson, you know, against
31. a lot of things that are represented in committee, that there are
32. individuals in this Body who, even when they have been opposed
33. to amendments, have allowed legislation to be brought back for it.

1. And frankly, I'm surprised that you would conduct things in
2. that manner, that you're not going to allow the courtesy to
3. try to work on a bill that has far greater impact than just
4. your area, but the entire State. And you did indicate later
5. that you would accept discussions and amendments, that you'd
6. hold the bill or move it and bring it back. And this seems
7. to be a violation, not only of the spirit of operations, but
8. what you represented to me that you would do in trying to
9. accommodate other problems.

10. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

11. The remainder of the day...well, Gentlemen, the sponsor
12. has indicated he's not going to call it back. If you...there's
13. no reason to put all of this on the record...if you Gentlemen
14. can work out the problems off the Floor, it would probably be
15. just as well. Senator Rock. ...Senator Demuzio.

16. SENATOR DEMUZIO:

17. I thank you for the edification from the Chair, however,
18. I would like to hear that from the sponsor and, in fact, I
19. have not heard specifically as directly as you...as the Chair
20. has put it. I would like to hear from the sponsor in this regard.

21. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

22. Senator Dawson, I guess I heard you wrong.

23. SENATOR DAWSON:

24. Mr. President...when we talked about having amendments put
25. on here, I found out that the amendments that Senator Gitz had,
26. the two amendments were put on when I went and asked the clerk.
27. I did not have a copy of them, I was not notified of them. I
28. said before that I would work out any amendment that they wanted
29. to bring to me, but when I found out that the amendments were
30. filed, I never had a copy of it...usually they...extend the
31. courtesy to a sponsor to bring you a copy of the amendment. I
32. found out about the copies from the Clerk when I came up to
33. the Secretary and I asked for it and that was at the time yesterday

1. when I was going to call the bill. So I did not call the bill
2. yesterday. I had the amendments analyzed and given to me, that's
3. where I got the amendments. And any time if anybody wants to give
4. me an amendment to something...to a bill ahead of time, I have
5. always held the bill off here and did the same thing in the
6. House to go through the amendment and try to work it out. But
7. when the amendments are given to the Secretary, not given to me,
8. and I'm not aware of them and that they're...they're presented
9. right before the bill is called, well if that's the way they
10. want to do it, then why should I bring it back again, I've given
11. them that courtesy already.

12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

13. Now, Senator Rock, for the rest of the schedule.

14. SENATOR ROCK:

15. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. We finished a few minutes
16. earlier than expected. I would suggest, with leave of the Body,
17. I'd like to go to the Order of Resolutions. There is a resolution,
18. I'm sure all of you have been invited to the unveiling of the
19. statue in honor of...Richard J. Daley. Part of the program
20. will be a resolution, which I would now like to present...but
21. in order to get the program printed prior to the 23rd of June,
22. next week, we have to get this done today. So I'd ask that we
23. go to that order, then we will move to the Order of the Agreed
24. Bills. Senator Bruce will go through the procedure and then
25. I presume the reading of those bills will take approximately
26. ...fifteen, twenty minutes and then we'll vote on those and
27. conclude...that will conclude today's business and we
28. will reconvene at nine o'clock tomorrow morning.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

30. All right. Is there leave to go to the Order of Resolutions?
31. Leave is granted. Resolutions.

32. SECRETARY:

33. Senate Resolution 245 offered by Senators Rock, Shapiro, and
34. all Senators and it memorializes Mayor Daley.

1. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

2. Senator Rock moves for the suspension of the rules and the
3. immediate consideration and adoption of Senate Resolution
4. 245. On the motion to suspend, all in favor say Aye. Opposed
5. Nay. The Ayes have it. The rules are suspended. On the motion
6. to adopt, all in favor say Aye. Opposed Nay. The Ayes have
7. it, Resolution 245 is adopted. For what purpose does Senator
8. Nash...Senator Nash, we're not on announcements, we have a
9. lot of business to do before the day is over. Senator Dawson,
10. yes, your bill went to 3rd reading. Senator Vadalabene is
11. recognized. We historically have presentations made to
12. other people, today we have the honor of presenting certain
13. awards to members of the Senate. And just before we go to
14. the Agreed Bill List, we'll have a presentation by Senator
15. Vadalabene.

16. SENATOR VADALABENE:

17. Yes, thank you, Mr. President. Just to get things in
18. order, I think I'll start in reverse. This is in...in the
19. tennis tournament that was held last week and the Executive
20. Director of the Southwestern Illinois Industrial Association,
21. our former colleague, Bob Walters, is in the President's
22. Gallery and let's give him a round of applause for every year
23. given a great bit of attendance, Bob. Bob had gotten several
24. letters...of...and reasons why there were some no shows. And
25. what he did was, he gave me about seven no shows and I thought
26. it might be interesting to you. Representative Joe Lucco, the
27. reason he couldn't be there, he said he worked late, explaining
28. to Michael Madigan how important RTA is to the downstate
29. Legislators. And Representative..Aaron Jaffe said he couldn't
30. be there because he was explaining to Joe Lucco what RTA stands
31. for. And Senator John Nimrod, he...he was nursing a bad arm
32. and I understand it was hurt in a battle over the Equal Rights
33. Amendment. And Representative John Hallock, he thought the
34. tournament was at Baur's Opera House and Representative Glen

1. Schneider showed up, but was defaulted when Tom Hanahan found
2. out Glen was voting for Ray Hudson's right to work bill. So
3. that's some of the reasons that some of the no shows didn't
4. show up. However, we will get into the 1988...1981 B Division
5. Championship and Senator George Sangmeister finished in second
6. place. As a Representative, he won the A Division and when
7. he came over to the Senate, he finished second in the B Division.
8. And, where's the balls? And for you, Senator George Sangmeister,
9. we have two Spaulding tennis balls given to me by our great
10. friend, Dave Embry, McDonald's with a flair...they...these
11. are McDonald Tennis Balls. And in the Class B Division, we
12. had one of our, I think he has...looks like he has probably
13. one of the greatest physiques of anyone in the Senate, he
14. stands up tall, he's ten foot tall, but he played one round
15. and went home, he couldn't take it anymore, Senator Roger Keats.
16. And from McDonald's...all right, you're welcome. All right,
17. second place in the Class A Division..is Senator Marovitz on
18. the...oh, yes, Senator Marovitz. He and Jim Houlihan, and
19. I understand you're short of balls too, Senator Marovitz, so
20. here's two for you. And now I would like to have the champion
21. come up to the Podium, Senator Art Berman. And Senator Friedland,
22. I want you to pay attention to this award. On behalf of Bob
23. Walters and the Southern Illinois Industrial Association, I would
24. like to, Senator Art Berman, present you with the championship
25. of the tennis tournament of this year in the Class A Division,
26. Senator Berman. And Senator Friedland, I want you to listen
27. carefully to this because I understand that Rosenbloom was
28. Senator Berman's tennis coach...that's something else that you
29. should be aware of. Also from McDonald's and Dave Embry, here's
30. a set of Spaulding McDonald balls from Dave Embry and now I
31. give you our champion for this year, Senator Berman.

32. SENATOR BERMAN:

33. (Remarks given by Senator Berman)
