The formula provides for 12. retirement at age fifty with twenty-five years service, or at 13. age fifty-five with twenty years service. Retirement would be 14. computed on the two and a quarter percent of the final rate 15. of earnings for the first ten years, and two and a half on the 16. second ten years, and two and three-quarters for the years above 17. twenty years service, a maximum of seventy-five percent of salary. 18. The proposed increase... the rate would the... of the participants 19. would increase to eight percent on January 1st, 1982. If there's 20. any questions, I'll be happy to try to answer them. Otherwise, 21. I would appreciate the adoption of the amendment. 22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

May we have some order, please. If we can take 4. our conferences off the Floor, we'll clear the aisles. We will 5. all take our seats...we can see Senator Berning. Senator Berning 6 on an explanation of Amendment No. 3 to House Bill 289. 7. SENATOR BERNING: 8. Thank you, Mr. President. Amendment No. 3 provides a very 9. small percentage increase in the amount to be contributed by the 10. employer and the employee in those cases where early retirement 11. is taken. With this small increase ... 12. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 13. May we have some order, please. Senator Berning. 14. SENATOR BERNING: 15. Thank you. With this small additional increase in the 16. percentage of contribution, there would be no additional cost 17. incurred by the State. In its current condition, the bill would 18. actually cost, at least, two million dollars a year, it is projected. 19. So, in an effort to further prevent a worsening of our financial 20. situation, I offer Amendment No. 3. The cost per individual, or 21. employer is miniscule. 22. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 23. Senator Demuzio. 24. SENATOR DEMUZIO: 25. Thank you, Mr. President. Senator Berning, will you yield 26. for a question? 27. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 28. Indicates he will yield. 29. SENATOR DEMUZIO: 30. What is the contribution rate now to the ... to the participant? 31. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 32. Senator Berning. 33.

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1. SENATOR BERNING:

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2. It depends on the numbers of years still to be served. In other words, at age fifty-five the contribution would be thirty-3. five percent, at age fifty-nine, seven percent. And my amendment 4. would change that seven percent to eight and one...8.4 percent. 5. A minimal increase in each one of these contributions, both by 6. the employee and by the employer. It has been estimated that 7. with this small increase, there would be actually no increased 8. cost, no loss to the State General Revenue Fund. 9. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 10.

11. Is there further discussion? Senator Bruce.
12. SENATOR BRUCE:

I... I rise in opposition to Senator Berning's amendment. We 13. have worked on a compromise proposal on 289. I know that he would 14. like to add his amendment, I would like to run the bill without 15. the proposal. The bill in its original form dealt with merely 16. the allowance of people getting out on early retirement. We 17. worked out a compromise position, which puts a fifteen percent 18. cap, there is no cost at all to the systems. The...we've been 19. very successful in the area of public school teachers. This 20. extends that program for early retirement to those at the senior 21. institutions of the State of Illinois, and they are very desirous 22. of this. They testified in committee for it, there was no dis-23. cussion about any increase in qualification. Less than six 24. percent of the teachers State-wide have taken advantage of it, 25. I'm sure the college professors, even a smaller percent. The... 26. the cost figures are just not there. This increases far more 27. than would be needed to sustain the...any additional cost to the 28. systems, and every system said they can handle it without any 29. increase. I would certainly oppose this amendment. 30. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 31.

32. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Berning may33.

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1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. Well, thank you, Mr. President. I repeat, that every time we make some additional concessions in any one of the systems 3. there is a cost involved. We ought to be concerned about the 4. mounting cost, and in this instance...by a very simple in-5. crease, very nominal increase in the amount of contribution 6. there will be no additional debt involved by the system and the 7. State of Illinois. Anyone retiring under the proposal here, 8. is going to recover their contribution in the matter of a year 9. or two at the most. This nominal increase of ... for instance, 10. instead of seven percent, 8.4 percent is practically nothing, 11. but enough to prevent a deterioration in the total amount. This 12. is an effort to stem the tide of loss to the systems. It should 13. also be done with the other systems where this is now a fact. 14. And I submit that the time has come for us to attempt to make 15. these systems selfsupporting rather than continuing to deteriorate. 16. Mr. President, Amendment No. 3 is a defensible amendment, and 17. I would urge an Aye, vote. 18.

8. SENATOR MAHAR:

Yes, thank you, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. 9. Amendment No. 2 now, is the amendment that I placed on it, is 10. this correct? Thank you. Well, I rise in opposition to this 11. motion, Mr. President, and members of the Senate. And I...I 12. don't know, maybe I'm in the wrong line, but it just seems to 13. me what we're trying to do here, is we're trying to open up 14. public meetings to the public. We want the ... public needs to 15. have the right to know, they want to know how money is being 16. spent in local government, Whether it be the municipality, the 17. school board, the park board, or whatever. And with the increasing 18. amount of collective bargaining that's going on at the local 19. level, and in view of the fact that it's recognized that that's 20. where the money is, and that's where the major part of our funds 21. are being spent, it just seems to me, that the public ought to 22. have the right to know, and they ought to have the privilege 23. of following the progress of collective bargaining. 'Cause we 24. often times know that the collective bargaining process can 25. last for months, and all we know is the final outcome. The 26. people...Mr. President, could I have a little order, it seems 27. to me that ... 28.

29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

30. Ladies and Gentlemen, we're debating now on a recall of a
31. Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 411, which deals with...with the
32. publics right to know. Could we have some order. Could we break
33. up those conferences. In the back...conferences here up on the

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front aisles. Could we have a little order back there. Senator
 Mahar.

3. SENATOR MAHAR:

Thank...thank you, Mr. President. Well, I'm...I'm amazed 4. at the press, and I'm really amazed at the press, because while 5. the press seems to want open meetings, they don't seem to want 6. them completely open. Because they've been running around ... 7. talking about this particular amendment as being the amendment 8. that would kill the bill, that I'm out to kill the bill. I've 9. been working under open meetings since 1967 when Senator or 10. Representative Scariano first passed the Act. And it seems to 11. me, that maybe the Attorney General is looking for a plank in 12. his platform that is really a plank that may cave in on him, 13. because it doesn't really do what he wants to do. It seems to 14. me that the press ought to be behind this move, and if they're 15. so magnanimous, that they're going to want to have everything open 16. to the public, it ought to all be open to the public. Т 17. resist this amendment being Tabled, and I would ask for your 18. support. 19.

20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

Is there further discussion on the motion? Senator Bruce.
 SENATOR BRUCE:

Thank you, Mr. President. I... I'm not sure Attorney General 23. Rock has made this part of his platform in his campaign for 24. election, but I would think that it would be very wise to take 25. this out. Now, I'm not going to get into strong disagreement with 26. Senator Mahar. I think he...he has a...a...a reason for putting 27. this on, but I think that within a very short time, if you will 28. think about what we are about to do, every unit of local government 29. is going to be back in here wanting this exemption back in. I 30. don't want to have any kind of closed meetings except where 31. they're absolutely required for the conduct of business. And 32. I think Senator Mahar and I just disagree mildly on...on this 33.

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1. particular amendment. You cannot conduct collective bargaining 2. in the open, and this bill would require when you're going to 3. talk about your school superintendent, and the problems they've 4. had with him on his contract, to open up that whole business. It would require that everytime you talked about your city manager, 5. any time you want to have disciplinary hearing with him, any 6. time you're going to discuss his operation...oh, I think, Senator, 7. it does, because when we start talking about collective bargaining 8. it's the hiring and firing of individuals. And I just don't 9. think that you want to get in to everytime you any kind of contrac-10. tual talk, with any of your organizing groups, that that has 11. to be open. I don't think you want that, I know that you've 12. put the amendment, but I...I dare say that within a year, you'll 13. be back wanting the exemption. I think we ought just avoid that 14. hassle, this is putting a tremendous burden on cities and counties 15. and school boards throughout the State of Illinois. We...they 16. have worked under the Act since 1965 with collective bargaining 17. arrangements excluded. And the purpose of the Attorney General's 18. bill as it's before us, is not to change that, but to improve it. 19. And this is a substantial change, a substantial alteration that 20. ought not to be in. If you would like to do this, I...you know, 21. we ought to debate on a separate bill, but not on Senator Bloom 22. and I's bill. 23. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 24. Is there further discussion? Senator Hall. 25. SENATOR HALL: 26. Well, I just want to ask for my edification, what amendment 27. are we voting on? Who's...who's amendment is it? 28. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS) 29. Senator Hall, we're on...voting on a motion to reconsider 30. Amendment No. 2 to House Bill 411. The motion was presented by 31. Senator Netsch. 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1. SENATOR BERNING:

2. Thank you, Mr. President. I just want to respond to Senator Bruce when he says that collective bargaining is the hiring and 3. firing, that is absolutely and categorically untrue, as you know, 4. Senator Bruce. Collective bargaining is the whole working con-5. ditions and compensations, but does not entail the actual hiring 6. of an individual or firing of an individual. I would like to 7. urge all of you to resist the amendment...resist the motion to 8. recall Amendment No. 2. 9.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

11. Is there further discussion? If not, Senator Netsch may close debate.

13. SENATOR NETSCH:

Thank you. I didn't even get to open it, as a matter of 14. fact. Let me explain briefly, I voted yes on the amendment, 15. and I know the argument...when it first came up. I know the 16. argument that can be made, that any collective bargaining 17. agreement obviously has a very large dollar impact, and so if 18. anything ought to be out in the open, that ought to be it. 19. Five minutes after I had voted Yes...and before anyone incidentally 20. talked to me about it, I filed a motion because I realized that 21. there is no way that you can reach resolution in collective 22. bargaining negotiations if it is being done with television 23. cameras and everything else shining in on it. That...it may 24. or may not be literally the decision of who will or will not 25. be fired in a very individual sense, as Senator Bruce was 26. suggesting, but it certainly does involve it in a very general 27. sense. And...and I just...it is not realistic, and it is not 28. even necessarily desirable for that kind of hard negotiation 29. to take place in a goldfish bowl, which it would if it were 30. subject to the Open Meetings Act. I would like to say, also, 31. Senator Mahar, that the other reason why I...I changed my mind 32. on this, is that if this amendment, if your amendment stays on, 33.

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I have a feeling that may be the end of this Open Meetings
 Act, and I am strongly committed to the principle of open
 meetings, and I don't want to see it unduly burdened with
 something, that I think will, in fact, have that effect. That
 is my reasoning, and I would renew my motion to reconsider.
 PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR SAVICKAS)

The motion is to reconsider the vote by which Amendment 7. No. 2 to House Bill 411 was adopted. Those in favor will in-8. dicate by saying Aye. Those opposed. A roll call has been 9. requested. Those who wish to ... reconsider the vote by which 10. Amendment No. 2 was adopted will vote Aye. Those opposed will 11. vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have 12. all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. 13. On that question, the Ayes are 31, the Nays are 24, none Voting 14. Present. The motion to reconsider carries. Senator Netsch. 15. SENATOR NETSCH: 16.
