We have 11. just an enormous amount of work to do before I ask leave to 12. go to the order of Senate Bills 3rd reading. 13. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 14. Senator Nash. 15. SENATOR NASH: 16. Ladies and Gentlemen...Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen 17. of the Senate, the softball game...the House-Senate...annual 18. softball game has been cancelled for tonight. We'll play at 19. a later date, most likely in the fall. 20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 21. All right. Is there leave to go to the Order of Senate 22. Bills 3rd reading? Leave is granted. Senate Bill 49...the 23. Senate adjourned when we were on that bill, it had been read 24. a third time, we were under debate. Is there discussion? 25. Is there discussion? Senator Rhoads may close. 26. SENATOR RHOADS: 27. Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Senate, I am 28. not closing. I now move that the Senate go to the Order of 29. House Bills 2nd reading so that House Bill 1902 may be read 30. a second time. And I ask for a roll call vote and I demand 31. it, right now. 32. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE)

Senator Rhoads has moved to go out of the ordinary order ı. of business to the Order of Business, House Bills 2nd reading 2. for the purpose of consideration of House Bill 1902. And on 3. that motion, is there discussion? Senator Rock. 4. SENATOR ROCK: 5. Thank you, Mr. President. There was a little confusion 6. and I did not, really even hear and I'm surprised, particularly 7. after...it's been reported to me by very reliable third and 8. forth parties what Senator Rhoads said about me and others 9. yesterday. Today is, in fact, constitutionally, the last 10. day that we can act validly on Senate Bills and hope to have 11. the House act on them before adjournment on June 30. And I 12. am frankly surprised...that the gentleman would wish to go 13. to House Bills, which as he well knows, will only require a 14. one day action to go back for concurrence. We are on the 15. Order of Senate Bills 3rd reading, as per earlier commitments. 16. We will deal with Senate Bills on 3rd reading and hopefully 17. afford the House the opportunity to react to what a majority 18. of the Senate sees fit to do. And I am frankly surprised and 19. I would hope that the Secretary would take House Bill 1902, 20. 2nd reading off the board. We are not anywhere near that 21. order of business. We are on the Order of Senate Bills 3rd 22. reading, and Senate Bill 49 has been called. And I would 23. hope the gentleman would proceed with Senate Bill 49. I 24. still have a few things to say about that one, I was rudely 25. interrupted yesterday. 26. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 27. The Chair apologizes for...any interruption. Senator 28. Rhoads. On the motion. 29. SENATOR RHOADS: 30. Yes, Mr. President. This really isn't very funny after 31. the President of the Senate broke his word yesterday, cost us 32. another legislative day and...and all the other promises he's

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broken. But let's...let's get back to my motion. The motion

We can...we have 4. a lot of time to work on the Congressional Map, to get together 5. and work things out and you can vote on it in January of next 6. year. I mean there's no rush in this matter. I can't see going 7. to this order. The rush right now is to work on Senatorial 8. and...and Legislative Districts because that...we have a 9. constitutional deadline till June 30th. And we should stay 10. with Senate Bill 49, or if he doesn't want to call that bill, 11. we'll go to my bill and we'll call mine and work on that. But, 12. I don't think we should be going with Congressional dealings 13. when we got till January of next year to consider this matter. 14. I...I resist the motion. 15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 16. Further discussion? Yes. Further discussion? Senator 17. Rock is recognized. 18. SENATOR ROCK: 19. Thank you, Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the 20. Senate. A motion to go to the Order of House Bill 1902, simply 21. in my judgment, is not in order. The Senator very well knows, 22. pursuant to the reciprocal agreement between the Speaker and 23. myself that a House Bill will be treated, I hope, in the same 24. way a Senate Bill will be treated, if, in fact, the Senate 25. bill gets over to the House. That the applicable rules 26. will be suspended and we will deal with it in the ordinary 27. course of business. Today is the last day for Senate Bills. 28. We are on the Order of Senate Bill 49, which deals with the 29. Legislative Map. House Bill 1902 deals with the Congressional 30. Map. And you and I very well know, that there is no Legislative, 31. Constitutional, or Statutory deadline with respect to the 32. Congressional Map. There is, however, a deadline, a Constitutional 33.

deadline, with respect to the Legislative Map. And I suggest

that we ought to be on the Order of Senate Bill 49, unless ı. the Gentleman wishes to take that out of the record and then 2. we will proceed to House Bill 278. 3. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 4. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Rhoads 5. may close. 6. SENATOR RHOADS: 7. Yes, I... I think Senate President has spoke, I think he 8. meant Senate Bill 278 and of course he knows that I will not 9. be taking 49 out of the record. Senator Rock, let me ask you 10. this...publicly. 11. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 12. ... Senator Rhoads...since you were closing... another Senator 13. has sought recognition on this. Senator Newhouse...Senator 14. Rhoads was about to close. Did you wish to make comment? 15. It is on the motion to go out of the ordinary order of business 16. to the Order of House Bills 2nd and to consider at this time, 17. House Bill 1902. That is the motion before the Body. Senator 18. Rhoads, will you yield to Senator Newhouse. Senator Newhouse. 19. SENATOR NEWHOUSE: 20. Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate. 21. think all of us know that the whole question of redistricting 22. is one of the most important ones that we'll ever have before 23. us, and I have gotten demands from my community to vote for 24. every map that comes through here with three black Congressional 25. Districts on it and I intend to do so. Now, as to the motion 26. that's before us right now, I'm not...I can't concern myself too 27. much about the order of the business, but I want you to know 28. that I'm in favor of 1902. If it gets amended properly, I...I 29.

certainly intend to vote for it. And I think it's an important

piece of business. Now, the timing of the matter is something

that's left up to this Body. I want to...want to...get clear on the

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record where I am.

- PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) ı. Any further debate on the motion? Further discussion? 2. Senator Rhoads may close. 3. SENATOR RHOADS: 4. Well, again, just to be clear for the record, Senator 5. Newhouse and...and others. The amendment that is filed on 6. the Secretary's Desk to 1902, is the same amendment that Senator 7. Newhouse requested for this bill as well as for others. What 8. I want to do is advance this bill now, to 3rd reading, with... 9. and put on the amendment that is filed on the Secretary's 10. Desk. If necessary, Senator Rock, I am... Senator Rock, if 11. necessary, I am willing to commit to you to call back 1902 12. tomorrow from 3rd to 2nd for further amendment, if that's 13. what you want to do. But I... I insist that we go to that 14. order of business now. ... I insist on renewing my motion, anyway, 15. we'll see what the Body wants to do, and...and have it read 16. a second time. It'll just take a minute, Senator Rock, no 17. big time delay. 18. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 19. Senator Rock. 20. SENATOR ROCK: 21. Well, I suggest to you it may take more than a minute 22. because I do, in fact, have amendments to House Bill 1902. 23. And I have suggested to the Senator from Chicago, who 24. allegedly has made a commitment to...to his constituency 25. to vote for 1902 as amended, that I would have amendments 26. and I've got some really super amendments. And it's going 27.
 - think that today is the proper time to do it, we have time tomorrow. Today is a Senate Bill day...and I would suggest to everyone that I will publicly commit, that tomorrow, we will get to the Order of House Bills 2nd reading and deal with House Bill 1902. And I have some amendments and they

And I'm prepared to...to 16. deal with House Bill 1902 pursuant to an agreement with the 17. Speaker of the House, tomorrow, and there's no reason to go 18. to this order today and I would urge everyone who supports 19. my position to vote No. 20. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 21. Senator Rhoads, you...you had closed, but if you wish 22. to...well, all right, Senator Rhoads. 23. SENATOR RHOADS: 24. Yes, I will close now on my motion to go out of the 25. order of business to go to House Bill 1902 to have it read 26. a second time for purposes of amendment. Senator Rock, I will 27. ask...now ask for a roll call on this motion, your word is 28. worth nothing, we all know that now, let's have a roll call. 29. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 30. The motion...for what purpose...Senator Walsh...for what 31. purpose do you arise?

ı. Senator Donnewald is recognized. 2. SENATOR DONNEWALD: Well, Mr. President and members of the Body. I'm looking 3. 4. at the map as drawn under this particular Senate Bill, Senate Bill 49. And of course my objection to this particular piece 5. of legislation is that it dissects counties downstate where 6. it absolutely isn't necessary. Williamson County, Wayne 7. County, my home county of Clinton and several others, Christian 8. and Fulton to name a few, are dissected where there is no reason 9. for that because there are ways that you can...draw a map, contiguous 10. and compact and with the proper amount of population and that's 11. the only problem that we have downstate. That's not done by 12. this piece of legislation. Subsequent legislation will show 13. that it can be done and I would object to Senate Bill 49. Thank 14. you. 15. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR BRUCE) 16. Further discussion? Further discussion? Senator Rhoads 17. may close. 18. SENATOR RHOADS: 19. Thank you, Mr. President. And thank you, Senator Donnewald, 20. I...we'll take a look at the amendment when it gets there. I 21. was about to say that...the remark of Will Rogers, who said, 22. despite every attempt of the American people to be fair, every 23. once in a while an innocent person is sentenced to a term in 24. the State Legislature and...we don't have too many innocents 25. left here, but I... I think sometimes in the final days we...we 26. all get under a strain and in the stress of debate, we make 27. intemperate remarks and I made such a remark to the President 28. of the Senate.      a computer printout showing what exactly the demographic

     data of each proposed legislative district was. It gives not

     only the population counts, but it gives the ratio of breakdown

     Bill 49. That, I think, is important, because I wanted people

      to know what they were voting on. And I've made an attempt

     to accommodate every...member of the Senate on both sides

     were. I've invited them in to take a look at the map, explain to

      them what the census tracks meant, provided the computer printout
