SENATOR POSHARD:

We will now proceed with the Annual Memorial Day Program and the chair would like to recognize Senator Sam Vadalabene, chairman of the Senate Majority Caucus and vice-chairman of the Senate Veterans' Affairs Committee, for the MC. Senator Vadalabene.

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Senate and guests in the gallery. We are proud to assemble today for our Annual Memorial Day Program. Memorial Day is a most sacred national holiday in our United States of America, and it is a day when we honor our departed servicemen and servicewomen, and it is a day we also honor our living servicemen and servicewomen. Please join together in this program of reverence and respect for both the living and for the dead. Now have the introduction of our guests, the Honorable Thomas R. Jones, assistant director of the Department of Veteran Affairs; Brigadier General Richard Eslinger, Air National Guard, Assistant Adjutant General for the Air; Brigadier General William Doris, Army National Guard, Assistant Adjutant General for the Army; Captain Roman Martin,

U.S. Naval Reserve, Naval Advisor to the Adjutant General; Colonel Carl O. Johnson, Jr., Army National Guard, Public Affairs Officer of the Illinois National Guard; Pharmacist Master Chief, John A. De Fiore, U. S. Navy, Commander of the Master Chief Commander of the Naval Training Center of Great Lakes; Lieutenant V. P. De Kime, U. S. Navy, Flag Lieutenant Commander of the Naval Training Center of Great Lakes; Captain...Norman C. Lord, U. S. Navy, Commanding Officer of Recruit Training Command, Great Lakes; Commodore Thomas R. M. Emery, U. S. Navy Commander...United State Naval Training Center, Great Lakes; Captain B. Angus Mac Donald, U. S. Navy Commander, Navy Recruit Area Five, Great Lakes; Lieutenant Lisa...McMangle, Army National Guard, Editor of the Illinois National Guard Chronicle and Sergeant James Holmes, Army National Guard, Equal Opportunity Specialists, Illinois National Guard. Let's give our honored guests a rounding, admirable, applause. We will open our program with the Presentation of the Colors, the Pledge of Allegiance and the opening prayer, so would you please stand. Color Guard, present the Colors, hand salute. (Machine cutoff)...two. I now recognize Senator William Mahar who will lead us together the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America. Senator Mahar.

SENATOR MAHAR:

(Senator Mahar leads Pledge of Allegiance)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

The opening prayer now will be given by Senator Davidson.
Senator Davidson.

SENATOR DAVIDSON:

(Prayer given by Senator Davidson)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

For some unknown reason, the choir of the Pleasant Plains Grove Baptist Church has not arrived as yet, so we will continue with the program. Please be seated. General John A.

Logan a native of Murphysboro, Jackson County, Illinois, was a Major General in the Civil War. He was three times Commander in Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic as well as a United States Senator and a member of the House of Representatives in Illinois. Senator Judy Topinka will now read General Logan's Order for the First Memorial Day issued on May 5th, 1968. Senator Topinka.

SENATOR TOPINKA:

(Senator Topinka reads General Logan's Order for the First Memorial Day)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator Beverly Fawell will read "A Star in God's Window," which was written by Reverend Eugene M. Denner, Almoner National, Forty and Eight. Senator Fawell. A star is born.

SENATOR FAWELL:

(Senator Fawell reads "A Star in God's Window")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

At this time I would like to recognize in the President's Gallery...there are veterans in the gallery and would they stand and be recognized. It is only fitting that a song that has always been a favorite to be played on Memorial Day, the "Battle Hymn of the Republic," which will be played by Steve Hall, the bugler of the Hundred and Fourteenth Reactivated Volunteers. Steve Hall.

STEVE HALL:

(Steve Hall plays the "Battle Hymn of the Republic")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

William J. Aker is a ninety-four year old self-taught poet. He was born and raised on a farm in Waterloo, Illinois. Aker saw service in the Army first in a Quartermaster Corps in Texas in the Border Patrol under General John J. Pershing in 1916 and in 1917 and later in World War I as a

Warrant Officer in France, and while a patient at the Geriatric Administration Medical Center in Los Angeles, the nurses discovered his talent after he dedicated a poem to them. And when he was asked by the Veterans' Administration to write a commemorative poem for veterans everywhere on Memorial Day, Aker said he had just the thing. And after flipping through a well-thumbed black scrapbook on his poetry, he retrieved and updated a poem he had written in 1941 called "Memorial Day." This poem composed by a Navy son of Illinois, William J. Aker, will be presented by Senator Margaret Smith. Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH:

(Senator Smith reads "Memorial Day")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator Greg Zito will present a statement on Memorial Day. Senator Zito.

SENATOR ZITO:

Thank you, Senator. (Senator Zito reads "Why Memorial Day.")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

It is traditional that the poem "In Flander's Field" be recited on Memorial Day. Senator Richard F. Kelly will present the poem. Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY:

(Senator Kelly reads "In Flander's Field")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Senator Adeline Geo-Karis who served as a Lieutenant Commander at the U. S. Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, Illinois, during World War II, will introduce our guest speaker. Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Chairman Vadalabene, distinguished guests, it's a real pleasure for me to introduce my constituent, Commodore Thomas R. M. Emery, Great Lakes who will be our guest speaker.

Commodore Emery has served valiantly for our country. He's the son of Grace Merrill Emery and the late Captain George C. Emery of the U. S. Navy, so he has followed the tradition of the Navy through his family. He was graduated from the United States Naval Academy and commissioned Ensign in 1955. He was selected as Commodore in February 1983. His assignments at sea have been many. He's been...had duty on the USS Cotten, the US Lorain County, USS Richard E. Byrd, USS Sampson and he served as Commander of Operations Seafloat in lower Ca Mau Peninsula, as Chief Staff Officer for Commander Surveillance Force, Cam Rahn Bay and as Chief of Staff for Battle Force Sixth Fleet. He commanded the...both the USS Coontz and the USS Hartley. He's also had many assignments at Fleet and Anti-Submarine Warfare School. He's probably one of the most articulate, one of the most well-trained Naval officers in the history of the Navy of the United States. He continued his studies in engineering at the U. S. Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, earning a degree in Electrical Engineering, and he also holds a Master of Science degree in International Affairs from George Washington University. In addition, he is a graduate of both the U. S. Naval War College and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. He assumed duties as Commander Naval Training Center, Great Lakes, on 21st of July, 1983. Among his personal decorations are the Silver Star, one of the highest orders; the Legion of Merit with Combat "V" and gold star in lieu of a second award; the Bronze Star with Combat "V", five in other words; the...Meritorious Service Medal, three Air Medals; the Combat Action Ribbon; and the...Vietnam...Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry. He is married to the former Gale Valentine of Marblehead, Massachusetts, and has three children. I know Commodore Emery as an individual who is a very community minded citizen as well as a competent naval officer. My only regret is that he is being

transferred, to better duty probably, in July of this year and we're going to miss him. It is my pleasure and, believe me, a distinct honor to introduce a citizen and man, a naval officer I deeply respect because he is a naval officer in the highest traditions of the United States Navy of America, Commodore Thomas R. Emery who will give the keynote address today.

COMMODORE THOMAS R. M. EMERY:

(Remarks given by Commodore Emery)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Thank you, very much, Commodore Emery. We appreciate very much your honoring us today and our guest speaker...as our guest speaker and sharing with us those wonderful words, and we are proud of your leadership as the Commander of the United States Naval Training Center at Great Lakes, Illinois. We will now be entertained by Mrs. Frances Jones and members of the choir of the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church of Springfield, Illinois for some...some number that's she's going to sing throughout the program. The choir. You're on, Mrs. Jones.

PLEASANT GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH CHOIR:

(Pleasant Grove Choir sings "God Bless America" and another number)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Mrs. Jones, on the program, we have that you have one more number. Are you finished?

PLEASANT GROVE BAPTIST CHURCH CHOIR:

(Pleasant Grove Choir sings "America the Beautiful.")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

We will now close our Annual Memorial Day Program. The Senators and guests in the gallery will please rise and remain standing for the closing ceremony. The combined Armed Force Color Guard will present the Colors. Present the

Colors. The closing prayer will be given by Senator Kenneth Hall. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL:

(Prayer given by Senator Hall)

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Our bugler will now blow "Taps." Hand salute.

BUGLER STEVE HALL:

(Steve Hall plays "Taps")

SENATOR VADALABENE:

Color Guard, retire the Colors. I would like at this time, since we're about to close the program, let's give Senator Bob Mitchler a hand...a round of applause for coordinating this program. Good job, Bob. Thank you, Senators and guests, for participating in this Annual Memorial Day Program. Thank you, President Rock, for authorizing this Memorial Day Program and a special thanks to you, Mrs. Frances Jones and members of the choir of the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church of Springfield. Your beautiful music and songs added so much to this program. And thank you to our Illinois veterans' who have been seated in the President's Gallery and a final thank you to our special guest.
