Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has accepted the Governor's specific recommendations for change which are attached to a bill of the following title, in the adoption of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

PRESIDENT:

All right, ladies and gentlemen, if you'll turn to Supplemental Calendar No. 1, on the Order of Specific Recommendations for Change there's a motion in writing with respect to House Bill 529. Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY:

I move to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to House Bill 529 in manner and form as follows. Amendment to House Bill 529 in acceptance of Governor's recommendations. Filed by Senator Doris Karpziel.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Karpziel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Thank you, Mr. President. I...I do move to accept the...the Governor's changes on House Bill 529. He went to the issue of the prior restraint concerns that I believe many

members in this Chamber had as well as he did and changed it to...dropped out the TRO portion and makes it constitutional in his eyes and I...I do happen to agree and...and ask for an Aye vote.

PRESIDENT:

Any discussion? Senator Dunn.

SENATOR TOM DUNN:

Thank you, Mr. President. This bill that was presented last fall during the veto session has now come back in a form that I think is...is more acceptable from a constitutional standpoint. There are a number of us that had some problems with it back last fall, especially in light of the appellate court decision on the seizure of property, and the bill now conforms with earlier court decisions and I urge its adoption.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Thank you, Mr. President. A question of the sponsor. Senator...

PRESIDENT:

Sponsor indicates she'll yield, Senator...

SENATOR NETSCH:

...Karpel, it does still provide for a very broad based forfeiture that is not limited in any way to the obscene material, as I understand it. I...I think it...it's better than it was but I...and I'm trying to find the language in the bill, which I cannot find at the moment, but I don't think it really eliminates the idea of being allowed to seize property...all property of someone who may be found to have had a...a publication that might subsequently be determined to be found obscene; and, again, you know, we were talking about the...the magazine rack or something of that sort where all of the assets of that person would be subject to seizure

for something that would not...until later be determined to be obscene, and I'm not at all clear that that has been totally turned around or eliminated. Can you answer that question?

PRESIDENT:

Senator Karpel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Probably not, Senator, because for one thing, I was just handed this and, secondly, I...I...I assume you're talking about this second offense because this has to be a second conviction of...of obscenity before they can do the forfeiture or...or...or take that and...and...you know, take that to court and take the property and hold the property until the second conviction. Now this has to be a second charge and I assume...is it the second charge you're talking about?

PRESIDENT:

Senator Netsch.

SENATOR NETSCH:

Well, what you're saying is that there now must have been one conviction of obscenity and then a subsequent charge or a subsequent conviction and...and after that fact, then all of that person's property is subject to forfeiture. Is that what you are saying?

PRESIDENT:

Senator Karpel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Yes, all of the property that is...was gained from that...you know, from the...I mean, that part is still in the...in the original bill, but it has...this...can only be done after the...if it's the second conviction, the second charge. I mean, you're right, there has to be a previous conviction of obscenity before this can go into place. This would have to be the second one.

PRESIDENT:

Further discussion? Any further discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to House Bill 529 in the manner and form just stated by Senator Karpel. Those in favor will vote Aye. Opposed will vote Nay. The voting is open. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On that question, there are 46 Ayes, 3 Nays, 1 voting Present. The specific recommendations of the Governor as to House Bill 529 having received the required constitutional majority vote of Senators elected are declared accepted. On the Order of Supplemental Calendar No. 1, there's a motion in writing with respect to the specific recommendations for change on House Bill 2065, Madam Secretary.

SECRETARY:

I move to accept the specific recommendations of the Governor as to House Bill 2065 in manner and form as follows. Amendment to House Bill 2065 in acceptance of Governor's recommendations. Filed by Senator Thomas Dunn.

PRESIDENT:

Senator Dunn.

SENATOR DUNN:

Thank you, Mr. President. The Governor in his veto changed several things. He raised the three percent of the gross to five percent and he increased the license fee from two to five hundred dollars and he increased the annual license fee for suppliers and manufacturers from two thousand to five thousand. The only other item of change in his Message was it limits the location where the games may be operated and it's now a premises that is owned by the organization. I move for the adoption.

PRESIDENT:

Discussion? Is there any discussion? If not, the question is, shall the Senate accept the specific recommendations

PRESIDENT:

Consent Calendar. With leave of the Body, we'll add those later entries to the Consent Calendar at this...all right, the Secretary informs me that the Resolutions Consent Calendar has been distributed. Madam Secretary, are there any objections?

SECRETARY:

There have been no objections filed.

PRESIDENT:

All right, no objections having been filed, Senator Demuzio moves the adoption of the Senate Resolutions Consent Calendar. All in favor indicate by saying Aye. All opposed. The Ayes have it. SENATOR BROOKINS:

Thank you, Mr. President. With leave, I ask to be a hyphenated cosponsor to Senate Bill 1583.

PRESIDENT:

Gentleman seeks leave to be added as a cosponsor on Senate Bill 1583. Without objection, leave is granted. Senator Berman.

With leave of the Body, Senate Resolution 855 will be added to the Resolutions Consent Calendar and will be considered adopted. Leave has been granted. Resolutions, Madam Secretary. Message from the House.

SECRETARY:

A Message from the House by Mr. O'Brien, Clerk.

Mr. President - I am directed to inform the Senate that the House of Representatives has adopted the following joint resolution, in the adoption of which I'm...instructed to ask the concurrence of the Senate, to-wit:

House Joint Resolution 154.

(Secretary reads HJR 154)

PRESIDENT:

Senator Demuzio...Demuzio. Thank you.

SENATOR DEMUZIO:

The...Resolution 154...is it House Joint Resolution...is the adjournment resolution which calls for us that we adjourn today to come back...to return on March the 23rd at the hour of noon. I would move that...to suspend the rules for the immediate consideration and adoption of House Joint Resolution 154.

PRESIDENT:

PRESIDENT:

Senator Geo-Karis.

SENATOR GEO-KARIS:

Mr. President and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Senate, I knew John Conolly well for many years. I knew his father and mother before them, very distinguished citizens. John Conolly's great-great-grandfather, David Valentine, had served as mayor of the Village of Little Fort, which is now known as Haukegan, and he was a very pleasant gentleman and he worked very hard when he was in the House and the Senate, and he was the youngest member to be elected to the House of Representatives from Lake County in 1962 at the age of twenty-seven years. We regretfully heard about his death...died very young, as a matter of fact, about fifty-two years of age and all I can say is he will be well remembered to our Lake County community. He had been my constituent for many years and I certainly express my condolences to his family, to his children, his brother and sister and, as I said, he left his mark, he sponsored some bills that were very...unpopular such as the RTA but his sponsorship made possible transportation on a greater basis than it was possible before. So, with deep sorrow, I say...so I give my sympathy to the family of John Conolly.

PRESIDENT:
