Senator Weaver, Chair of the Committee on Rules, reports that the following Legislative Measures have been assigned to committees: Referred to the Committee on Insurance, Pensions and Licensed Activities - the Conference Committee Report to Senate Bill 533, motion to concur with House Amendments 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 to Senate Bill 1706; referred to the Committee on Judiciary the motion to concur with House Amendments 1 and 9 to Senate Bill 1299; and Be Approved for Consideration - Conference Committee Report to House Bill 1040.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

# SENATOR CRONIN:

Yes. Thank you, Madam President, Ladies and Gentleman of the Senate. I do move to refuse to recede from the House <sic> amendments, as stated in my motion.

I move to non-concur with the House in the adoption of their Amendments numbered 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11 and 12 to Senate Bill 1721.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Karpiel.

### SENATOR KARPIEL:

I move to non-concur in Senate Bill 1721 and all the amendments and ask that it be placed in a conference committee. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator -- is there any discussion? Any discussion? Senator Demuzio.

### SENATOR DEMUZIO:

Well, thank you. I -- there -- a lot of people are really not paying attention as to what, in fact, we are doing. We are now on the Order of -- of Secretary's Desk, Concurrence, on page 10. I probably don't have any objection, Senator Karpiel, to what you are doing -- I don't have any objection to what you are doing, but I was wondering if the sponsors could give us a little indication at to what is in these amendments that we're non-concurring in, so that we can get with the flow here.

PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Karpiel.

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Senator Demuzio, while we are trying to find the -- I don't have anything on my desk here. I just walked on the Floor. But I can tell you, it was sort of a Christmas tree of things. One of them has to do with quantity-based garbage collection that's -you know, statewide mandate. One of them has to do with tires disposal of tires. One of them was adopt-a-park. One was a nuclear safety language that was already on a different bill and has gone to the Governor. Some of these amendments may be very good. Some of them are very bad. And they don't all track, and we just would like to sort it all out in conference committee, the underlying bill, Senator Demuzio, is the because landfill-siting bill, and we do need that. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Is there further discussion? Senator Welch. SENATOR WELCH:

Yes. I'd like to ask the sponsor a question. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Indicates she'll yield, Senator Welch. SENATOR WELCH:

Senator Karpiel, the -- the quantity-based garbage proposal has been passed by the Senate a couple of years ago. In addition, we've recently had major tire fires throughout the State of Illinois. Are you going to maintain those provisions in the new conference committee, or what is your intention? PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

Senator Karpiel.

SENATOR KARPIEL:

Well, my intention, Senator, is to go along with the tire -the amendment dealing with the tires. And I am -- I, personally, am not in favor of the quantity-based garbage collection, but that'll have to be discussed in conference. PRESIDING OFFICER: (SENATOR DONAHUE)

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Further discussion? Senator Shaw. Senator Shaw? Further discussion? Further discussion? Seeing none, Senator Karpiel has moved to non-concur in House Amendments 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11 and 12 to Senate Bill 1721. All those in favor, say Aye. Opposed, Nay. The Ayes have it. The motion carries, and the Secretary shall so inform the House. Senator Weaver, for what purpose do you rise?
