

### Illinois's Latino Population

Illinois has more Latino population than Arizona, and is only surpassed by California, Texas, Florida, and New York.

Illinois has 2,337,410 Latinos as of the 2020 Census, which is 18.2% of the state population.

Latinos are the largest minority group in Illinois



## Illinois vs New York philosophy on Latino Congressional Districts

Illinois inefficiently packs its Latino population into one Latino majority congressional district, electing one Latino to Congress.



New York only has one Latino majority district, but also has three Latino plurality districts. New York efficiently uses its Latino population to elect Four Latinos to Congress
































#### **Two Illinois Latino Districts**

Illinois does not need one "super" Latino district to elect a single Latino, it can elect two Latinos to congress in two separate districts.

The south Latino district would consist of southwest Chicago, Cicero, Berwyn, Burbank, and Bridgeview. This district would be 67% Latino

The north Latino district would consist of northwest Chicago, Melrose Park, Franklin Park, Bensenville, Addison, and Des Plaines. This district would be 50% Latino



#### **Two Illinois Latino Districts**

The north district would be more Latino than three New York congressional districts that elect Latinos



NY-12 Velasquez 38% Latino



NY-13 Espaillat 49% Latino



NY-14 Ocasio-Cortez 47% Latino
