1 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Good afternoon, and
2 welcome to the House redistricting hearing in
3 Champaign. Do we need to call the roll or are we on
4 a recessed roll?

5 MR. HARTMANN: We are on a recessed roll.

6 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Okay. And --

7 REPRESENTATIVE BURKE: We'll need to add
8 Representatives -- is it recessed from Peoria or
9 recessed from --

10 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Is it recessed from
11 yesterday, so we have to -- Rep Spain had a
12 replacement yesterday.

13 MR. HARTMANN: It's recessed from this
14 morning.

15 CHAIRMAN BURKE: From the Peoria?

16 MR. HARTMANN: Correct.

17 CHAIRMAN BURKE: And he was there.

18 Okay. So I think -- I think we have
19 everybody. I don't see any visiting legislators.
20 It looks like it's all Committee Members, so we'll
21 go ahead and proceed.

22 So good afternoon everyone, and thanks for
23 everyone for taking the time to participate in
24 today's hearing. Earlier this year the House and

1 Senate Redistricting Committees held approximately
2 50 public hearings to gather input on redistricting
3 in Illinois. Based on the input from the public and
4 the best population data available at the time, the
5 General Assembly in May passed a legislative
6 redirecting plan that was signed into law by the
7 Governor as Public Act 102-10 on June 4th to comply
8 with the Illinois Constitution's June 30th deadline.
9 At the time, the House Democrats indicated we would
10 review the 2020 Census data when it was released
11 this fall to determine if changes should be made to
12 the map. On August 12th, 2021, approximately
13 five months later than normal, the United States
14 Census Bureau released the 2020 Census population
15 data to Illinois, as well as to the other states.
16 Now that we have the census data, we are fulfilling
17 our commitment to review the data, seek additional
18 input from the public, and amend the redistricting
19 plan to incorporate the latest census data as
20 needed. The House Democrats remain committed to
21 providing the public with various ways to make their
22 voices heard to ensure a fair map that reflects the
23 broad racial and geographic diversity of Illinois.
24 Rep Butler, do you have any comments or

1 statements?

2 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: Sure. Thank you,
3 Chair Burke. I haven't seen a witness list yet, but
4 I do see we have a few witnesses in the waiting
5 room, so I don't know if we can get that witness
6 list to our staff, and I would just -- just happy to
7 be here. I guess this is for the Champaign area.
8 We will try not to take long I guess today, because
9 the Illini kick off in about ten minutes, and I'm
10 sure, Representative Burke, I think you're an U of I
11 grad. I'm sure you would like to watch the football
12 game today. But I'm glad we have some witnesses
13 here today, at least a handful of them. Thank you.

14 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Well, I'd love to watch
15 the Illini. I don't know if my event schedule will
16 permit it, but I'm going to try.

17 We do have three witness that have
18 requested recognition, and the three witnesses will
19 be C.W. Chan, for Coalition for a Better
20 Chinese-American Community. Judge William Hadad,
21 MENA Government Advisory Council, and Ryan Tolley of
22 Change Illinois. I believe they're all here in the
23 waiting room, so we will proceed with C.W. Chan,
24 Coalition for a Better Chinese-American Community.

1 MR. CHAN: Thank you, Madam Chairman.

2 We are not from the Champaign area,
3 but this just happened to be a good time, so good
4 morning everybody. My name is C.W. Chan, and I'm
5 here representing the Coalition for a Better
6 Chinese-American Community.

7 For more than two decades, CBCAC
8 promoted civic engagement, political empowerment,
9 and community development for the first China --
10 Chinese-American Committee in the Greater Chinatown
11 Chicago area. As the Illinois General Assembly is
12 going into a special session to make adjustment to
13 the recently passed legislative act, CBCAC would
14 like to register for the record the following:

15 We have been advocating for a fair
16 remap for Chicago's Chinatown neighborhood since
17 1991. Ten years ago, our fully-engaged community,
18 encouraged by the more than 300 percent increase in
19 registered voters within a decade, worked closely
20 with our legislative leaders to get a passage of the
21 Illinois Voting Right Act of 2011, which included
22 specific protection of language minority without a
23 voting age majority in the redistricting process.
24 Following the passage of the legislature, also

1 nicknamed the Chinatown Bill, over 90 percent of the
2 Chinese Americans in the greater Chinatown area were
3 joined into one single State legislative district,
4 despite only a 24 percent population of the
5 district. The first ever Asian-American State
6 legislator in Illinois was elected in 2016. It was
7 such an encouragement to other Asians in the
8 district, that only four years later, five proud
9 Asian-American legislators are now serving in the
10 Illinois General Assembly. It's a success story of
11 the Asian-American community as well as a success
12 story of the Illinois General Assembly, and should
13 be celebrated and remembered by both.

14 As you're finalizing your 2021
15 redistricting with the recently released census
16 data, I urge you to remember the commitment to the
17 protection of language minority and other minority
18 groups. The community will keep a close eye to make
19 sure that a Chinatown neighborhood, as well as other
20 Asian district neighborhoods will be kept intact in
21 the final map. And we thank all of you in advance
22 for doing the same.

23 CBCAC is also part of the United
24 Congress for Community and Religious Organizations,

1 the UCCRO Coalition, a multiethnic coalition that
2 worked collaborating on a unity map that was
3 submitted to both State House and State Senate
4 Redistricting Committees during the comment period
5 in May, 2021. We urged that the House and Senate
6 Redistricting Committees revise and review this map,
7 which takes into account each communities of
8 interest and take it under serious consideration.
9 And as the General Assembly goes back into special
10 session next week, we urge that the map drawn out of
11 this special session be shared with the community
12 early and with ample time for community review and
13 discussion. Thank you.

14 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Thank you, Mr. Chan, for
15 your testimony. And Committee Members, I did
16 neglect to call upon our Democratic staffer for the
17 presentation. I apologize for taking things out of
18 order. So before we get to the next two witnesses,
19 I will recognize House Democratic staffer for our
20 presentation and please proceed.

21 MS. McNAMARA: Good afternoon everybody.

22 CHAIRMAN BURKE: And for clarification,
23 it's Allie McNamara.

24 MS. McNAMARA: Like Representative Burke

1 said, my name is Allie McNamara. I'm an employee of
2 the Illinois House of Representatives, and I'm here
3 to give a brief overview of what the 2020 Census
4 data released earlier this month showed for the
5 State overall as well as the local region.

6 According to the 2020 Census, the
7 State's population is 12,812,508. This is a decline
8 of 0.14 percent or 18,124 people over a ten-year
9 period. The State's total population, according to
10 the final 2020 Census numbers was approximately
11 0.3 percent above the 2015 to 2019 American
12 Community Survey five-year estimates.

13 Statewide populationships over the
14 past decade reflect an overall increase in urban and
15 suburban communities and decline in population in
16 rural and downstate areas. The State's northeastern
17 counties, Cook, DuPage, Lake, Will, McHenry, Kane,
18 Kendall, and Grundy counties all saw increases in
19 population, with Kendall County seeing the largest
20 population increase in the State.

21 While much of the downstate lost
22 population, some areas did see noteworthy increases
23 such as Carroll County, McLean County, Champaign
24 County, Effingham County, Williamson County, and

1 Johnson County.

2 The counties that saw the biggest
3 declines were located downstate. Alexander County
4 saw the State's largest loss of population while
5 Calhoun County, Coles County, Gallatin County, Green
6 County, Haradin County, Henderson County, Jackson,
7 Mason, McDonough, Pike and Pulaski all saw double
8 digit losses in population.

9 Overall, these rural areas of
10 Illinois were generally overestimated by the 2015 to
11 2019 American Community Survey five-year estimates
12 while many urban areas were underestimated.

13 Locally, Champaign County's
14 population increased by 2.4 percent over the past
15 decade. House Districts 103 and 105 from the 2011
16 map saw an increase in population, while House
17 Districts 101, 102, 104, 106, 107, 109, and 110, saw
18 a decrease in population over the decade.

19 The counties white population
20 declined over the past decade, while
21 African-American, Asian, and the Hispanic
22 populations increased.

23 Thank you very much for your
24 attention and for coming out to share your thoughts

1 today. As the Chair mentioned, you'll be able to
2 find hearing information and testimony from this and
3 other hearings on ilga.gov,
4 ilhousedems.com/redistricting, and
5 ilsenateredistricting.com. You can send further
6 written testimony and suggestions by email to the
7 House Redistricting Committee at

9 Thank you.

10 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Thank you, Allie.

11 Now we'll go back to our -- did any
12 Committee Members, I didn't see any hands raised for
13 Mr. Chan, so I'm going to move ahead to our next
14 witness, Judge William Hadad, MENA Government
15 Advisory Council. Judge Hadad.

16 JUDGE HADAD: Thank you Representative
17 Burke, and I want to thank the Committee and Allie
18 McNamara for making this possible. I, too, am like
19 Mr. Chan, someone who was not able to be with you on
20 Thursday, so I hope you will indulge me, just for a
21 few minutes, to present our case. You know, I heard
22 Mr. Chan speak, and I have to tell you that I'm
23 happy that the Chinese-American community has five
24 Representatives downstate. My community, the MENA,

1 Middle East North Africa, otherwise the
2 Arab-American community, has none. And I'd like to
3 make a case for the issue of southwest Cook County.

4 Now, our objection, our formal
5 objection for this record for the courts or the
6 General Assembly to note is that our people have
7 been excluded as MENA Americans in the adjustments
8 to the General Assembly Redistricting Act. The
9 American Middle East Voters Alliance, of which I am
10 Chairman, was founded in 2006, and became a
11 Political Action Committee in 2014. That group has
12 been able to accumulate a proprietary database of
13 249,000 registered MENA voters in Cook County and
14 the collared counties here in Illinois. That is
15 consistent with the estimates of 4.1 to 4.6 percent
16 of Illinois citizens being from our MENA community.
17 That's a lot of people. Our greatest concentration
18 of Arab-Americans or MENA Americans is in southwest
19 Cook County. And that southwest sector is the area
20 that I'm focusing on in speaking to you today.

21 There are 64 precincts in that
22 region. And we're Palos, Bridgeview, Orleans,
23 Stickney, Lyons, all of which can be, I believe,
24 created into a district. We have submitted

1 documentation to Allie McNamara of maps and
2 demographics regarding those areas showing the last
3 voter turnouts and so on. The maps that we're
4 submitting, though somewhat remote --
5 unsophisticated I might say, do not disrupt any
6 current representatives from that area, but carve
7 out an area that would represent the large
8 population of MENA Americans there. There are more
9 Palestinian-Americans here in Chicago, in this area,
10 than anywhere in the world. And we have the largest
11 population of Palestinians, Jordanians, and Syrians
12 in this region as this documentation that I gave to
13 Ms. McNamara bears out. We do have statistics,
14 despite the issue with the census.

15 We also are submitting a resolution
16 from our recently formed MENA Governmental Advisory
17 Council of urging to you to create a redistricting
18 in southwest Cook County and to take that into
19 account.

20 Now, I don't want to be too much of a
21 former judge here, okay, but the U.S. Supreme Court
22 said in Gray versus Sanders, that local electoral
23 district boundaries should be drawn in accordance
24 with the constitutional principle of one person, one

1 vote, in order to fairly reflect the population in a
2 way that does not dilute a fair reflection of the
3 citizens within that district. However, the Trump
4 census ban on Arab-Americans, ended the Census
5 Bureau's plans to add MENA Americans to the 2020
6 census. That's a fact. This prohibition denied
7 Arab-Americans their lawful right and opportunity to
8 be counted along with other minorities in the 2020
9 Census. This puts us at allegedly an impediment.
10 However, we're submitting to the General Assembly,
11 the fact that the Trump census ban on Arab-Americans
12 should not and need not be an impediment to bridging
13 the political rights of Arab-Americans and our MENA
14 population here in Illinois, which is quite sizable.
15 We're presenting, and I sent it to Allie McNamara,
16 our study's empirical evidence from Professor Louise
17 Cainkar from Marquette University and other sources
18 that show that there is a basis to redistrict
19 southwest Cook County, and we submit some drafts of
20 maps that would support that idea.

21 So, okay, we have included with our
22 testimony, and I'm sending to you -- I'm trying to
23 be brief here. I know the Illinois game is coming
24 up, and the White Sox really took care of the Cubs

1 last night. I gotta mention that as a White Sox
2 fan. I'm a south sider.

3 Anyways, I've included in our
4 testimony today the MENA Governmental Advisory
5 Council's former resolution to the General Assembly
6 to redistrict southwest Cook County to address the
7 concentration of Arab-Americans in that region.
8 I've also submitted an overview of the demographic
9 evidence in support of our proposed inclusive
10 redistricting and some examples of maps and
11 population guides to help you along. Now, I am
12 happy that there's other minorities that have been
13 able to prevail upon the General Assembly to allot a
14 redistricting region here and there from minorities.
15 We have been conspicuously omitted, and I urge the
16 General Assembly not to abide by the Trump census
17 ban on Arab-Americans that prevented us from being
18 counted formally with the census, because there were
19 plans to do so. And I've submitted empirical
20 evidence to support the fact that there is that
21 population we have here based on voter turnouts,
22 assessments and the five year -- five years ago the
23 Census Bureau's decision to include MENA Americans
24 as a separate class to be counted.

1 I thank you for your time today and
2 appreciate your indulgence.

3 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Thank you, Judge. I do
4 see that --

5 JUDGE HADAD: Oh, by the way, one more
6 thing, Representative Kelly. Louise Cainkar and our
7 experts, stand ready to provide any live testimony
8 and their curriculum vitae to support our position
9 here. Thank you. I'm sorry to interrupt you.

10 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Thank you. And I see
11 Representative Butler has a question. Please
12 proceed Rep Butler.

13 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: Thank you, Madam
14 Chair.

15 I just wanted to, first of all,
16 Judge, could you pronounce your name? I know
17 there's a few different pronunciations.

18 JUDGE HADAD: Well, I -- the nuns at
19 St. Catherine of Siena called me Hadad, and now the
20 Arab-American community calls me Hadad, and my
21 daughter calls me Hadad now, so . . .

22 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: Those of us from
23 good Peoria heritage usually say Hadad, too, so I
24 just wanted to make sure I didn't get that wrong.

1 JUDGE HADAD: Say hi to the LaHoods for
2 me, please.

3 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: There you go. I
4 will. And first of all, I'm glad the White Sox gave
5 up 13 runs last night to the Iowa Cubs, so, you
6 know, that's good.

7 If you could, and I don't know if
8 Ms. McNamara has sent your information to our staff,
9 to the minority staff, Republican staff, but we
10 would like to see that information as well that
11 you've submitted, and we can get that, our staff,
12 Dan Weber who's on here, can get that from
13 Ms. McNamara, I would hope, if we haven't seen it
14 yet.

15 My question is, so you guys have done
16 a great job testifying at these hearings. A lot of
17 these groups have done -- a lot of the advocacy
18 groups have done a great job, and specifically about
19 southwest Cook, we've heard about this several
20 times. And it is your expectation now that you've
21 submitted this information, that you hope that a
22 district to you of what you've described would be
23 included in a -- whatever the revised maps are going
24 to be that we're going to vote on in 72 hours,

1 correct?

2 JUDGE HADAD: Correct, Mr. Butler, yes.

3 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: And do you know, I
4 know you've submitted to the Democratic staff, do
5 you know who's drawing the maps?

6 JUDGE HADAD: I don't know who's drawing
7 the maps. We have met with various people in the
8 last two years regarding this, the previous Speaker
9 and Chairman of the Democratic Party -- my brother
10 is a Republican Committeeman in York Township. We
11 have talked to everybody, and it seems that we're
12 not making very much progress until this opportunity
13 today.

14 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: Okay. I
15 appreciate that. Thank you very much.

16 JUDGE HADAD: Finally, I would tell you, I
17 could share on screen that report. I did send it to
18 Allie. I don't know if Allie McNamara is still on.
19 Maybe she could acknowledge receipt of the package I
20 scanned to her last night. Well, I don't want to
21 share screen and take up your time.

22 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Whatever materials you've
23 sent, I'm sure we'll be able to disseminate.

24 JUDGE HADAD: Well, thank you very much.

1 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Thank you. I see no
2 further questions for this witness, so we'll move to
3 our third witness who is Ryan Tolley of Change
4 Illinois.

5 MR. HARTMANN: I don't think Ryan's on.

6 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Okay. So no Ryan Tolley.
7 So that concludes our list of witnesses for this
8 hearing.

9 Any further comments or questions from any
10 of our members? Rep Butler, you still have your
11 hand up. Is that --

12 REPRESENTATIVE BUTLER: I just like having
13 my hand raised.

14 CHAIRMAN BURKE: Well, that's what I
15 figured.

16 Okay. So seeing no further questions or
17 comments, the hearing is concluded, and we will
18 recess to the call of the Chair. Thank you
19 everyone.

20 (Whereupon, at 12:30 p.m., the
21 hearing was adjourned.)
