SENATE BILLS ON FIRST READING

Having been reproduced, the following bills were taken up, read by title a first time and placed in the Committee on Rules: SENATE BILLS 320 (Drury), 473 (Martwick), 1591 (Crespo) and 1866 (Skillicorn).

SENATE RESOLUTIONS

The following Senate Joint Resolution, received from the Senate, was read by the Clerk and referred to the Committee on Rules: SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 16 (Bellock).

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 360

Offered by Representative Keith Wheeler:

WHEREAS, Subsection (b) of Section 2 of Article VIII (Finance) of the Constitution of Illinois states the following requirement: "Appropriations for a fiscal year shall not exceed funds estimated by the General Assembly to be available during that year."; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois is currently operating with no comprehensive budget in place for the previous two fiscal years; concurrently, the legislature has failed to adopt a revenue estimate as is constitutionally mandated in order to allow the budget-making process to proceed; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the constitutional obligation set forth in Subsection (b) of Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution, it is the duty of the Illinois legislature to adopt a revenue estimate for each and every fiscal year in order to have a basis from which to design a budget that is balanced; and

WHEREAS, In order to assist the legislature in meeting this end, subsection (a) of Section 4 of the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability Act directs the Commission to publish on the third Wednesday in March of each year, revised revenue estimates for the approaching fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, For FY 2018, the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability provides that Illinois will generate \$33.991 billion, including federal and State sources; with regard to the Subtotal of General Funds generated for FY 2018, the Commission reports that the State will have \$31.147 billion in total general revenues once allocations are made to the Refund Fund, the Fund for Advancement of Education, and the Commitment to Human Services Fund; and

WHEREAS, The Governor's Office of Management and Budget reports in its revenue estimate that for FY 2018, Illinois will generate a total of \$34.401 billion when including total federal and State sources; with regard to the Subtotal of General Funds generated for FY 2018, the Office reports that the State will have \$31.476 billion in total general revenues once allocations are made to the Refund Fund, the Fund for Advancement of Education, and the Commitment to Human Services Fund; the Office has included two key assumptions in the budget book, including \$300 million to be received from the sale of the Thompson Center and \$942 million in the Fund for Advancement of Education and the Commitment to Human Services Fund re-classification under general funds definitions; and

WHEREAS, With the estimates provided by the Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability and the Governor's Office of Management and Budget, the House of Representatives and the Senate have a proper basis from which to adopt a revenue estimate for FY 2018; House Joint Resolution 49, House Joint Resolution 50, and House Joint Resolution 51 of the 100th General Assembly have been filed and contain detailed explanations of the estimates for FY 2018 from both agencies; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the House of Representatives shall adopt a resolution that contains a revenue estimate for FY 2018 that will enable the legislature to devise a budget for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 2017, that is congruent and does not exceed the forecasted revenues for FY 2018, thereby meeting the General Assembly's constitutional obligation set forth in subsection (b) of Section 2 of Article VIII of the Illinois Constitution; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the House of Representatives to adopt House Joint Resolution 49, House Joint Resolution 50, and House Joint Resolution 51 of the 100th General Assembly in order to proceed with the budget-making process; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be delivered to the Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives, the President of the Illinois Senate, the House Minority Leader, and the Senate Minority Leader.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 361

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, America has more than 2,000,000 of its people in prison, which is more than any other developed nation in the world; and

WHEREAS, The vast majority (95%) of the men and women in our prisons will eventually return to their communities; and

WHEREAS, Few of those who return to their communities are prepared for their release, and often face barriers to reentry, such as serious physical and mental health problems, no place to stay, and lack of education or qualifications to hold a job; and

WHEREAS, One-third of all correction departments provide no services to released offenders, and most departments do not offer a transitional program, placing a heavy burden on families and communities; and

WHEREAS, Two-thirds of persons released will be rearrested for new crimes within the first 3 years after their release; and

WHEREAS, Congressman Danny K. Davis sponsored the Second Chance Act of 2007 for the purposes of providing transitional assistance to ex-offenders in coping with the challenges of re-entry, reducing recidivism, helping to reunite families and protect communities, and enhancing public safety; and

WHEREAS, The Second Chance Act of 2007 was signed into law on April 9, 2008; and

WHEREAS, The Second Chance Act of 2007 provides grants to state and local governments to promote the safe and successful reintegration of offenders into the community upon their release; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate July 3, 2017 and July 3, 2018 as Illinois Citizens Re-entry Day, to be observed in recognition of Congressman Danny K. Davis' work in helping to provide ex-offenders with a second chance and opportunity to re-enter society as productive citizens, and to encourage continuing support of such citizens as they re-enter their communities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President of the Senate, and Congressman Danny K. Davis.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 364

Offered by Representative Parkhurst:

WHEREAS, Studies in psychology, sociology, and criminology have demonstrated that violent offenders frequently have childhood and adolescent histories of serious and repeated cruelty towards companion animals; and

WHEREAS, Additionally, mental health professionals and top law enforcement officials consider the blatant disregard for life and suffering evidence by all forms of cruelty to companion animals to be an unquestionable warning sign of future violent behavior; and

WHEREAS, Intentional cruelty toward companion animals is of particular concern as it is a sign of psychological distress and often indicates an individual may be predisposed to committing acts of violence towards humans; and

WHEREAS, The American Psychiatric Association identifies cruelty to companion animals as one of the diagnostic criteria for conduct disorders; and

WHEREAS, Types of companion animal abuse include passive and active cruelty; and

WHEREAS, Passive cruelty is typified by cases of neglect such as starvation, lack of shelter, and failure to seek veterinary care; and

WHEREAS, Active cruelty is inflicted with deliberate intent to harm an animal creating immediate pain and suffering; and

WHEREAS, 70% of companion animals that are abused are dogs, and 20% are cats; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the citizens of Illinois to educate themselves on the signs and types of companion animal cruelty so that they can report it when they see it; and be it further RESOLVED, That we urge all owners of companion animals treat them with the utmost respect.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 367

Offered by Representative Phelps:

WHEREAS, After years of mismanagement, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development made the announcement to close the McBride and Elmwood public housing buildings of the Alexander County Housing Authority, rather than make any efforts to improve the living conditions of the people who live there; and

WHEREAS, It is unjust to evict the families currently residing in these housing developments, many of whom have no other place to turn; and

WHEREAS, The closure of these housing developments will not only cause devastation to the community of Cairo, but to Illinois as a whole, since many families living in these housing developments may choose to leave Southern Illinois or the State altogether; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Housing and Urban Development is shifting responsibility for the Alexander County Housing Authority and putting the families and the people of Cairo at risk; and

WHEREAS, The Governor must stand up for the people whom he represents and take action to help those that are being negatively impacted by the Cairo housing closures; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we strongly urge the Governor and the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to direct funds that would allow the rebuilding and repair of the Alexander County Housing Development in Cairo; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Governor, the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, the Alexander County Housing Authority, and the McBride and Elmwood public housing buildings.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 372

Offered by Representative Parkhurst:

WHEREAS, The American steel industry is vital to this country's manufacturing base, strategic infrastructure, and national security; and

WHEREAS, The steel industry and manufacturing in general has been significantly undermined by artificially low-price steel imports from foreign nations like China, that are selling their products in the United States at predatory prices; and

WHEREAS, Foreign steel overproduction and dumping into the U.S. economy puts American businesses and jobs in trouble, and puts our overall economy at risk; and

WHEREAS, The United States trade deficit with China in 2016 was more than \$347 billion; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Transit Authority recently awarded a contract order to build over 800 rail cars, totaling \$1.3 billion; reportedly, the lowest bid was to China Railroad Rolling Stock Corp. (CRRC), a company with documented quality deficiencies in projects in Boston, Massachusetts and Singapore; and

WHEREAS, Across the Midwest and throughout the country, thousands of steelworkers have been laid off in recent years, and as mills continue to operate well below their operational capacity due to Chinese steel

dumping and predatory bids on public contracts, more steelworkers and miners are at risk of losing their jobs; and

WHEREAS, There are 340,000 less manufacturing workers in Illinois than there were just 20 years ago; and

WHEREAS, Manufacturing lost 45,000 jobs nationwide in 2016, compared to more than two million gained in the entire economy; and

WHEREAS, These same workers are the taxpayers that provide the revenue needed to fund our nation's crumbling infrastructure, and their tax dollars should be spent on maximizing the creation of American manufacturing jobs, building American infrastructure, and restoring the economic vitality of our communities; and

WHEREAS, The decision to use taxpayer dollars to support Chinese-made manufacturers that are undercutting the American steel industry by illegal steel dumping practices, along with reports of flawed products that could potentially lead to dangerous accidents, is detrimental to the American economy, infrastructure, and national security; and

WHEREAS, A strong "buy American" domestic procurement preference for publicly funded infrastructure projects is vital to the health of the domestic steel industry, would help create manufacturing jobs and build American infrastructure, and would prevent future unfair competition from companies like CRRC; and

WHEREAS, Using Illinois taxpayer dollars on domestically-produced iron and steel and other American-manufactured products in our infrastructure projects will help struggling American families, strengthen our middle class, support the American manufacturing base, and stabilize our greater economy; and

WHEREAS, Any infrastructure project built with Illinois taxpayer dollars should - to every extent possible - include a preference by the State of Illinois to buy iron and steel that is produced in the United States, thus employing the very workers that pay the taxes for American infrastructure projects; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the State of Illinois should work to maximize the creation of American jobs and to stimulate economic growth and opportunity by spending Illinois taxpayer dollars on iron and steel that creates jobs and helps keep Americans employed; and be it further

RESOLVED, That it should be the policy of the State of Illinois and its localities, whenever and wherever possible, to use taxpayer dollars to purchase iron and steel that is produced in the United States, meaning that all manufacturing processes, from the initial melting stage through the application of coatings, occurs in the United States.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 376

Offered by Representative Lilly:

WHEREAS, Farm to School programs in Illinois schools teach students about the connection between healthy food and local farmers, and make it more likely that students will eat the fresh fruits and vegetables served in their school meals; and

WHEREAS, Illinois-grown produce, such as apples, purchased by schools and promoted in the cafeterias, brings an economic benefit to farmers in the community and across the State; and

WHEREAS, A school day celebration of Illinois produce, such as the Illinois Great Apple Crunch, makes it easy for schools to purchase Illinois-grown apples and celebrate agriculture and healthy food with their students through a cafeteria celebration and community education; the Illinois Great Apple Crunch is a day-long celebration of fresh, local apples from the Midwest; schools across the State of Illinois can participate by serving local apples on the lunch tray and crunching into them together as a school; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Farm to School Network, in partnership with the Illinois Agriculture in the Classroom program, is committed to helping schools participate in the Illinois Great Apple Crunch through the provision of educational materials and an online website and registration to support the day, and acknowledges the support of the Illinois Farm Bureau and the Illinois Specialty Growers Association in connecting to Illinois farmers; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Farm to School Network is committed to increasing the amount of locally grown food in schools, as well as agriculture education, and programs such as the Illinois Great Apple Crunch make it easy for schools to participate in these programs; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare October 12, 2017 as the "Illinois Great Apple Crunch Day"; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Illinois Department of Agriculture, the Illinois State Board of Education, and the Illinois School Nutrition Association.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 377

Offered by Representative Lang:

WHEREAS, From our nation's earliest days, Jewish Americans have been a critical part of our story; in the face of unspeakable discrimination and adversity, they have fought tirelessly to realize their piece of the American dream and the promise of our founding, holding tight to the belief that better days lay ahead; their relentless spirit and remarkable achievements have enriched our country, stirred our conscience, and challenged us to extend the miracles of freedom and security; during the month of May, we honor the vast contributions Jewish Americans have made to our world, and we recommit to standing up for the traditions we believe in and the values we share; and

WHEREAS, This year, Jewish American Heritage Month begins as the world commemorates the 72nd anniversary of the liberation of Dachau by American soldiers, and we are once again reminded that the vibrant culture of the Jewish people has not always been embraced; as tragic events show us all too often, Jewish communities continue to confront hostility and bigotry, including in America; our nation shares an obligation to condemn and combat anti-Semitism and hatred wherever it exists, and we remain committed to standing against the ugly tide of anti-Semitism in all its forms, including in the denial or trivialization of the Holocaust; and

WHEREAS, In celebrating the contributions of the Jewish people to the progress of our country, we also reaffirm America's unwavering commitment to the security of the State of Israel and the close bonds between our two nations and our peoples; and

WHEREAS, For centuries, Jews have reached for the blessings of freedom and opportunity in the United States; today, as pillars of their families and leaders in their communities, Jewish Americans represent a link in an unbroken chain of perseverance; during Jewish American Heritage Month, we celebrate the hard-fought progress won through struggle and sacrifice, and we rededicate ourselves to building a world where diversity is cherished and faith is protected; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May of 2017 as "Jewish American Heritage Month" in the State of Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 378

Offered by Representative Lang:

WHEREAS, Around 160,000 babies are born in the State of Illinois each year and maternal health and, more specifically, the mental health of women before, during, and after pregnancy is an issue of great concern to women and their families and is, therefore, of interest to the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Between 10 and 20% of new and expectant mothers are affected by perinatal depression and related mood disorders such as anxiety and psychosis, and they may experience associated symptoms, which are often overlooked and heavily stigmatized because new and expectant mothers suffering from a perinatal mood disorder often feel confused, ashamed, and isolated; and

WHEREAS, Many at-risk women may not seek help because they are not informed about perinatal depression and related mood disorders as part of their health care, because there is a lack of knowledge and use of screening and assessment tools, and because they are unaware of treatment and community supportive services for perinatal depression and related mood disorders; and

WHEREAS, Heightened awareness and increased education among all residents in the State of Illinois regarding the incidence of perinatal depression is critical; perinatal depression and related mood disorders affect all categories of women and teenage girls regardless of their age, race, or income level; perinatal depression can have a profound impact on the family and significantly contributes to adverse developmental and behavioral outcomes and attachment disorders in the young children of affected women; perinatal depression is highly treatable with therapeutic intervention such as medication, professional therapy and counseling, support groups, and community support services including crisis hotlines; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare May of 2017 as Maternal Mental Health Awareness Month in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the State of Illinois will encourage collaboration with State and national coalitions, organizations or agencies that are informed about and devoted to maternal mental health to facilitate increased awareness and education about perinatal depression and related mood disorders throughout the State, to explore and encourage the use of prenatal screening tools, and to improve the availability and access to effective treatment, prevention and support services for the promotion of maternal and infant mental health whenever possible in the State of Illinois.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 56

Offered by Representative Jones:

WHEREAS, Firefighter support groups like the Illinois Firefighter Peer Support (ILFFPS) team have championed the cause of emotional wellness in the fire service; and

WHEREAS, The ILFFPS and its 200 members in Illinois continue to provide peer support to firefighters in need; and

WHEREAS, The ILFFPS has shared its vision of emotional wellness in the fire service with Minnesota, Kentucky, Connecticut, North Carolina, Florida, and Alaska, and continues to reach out to firefighters in need in Illinois and beyond; and

WHEREAS, The Firefighter Behavioral Health Alliance (FBHA) is the only known organization in the United States that tracks and validates suicides among firefighters and emergency medical service responders; and

WHEREAS, Behavioral health and suicides are becoming recognized as major health issues for first responders; and

WHEREAS, More firefighters died by suicide in 2015 and 2016 than in the line of duty; and

WHEREAS, State government officials need to recognize behavioral health issues and support fire and EMS organizations with funding and policies to reduce these tragic events; and

WHEREAS, On May 19, 2017, at 9:00 pm, in recognition of Mental Health Awareness Month, the FBHA is asking fire and EMS organizations to place a rig(s) on their driveway and turn on their emergency lights for one minute to express support for all the families that have suffered a loss; and

WHEREAS, Community members are welcome to join their local participating location or stand in their own driveway and light a candle to remember a loved one; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDREDTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we recognize May 19, 2017 as a day to honor police officers and firefighters who have lost their lives and suffer from PTSD, depression, and other mental health issues; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Illinois Firefighter Peer Support team as a symbol of our respect and esteem.
