HOUSE RESOLUTION 691

Offered by Representative Coffey:

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives are disappointed to learn of the closure of the Springfield Regional Processing and Distribution Center of the United States Postal Service; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Postal Service has been a staple of American society during the 248 years of the American experiment, allowing communication and the flow of information from town to town, city to city, and state to state for generations; and

WHEREAS, A year before the official founding of the United States of America, the Continental Congress recognized the need for a postal service by appointing Benjamin Franklin to the office of Postmaster General in 1775; and

WHEREAS, Although advancements in technology and business have made the U.S. Postal Service seemingly a relic of the past, its importance cannot be overstated nor its significance to national security, secure correspondence, and tradition; and

WHEREAS, A local post office connects a small rural town to a larger interconnected network of nationwide communities while offering many beneficial functions, such as arranging the delivery of a care package to a loved one stationed overseas, providing passport applications and renewal services, and making available the purchase of money orders; and

WHEREAS, Massive central hubs and smaller distribution centers may be acceptable for privately owned businesses; however, the U.S. Postal Service is not a privately owned business but is instead a government-owned corporation; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Postal Service employs roughly 525,469 individuals nationwide, with its staff including mail carriers who deliver mail to your mailbox, mechanics who perform routine vehicle repairs, and clerks behind the counter who remain committed to providing passport services, selling stamps, and weighing and correcting postage for packages to be shipped; and

WHEREAS, The closure of the Springfield Regional Processing and Distribution Center extends beyond its employees, who will potentially lose their jobs, to local residents whose vital mail deliveries will experience delays; and

WHEREAS, The Springfield Regional Processing and Distribution Center employs many, and these individuals alongside various local leaders and other U.S. Postal Service employees recently voiced their

concerns regarding the loss of the Springfield Regional Processing and Distribution Center in a robust public gathering; and

WHEREAS, News regarding the closure of the Springfield Regional Processing and Distribution Center and additional processing and distribution centers across the country should not ring in indifferent ears but rather should concern each and every constituent in every district in every state; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge Postmaster General Louis DeJoy to reconsider closing the Springfield Regional Processing and Distribution Center; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to Postmaster General Louis DeJoy.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 692

Offered by Representative Davidsmeyer:

WHEREAS, The hard working people of Illinois paid over \$50 billion dollars in tax payments used by the State of Illinois, in addition to local and federal taxes; and

WHEREAS, Tax Freedom Day is an important date for the more than 340 million U.S. taxpayers and their families who pay federal and state taxes every year, because it marks the day when Americans as a whole have earned enough to pay their tax burden; and

WHEREAS, Tax Freedom Day has been calculated by the Taxpayer Federation back to the year 1900, when this day was January 22nd, using a methodology that calculates each dollar amount of net income paid by using the Department of Commerce's Bureau of Economic Analysis and allocations by each taxpayer's state of residence; and

WHEREAS, Tax Freedom Day is not only a significant symbolic date to recognize the hard work of all Illinoisans but also acknowledges the significant amount of taxes that come out of a taxpayer's yearly pay check; and

WHEREAS, Tax Freedom Day is an important time for citizens, lawmakers, educators, and all other entities who are impacted by taxes to observe this day to begin important conversations about fiscal responsibility and to increase taxpayer awareness; and

WHEREAS, All federal, State, and local governments should keep in mind Tax Freedom Day when making decisions on behalf of members of the public to insure collective freedom and prosperity; and

WHEREAS, In 2024, it will take until April 18th for most Americans to make enough income to pay off all their federal, state, and local taxes; this date is 109 days into the year and falls after Tax Day on April 15th; and

WHEREAS, Historically, Illinoisans have had to pay taxes eight additional days or more to pay off all their federal, state, and local taxes; and

WHEREAS, This date continues to show the increasing overall tax burden on all taxpayers, as the rate of taxation continues to lag behind the economy and inflation; and

WHEREAS, Americans continue to work longer to pay off all their taxes; in 2019, it took the average American 26 days to pay payroll taxes, 15 days to pay sales and excise taxes, 5 days to pay income taxes, 11 days to pay property taxes, and 6 days to pay estate taxes; and

WHEREAS, Illinois ranks in the top five states in terms of tax burdens; with Illinois Tax Freedom Day coming in May, it is beneficial to observe the federal Tax Freedom Day so the people of Illinois can reflect on their hard work and dedication to pay their share of the collected government budgets; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE ONE HUNDRED THIRD GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we declare April 18, 2024 as Tax Freedom Day in the State of Illinois.
