26TH LEGISLATIVE DAY

Perfunctory Session

TUESDAY, MARCH 8, 2005

At the hour of 2:01 o'clock p.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING OF BILL

The following bill was introduced, read by title a first time, ordered reproduced and placed in the Committee on Rules:

HOUSE BILL 4068. Introduced by Representative Krause, AN ACT concerning appropriations.

SENATE BILLS ON FIRST READING

Having been reproduced, the following bills were taken up, read by title a first time and placed in the Committee on Rules: SENATE BILLS 6 (Delgado), 74 (Joyce), 99 (Rose) and 123 (Black).

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 193

Offered by Representative McKeon:

WHEREAS, The AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP) provides access to treatment for low-income people living with HIV/AIDS who are uninsured or lack adequate prescription drug coverage; and

WHEREAS, ADAP assistance and the Ryan White CARE Act services provide a safety net for Americans who have no other means of accessing HIV medications; and

WHEREAS, Nearly 4,000 Illinoisans rely on Illinois ADAP for their lifesaving medications; and

WHEREAS, Many state ADAPs have been facing financial difficulties and are unable to meet the needs of those who depend on the program; and

WHEREAS, Twenty states have implemented restrictions to treatment access, including waiting lists in nine states, and eight states are anticipating new or additional restrictions in the next few months; and

WHEREAS. The number of people depending on ADAP continues to grow; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we call on the United States Congress to fully fund the AIDS Drug Assistance Program at \$1.037 billion in FY06; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we respectfully urge Congress to fully fund the essential health and social services that enable individuals to access ADAP and remain in care; the CARE Act should be fully funded at \$2.561 billion in FY06, an increase of \$513.35 million, which includes the requested amount for ADAP; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be presented to HIV/AIDS Chief Andre Rawls; Nancy Abraham, ADAP/CHIC Administrator; Dr. Eric Whitaker, Director of Public Health; and each member of the Illinois Congressional Delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 195

Offered by Representative Jakobsson:

WHEREAS, Social Security is based on a promise to the American people: if you work hard and contribute to Social Security, you will be able to retire and live in dignity; and

WHEREAS, Social Security is the primary source of income for two-thirds of American seniors; and

WHEREAS, As of December 2002 (the most recent data available), Social Security benefits for retired workers residing in the State of Illinois average only \$934.50 per month; and

WHEREAS, \$934.50 per month is insufficient to maintain a decent standard of living in many parts of Illinois, especially for seniors with relatively high health care costs; and

WHEREAS, The U.S. Congress has consistently spent the Social Security surplus on other programs, including tax cuts, which has created a long-term funding shortfall; and

WHEREAS, In 2001, President George W. Bush created the President's Commission to Strengthen Social Security (Bush Social Security Commission), naming as Commission members only those who advocated Social Security privatization and mandating that the proposals put forward by the Commission include privatization of Social Security; and

WHEREAS, The Bush Social Security Commission's proposed changes could reduce Social Security benefits to future retirees by as much as 46 percent; and

WHEREAS, Under the Bush Social Security Commission's proposal, the cuts in Social Security benefits would apply to all seniors, not just those who choose to participate in privatized accounts; and

WHEREAS, The cuts in Social Security benefits could be even deeper if individuals shift funds to privatized accounts; and

WHEREAS, Privatization advocates attempt to justify cuts in Social Security benefits by pointing to future projected shortfalls in the Social Security trust fund, but the diversion of payroll tax revenues from the trust fund into privatized accounts would substantially accelerate the date by which the Social Security trust fund would become insolvent; and

WHEREAS, In order to avoid accelerating the insolvency of the Social Security trust fund, the Bush Social Security Commission was forced to propose that the federal government incur as much as \$4,700,000,000,000 in federal debt (in today's dollars) by 2042; and

WHEREAS, The deep cuts in Social Security benefits proposed by the Bush Social Security Commission could jeopardize the financial security of not only thousands of Illinois residents, but also the security of millions of Americans; and

WHEREAS, It is recognized that Social Security faces future challenges, and powerful members in both the President's party and the opposition do not find privatizing the most successful government program as the solution; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the U.S. Congress to reject Social Security privatization proposals, such as those put forth by the President's Commission to Strengthen Social Security, that require deep cuts in Social Security benefits and massive federal borrowing; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to the President pro tempore of the U.S. Senate, the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives, and each member of the Illinois congressional delegation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 196

Offered by Representative Brosnahan:

WHEREAS, The Journalism Education Association and the National Scholastic Press Association will hold their JEA/NSPA Fall National High School Journalism Convention in 2005 in Chicago from November 10 through November 13; and

WHEREAS, Highlights of the convention include keynote addresses by some of the nation's top newsmakers and reporters; more than 200 learning sessions in newspaper, yearbook, photography, advising, press law, and more; special pre-convention and issue seminars; media and sight-seeing tours to top attractions and publications; on-site critiques and competitions, including the NSPA Best of Show and JEA Write-off competitions; information sharing at "Break with a Pro" and "Swap Shop"; and a trade show exhibit hall; and

WHEREAS, This convention is the largest fall gathering of student journalists in America; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that in honor of the JEA/NSPA Fall National High School Journalism Convention, we do hereby proclaim November 10, 2005, through November 13, 2005, as "High School Journalism Days" in the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Journalism Education Association and the National Scholastic Press Association as an expression of our respect and esteem and with best wishes for a successful convention.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 25

Offered by Representative Feigenholtz:

WHEREAS, It is important that a school district conduct all of the required checks into the background of any individual seeking employment with the school district; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we urge the State Board of Education to create a Records Check Clearinghouse Task Force; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the purpose of the Records Check Clearinghouse Task Force shall be to study various ways to facilitate the process that a school district must complete in conducting the required checks into the backgrounds of individuals for the purpose of employment with the school district under Sections 10-21.9 and 34-18.5 of the School Code; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Records Check Clearinghouse Task Force shall consist of the following members: 2 members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; 2 members appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; 2 members appointed by the President of the Senate; 2 members appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; the Director of State Police or his or her designee; 2 representatives of the Department of Children and Family Services appointed by the Director of Children and Family Services; a representative of a statewide organization representing school boards; 2 members, each representing a different statewide professional teachers' organization; a representative of a statewide organization representing regional superintendents of schools; a representative of a statewide organization representing sheriffs; and a representative of a statewide organization representing chiefs of police; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Records Check Clearinghouse Task Force shall meet at the call of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Records Check Clearinghouse Task Force shall file a report of its findings and recommendations with the Secretary of the House and the Clerk of the Senate on or before May 1, 2006, and, upon filing its report, the Task Force is dissolved; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to the State Board of Education, the Director of State Police, and the Director of Children and Family Services.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 26

Offered by Representative Saviano:

WHEREAS, The status of fragmented building requirements in Illinois is of serious concern to those involved in building, design, and construction; and

WHEREAS, Of the 102 counties in this State, less than half have adopted a building code; and

WHEREAS, Over 40 states have adopted some portion of a model building code; and

WHEREAS, Illinois already has adopted a statewide plumbing code and a statewide accessibility code; and

WHEREAS, Building codes promote public safety; and

WHEREAS, Illinois does not have a statewide building code, but does have a collection of building requirements not equitably administered and enforced within the construction industry; and

WHEREAS, Illinois citizens are entitled to safe, affordable, and responsible accommodations; therefore,

be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there is created a Task Force on a Uniform Building Code for the purpose of examining and making recommendations pertaining to the adoption of a uniform building code for the State of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall be comprised of 2 House members, one appointed by the Speaker of the House and one appointed by the House Minority Leader; 2 Senate members, one appointed by the Senate President and one appointed by the Senate Minority Leader; one person appointed by the Governor; one person appointed by an organization representing home builders; one person appointed by an organization representing the plumbing industry; one person appointed by an organization representing the Illinois construction industry council; one person appointed by an organization representing architects; one person appointed by an organization representing structural engineers; one person appointed by an organization representing building trades; one person appointed by an organization representing code administrators; one person appointed by an organization representing municipal governments in the State; one person appointed by the Office of the State Fire Marshal; and representatives of any other organizations that express their interest in participating to the Capital Development Board in writing; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force members shall serve on a voluntary basis and shall be responsible for any costs associated with their participation in the Task Force; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Task Force shall meet a minimum of 4 times; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Capital Development Board shall facilitate the Task Force and shall summarize its findings and recommendations in a written report to the Governor and the General Assembly no later than December 31, 2006; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this House Joint Resolution of the 94th General Assembly shall supersede House Resolutions 898 and 1205 of the 93rd General Assembly.
