94TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HOUSE BILL 3801

To the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives:

We, the conference committee appointed to consider the differences between the houses in relation to Senate Amendments Nos. 1 and 2 to House Bill 3801, recommend the following:

- (1) that the Senate recede from Senate Amendments Nos. 1 and 2; and
- (2) that House Bill 3801 be amended as follows:

by replacing everything after the enacting clause with the following:

"Section 1. Short title. This Act may be cited as the Medical School Matriculant Criminal History Records Check Act.

Section 5. Definitions.

"Matriculant" means an individual who is conditionally admitted as a student to a medical school located in Illinois, pending the medical school's consideration of his or her criminal history records check under this Act.

"Sex offender" means any person who is convicted pursuant to Illinois law or any substantially similar federal, Uniform Code of Military Justice, sister state, or foreign country law with any of the following sex offenses set forth in the Criminal Code of 1961:

- (1) Indecent solicitation of a child.
- (2) Sexual exploitation of a child.
- (3) Custodial sexual misconduct.
- (4) Exploitation of a child.
- (5) Child pornography.

"Violent felony" means any of the following offenses, as defined by the Criminal Code of 1961:

- (1) First degree murder.
- (2) Second degree murder.
- (3) Predatory criminal sexual assault of a child.
- (4) Aggravated criminal sexual assault.
- (5) Criminal sexual assault.
- (6) Aggravated arson.

- (7) Aggravated kidnapping.
- (8) Kidnapping.
- (9) Aggravated battery resulting in great bodily harm or permanent disability or disfigurement.

Section 10.Criminal history records check for matriculants. A medical school located in Illinois must require that each matriculant submit to a fingerprint-based criminal history records check for violent felony convictions and any adjudication of the matriculant as a sex offender conducted by the Department of State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation as part of the medical school admissions process. A medical school shall forward the name, sex, race, date of birth, social security number, and fingerprints of each of its matriculants to the Department of State Police to be searched against the the Statewide Sex Offender Database and the fingerprint records now and hereafter filed in the Department of State Police and Federal Bureau of Investigation criminal history records databases. The fingerprints of each matriculant must be submitted in the form and manner prescribed by the Department of State Police. The Department of State Police shall furnish, pursuant to positive identification, records of a matriculant's violent felony convictions and any record of a matriculant's adjudication as a sex offender to the medical school that requested the criminal history records check.

Section 15. Fees. The Department of State Police shall charge each requesting medical school a fee for conducting the criminal history records check under Section 10 of this Act, which shall be deposited in the State Police Services Fund and shall not exceed the cost of the inquiry. Each requesting medical school is solely responsible for payment of this fee to the Department of State Police. Each medical school may impose its own fee upon a matriculant to cover the cost of the criminal history records check at the time the matriculant submits to the criminal history records check.

Section 20.Admissions decision. The information collected under this Act as a result of the criminal history records check must be considered by the requesting medical school in determining whether or not to officially admit a matriculant. Upon a medical school's evaluation of a matriculant's criminal history records check, a matriculant who has been convicted of a violent felony conviction or adjudicated a sex offender may be precluded from gaining official admission to that medical school; however, a violent felony conviction or an adjudication as a sex offender shall not serve as an automatic bar to official admission to a medical school located in Illinois.

Section 25. Civil immunity. Except for wilful or wanton misconduct, no medical school acting under the provisions of this Act shall be civilly liable to any matriculant for any decision made pursuant to Section 20 of this Act.

Section 30. Applicability. This Act applies only to matriculants who are conditionally admitted to a medical school located in Illinois on or after the effective date of this Act.

Section 90. The Department of State Police Law of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois is amended by adding Section 2605-327 as follows:

(20 ILCS 2605/2605-327 new)

Sec. 2605-327. Conviction and sex offender information for medical school. Upon the request of a medical school under the Medical School Matriculant Criminal History Records Check Act, to ascertain whether a matriculant of the medical school has been convicted of any violent felony or has been adjudicated a sex offender. The Department shall furnish this information to the medical school that requested the information.

Pursuant to the Medical School Matriculant Criminal History Records Check Act, the Department shall conduct a fingerprint-based criminal history records check of the Statewide Sex Offender Database, the Illinois criminal history records database, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation criminal history records database. The Department may charge the requesting medical school a fee for conducting the fingerprint-based criminal history records check. The fee shall not exceed the cost of the inquiry and shall be deposited into the State Police Services Fund.

Section 99. Effective date. This Act takes effect upon becoming law.". Submitted on November 3, 2005.

At the hour of 11:04 o'clock a.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 724

Offered by Representative Moffitt:

WHEREAS, The members of the House of Representatives of the State of Illinois recognize the dedication and efforts of the March of Dimes Illinois Chapter and their volunteers who for over 67 years have been fighting for the health and well-being of America's children and are now taking on the problem of prematurity; and

WHEREAS, The March of Dimes Illinois Chapter has made a difference in the lives of over 22,000 premature babies born annually in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The March of Dimes Illinois Chapter is recognized for its programs to improve prematurity risk detection and prevent preterm births; and

WHEREAS, Thanks to the research and education programs funded by the March of Dimes, every premature baby born has an increased chance for survival; and

WHEREAS, The March of Dimes Illinois Chapter serves as a resource for information about healthy pregnancies and prematurity; and

WHEREAS, The March of Dimes Illinois Chapter works to increase awareness of the risk factors associated with premature birth such as smoking, drinking, and substance use; and

WHEREAS, The March of Dimes Illinois Chapter has successfully advocated to expand access to health coverage for pregnant women, infants, and children; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we do hereby proclaim November 15, 2005 as Premature Awareness Day in Illinois and encourage all citizens to be cognizant of the many wonderful and lifesaving services the March of Dimes Illinois Chapter provides to the people of Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the March of Dimes Illinois Chapter as an expression of our esteem.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 729

Offered by Representative McKeon:

WHEREAS, The AIDS epidemic continues to pervade our world, affecting both men and women of all ages and ethnicities; and

WHEREAS, Since the AIDS epidemic first surfaced in the United States, an estimated 929,985 AIDS cases have been reported, and approximately 524,000 or 56 percent of those individuals have lost their lives as a result of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Of those 929,985 reported cases, nearly 30,139 were from the State of Illinois; in 2003, there were 1,730 individuals diagnosed with AIDS in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The city of Chicago accounts for approximately 73 percent of all reported AIDS cases in Illinois; since 1981, at least 22,190 persons in Chicago have been diagnosed with AIDS, and at least 11,931 of those individuals have died; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of the State of Illinois has provided increasing funds to raise greater awareness of AIDS, support cutting-edge research and treatment, and provide counseling and testing

services to the citizens of this State; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois proudly joins the City of Chicago in the continuing fight against AIDS; on December 1, 2005, citizens representing coalitions and faith-based organizations throughout the Chicago area have joined with the Chicago Department of Public Health to sponsor World AIDS Day 2005, which is a globally recognized event each year; and

WHEREAS, World AIDS Day is an opportunity to educate citizens about AIDS, to pay tribute to the many lives that have been lost, and to express support for the ongoing efforts to one day find a cure for this devastating epidemic; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we do hereby proclaim December 1, 2005 as World AIDS Day in Illinois, and urge all citizens to join in this very meaningful and poignant observance.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 732

Offered by Representative Mendoza:

WHEREAS, The Illinois House of Representatives is pleased to acknowledge the outstanding achievements of those individuals who strive to improve not only themselves, but the world around them; and

WHEREAS, Emmanuel Ofosu Yeboah, from the African country of Ghana, is a man who has excelled both as an athlete and as a champion for the rights of the disabled; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Yeboah had many challenges to overcome in his early life; he was born without a tibia in his right leg, which left his leg useless and withered; and

WHEREAS, In Ghana, at the time, it was a commonly-held belief that a deformity of a child was caused by a sin of the mother; because of his son's deformed leg, Mr. Yeboah's father abandoned his family, and the friends of Mr. Yeboah's mother encouraged her to kill or, at the very least, abandon her disabled son; and

WHEREAS, Comfort Yeboah, Emmanuel Ofosu Yeboah's mother, chose, instead, to nurture and encourage her firstborn son; Comfort Yeboah made the radical decision to send her disabled son to primary school instead of sending him to the streets as a beggar; and

WHEREAS, Comfort Yeboah died when her son was 13, and Emmanuel Ofosu Yeboah was forced to drop out of school; he moved to Accra, the capital of Ghana, where he shined shoes for \$2 a day; and

WHEREAS, Seeking to prove that a disability is not an insurmountable challenge, in September of 2001, Mr. Yeboah, with the support of the Challenged Athletes Foundation, embarked on a bicycle ride across his home country; with the use of only one leg and wearing a shirt that read "The Pozo", which is slang for a disabled person, Mr. Yeboah completed the 379-mile ride across Ghana; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Yeboah's courageous efforts garnered media attention both in Ghana and around the world; Mr. Yeboah has used that media attention to champion the rights of the disabled; and

WHEREAS, In cooperation with King Osagyefuo Amotia Ofori Panin of Akyem Abuadwa and with the Free Wheelchair Mission, Mr. Yeboah has helped provide free wheelchairs to disabled persons around the world; since 2001, the Free Wheelchair Mission has distributed more than 24,000 wheelchairs in 37 developing countries, including Afghanistan, Angola, Egypt, Ghana, Haiti, Iraq, Liberia, Rwanda, and Zambia: and

WHEREAS, In his home country, Mr. Yeboah has started a cycling team, a wheelchair basketball team, and a running team for physically challenged athletes, and he is currently working on starting a sports academy for disabled athletes; and

WHEREAS, The government of Ghana is taking steps to improve the quality of life for its disabled citizens; in September of 2005, the government of Ghana indicated that, during its next session, the Parliament of Ghana would pass a Disability Bill to help remove barriers and obstacles that obscure the developmental efforts of people with disabilities; and

WHEREAS, The efforts of Emmanuel Ofosu Yeboah, King Osagyefuo, the Parliament of Ghana, and countless others have gone a long way toward allowing persons with disabilities to live with purpose and dignity, but, as always, more can be done; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize and applaud the outstanding achievements of Emmanuel Ofosu Yeboah both as an athlete and as a champion for the rights of the disabled; and be it

further

RESOLVED, That we urge the Parliament of Ghana to increase its efforts to protect and improve the lives of its disabled citizens and to pass conscientious legislation to ensure the rights of the disabled; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we applaud King Osagyefuo Amotia Ofori Panin of Akyem Abuadwa for using his name and authority to improve the status of Ghana's many physically disabled persons; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we urge the citizens of Illinois to take part in the continuing efforts around the globe to make it possible for those with physical disabilities to live their lives with purpose, dignity, and value; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be delivered to Emmanuel Ofosu Yeboah, King Osagyefuo Amotia Ofori Panin, and the Parliament of Ghana.
