HOUSE RESOLUTION 1038

Offered by Representative Delgado:

WHEREAS, The mission of the YMCA is to build strong kids, strong families, and strong communities through programs that focus on developing a healthy mind, body, and spirit for all; and

WHEREAS, Our children's health is a concern for the whole community; because parents can be the best role models for their kids, and kids' health habits mirror those of their parents and other adult role models, YMCA Healthy Kids Day is a great time for communities to come together to learn more about healthier lifestyles; and

WHEREAS, Among children and teens ages 6 to 19 in the United States, 16 percent (over 9 million) are overweight according to the Centers for Disease Control 1999-2002 data, or triple what the proportion was in 1980, and 29 percent of low-income children between 2 and 5 years of age in Illinois are overweight or at risk of becoming overweight; and

WHEREAS, YMCAs throughout Illinois are dedicated to providing programs and services to over 384,000 youth between the ages of one and seventeen; and

WHEREAS, Community-based responses alleviate the growing epidemic of obesity and physical inactivity, particularly among young people; and

WHEREAS, YMCA Healthy Kids Day is a national event celebrating healthy living and helping kids and families embrace habits that can become a lifelong practice; and

WHEREAS, On April 8, 2006, YMCAs throughout the nation and the State of Illinois will sponsor YMCA Healthy Kids Day to help our youth become more healthy; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we join YMCAs in the State of Illinois, and throughout the nation in the fight against childhood obesity by recognizing April 8, 2006, as YMCA Healthy Kids Day; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to participating YMCAs in Illinois.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1039

Offered by Representative Bellock:

WHEREAS, The Illinois National Guard (ING) Grant, the Illinois Veteran Grant (IVG) Program, and the MIA-POW Scholarship Program are entitlement programs that are awarded to eligible recipients regardless of the funding level for the programs; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois National Guard Grant is awarded to applicants who are on active status and have served for at least one year in the Illinois National Guard; a grant recipient is entitled to receive payment of tuition and eligible fees at all Illinois public universities or public community colleges for a period equivalent to 8 semesters or 12 quarters of full-time enrollment; there is no minimum enrollment requirement and non-credit courses are eligible for the ING Grant; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Veteran Grant is awarded to applicants who are members of the Armed Forces of the United States and have served at least one year of active duty and whose separation from such service has been characterized as honorable; a grant recipient is entitled to receive payment of tuition and certain fees for either undergraduate or graduate study at any Illinois public college or university or community college for a period that is the equivalent of four academic years of full-time enrollment, including summer terms; there is no minimum enrollment requirement and audit and non-credit courses are eligible for the IVG Program; and

WHEREAS, The MIA-POW Scholarship is awarded to dependents of Illinois residents declared to be missing in action or prisoners of war; and

WHEREAS, The community colleges of the State have not received sufficient funds from the State to cover the costs of these entitlement grants, which, in turn, forces the community colleges to waive the remaining tuition expenses that have not been covered by the State and to, subsequently, raise tuition; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the community colleges of the State are entitled to reimbursement for the costs incurred in the administration of the ING Grant, the IVG Program, and the MIA-POW Scholarship; and be it further

RESOLVED, That for the 2005-2006 academic year, the following community colleges are entitled to reimbursement from the General Revenue Fund in the following amounts:

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1040

Offered by Representative McKeon:

WHEREAS, The capital construction program proposed by the Governor is estimated to generate 230,000 new living wage jobs across Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The proposed program intends to invest over \$6 billion in capital projects that would build critical roads, improve mass transit, and construct and maintain the quality of school buildings; and

WHEREAS, This program would provide a needed avenue to provide employment for disadvantaged job seekers and the opportunity to improve State and federally funded training programs that ready job seekers for skilled placements; and

WHEREAS, Access and placement into living wage jobs is one of the main challenges faced by low-income and disadvantaged individuals and families; over 71% of participants surveyed at Illinois Workforce Investment Board Act programs in Chicago asked for assistance with job search and job leads, the most requested service; and

WHEREAS, Women and minorities continue to be underrepresented in the construction industry workforce and face barriers that limit access and retention in such jobs; and

WHEREAS, Families transitioning off of welfare are having difficulty accessing jobs, with almost half of the surveyed families in Illinois not finding employment in 2003; ninety percent of the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families caseload who did find work remained in poverty; and

WHEREAS, Even for families with working members, income is oftentimes insufficient for self-sufficiency; in Illinois, the wage needed for a family of four to be self-sufficient ranges from \$36,408 to \$43,704; and

WHEREAS, While finding and maintaining employment is crucial for ex-offenders re-entering society, employment and job placement continues to be a serious challenge; studies of ex-offenders in Illinois indicate that only 28% of those surveyed in 2005 had some form of employment a year after their release; and

WHEREAS, Jobs generated through the capital construction program offer Illinois an opportunity to provide employment with sufficient wages to populations that need employment the most by expanding job opportunities for disadvantaged and underrepresented populations; and

WHEREAS, In order to connect individuals with jobs generated by the capital construction program, a greater pool of skilled applicants is necessary; training opportunities need to be made available to disadvantaged and underrepresented populations to contribute to expanding the qualified workforce; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Governor and the General Assembly establish goals and mechanisms that will increase the participation of disadvantaged and underrepresented groups in the workforce and ensure that the benefits of the capital construction program will reach all populations in Illinois; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be presented to the Governor of the State of Illinois, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, the Director of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, and the Secretary of Transportation.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1050

Offered by Representative Feigenholtz:

WHEREAS, The Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) currently operates an extremely

valuable, productive Datawarehouse, providing the agency with unmatched capability and reliability in understanding its various Medicaid programs; and

WHEREAS, This comprehensive understanding of the program has allowed the agency to implement program efficiencies worth hundreds of millions of dollars; and

WHEREAS, Segments of Medicaid as well as other State-operated healthcare programs providing essential benefits to thousands of Illinois citizens and that are, ideally, designed to be interdependent with Medicaid, reside at other State agencies and, unfortunately, operate in almost complete isolation, consequently producing sub-optimal healthcare outcomes for the most chronically ill of Illinois citizens; and

WHEREAS, Given the current fiscal climate, it is absolutely critical that scarce State dollars be invested as wisely as possible so as to produce optimal health outcomes for Illinois citizens; and

WHEREAS, Comprehensive information exchange among State agencies allows for better management, leading to better health outcomes and more efficient use of State resources; and

WHEREAS, To cite a significant example, of the 75,000 annual Medicaid births, fully 1/3, that is 25,000, are deemed non-normal; and

WHEREAS, These 25,000 non-normal births, aside from the onerous toll extracted on the child, cost the State over \$200 million annually; and

WHEREAS, In this day and age, it is completely unacceptable that 25,000 babies each and every year are subjected to this misery and distress when we already have at our disposal the tools that, properly utilized, would alleviate this tragedy; and

WHEREAS, Integrating the currently isolated Women, Infants and Children data residing exclusively at the Department of Human Services (DHS) into the Datawarehouse would allow the State to identify and proactively assist these most-at-risk pregnant women; and

WHEREAS, Such proactive data management, coupled with targeted outreach efforts, may halve the number of non-normal births, thus saving \$100 million; and

WHEREAS, There are dozens of additional examples of currently isolated programs that, if incorporated into the Datawarehouse, would dramatically improve Illinoisan health outcomes while preserving millions of scarce State dollars; and

WHEREAS, The original vision - and the most logical end - for the Datawarehouse is that of a comprehensive repository allowing for one-stop service, thereby facilitating the most effective and cost-efficient manner of providing healthcare to our clients; and

WHEREAS, Such an expansion would predominantly be funded by the federal government; and

WHEREAS, Public Act 94-0267, effective July 19, 2005, mandated an expansion of the Datawarehouse to encompass all other isolated healthcare data sources at DHS and the Department of Public Health, and yet, perplexingly, absolutely no movement has been made toward this end; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that owing it to Illinois taxpayers and, most importantly, to the very individuals who rely heavily on all of us in State government, the Department of Healthcare and Family Services shall immediately expand the superlative Datawarehouse, incorporating currently isolated healthcare data residing at other State agencies, so as to effectuate significantly improved health outcomes for the neediest of our citizens; and be it further

RESOLVED, That suitable copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Director of Healthcare and Family Services and to the Governor.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 109

Offered by Representative Howard:

WHEREAS, Untreated drug offenders are the cause of crime in many of our communities and those communities across Illinois become "victims" as a result of State policy of incarcerating and not treating low-level non-violent offenders; and

WHEREAS, The answer for reducing crime is both to change public perception and legislative strategies so that low-level drug use is perceived and treated as a public and mental health issue and to require a prevention strategy; and

WHEREAS, Communities are alarmed at the high rate of drug offenders returning to Illinois communities without rehabilitation and stripped of employment, housing, and education prospects, creating

volatile conditions in our neighborhoods; and

WHEREAS, These barriers to employment, housing, education, and other basic needs force many non-violent drug offenders into a cycle of escalating criminal activity; and

WHEREAS, The Developing Justice Coalition, a statewide alliance of dozens of community groups, and other community-level organizations are working together with legislators, the business community, bar associations, and academia to define and combat the critical public safety problems that are proliferated across the State by the cycle of untreated drug abuse, violence, incarceration, and barriers to prisoner reentry; and

WHEREAS, This cycle threatens the very foundation of our communities as more families are devastated by untreated drug addictions, while the process of incarceration and reentry has become commonplace and a major eroding factor in some Illinois communities; and

WHEREAS, Illinois spends millions of dollars each year incarcerating the same nonviolent drug offenders, many of whom cycle in and out of prison on an ongoing basis at great expense to the taxpayers; and

WHEREAS, Every year, the number of arrests for drug offenses is increasing, with over 70,000 people arrested for drug offenses in Illinois in 2004; and

WHEREAS, Every year, counties send a new record number of admission of non-violent drug offenders to Illinois State prisons; and

WHEREAS, In 2005 alone, more than 11,000 people were imprisoned in Illinois for low-level, nonviolent drug offenses at a cost of more than \$249 million annually; and

WHEREAS, Illinois law currently contains provision for diversion away from prison toward more effective treatment, but the existing laws are either inadequate, improperly applied, or lack resources for implementation; and

WHEREAS, In FY 2005, a record number of nearly 40,000 people were released into Illinois communities with little or no resources, and tens of thousands of the ex-offenders returned to Illinois neighborhoods with untreated drug addictions; and

WHEREAS, In 2005, with the recidivism rate of 54.6%, most non-violent drug offenders will return to prison within three years; and

WHEREAS, Members of the Illinois General Assembly have come to understand that we cannot arrest ourselves out of this problem, nor can we cure addicted people by warehousing them; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly wishes to examine the creation of a system of sanctions that utilizes diversion in appropriate cases and reduces the escalating cost of Corrections by eliminating mandatory sentencing and incarceration for low-level nonviolent drug offenses and provides the universal option of treatment, counseling, and community service instead and wishes to explore whether such a system will save valuable state funds, increase the public safety in our communities, reduce the state prison population, and help low-level nonviolent drug offenders learn to function as profitable members of our communities; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-FOURTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Illinois General Assembly mandates that its members shall participate in a series of public hearings beginning in May, 2006, aimed at defining the depth of the problems associated with untreated drug addictions and to find ways to identify resources to support treatment, to identify policy changes that can improve diversion opportunities and outcomes, and to develop solutions that will address the public safety concerns of residents of Illinois communities; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a report on the findings and recommendations shall be delivered to the General Assembly during the 2006 Veto Session.
