enemy lines for 3 months before being found 1,000 miles from their destination point; he was honorably discharged in 1946 and, as of today, is one of only 3 remaining African Americans who fought in the Battle of the Bulge, during this last-gasp effort by the German army; and

WHEREAS, John Slater, Sr. settled in Waukegan in 1947 and began working for American Motors in 1949; he later worked as a Floater for 30 years at American Motors in Kenosha, Wisconsin, before retiring in 1978; he opened Slater's Barbecue in 1957 on Market Street in Waukegan and it became one of the most affluent establishments in the area with people coming from all over the North Shore for his famous home-made foot-longs and ribs; and

WHEREAS, John Slater, Sr. has been a pioneer business man within the community of Waukegan; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize John Daniel Slater, Sr. on his lifetime of accomplishments, and wish him the best in all his future endeavors; and be it further

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 895

Offered by Representative Chapa LaVia:

WHEREAS, Thousands of young students participate in high school athletic and academic competitions in Illinois each school year; and

WHEREAS, High school athletic and academic contests are an integral part of all communities across Illinois, both small and large; and

WHEREAS, Public high school athletic and academic programs belong to the taxpayers who fund their local school districts across Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The health and safety of those students and student athletes is of paramount importance; and WHEREAS, School districts incur substantial costs to enable students and student athletes to have broad athletic and academic opportunities; and

WHEREAS, The State Board of Education provides general oversight to school districts throughout Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois High School Athletic Association (IHSA) provides oversight and administrative assistance to school athletic programs and other extra-curricular programs; and

WHEREAS, The IHSA regulates, or has attempted to regulate, access to high school athletic and academic events, including access by members of local community media organizations; and

WHEREAS, The IHSA has entered into exclusive contracts with vendors and suppliers to identify particular types of balls, bats, and other athletic equipment and clothing that are required to be used by IHSA members, in return for monetary compensation to the IHSA; and

WHEREAS, The IHSA and other state athletic associations have discussed a national venture to control access to and distribution of video and other media coverage of publicly funded high school athletic and academic competitions; and

WHEREAS, The IHSA has refused to make public exclusive contracts with vendors and suppliers of "the official state basketball" and similar contracts, including the income to IHSA from such sponsorships; and

WHEREAS, Illinois high schools should be aware of the funds generated by these contracts between the IHSA and vendors and suppliers, as well as the revenues generated by the athletic and academic contests in which Illinois's student athletes participate; and

WHEREAS, With few exceptions, IHSA members may compete only with other IHSA members in athletic and academic contests (IHSA Constitution Section 2.050) resulting in virtual mandatory membership in the IHSA for schools; and

WHEREAS, The United States Court of Appeals for the Seventh Circuit's final holding in the case of Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association, and American, Inc. v. Gannett Co., Inc., and Wisconsin Newspaper Association.658 F.3d 614, is contrary to the public policy of the State of Illinois, and it is incumbent upon this General Assembly to enact legislation to properly re-state the policy of the State; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the House Committee on Elementary and Secondary Education be encouraged to hold subject matter hearings on the issues presented by this Resolution, the administration and funding of high school sports, the safety of high school athletes, the systems and protocols of the IHSA, the costs and income associated with the administration of high school sports (including any trademarks or copyrights claimed by the IHSA) and the feasibility of statutorily transferring the duties and functions of the IHSA to the Illinois State Board of Education; the committee is further asked to examine the issues of transparency and accountability in relation to high school athletic and academic programs in Illinois; the Committee is encouraged to make recommendations to the full House of Representatives on these issues.

WHEREAS, The Department of Central Management Services has been cited by the Illinois Auditor General for weaknesses in internal controls over financial reporting, a condition that has existed since 2007; and

WHEREAS, These 7 revolving funds earned revenues of \$566,000,000 in FY'12 and \$500,000,000 in FY'13; and

WHEREAS, 92% of the FY'12 revenues and 90% of the FY'13 revenues to 5 of the revolving funds (Facilities Management, Statistical Services, Communications, State Garage, State Surplus Property) were from billings to State agencies; and

WHEREAS, During FY'12, these 5 revolving funds operated at a surplus of \$54,000,000, and in FY'13, a deficit of \$35,000,000; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Central Management Services also receives revenues for these revolving funds from non-State agency sources; and

WHEREAS, Between FY'10 and FY'14, while overall State appropriations have risen 12%, Department of Central Management Services appropriations have risen 420%; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that the Auditor General is directed to conduct a management audit of the Department of Central Management Services for the period FY'12 through FY'14; and be it further

RESOLVED, This management audit include, but not be limited to, the following determinations:

1) An examination of the rate setting process and policies that are used to charge State agencies for administrative functions paid through the revolving funds;

2) An examination of the billings and revenues in the revolving funds;

3) An examination of the expenses paid with funds maintained in the revolving funds;

4) An examination of the procurement process utilized by the Department of Central Management Services to ascertain if it follows relevant laws, rules, policies, and procedures and meets the needs of the State agencies being served; and

5) An examination of the hiring process utilized by the Department of Central Management Services to ascertain if it supports the needs of the State agencies it serves; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Department of Central Management Services and any other State agency or other entity or person that may have information relevant to this audit cooperate fully and promptly with the Auditor General's Office in its audit; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Auditor General commence this audit as soon as practical and report his findings and recommendations upon completion in accordance with the provisions of Section 3-14 of the Illinois State Auditing Act; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a suitable copy of this resolution be presented to the Auditor General.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 899

Offered by Representative Evans:

WHEREAS, The Calumet region's first steel mill began operating in 1875 and for many decades prospered the community under the banner of International Harvester's mighty Wisconsin Steel Works, which crafted steel moldings for heavy vehicles that provided a strong and reliable economic engine for the national economy; and

WHEREAS, Wisconsin Steel Works ran powerful and steady for more than a century until the decline of the domestic steel market in the early 1980s; and

WHEREAS, The mill operated in an era that was unaware of environmental impacts on the land; and

WHEREAS, The later-found burden of contamination prevented redevelopment of the vast swath of land set in the heart of southeast Chicago's South Deering community; and

WHEREAS, Navistar, Inc. (formerly International Harvester) pursued and entered into a 1996 agreement with the United States Department of Commerce to assume corporate responsibility for the comprehensive remediation of the site under the guidance of the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency's Site Remediation Program; and

WHEREAS, Navistar's environmental project team conducted multiple years of environmental testing, analysis, assessment, planning, and implementation in support of the comprehensive remedial action; and

WHEREAS, On December 20, 2013, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency granted the 13th and final No Further Remediation letter for the respective tracts of the former Wisconsin Steel Works site; and

WHEREAS, The remediated site has been sold for redevelopment and now hosts multiple businesses that newly contribute to the economic prosperity of southeast Chicago; therefore, be it RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we recognize Navistar, Inc. for its initiative in assuming responsibility for the site environmental remediation project; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend Navistar and its project team - environmental consultant ARCADIS and environmental communications specialist EnviroCom - for steadfast commitment, engineering excellence, and well-attuned stakeholder engagement which resulted in the remarkable success of the project; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we commend the staff of the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency Site Remediation Program for outstanding civil service; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we state our belief that the environmental cleanup of the Former Wisconsin Steel Works site exemplifies a high benchmark in Illinois for the collaboration of corporate citizenship, federal guidance, State programming, city interaction, applied technical excellence, and fully-connected community relations; and be it further

RESOLVED, That we state our belief that the environmental remediation project offers not only a fitting epilogue for the once mighty Wisconsin Steel Works, but, in great measure, presents the hope and promise of a bright future for the southeast Chicago community that lives to thrive again.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 900

Offered by Representative Ford:

WHEREAS, The World Kindness Movement is an organization with no religious or political affiliation whose chief objective is to foster goodwill among the local, national, and international communities; by way of kindness, the movement hopes to create greater understanding and co-operation between all people and nations throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, The World Kindness Movement was conceived at a Tokyo conference in 1996 when founders of the Small Kindness Movement in Japan brought together like-minded individuals from around the world who had started kindness movements in their own countries; a second conference was held in 1997 in which the World Kindness Movement was formed, with the founding members being the countries of Japan, Singapore, Australia, Canada, Thailand, the United Kingdom, and the United States; the movement was officially launched in Singapore in November of 2000 at the Third WKM Conference with 33 delegates from 22 countries; and

WHEREAS, The date decreed for World Kindness Day is November 13 of each year, which was the opening day of the first World Kindness Movement conference held in Tokyo in 1998, and the 35th anniversary of the Small Kindness Movement of Japan, which brought the signatories of the 'declaration of kindness' of the World Kindness Movement together in 1997; and

WHEREAS, Individuals can help implement the goal of the World Kindness Movement by themselves being kind and helping others; therefore, be it

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 85

Offered by Representative Gabel:

WHEREAS, Despite an increased focus on improving the quality of care in the United States, our nation's healthcare system often remains fractured, with misaligned payment systems, a lack of information and transparency, and gaps in care delivery; and

WHEREAS, The healthcare marketplace has traditionally rewarded our providers for the volume of care they deliver; even though utilization of healthcare is high, there are significant differences between the healthcare that should be received and the healthcare that is actually received; those gaps result in increased costs, and in some cases, harm to patients; and WHEREAS, The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act contains provisions that are facilitating a shift from volume of services provided to the value of services provided by linking provider and physician payment to quality of care and patient outcomes; and

WHEREAS, The Institute of Medicine defines healthcare quality as "the degree to which health services for individuals and populations increase the likelihood of desired health outcomes and are consistent with current professional knowledge" and has recommended that the United States healthcare system be aligned to deliver care meeting 6 aims critical to quality improvement, including care that is safe, effective, patientcentered, timely, efficient, and equitable; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Health and Human Services was tasked by the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act to convene public and private stakeholders to establish a National Quality Strategy focused on 6 priorities: safety, care coordination, population/community health, clinical care, patient and care-giver centered experience and outcomes, and efficiency and cost reduction; public and private entities are encouraged to align their activities to reach these common aims; and

WHEREAS, Working from this common understanding of quality, experts have developed hundreds of quality measures in use today and continue to develop and refine new ones; and

WHEREAS, Measures of quality should be evidence-based, consistent with nationally-recognized practice guidelines and endorsed through a multi-stakeholder consensus-based organization (i.e., National Quality Forum); and

WHEREAS, The trends of linking quality of care to reimbursement and using quality information to inform patient choices will continue to grow as they are critically important to ensuring that healthcare reforms preserve and enhance the quality of healthcare; and

WHEREAS, Evidence-based cost and quality measures will help the healthcare system evolve from one rewarded for the volume of services to one promoting the value of services; and

WHEREAS, Because medical advances occur rapidly, quality measures need to be updated regularly to reflect the latest medical knowledge and continuous reassessment is required to avoid penalizing early adopters of care improvement and to facilitate medical innovations; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that we support the application of evidence-based multi-stakeholder endorsed (National Quality Forum) quality measures and requirements that health plans and providers report publicly on quality performance to improve patient outcomes and better inform patient choices in state Health Insurance Marketplaces and state-funded healthcare programs, including Medicaid.

# HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTIONS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS FIRST READING

Representative Kosel introduced the following:

# HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 50

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to amend the Illinois Constitution by changing Section 6 of Article 4 as follows:

#### ARTICLE IV THE LEGISLATURE

#### SECTION 6. ORGANIZATION

(a) A majority of the members elected to each house constitutes a quorum.

(b) On the first day of the January session of the General Assembly in odd-numbered years, the Secretary of State shall convene the House of Representatives to elect from its membership a Speaker of the House of Representatives as presiding officer, and the Governor shall convene the Senate to elect from its membership a President of the Senate as presiding officer. <u>A person shall not serve more than a total of 8 years in the office of the House of Representatives</u>, President of the Senate, Minority Leader of the House of Representatives, <u>Assistant Majority Leader of the Senate</u>, <u>Assistant Minority Leader in the Senate</u>, <u>Assistant Majority Leader in the House of Representatives</u>, <u>Assistant Minority Leader in the House of Representatives</u>, <u>Assistant Minority Leader in the House of Representatives</u>, <u>Assistant Minority Leader in the House of Representatives</u>, <u>Majority Caucus Chairman in the Senate</u>, <u>Majority Conference Chairman in the Senate</u>, <u>Majority Caucus Chairman in the Senate</u>,

the House of Representatives, and the Minority Conference Chairman in the House of Representatives; provided that service before the second Wednesday in January of 2015 shall not be considered in the calculation of a person's service.

(c) For purposes of powers of appointment conferred by this Constitution, the Minority Leader of either house is a member of the numerically strongest political party other than the party to which the Speaker or the President belongs, as the case may be.

(d) Each house shall determine the rules of its proceedings, judge the elections, returns and qualifications of its members and choose its officers. No member shall be expelled by either house, except by a vote of two-thirds of the members elected to that house. A member may be expelled only once for the same offense. Each house may punish by imprisonment any person, not a member, guilty of disrespect to the house by disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence. Imprisonment shall not extend beyond twenty-four hours at one time unless the person persists in disorderly or contemptuous behavior. (Source: Illinois Constitution.)

#### **SCHEDULE**

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.
