Perfunctory Session

TUESDAY, MAY 13, 2014

At the hour of 2:05 o'clock p.m., the House convened perfunctory session.

HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 1096

Offered by Representative McAuliffe:

WHEREAS, The 3-day National Football League Player Selection Meeting, commonly known as the "NFL Draft", is one of the most widely-viewed sports events on worldwide television that does not involve an athletic contest; and

WHEREAS, The signing, by the Chicago Bears, of University of Illinois great "Red" Grange in 1925 was the first significant transition of a college football superstar to the National Football League, setting the stage for the coming century of "America's game"; and

WHEREAS, The owner/founder of the Chicago Bears, George Halas, is a key figure in the history of the National Football League, recognized as such through the George Halas Trophy, awarded annually to the champion of the National Football Conference (NFC) within the National Football League; and

WHEREAS, Twenty-nine of the 500 firms listed in the Fortune 500 list are headquartered in the greater Chicago area, including many firms that partner with the National Football League and its 32 teams in a variety of ways; and

WHEREAS, The members of the Illinois House of Representatives believe that the Chicago area will be a superb location and headquarters for the annual NFL Draft; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we invite the National Football League to hold the National Football League Player Selection Meeting in the Chicago area as a gesture to the heritage of the NFL and a gesture toward the future; and be it further

RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be presented to Roger Goodell, Commissioner of the National Football League, George McCaskey, Chairman of the Chicago Bears, and the 31 other constituent teams of the National Football League.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION 96

Offered by Representative Zalewski:

WHEREAS, The criminal laws of the State of Illinois seek to prescribe penalties which are proportionate to the seriousness of offenses and the differences in rehabilitation possibilities among individual offenders; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly recognizes that the data collected and analyzed by State agencies, including the Illinois Sentencing Policy Advisory Council, and independent entities have demonstrated that the State of Illinois experiences overcrowding in prison and jail populations, a continued high rate of recidivism of approximately 50%, and levels of crime that plague Illinois communities; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly recognizes that the State of Illinois currently spends \$1.3 billion per year on imprisonment of adults and approximately \$86,861 per year to detain a single juvenile; and

WHEREAS, It is in the interest of public safety and the public good of the State to examine the current Illinois criminal justice system and develop comprehensive, evidence-based methods to more effectively and cost-efficiently sanction criminal offenses and improve outcomes, while holding offenders accountable; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-EIGHTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that the Joint Criminal Justice Reform Committee is created to examine the impact of the current sentencing structure, ensure that the enforcement and punishment of crimes do not disproportionately or unfairly affect certain racial, ethnic, or minority groups, and develop solutions to address the issues that exist within the system; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall consist of 10 members of the General Assembly appointed as follows:

(1) 3 appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom shall serve as co-chairperson;

(2) 3 appointed by the President of the Senate, one of whom shall serve as a co-chairperson;

(3) 2 appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; and

(4) 2 appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall hold public hearings, at the call of the co-chairpersons, to receive testimony from the public regarding the efficiency and effectiveness of Illinois criminal justice system, and the impact of the current sentencing scheme; and be it further

RESOLVED, That the Committee shall submit a report to the General Assembly no later than December 1, 2014.
