Mr. Speaker -- I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has passed bills of the following titles, in the passage of which I am instructed to ask the concurrence of the House of Representatives, to-wit:

SENATE BILL NO. 1228

A bill for AN ACT concerning health.

SENATE BILL NO. 1281

A bill for AN ACT concerning regulation.

SENATE BILL NO. 1763

A bill for AN ACT concerning children. Passed by the Senate, April 29, 2015.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were offered and placed in the Committee on Rules.

**HOUSE RESOLUTION 429** 

Offered by Representative William Davis:

WHEREAS, Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) is an umbrella term used to describe airflow obstruction that is associated mainly with emphysema and chronic bronchitis; and

WHEREAS, COPD affects an estimated 24 million individuals in the United States and an estimated 580,000 individuals in Illinois; and

WHEREAS, In 2010, the National Center for Health Statistics released a report stating that COPD had become the third leading cause of death in the United States; and

WHEREAS, COPD currently accounts for 1.5 million emergency room visits, 699,000 hospitalizations, and 10.3 million physician office and hospital outpatient visits, all of which are detrimental to the United States economy; COPD costs the nation an estimated \$49.9 billion in direct and indirect medical costs annually; and

WHEREAS, COPD affects an estimated 580,000 citizens of the State of Illinois, with at least as many persons who are estimated to be undiagnosed; Chronic Lower Respiratory Disease, including COPD, is the third leading cause of death in the State; the Respiratory Health Association is participating in statewide efforts to increase early detection, improve care and treatment, and prevent and reduce the prevalence of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Research has identified a hereditary protein deficiency called Alpha-1 Antitrypsin; people with this deficiency tend to develop COPD, despite the lack of exposure to smoking and environmental triggers; and

WHEREAS, Women over the age of 40 are the fastest growing segment of the population to develop this irreversible disease, due in large part to the equalization of opportunity for men and women to smoke over the past several generations; and

WHEREAS, There is currently no cure for COPD; spirometry testing and medical treatments, such as pulmonary rehabilitation, exist to address symptom relief and possibly slow progression of the disease; and

WHEREAS, Until there is a cure, the best approaches to preventing COPD and its considerable health, societal, and mortality impacts lie in education, awareness, and expanded delivery of detection and management protocols; and

WHEREAS, The Respiratory Health Association and its partners from the Illinois State COPD Plan will work with the Illinois Department of Public Health and other relevant partners to seek opportunities to promote awareness and treatment for COPD; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we designate the month of November as COPD Awareness Month in the State of Illinois and encourage others to promote education, awareness, and screening of Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease.

#### HOUSE RESOLUTION 431

Offered by Representative Monique Davis:

WHEREAS, Higher Education is the backbone of a productive community and promotes values that shape the future; a person's ability to obtain a degree from a higher education institution equips them with the tools to shape their own destiny; college should be universally accessible to all, regardless of finances, family situations, or socioeconomic barriers; and

WHEREAS, Universities with childcare centers enable students of all ages and backgrounds to obtain an education; and

WHEREAS, The funds generated from the 2.5% increase should be evenly allocated to Chicago State University, Northeastern Illinois University, and Governor's State University; and

WHEREAS, Funding childcare facilities means creating space for a center or expanding existing facilities, paying salaries of childcare teachers, and providing equipment needed to create a healthy environment for all children while their parents attend classes; and

WHEREAS, These monies would increase the graduation and retention rate for students who attend these institutions; and

WHEREAS, The funds generated from the 2.5% increase in distribution fees for craft beer breweries will remove a barrier that has hindered thousands; and

WHEREAS, By implementing this strategy, college students who are parents will be able to provide an improved quality of life for their children; and

WHEREAS, Funding childcare centers at State universities is an investment in the next generation; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, that we urge the Governor and the 99th General Assembly to review the possibilities of increasing distribution fees by 2.5% on craft beer breweries solely to fund childcare services at State universities.

WHEREAS, The officer was forced at gunpoint to return to his vehicle; when Officer Garrity returned to the squad car, he found that Patrolman Roseland had been shot from behind in cold blood and had died almost instantly; and

WHEREAS, The robbers fled the scene with a female hostage, who they released later near Joliet; the criminals successfully robbed a total of nearly \$60; and

WHEREAS, After several months, the robbers were apprehended and Louis Lutz was charged with the murder of Patrolman Roseland; and

WHEREAS, The murder of Clarence Roseland was a tragedy that greatly affected the residents of Grundy County for many years to come; he was a great and noble man who was a respected citizen of his community; therefore, be it

HOUSE BILL 4208. Introduced by Representative Gabel, AN ACT concerning elections.

Having been reproduced, the following bills were taken up, read by title a first time and placed in the Committee on Rules: SENATE BILLS 376 (Acevedo), 1228 (Lang), 1281 (Turner), 1367 (Bellock), 1393 (Beiser), 1446 (McDermed), 1657 (Cabello), 1702 (Rita), 1763 (Feigenholtz), 1764 (Lilly), 1810 (McAsey), 1906 (Cloonen), 1907 (Nekritz) and 1908 (K. Burke).

#### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTIONS CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS FIRST READING

Representative Mautino introduced the following:

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 36

RESOLVED, BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE NINETY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, THE SENATE CONCURRING HEREIN, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least 6 months after the adoption of this resolution a proposition to add Section 11 to Article IX of the Illinois Constitution as follows:

### ARTICLE IX REVENUE

#### SECTION 11. HIGHWAY FUNDS

(a) No moneys derived from taxes, fees, excises, or license taxes relating to registration, titles, operation, or use of vehicles or public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, or airports, or to fuels used for propelling vehicles, including bond proceeds, and from taxes, fees, excises, or license taxes relating to any other transportation infrastructure or transportation operation shall be expended for other than costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation, statutory refunds and adjustments provided in those laws, payment of highway obligations, costs for construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair, and betterment of public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, airports, or other forms of transportation, and other statutory highway purposes, the State or local share to match federal aid highway funds, expenses of grade separation of public highways and railroad crossings, protection of at-grade public highways and railroad crossings, and, with respect to local governments, other transportation purposes as authorized by law. Costs of administering laws related to vehicles and transportation shall be limited to direct program expenses of the Secretary of State, the Department of State Police, and the Department of Transportation, or their successor agencies, related to the

enforcement of traffic laws or the safety of public highways, roads, streets, bridges, mass transit, intercity passenger rail, ports, or airports.

- (b) None of the revenues described in subsection (a) of this Section shall, by transfer, offset, or otherwise, be diverted to any purpose other than those described in subsection (a) of this Section.
- (c) If a mode of transportation not described in subsection (a) is first proposed for State funding after this Section is added to the Constitution, the mode of transportation must have a dedicated source of funding.
  - (d) Federal funds may be spent for any purposes authorized by federal law.

#### **SCHEDULE**

This Constitutional Amendment takes effect upon being declared adopted in accordance with Section 7 of the Illinois Constitutional Amendment Act.

The foregoing HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT 36 was taken up, read in full a first time, ordered reproduced and placed in the Committee on Rules.
