Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Third Reading. House Bill 1906."

Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1906 is exactly what it says. It's a House....er it's a study Commission to study the Banking laws of the State of Illinois and to report back to the next General Assembly. It's composed of sixteen Legislative Members, eight from the House, eight from the Senate, four appointed by the Speaker, four appointed by the Minority Leader, four by the President of the Senate, four by the Minority Leader in the Senate. Eight public Members, two appoint-

ed by each of those. I'd appreciate the support of the House."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 1906 pass? All those in favor signify

by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all

voted who wish? Take the record. Bob Dunne 'aye'. On this question...107 'ayes', ...Geo-Karis 'aye'. 108 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1419."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1419, Matijevich, a Bill for an Act to amend the Hospital Licensing Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this Bill

was on the Agreed Calendar but I took it off for a clarify
ing Amendment. I would ask leave of the House to....ah...



send this back to ...ah....Second Reading for the purposes of adding Amendment #1 to 1419."

Speaker Telcser: "Are there any objections? Hearing none,
House Bill 1419 appears on the order of Second Reading.

Will the Clerk please read the Amendment?"

1419, page 1, line 17 and soforth."

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1, Matijevich, amends House Bill

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, all this
Amendment does is state that the audits that are made are
available for public inspection, but that the individual
person asking for such audits would have to pay the actual
cost of duplicating the same. It's a clarifying ...ah...
language and I would move the adoption of Amendment #1,
to House Bill 1419."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has asked to move for the adoption of Amendment 1 to House Bill 1419, all in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. This Bill has been read a third time, Representative Matijevich, do you wish to call it now, Sir?"

Matijevich: "Well, since it's on the Agreed Calendar, I think we can call it."

Speaker Telcser: "Okay, the Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Ah.....Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this
Bill ...ah...was a recommendation of the Health Care
License....Commission, calling for Manpower Utilization
Committee and an.....an annual independent audit of
hospitals that receive State or Federal funds. I solicit
your favorable support of this Bill, House Bill 1419."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."



Juckett: "Ah... Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Sponsor
 yield?"

Speaker Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Juckett: "What is the purpose for requiring an audit? From the State standpoint, does the Federal Government require an audit?"

Matijevich: "Well, the ...ah...evidently there are some requirements butah...the Price Council...I believe it is, the agency recommended to our Commission that....ah...audits are necessary for the State to determine how we can cut costs. If we cut one dollar ...ah. ...per person...per...per hospital...we can save over a billion dollars in a year. Ah...I think it is something like a billion eight hundred thousand follars. So there is no way that we can ever evaluate the...ah..high cost of hospital care....ah....without some...ah...accountability to independent audit. I don't know of anybody that opposes this and we also I think ... in effect would be helping those hospitals who so often complain that they have got to make this audit and that audit and this audit. This would be an independent audit that would be available and I think would go a long way toward helping the people in the State of Illinois in reducing health care costs.

Juckett: "So, in other words you're after finding out whether

a hospital makes a profit? If it does make a profit, how

much of a profit and whether that profit is excessive for
the services rendered?"

Matijevich: "Well, I....I...really thinkah...Representative Juckett, you hit the nail on the head. Now, whether you agree with me or not, thatah....whether that's laudable ...I think when State and Federal funds are ... are used, that is a laudable purpose.....laudable purpose and we do this because we are giving them funds, either Federal or State, so that they would be subject to



the audit in their procedures, et cetera."

Juckett: "Now, why is this tied in with this...ah...inner disciplinary...ah...section? Why are these two tied together?"

Matijevich: "Well, because it all relates to the same purpose in trying to reduce costs....and the Manpower Utilizes...
....Utilization Committeeah....written into the Bill is that its purpose is to maximize the efficiency of the hospital which in turn would reduce the cost. So that's

Speaker Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Douglas."

...that's why it's all related into one Bill."

Douglas: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Douglas: "John, ah....this sounds like a very laudatory idea. However, I wonder in the....with the passage of a Bill like this, how far we're going to get ...really in accomplishing the things you mentioned in your answers to Representative Juckett. I've always had a great concern about the fact that hospitals do as they please, charge as they wish and have so little control over their ultimate operational costs. Now, what....what will this Bill, along with other things that are being done ...including ...ah...including rules and regulations that are passed down from various governmental and private agencies do to lower the costs ...ah....of patient care every day. Now, I assume that's what you're saying...it will do. But how do we.....in passing a Bill like thisget back from the hospitals and how do we in turn have some influence on the hospitals to make sure that ...that

manpower utilization ...which is dismally ignored today in most of the hospitals, they waist manpower like mad, how are we really going to accomplish with this and other things the ultimate job of getting ...getting fees and



getting costs down every day. Do you....are you optimistic that that's going to happen as a result of this kind of a Bill or a law?"

Matijevich: "Well,....ah....first of all, let me say, Mr.

Speaker, if there is a debate on this, I'd like to pull
it out....except this is on the Agreed Calendar and I
thought there wouldn't be any debate, but let me answer
that by saying that I think that unless there's some
accountability that there is no way that we can reduce
cost and I feel that this at least is a step where....
wherein we can determine whether there is accountability
or not. I am pessimistic that if we don't have Legislation such as this, if we can ever get at reduction of
costs. So that would be my answer to you, Dr. Douglas,
I really think that this is a....a....a real...giant
stride in the right direction."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there further discussion? If not, does the Gentleman wish to close? The question is shall House Bill 1419 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Telcser 'aye'. On this question there are 100 'ayes', 6 'nays', and this Bill having received a Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Record Representative Choate as voting 'aye'....and

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1723, a Bill for an Act to amend

Telcser. House Bill 1723."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1723....."

Speaker Telcser: "One moment, please, Representative Shea,
for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Shea: "We had a hold on it, but I guess we're all right now."



Unknown: "Yeah, that's what I thought."

Speaker Telcser: "Proceed, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "We did have, Jerry and I was informed that it was released and everybody was in agreement. Yeah. House

Bill 1723 deals with the Nursing Home Administrator's
Licensing Act. It makes clarifications in the Act, pro-

vides for procedures and clarifies that the college or

formal education training is equivalent toah...experience. There was some problem ..ah...in the admin-

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is,

Capuzi: "Well, the problem that I would haveI'm sure....

because I didn't receive some notification of witnesses

that are ...ah...scheduled to be here tomorrow..tomorrow

evening ...on my....on my Committee and ah...."

Speaker Telcser: "Okay, but we'll know by late this afternoon, so that you can call them...."

Capuzi: "Call 'em?"

Speaker Telcser: "Call up witnesses in Chicago and tell them to come or not to come. Is that...."

| Capuzi: "Well, as long as we know...."

Speaker Telcser: "The Sponsors of the Bills, I mean....."

Speaker Telcser: "All right now, the Coach just informs me that
we'll know by noon if we're going to play or not. So then
we'll know what tomorrows schedule would be in terms of

we could all really try and...ah...help each other whip

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, that's essentially right. It was impossible to make it before this morning because we didn't know how close we would come to beating the Calendar yesterday.

speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman form Cook, Representative McCourt."

McCourt: "Ah, Mr. Speaker, this Bill is similar to a Bill that passed the House unanimously last Session but failed in the last days in the Senate due to a technicality which has now been corrected. And then, paragraph 127 of Chapter 43, it's applicable only to a Home Rule Community, in that it clarifies the existing law in line with the new Constitution. And I would urge your support."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is,

shall House Bill 1810 pass? All those in favor



...the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, what...I'm...I'm confused, I read this Bill yesterday...ah...and it seems to say that a Home Rule Unit can open....authorize the opening of a ...ah...like say a coffer that....within the prescribed limit or the prescribed limit applies to a Home Rule Unit, or what?"

McCourt: "I'm sorry, I didn't quite understand what you said,

Representative Shea."

Shea: "Is this Amendment #2 on the Bill? It says 'this
Amendatory Act is not a limit upon any Home Rule Unit'?"

McCourt: "Correct. Amendment #2 is the only Amendment on the
Bill. It's just to clarify that ...ah...ah...this is the
only Section of the Act that we are saying ...ah..we're
not saying that any of the other Sections of the Act
does not apply to the Home Rule Unit either. It's just
a clarification that your staff suggested."

Shea: "All right."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 1810 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Telcser 'aye' Now, who wishes to explain their vote. Geo-Karis 'aye'. Grotberg 'no'. Schraeder 'aye'. Londrigan 'aye'. Representative Shea, did you say..... Bluthardt 'aye'. I'm sorry, Bluthardt 'no'. Katz 'aye'. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative McCourt wish to explain his vote? You need two more. Lechowicz 'aye'. Molloy 'aye'. Now, let's get a new Roll Call the Clerk tells me. Now, if we can all stay on these switches we can save a lot of time. The question is, shall House Bill 1810 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Now, he's got a few better going. Where is the Representative Campbell 'aye'.... Washburn Now, the switches are still open now. Now, have all voted who



wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative McCourt to explain his vote."

McCourt: "Mr. Speaker, if I could just explain this, possibly a little more in depth. Under the Constitution...this new Constitution...ah...it gives to a Home Rule Community the manners of...that are ...anything as far as governmental affairs is their prerogative. In the...in Chapter 43, it mentions that a restaurant ...ah...that might sell alcoholic beverages cannot be within a hundred feet of a church or school et cetera. This...."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Have you completed Representative McCourt? Do you wish to continue to explain your vote, Sir? Give him.....Representative McCourt have you completed your explanation?"

McCourt: "Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Telcser: "Okay, have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 92 'ayes', 27 'nays'.

This Bill having received a Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1383.

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1383, Lemke, a Bill for an Act prohibiting the assignment of wayes, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a Bill which prohibits wage assignments in the State of Illinois...ex.....with the one exception...that credit unions will be able to use them. Mr. Lemke is not here to present his Bill, he did tell me however, that...that the State half of AF of L CIO strongly supports this Legislation and that it is his feelings and the feelings of many people in the State of Illinois that the wage assignment no longer serves a very useful purpose in

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from



Illinois. I urge a favorable vote."

Franklin, Representative Hart."

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r: "Ah.....what is the need for this Bill? You know the purpose of wage assignments like many other things is for the people to be able to borrow money by using some form of security. Now,...ah..I don't know of any particular abusers of wage assignments, nobody ever has to sign one. I think they are a useful tool to people who want to use them who have ...ah...their wages as security There are plenty of safeguards in the present law about the use of them, that you have to give notice and soforth. I don't know of any abuses. So, I'd say this Bill ought to be defeated because I think it's a bad Bill for the people who are obtaining money on credit."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative....

I einenweber."

Leinenweber: "A question for the Sponsor."

Speaker Telcser: "He indicates he'll yield."

Leinenweber: "What is the justification for the exception for the credit union?"

Beatty: "Well, I'm not actually quite certain, it's not my
Bill.....ah....It's Mr. Lemke's. I think the problems...
the reason for the Bill initially was that there had been
abuses and...ah...people had been coerced into signing
wage assignments and in the instance of a credit union
I think they're not thought to be in the same category as
an employer ...that these are actually members own
associations where they borrow money and that they....
normally do not....ah...react as harshly to the employee
in the...."

Speaker Telcser: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Martin."

Martin: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen.... rise in support

of this Bill. Having been in credit and collection for

some 20 years before coming to the General Assembly, I

know of the widespread abuse of wage assignments. Some
time even to the point of persons committing suicide. I'd



like to cite to you an example of why this Legislation is important. I remember working for a clothing firm... that had a habit of charging two dollars down and two dollars a week. With a Gentleman with a very low income which is the only way he could buy because of the wages that he was earning ...ah..he could not afford to pay cash.....and wanting to have some of the necessities of life he had to buy on credit. I remember one day selling a used television for a company that I was forced to sell for....I had no job....the ...television was a used television. It was sold to someone for two dollars down, two dollars a week for four hundred dollars....and as since it was bought by car load so consequently it was thirty times the amount of what it should of cost. After two weeks the man was not able to make the two dollar payment for some reason or the other...and his wages were assigned. Most people who sign wage assignments in this State and especially in the Northern part of Illinois, they sign some blan....blank wage assignments. Loss of jobs after one or two wage assignments ...you're fired. So therefore, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, this is a very important piece of Legislation, I do wish you would listen to my plead for those persons who on their jobs cannot afford to get more than one or two wage assignments Credit is necessary, but I think that persons who are buying on credit should be a little bit better screened. I think that....ah...those persons who cannot afford to buy on credit on the two dollar down ... two dollars a week ... which we have in Chicago...especially....ah...Mr. Speaker if I could have some attention, please? Most people who ...who take wage assignments as a security of payment are mostly known as 'stickup artists with a pencil'. Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, I ask your support for this very important piece of Legislation. House Bill 1383."



Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative

Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there's really two reasons which I stand to oppose this Bill. One of the reasons is that this is obviously special interest Legislation. There is no earthly reason that can be given why the wage assignment process should be excluded from the Illinois law and at the same time the credit union should be allowed to continue to process. If it is bad it is bad and no amount of allowing one particular interest group to maintain it will make it any better or any worse. However I'm more concerned with the second reason that I am opposing this Bill and that has to do with the basic right that it is stopping people to use another element for credit security. Certainly there have been abuses in this as there have been in all other forms of credit, but I don't think that you can generalize by specific instances. I think a number of people have used this form of security when obtaining loans ... I don't think it's been abused...at least in the generality....and it's something that should not completely be wiped off our books for the benefit of those few instances where there have been some problems. For those two reasons I am opposing this Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Livingston, Representative Hunsicker."

Hunsicker: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,

I rise in opposition to this Bill. I agree with the

previous Speaker that this is special interest Legislation
and I see no reason why some should be prohibited from
taking wage assignments and others being allowed to and
that's my reason for being opposed."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, there has been adequate debate and this



has come up before other Sessions and I at this time move that the ...move the Previous Ouestion."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman moves the Previous Question.

All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Representative Beatty to close."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is special interest Legislation. It's Legislation to help the poor working man who has difficulty in getting credit, who really has economic problems. The Bill is offered to eliminate some of the abuses of this type.

The fact that he has one ally where he can get a loan at a decent rate and be treated on a friendly basis. The credit unions still retains the wage assignments, does

that make it a bad item? This is a good Bill, it is

supported by the AF of L CIO, here in the State of Illinois, it's an abuse and this Bill will remove the abuse. I urge a favorable vote."

Speaker Telcser: "The question is, shall house Bill 1383 pass?

All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed

by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Catania 'aye'.

Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this

question there are 69 'ayes', there's 46 'nays', the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Since Mr. Lemke isn't here I'd like to put this on Postponed Consideration."

Speaker Telcser: "You have that right, Sir. It'll be put on
Postponed Consideration. House Bill 1543. Is Representative Berman on the floor? Here he is, okay. House
Bill 1543."

clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1543, a Bill for an Act in relation to the restoration, reconstruction or refurbishment of

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1448, Berman, a Bill for an Act to amend the Municipal Code, Third Reading of the Bill." Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Berman."

Berman: "Thank you.....ah....Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1448...ah..is a Bill which would extend the time for which free annexation agreements may be entered into from five years to ten years. This is a Bill that's been worked out between the...ah.....ah.....

Municipal League and the Industry. It passed out of the Cities and Villages Committee without a dissenting vote.

I would solicit your affirmative vote."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "Mr. Berman, what is the reason for extending the
..ah....term from five years to ten years?"

Berman: "It's been brought to our attention the reason for the need for the Bill was that in many of these preannexation agreements the...ah...undertakings by the developers are so extensive that the period of time of five years has not been sufficient. I point out that this is strictly a permissive Bill....that it does require the corporate



authorities and the...ah....developers to enter into it.
All it does is say....instead of restricting them to a
five year contract ...it's actually a ten year contract,
or anything less that the corporate authorities sought
....to...."

Palmer: "Can you negotiate for a one year contract?"

Berman: "Oh, yes, it's just not to exceed. It's the same language as the previous statute, all it does is give them more leeway as far as the total length of time of time of the preannexation agreement."

Palmer: "Well, the only concern that I would have with something like this is on a preannexation agreement which accompanies a....an annexation...ah...the municipality may expend a goodly sum of money in doing so and then of course at some later date....ah...the developer or whoever it might be wants to...ah...if he wants to get off of the hook on the thing after the City has expended money into it he looks for a technicality and then starts to work from there. Files a suit in court and then goes on from there. I just wonder whether or not

it's really fair to taxpayers within a municipality."

Berman: "Ah....Romie, I don't think that this Bill in itself
...ah...really ...ah...addresses itself to that...to
that situation. I think that the exposures of a...a...
improper developer or an unethical developer would exist
whether there was a five year agreement or a ten year
agreement. I think that all the safeguards that would
have existed previously would exist under this Bill and
I don't think that we'reah..necessarily opening the

Mahar: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,
I would rise to oppose this piece of Legislation because



proper."

I think extending the time limit from five to ten years would have an adverse effect as far as the municipality is concerned. Any preannexation agreement entered into now in most cases ...ah...the municipality is hardpressed to get an agreement of any sizable amount...any sizable.... context unless they go the full five years. So if this is extended to ten years they'd be obliged to ...ah.. carry out the agreement over a ten year period. In many cases the municipality is required to enter into the agreement with a corporation in regard to annexation of property and the further development. They have to ah...limit themselves their authority for a period of time. They may have to give some tax concessions, they may have to give some licensing concessions, they may have to enter into some changes in subdivision codes, subdivision regulations, which they are all allowed by preannexation agreement and the s.....sooner they can get out of this particular arrangement the better it is for them. The longer they oblige to be held to this type of thing of course the more adverse effect it has upon the people in the municipality and a very good annexation agreement that would be taxed....increase the tax for the municipality might very well go down the drain if it has to be extended to ten years and I strongly urge the opposition to this Legislation."

speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of this Legislation. As a Member of the Cities and Villages Committee in the House, it came out of Committee with a unanimous vote.....not one dissenting vote. There were witnesses that testified in favor of the Bill and simply all it does is extend the preannexation agreement from five to ten years which allows both the municipality and the other signer of the



agreement the developer to do what is supposed to be done in order to increase the assessed valuation of the property to be annexed....and this of course benefits all the taxpayers. There has been no abuse that I know of of the five year period and I see no reason why we can't extend it to ten years. I would hope that you would give a green light to this very....very good Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff."

Duff: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Telcser: "....Indicates he will."

Duff: "I'd like to get a little more clarity on the effect ..

that this would haveah...if....a builder or developer entered into an annexation agreement would it not
ah...frequently involve agreement relative to the build-

ing of sewers, streets and schools and parks?"

Berman: "Yes."

Duff: "And then under this... the builder would be able to delay and perhaps have a period of ten years in which to meet his obligations to build schools, parks, sewers and streets?"

Berman: "Not necessarily."

Duff: "But it could?"

Berman: "Well, anything could be done because you're talking about a negotiated contract."

Duff: "So if a municipality wanted a developer to come in and to increase its taxes or for whatever purpose it...it might be under a circumstance where it would want to negotiate long term agreements along those lines."

Berman: "I think all we're doing here Bryan is to allow a little more flexibility in negotiations between the municipalities and the developer."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak to the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "Proceed, Sir."

Duff: "It seems to me that ...ah..under the great difficulties



that we're having in theurban and 'ex-urban' areaswith rapid growth and the problems of the municipalities, the problems of flooding, the problems of schools, ...ah. and often time the ...the relatively unstable.... ah...financial circumstances of the kind of a builder that would have to enter into an agreement that would.... that he would need ten years with which to comply...to such important items as building schools and streets and sewers....ah...that kind of person that would need ten years to accomplish his purposesit would seem to me would be seriously subject to question as to whether or not he was financially stable in the first place. It also seems to me that many developers over a period of ten years could find themselves in considerably differentah.....fiscal position than when they entered into the agreement and regardless of what the municipality might want or what the agreement might be, some ten years later the builder or developer would possibly be unpredictably, absolutely unable to comply and if that would happen the homeowners ...ah..who had relyed upon that agreement would be put into a very stressful and impossible situation. I think this is not a good piece of Legislation for that reason and I would oppose it."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, the Gentleman from Will, Representative Sangmeister."

Sangmeister: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I think the point that's being missed here is that this is merely extending it from five to ten years. The municipality can still enter into a one year contract if it so desires. In representing municipalities any attorney will tell you that we are now dealing with some very...very big developments. It'll take a ten year period in order ...which to work out the negotiations. For example the building of a sanitary disposal plant, in which the builder has to have some kind of 'payback'



over a period of time and five years is just not long enough. Let's give the municipalities some room to move here and let's pass this Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the...ah....

Sponsor and then I would like to make a statement. I would like to know why he excluded his own municipality if it was such a good idea?"

Speaker Telcser: "Do you wish to....ah.....The Gentleman

wants to know why you've excluded your municipality from
the Bill."

Berman: "When he says 'my municipality', what does he mean?"

Skinner: "Well, I believe Amendment #1 is a Home Rule Amendment and if this is good for any city it ought to be good for all cities."

Berman: "Ah, Mr. Skinner, that was a Committee Amendment that ah.....was placed on by the Committeeit was not offered by me."

Skinner: "Well, I wonder why you accepted it?"

Berman: "I want to pass the Bill."

Skinner: "I'd like to speak against this Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "Proceed, Sir."

Skinner: "You'll notice that at the present time the cities can freeze fees for five years for developers. This has happened in my home municipality this very year..they made a five year agreement with 'Robina-Ladd Enterprises' to build a rather large subdivision that will probably increase the size of my city by 20 percent. Unfortunately the subdivider refused to go along with an increase in sewer hook on fees which was passed two months after the agreement. The subdivider agreed ...er...the subdivider argued that ..ah...by signing a preannexation agreement for five years they were exempt from any increases in



fees or charges that the city might impose. Now, the

city is being intimidated by the threat of a law suit if they enforce the increased fees on 'Robina-Ladd'. Now, it seems to me that by extending this to ten years it's just an excuse to further force the ...the people living in the city at the present time to subsidize ... the new residents of the city on services that are found not to be paying their own way. I think that anybody that's interested in education ought to be against this Bill. One reason is that in the year that the preannexation agreement is ...ah...is negotiateda city may not have yet reached a point where it is requiring developer donations for schools. What if, two months after the agreement is made, the city f....the city fathers finally came up the viewpoint that they ought to have some responsibility for the total tax bill for the total taxpayer of the city and thereafter force developer donations through various means. Through preannexation agreement. They will find a way to write developer donations for ten year periods and that is much too long. Ah....In a ten year period a subdivider could double the size of my city and it seems to me that in any large development they can easily cut it into sections and in fact most subdividers do cut it into sections and come in with one addition one year, another addition another year. It just does not seem to be an overwhelming argument in favor of this Bill and because there are numerous arguments against, I would urge its defeat.

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from St. Clair, Representative Flinn."

Flinn: "Mr. Speaker, this subject has been discussed thoroughly and I therefore move the Previous Question."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved the Previous Question.

All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed
'no'. The Gentleman's motion prevails. Representative

Berman: "Ah...Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in closing I would point out that number onethis Bill is strictly a permissive authorization to local communities to ...to enter into preannexation agreementsnot limited to five years

preannexation agreementsnot limited to five years in duration and allowing them to negotiate for ten years. Now, I believe that all of the objections that have been raised may be well founded but really have nothing to do with this Bill. Their objections deal with the responsibility and the action taken by the local corporate authoraties in their negotiating with this developer for the annexation agreement. If the local authorities are on the ball and put in certain safeguards, as far as development of schools at periodic progress steps, as far as construction of severs at periodic intervals, there is nothing wrong with allowing them to have this Bill that would allow them where there is a large development put in, where we're talking about a substantial improvement with a substantial increase in tax values, that will bene-

fit the municipalities, there is nothing wrong with allowing the municipalities to have the discretion of entering
into ten year contracts. This Bill again, is...sub.....
endorsed by the Municipal League, it's endorsed by the

by voting 'no'. The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Redmond to explain his vote."

Redmond: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in support of this Legislation. I've had some experience as a municipal attorney and that five year limitation is very disasterous. The purpose of the preannexation agreement was to afford the homeowners and the municipalities some degree of protection, to insure that



public improvements would be put in and that adequate zoning would be availed of. Now, if that annexation agreement agreement expires at the end of five years you are no longer protected by any understanding that there might have been between the parties....and you leave yourself open to hostile zoning, you leave yourself open to a lot of difficulty. I only wish that this extended not only to the Home Rule units but also to the non-Home Rule units. I've had occasion to use this in the past and I think that this Bill is very much needed....and I vote 'aye'."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Mahar to explain his vote."

Mahar: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House I

rise to explain my vote as I rarely do, but I feel very strongly about this Bill. I have had the privilege of being...participating in three ...preannexation agreements of sizable magnitude. It just seems to me that for the average, ordinary, preannexation one year or six months is adequate. And the more important it is to the community the longer time you have to have. to go beyond the five year period, you're going into a situation in which you cannot review this thing because bear in mind when you enter an agreement you loose control. You're obliged to follow the agreement. What you do is ...you have to give concessions on licenses, you have to give concessions on building fees, you have to give concessions in zoning and concessions in planning. When you do these things you have to enter the agreement for that period of time. Now, in eight or ten years the board, the village or city council who made the agreement may be gone by the board and there may be a need for review. It means that the community has lost the leverage that they have ordinarily over a long period of time and

the chances of it working adverse to them certainly is



there. It just seems to me that it's proper to be able to do these things on a shorter term and any development that requires longer than five years to be sure that it is the proper one, has to have very serious consideration. I think that this iswe're....we're ...in a situation here where we're going adverse to what local government wants. Now, I respect the authority of ..."

Speaker Telcser: "Could you conclude your remarks, Sir."

Mahar: ".....Municipal League but I still think we have to go against it."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Now, Mr. Speaker, I respectfully disagree with the last speaker. This annexation agreement doesn't have to contain anything. It's an agreement, that's all that it is, between a landowner and a ...ah...who has contiguous property and municipality. They can put anything in there they want. It ... can work both ways. It can work to the benefit of the municipality to bring land of high valuation to add to their property tax rolls or it can work to the benefit of the developer. I would say that it must work to the benefit of both or they won't enter into the agreement. All this is ... is permissive...it expands to a certain extent the latitude that the parties may go to in entering into this agreement....and I think it's a fine Home Rule type of idea that gives more power to municipalities to control their own destiny. I'd like to see seven more green lights up there to put this Bill through."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker, to explain my vote. I think the previous speaker, Representative Leinenweber is right on the button there. He's talking about strictly a permissive authorization for people to negotiate reasonable



contracts. That's what we're talking about in this Bill. I agree that it's not very often that you may find a development that would want to...or require a ten year contract. But I can assure you that there are many areas in our growing suburban communities where a large development would be very attractive to the existing community. That would be a great windfall to the existing taxpayers of that community. That the amount of commitment that the developer is willing to put in .. requires ten years and justifies ten years. All we're saying is that we're allowing the mu....the corporate authorities to contract, and to negotiate, and to enter into an agreement that does justify a ten year period. There's nothing mandatory about this and all we're doing is saying to the mu...corporate authorities that we have faith in them, that they are for the most part elected officials, that we are going to watch very closely and that we're saying to them that this is going to be good for your taxpayers, good for your voters, that if ten years is what is necessary, we're going to give you the authority to do so. That's all this Bill does and I think there is nothing wrong with it. people that we're giving this authority to still allo.... requires a responsiveness to their constituency and Iwould again solicit just four more green votes up there so we can get this good Bill out."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Bluthardt."

Bluthardt: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I find this Bill rather confusing. If we're talking about a ten year development then we're talking about a development that will probably take the municipality out of the non-Home Rule classification and put them in a Home Rule classification and therefore any such agreement would not be necessary. Another thing that bothers me is what if after seven or eight years....certain commitments have



not been met, does that give the person who has the next preannexation agreement the right to disconnect? Because I don't know the answers to these questions, I'm going to ask to be voted present."

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Speaker Telcser: "Record Representative Bluthardt as voting 'present'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

This Bill will have nothing whatever to do with solving any of the problems of the City of Chicago, any of the racial problems or other problems there. We go a lot deeper than something like this to do that. This will mean absolutely nothing and what it will do is ...it will prevent people from making an honest living. There's nothing inherently wrong with soliciting for a listing. I don't think anyone here can say that there is anything wrong with soliciting for a listing. And none of the problems in the City of Chicago



stem from listings being solicited. People it seems want to run away when there is a racial change in their neighborhood and this is not going to prevent it. Now, I would suggest to you that we here ought to address ourselves to the problem in some more meaningful way than scratching the surface or attempting to scratch the surface with something like this. There will be less expense for the State because it will save about \$150,000 for administration in the State because it will be put in the right department instead of present department that it is. Please look at this very carefully and I...we solicit your 'aye' vote on this measure."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I'm voting in favor of this Bill because I find it very similar to the Federal Law that
prevents the delivery of pornography by mail. If one
places ones name on a list that is filed with the Federal
Government. Seems to be a similar remedy and I think
it will solve the.....solve the problem the Sponsor points
out."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Robert Dunne to explain his vote."

Dunne: "Well, very briefly, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to point out to the House that the requirements of this Bill are very similar to the requirements that were drawn into the Bill that creates a new code for administry realtors, that's

Speaker Telcser: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Catania."

Catania: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would suggest that this is not the approach to take if we want to end the reprehensible practice of 'block busting'.

The Bill's developed for.....are the Fair Housing Bills, and Bills like House Bill 709 which really will provide fair housing for everyone in the State of Illinois. There aren't any black people sponsoring this Bill, this Bill is sponsored by the people who live on the southwest

'lily-white' side of Chicago. This is not the way to go.

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Robert Holloway."

Holloway: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah....there sometimes comes a time when you would call a spade a spade. Now, I remember years ago when 'open occupancy' ...ah...was the great thing here in the House. And, ah...the Democratic side used to depend on the Republican side to kill those Bills and the Republican side of the House always accommodated. And since when is it ...ah..bad to have people's rights protected? If a person doesn't want to be solicited it should be his right. There is nothing ...ah...bad about having a real estate broker or anyone go in and solicit the area. All he has to do is just check the lists and respect the rights of other people...and why this is supposed to be a 'backlash Bill' I..I....certainly don't know. Since when is people's rights a 'backlash Bill'? Let's give

And, I urge support of this by every Member of the House."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Jones."

Jones: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. A portion of my district is a district wherein persons have moved into an area they were sold houses by a reputable real estate broker but I see nothing in this Bill ...nothing in this Bill that will protect the homebuyer when he moves into an area and is being discriminated against. I have to agree with my colleague on the othereside of the aisle that this is nothing but a 'backlash Bill' and I wish some of my colleagues on this side of the aisle would join me in voting no on this Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "Ah..Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I hadn't planned to speak on this Bill, I was simply going to vote 'no'.....and sit here, because I've spoken against every socalled 'blockbusting Bill' that has come before this House. But, I think I would be remiss in my responsibility if I didn't join Representative Jones, Representative Holloway and Representative Catania in pointing to just what this Bill does and doesn't do. Now, for years we've tried to pass out of this House fair housing laws which would take the pressure off of those whites who live on the black periphery and permit blacks and other minorities who've been shut out of the housing market to move where their economic means permitted them to live. And, it is very unfortunate and I don't say this with maliceit's very unfortunate that the very people who are sponsoring



this Bill always led the fight against fair housing. Now, I have a Bill called House Bill 709. A Workers Residential Rights Act, and that what it is, which is on Postponed Consideration and it seems to me that the people who are sponsoring this Bill should have 'wakened' up and supported 709. But, I'm positive ... I'm positive that not a single sponsor on this Bill voted for 709 and if there is I'll apologize to them personally. I'm simply saying that they don't even know where their best interests lie. They are fighting the desire on the part of the minorities to avail themselves of property throughout the county and the state and the city. are frustrating the free alienation of property in this country and in this State by consistently refusing to vote to support fair housing and worker residential rights Bills. I repeat, as Representative Holloway said 'this Bill' and I want to make it very clear, 'this Bill has racial overtones', racial overtones of the worst sort. I think it should be defeated and I think if these people want to cease from the steady tide of movement of people who want the free alienation of land so they can live near their jobs and work and raise their children and educate them and get the finer points of life like everyone else does, then they should go back home and simply tell their constituents one simple fact. The tide is moving and we can't stop it. And if we're going to have racial peace in this country, and in this State and in the City of Chicago, we have got to stop frustrating the litigimate ambitions of those people who want property.

I would suggest that they also say that I voted for House

Bill 709 because I think it will help restore racial peace ."

Speaker Telcser: "Could you please...."

Washington: "And I'm going to vote against every block busting

Bill because it does just the opposite. I urge you to

vote 'no'."



Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative D. L. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, in response to the previous speaker,

I would like to point out that I did support House Bill

709 and that I am also a Cosponsor of this particular

Bill. We are not attempting to frustrate the legitimate

ambitions of the people of this State as to where you

are going to live. What this Bill is attempting to do

is to frustrate the criminal ambitions of unscrupulous

real estate brokers who are praying upon the fears and

who are engaged in 'panic peddling'. This is a fundamentally important Bill. It is very important to the people

Barnes: "Mr....Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, to ex-

you vote in support of the Bill."

plain my vote, I think that this Bill goes in the ab.... absolute opposite direction from what we should be about the business of doing here in the State of Illinois. My district happens to boarder on that so called Chinese Wall in the City of Chicago..... Ashland Avenue. That is the boarder of my Western boundries of my district... and if any of you downstaters would ever want to come up to Chicago and see what is in fact a Berlin Wall within a City, come up and take a look at the Western Boundries of the 29th District which is the east side of Ashland Avenue and then look across to the Eastern boundry on the other side of the street. You can see right there the makings of what will ultimately be what was expressedin some of the earlier reports during the 1960's....two societies...one white and one black. If that is the kind of society that we want to leave our legacy for our coming generation I would suggest to you, support this Bill. If you believe



that a person should be able to rise as far as his ambitions and his work will take him in this society, then you willoppose this kind of Legislation. I believe that this is a horrible Bill, it's a horrible precedent to set this kind of Legislation in the 1970's if this was 1935 I'd say you were doing the right thing. So if you want to come along and in the current generation I'd....I would solicit a 'no' vote on this particular bad Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Beatty."

Beatty: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, we've heard some of the black Representatives from the City talking about this having racial overtones. Well, of course the real estate that is in question is in an area that is a changing area and in this sense there are racial overtones. However, in my opinion the basic reason for this Bill is to get a seller, normally a white seller a proper price for his piece of real estate. Not to have him place in a position where he is beat down and to take the home that he's spent twenty or thirty years in and to give it away to a 'panic peddler'. And, then what does the 'panic peddler' do? He boosts the price to an extremely high price and sells it to some black family and who has suffered? The black family and the white familyand the unscrupulous real estate broker has made one hell of a big profit. We can talk about race, certainly when you have black and white people living adjoining each other there is a racial point involved but the real issue of the Bill is are we going to let the brokers make the money on 'panic peddling' or are we going to give white people a fair price for their real estate on this southwest side of Chicago and in the other area that's changing? I urge a 'yes' vote for this Bill."



Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, I rise on a Point of Personal Privilege."

Speaker Telcser: "State your point, Sir."

Maragos: "I am a Cosponsor of the Bill....6...5...years ago which this Bill is trying to correct. I was the first man in my district to vote for open.....housing....I was the first person in my district that went ahead of the area because I wanted to believe in racial equality and I believe in a viable city. I do not like the tag because I am a supporter of this Bill that I have any racial overtones. I want to state also to Mr. Washington that I did support House Bill 709. And, the many Legislators who I hear.... I still live in a area where I have black neighbors and white neighbors and I want to keep that City a viable City like it is and have no question of racial overtones. Even though this may be an artificial method at least it shall slow down the process of making the City a one race City and the suburbs become lily-white:I'll support every piece of Legislation but give us a hand to slow down the process that this one does. It is equitable....we see time and again, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House where the blacks or the whites ...spoilers come in...and it is amazing when it comes to the fringe areas....where there

fore and have a concerted effort to change it from blackfrom white to black instead of having an orderly process of having this done in a manner which would be its natural course by the scare tactics ...by everything else....and what concerns me is the older people who are on pension who cannot even buy other homes, it's the white people who want to stay with...their black neighbors

is racial boundries...all of a sudden you hear about two or three hundred brokers come in there who never had be-



and are being forced out because their scared every day because of their tactics. This is a Bill that tries to keep artificial boundries alive in order to give the people an opportunity to live together. Personally it has nothing to do with any racial overtones on my part because I say I still live in an area which is a mixed area ...I have very good neighbors.....I want to stay there as long as God allows me but the only thing is... this is not an artificial thing and I'm very sad that they've made this into a racial overtone Bill because it is not that fact and I rise on a point of Personal Privilege because I do not like the remark...to say that the Sponsor of this Bill or the Cosponsor of this Bill are racially motivated."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Rayson."

"Well, I'd just like to say this Mr. Speaker, that Ravson: we have laws in Illinois, the City of Chicago, other municipalities relating to the scurrilous practice of 'block busting', the fomenting of race and all of these intended evil practices. They are not too workable it's true. Many of our laws are not too workable in this society in which we live, which is strained because of the races aspect of society....but when we have block busting laws which on the surface seem good but perhaps are a guise to keep black people out. As the case in the City of Markham, where I took their ordinances to the Supreme Court of Illinois, as in the case of the City of Harvey now, I'm suggesting that this kind of Legislation may legitimatize the interest of owners so that they can feel that they are not racial in any way but yet they can have a tranquility in their neighborhood without any intrusions of black people moving in. I'm suggesting when the owner can say 'please don't bother me, here's my name on a list', I'm suggesting this is a tacit way,



where the white people can work with their white brokers to do their white thing and to keep the black man out.

I suggest that this Bill has many bugs if not apprehensions.

And, I think that a good vote is 'red'."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative J. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "It's....It's.....Mr. Speaker and Members of the

General Assembly, it's clear to me that there is very
strong feelings on this issue on both sides. I would
suggest that those who are interested in this Bill and
those who are very interested in the Workers Residential
Rights Bill get together and possibly we can have a joint
Roll Call on both of those Bills. Until they get a chance
to discuss this I suggest the Bills not go anywhere, I'll
vote 'present'."

Speaker Telcser: "Record Representative Houlihan as voting
'present'. Have all voted who wish? Have all voted who
wish? Now, the Gentleman from Lake, Representative
Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House I live out in 'lily-white' Lake County at a place called Sylvan Lake, but for the last 10 years of my life prior to that I lived in an integrated....half white, half black community in Washington, D. C. and I believe very much that people of all races can live together in peace and harmony. However, in order to do that you have a lot of obstacles to overcome. And you have to do everything you can when you're living together...blacks and whites.. hoping for community life and happiness to avoid every source of irritation, every despicable practice that you identify that causes hostility and bitterness between the races must be stamped out....and I wanted to explain that my green light is up here in that spirit because I feel that the insidious practice that some disreputable real estate people engage in causes disharmony between the



races and it's hard enough for us to get together as brothers and sisters and the people of good will when we have those who are praying on the underlying fears and suspicions. And I'm voting for this Bill and I urge others to put a green light up there, simply to do something to make it possible in the areas where there is tension and friction and to get rid of practicesah...that prey on the bad side of human nature. And I would urge many of you to put the green light up for that reason and in that spirit."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, there are a number of you who are still seeking recognition, we've been on this Bill for almost one-half hour...ah....the latest report is ...by the way...is that the baseball diamond is too muddy to play. If I would have the approval of Representative Choate, Representative Walsh, I'll stay here 'till o'clock in the morning....because we're going to beat this Calendar today. I'll continue to recognize everyone who wants to explain their votes, but remember you're going to pay for it in the wee hours of the morning. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Robert Dunne."

Dunne: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I've already explained my vote....

but like...."

Speaker Telcser: "....Sir, you don't have that right any longer."

Dunne: "Well, wait,I'm not...."

Speaker Telcser: "What's your point, Sir?"

Dunne: "On a Point of Personal Privilege.

Speaker Telcser: "State your Point."

Dunne: "As Representative Maragos says. We have been accused rather directly, those of us who support this Bill, that we live in a 'lily-white' southside, as one Member represented and others have accused us of being racist.

And I'd like to point out to those Membersthe 29th and the 28th District...that are against this Bill, I'd



like to relate to them...what is said over the phone when one of these unscrupulous realtors calls. Might call Mrs. Dunne, or Mrs. Houlihan, or Mrs. Madigan, if they call during the day and we're down here, they say..'hey, do you know that those blacks are coming into your neighborhood, those racists, those murderers, those hoods, with their 'hoody' children', this is what they say. And you're voting to support those kind of people? That's what you're doing the way you're talking on this Bill. I don't understand it."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Representative

"Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Palmer: presently, municipalitiesah...can cause the demolition or repair of dangerous and unsafe buildings....or uncompleted or abandoned buildings by sending a statutory notice to the persons of recordas might be evidenced by the ...in the Recorder of Deed's Office or the Torrens Office, as in Cook County and then if repairs are not made the Building Commissioner makes the report....then tells the persons what to do....if the repairs are not made within a certain length of time then the municipality has the right to go ahead and make those repairs or demolish the buildings. Obviously in urban areas this.... is of great benefit to eliminate slum buildings and I might say that slum buildings appear in all areas of urbanah....of urban areas.....all parts of urban areas. Now, once this is done, the...they can file the suit in the Circuit Court and then the Judge again tells them what to do or what not to do and if the Municipality does demolish or repair and the....providing they take the proper statutory steps they can get a ... 'lend' against the real estate for that amount of money expended. Ryan: "Yes, well ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House ah... House Bill 1498 is ah... is a Bill to set up for the disposal of sludge and ah... wastewater and it's ah... Everybody seems to be in agreement as Representative Shea has indicated here. It sets up a steering committee and ch... ch... controls the ah... the disposition of this stuff that everybody's happy with. So I would move for the ah... passage of this Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "I don't understand exactly what the Bill is about ah...

Would the Sponsor tell me more about the kind of restrictions it

puts on or kind of guidelines? Tell me what it does ah..."

Ryan: "Well, Representative Schneider, this is to control the, the wastewater and the sludge distribution downstate out of Chicago and ah... the Sanitary District. There was a proposal made in one of the counties in my district that ah... it caused a lot of uproar with the citizens. It was the Corps of Engineers wanted to come in and take ah... some 860 square mile area and displace some 25,000 people and some 1,700 homes and ah... ah... without any control or regulation at all."



Schneider: "Well that sounds like the ah... Corps of Engineers, but what about areas that were trying to recover and use floods to enhance the land in terms of its ah... viability for growth..."

Ryan: "That's right and this will not affect those, those counties or areas that want to. It just sets up the definitions for sludge and standards that are going to be set by the E.P.A. It's got a 15 member steering committee that's going to be appointed and ah..."

Schneider: "The appointments are by whom and..."

Ryan: "There are 5 that'll be appointed by the County Board of the receiving county. Three by the ah... applicant. Two by the President of the University of Illinois and one each by the Director of the E.P.A., Conservation, the Department of Transportation, Agriculture and Public Health."

Telcser: "Any further discussion? The Lady from DuPage, Representative Dyer."

Dyer: "Mr. Speaker, ah..."

Telcser: "Indicates he'll yield."

Dyer: "He'll yield. I'm confused about this, too, particulary since

I don't have the Amendment right here. Ah... and I'm not sure what
that does. The synopsis on the original Bill says that permission
has to be gotten from the County Board through which ah... you know,
pipes might run in transporting sludge from one, from its source
of origin down to its destination. Is that still in the Bill?"

Ryan: "No, that was one of the objections of the Sanitary District

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1474, a Bill for an Act creating the Health Care Commission, defining its powers and duties, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Ah, Mr. Speaker and Members of the ... the House, Ah...House Bill 1474 is a Health Care Study Commission. As some of you know this session we had the Health Care Licenser Study Commission of which a fierce.....of Bills came out. Most of which have been passed, there's still one on the Postponed Consideration Calendar. wants any information on that Bill, I'll talk to them personally and draw them a whole picture of the history of that Bill, butah..this Bill would be an extension of that Bill but ...ah..this Bill would be an extension of that Commission and it would study the status of Health Legislation Regulation and the cost in Illinois as it effects the Health Care delivery system and study the full utilization in allied health manpower....and study the problems of entry into and career progression in the health care field, possible changes in the health and allied...health care training systems to protect the public health and study the problems related thereto. Speaker,Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, a little while ago.....yesterday....we passed some Legislation that had to do with the aged. We passed some Legislation that had to do with the humane treatment of animals and I think that we as a Legislative body ought to have the mechanism to make sure that we are studying as diligently as we can. A system to provide for the health care of our citizens. In my estimation too much of the system that we have really isn't health care, it is sick care. We do not try to prevent illnesses. We do not provide...try to provide try to prevent sickness and we are living in a day when I think the American Hospital Association set in 1970



that health care is an inherent right of each individual of all the people in the United States. We have gone from 7th to 16th in the prevention of infant mortality....this civilized society that we have. We have gone from 6th to 8th in female life expectancy, but you women are doing much better than us men because us men have gone from 10th to 24th in male life expectancy, in the countries of the world. One dollar out of every 14 dollars, more than any other country goes for health care. I say that's a misnomer it goes toward sick care. If we cut, in this country, the length of average hospital stay by one day we can save almost two billion, it is estimated that we can save [\$1,700,000 a year if we can cut that average length of hospital stay. I think, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House that we ought to have a Commission to continue the problems in health care. I think many of you know my position with regard to Commissions. If I felt that the Committee system in this House ...in this Legislation ...were viable to study this I would say no, but I don't think it is and I would ask for your favorable support of House Bill 1474."

Speaker Teloser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the
House.....I have no particular knowledge of this Commission except to know that they spent a great deal of
money in the last year. Something over a hundred thousand
dollars. The product we have been discussing the last
few days in a few Billsah....over which there is
considerable controversy, but it seems to me that in the
area of health care where we have a committee as closely
related as this subject, the Human Resources Committee,
that this matter should be turned over to the Human
Resources Committee and that ...that an interim study of
the question of health care, health care licenser et cetera,



80. can very adequately and a lot more reasonably be taken up by the Human Resources Committee under the Chairmanship of Chairman Capuzi. I....ah...really think that... ah...this is going far....too far...in....ah...spending this kind of money ...ah...for the kind of product that we received and I would suggest that we defeat this Bill I see that Representative Katz is here, he sponsored this Bill...ah...last year and I think probably has different feelings on it now than he did then and I would be interested to hear what he had to say, but in the meantime I feel that this is not a proper commission and that we should defeat this Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Katz."

Katz: "The Majority Leader, having asked my view concerning the recreating of the commission, I would say to the Members of the General Assembly that in my opinion the Commission should not be recreated....Ah...I originally sponsored the Bill with reference to this Commission, the strange and curious course of events $_{\dagger}\textbf{I}$ did not end up a Member of the Commission until the Commission had been organized, officers elected, without notification to the public members of the Commission, subsequently after this had been done I became a member of the Commission. Ah....I would say to you that while I have generally as you have perhaps observed, supported the Legislative recommendations of the Commission, I have been somewhat distressed at some of the events that have occurred with reference to the operation of the Commission. The Commission was a very expensively funded Commission....ah...they had spent large sums of money by our standardsa great deal of money....with no accountability to the Members of the Commission...ah... staff has been added, Members of the Commission do not even know the salaries that are paid or voted on the



the people who have been named as staff Members of the Commission. Having nothing to do with any connection that I have to it, I believe that this absence of financial accountability is something that we would not encourage....indeed even tolerate...in the executive branch and I have been a little distressed that it has occurred in a Commission that I originally sponsored. It has also been a source of concern to me that rather than unifying the difficult health care field, it has caused controversy in the health care field. The two largest organizations in the health care field, the Hospital Association and the Medical Society very strongly oppose the recreation of the Commission. That seems to me to be a very unhappy situation. It is not as might be inferred for the good reason I think that, in my opinion, it indicates that there has not been the kind of relationship within the Commission in whith the major groups in the State work together for the advancement of health care. I am not prepared to say that because the Illinois Hospital Association and the Illinois M dical Society opposed the recreation of the Commission that that's a plus for the Commission. In my opinion the Illinois Hospital Association, the Illinois Medical Society are responsible groups, we rely to a considerable extent upon them for the maintenance of a delivery of good health care in the State. I think it is somewhat of a travesty that the major groups in the field opposed the recreation of the Commission. I believe that it would serve the cause of health care generally for the unpleasantness that has been associated with some aspects of that Commission to be allowed to remain dormant. think to give another hundred thousand dollars to a Commission that in my opinion has without accountability spent almost that amount of moneywould be irresponsible on our part. So having been asked by the Majority



Leader my views on this Commission and having told you that to some extent I ended up in a situation in which the Bill that I sponsored became a Commission to which I was not appointed until after it was organized I still support their Legislation when I felt it was good Legislation and I have been consistently supporting Representative Matijevich's Bills, but in my opinion it would be irresponsible to set up this Commission in the way that they seek to do so, we are gradually moving toward giving Legislative Committees the power to do that which Committees do in the Congress and elsewhere. Commissions are frowned upon, that is the purpose of Legislative Committees. We have a Committee system, we have bodies that are set up in Illinois that do have excellent public representation that could do the work here set up. So, that, I find myself then without any question in my own mind of voting against this Bill. It is not a fact incidentally as far as I know, that the Commission itself voted to recreate itself, at least at the meetings that I attended at the end when the subject of proposed Legislation was being debated and discussed I never heard the proposal made. I didn't have any idea how much the Commmission was spending because financial reports were never made as far as I know during the course and I communicated with other Members even though frankly I was pretty sore about the events that took place. And, my participation was effected by the jaundice view I took to the events that had occurred with me being the 'butt' of much that had occurred. But, objectively without reference to any personal views I will have to vote against the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Telcser: "He indicates he will."



Hudson: "John, I just wanted to ask one or two questions. The first one was translated in terms of economics, what this might mean....in the way of cost to the taxpayers of the State of Illinois and.....number two, if in your opinion it isn't possible to become ...ah...over Commissioned, over controlled....and ah...in a sense over protective where we other agenciesah....that can do the same job....and in your opinion, the time perhaps is coming when we ought to run these proposals through a sieve or a screen and determine their absolute necessity to the citizens in terms of what it will cost our taxpayers and make our judgments on those basis. Also, I would like to ask you ... I realize I am compounding one question on another here....but you mentioned the absolute right or right of a citizen for services of this kind and I don't know of any society where the ...ah..citizen has an absolute right to everything at state expense except under some socialistically controlled form of government. I'm sure you don't want that and I don't want it and I don't think any of us want it. So I through out these questions for your response."

Matijevich: "Well, Mr. Speaker, let me try to be brief to those four questions, I believe it was....Ah...first of all I stated that the American Hospital Association claimed that we have an inherent right to....of each individual....to health care...I didn't say that the State must provide that health care, Representative Hudson, but I tend to agree with the American Hospital Association even though the Illinois Hospital Association opposes this Bill. I disagree as to the cost of the Commission. That goes before the Appropriations Committee. I don't knowah...what will happen to that particular cost. I just think that there ought to be a viable agency to study the real problems that we have in health care. Now, I happen to disagree with the



Gentleman from Glencoe, I think he only attended four meetings and I can understand Harold's real emotional problem with relation to this Bill....that happens to be a political problem on this side of the aisle. have a feeling after what happened to 1414 that this Bill became law and was signed by the Governor I wouldn't be a Member of the Commission. I say that frankly..... because I don't think my Minority Leader would pick me to that Commission.....after the problems that I had with 1414 and him relative to the Bill. Now, Harold, you and I ... I think will be in the same position then, but I don't think that ought to deter the importance of Health Care Legislation. Now, contrary to what Harold Katz saidand I attended practically all of the meetings. health care profession got along real well in the advisory Committees they did real well, there were so many problems they saw each others problems in a different light because no other agency had brought them together... and I think they did a magnificentmagnificent job... in health care Legislation. Ah.... I think that ...ah..

Speaker Telcser: "Representative....

Matijevich: "....If it weren't for the fact that was a Member of that Commission and saw that it could work....now..."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Matijevich...are you answering Representative Hudson's questions?"

Matijevich: "I think I am answering both him and Harold Katz'.

Now, here is the material I got in the Commission. And
there is some of it missing....Representative Dyer...I

will tell you...."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Walsh, would Representative Richard Walshfor what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Walsh: "I have a point of order, Mr. Speaker.... Who's time is this charged to?"

speaker Telcser: "Well, it is charged to Representative Hudson's time unless he tells me his questions have been answered



and then ..."

Walsh: "Well, how much time does Representative Hudson have?"

Speaker Telcser: "His time just expired, in fact. Representative Hudson indicates his questions have been answered.

Okay....Douglas, no....Well, there's some Members who seek....Representative Polk, the Gentleman from Rock

Island, Representative Polk."

Polk: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Polk: "That stack of material that you have there, do you have an audit on the....the hundred thousand dollars that they spent last year?"

Matijevich: "Well, you know the Commission is still in existence and there will be a complete financial audit and.....and I wasn't chairman of the Commission...I think Representative Dyer will....was at the meeting when I made a motion that we follow a budget and that it be followed closely. I'm not the chairman of the Commission,....and as to that all the money spent for that...."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker....he answered my question...."

Speaker Telcser: "Okay...Now, the Gentleman from Lake, Representative MatijevichRepresentative Dyer, do you wishthe Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Mahar.....(Tape failure.....mike off.)....."

Dyer: "......Fellow Members of this Commission but I really would find it hard to justify funding this Commission for another two years at a hundred thousand dollars. In the light of some of the funding of some of the other Commissions on which I serve I think it is ...this is...is...is a high fund....I am still waiting for detailed accounting....I look forward to the precise accounting. I have general budget figures provided by the executive director and I look forward to more preciseprecise answers. Now, I have a rule in politics

and in Legislation 'never be negative about something



unless you can propose a constructive alternative', and my constructive alternative on this is to say that this Commission has come up with some very sound Legislative proposals. The meat of their Legislative proposals is in House Bill 1414 which is on Consideration Postponed. 1414 increases the roll of the consumer on the examining Committees under the Department of R and E, also it sets up a Health Professional Career Board composed of Representatives from the various professional organizations. And, with the Chairman of the Comprehensive Health Planining Agency on this board. What I would urge Members of this General Assembly to do is when Representative Matijevich takes 1414 off of Consideration Postponed, I would urge you to pass this Legislation then you will have a continuing, a statutory body, who can continue the kind of study of the whole health care delivery field which this Commission has tried to do and would try to do if it were reactivated. If you will pass 1414 then I would think you would not need 1474. I would urge Representative Matijevich to take this out of the record for now pending the passage of 1414. Thank you."

Speaker Teicser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Matijevich to close."

Matijevich: "Representative Dyer, I appreciate those remarks and I'm not going to take up...I've taken up too much time of the House....all...all I can say is that ...and I apologize for that....all I can say that if this Commission, if Representative Katz were the Chairman of it and it were recreated...they'd have spent a hundred thousand dollars, it was his idea to put that amount on it, there'd have been no question. Now, there seems to be some question. I...ah...move....I ah....ask for your favorable support.....on 1474."

Speaker Telcser: "The question is shall House Bill 1474 pass?

All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed



by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 52 'ayes', 50 'nays' and this Bill having failed to receive a Constitutional Majority is hereby declared lost. Schneider and Maragos 'aye'. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, in the Speaker's Gallery to our right and to the Speaker's left is Mayor Tom Ryan of Kankakee with Mrs. Ryan and their daughter and our Colleague George Ryan, they are brothers.

Speaker Telcser: "House Bill 1882."

Clerk O'Brien: House Bill 1882, Walters.....



Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1882, Walters, a Bill for an Act to

amend 'The Criminal Code'. Third Reading of the Bill. 1882, Taylor, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to Banks and Banking. Third Reading of the Bill."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

- G. W. Shea: "Mr. Speaker, may I have ah.. Representative Taylor is ah... at Alderman Claude Holman's Services today and he asked me to handle this Bill ah.. and another Bill for him, 1884. And, with leave of the House, I would like permission to hear 1882 and 1884 together. I... I think, they're interrelated and I'd like for one Roll Call to suffice for both Bills, unless somebody wants them on two Roll Calls."
- Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Are there any objections? Ah.. the gentleman.... Objections are heard, Representative Shea. Just take House Bill 1882.'
- G. W. Shea: "Ah.. House Bill 1882 ah.. says that when control of a Bank is sold or changed, then it must be approved by the Commissioner of Banks in the State of Illinois. Ah.. it came out of the Banking Commission and I don't know of .. if, or I mean, out of the ah... Mr. McAvoy's Commission. I didn't know of any opposition to it in Committee. Ah.. and I would ah... answer any questions that I could for the Members of the House."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from ah.. DuPage, Representative Philip."

- J. Philip: "Yes ah.., will the Representative yield for a question?"
- G. W. Shea: "I'll trv."
- J. Philip: "Yeah ah.., I'd like to know the reason or the theory behind this. Ah.. when other Corporations, that are licensed by the State, ah.. transfer ownership, ah.. they certainly don't have to get the permission from the State of Illinois. I... What... What's the reason? What's the cause?"
- G. W. Shea: "I think, you'll find that this is very similar to the Legislation we passed for Insurance Companies. And, I think, that Representative Epton's Commission could probably give you the background on it. But, when you have such Industries as Insurance and Banking that are so vital to the health and economic well-being of a State, and that the people are so vitally interested in, and is such an integral part of their economic well-being, that the State, I think, does have a right to make sure that those people in control are the kind of people that will do that job."
- J. Philip: "Are... Are you saying, Representative, that when an Insurance Company decides to ah.. sell, that the State has to okay the selling of that Insurance Company?"
- G. W. Shea: "I... I'd like to ask Representative Etpon. I think, that's it says, when you sell control of an existing Insurance Company, that has to be approved by the Department. Could I ask Representative Epton to answer that?"

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "The gentleman from Cook, Representa-



tive Epton will respond."

- B. E. Epton: "I think, that Representative Shea is alluding the fact that in both instances, before an Insurance Company or a Bank can do business in the State of Illinois, they must be approved by either the Director of Insurance or the Commissioner of Banks. Accordingly, if that concept is valid, when an Insurance Company changes hands' control, they again must get the approval of the Director of Insurance to continue operation. In the case of a Bank, however, that isn't true. Today, someone can organize a Bank and participate, and then if they decide to sell to new ownership, the ah.. Insur... the ah.. Banking Commissioner has no authority. So what they're trying to do, as Representative Shea indicated, is to have the same type of opera tion as the Department of Insurance. Since they have the initial right to check on those who organize the Bank, they feel it's only proper that they should have some decision as to the parties who might purchase the Bank."
- J. Philip: "Yeah ah.., thank you, Representative. I've got another question. What are ah... What does this Bill in regards to ah... Bank.... to Savings and Loans? Are we going to allow Savings and Loans to change hands without the authority of that Department? And, how about currency exchange? Are we including currency exchanges?"
- G. W. Shea: "Ah.. Mr. Philip, this Bill was put in at the request of the Department. I know of no Legislation to control Savings and Loans or currency exhanges. Maybe some-



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body else on the Floor does. Ah.. I think, that this is a good piece of Legislation. I think, that it's a step in the right direction. Ah.. there was no opposition to it in Committee. And ah... This...."

- J. Philip: "Thank you ah.., Representative Shea."
- G. W. Shea: "This is what you'd refer to as a 'White-Hat Bill', I think."
- J. Philip: "I.. I hadn't noticed. Then Mr. Speaker, may I
 speak on the Bill?"

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Proceed, Sir."

J. Philip: "Yeah, it's kind of interesting to me. I.. I don't know of any problem. I know that there's been some problems in the Insurance Area and I can see the justification. If there's a problem in the Banking Area, I'm certainly not aware of it. I certainly think that ah.. we've had more problems in the Savings and Loans Area. We've had some problems with currency exchange. I don't see any ah.. any okay. And ah..., Mr. Speaker, I would suggest to the Membership that we ought to object to this Bill. It certainly ah... ah... is taking away from the free enterprise system."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative McAvoy."

W McAvoy: "In answer to ah.. ah... my good friend, Mr. Philips, in reference to the Savings and Loans Associations, we've passed Legislation here that they would have authority over when the merges were made or when they'd move from one



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vicinity to another. So, there is Legislation that is....
that is protecting that interest of the people."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Ah. the gentleman from Peoria, Representative Day."

- R. G. Day: "Would the Sponsor yield for a question?"
 Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "He indicates he will."
- R. G. Day: "Gerry, ah.. I don't have a copy of this Bill in front of me, but can... can you tell me whether there are any ah.. ah.. guidelines ah.. spelled out in this Bill as to ah... that would be binding on the ah... Commissioner so far as approval? I mean, does he have absolute discretion on this... on this matter or...."
- G. W. Shea: "No. That's why I asked to hear both Bills together. House Bill 1884 provides for the ah... Board of Bank and Trust Companies to set up the rules and regulations by which the Commissioner will operate. And then, it says further the... the Board will review ah.. anytime that the Commissioner would prohibit a change in ownership, then it would be up to the Board to review that so that there would not be any absolute discretion on one man to say 'yes' or 'no'."
- R. G. Day: "One other question. Ah... I know that there are some ah... small... small town banks ah.. around the State that are controlled by one person. And ah.., how would this ah.. affect the situation where control of the bank changed as a result of someone's death? Supposing that... Supposing he died ah.. without a Will and his heirs in-



herited all of his stock in the bank and.., and thereby, gained control of the bank. Now, would this mean that the ah... that the Commissioner of Banks and Bankings could come in and say, 'Well, we've come to the conclusion that you are not qualified to operate this Bank and you'll have to sell your stock or dispose of it in some way or... or stop the operation'?"

G. W. Shea: "Well, I... I think, all that the Commissioner...

Can I read this portion of the Bill, Mr. Day and I hate to
take up the time of the House? But, it says that, 'before
a change may occur in the outstanding stock of any State
Bank, which will result in control or change in control of
the Bank, the Commissioner shall be of the opinion in find
that the general character of its' proposed management'....

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "One... One moment. Representative Epton, do you seek recognition, Sir?"

B. E. Epton: "If I may ah..., Representative Shea, was not in the Committee when this point was raised. And, with his permission, I could simply answer your question. The answer is 'yes'. The... The ah.. Commissioner could say to the heirs, 'No, you can not run this Bank. You are not fit'. And ah.., then the heirs would have to put the stock on the market. However, they would have, under the rules suggested, a reasonable time to get a... a bidder. However ah.., the answer to question is 'yes'. They could restrict the heirs."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Is there further discussion? Okay.



The gentleman from Cook, Representative Jaffe."

A. Jaffe: "Ah.. Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I just wanted to answer Representative 'Pate's' question with regard to currency exchanges. Currency exchanges do have to be OK'd for a change of ownership from the Department of Financial Institutions. I think, that this is a Peoples' Bill. It's a good Bill. And, I think, that we ought to vote for it."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Richard Walsh."

R. A. Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in. in view of the ah. answer given by Representative Epton to Representative Day's question, it seems to me that ah.. there's a little more to this Bill... ah.. these Bills that meets the eye. Now, there's a distinction between a Bank and a Currency Exchange. A Currency Exchange issues money order to people ah.. for cash and ah.. these people have to... to an.. have to an... ah... be assured that that money order is going to be good when they go to cash it or go to pay their electric bill or what have you. Ah.. with a Bank, the only protection really that a... that a person needs in dealing with a Bank is when he makes a deposit. And, that deposit is ah.. presently guaranteed with the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to the amount of twenty thousand dollars. Now, that's the only protection people need in dealing with Banks. It shouldn't make any difference to them who owns the Bank, ab.. who



happens to be running it, whether ah.. a person in control passes away and his Wife becomes the... the ah.. ah.. controlling party. Ah.. the... the Owner of... of a Bank may not know too much about operating it, but he probably has good operating personnel ah.. or the Bank wouldn't be successful. Now, there may be some good points to this Bill. Ah.. it's been referred to as a 'White-Hat Bill' and ah... ah... I happen to have.... personally have some interest in Banks, but I... I can't see the... the need for it here, especially in view of Representative's answer. So, Mr. Speaker, I desire to be recorded ah.. as voting 'present'."

- Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Now, will the Clerk please record
 Representative Richard Walsh as voting 'present' on this
 Bill? Now, the gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea,
 to close."
- G. W. Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Fouse, I think that this is a good Bill. And, when it comes to ah... personal interest in a Bill, I too, own some bank stock. I don't think, it's controlled by a long shot. But, I think, that this is the kind of Bill that's important to the people of the State of Illinois. If a Bank is going to change hands, in the first instance, in order to license a Bank in the State of Illinois, it has to be approved by the Commissioner of Banking and the applicants have to be approved and be people that will give good banking service to the people of this State. Now, I don't think, that



anybody would suggest that four or five people could go out and start of Bank, once they get it... ah.. get the stock sold and... and the bank going, that they should be able to turn around and sell it to anybody ah.. without some sort of control to protect the people of this State. I think, that this is a good piece of Legislation and I'd ask for

the favorable support of the House."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "The question is, 'shall House Bill 1882 pass?'. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Now, record Representative Richard Walsh as voting 'present'. Friedland.. 'present'. Bluthardt.. 'present'. Grotberg.. 'present'. Getty.. 'present'. Schoeberlein. 'present'. For the number of you on 'presents', we could save time ah .. All right now, if you want to be recorded as voting 'present', why don't you come here and tell the Clerk? Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question, there are.... Oh no! The Clerk tells... Wait a second now. The Clerk tells me that we have a bad Roll Call. We have to take it again. The machine is ah.. got a little jam or something. Ah.. by the way, I understand that ah.. ah.. the Baseball Game is still in limbo. And, they're out at the field trying to drain off the water or ah.. do something with it. And ah.., Coach Deavers tells us that 1:00 O'Clock will have the answer. Is that right, Gil ? He still says 1:00 O'Clock. What's your Assistant ah.., Pete Miller, going to say? Okay, the House will have to be at ease for



five or ten minutes. They've got a big operation going on here. Ah.. so, if we'll just be at ease and maybe in that time, the Coach can tell us what's going to be with the Ball Game. By the way, we've only dealt with nineteen Bills this morning. We've got around forty-five more to go today. Want to go with an oral Roll Call for awhile? Well, the... the ah.. ah.. It'll take us about five or ten minutes to get this thing done. Okay.. Ladies and Gentlemen, now we're going to have to take a new Roll Call. We have all of the 'presents' recorded on House Bill ah.. 1882. Let's give the Sponsor a little extra courtesy. Do you wish to make anymore remarks in close, Representative Shea?"

- G. W. Shea: "Well ah.., again, Mr. Speaker, I think, that this is a good Bill for the people of the State of Illinois.

 I don't think, it's an unnecessary restriction on Banks nor or the people that own Bank Stocks. At.. it only talks about when control passes of the Bank and I would appreciate the support of the House."
- Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "The question is, 'shall House Bill 1882 pass?'. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. This is just on 1882. R. Walsh.. 'present'. All of the 'presents' are already recorded. The gentleman from Moultrie, Representative Stone, to explain his vote."
- P. Stone: "Ah.. Mr. Speaker, there is absolutely nothing wrong with this Bill as I can see it. I sat throught the

Hearing ah.. ah.. in Banks and Savings and Loans with ah.. Representative Epton who has spoken in favor of the Bill. There were seventeen Members of the Committee, all thought it was a good Bill. No one appeared against it. All this Bill does, as I see it and as the Members of the Committee saw it when it was before us, all the Bill does sta... it states that before the control of a State Bank can change, the new ownership must be approved by the State of Illinois. And, the reason for this simply is to keep unsavory characters from having someone who has a good reputation from forming a State Bank. And immediately after it's formed, they can sell it to people who should not be in the Banking Business. This is a good Bill. It's simply for the protection of the People of the State of Illinois to see to it that the Bank, that is chartered by the State of Illinois is kept in the hands of people who should be in the Banking Business. It has nothing to do with currency exchanges. It's a good Bill and should receive your vote."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Have all voted who wished? Take the record. Your switch is still open, I think. It's locked.

Lemke.. 'aye'. On this question, there are 94 'Ayes', 11 'Nays' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1884."



Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "House Bill 1884."

Jack O'Brien: "House Bill 1884. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act related to banks and banking. Third Reading of the Bill."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative
Shea."

G. W. Shea: "Mr. Speaker, 1884 is a companion Bill to 1882. This would provide. the support would provide the rules and regulations to the Commissioner for the implemation. implementation of 1882, and if he refused to grant the owners. the new owner of stock the right to control the bank, it would be subject to review by this Board. I ask for a favorable Roll Call vote."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is 'shall House Bill 1884 pass?' All those in favor will signify by voting 'Aye', the opposed by voting 'No'. Have all voted who wished? Fleck, 'Aye'. Take the record. R. Walsh, 'present'. Lemke, 'Aye'. On this question there are 101 'Ayes', 3 'Nays', 1 answering 'present', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared 'passed'."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1150, Washington, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to beauty culture, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House, House Bill
1150 simply provides that the....inspectors of beauty
culture shops shall be registered Beauty Culturists.
There's an effective date on this Bill of July 1975 and

indicates that by that time the Department will be full geared and ready to provide this kind of service which hopefully will uplift the entire industry. The Bill passed out of the Committee without any opposition,

Polk: "Mr. Washington, do you have the..w..ah....endorsement of



of the beauty schools and the culture....culturists?"

Washington: "Yes, I have received support ...ah...ah...from

the beauty schools....some beauty schools and several of

the beauty culture associations on the endorsing this

Bill. I don't know, Representative Polk, of any opposition

to it."

Polk: "Thank you."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative
Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, one question of the Sponsor.....Rep-

Are theyare they.... the policy going to be in the future going to be that there'll be an inspection procedureah...for each profession, Harold?"

Washington: "I can't....I won't presume upon the...ah...

director but it is my impression that we're going in

Simms: "Okay, thank you very much."

Washington: "The job of the inspector is to make certain that the beauty shop, the establishment meets all the health and safety requirements set down by the Department. To make certain that the quality of the machinery is up to par. To make certain that the person who is actually doing the work is a licensed beautician. To make certain

that there are no 'fly by night' operators. To just in



the industry as such is functioning along the standards of the lines set down by the Department to guarantee that the buying public is not ...ah...ah....hoodwinked...that they are not harmed in the use of the various chemicals

that are used on the scalps and faces and so forth and

a sense protect, safeguardand make certain that

so on.....It is quite an involved job as you probably know.

Juckett: "Isn't it true though that the inspector does not infact test the individual as to his ability or to her ability of being a beauty operator?"

Washington: "No, that's not the function of the inspector,
that's the function of the examining board."

Juckett: "Well, then I would see no reas.....Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, because the inspector does not go into the ability of the individual to be an operator, I would see no reason for the inspector to be a beauty operator. I think the inspectors now are well-trained, they know exactly what to look for, they have a long check list which they use and which they must fill

in the business and they go over this check list with the individual and I think that this is just anotherah.. Bill to create opportunities for beauty operators and beauty school operator....operator trainees to get more

out and complete in order for the individual to remain

people into their business and I think a 'no' would be a very good vote for this type of a Bill"

Washington: "The last Gentleman stated everything which is the

complete opposite of the intent, language and purport of this Bill. This is not an attempt to create anything other than to uplift the standards, to make certain that the beauty culture operators are giving the public the kind of service to which they are entitled to. Until the one or two Gentlemen that arose on this floor, I wasn't aware that there was any opposition. The entire industry

supports it, the Department of Education and Registration



agrees with it. There are other disciplines under the Department of Education and Registration which are going in the same direction. I would assume that the State Legislature would want to guarantee in every way possible that the buying public would be safeguarded. You're talking about a very complicated field. I can't begin to name the kind of cosmetics that are used on the scalps of people. The hot combs, the dryers, all the paraphernalia and the machinery et cetera that is used by a competent operator. It seems to me to follow, 'as night does day'.....that anybody that is going to inspect these operations should have a first hand indepth thorough knowledge of 'em. That's the only purport of this Bill and it is because of that that I think the ...we've had so much support of it. I urge your consideration to a needed ...ah...reform in that area and I would remind you once again that this is two years in the offering the effective date is July 1975."

Speaker Telcser: "The question is, shall House Bill 1150 pass?

All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed

Caldwell to explain his vote."

wanted to point out that on my work on the Registration and Regulations Committee we find that when it comes to inspecting and policing the real estate business we have realtors, the building and architects, they are architects. I see nothing wrong with this Bill, as a matter of fact this is a step in the right direction, the people who are engaged in this trade are the ones who know how best to....to....police it or regulate it, if you please.

And....I would hope that we get enough red...er...green lights on that board to pass this Bill. This is needed Legislation and it's across the board. It's to....to... regulate an industry that's with us...has been with us...



and will be with us all the time. I certainly hope we canah..get enough votes to pass this Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Perry, Representative Dunn."

Dunn: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to explain my 'no' vote. I just talked to Representative Washington and if it doesn't pass I think he'll amend it to make it effective July the lst, 1977 and it would be a darn good Bill then. There'll be a different Governor, perhaps. I vote 'no'."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington to explain his vote."

Washington: "In response to Representative Dunn, I have no qualms about making the effective date 1977. That isn't the issue, really. The issues on all of these various disciplines have to be upgraded. I'm not going to waste any more timeput it on Postponed Consideration, will you."

Speaker Telcser: "It will be on Postponed Consideration. Is..

ah....is 1151 a companion Bill, Harold? "

Washington: "Based on that vote, I hope not. It's a separate
Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "Oh! I see, okay. House Bill 1151."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1151, an Act to amend the Illinois

Beauty Culture Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Washington."
Washington: "Ah....This Bill does two things to the Illinois

Beauty Culture Act, it increases the Board of Examiners from 5 to 7, which means they can expedite the handling of the exams more propitiously and it also does something else which is common to most boards and departments throughout the State, it sets up an advisory board ... of 9 individuals appointed by the Director of the Department of



Education and Registration. The thrust of this Bill is more less in line with that of the preceding Bill and the purpose is simply to make certain that the director in handling all the various disciplines under his department is getting a broad spectrum of input from the industry as such. Everyone in the industry wants this Bill. The Department ...ah...agreed that it would be useful to assist the Director in bringing in this kind of information. It passed out of the Committee without a dissenting vote. I started to say, I know of no opposition, on the floor of the House, let me simply say that I hope there is no opposition on the floor of the House and I ask for your support."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh.....There you go

Harold."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I'm opposed. I really feel very sincerely that to add another layeran advisory board to the Director of the Department of Registration and Education and beauty culture matters is just absolutely absurd. To get the picture correctly you've got to understand that there is already an examining board. This examining board certainly is free to advise the director in matters regarding beauty culturethere's absolutely no need whatever to put another layer...an advisory board on here andah...it just makes the whole thing absurd. Now, licensing generally, Mr. Speaker ought to be looked at very carefully, there are 181 licensed occupations....ah in this State. And, of these 181 9 of them rejected no one in 1971, the last year for which we have any figures. One of these was beauty culture. Now, I suggest to you that if the examining and licensing of beauty culturists resulted in nobody getting....being refused a license in 1971 and presumably their record is substantially the same for other years. Then, what is the point



been some people who were incapable of passing the examination or a reasonable examination taking it. Now, I suggest that we're licensing in this State more and more and we have a responsibility to look into it. We're licensing more and more for the licensee and less and less for the public....and I think this is a good time to turn that situation around and decline an advisory board to the Director of Beauty Culturists. This is absurd and the Bill should be defeated."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington to close."

Washington: "I don't understand the position of the Majority Leader nor did the House understand his position when he enunciated almost the same words two weeks ago and he was resoundingly defeated when I put this Amendment on. It seems to me the Majority Leader doesn't have a quarrel with this Bill he has a quarrel with the whole licensing procedure. That's a fait accompli. That's the Law of the State. He should have taken up that cudgel some time ago and if he is going to go after the licensing process it seems to me what he should do is come in here with a series of Bills to revise, reform or what have you along the line of his own sentiments....But, he's talking about....he's not talking about this Bill. This Bill simply says that there shall be an advisory board of 9 members to advise the....ah...ah...Director of the Department of Education and Registration. Other disciplines do it, teachers for example, every code department in this State has an advisory board and for a very sound reason, because no matter how competent the chief administrator may be he's dealing in a discipline field, he needs input from people who know something about the field, he has the discretion of appointing people of his own choosing. Presumably he will get



a cross section of a the various interest groups throughout the State to advise him. I think it's a step in the
right direction because all you're saying when you vote
for a Bill like this is that the people in the industry
should have a right to assist in determining on an advisory level only, how their industry should be operated.
This is a progressive forward sighted movement and I ask
you for the same support that you gave when you supported
the amendment which brought this Bill into the shape I
assume you wanted it in and I ask for your support."

Hoffman: "Is the Digest correct that you are adding crows to
 the protected species list?"

Boyle: "No,ah...crows....what this....what the Bill doesah...Gene, is if you look on page 5 of the Bill it puts crows in under the category of migratory game birds and it allows the Department, by administrative order, to regulate the crow season. But, it doesn't protect crows. Somebody else raised that. I think Representative Dunn had that same question, I checked with the Department and it does not, and I repeat that, does not exempt 'em from

 Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question ...133 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1831."
- Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1831, Catania, an Act in relation to State Aid for Probation services, Third Reading of the Bill."
- Speaker Telcser: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Catania."

 Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I

 ask leave of the House to return House Bill 1831 to

 Second Reading to be amended."
- Speaker Telcser: "Are there any objections? Hearing none,

 1831 on the order of Second Reading, will the Clerk please
 read the Amendment."
- Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #2, Catania, amends House Bill 1831,"
- Speaker Telcser: "The Lady form Cook, Representative Catania."

 Catania: "Amendment #2 to House Bill 1831 places the probation subsidy program in the administrative office of the Illinois courts instead of the Department of Corrections. It provides thatah...supervision programs which shall be recommended to be adopted under the provisions of this Bill are spelled out ...ah...suggestions are spelled out that is....it also provides that probation subsidy cannot be merely to increase the number of probation officers in any given probation programs and it provides that the amount of subsidy per reduction from the expected rate of commitment will be adjusted each



year according to the cost of living change. Further, it provides that the Probation Subsidy Act..shall not take effect until July 1st 1975. I move the adoption of Amendment #2."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion on the Amendment?

The Gentleman from Christian, Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Will the Lady yield for a question, please?"

Catania: "Yes."

Tipsword: "What is the probation subsidy that is now provided and what would it be under this Amendment?"

Catania: "Well, the probation subsidy itself is provided in the Bill. Amendment is proposed to meet the objections that were raised in Committee and after this Bill was voted out of Committee to bring the Bill into conformity with existing probation programs and proposed probation programs. I'll explain more about/when I actually explain the whole Bill."

Tipsword: "You mean there is no currently....there isn't currently a subsidy for probation?"

Catania: "That's right."

Tipsword: "What is the difference now that you make in this from 1066 which we passed yesterday?"

Catania: "1060 proposes to establish a statewide probation system which is not now in effect. House Bill 1831 is a permissive Bill. It provides that counties or circuits, if the statewide probation system is in effect, can really be very creative and innovated in proposing their own supervision programs which will be approved according to standards that will be set by the administrative office of the Illinois courts."

Tipsword: "Does it then provide that whatever any single county wishes to do innovatively will be supported through your subsidy by the other counties of the State?"

Catania: "It provides thatif a statewide probation system

is in effect that circuits will submit these programs.



There are twenty circuits in the State, an average number of five counties each, if the statewide system is not in effect, counties will submit these programs and as I said if the Illinois administrative office, the courts, that sets the standards and approves these programs. So it retains local control but it does have a statewide standard setting provision."

It appears to me from the explanation of this Amendment that what this does is guarantee that there should be no uniformity. In the probation services of the State of Illinois nor in the qualifications of probation officers. Catania: "Well, I feel that this/hardly what this Amendment does. Ah...The Amendment really does not address itself to uniformity or lack of uniformity. The Amendment, as a matter of fact, places the administration or the system with one central office, which certainly is a move to really establish standards and thereby set that degree of uniformity."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to speak to this Amendment.

Tipsword: "I'm sorry I was interrupted, while I was speaking to the Bill I wanted to further say that it appears to me that it provides thatah...differing areas of the State could set up whatever they think might be aa useful thing....under probation or some experiment al program and by virtue of this the General Revenue of the State of Illinois and all of the taxpayers, no matter what circuit or what county they reside in would be paying for this innovation or this experimentation. I would submit that it appears to me that we need to have some kind of uniformity in this kind of area and that the taxpayers of the State are not being taken by some other county. It....However, I have just been asked... the...the interruption that I received when I was speaking to the Bill, it was the request of the Majority



Leader that I might ask you if you would hold this Bill up until he might have a chance to speak with you about this Amendment."

Catania: "I'm sorry, I didn't hear that last request."

Tipsword: "You were interrupted too. I think....while I was speaking the Minority Leader asked me if I would request of you that you might hold this Bill up until he has a chance to examine the Amendment or to discuss the Amendment with you."

Catania: "You have any idea how long that might be?"

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Choate, for what purpose do you rise?"

Choate: "Just until I have an opportunity to look at the

Amendment and check with the Department. Five minutes."

Catania: "Five minutes? Certainly."

Speaker Telcser: "Okay, let's take that out of the record.

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Catania, I'd suggest you pay attention to this now. Now your Bill is on Second Reading, Representative Skinner has requested a Fiscal Note and one of the rules if a request is made for a Fiscal Note, before it can be movedyou gotta provide that note."

Catania: "I happen to have a Fiscal Note which I will file with the Clerk."

Speaker Telcser: "Very good, I'm glad to hear that, great.

That Bill will be left on Second Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1273, Farley, a Bill for an Act



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to amend the Savings and Loan Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Farley: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1273 addresses itself to the Facility Bill. The 77th General Assembly passed the Facility Bill whereas the inner city associations were enabled to relocate into more prosperous suburban areas and yet maintain a facility at their old location to serve those old neighborhoods. Weak associations were permitted to merge with stronger associations and also maintain a facility. It was hoped that the Facility Legislation would make it possible for strong associations to assist neighborhoods served by weak associations and for inner city associations to relocate into suburbs and gain strength which would be utilized to fortify the facilities. However, the Facility Legislation has proven to be somewhat faulty and that mortgages cannot be applied for, processed or granted at the facility. As a result facilities are not able to achieve their proposed purpose and as they cannot use the suburban money in the facility and because of the inability to make mortages at that facility This Bill would correct this glaring deficiency and would be a progressive move of major importance to the Savings and Loan Industry in metropolitan areas and throughout the State. I solicit and urge a favorable vote. Thank you."

MURPHY IN CHAIR:

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any further discussion? If not the question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Dunn, for what reason do you rise?....Oh! The Gentleman fromBarry.....Barry.....Okay."

Barry: "I would like to ask if the Sponsor'd yield to a question."
Speaker Murphy: "Proceed"."



Barry: "Is it true that this is a Branch, Savings and Loan

Association said that it was a bad Bill, it was Banking
....Branching....I wanted to point that out, Mr. Chair-

man, I wasn't sure at all that it was, but, thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? If not....ah...ah...

the Gentleman from Cook, Representative McAvoy."

McAvoy: "Will the Sponsor of the Bill yield to a question?"

Speaker Murphy: "He indicates he will."

McAvoy: "Bruce, ...ah....you say that not.....is not a branch program?"

Farley: "No, it is not."

McAvoy: "Well, it is a branch program, for the simple reason that you are going to be able to process mortgages at the.....at this institution.....where the old institution when you move into the new one."

Farley: "Mr. Speaker, I can't hear the question."

Speaker Murphy: "All right, let's have a little quiet, please:

Repeat your question, Representative McAvoy."

McAvoy: "The question I'm asking is this, you did say this is not branch....like branch banking or branch Savings and Loan. Well, now under the Federal Savings and Loan Program, when they move out to new territory, and leave the old institution there, but they don't process mortgages?"

Farley: "That's correct, this Bill would....."



"This would give the authority....." McAvoy:

Farley: "Yes."

McAvoy: "Well, then that would be Branch Banking."

Farley: "Well, it's not considered Branch Banking, it has nothing to do with banks. It's in the Savings and Loan

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from

Cook, Representative Piotrowicz." Piotrowicz: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,

in reading the Digest breakdown on this Bill, it does say and I quote from the Digest, 'provide that the Commissioner may adopt regulations providing for a facility which constitutes as exception to limitation on branches or offices as provided under the Illinois Banking Act', and it also ends up saying that, 'provides that the business conducted at the facility can include the processing of mortgages'. What I suggest, for your consider ation, is that this Bill does allow for Branch Banking of the Savings and Loan and even more than that, it allows those large Savings and Loan Associations that are in a financial position to expand throughout the county or throughout the city, I would think, it would allow them to do this and also gives them, I think, unfair advantage over the small Savings and Loans who have served the various communities throughout the city. I, after serious consideration on this measure, it is a Branch Banking situation for Savings and Loans and ask for opposition to this measure."

Speaker Murphy: "Is the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Arnell..-.No.....The Lady from Lake, Representative Geo-Karis is recognized."

Geo-Karis: "A point of order, Mr. Speaker. Wouldn't this Bill take 107 votes, to pass? Inasmuch as Article XIII, Section 8, of the Constitution says Section 7..... I would. Section 8....Branch Banking....this is what you're doing



in effect.....if you pass this Bill. It's Section 8,
Article XIII, of the Constitution. I submit, Mr. Speaker
I think we need 107 votes. I'd like to have a ruling from
the Chair. If you'd like, I'll bring it up there."

Unknown: "They're reading the Bill."



Speaker Murphy: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. The...ah...Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea is recognized."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, perhaps this is a misunderstood Bill. In the last Session of the General Assembly, I handled in this House, for the





administration, a Bill to permit facilities. All this does is amend that law and say that in those facilities that stay in the inner cities ...that they can process mortgages within the inner cities. Now, if you want to do something for those people that live within the inner city, let 'em get a chance to get their mortgages right where they live. That's all that this Bill does. Instead ofSavings and Loan Association 'A'....has a facility in the inner city and the main branch of it now out in Berwyn or Cicero or up in Skokie or out in Schaumburg.... let 'em....or Oak Lawn as 'Buzz' just said, let 'em have the opportunity to process the mortgage in the city without forcing those people to go from the inner city out to Schaumburg or Oak Lawn to get their loan. I think that perhaps that somebody has misunderstood this Bill. If they'd take the time to read it...we passed the Facility Bill in the last Session of the General Assembly At the behest of the then administration. All this does is let that facility that's left in the inner city process mortgages."

Speaker Murphy: "The Centleman from Peoria, Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I concur

in what the previous speaker just said. And, actually for those of you who are fearful of branch banking for savings and loans, let me say this, that starting July 1st it is my understanding that the Federal Savings and Loans will have the opportunity of branch banking or branch savings and loan whatever you want to call it. And, actually what this Bill does is it just gives the savings and loan and impliments that facility Bill which we passed in the last Session and this says it gives them an opportunity to make mortgages at that facility. And really that's all it says and I would favor your support.



Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Bureau, Representative

Walsh: "John, can you refer to your Digest and tell me if the Bill as described in the Digest ...ah. .is what we're presently voting on?" Porter: "Just a second..."

Walsh: "I don't have the Bill or the Amendments in front of me and I wonder if you might refer to the Digest and tell $\ensuremath{\text{me}}$ if it's correct and if not...." Porter:

"The description in the Digest is substantially what the Bill is about, yes."

This Bill passed the Cities and Villages Committee 14 to nothing with one voting present and I know of no opposition to It contains a specific provision that it is not a limitation on Home Rule Units.....and I ask the the House's favorable consideration."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Dick Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, John, once again....ah...in language that I asked earlier, if you could indicate....distinguish in some way what this Bill does from those other Bills to



which I alluded."

"Yes, ...ah...the other Bills were ...in my understand Porter: ing designed toto create a special district within which ...ah...there would be special assessment taxing powersah..and they would be exercisedah...to tax the district itself.....and there was objection.... I believebased upon the fact that those taxing powers would not be subject to referendum. This Bill has nothing to do with the crea.....creation of special taxing districts it has only to do with the creation of a redevelopment commission to carry out powers that probably already exist under the home rule provisions of the Consitituon. Very frankly the Billah...yearly defines what the powers are and is intended to preclude a long and costly and delaying court interpretation of home rule powers in this area. It's my opinion and the opinion of most of the experts who deal with municipal law that home rule units already have all the powers that are contained in this Bill. But, the purpose of it is to....ah...define by statutes that the powers exist and therefore avoid a long and expensive and delaying court interpretation if a municipality should wish to undertake this sort of a program."

Walsh: "All right, but this Bill applies to all municipalities, not just home rule units, does it not?"

Porter: "Yes, that's true."

Walsh: "So,:...ah....to say that it's something that home rule units now have the power to do doesn't answer the problem because you're giving additional power to non-home rule units."

Porter: "That may.....that may be true....so it does have that additional possible effect but I can't frankly imagineah...any circumstances where non-home rule unit is likely to undertake a redevelopment program of the type and vision. It's possible but it's very unlikely."



Walsh: "Are you granting additional tax....ah....taxing powers?"

Porter: "Nope.....taxing powers are not changed in any way at all."

Walsh: "The only thing that they might not have ...ah...that they might not have now that they would have under this Bill would be power of eminent domain?"

Porter: "What....I didn't hear that?"

Walsh: "Well....what additional power are you granting that's the question."

Porter: "I don't think that we're granting any additional powers...ah...to home rule units, as I said."

Walsh: "Well, what additional powers to non-home rule units?"

Porter: "Well, I assume that all the powers granted would.....

would be new in respect to non-home rule units...."

Walsh: "All the powers that you enumerated in your presentation."

Porter: "I'm sorry, I can't hear you, Mr. Speaker, can we

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I guess....ah...one of my concerns, John, is how dis... how does the commission determine the kind of property they would consider for appropriate development or redevelopment?"



Porter: "Well, the Bill provides that they would designate an area after public hearings for redevelopment...and... and it would then be up to them to adopt ...a plan or a proposal for redevelopment and go ahead with the program that they had invisioned."

Schneider: "Could our logic on this kind of a proposition carry us to a point where we say that it will be..... enhance the downtown area of some community to the point where we might want to avoid ...ah...traffic problems and have say....outlying expressways developed so as to avoid ...ah..heavy truck traffic or...ah..congestion of business nature...you know...busy traffic....ah...therefore leading to the possibility that....after long and extensive study we have decided that it might be a good idea to build an expressway from one part of town to another...in fact to have a cross-town expressway?"

Porter: "A cross-town expressway? No, I....I think that thisthis....ah....has nothing to do with a cross-town expressway, believe me....ah...this Bill is a Bill that ah....came out of the...a...ah...Appropriation Council for the City of Evanston in considering their problems in redeveloping a downtown that is becoming too old and ...and needs revitalization. Ah...."

Schneider: "I didn't mean the cross-town.... I was just suggesting that from one part of town to another part of town you know.... is really across town. But, I wonder, John if maybe... if you really could develop some kind of prohibition against something that could be construed that way... because I know it's difficult to develop a piece of Legislation for one's own area such as in your case, Evanston, and then have that as part of the Statutes, and then find other communities using it to their purposes. Now, whatever they may be, I'm sympathetic to redevelopment of decaying centers of cities of all sizes including my own and I wonder if perhaps such a prohibition or a



good language could be developed to protect us against
this because I do note that you also haveah...the
authority to dispose of federal money that they're directedtoward that municipality...ah...state funds and
so forth and ...ah...I'm not really paranoid on that topic
at all but it is a....kind of a touchy ...subject this
term and I wonder if maybe you could something with that?'

Porter: "Well, as I say, Glen, I...I don't think there is anything in this Bill in reference to the home rule unit....
that gives 'em any greater powers than what they already
have. It's a merely Bill in that respect. Ah....It
merely defines what they probably already have without

taking the matter to court."

Schnieder: "Okay, thank you very much."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Porter may bring his remarks to a close....and close the debate."

Porter: "Well, as I said, I don't know any opposition to the Bill, it is a merely Bill in a sense that itah.... allows for powers that already exist...ah....by all experts that I know of under municipal law. But, it does define 'em statutorily or attempts to do so and I urge a 'yes' vote."

Speaker Murphy: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Dick Walsh is recognized."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, as I indicated earlier, this really is a very significant Bill. Especially as to non-home rule units because....ah.... although it isn't certain just what powers home rule units may have in some of these areas we can assume they have all the powers enumerated ...it's quite clear that non-home rule units do not have all of these powers and I think we should specifically note that this would extend



to non-home rule units the power to issue ...a..ah....

general obligation bonds ...ah...without referendum. It
...ah...ah....number 5, in the Enumeration of Powers on
page 2 is to borrow funds as if...as....the municipality
may be deemed necessary for the purpose of business district development and redevelopment and in this connection
such obligational revenue bonds as it shall be deemed necessary. So, they can issue general obligation bonds it
would seem to me...ah...without a referendum and for that
reason if....if for no other....I believe this is a bad
Bill and should not be passed."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative

Porter to explain his vote."

Porter: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, ...ah...Representative Walsh has not read the entire provisions ...that says...'to issue such general obligation or revenue bonds as it shall deem....be deemed necessary subject to applicable limitations'...there are already statutory limitations in the law in respect to non-home rule units. I think his point is badly taken. I think it's also badly taken to say that it has anything to do with the cross-town expressway or anything like that. This is a Bill that has no effect like that and I would urge all of you to vote in favor of it."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I am casting my vote for this Bill and would certainly urge everyone of you from downstate areas that have cities such as we have in Waukegan with questionably run down downtown areas to reconsider your votes on this if you're casting a red light up there or if you are not voting, to certainly cast a green light for this. This may be the most important bit of municipal Legislation that we passed this Session. It'll give an opportunity



to areas that are deteriorating because of outlying shopping centers, for a second chance or a second lease on life.

Many of our municipalities do want to regenerate their downtown areas but without the authority to fund these it's physically impossible. We in Waukegan have got this very problem and I've looked into the problem...I find that the State of Colorado has got a similar Bill that they've just passed and it's having an immensely beneficial effect upon all of their outlying areas, their old business and downtown areas. I certainly hope you'll reconsider if you're voting against this and if you're not voting cast your light for it."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any further discussion? Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, briefly to explain my vote. I think the importance of this Bill has already been pointed out but I'd like to emphasize it and that is, this is a self-help Bill. This isn't a Bill to ...ah...provide State Aid to communities to help redevelop their downtown areas. This is a Bill that says, you have the authority to do it yourself. It seems to me this is the most salutary kind of Bill we can pass. We give to local communities the expressed explicit authority to help redevelop their own downtown areas. They don't ask for State money, they don't ask for State help, they want to do it on their own all they want from us is the authority to be able to do Now, there are many many towns in the State which have deteriorating downtown areas and it seems to me that it's in everybody's interest, not only the residents of those towns but everybody in the State....to have those cities and towns and villages be able to do that on their

own. And, that's why I'm voting to support this Bill, I think it's a good Bill, I think there has been a lot of



extraneous and irrelevent ...ah...criticisms or....or...
quibbles raised about the Bill. It really has nothing to
do with its central purpose and hope we can get some more
green votes up on that board. Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "Have all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the record. Did you wish to be recognized, Representative Walsh, from Cook County? W. Walsh.?"

Walsh: "Ah..Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I simply am not satisfied with the Gentleman's explanation that...ah...general obligation bonds that may be issued by this commission are subject to a referendum. The Bill doesn't say that at all, it says that the....they are subject to any statutory limitations hereafter imposed by the General Assembly upon cities and villages. I would interpret that to mean that there is an amount limitation that can...be imposed, not a limitation thatthe bonds must be issued subject to a referendum. seems to me that ...ah...this would permit ...ah...nonhome rule cities and villages to issue bonds without a referendum and Igeneral obligation bonds without a referendum and I think that's just dead wrong. Now, I would submit that maybe the Gentleman could take this . out of the record, we could go over it a little bit, this doesn't seem to be his intention, but it sure looks to me

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1350, Skinner, a Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner:"

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1350 is an attempt to get
the Department of Local Governmental Affairs in....to
conduct their sales ratio studies, which are studies comparing assessments with sales prices for given years
on a timely basis. Right now they're about three years
behind in reporting their statistics and they're completely
useless to local officials for that reason. What this
Bill does is say that after a phasing period of two years
that statistics...have to be completed and reported to
the local government within six months after the end of
the calendar year. It also says that ...ah..these statistics have to be printed in abooklet...in booklet
form two months after they have been repeated ..er....
that is reported to the local Assessor and County Clerk.
...they become public information."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea. Shea: "Can I ask you....have you discussed this with the Department, Cal?"

Skinner: "Sure."

Shea: "And, what do they say? Do they think that they can gear up to this feasibly?"

Skinner: "They say with a phasing period they can. Now, they have asked for a larger phasing period than I thought was reasonable, they asked for a two year delay after the end of the calendar year and I still think that is totally unreasonable. They're...they have been computerized for about six years now and ...ah...with the budget increases that the Appropriations Committee is giving this Committee...this particular office of the



Department I see no reason why they can't meet the schedule that has been laid down in the Bill. The Bill gives them a year.....to do this and Iyou have to get them on an annual basis or they are not going to get it done forabsolutely years after the end of the calendar year."

Shea: "One other thing,...as I understand ...like say....for
...for this year, real estate taxes for '72 ..er for '72
are now being paid this year, all right, now,and
the multiplier was put on say in March...by the c..c...c
by the Department...ah....the multiplier is usually furnishby the county by either March or April. Are you telling
me that for the '72 taxes when this Bill is fully implimented, that for the....for '72, that year, all the sales
would have to be computed and supplied to the local
assessor by March 1 of that next year?"

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook...."

Skinner: "No. 1...It gives six months after the end of the calendar year. It says that they have to be....just.... let's just take this year. Ah...well it's not....yeah, let's just take this year, this is the '73 calendar year, this would mean thatwithout the phase in that I have put in at the request of the Department, the report would have to be out to the county by July....July 1st. This would mean that many small counties would not have to run their own sales ratio studies and it would expedite in the intra-county equalization of assessments."

Shea: "All right."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? If not the question is shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Run the totalizer, Jack. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 102 'ayes' and 2 'nays and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1770."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1770, Polk, a Bill for an Act to



amend the Child Labor Law, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Polk is recognized."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is not a merely Bill, this removes exemption of minors under the age of 10 years old to be engaged in agricultural work. This Bill came out of the Spanish Speaking Commissionsah...study over the summer. At the present time.....no minor under 16 years of age....has restrictions placed on them, they are not permitted to work for gainful occupation in different types of work such as hotels, offices, stores, laundries and so forth. What we're attempting to do is to say that no child undernow under the age of 10 can be employed for farm labor. Now, this is directly related to the type of families that do....come in and do....ah...the migrant labor type of work. We do not have any opposition from any organized groups at this time. The canners have indicated that they actually don't want the children in the fields because they're causing more damage than they are actually picking the tomatoes and I would certainly appreciate your support on this Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Whiteside, Representative Miller."

Miller: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Murphy: "He indicates he will."

Miller: "Ben,....Ben...the only problem I have here is one..

...you used the word employment. I assume a child working for his father in agri...on the farm is not employed Ah...Mr. Miller, this states that aa person working for his parents or his grandparents or relative ..a..may ...may continue to work..ah...I drove a tractor before I was ten years old on a farm...and would be able to do so, and could continue to do so if this Bill passes?"

Polk: "That's correct. It does not effect the ..ah...relationship

Schneider: "Will the Sponsor yield, please?"

we're trying to keep the 5, 6, 7, and 8 and 9 year olds out of the fields, frankly."

Schneider: "I don't know....thank you.....just speaking to
the Bill quickly, I don't know how you deal with a problem

like this. I think it's...ah...kind of disgraceful that we would allow children to work ...ah...extensive hours under difficult situations. I guess you have to support

the Bill because without it you wouldn't have a limit-

ation at all."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Gene Hoffman."



Hoffman: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, my question is related to the one raised by Representative from Whiteside....but to extend it outside the family.

For example, ...ah...ah....working for a neighbor on the farm for wages. For example, I worked ...ah...for my neighbor ...ah...watch....yeah.....worked for my neighbor at a very young age and was paid for it. Now, would this prevent this form happening?"

Polk: "If your son is 7, 8 or 9, yes this would prevent him from working in the fields, as an agricultural worker, yes Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Polk may close the debate."

Polk: "Ladies and Gentlemen I think it's time in the State of Illinois that we address ourselves to this ...this type of a problem and let us be one of the first states to impliment a Child Labor Law Act which says that people or children under the age of 10 should be precluded from working in the fields and I sincerely appreciate your assistance on this Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Mave all voted who wish? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 107 'ayes', 6 'nays' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Yourell 'aye'. House Bill 1594."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1594, Schraeder, a Bill for an Act to amend the Fish Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Schraeder."

Schraeder: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this is just a....kind of a housekeeping thing a few changes in the Fish Code Regulations and it's recommended by the Department of Conversat....Conservation. And there was an Amendment attached to it which just was...ah...suggested



by the Bureau....under Mr. Boblitt, to bring it into conformity and....it was on the Consent Calendarit was on the Agreed list of Bills last Friday, had one objection was all. There's nothing wrong with it and I ask your vote."

Speaker Murphy: "Are there any further discussion? If not the question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Shea 'aye'. Shea 'aye'. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 127 'ayes' and 3 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1829."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1829, Catania, a Bill for an Act to protect potentiality of human life, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Lady from Cook, Representative Catania."
Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House,

House Bill 1829 ismy attempt to formulate for the State of Illinois an abortion law which will be a realistic one. My request to the Legislative Reference Pureau was that a Bill be drafted that would conform to the Supreme Court decision, but that would protect what I regard to be the right of fathers and the rights of the live born fetus to life. House Bill 1829 has been amended three times in attempts to clarify these provisions to protect the rights of fathers and the rights of the live born fetus. Now, the Supreme Court decision, which I am trying to have copies of distributed right now says very specifically that the rights of fathers were not considered in either the Georgia Case or the Texas Case, so that Legislation can still be drafted protecting fathers rights. What House Bill 1829 does is to say that a woman has to file an affidavit with the abortion facility where she is going to have the abortion performed stating that she has



informed the fatherif he is living and if he can be

be located, within 10 days of her coming to the abortion facilities to get the abortion....of her intention to have the abortion and that she has told him the address and the name of the abortion facilities. If he wishes to prevent the abortion he can do so by filing a statement with the abortion facilities saying that he accepts complete financial responsibility for the pregnancy and childbirth and that he accepts parental responsibility for the first 18 years of the childs life. I've done this as I say to provide recourse to those men who I think have a right to see to it that their children are born. If they feel strongly that these are their children and they want. they do want to have parental responsibility during those 18 years, they have this provision in the law. Now, with regard to the rights of the live born fetus. The Bill provides that if the abortion was saught, in other words it was not an emergency abortion to protect the life of the mother or the life of the fetus, that the right to parenthood really of the live born fetus is waived by the parents that seek the abortion say that the child becomes a ward of the State....so that it's quite clear who is going to bear the expense of preserving the life of the It's going to be the responsibility of the viable fetus. State....so that the resusitation and incubation equipment that has to be available for the preservation will be used and the cost will be paid for by the State. be happy to answer any questions about the Bill. And, as I said, there were 3 Amendments, and.... I would like to point out that it....it does have much of the same language as the Department of Health Bill, but it does go further in dealing with the rights of fathers and the

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lemke is recognized."

rights of live born fetuses."

Lemke: "Mr. Speaker, can I have a question of the Sponsor?"



Speaker Murphy: "She indicates she will, yes."

Lemke: "I notice in your synopsis you provide for penalties

for violation of the Act. What are these penalties?"

Catania: "The penalties are that any person on ...who uses an instrument... medicine, drug or other substance to procure

an abortion, not under the provisions of the Act, is guilty of a Class 4 felony. There are provisions to

protect the conscience of those who might be requested to help in performing abortions on or in undergoing an

abortion and there's a penalty for violating the rights of those people who object to either participating in

or undergoing an abortion. There is a penalty for failing to submit the sort of report that has been requested by

the Department which is a statistical report on abortions performed in health authorities throughout the State."

Lemke: "What protection do you offer the hospital or the doctor or the nurse or some person who refuses because of conscience to perform an abortion. What protection do they

have?"

Catania: "Anyone who violates the right of such person to refuse to participate is answerable in civil damages."

Lemke: "Can they be forced to perform an abortion?"

Catania: "No, they cannot."

Lemke: "Is there a provision in there to prevent this?"

Catania: "Yes."

Lemke: "From forcing to perform an abortion?"

Catania: "That's right."

Lemke: "And when are these abortions supposed to take place?"

In what...in what trimester?"

Catania: "In conformity with the Supreme Court decision it says that an abortion during the first trimester of the pregnancy shall be performed in a hospital or other health facility licensed by the State of Illinois. After the first trimester they must be performed in hospitals where resuscitation and incubation equipment for newborn infants is available and



in such cases the medical personnel are required to use such equipment to attempt to save the life of the infant provided that it shows signs of life which are spelled out. No abortion shall be performed after the second trimester except as necessary for the preservation of the life or health of the female or the fetus. And, I added the fetus because in cases of RH incompatibility, diabetes and similar instances sometimes an abortion is necessary to protect the life of the fetus. It's not always medical ty necessary just to protect the life of the mother." Lemke: "Does the Supreme Court decision talk about the second

Catania: "The Supreme Court decision says there cannot be interference in the first trimester. It says that after the first trimester there can be provisions to protect the potentiality of human life."

Lemke: "Mr. Speaker and Colleagues, I'd like to speak against this Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "Proceed."

trimester?"

"I do not think that we should take the life of an individual who is first born....and when we look at pictures of a 12 week old fetus....this is of man....I'm getting sick and tired of people here protecting the rights of murderers and voting one way to save a of a man who has proven himself no good. But, to deny the rights of aof a baby to have no rights....and was born at the inception into his life. And I refuse to vote for any Bill and I....as I said before I refuse to do what the Supreme Court says, I think it's the Legislators duty to do ...when the Supreme Court makes an errorto write laws to remedy these errors that are made by the Supreme Court and I urge you all to vote against this Bill. Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Douglas."



Douglas: "Will the Sponsor please yield for a question or two?'
Catania: "Yes."

Little Control of the Control of the

Douglas: "Ms. Catania, you have on page one...and I discussed this with you, I don't know whether you mentioned it...a statement thatah...the Department of Public Health ...presumably at some future time can determine that someone other than a physician is qualified to perform an abortion. Then on line 27 you say that no abortion may be performed except by a physician. Now, how do you resolve this apparent conflict and do you ...are you proposing that there should be a basis where non-physicians should do abortions?"

Catania: "I think Representative Douglas, that there is a trend towards permitting non-physicians, if they are qualified to perform abortions in the first trimester and on line 14, page 1, the definition of physician begins so that wherever the word is used thereafter in the Bill that definition applies....so that when it is used again on line 27, that's the definition that applies."

Douglas: "All right. Next question, on page 2, where you've added, by an Amendment, in ...or the life of the fetus.

Under what circumstances would an abortion be performed to preserve the life of the fetus. I'm not sure I understand ...ah...what you mean by that."

Catania: "Ah...I think I just mentioned in attempting to answer Representative Lemke's question, that sometimes an abortion is necessary ...an abortion in the medical sense, which is induced ...ah...expulsion of the product of conception, to protect the life of the fetus. In the case of RH incompatability where the fetus is infecting ..damaged by being retained in the womb. Or in other cases where there are medical reasons for removing the fetus."

Douglas: "All right, now, if I may,....just one or two more questions. Ah...Ah...you mentioned in your Amendment....

Item 'z' on page 2, if after reasonable search the father



cannot be found. Is this clear, not being a lawyer, of course you're not one either, but is it clear under the law what this means? If after reasonable search the father cannot be found. How does that decision get made.? You know, you've raised a very difficult question which I hope you can resolve in my mind at least about the question of ...of the roll of the father...ah...I...I think that there's athere's a certain amount of validity here in a father at a certain point having a roll to play in a decision of whether or not an abortion should be done, but what if the guy is gone somewhere and you can't find him. Are you going to penalize the mother and the baby by this term 'reasonable search'?"

Catania: "Well, this is exactly the problem that I've sought to solve with that position. I...asked the lawyers in the Legislative Reference Bureau to draft it as clearly as they could so that this could not be used either to victimize the woman or to make itah...difficult for the father to prevent the abortion if in fact he was willing to accept responsibility. Ah...."

Douglas: "Ah..Mr. Speaker, ..and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is areally...no matter how you....feel on this...on this ...very sensitive issue, this is an....

a....very, very bad Bill. And I'd like to address myself to the Bill as well as I can and as quickly as possible.

First of all it is utterly deceptive in the Synopsis and do not be fooled by thatanyone who's concerned at all about Supreme Court Ruling ..to say that this is written in line with the Supreme Court ruling because it just simply is not. It's obviously an effort to ...to challenge the Supreme Court ruling, which I think is a valid thing if this is the intent of the Sponsor, but it does not in any way go along with it. For example...ah...it...it...const... it...constantly refer...it says on page two that an abortion... an abortion in the first trimester should be done in a



hospital...,ah...and while I happen to think it's an excellent idea...it unfortunately goes against the Supreme Court ruling. Ah...there are references in here which would impose enormous penalties on the woman, on an innocent person standing by in an operating room who would be affected by the penalties inflicted on the people under this law. On page 2 it says that the medical personnel performing or assisting in the abortion are required hereby to use such equipment, and it clearly means ...if they don't do it they're subject to the penalties. But the worst thing by far ...Susan....I just can't stand on the Floor of this Legislature and let this go. No matter how you feel...to say that...that on page 3, that if a woman makes the decision for whatever reason, to have an abortion done, and that child is born alive, you've said here that that child shall be deemed to be abandond and the father and the mother consenting to the abortion thereby lose all rights, control, and authority over and are removed from any obligations for such child. What a horrendous act it would be for us to say to a mother, if for whatever reason she has decided to have an abortion that if her child is born alive that we the Representatives of the people take that child away from her. In my Bill which we've worked out very very carefully...at least it says that the court appoints a guardian ad litem to take the roll of protecting the child against a mother and father who very well maybe shouldn't have the child but to authorize under law that that child would be taken away from that mother and father I think is a ... would be a sinful kind of act. I would ask you.... I would ask you to recognize that this Bill sincere though as it may be, doesn't do either, it doesn't protect the right of the fetus, it doesn't protect the right of the mother, it absolutely ignores the ruling of the Supreme Court, it's bad in every sense and I'd hope that you'd vote against it.



Speaker Murphy: "The Lady from Cook may close the debate."

Catania: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House.

The problem of course with this Bill is that it does attempt to conform with the Supreme Court decision, yet it also attempts to recognize the rights of everyone involved in what is clearly a very anguished situation....that of an abortion. Now, consequently it tends to be opposed by those who don't like the Supreme Court decision as well as those who do. This, I think is a reasonable approach to getting a law that will be able to stay on the books and we can live with. It does have a severability clause at the end so that if anything is found unconstitutional the rest of the law can stand. Now, specifically with regard to Representative Douglas's point and then perhaps with regard to some others I feel that certainly the medical personnel in hospitals should be required to use every possible means that they can find to preserve the life of a live born fetus. And, I find something of a conflict in the statements of the previous speaker who feel that these people should not be compelled to use said equipment to save the life of that child yet he feels that the parents should have the right to have the child if it does in fact survive. Now, I feel that it is imparative that that equipment be used to save the life of the child. Also, I feel that the parents should decide whether they want the child or not ... and if they should decide to seek an abortion, I think clearly it means that they do not want the child. Also, I want to be sure that the resuscitation and incubation equipment is used...and I think it is important to make it very clear who's going to pay for the cost of the use of that very...very expensive life support equipment. If the child becomes a ward of the State, clearly it is going to be paid for and the hospital personnel is not going to be afraid to us it and they are going to do everything in their power to save the



life of that live born fetus. Which under the provisions of this Bill has all the rights of a person. I think this is an excellent Bill, I think it is a reasonable approach to the delema we find ourselves in, I find it's a great source of personal difficulty, I've sought to draft something we can all live with and I ask for your 'aye' vote."

Speaker Murphy: "The question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting, 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Rayson is recognized."

Rayson: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'm sorry I didn't get a chance to ask one question because this must be a good Bill because it suggests a rapist can deny a woman getting an abortion, if he rapes her....ah...but I don't know."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Deuster."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

This abortion Bill is very much like many others and the

only thing that's different about is it that the Lady Sponsor who developed it has gone far beyond into an area of sensitivity and addressed herself to a couple of problems that other people have just ignored. One is this, that ...ah...the primary emphasis here is on the responsibility during the first trimester ...trimester of a woman....and she delicately balances the roll of the man and the woman saying that the major thing is the woman is the one with the child and she ought to make the primary decision. And, secondly she's gone on to respect what most people have been talking about all year and that is the right of the unborn and she has added the word fetus which is really important. And, the other thing it's responded to the ...ah..experience that many of us have had and I have the same thing, my wife and I have RH incompatability and we had the prospect with our last daughter of considering an abortion not for the purpose of ending life but for the purpose of saving life.

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 1822, Walters, a Bill for an Act to amend the Criminal Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walters."

Walters: "Thank you Mr. Speaker,"

Speaker Murphy: "Madison, I'm sorry, Representative Walters."

Walters: "I believe it may be that I have to answer (tape failure....unintelligible)...I think it's a little bit different than the last one, I hope the vote's a little bit different also. 1822 is a simple Bill that you've received some mail on I believe and the thrust of this Bill we in the State of Illinois declare it to be the States public policy that human life commences at conception of pregnancy and that this human life is a person within the meaning of the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution. This Bill will protect all unborn human life throughout this development subordinate only to the saving of the life of the mother. House Bill 1822 will provide equal protection of the law to the unborn in the State of Illinois. Mr. Speaker, I'd like to read a couple small

quotes from Modern Medicine, May issue, May the 14th, 1973
'33,000 doctors spoke out on abortion', and some of the



quotes were as follows, very simply, a 42 year old pediatrician said 'it is totally incongruous...in the same hospital a team of medical personnel focuses all its expertise to save a...premature or immature infant. While in the next suit....next suite a fetus ...non-person, nonhuman being perhaps more mature and having a better chance of survival is tossed into an 'OB' bucket.' The second quote that was in the Chicago Tribune the other day was by a 57 year old general practitioner who said and quote, 'I would no more consider destroying a fetus than I would a Supreme Court Justice! I can't even imagine how any medical doctor who has ever held a four week old fetus in his hand doesn't see that it is a human being.' The last quote I'd like to read is a typical reaction...came from a doctor who was in favor of the Supreme Court Decision but he commented. 'I feel that to have a child born without continuous ..maternal care or father or family upbringing is an injustice to the child, still I fear that legalized abortion opens the door to further government control of life itself.' One of the problems that we have had with this Bill in discussing with various Members is the Constitutionality. Does this Bill adhere to the Constitution of the United States with the new Supreme Court decision? I'd like to refer to you the Attorney General of the State of Missouri, he happens to be an ordained Episco palian minister. He was taken to task by the recent article in the Saint Louis Post Dispatch and I'd like to read to you his answers to the Saint Louis Post Dispatch about Constitutionality. He said quote 'Every member of the Missouri Bar subscribes to an oath that he will present no defense to a court which he does not believe to be honestly debatable under the law of the land. As in the case whenever the Constitutionality of the Missouri Statute is challenged in the courts it is the duty of the Attorney General to defend the suit. This would be true regardless of his personal views on the Statutes.The..



Constitutionality of the Missouri Anit-abortion Statute which has been in litigation since 1970, I am a defendent in this litigation. I have defended the Statutes to the best of my ability and I have never raised any point which I do not believe honestly debatable.' Now, Ladies and Gentlemen, he goes on to say, 'In the Texas and Georgia cases were decided in some fashion without medical evidence being presented on whether the unborn child is a human life. Therefore, the Supreme Court of the United States did not and could not resolve the question, given the posture of those cases. It is my legal position that if a medical evidence can be educed and I believe it can, showing that an unborn child is human life, the State has a compelling interest in protecting life.' I do not believe it is unethical for an attorney to exhaust every legal remedy avail able to him, to press every debatable argument he has and to appeal the judgment of trial courts with which he takes issue. Instead it is my view that this is what our adversary system is all about, this is what our courts are for and I do not believe that an attorney should be asked to refrain from utilizing the judicial process because that process is time consuming or because his position may be unpopular or in conflict with a particular editorial policy. I would like to bring you up to date that in the United States Congress last week Senator James Buckley and 5 other United States Senators have introduced a Constitutional Amendment which says abortions except to save the life of the mother would end under the Constitutional Amendment proposed today by Senator Buckley of New York. The Amendment would establish that fetuses are persons entitled to Constitutional legal protection. In its recent decision on abortion the Supreme Court held that the fetus are not persons in the whole sense and that they do not possess the the capability of meaningful life. Buckley took issue with the courts finding and said the terms of



the Amendment was specifically established that unborn children are persons within the meaning of the fifth and fourteenth Amendment of the Constitution. In closing may I ask that a month ago or so we passed out of this House House Resolution 113 by Representative Robert Dunne, which asked Congress to do the same thing that Senator Buckley has undertaken and that received 120 green votes. Now, I say to you Ladies and Gentlemen of this House in Illinois it's our turn to tell the Federal Courts in Illinois that we in Illinois, in the House of Representatives believe in the protection of the unborn in Illinois and I ask for your green light. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Murphy: "Is there any further discussion? If not the question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lemke."

Duff: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in

Sangmeister: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the present law of the State of Illinois, we have two Acts, one Act relates to location, construction and modification of water wells. We have another Act which relates to the installation of water well pumps and equipment. These two Acts are obviously very closely related. The Illinois Department of Public Health has come to the conclusion they have to both be under one Act. It was presented to the Committee and it was passed 18 to nothing and it merely puts the two Acts together. It is also agreed to by the Department of Registration and Education with a small Amendment they put on it. I know of no objections and request your favorable vote."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from McLean, Representative Flinn is recognized."

Flinn: "Mr. Speaker, would the Sponsor yield to a question?"
Sangmeister: "Surely."

Flinn: "Thethe present Acts....the way they are presently written as opposed to your proposal here, Representative Sangmeister?"

Sangmeister: "Well, the reasons given by the Illinois Department of Public Health is that it will provide for the right of entry for inspection purposes, locate full time health departments may be designated as agents for the Department in making inspections and investigations....and further that authority is granted the Department to give written notice of violation to owners or persons involved to abate violations and to require abatement of violations. In other words to put some teeth into the Act as well."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Whiteside, Representative Miller is recognized."

Miller: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question or two?" Speaker Murphy: "Yes."

Miller: "Up in my area, Sir, we have many shallow wells. The



type in whichah...you can drive down, what is called a sand point and get good water at say 20 to 25 feet. Now, we're having real difficulty in this area because plumbers cannot put down that type of a point in my County. Now, so they have.....unless they have a special license, now, under this proposal, can a plumber or a person who is authorized to construct or ... ah ... authorized to put in a pump under this new proposal, is he now authorized under the same license to drive a point down like I described?" Sangmeister: "Well, as I see the Act, there is nothing Representative Miller that changes the prior law in regard to that at all. Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1313. Duff. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to notices. Third Reading of the Bill."

Murphy: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff is recognized." Duff: "Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1313 responds to a serious doubt that home rule units, which include many cities and villages in the State, as well as the County of Cook, could legally avoid publication requirements, by simply requesting an ordinance to delete, alter or water down such) publications, thereby denying citizens within those units of their right to know. You'll agree, I'm sure, that if any of these units decide to tamper with matters of public interest, the human cry would be forthcoming in short order. However, since the New Constitution contains the phrase 'powers and functions of home rule units shall be construed literally' it is in the public interest to be absolutely certain that their right to know is not impaired. Real estate assessment lists, personal property lists. changes in real estate assessments, delinquent real estate taxes, delinquent special assessment lists, notices of zoning hearings, bid notices, local election notices, referneda, bond issues, condemnation. eminent domain privileges, etc. are just too important to tamper with. Most important, House Bill 1313 does nothing to add to the publications requirements. It does not increase rates. It does not increase costs. It does nothing that is not being done now. A citizen in a homerule village, city or county, should not be a second class citizen. His right to know should be equal to that of any citizen in the state. Publication laws not in the Statutes were put there by Legislators from every corner in Illinois. Over a period of 155 years and after much deliberation. This legacy belongs to the State Legislature and should stay here. House Bill 1313 is supported by the Illinois Press Association, the Taxpayers Federation of Illinois, the Cook County Suburban Publishers Association and all accredited Chicago

Murphy: "That is your privilege. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "I simply want a clarification of your Ruling, Mr. Speaker.

Now, under what Section are your Ruling that this takes only 89 votes?"
Murphy: "Under Article VII, Section 61."

Washington: "Section 6I, which provides home rule units exercise and perform concurrently."

Murphy: "That is correct."

Washington: And where Legislation permits that then it is not a violation or infringement upon the home rule unit."

Murphy: "It is not a denial or a limitation."

Washington: "And that's in keeping with the previous ruling by the Speaker on a Bill which he handled himself?"

Murphy: "It's in keeping with a Ruling I'm making now at least."

Washington: "Thank you."

Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook may close the debate."



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Duff: "Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a Bill which does protect the public and its right to know. It does equalize and make the right of the home rule units and all others in the State the same. I would appreciate a favorable Foll Call."

Murphy: "The Question is, shall this Bill pass? All those in favor, signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wished? The Clerk will take the Record. On this question there are 123 'ayes', and 4 'nays', and this Bill, having received the Constitutional Majority, is hereby declared passed."



Speaker Murphy: "House Bill 1211."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1211, Hyde, a Bill for an Act to amend the Savings and Loan Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Hyde

is recognized."

Hyde: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill is the product of the Commissioner on Savings and Loans and his Staff and it is an effort to provide a fund out of which to ...ah...reimburse and to protect ...ah...depositors who have lost their life savings in savings and loans that go bankrupt or through criminal activity or otherwise and I am speaking of the City Savings and Loan, depositors lose: their life savings and what the Bill does and it is complicatedah...right now most savings and loans in the State are Mutual Savings and Loans and that means that their earnings and the funds deposited are the only moneys that they have to deal with and to make loans. Now, if they can convert into Stock Associations they then may sell stock and add to the money available to them in their operation. This is very desirable. Now, the Federal Government has had a moratorium on this type of conversion from a mutual to a stock company and it is anticipated this moratorium will soon be raised and it will then be most advantageous economically for Savings and Loans to transfer from mutual to stock associations. Now, what this Bill does is provide a tax of 10 percent on the fair market value of the stocks that will be issued to the depositors in a schedule ... scheduled order and this tax will go into a special fund to reimburse people whose savings have been wiped out because of defalcation and the defaults of savings and loans that.....did not have insurance previously. Now you know the Federal Court's Judge Robson, has entered an order finding that the State was negligentah..in the administration and supervision of the records of the City Savings and really the...ah....the posibility of a judgment being entered against the State is



very real. What this does is provide a fund out of which these people can be paid. It really is simple justice....

ah....and I would urge your support for this Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative
Maragos."

Maragos: "There is a note that a Fiscal Note is applicable.

Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Hyde: "Yes, Sir."

Maragos: "Henry, what will this do regarding the State's

ah...ah....as far as administrative costs go? If any?"

Hyde: "Sam, I honestly don't know and I recognize that it will

require personnel to administer and it will require the expenditure of some funds. Now, ...ah....the Secretary of

State's Office is interested in this as well as the Commissioner of Savings and Loans and I could only say that this aspect of it is going to be discussed at length in the Senate and it was their recommendation to pass it out of

the House and that problem would be dealt with in the Senate."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Mugalian."

Mugalian: "Will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Murphy: "He indicates he will."

Maragos: "All right, thank you."

Speaker Murphy: ".....Let's have a little quiet so that the Gentlemen can hear."

Mugalian: "I understand this Bill essentially provides for the conversion of a mutual savings and loan which is about the only kind we have in the State, to a Stock Company. Is that correct?"

Hyde: "Ah....That's correct."

Mugalian: "Thank you."

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? If not the question is shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting



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'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Maragos is present. The Clerk will take the record. On this question there are 103 'ayes', and 5 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. And one 'present'. Anybody that has any Bills they want called now they should come up and tell the Chair so we can call their Bill. House Bill 1576."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1576, Hyde, amends the Savings and
Loan Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Hyde is recognized."

Hyde: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, this is the second part of the Commissioner of Savings and Loans approach to the problem of restoringah...depositors in State Institutions whose life savings were wiped out, through negligence...and ...ah...through maybe worse in the supervision and administering of these savings and loans. Now, as you may know, abandoned property, money and other tangible assets that are left in a savings and loan over a period of some 15 years are then deemed to be abandoned and they are then transferred to the State Retirement.... State Employees Employment Fund. This Bill cuts the period of time down to 7 years instead of 15 ...ah...that they are considered to be abandoned, it provides a formula or procedure by which depositors may reclaim their assets if they in fact weren't abandoned ...ah...and then it says that after this period....ah...the property will be transferred to this fund that I spoke of in connection with the last Bill ...ah..out of which the depositors will be repaid their lost savings. Now, it is estimated the first year this would produce about \$500,000 and then every year there after about \$100,000. While it does take away from the State Employees Retirement Fund....ah...this money....ah... at the same time it is the responsibility of this Legislature to fund the State Employees Retirement Fund and this



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provides a source from savings and loans assets ...ah...to pay back savings and loans depositors. I don't think it will make any substantial impact on the State Employees Retirement Fund and it to is a method whereby people who have been wiped out because of negligence of the State to ...ah...to achieve simple justice by getting some of their money back. This is a very small procedure but nevertheless it is some progress toward restoring these people and I would urge your favorable vote."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Griesheimer. "38. 6

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield to a question?" Hyde: "Yes, Sir."

Griesheimer: "Henry, I was wondering ...ah...who makes the

determination as to negligence on the State's part in these
cases? I've heard a great deal said about the city savings
and loan situationthat the State was negligent. I've
yet to see any law suit make the determination. Negligence
as I understand it is civil determination by the court. I
just don't see why the State of Illinois should just on...
be accused ...ah...of being negligent and therefore have
to pay without a full civil hearing on it."

Hyde: "Well the answer to that is twofold. First of all there was an extensive investigation of this situation by the Illinois Legislative Investigating Commission and they have filed a very detailed report and the pages of that fairly bristle with examples of, let's say, ineptitude...ah..ah. on the part of State Officials who were supervising the savings and loan. But moreover...ah...ah...Ron, the Federal court has made that determination, Judge Irwin Robson, in a suit before him ...ah...found that the State was negligent and liable. The problem with that is ...ah. its broad sweeping...ah..impact....the Attorney General is hoping to narrow that judgment to just the city savings and loan situation but the fact is a Federal Judge has made a



specific finding of negligence on the part of the State.

Our problem is, how do we restore these? And, there is
a Bill pending for direct appropriation out of General

Revenue that's one way, but this way...ah...provides another
way that won't impair General Revenue. This provides a

small fund out of savings and loan's assets or assets deposited in savings and loan to start repaying some of these
people and I won't burden you with some of their stories

Griesheimer: "Are there any other precedence in any of the other
50 states where the state guarantees the deposits in savings and loans?"

Shea: "Henry, ...ah...will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Bill but I wanta make sure I understand it. The....a...

ah...money to create this fund is a premium ...ah..tax on savings and loans? "

Hyde: "No, Sir. This is this is a money first....."

Shea: "No....no....in the last Bill."

Hyde: "The last Bill would be a tax on the fair market value of stock to be issued by a savings and loan when it converts

from a mutual to a stock association."

Shea: "All right, now. Is there a limitation on that fund?"

Hyde: "No, Sir. And, that ...a...ah...is one of the problems

with it which I...I...have stated. I'm sure the Senate



will address itself to because ...ah...I imagine when we bring our laws up to date to require ...ah..insurance on these savings and loan, the need for this will no longer exist. So I don't view this as an ongoing thing at all, I think there should be a cutoff date or someway of ...ah...altering this fund when the need for/no longer exists.

hea: "All right, now, does this operate just prospectively or both prospectively and retrospectively?"

Hyde: "Well, the Bill operates prospectively ...ah..in the ...

Shea: "And you expect this Bill then to createah...about \$500,000 in the first year and \$100,000 a year thereafter."

Hyde: "Those are the figures given to me by Commissioner

Lanagan and his counsel Mr. Palmer. "

Shea: "All right, but....and then what in effect we're going to have to do is make up that money someplace along the line. Is that correct?"

Hyde: "Well, not necessarily. I...I...I ..really don't know where we're going to get the money....ah...that Judge Robson has said the State owes these people, but this is a start. This will create a fund....ah...and it won't come out of General Revenue at all it comes out of assets deposited and abandoned in savings and loan associations. The other Bill will provide a fund if and when the Federal Government lifts the moritorium. Now, what the take will be on that, Jerry, I don't know. Nobody knows. Miller: "One question of the Sponsor. It has to do with abandoned funds in buildings or savings and loan."

Hyde: "Right."

Miller: "Does this include Federal Savings and Loans?"
Hyde: "No, Sir. We have no jurisdiction over them."

miller: "Well, there is some in the banking area and I just wanted to be sure, Thank you very much."

Speaker Murphy: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Representative Hyde, what constitutes an abandoned depository account?

where there's been no activity whatsoever for 15 years, now it's reduced to 7.Ah....But there are many protections requiring notifications and ah....that sort of thing. If somebody has deposited money and ah...for 7 years there has been no activity in the account there are many procedures of safeguard so that your money won't be



preempted if you want to do it. It is technical and complicated but the Bill does cover that."

Hoffman: "If these procedures are implemented as far as establishing.....ah.....where these people are....that the accounts are drawn on, and the funds are turned into the commission and utilized for the purpose of (unintelligible) What recourse does the depositor have?"

Speaker Murphy: "Are we through the debate?"

Hyde: "Yeah, there is recourse, sure."

Speaker Murphy: "All right."

Hyde: "The Gentleman, I couldn't understand him, Sir. The
Gentleman asked what recourse the depositor would have
after 8 years and there is adequate recourse in the...the..
..the claim....ah...simply files the claim with the
Department and the Department ...ah...it takes several
years after the 7 years to process this through. So, I
would say it would take a good 10 years before your claim
would.....you would not have a claim...But I can assure
you there is adequate safeguard in here and I'll hand you
the Bill to look at, to protect a person who for 7 years
maybe did not have any activity in his account. There's
only a presumption of abandonment at the end of 7 years
and there is a simple way to get your money back if in
fact it has not been abandoned."

Speaker Murphy: "Representative Hyde, have you concluded your closing debate? All right. The question is, shall this Bill pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', those opposed by voting 'no'. Representative Shea 'aye'. Have all voted who wish? Representative Choate 'aye'. Representative Grotberg 'aye'. Schoeberlein: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill 1532 establishes the Illinois Wage Payment and Collection Act. It will permit the Director of Labor to assist employees in the collection of wages and wage supplements....fringe benefits ... due them up to 1000 per employee, where the employer is improperly withholding the amount. Now, this Bill passed the House two years ago 138 to 4 and it was one of the Bills that was placed in the bottom drawer somewhere and...ah... the Senate never took action upon it. This is to help the employee who needs help, who perhaps doesn't have money

Speaker Murphy: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Jaffe."

Daffe: "Will the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Jaffe: "Does this now mean that the State can get into the wage assignment business?"

schoeberlein: "No, it does not. It may...assistah....

During this period of time the cost of living index has gone up 42 percent. Now, I submit to this House that it's clearly unfair to have sheriffs being paid \$17,000 as the minimum, we raised it for the sheriffs, we did it for the sheriffs....and..and not for the other county officials. You're going to have a situation in Illinois where you have sheriffs being paid \$17,000 and recorders being paid \$9,000. The circuit clerks being paid \$9,000. And, I certainly hope that some of those Members who are absent from the Roll Call would give us enough votes to reconsider this question where we can debate it further and ...and bring it out before the House because on Saturday when this Bill was voted on many of you weren't here and there weren't very many people on the floor at that time and I'd hope some of my friendsah...from Chicago and the northern part of the State where we supported Legislation beneficial to them would give us enough votes to get 89 so we could reconsider this

Rayson: "Well, rather than take the time I....ask for leave to put it on Postponed Consideration."

Speaker Telcser: "You have that right, Sir. Put it on Postponed Consideration. House Bill 1314, now, I guess
there is an agreement on that Bill. Well, Madigan just
came up to me and said, 'call it'. We assured him we'd
call it today."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1314, an Act to amend Section 16

of an Act to create sanitary districts and to remove obstructionsThird Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Madigan."

Madigan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I wouldn't go so far as to say that there is an agreement but I would like to ...call the Bill and have it heard and take a Roll Call on the Bill. I've already spoken to the Bill....However, let me reiterate that it only applies to the Chicago Metropolitan Sanitary District. They already have this power for sewer projects and the Bill would provide that it would be granted for flood control projects also. Additionally

the property owners rights to a judicial hearing are not



abrogated at all. Those remain exactly the same. The only issue that is postponed is the question of compensation. I would request a favorable Roll Call."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Thank you, would the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Speaker Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Juckett: "Now, are we talking about underground pipes or sewers or are we talking about retention basins?"

Madigan: "Bob, it would be my understanding that this Bill would address itself to retention basins."

Juckett: "Now, do you know where these retention basins would be located?"

Madigan: "I don't have that with me. I have other Bills which are currently pending in the Appropriations Committee, which set out in detail the specific areas where they propose to build the project."

Juckett: "Do you have any idea how large these retention basins would be?"

Madigan: "No, I would not be in a position to answer that."

Juckett: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the

House, I think here we're talking about a very ...very

valuable power which most governments do not have and we're

talking about taking large sections of land out of cir
culation and being used for retention basins. Now, the

State of Illinois has ...ah...extensive programs along

the DesPlaines River, along the North Branch of the Chicago

River to do the same thing. And, they are not exercising

the quick take powers, they're getting agreements of the

people who own the land ...ah...to sell the land or to

trade the land and....in order to do this same thing. And if the State can do it this way, I don't see any reason why the sanitary district can't do likewise and I think this would be a bad precedent to give this extreme power to a municipality and I would urge you to vote 'no'."



Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, with due concern for the address of the last speaker, we in the City of Chicago whose furniture floats in our basement during a storm are very concerned with these retention basins be formed. So many of us are injured and I solicit your vote."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,

I think Representative Kosinski hit it right on the head, when he talked about the need for quick....quick releif from the flooding problem in suburban Cook County and in Chicago. Now, all we're trying to do is to get the show on the road. And, I was surprised at Representative from the northwest side and the suburban area, because I don't know how his district was during the spring but I can tell you that many of my areas were under water. That we are now completing a deep tunnel project on 39th Street and with the completion of that project we hope to solve many of the flooding problems out in the western and southwestern suburban areas. And, I think this Bill will go a long way toward solving some of the flooding problems we have in suburban Cook County and I'd ask for the support of the House."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Adams, Representative McClain."

McClain: "Will the Sponsor yield?"

Speaker Telcser: "He..indicates he will."

McClain: "Mike, just one question. Does the State at this time have this kind of power for quick takes maneuver for flood control?"

Madigan: "Mike, I really don't know but I don't think so. It just doesn't seem to me that the State is involved in flood control projects, where local sanitary districts



would be."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Miller.....Tom Miller."

Miller: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House and particularly Representatives from the Suburban areas....I'd like to express my concern to this particular Bill. We have in the 10th District a quarry, operated by the Materials Service Corporation, and I attended a meeting a year ago where there....where there was a representative of the Metropolitan Sanitary District who was outlining to a group of people the distinct possibility of taking the quarry and using it as a retention basin....for the combined sewer system of the Chicago areas to run that into that quarry in periods of heavy rainfall. And, I think it's a very dangerous proposition to give quick takes to the Metropolitan Sanitary District. For that reason I intend to vote 'no'."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representatsive
Ron Hoffman."

Hoffman: "Mike, is this just another vehicle to create the 'Cross-town Expressway'?"

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Madigan to close."

Madigan: "Mr. Speaker, other ...ah...speakers to this Bill have very adequately expressed the need for the Bill.

The need concerns flood control projects ...those of you from the suburban....Chicago suburban area are well aware of that problem. Please let me impress upon you that the judicial right of the property owner are not changed because an action is taken for quick take rather than through normal condemnation. Their right to a hearing before a judge is retained there is no difference in that area at all. I would request a favorable Roll Call.'

Speaker Telcser: "The question is, shall House Bill 1314 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the



opposed by voting 'no'. The Gentleman from Cook, Rep-Schlickman to explain his vote."

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in explaining my vote, I call to your attention that the law as it presently exists restricts the quick take to only easements to only easements....for sewer improvment projects. By this Bill we're not only extending the quick take authority to flood control matters, but for the acquisition of property for flood control matters. Tying this in with the deep tunnel program of the Metropolitan Sanitary District, we're talking about something very ...very .. substantial ...and absence of further showing I must be recorded as voting 'present'."

Speaker Telcser: "Record Representative Schlickman as voting 'present'. Record Representative R. Dunne as voting 'present'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Phil Collins to explain his vote."

Collins: "Well, Mr. Speaker in explaining my vote, I...I.... would urge all Members to get on behind this Bill and vote for it. I know that my District is not only in Chicago but is also a suburban area which ...ah...we have serious problems and grave flooding problems. We need this....we need this Legislation to be able to allow the sanitary district to solve the problems that are washing away so many of our homes ...ah...and as Representative Kosinski said, floating their furniture in their basement. I ran for the sanitary district some about 10 years ago and I know the....the....great potential but also the ...the problems facing this district and the money that must be expended in construction of new ...ah. flood control facilities. Deep tunnel facilities and all We, we are spending millions of dollars now and it is not adequate yet and I would urge that you join Representative Madigan and some of the others voting for this Bill to



pass this much needed Bill. This really is...this is crisis Legislation....when it comes to Cook County.....

As I said not only in the City of Chicago where I have resided but also in the suburban area where I now reside.

The....the flooding in the...this last series of storms was....was.....unbelievable and the damage that it did out south, I can only assume that it was the same north and west. I...I...as Representative BluthardtI have never been a great advocate ofquick take provisions, but I certainly think that this is.....this is much needed Legislation and I would urge an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, Hirschfeld wishes to be voted

'aye'. Porter, 'aye', Mahar 'aye'. Now, you know we've taken five Roll Calls on every Bill, now, if the Members wish to vote they ought to be in their seats. Now, I'm going to take one more Roll Call, I'm going to recognize no one to explain their votes. All right. The question is, shall House Bill 1314 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? You're going to loose it.....If you want to get on....you better get on now. Eave all voted who wish?
