Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker, on this Resolution, I'd like to have it go back to Second Reading, there was a..are we on Second?"



Telcser: "Yes,Amendments, now. The Resolutions don't have 3 separate days."

Griesheimer: "Right. All this Resolution does by way of explanation is, it deletes the next to the last paragraph in the Resolution that was adjusted by the Committee..and ah.. the Committee recommended that we delete the 2nd paragraph with regard to certain indications of economic necessity for the Senior Citizens Committee. I would urge its support."

Telcser: "The gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Ah..Mr. Speaker, I'm wondering if we could have the Resolution read in its amended form, its not too long a Resolution, is it?"

Telcser: "No, would the Clerk please read the Amendment?"
The Resolution in the Amendment form."

Fred Selcke: "The Amendment #1 provides that..ah..House Resolution 281 is hereby amended by deleting the next to the last paragraph of the Resolution. Now, I'll read the Resolution and leave the next to the last paragraph out. House Resolution 281 whereas the Governor of Illinois has announced the discontinuation of the Governors Committee on Senior Citizens, and whereas this Committee was created in 1970 to fill a gap in the State Government Service to Senior Citizens and during 1972 handled more than 50,000 telephone inquiries, responded to thousands of letters, and personally assisted many of the older citizens of Illinois and whereas the alternative suggested by the Office of Governor would place the State Service to the aged, under a large State Agency where their problems could not be handled by persons within an understanding of the peculiarities of the situations involving the Senior Citizens of Illinois, and whereas, proposed Legislation now under consideration by the Legislature would create a Department of Services for the Aged to assume the burden now carried by the Governors Committee on Senior Citizens, therefore, be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the 78th General Assembly of the State of Illinois,



that we strongly urge the Governor of Illinois to delay his planed abolition of the Governor's Committee on Senior Citizens of Illinois until becoming law of House Bill 1405 or similar Legislation which would create a Statutory Agency of State Government whose sole function would be to aid the Senior Citizens of Illinois with problems arising out of their advanced age, and be it further resolved that the Clerk of the House of Representatives be directed to transmit a copy of this Preamble and Resolution to His Excellency, Governor Daniel Walker."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Will the Sponsor yield to one question?"

Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Shea: "Were there any Representatives from the Governor's Office at the Committee hearing?"

Griesheimer: "Not to my knowledge, Mr. Shea...ah...it went through...ah...in very short order with no explanation, the Committee took immediate action on it, and to my knowledge although there was an individual present from the Governor's Office who had been involved in this, there was no testimony by him on it whatsoever."

Shea: "He offered to be neither an oponent or proponent of this Resolution?"

Griesheimer: "He did not sign up to be witness as proponent or oponent...ah..."

Shea: "Thank you."

Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved to adopt Amendment #1 to House Resolution 281. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', opposed 'no', the Amendment is adopted. On the Speaker's table.....Is Representative Hirschfeld here? On the Speaker's table appears House Resolution 27, for which purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett wish to be recognized? Representative Juckett, you wish your Resolution called? House Resolution 27."

Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the



House. House Joint Resolution 27..ah..calls upon the Congress of the United States to consider the Abortion issue which was passed by the Supreme Court and I think its the proper way of doing it for the Congress to..ah..pass a Constitutional Amendment in boding what we here have passed in Resolutions. And have attempted to pass by Bill form. Ah..if there are any questions I'll be glad to answer it, but, it does call on Congress to pass it and the, ..ah.. there is a deadline on it that if the..ah..Congress has already passed it then the Resolution would be of no effect."

Telcser: "The gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I'm just wondering if this isn't something maybe we'd want to take up at a later time when its a little ..ah.."

Telcser: "All right. The Sponsor indicates..take out of the Record. On the Speakers table appears House Joint Resolution 39 for which purpose the gentleman from Cook, Representative DiPrima is recognized? Representative DiPrima you are recognized, Sir. For House Joint Resolution 39.."

DiPrima: "Yes, well..ah..Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, what this House Joint Resolution attempts to do is..ah..get the message over to our Members in Congress from the State of Illinois and inform them that..ah..the Postal Rates on the 2nd Class Rates are so extremely high that like the Legion, VFW, the Veteran Organization magazines and Civic Organization magazines are going down the drain with their publication and I would appreciate passing this up and getting this message over to our Members in the Congress, try to do something about curtailing them excessive rates."

Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of
the House, Committee Amendment #1 reduces the total
dollar amount by \$521,400 It was an agreed Amendment.
I move for its adoption."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman
has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to
House Bill 367. All in favor of adoption signify by
saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is
adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading.

Telcser: "Is there any, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Yourell: "Roll Call. I request a Roll Call on that, Mr. Speaker."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner. Representative Yourell, did you really, do want a Roll Call really or are you...? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 926. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Amendment #2, Kempiners, amends Senate Bill 926 on page 2 by deleting..."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Will, Representative Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. This is an Amendment which I have talked to the Sponsor about and which he accepts and it includes payment for M.D.'s, chiropractors, clinical psychologists and optometrists but leaves out opticians and accupuncture and I would move for its adoption."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 926. All in favor of adoption signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. Senate Bill 927."



Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 927, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections and so forth of the Non-Profit Hospital Service Plan Act, Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Committee Amendment #1 amends Senate Bill 927 on page 1, line 31 and so forth."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Miller."

Miller: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, there were two Amendments offered in Committee on Senate Bill 927. One Amendment on page 1, line 31 deleted the word services and inserted in lieu the word fees. It was a corrective Amendment language wise."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 927. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Fred Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2 amends Senate Bill..."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Miller."

Miller: "Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 927 in Committee was also a corrective Amendment language wise by deleting on page 2, line 33 the words 'maintained by a corporation' and adding in lieu thereof 'corporations'."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 927. All in favor of adoption signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. Senate Bill 266."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 266, an Act to provide for the exercise of the right of eminent domain, Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Telcser: "Are there Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. Senate Bill 345."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 345, a Bill for an Act to amend



the Juvenile Court Act, Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends Senate Bill 345..."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Porter."

Porter: "Mr. Speaker, I don't have these Amendments in front of me but each one of them is a technical Amendment changing a word or two for technical reasons. They have no substance whatever."

Telcser: "The Gentleman has offered to move the adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 345. All in favor of adoption signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. Senate Bill 346."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 346, Porter amends an Act relating to adoptions,,Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment amends Senate Bill 346 on page 6, line 16 and so forth."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Porter offers to move the adoption of Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 346. All in favor of adoption signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. The Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? Third Reading. Senate Bills Third Reading. Senate Bill 23."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 23, a Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from LaSalle, Representative Fennessey. Is the Gentleman on the floor? Take it out of the record. Senate Bill 105."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 105, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to jurors, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Day."

Day: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this Bill amends the Act with reference to the summoning of jurors and authorizes the now sheriff to summon them by registered mail. The Bill in its original form



provided that the Clerk would, could summon the jurors in this fashion and at the suggestion of the Sheriff's Association, a Committee Amendment was accepted which retains this function in the sheriff's office so that all Bill does now is to simply authorize the sheriff to summon prospective jurors by registered mail and of course the reason for it is that it cuts down on the cost and I know of no opposition to the Bill in its present form and would appreciate your support."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Well, Representative Day, why don't we just take the authority away from the sheriff if we are going to use the mail? Why don't we just let the circuit clerk, the notifying agency just send the letters rather than going through two or three layers?"

Day: "Well, we are not going through any new layers in doing it this way. At the present time..."

Giorgi: "Well, why should..."

Day: "...draft the summons and sent it to the sheriff and the sheriff served it. Now, this traditionally has been the functions of the sheriff's office and the Bill still provides that if the registered mail is not served and it comes back then the sheriff goes out and serves the summons in the usual form."

Giorgi: "But if you are going to use the mail, why should you bring all the paper work down to the sheriff's office; do the paper work and then bring it down to the sheriff's office, then have the sheriff's office mail the notices to the prospective jurors? I think this is asinine. I think it's a waste of money. I think if you are going to notify them by mail let the original agency so there won't be any loss of time, any loss of paper work. I think this Bill is just cluttering up the law books and I don't see any need for the Bill at all. If you are going to notify them by mail let the circuit clerk's office



by mail. Why should they go down to the sheriff's office so that the sheriff can excuse some of them from jury duty or pick out their friends so they don't have to serve on jury duty."

Day: "No, the sheriffs office has nothing to do with selecting the names of those who serve on the...."

Giorgi: "He assigns the ..."

Day: "Ah, the jury commission determines..ah..who will be the prospective jurors and..ah..this has always been a function the law still provides that they can be summoned if they don't respond to the registered mail. There's no way that the clerks office can go out and serve a summons under the laws that stands now. This has to be done by the sheriffs office. The sheriffs the only one authorized to serve a summons if we were to..ah..turn this over to the clerks office..ah..we would have a ..ah...division of authority so far as the responsibility for getting the jurors notice and getting them into court."

Giorgi: "I see here that the sheriffs office is going to mail all these summons', there not going to deliver them any longer. I think this is assinine taking the paper work from the circuit clerks office down to the sheriffs office so they can mail, mail the summonses, I think..ah..I don't know what the ..ah..reason is for the Bill, I think..ah.. all its doing is playing ring around the rosy in the Court House. I think you ought to take it out of the Record and probably consider tabling it."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion?"

Day: "By way of closing, Mr. Speaker, I would simply say that there is a very minor change in the law, simply authorizes the sheriff to..ah..save the county some cost by mailing by registered mail return receipt requested..ah..these summonses for jury service and I think its a good Bill and ..ah..would appreciate support."

Telcser: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 105 pass, all



in favor signify by saying "aye" opposed "no". The gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi to explain his vote."

Giorgi: "Well, I'd like to explain my vote. Inasmuch as we know whats going to happen here, the circuit clerk will be drawing the names of the jurors and he'll be making up a master list, there are going to be names and addresses for the sheriffs office and then the sheriffs office is going to mail the summonses, I think this thing ought to be , this Bill ought to be either amended or just kill the Bill so that we use the system we're using now. I think its nothing but a running around the Courthouses and with duties that some clerk can do in the clerks office. I think its a terrible Bill and I think it ought to be defeated."

Telcser: "The gentleman from Moultrie, Representative Stone.."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, I think someone is misreading this Bill and I do not believe its the Sponsor. The laws that the State of Illinois now provides that, that these notices must be personnaly served on the prospective jurors and the gentlemans Bill just merely says that they can now be sent by registered or certified mail and the sneriff will not then have to drive all over the county and in many, many instances go to a persons home 3, 4 or half a dozen times in order to serve them with this necessary summons. The summons under the law cannot be served by anyone other than the sheriff. And the sheriff then gets his 20¢ a mile and it runs the cost up to the people of the county this is a good Bill and it should have your support."

Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? The gentleman from Peoria, Representative Day."

Day: " By way of explanation, I would report that this Bill was..ah..reported out of Committee by a vote of 16 "ayes" no "nays", there were no decenting votes, It is supported by the Illinois Sheriffs Association and..ah..it will amount to a considerable savings, to..ah..each county in the State



and this matter of serving process..ah..if we are to make a substantial change in the law sofar as the serving of papers is concerned and..ah..if there's a gentleman from Winnebago suggests, we should turn this function over to the clerks office, then I would recommend that gentleman introduce a Bill for that purpose..ah..in this House..ah.. this does attempt to make a substantial change of that nature, all it does, it attempts to save the county some cost and to permit them to save the taxpayer some money by using registered mail and instead of personal service of summons of this nature."

Telcser: "The gentleman from Macon, Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I have in the past been a member of the Board to serve of Supervisors served as Chairman of Election Jurors Committee and have been in contact with this. It is incredible the number of times sometimes its necessary to serve these papers in the ...jurors service. By simply passing this Bill we eliminate tremendous amount of time involved taking up the sheriff deputies time that can better service by being on the States streets and roads of the township and in the various counties. You can't imagine the time its going to save. And..ah..for worthwhile project, so we should certainly vote this Bill in."

Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the Record.anyone else? Murphy can be recorded by voting "aye". anyone else? O.K. on this question there are 90 "ayes" 4 "nays" Gibbs "aye", Pierce "aye", On this question there are 92 "ayes", 4 "nays", this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 110."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 110, Lauer, a Bill for an Act to amend Section relating to human blood, Third Reading of the Bill"

Telcser: "The Gentleman wants it out of the Record. Senate Bill, lets see, is Representative Collins on the floor?"



No.....Senate Bill 119."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 119, Campbell, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections to the Illinois Public Aid Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Campbell."

Campbell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This is a Legislative Advisory approved Commission Bill. It simply increases the funeral allowances...ah...for... the funeral directors of the State of Illinois from \$200 to \$300. Now, they have not had an increase since 1966, and I would certainly appreciate your favorable support."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 119 pass? All those in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. Telcser 'aye', Grotberg 'aye', On this question 109 'ayes', one 'nay' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Pierce.... in Choate's seat."

Pierce: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, I'd like to introduce from the Gallery behind me the 8th grade graduating class from Big Hollow School in Ingleside, Illinois, served by Representatives Murphy, Deuster and myself. Big Hollow School right near Fox Lake in Ingleside."

Telcser: "Senate Bill 127."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 127, Campbell, a Bill for an Act to amend the Nursing Home, Shelter Care Homes and Homes for the Aged Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Campbell."

Campbell: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 127 adds some consumers to the Nursing Home Advisory Council and it increases the Membership on that Council from, well, it increases it by 3 Members and there are ... making a total of 16 Members from that Board."



And..ah...the council makes recommendations to regulations and standards which the Department applies to Nursing Homes. I'd appreciate your favorable support."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Lady from Cook, Representative Martin."

Martin: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question, Mr. Speaker?"

Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Martin: "Can you please tell me of the 3 persons that are going to be appointed, Representative, on the Advisory Board, where will these 3 persons come from and who will appoint them?"

Campbell: "The Director will make the appointment and ...ah... one of the groups is the Metropolitan Nursing Home Association and 3 members representing the public whose occupation will not involve or before their retirement involve the administration of a Nursing Home, Shelter Care Home, or Home for the Aged....or who have no financial interest in a Nursing Home, Shelter Care Home or Home for the Aged."

Martin: "Can you tell me please how often this council meets?"

Campbell: "I don't know."

Martin: "Thank you."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? Question is, shall Senate Bill 127 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Mann 'aye'. Take the Record. On this question there are 126 'ayes', no 'nays' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Is Representative McMasters on the floor, for 151? Senate Bill 177."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 177, Fennessey, a Bill for an Act for creating Rural Transportation System...Demonstration Project Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "By the way, in following the priority call..the rules...rules are not suspended for me to do otherwise."



The Gentleman from LaSalle, Representative Frnessey."

Fennessey: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House.

Senate Bill 177 is identical to House Bill 305 that passed out of here a month or so ago, creates rules downstate transportation assistance project and authorize county boards to provide transportation service by contract with school districts of public or private services. It requires the Secretary of Transportation to make grants to county boards for 100 percent operating expenses incurred, requires detailed reports to General Assembly results of the project by January 15th, 1974. This identical Bill passed out of the House, 305, and ask for a favorable vote on this."

Telcser: "Is there any further discussion? Question is, shall Senate Bill 177 pass, all those in favor signify by voting 'aye' those opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Macdonald 'aye', Telcser 'aye', take the record. On this question there are 104 'ayes', 8 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Keller on the floor?.....'nope'.....Senate Bill 261..."



A. Telcser: "Senate Bill 261."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 261. Maragos. A bill for an Act amending sections of an Act relating to recorders. Third Reading of the Bill."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Rep. Maragos: "Ah.. Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. This ah.. Act amends the law to revise in relation to recorders. It states ah.. that it provides a section of the law that ah.. requiring the name and address of the persons who are preparing real estate instruments to be on the same.. as the condition of the recordings. And it dubbs court orders and wills and death certificates and foreign instruments. It's a bill for corrective legislation and ah.. I would ask for your approval."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi."

Rep. Giorgi: "Ah.. Mr. Maragos, would you answer a question, please?"

Rep. Maragos: "Yes."

Rep. Giorgi: "I noticed this bill got out of the Committee on Judiciary by just an 8 to 7 vote. Ah.. so can you explain what the controversy would be over this bill?"

Rep. Maragos: "Ah.. the.. misunderstanding. That's why it got that 7. The question is ah.."

Rep. Giorgi: "That's what they used on the last bill was a misunderstanding. This is Senator Sours bill, isn't it?"

Rep. Maragos: "Well, ah.. that was the reason."

Rep. Giorgi: "Ah, ah.. would you please explain why and 8 to 7 vote.. I think the General Assembly should know the reason."



don't think we ought to be.."

Rep. Maragos: "Well, because of the fact that Mr. ah.."

Rep. Giorgi: "...Comin' in here and the guys have saving money.. and right now we're paying twice as much for things."

Rep. Maragos: "No. The reason is because of the Senate sponsor that the seven votes were 'nay' and that's a fact. Then it would have normally gone out of Consent Calendar, but because they consider the Senate sponsor to be honest with you and ah.."

Rep. Giorgi: "Is.. Is.. this to prevent friends of the court and maybe real estate agents from doing work that probably lawyers are doing and you're trying to identify the culprits or something?"

Rep. Maragos: "No. This.. what this does, Mr. Giorgi, is ah.. What it does is it requires that you put the permanent index number of your tax bill on the ah.. deeds. And also requiring the name and address of the person ah.. who's preparing the real estate instrument to be in the same condition as the recording."

Rep. Giorgi: "Mr. Maragos. Now, if you're making it so simple, why would you have an 8 to 7 vote in Judiciary?"

Rep. Maragos: "Because, Mr. Giorgi, I'm talking the facts. Because if 7 members of the Committee don't like Sours anything he has over here will not pass."

Rep. Giorgi: "That was Sours? Is this a Sours bill? I'm glad you reminded me."

A. Telcser: "Is there further discussion? Gentleman from Cook, Representative Fleck."



Rep. Fleck: "Will the spnsor yield for a question?"

A. Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Rep. Fleck: "Ah.. why do we have to have the name of the person on the instruments.. ah.. which is going to be recorded with the Recorder of Deeds? Well, what's the necessity of this? It seems rather foolish to go through all the trouble of having someone's name put on it who might not even be a grantee or grantor or involved whatsoever in any transaction."

A. Telcser: "Well, now, Representative Maragos is trying to get an answer to the question."

Rep. Giorgi: "Maybe he can run over and ask Senator Sours."

Rep. Maragos: "Ah.. in answer to ah.. I thought you were in Committee at the time this bill was heard, but evidently you were not there because you did not vote on this, Mr. Fleck."

Rep. Fleck: "I probably would have voted against it if I was in Committee. So. ah.. I'd like to have an answer to the question if you have one."

Rep. Maragos: "Yeah.. the ah.. The statements says, '..though a Recorder shall record an instrument effective title to the real estate, unless the name and address of the person who prepared and drafted the instruments, is..'"

Rep. Fleck: "Slow up a little, Sam. I can't understand you."

Rep. Maragos: "All right. 'The person who prepared and drafted such instruments is printed, typewritten, or stamped on the face thereof in a legible manner. But the validity and striking of record of any such issue shall not be



lessened or impaired by the fact that it does not comply with the provisions of the Section. And then it states what it has to say who prepared the instruments and ah.. so they'll show some responsibility in case of errors. And say, bill, that ah.. is corrective and it's done like in other states have similar types of provisions on instruments for recording. It does not apply to, of course, wills and does not apply in other areas."

Rep. Fleck: "Well, in view of that fine explanation, I think it's a good bill then. Thank you, Sam."

A. Telcser: "All right. Ah.. Gentleman from Kane, Representative Hill."

Rep. Hill: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. The sponsor of this piece of legislation, sets him out.. sets himself out to be very sanctimonious. And it seems to me that this piece of legislation is one more of his tricks and I think it would be a very good idea if we would vote 'no' on this piece of legislation. It seems that we're finally catching up with this gentleman, and certainly we should send a message to him. Thank you."

Rep. Maragos: "I would like a clarification. Which sponsor? The House sponsor or the Senate sponsor?"

Rep. Hill: "I, certainly would not want that misrepresented. I was talking about the Senate sponsor."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from ah.. McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Rep. Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, I can't speak to the.. part of the discussion that everyone else has been talking about. That is necessity or non-necessity of having the individuals name



who drew up the instrument. But it certainly would be extremely helpful to have the unique number on the on the deed. Ah.. the reason for that is that an administrative reason and that is these deeds then are fed from the Recorder's Office to the Supervisor of Assessments Office. And changes in the Assessments records are made. And if one has to spend clerical time going from the legal description to ah.. the index number, you're just wasting tax dollars. So, from that asp.. from that part of the bill, this is a very good bill."

A. Telcser: "Okay. Gentleman from Cook, Representative McGah."

Rep. McGah: "Mr. Speaker. Will the sponsor yield for one question?"

A. Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Rep. McGah: "Ah, Sam did you say that this ah.. that Senate Bill 261 required the real estate index number?"

Rep. Maragos: "No. If I did.. If I did, it was a mistake. No, it does not." Other bills would have it but this does not do that."

Rep. McGah: "This only requires the attorney for ah.. the attorney or someone else who prepared the deed to have his name on it?"

Rep. Maragos: "That's right. Yeah."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Palmer."

Rep. Palmer: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This bill is a good bill, for the reason that a lot of times, you want to check out other things in



connection with the conveyance of real estate and with the name and address of the person who prepared the deed. You can save a lot of time by going to that person directly. They have knowledge of the transfer and of those things that occurred prior to the transfer. I think it's a good bill and it.. we should dismiss the personality bit of this thing and vote it 'aye'."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Lake, Representative Pierce."

Rep. Pierce: "Ah, Mr. Speaker. The purpose of this bill, is simply that many unauthorized people ah.. some real estate people ah.. some not even real estate people have been drafting deeds and legal documents and many of them are in incorrect form. And there's no way of knowing who drafted them. Ah.. this way if someone's practicing law in an authorized manner who's not entitled to, ah.. some real estate broker is drafting a deed to real estate and it's imperfect, ah.. then he can be prosecuted for this. It's a good bill because it helps lawyers which I'm sure Rep. Giorgi would appreciate. Many people are trying to practice law. Some people take parking tickets and try to take care of them who aren't lawyers. Some people draw up deeds who aren't lawyers. Some people even draft wills who aren't lawyers. And the purpose of this bill is simply to make sure that a qualified person is drafting that deed. Otherwise you may find you've paid for property with an incorrect legal description on it and you don't have anything but a badly drafted piece of paper with no record of who drafted it."



A. Telcser: "Is there further discussion? Gentleman from..
Lady from Cook, Representative Martin."

Rep. Martin: "Well, I don't know if I rise in opposition to
the bill as much as to the sponsor. I know as many of us
here, when we confront with Senator Sours, we're not able
to get anything out. I had a bill over there, a Contract
Protection Bill, for buyers of real estate, and that bill
was soundly defeated by proxy. I've never seen so many
proxies in all my life. And I'm sure there were more
proxies than there were Members on that, that Committee.
And for that reason I just thought I had to voice my
opinion to make everyone aware ah.. that everyone here
has been before Senator Sours before. And ah.. they should
certainly take.. not only this bill, but all of his bills
into consideration and scrutinize them very carefully."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos
to close."

Rep. Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. I cannot
help what your feelings may be for the Senate sponsor.
And, I think all those remarks were directed against him
and not the House sponsors, but be it as it may.. don't
be so sure the Speaker says. But be it as it may, ah..
vote on this bill on its merits. And ah.. you will find
that this is a step in the right direction so show responsi-
bility to the preparer of the instrument and I ask for your
support."

A. Telcser: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 261 pass?"



All those in favor, signify by voting 'aye' the opposed by voting 'no'. Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Day."

Rep. Day: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I can ah.. hardly let this matter go by without saying a few words. And ah.. and the friends of the Senate sponsor of this bill. Ah.. actually the Gentleman is a very congenial, friendly sort of a person. And ah.. he ah.. perhaps at times is a little bit opinionated. But I think that is true of all of us. And I regret very much to see personalities brought into the subject of legislation. Ah.. this sort of thing is apt to bring about similar reactions so far as ah.. other Members of the Senate are concerned and so far as other Members of the House is concerned and I don't think that it's a.. a.. healthy sort of a thing. Now, ah.. Representative Palmer hit the nail on the head when he talked about the merits of this bill. The drafting of a deed which conveys title to real estate is a very serious matter. And when ah.. we have problems involving descriptions. When we have a situation when a legal is erroneous and encroaches on someone else's property. Ah.. clouds up someone else's title. It is important ah.. that ah.. those who are attempting to correct such a situation know the name of the person who drafted the instrument that caused the problem. Because very often it's possible to go to that person and say, 'you know, 'Why did you do it this way? Is this really a mistake? Ah.. or isn't it?' And in this way we can clear up titles. So I



think it's a good bill and I think it deserves your support."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Whiteside, Representative Miller."

K. W. Miller: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House.

I feel compelled to make some comments regarding this bill. First of all, I'm not going to uphold Senator Sour. I respect this Gentleman. I, too, have had problems with him in the past. But, I look at the merits of the bill rather than who the sponsor is as to how I vote. Ladies and Gentlemen, this is a good bill. This ah.. requirement as to who's prepared illegal instruments is now mandatory in Whiteside County. We have a rule to that effect. It's a good bill. If a lawyer drafts a deed and there's errors in it, why shouldn't other members of the bar and the public generally know that this lawyer has done a bad job. I think it'll make ah.. better relations between the legal profession and the non-lawyers. I think it's a bill that has a lot of merits and I urge green lights on this bill."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Katz."

Rep. Katz: "Ah.. in voting against this bill, I want to make perfectly clear that I'm simply voting against the bill because in my opinion it is without merit. The question of the Senate sponsor is irrelevant. I would like very much if the Senate did eliminate its proxy ah.. rules and ah.. I think they would gain alot. The public would gain alot if they would get in line with what we've done in the House. But that has nothing to do with this particular situation. I do believe that this bill is in fact a kind of 'lawyer-



makework bill'. If anybody wants to know who drafted a document, all they really have to do is go to the person who signed the deed and find out who did the drafting. Ah.. it's because of that that ah.. I feel that the motivation for this bill is not a proper one. I don't believe that our recording rules or our laws that we passed ought to get involved in the ah.. ah.. rivalry that may exist between lawyers and real estate people and others with reference to drafting documents. AH.. it would seem to me that a lot more useful bill would be one that would include the real estate index number as Representative McGah mentioned a few minutes ago. Ah.. I don't believe this is a good bill and I'm voting 'no' on the merits of the bill and not on the sponsor."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Beaupre."

Rep. Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I am somewhat concerned about the lack of green lights up there. I have heard a number of people register a vindictive spirit against the sponsor and I think that's alarming that we cast our votes not on the merits of the bill but on who sponsored the bill. But besides that, I would like to point out that there are a number of recorders in the State of Illinois who do indeed require that the drafter of a deed be pl.. the name of the drafter of a deed be placed on.. on the instrument to be recorded. There may not be any authority in law for this. But, it seems to me that it's time that we enact such authority. Because there are two things really concerned. Number 1, we have an



obligation to see that there is not the unauthorized practice of law in this State. And secondly, besides protecting the lawyers, who I am sure not so many of you are concerned about, when a lawyer does a bad job of drafting; and he doesn't include the right legal description or doesn't phrase it properly or doesn't do his homework in preparation for the deed, he ought to be held responsible and there's no way that you're going to see that he is held responsible unless you know who did the drafting. I disagree with Representative Katz in this respect. I think there is a great deal of merit to the bill and I would ask for your support."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Fleck."

Rep. Fleck: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I'm rather schizophrenic in regard to this bill. At first I thought it appeared to have some merit. But out of reflection, I notice that this is a mandatory condition precedence as a filing or recording of any document. Now, a lot of people have said that it's directed at probably faulty draftsmanship on the part of some lawyers. Well, there are a lot of other documents that are recorded in the Recorders Office which are not necessarily drafted by lawyers, but by lay persons and other people.. ah.. mechanics.. ah liens are filed by people other than lawyers and a lot of other documents. Now, the problem here is a very, very serious defect in that if a person goes to the Recorder's Office with a document and they do not have the name of the preparer of that document on there, they are either going to have to know who drafted it or they're going to have to

back and find out who drafted it. Now common sense and reason dictates simply one thing. If you go all the way to the Recorder's Office and you don't have the name of the person who prepared that document, you might put down John Doe or someone else in the real estate agency or anyone else that you might know and all of a sudden this person might find themselves involved in the lawsuit. It might notate against his interest quite seriously just because someone who is actually recording the document is unaware of the name of the person who ah.. prepared it. I think it is very bad in this respect and it still should at least be tightened up to get around that possible defect. And for that reason, we are going to vote against this bill."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Rep. Maragos: "Ah.. Mr. Speaker. To explain my vote I want to answer Representative Fleck that he is mistaken that if this is not done, the validity in the instrument shall not be lessened or impaired. That's in the language of the ah.. amending Section 9.3. So even if you went there and for reasons you could not find the name of the preparer the document would still not be lessened or impaired. So, therefore, that argument, I think, Charlie, is incorrect. And therefore, that's the reason why you're not going to vote for this bill, I think you should take a second look at this bill."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi."



Rep. Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker. It's not that I'm sour on Sours that I'm opposing this bill. I think that speakers like Representative Day and Representative Miller who are lawyers from communities where the Bar Association throws their weight around. They might intimidate a real estate agent or a fella that prepared something that has to be filed in the Recorder's Office. I think we're sick and tired because we have 45 to 50 lawyers that constantly were making work for lawyers. I think once in a while you ought to admit that 'Yes. This does make work for me. I'm for the bill because I'll pick up an extra buck. And I'll intimidate some poor soul in the Boondocks.' I think Senator Sours is the.. the.. epitome of this type of hipocritical standards. I think it ought to be brought out on the floor of this House that this is a make-work for some people. If you want to vote for make-work, go ahead. I know you're having a tough time of it.. hiding some of your incomes and declaring \$50,000 a year."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Epton."

Rep. Epton: "Representative Giorgi may be losing more votes than he's gaining. If he thinks being a clown in this House and attacking a legal profession is a standard operation, he's got another guess coming. The lawyers are the mainstay of many foundations in our entire democracy. And to have individuals get up on this House and not discuss merits of a bill, is stupid. And not worthy of some of you gentlemen. Now, I've told you before. When you get up and talk about farm bills, I listen to the farmers. There are lawyers who



vote against these bills as well as lawyers who vote for them. And if Zeke Giorgi or anybody else wants to take on the legal profession, you go right ahead. But, rest assured that we're going to be here til January. The fact is, that the bill has merit or it has no merit. As far as the Senate, I concur. They, too, have their clowns. They have a considerable number of clowns. Those of you who have failed to run into their proxy machine over there will give reflection to it next time. But, again, I.. I ask you.. speak to the merits of a bill rather to whether a lawyer is dominated or not. I happen to be a lawyer who has lost clients because I have voted against their wishes in this House. I'm not sure that Mr. Giorgi or Mr.. or any other individuals can say that. I happen to be a client, a lawyer who has gotten up here and said, '..when I represent a client..'. I'm not sure all of you have. In the future, you stick to the bill or be prepared to stay here for many, many months."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff."

Rep. Duff: "Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. On the merits of this bill, it seems to me that rather than being a makework for lawyers, sometimes this would be a pain-in-the-neck. Ah.. not particularly desirable to lawyers in fact. Except for the merits towards the clients cause. Seems to me the most important factor here is that this bill asks lawyers to be accountable for what they do. And to be willing to put their names on the product of their work and stand by its accuracy and be recognized for what they

are doing in behalf of a client whether it be right of wrong. You can hardly say that to require them to be accountable is a bad thing."

A. Telcser: "Have all voted who wished? Gentleman from Cook, Representative Yourell."

Rep. Yourell: "Yes, Jack Hill wants to talk and I think you should let him talk."

A. Telcser: "Alright, Buzz, Gentleman from Kane, Representative Hill."

Rep. Hill: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I don't think that myself or anyone else should get up here and say bad things about any profession. That certainly includes the attorneys, because we have many good attorneys, not only in the House, but also in the Senate. But in regard to this piece of legislation, I'd like to point out to you that it is a bad piece of legislation and this gentleman that sponsored this piece of legislation in the Senate has been doing this for many years. This is make work bill for attorneys and consequently it will have the tendency of costing many people in the State of Illinois an extra buck, and certainly this Bill is a bill that is opposed to consumers in the State of Illinois and this gentleman has always been opposed to consumers in the State of Illinois. I want you to vote on the merits of this piece of legislation, because there aren't any merits to it and I'd appreciate very much that you would vote no on this piece of legislation. Thank you very much."

A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Lake, Representative Griesheimer."



Rep. Griesheimer: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I think this argument that was just raised has got to be one of the most fallacious arguments I've ever heard presented in the House this session. It presumes that in the case where you bring your car into a dealer for repair, that you'd want someone to prepare your car who knows absolutely nothing about it, and when you start talking about non-lawyers preparing deeds, you're talking about people who know nothing about the law. I think if we're going to talk about consumer protection, we ought to go to the people who are trained and licensed by the State of Illinois to do this. And I think that any of the people who are opposed to this Bill, allegedly on the basis of make work projects for attorneys, I would suggest that they look at the real estate accord that we made out between the Bar Association and the Chicago Board of Realtors and the Illinois State Board of Realtors. It was clearly set out there what the real estate people should do and what the lawyer should do. And all we're trying to do is put some teeth in this, so that the people really have some protection on the most basic document involved in real estate matters and that is the deed. I, myself, have been involved in cases where a party came in to see me on deeds that were made out ten years before by either friends or members who allegedly knew how to do this and found that the title to the property was incorrectly spelled out and it literally cost thousands of dollars to square this away through a law suit. All we are asking is that the people who are accountable, namely the attorneys, be given the



opportunity to make these deeds out and at least we know through the name on the deed who's doing this, and we don't turn it over to a person who is more interested in making a profit on the sale of land than he is making sure the title is good. I would urge your support of this bill."

A. Telcser: "Lady from Cook, Representative Martin."

Rep. Martin: Mr. Speaker. Ah.... I can sing with Mr. Sours at the Black Anges a good duet. I, too, believe that my Bill that was in the Senate was a good Bill and should have been voted on its merits. For that reason, I cast my present vote."

A. Telcser: "Record the lady as 'present'. Gentleman from Lake, Representative Pierce. Well, if you ladies and gentlemen want to spend forty-five minutes on a Bill like this...."

Rep. Pierce: "Mr. Speaker, if I were to vote against every Member who had voted against my Bill, there would be very few people in this House I would support, to tell you the truth. I don't think we can go on that basis. But let me tell this to the gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi, this Bill doesn't create work for lawyers. What creates work for lawyers is not having this Bill. It's homemade wills, homemade deeds that result in will contests; it results in litigation over title to property. That makes work for lawyers as profitable work. That's why lawyers get to go to Supreme Court on cases because of homemade wills, homemade deeds and real estate people without qualifications who prepare improper deeds. Actually the lawyer is much better off with the layman preparing the documents and



screwing them up so we have to take them to court and straighten them out. So this Bill doesn't really produce important work for lawyers. It does help the homeowner make sure that he's getting good title to property. It helps the little man who will need not go to court and to litigate to straighten out his title and I vote 'aye'."

A. Telcser: "Have all voted who wished? Take the record. Representative Giorgi, for what purpose do you rise?"

Rep. Giorgi: "You've got 89 votes up there and I'm not going to asked for verification. I could have asked for verification on the earlier bill. I just want to reiterate they are both lousy bills and that's the way I voted."

A. Telcser: "This question, 89 'ayes', 30 'nays' and this Bill, having received a constitutional majority, is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 356."



Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 356, J. D. Halloway, a Bill for an Act relating to an easement in Jackson County, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Randolph, Representative Halloway"

Halloway: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a routine easement Bill, located in Jackson County, highway easement that's approved by the Department of Transportation. Appreciate your support."

Telcser: "The question is, shall Senate Bill 356 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 115 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having.....received the Constitutional..... Majority is hereby declared passed. Now I'm going to pick up a couple more Bills on a priority call from June 12th. Senate Bill 151....Ah....Oh....The Gentleman from Cook..... Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, I'd like to introduce....in the gallery...ah...in the back of the Speaker....the....ah.. students in the 8th grade.....specializing in field government....of the Northside Middle School, in Aledo, and they are with Mrs. Wilma Lund, who is their director and they are very capably represented by Representatives McMaster, Neff and McGrew."

Telcser: "Senate Bill 151."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 151, McMaster, a Bill for an Act to Amend Sections of the Election Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "Okay.....That's an error.....the House Sponsor is Representative Macdonald. The Lady from Cook, Representative Macdonald. I think you're turned on Ginny."



Macdonald: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Ah...House Bill 151 amends the Election Code and eliminates the requirements that the County Clerks of Counties of 500,000 or more...ah...make out Delivery Election Notices to the County Sheriff and Supervisors. The Senate Bill, excuse me, Senate Bill 151, ah....this Bill came over to us from the Senate, it was Senator Regner's Bill. The Calendar is in error and it was Senator Regner's Bill and it has come to us with strong bipartisan support. It has been estimated by the unnecessary in our...system of having to post these notices that we are spending probably 200 to \$300,000 an election more than we have to spend. So I ask for your support of this Bill and take off the books antagonistic law."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 151 pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye' the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Campbell 'aye'. On this question 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 23."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 23, Fennessey, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Vehicle Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from LaSalle, Representative Fennessey."

Fennessey: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Senate Bill 23 amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. Provides that corporate authorities in municipalities may adopt all or any portion of Illinois Vehicle Code by reference. Effective January 1st, 1974. At the present time, Municipalities are authorized to enact ordinances relating to vehicles that are in operation on local streets. Most municipalities have their own ordinances, however, their numbering system differs from that of the Illinois Vehicle Code. This Bill



will permit any municipality at their option to adopt provisions of the Code by reference. This rule will result in having identical provisions with identical numbers...ah..then when the Secretary of State processes conviction notices, he will no longer have to transpose the local ordinance number and change it to the Code number. This simplified the process and ask for a favorable vote."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 23 pass? All in favor signify by voting "aye" and the opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 131 "ayes" no "nays", this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 133. Waddell "aye"."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 133, Juckett, a Bill for an Act to amend an Act relating to Commission to visit State Institutions, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "Is Representative Juckett on the floor? What about Representative Boyle, he came up here and said he would handle it. Take that out of the Record. Senate Bill 70. Representative Dan McClure, take that out of the Record. Senate Bill 136, is Representative Hanahan on the floor? Take it out of the Record. Senate Bill 216."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 216, Stone, a Bill for an Act relating to alcholic liquors, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Moultrie, Representative Stone."

Stone: "Ah..Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill does exactly what the digest says it does, it amends the Dram Shop Act, and it permits the sale of alcholic beverages in the ..ah..at the University Airport at the University of Illinois and at the University Faculty Center. This Bill passed the Senate by a vote of 39 "yes" and 4 "no" and I would appreciate your support."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Kane, Representative Grotberg."



Grotberg: "Ah..Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House...and Mr. Stone. I have a ..ah..Amendment to that Bill and I'd like to take it out of the Record for just a second but I'd certainly like to talk to you about it. Somehow, I got it from Giddy Dyer and I thought perhaps maybe you knew about it."

Stone: "Well, the Amendment is not on my desk, I knew that she ..."

Grotberg: "The Clerk has it, and may we discuss it?"

Stone: "Yes, I know it kills it and I intend to ..to..ah.. object to the Amendment being offered and..ah..I would like to proceed with the Bill, if you insist I can take it out, but I will not consent to the Bill being taken back to Second.."

Telcser: "Take it out of the Record. Collins isn't here. Senate Bill 271."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 271, Totten, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections of the Public Junior College Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Totten."

Totten: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Senate Bill 271 sponsored by Senator Regner, Shapiro, Rock and Welsh clarifies the intent to permit Junior College Districts to participate in joint purchases by Governmental Units. Some Junior Colleges are doing this and some others are not clear of the law and..ah..this just clarifies the intent and I would ask ..ah..for your favorable consideration."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? Question is, shall Senate Bill 271 pass. All those in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". Dunn, "aye", Dunn from Perry County. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question 110 "ayes", 3 "nays" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Now, the next one is Representative Maragos, shall we just pass that by? Senate Bill 341. Representative Ewell



will take it."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 341, a Bill for an Act making appropriation of the ordinaryexpense of the Legislative Audit Commission, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ewell."

Ewell: "Ah..this Bill is cosponsored by Representative Arigo who is ill at this time..the..ah..digest describes it adequately, it simply the appropriation."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? Question is, shall Senate Bill 341 pass. All in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question, there are 131 "ayes" no "nays" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 368."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 368, Shea, appropriation of Metropolitan Fair and Exhibition Authority, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. This Bill appropriates \$11, 750,000 to the Metropolitan Fair and Exhibition Authority for the payment of their Bonds and Interest. I'd appreciate the support of the House."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 368. All in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi to explain his vote."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I'd just like to remind the House in explaining my vote that this \$11, 750,000 is what we skim at the race tracks from the gambling dollars. We take the first 15¢ and tell them they can dividie up other \$1.85, and I'd like to notify a lot of Members of the House, especially from the rural areas, that a lot of the Church people in the State of Illinois avail themselves to the use of McCormick Place for most of this money is being expended and I think if they really..ah..

Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question 134 "ayes" no "nays" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Dyer isn't here. Senate Bill 281. Harpstrite "aye" on last Roll Call."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 281, Berman, a Bill for appropriation to provide for the ordinary ..expense for the Court of Claims, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Berman."

Berman: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker, Senate Bill 281 is the ordinary and contingent expenses of the Court of Claims for the next Fiscal Year, the total appropriation of \$591,600."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? Question is, shall Senate Bill 281 pass? All those in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 136 "ayes" no "nays" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 490."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 490, Lemke, a Bill for an Act for making additional appropriation to the Supreme Court, Third Reading of the Bill."

Teleser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lemke."

Lemke: "Mr. Speaker, Fellow Colleagues of the House, This is ..ah..Senate Bill 490 which is sponsored by Senator Carroll, Rock, Fawell, Sours, this makes an appropriation of \$12,000 to the Supreme Court for impartial Medical examination pursuant to Supreme Rule 215D. Becomes effective upon becoming law."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 490 pass? All those in favor signify by voting "aye" those opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wished? Take the Record. On this question there are 137 "ayes", 3 "nays" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate



Bill 491."

Jack O'Brien: " Senate Bill 491, a Bill for an Act to amend Sections to the Illinois Vehicle Code, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Schraeder ."

Schraeder: "Well, I'd just like to point out why this is Senator Hudson Sours Bill lets talk about the merits of the Bill and not about the Senator. I think we've torn him apart enough this morning. Its a very simple Bill, and its a companion Bill to 324 and 325, and it just brings up to date some of the matters contained in the revocation of civical permit for the failure of paying franchise tax. All three of these Bills went to Committee they came out on the do pass recommendation, they all came out on consent Calendar, inadvertantly this was placed on the General Calendar...wasn't supposed to be on consent Calendar, very simply it amends the Motor Vehicle Carrier of Property chapter of the Illinois Vehicle Code providing grounds of revocation, certificate of permit, the failure to pay any franchise tax. And its a very simple Bill and I'll answer any questions if you have any."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 491 pass? All in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wish? The Lady from Cook, Representative Martin."

Martin: "Mr. Speaker, Mr. Sours came up with a good one. I'll vote "aye".

Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 112 "ayes" 9 "nays" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 602."

Jack O'Brien: "Senate Bill 602, a Bill for an Act to amend Section to the Illinois Vehicle Code, Third Reading of the Bill."



Telcser: "The Gentleman from Vermillion, Representative Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. Senate Bill 603 amends the Vehicle Code to require notice of publication in the.. for temporary authority in the State paper rather than:the local papers and also it requires for it to be published in the paper rather than have to send it out to five competitors, it also has to be published in the paper they have to be filed within thirty days of publication whether they're for or against the authority so that the Commerce Commission will know how to schedule their hearings and things of that nature."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "If the Sponsor will yield to a question..ah..what paper is the State paper now and who designates the paper as a State paper and for what period of time?"

Craig: "I think the Register is now, I think the Journal was the State paper but that will be the only publication is in the State paper."

Palmer: "Well, do they designate any newspapers outside of Springfield as a State paper?"

Craig: "Yes, I think they could be."

Palmer: "Is it for a year's time?"

Craig: "I think so. For a year's time and most all these carriers, they realize where the State paper, which paper it is and they follow this very closely."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."

Skinner: "I wonder if the Sponsor could tell us how much advertising revenue is involved that will be lost by local newspapers?"

Craig: "I didn't hear the question."

Skinner: "How much advertising revenue will be lost by local newspapers?"

Craig: "Well, I don't know what the loss is, but..to the local newspaper, but you consider this, its also a great



savings to all the people who are asking and filing for ..ah..permits, because really in the local newspaper what usually happens if its in a large County they'll go down and publish it in some paper in one end of the County that doesn't have coverage, although with the County which doesn't really do a whole lot of good, so I think this is a savings to the people who are asking and as far as the publication I don't think it does very much good locally anyway."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 602 pass? All those in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wish? Campbell "aye". Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. Ewell "aye". Martin "aye". Beaupre "aye". Neff "aye". Representative Craig for what purpose do you arise?"

Craig: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to explain is my vote."

Telcser: "Well, I'll tell you, what the Clerk says, he'd like to have another Roll Call. Representative Palmer for what purpose do you arise?"

Palmer: "Well, if you're going to have another Roll Call, then I'd like to pose another question. I realize this is not just simply a notice provision there's another procedural as I read it, procedural things that do with the processing of application. And the question is, how does..under the Act, under the Bill, how does it differ from present practice?"

Craig: "One thing now under the present practice after the.. publish in the paper, the Commerce Commission has no knowledge of how many people come in to protest against the authority or before the authority. This, after its published in the paper the people who are protesting will have 30 days to file their protest with the Commerce Commission. This will give the Commerce Commission a reasonable knowledge of how many people are protesting how much time this authority will take to be heard rather



than maybe to have 3 or 4 without any knowledge of knowing of any protest being made and hencefore hearings under one hearing officer set for this day and this one might take most of the day. This will give them some reason to base these hearings where they won't have to have these continuous people come down to Springfield to the hearing or Chicago and be continued over, because of so many people coming in all at once. If they don't file their protest within this 30 day period then they can't be a protestor, they can't wait for the day of the hearing."

Palmer: "Will this make it harder for the little shipper to get a..ah..certificate?"

Craig: "No, I don't think this will make it any harder to the little shipper because he won't know what he's coming into when he comes to the hearing."

Telcser: "Question is, shall Senate Bill 602 pass? All those in favor signify by voting "aye" the opposed by voting "no". Have all voted who wish? Now, lets get on the Roll Call if you wish. Have all voted who wish? Take the Record. On this question there are 85 "ayes" Boyle "aye" 86 "ayes" Walters "aye" Ike Simms "aye" J. J. Wolf "aye" Martin "aye" McClain "aye" Representative Palmer for what purpose do you rise? Representative Palmer is voting "present" Katz "aye". On this question there are 90 "ayes" 22 "nays" one answering "present" Jacobs "aye" and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Walsh, for what purpose do you rise?"

Walsh: "For the purpose of an introduction, Mr. Speaker. In the Gallery behind me, Speaker, is Ms. Jean Walters, the wife of our Colleague, Bob Walters."

Telcser: "Senate Bill 629. Senate Bill 629."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 629, an Act to vacaterelease in the.....for Highway ...Schuyler County, Third Reading of the Bill."



Telcser: "The Gentleman from Adams, Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker,...ah...Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. House Bill...er....Senate Bill 629 is a very simple Bill, vacates the right-of-way easement to ...ah...a little less than ...ah..a half an acre of land in Schuyler County upon payment of \$500. The \$500 was... ..ah..assessed by the Department of Transportation. The Department of Transportation has indicated to me and to Senator Knuppel, the original sponsor, that...ah...the land is no longer..ah...no longer can be used for highway purposes and so all it does is permit a farmer to use it for farming...and I urge a favorable vote. Thank you."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is shall Senate Bill 629 pass? Those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Cox 'aye'. Take the record. Pate Philip 'aye'. This question there are 124 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 1185."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 1185, a Act making additional appropriations to the Illinois Public Employees Pension Laws Commission, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen, Senate Bill 1185 is a... ..ah...supplimental appropriation to the Public Employees Pension Law Commission. It has been accelerated through the Senate and through the House because of the emergency and I would appreciate a favorable vote."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you Mr. Speaker....ah...Leo...what....you say it was a supplimental appropriation and there is an emergency. Can you explain why?"

LaFleur: "I did not hear the question, Glen."

Schneider: "It's a supplimental appropriation?"

LaFleur: "Yes, \$7,000."

Schneider: "What's the explanation for that? Is there going to



be an additional study of the Pension problem in Illinois and are we hiring more people to do that?"

LaFleur: "No,...No...it was a very frank and honest...ah....ah.. that they...'goofed' on the anticipation of the amount necessary to operate the Pension Laws Commission. The work load had been extra heavy and they had just fallen short by this amountof meeting the amount of money that was going to be necessary to operate for the balance of the year."

Schneider: "O. K."

LaFleur: "They just plainly said that they did not anticipate the workload, Glen."

Schneider: "What was the total appropriation then for the last fiscal year including this \$7,000?"

LaFleur: "I do not have that handy,...I..."

Schneider: "No, ...I have no great problem with it, I was just hoping that....ah...they were putting more people on to do great....more studies."

LaFleur: "This is not the problem, they have the same staff... the same.....it's just the additional workload and the additional amount to time necessary to meet and to...ah.. work on the Pension Laws....".

Schneider: "Thank you very much."

Telcser: "Any further discussion. The question is shall Senate Bill 1185 pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 129 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Senate Bill 133."

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill 133, an Act to amend Sections 1, 2 and 5 and the Title of an Act to create a Commission of Visiting Examiners....of State Institutions."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. Senate Bill 133 would add six more members



of the Legislature to the Visitation Commission. We presently now examine the charitable institutions of the State, educational institutions and penal institutions. This new subcommittee would be to ...ah...visit and examine the private facilities in the mental health field which are receiving patients from the State facilities. The industry is in favor of this, the Department and so is the Visitation Commission. It is something that is long needed and I urge your support.....of this Bill."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion. The question is shall Senate Bill 133 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by vote.....the Gentleman from Christian, Representative Tipsword."

Tipsword: "Would the Gentleman yield for a question?"

Telcser: "He indicates he would."

Tipsword: "Would this also empower this Commission to visit some of the nursing homes in which State patients are being placed at the present time? Why I certainly..... support of this Bill because we've got nursing homes in this State, right here in Springfield and surrounding territory and I'm sure in all the rest of the State they're in terribly sad condition. Report it over here to the Department and immediately that nursing home finds out about it and before any inspector can get there they clear it up for a days time....and they're absolutely filthy and horrible and I certainly hope that this group can....can get in some of these places without advance notice."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is, shallthe Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Juckett: "Be happy to."

Washington: "Now, now these...these holes which you are proposing be investigated by the Commission.....they are licensed under the City....are they not?"



Juckett: "They're both licensed under the City and the State... that is correct."

Washington: "And ...how many agencies are now empowered to investigate or inspect these facilities?"

Juckett: "Well...you've got quite a few. You've got the Department of Public Aid, the Department of Public Health, Department of Mental Health and various divisions of other Departments if they're under their kind of programs.... that is correct."

Washington: "And they're responsibility is to inspect these various facilities."

Juckett: "Ah...they have a field of inspection...right..... concerning their particular field of endeavor."

Washington: "Well, some of them do with nursing....some do with sanitation."

Juckett: "Right...that is correct."

Washington: "Now, what could the Legislative investigative Committee...pardon me...ah...what do you call this Commission?...."

Juckett: "You were correct...the Legislative Commission to Visit and Examine State Institutions."

Washington: "What could this Visitation Committee add to this ...they have no particular expertise ...in the field of nursing or sanitation or what-have-you?....What would they add to it?"

Juckett: "One of the problems that we find is that...ah...many patients are being discharged ...or have been discharged from State facilities and in order to conserve hospital beds and acute treatment areas we either place them in nursing homes, intermediate skill care homes or residential facilities....and what we're concerned is on the treatment of these individuals the programing that they're getting ...whether they are getting it or not....just as we are on the State facilities and a larger and larger share of the State budget...ah...both in Public Health and Mental



Health are going to these type of facilities and at the current time the Legislature itself is has no contact with these facilities..."

Washington: "Ah....would every inspection be accompanied by television cameras and ...ah.....ah...radio reporters and newspaperin other words..ah..."

Juckett: "I'm sure that...I'm sure that 99% of all the visitations are going to be a routine visitation where the press is not ...the...you know...if they want to come along that's fine...I mean...you know..you and I...we never keep the press from finding things out if they wish to...but it certainly would not be a deliberate attempt of....this commission or any other commission to do so."

Washington: "Well, what I'm getting at, Representative Juckett is that I would hate to see this kind of thing turn into a circus and just made political fodder and dramatized for the benefit of the press and playing up insignificant little housekeeping problems which can be taken care of by the local inspector.....agencies and I'm concerned that this thing might get out of hand and that's why I'm raising this series of questions."

Juckett: "Well, I couldn't agree with you more and I would certainly....if it was in my powersee that your wishes were carried out."

Washington: "Well, you're on that Commission, are you not?"

Juckett: "Well, I'm on the overall Commission...I don't know that I would be on this specific...ah...six man Commission but if I am I would certainly see to it that ...ah.. wishes of you and every other Legislator would be carried out."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Capuzi."

Capuzi: "Now, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I too am a Member of the Commission and I've had occasion in the past month or so to visit some of these so called nursing homes. And I personally have observed things



which I think are deplorable. Now the State of Illinois does participate ...as far as welfare recipientswhere some of these people need some convalescent care are taken care of in these nursing homes. I think this is a very very good Bill and I hope that everyone here on the floor will support it."

Telcser: "Any further discussion? The Gentleman from Macoupin, Representative Boyle."

Boyle: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I also am a Member of the Commission and rise to support this Bill. As the current trend in mental health is to take...ah.. patients from State institutions and put them in nursing homes....ah...I think that it is very important that the State have some investigatory powers with respect to these nursing homes. So many of our State Hospitals are being closed and the number of ...ah. . patients in other hospitals are being reduced and these patients are going from the hospitals into the nursing homes and as the law is now...the State of Illinois continues to pay the nursing home operators for the keep of these patients but there no check by the State and I think this is a good Bill and I would urge the Membership to support it."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Thompson."

Thompson: "Ah...Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Thompson: "Representative Juckett, ...ah...this Commission.... ah...are they inspecting the treatment of the patient, of the facility or both?"

Juckett: "Well, we are concerned with both. We're concerned with the conditions of the facility, the individual treatment of patients as well as the overall program."

Thompson: "Well...ah...one other question. I didn't understand your answer to Representative Washington when he asked you ah.....the people on the Commission...do they have the



expertise of making a proper inspection of the facility?"

Juckett: "Well, having been on this Commission for some seven years now and having gone into both the university field but primarily in mental health...ah...you'd be surprised how quickah...you canah...be able to develop an expertise in this field. I'm not saying that any of the Members are going to be as qualified as a psychiatrist or a psychologist as to a specific program but I do think that the Members of the Committee are extremely hardworking and that they are concerned with the welfare of the people that are in these various facilities and we do have some staff on the Commission and we do try to relate thatah....to the State facility and to the State programs. And I would say that the Members do have aa high degree of....of expertise in relation to the average Member."

Thompson: "Thank you. I was just thinking that it is ...ah.. as essential that they would have expertise with the patients and the facility. Thank you very much."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Kane, Representative Grothberg."

Grothberg: "Mr. Speaker, I move the Previous Question."

Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved the Previous Question. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Representative Juckett to close."

Juckett: "Well, thank you Mr. Speaker, I think that the issue has been well debated on the floor. It would add six more Members, three Senators, three Republican...er.... three Representatives equally divided on the Commission ...and...ah...I think it would be a necessary item ...we are discharging patients and putting them into these facilities and I think we have to have this necessary follow up....and I would urge everyone to vote for Senate Bill 133."

Telcser: "The question is shall Senate Bill 133 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting



'no'. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Barnes to explain his vote."

Barnes: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I did have one question that came to mind during the debate but I didn't get a chance to ask the question...but is this overall Commission also the...also involved in visiting the penal institutions?....Well, Representative Juckett, it seems to me that we've had many problems in our penal institutions...especially up around Pontiac... and I have yet to receiveon my desk....or to read anywhere ...ah...anything from that visiting Committee that concerned itself with the many problems that ...ah.. we've had in our penal institutions in the last year so ...and I would hope that a Commission dealing with the nursing homes ...such a vital issue...the Commission...if enacted and apparently it will be..I'm not going to oppose it...but I would hope that they would get to it, before the fact and try to get us the kind of information that we would need here to be able to deal with our constituents and to deal with the various problems that apparently might come up at the various institutions and I hope that they won't be 'did' in the way that the Commission has apparently handled the visitation....ing of the penal institutions because I think that particular Committee has not 'did' its job."

Felcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. This question there are 112 'ayes', no 'nays'....McLendon 'aye' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority Laurino 'aye', is hereby declared passed....And now the Members will please be in their seats...Ah...Representative David Jones has a very distinguished visitor ...whom we would like to introduce and present to the House this morning."

Jones: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it's my pleasure to have with us today the illustrious Sheriff



....former Sheriff from McNary County, Tennessee, Mr. Beuphert Pusser. Now, Mr. Pusser is from Adamsville, Tennessee, and...when he was 26 years old he was beaten and robbed and he complained to the authorities but nothing was done so at that age he ran for Sheriff himself....of McNary County and he won. He was the youngest Sheriff ever elected in Tennessee and for his efforts in fighting organized crime he was shot seven times, he was stabbed, he was run down by a car while he and his wife were driving down a country road three hoodlums in another car.....ambushed him and blew his wives head off with a shotgun blast. The blast butchered his jaw, he has gone through 14 surgical operations on his face to recover. His exploits at...attracted attention of network television and then by a movie producer who decided that his exploits would bear making a motion picture and the film story of his life is now playing in Springfield and other theatres in this area. Having served a three term limit in Tennessee....they have a three term limit...for a Sheriff...Beuphert hopes to return to Tennessee in a State supervisory roll in law enforcement. Beuphert has an Illinois connection, he is here visiting his brother John who is with him...and who lives in East Peoria.... and a superb example of those who enforce the laws at the local level that we at the State House pass for them area real life law and order guy...who "Walks Tall"....

Beuphert Pusser: "Thank you. Thank you. It's a pleasure indeed to be here in Springfield. It's an honor to be standing before the Legislature of the great State of Illinois. Of course I always feel close to the Legislature because, after all you all are the ones thatthe law that the law enforcement has to enforce and I won't take up much of your time but it's a pleasure to be here. Thank you very much."

Telcser: "And now will Representative Geo-Karis.....also has



with...ah...with her today...another distinguished citizen from her District...whom she will introduce."

Geo-Karis: "Ah....Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ...ah....Mr....ah...on behalf of our three Representatives, Mr. Griesheimer, and Mr. Matijevich and myself from the 31st District in Illinois. I'm very honored to tell you that the first prize winner for the design of the medallion which will be the first medallion to honor the bi.....National Bicentennial Committee from the Illinois Bicentennial Committee was won by a young lady by the name of Robin Neuman from Waukegan, Illinois..... 31st District, who is here today, with her mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Al Neuman and her brother Bill and with Mr. Sam Lilly, the Executive Director of the Bicentennial Commission. And I'd like for you to meet Robin Neuman.

Robin Neuman: ".....what to say.....Thank you."

Geo-Karis: "She won a \$1,500 scholarship."

Telcser: "Representative Kosinski, for what purpose do you rise?"

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, a point of information, please?"

Telcser: "State your point, Sir."

Kosinski: "I have a copy of the Senate Calendar here and I wish to read this to you and the House and I'm not sure what this infers. It's House Bill 1975, Washburn....and the texts say.....'Washburn, fake a supplemental....appropriation of \$40,993 to the Board of Higher Education.'.... What's that mean, Sir? Fake?"

Telcser: "Representative Washburn present? Representative Ryan, do you wish to defend your colleague?"

Ryan: "Yes.....yes, Mr. Speaker, inasmuch as my running mate Representative Washburn is not here right now I'd like to just tell the honorable Gentleman from across the aisle that I'm sure that's a misprint and....ah...not to be too alarmed about it."

Stone: "Yes, Sir."

Telcser: "O. K., let'sSenate Bills, Third....Senate

Fred Selcke: "Senate Bill, 216, a Bill for an Act to amend an
Act relating to alcoholic liquors, Third Reading of the
Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Moultrie, Representative Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, the Gentleman that talked to me about
the Amendment is not on the Floor but he said that he
would notah...offer the Amendment and this Bill is
the one that I explained a while ago that would permit
the sale of alcoholic beverages at a State controlled
University Airport or faculty center and I would appreciate
your favorable vote."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall
Senate Bill 216 pass? All those in favor signify by
voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted
who wish? Take the record. Shea 'aye'. Collins 'aye'.

Fred Selcke: "Take the record, did you say."

Telcser: "Take the record. Representative Borchers, for what
purpose do you rise?"

Borchers: "In explaining my vote, actually I try.....I try to
get an explanationwhat about.....what about the

Telcser: "On this question there are 99 'ayes', 10 'nays' and

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall Senate Bill 164 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. I'm sorry, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "One question if the Sponsor will yield, Mr. Speaker."

Telcser: "He indicates he will."

Lechowicz: "Who'll make these appointments?"

McMaster: "In the case of the ones under township....Counties under township operation...ah...Ted, the appointment would be made by the Board of Township Auditors. Where there is no Township organization...ah...in commission Counties it is made by the County Board. Inah.... Townships that are coterminous with the City, then the appointment...ah....ah....remains an elective office rather than an appointive office."

Lechowicz: "Are any of these offices presently held in Cook County? "

McMaster: "Would you mind taking this out of the record until Representative Yourell comes back."

Telcser: "No, I wouldn't mind. Have all voted who wish?.... Oh!....I'm sorry. He took it out of the record? O. K. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill 110."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Have all voted who wished? Oh!

I'm sorry. He took it out of the record? Okay. Take it out of the record. Senate Bill 110. Senate Bill 110."

Fredric B. Selcke: "Senate Bill 110, ah.. Lauer, amends an Act relating to Human Blood. Third Reading of the Bill."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Logan, Representative Lauer."

J. R. Lauer: "Mr. Speaker, this is a Bill that ah.. is a correspondent Bill to one that was sponsored by Representative Douglas, which the House passed out several weeks ago and sent to the Senate. This is a Bill that ah.. was introduced in the Senate at ah.. the same time. It passed out of the Human Resources Committee by a vote of thirteen to nothing and is a Bill which would extend the repealer of the ah.. 'Blood Labeling Act' to 1976. It also defines ah.. human ah.. tissue, organs and blood as not being a product and would not come under the purview of the ah.. ah... Acts which would have to do with products. Rather, ah... the.. the ah.. services or the... the transfer of blood tissue or organs from one human being to another is considered definitely a service. I.. I would ah.. like to have Doctor ah.. Douglas comment on the Bill."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "He doesn't seem to want to. The gentleman from.... Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

G. W. Shea: "Yeah... Ah.. Representative Dan Houlihan had a Bill to do with blood labeling and that. I know he's off



the floor right now. And, I'm wondering if you could hold it until he gets back. I'll tell you, he's very interested in this. Ah.. there's some problems about hemophiliacs and blood shortages. Oh! There he is over there. I just want to make sure that he understands what this Bill does."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from....."

G. W. Shea: "He tells me it's alright."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Alright.. The gentleman from Cook, Representative Douglas."

B. L. Douglas: "Ah.. Gerry, this Bill ah.. has nothing to do with the intent of ah.. House Bill 1411 which we passed out for Representative Houlihan. This is a very important piece of Legislation which must be passed ah.. as far in advance as July 1st as possible as Representative Lauer has already said. After July 1st, ah.. we're going to be up against a very serious problem with the fear that Doctors will have that hepatitis could be spread through the transfusion of blood. And, I urge that the House give favorable consideration to this Bill which, under my name, passed out of here on the Consent Calendar with no trouble at all."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff."

B. B. Duff: "Ah.. would the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "He indicates he will."

B. B. Duff: "I'm sorry, Representative. I.. There's a little bit of hubbub and I was trying to listen. But, I did not get your statement as to what this Bill actually does,

particularly relating to taking it out of the product field."

J. R. Lauer: "Representative Duff....."

B. B. Duff: "Are you talking about product liability?"

J. R. Lauer: "Right. Ah.. The.. The part of the 'Blood Labeling Act' that is actually changed is ah.., if you have a copy of the Bill, in ah.. lines 21, 2, 3, 4 and 24, 'and in the case of a service involving blood or blood derivatives that he has rendered such service in accordance with the 'Blood Labeling Act'. So that ah.. he ah.... By this Bill, it is defining ah.. the transfer of blood or other tissue as a service."

B. B. Duff: "I'm sorry. I really couldn't hear you or understand what you're saying."

J. R. Lauer: "The language of the Bill, Representative, ah.. makes it clear that ah.. this is a service, that is the transfer of blood or blood derivatives, is a service and that blood ah.... And, it thereby infers that blood is not a product. One of the basis for these ah... for the Blood Labeling Bills is that there has been a shortage of blood to the extent that Doctors in Hospitals must at some time rely upon purchased blood, that is, as opposed to donated blood. We have not as yet had the time to ah... get the blood bank ah.. donation proposals fully implemented. And, this does give a.. a ah.. certain protection to the Physicians and to the Hospitals in that they are acting in good faith and exercising due care in the transfer of blood to the extent that it is ah.. possible to know that the



blood and uncontaminated."

B. B. Duff: "Well, you're saying then that the basis of this Bill is that it takes blood out of the product liability area and puts it into the service area."

J. R. Lauer: "Yes, that's true."

B. B. Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to address myself to the Bill."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Now, wait... Well, Representative Douglas is seeking recognition and he indicates that, perhaps, the explanation was in error. So, maybe your question can be answered better. Representative Douglas."

B. L. Douglas: "Ah.. if I may, Representative Duff. It does not take it out of the product area. It's already out of the product area. The Supreme Court, three and a half years ago, in the Cunningham-McNeal Decision, made the observations that blood should be regarded as a product. And, we passed Legislation in the beginning of the last Session that countermanded the Supreme Court Ruling. And, at the present time under Law in Illinois, the transfusion of blood is a service, not a product. And, what this Bill would be doing in direct answer to your question is extending the waver of liability from July 1st, 1973 to July 1st, 1976. Now, we worked very hard to limit it to only three years to keep the pressure on the pharmaceutical industry to come up with an adequate test to detect hepatitis. At the present time, and this will certainly be true three weeks from now after July 1st, we can only discover at the most one out of



five cases where blood carries the hepatitis virus and can spread it to other people. And, with the cooperation of industry, we've decided to extend it to three more years, keep the pressure on industry, keep the pressure on the medical profession so that in three years time, we can make the decision whether or not we should continue to regard blood as a service and not a product."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Duff."

B. B. Duff: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I consider this to be a very serious problem and I know many many Members of the House do to. The simple fact of the matter is that the reason that this has all come about is that people do get bad blood and they do get them from people who sell blood for a profit. And, the people who sell the blood for a profit do not have an adequate concern over the quality of the blood that they're selling for a profit. Now, there have been many blood banks implemented on a volunteer basis to be sure not totally and not well. But, the fact of the matter is the recipient of this blood is in a totally helpless situation. The recipient of this bad blood is.. is going to be affected in his health, perhaps, for his life, if he lives. And, I think, that three years is too doggone long. If we're really going to try to put the pressure on industry to come up with a solution to that, I really think, it's a mistake for us to do now what we have done before in other areas of Legislation. And, that is to extend the



period of time so long into the future that people do not understand the very real concern that we have over this serious problem."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

R. S. Juckett: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. If we do not pass this Bill now, the Hospitals will close down, the blood transfusions will close down and it has absolutely nothing to do with purchased blood. Under the Court Decision, a Hospital was held liable for the transfusion of blood. It was donated blood and the individual contacted hepatitis. As was previously said, we can not and we do not, at this time, have a fool-proof method of detecting hepatitis in the blood even that which is donated. Now, if this Bill is not passed, then as of July 1 of 1973, every Hospital, every Doctor, every Technician will be absolutely liable, absolutely liable, absolutely. There will be no affirmative defense. And, if a patient does, perhaps, contact hepatitis, then that person will have an absolute liability... law suit against the Hospital. But, I would predict, and this is the statement I made when I passed House Bill 16 two years ago, there will be no blood transfusions in the State of Illinois, there will be no operations unless they are absolutely sure that the patient will not lose any blood. It would be reckless on our part not to pass this Bill. It does extend the time for another... additional period of three years. If we find



the absolute cure for the detection of hepatitis, we will be the first ones to come in with a Bill and remove what we are doing now. But, we don't have it now. It is not in the near future. And, I would urge you to pass this Bill because without it, we will bring to a grinding halt the operations of Hospitals, Doctors, Nurses and the related fields. It is absolutely and imperatively needed. And, I urge an 'aye' vote on this Bill."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Gentleman from Cook, Representative McLendon."

J. A. McLendon: "Mr. Speaker, I think, that we've had adequate ah.. debate. We realize the seriousness of the ah.. problem. And, I, at this time, move the previous question."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "The gentleman has moved the previous question. All in favor signify by saying 'aye', the opposed 'no'. Representative Lauer, wish to close?"

J. R. Lauer: "Mr. Speak... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I agree that the debate has been adequate. I think, that the Ladies and Gentlemen of the House will be impressed by the urgency of passing this Bill. I strongly solicit your 'aye' vote."

Rep. Arthur A. Telcser: "Question is, 'shall Senate Bill 110 pass?'. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wished? Telcser.. 'aye'. Take the record. Porter.. 'aye'. If you want to get on, why don't you come up here and tell the Clerk. On this question, there are 138 'Ayes', 2 'Nays'

and this Bill having received a Constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. Now ah., the distinguished ah. Minority Leader, ah.. the gentleman from Union County, Representative Choate."



Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House we had the winner of the Bicentennial Commission...State wide contest to design the Illinois 1973 American Revolu Bicentennial Medallion introduced a moment ago. I would like to introduce the second and third place winners and they both come from the same town of Marion, Illinois which is in the District of Representative McCormick and Hart and myself. I would like to introduce the second place winner, Valarie Bourlandfry and third place winner Mark A. Rue, both seventeen years of age and they are accompanied by their art teacher, Mrs. Bornfield who assisted them in their endeavors and also their parents are in the Gallery to the rear on the other side of the aisle."

Telcser: "Okay, we'll go to House Bills, Third Reading. House Bill 604."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 604, Stedelin."

Telcser: "Do you want that out of the record?

Fred Selcke: "Hold it."

Telcser: "What about House Bill 640, Representative Williams, wish that called? House Bill 640."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 640, Williams, an appropriation... Department of Transportation, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Williams."

Williams: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is a....ah...underpass Bill that is much needed... not only in the Village of Franklin Park but it is a regional problem there. There are about 168 trains a day of about 200 cars. It has been amended by the Appropriation Committee to give the seed money to proceed with the engineering and the geometric study. I would appreciate a favorable vote on this. Thank you."

Telcser: "Any discussion? The question is shall house Bill 640 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish.



Take the record. Is Representative Katz on the floor? Harold let's get your Bill next. Huh!...On this question there are 116 'ayes', no 'nays' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 698."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 698, Katz, an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of comprehensive health planning agency, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Katz."

Katz: "This is the regular appropriation for the agency relating to health care planning services in Illinois. It was reduced by the Committee on Appropriations and then unanimously recommended for approval by the Committee. I would urge the adoption.....appropriation Bill."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion?....The question is shall House Bill 698 pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Telcser 'aye'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. This question 130 'ayes', one 'nay', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 840."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 840, Washington, a Bill for an Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense Department of Local Government Affairs, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Washington."

Washington: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Bill 840 here ...the Bill for the ordinary and contingent expenses for the ...ah...Department of Local Government Affairs for the fiscal year 1974. There were two Amendments placed on it which were debated on the floor, they were accepted in committee without opposition. I know of no opposition here today and I move the...ah...I ask for your support for the passage of House Bill 840."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Skinner."



Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, it's been no secret that I have not been of the opinion: the Department of Local Government Affairs has been doing a very good job. I have resolved that for the first year that we ought to give them a chance to organize and get on the stick. I will assure the Sponsor of this Bill and the Department of Local Government Affairs for which I know he'sfor which he holds no special brief, that if after a year they are not supervising assessments as the State law provides in this State that I shall do everything I can to cut the guts out of any future appropriations."

Telcser: "Is there any further discussion? The question is shall House Bill 840 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question 138 'ayes', one 'nay', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Hudson 'aye'. Representative Borchers, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Borchers: "Vote me 'present' just as an indication of a slight doubt of these Gentlemen."

Telcser: "Okay, record the Gentleman as voting 'present'. Richard Walsh, 'aye'. House Bill 876."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 876, Douglas, appropriation for expenses...Department of Public Health, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Douglas."

Douglas: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker,....Ah....Ladies and Gentlemen of the House,...ah...this is the Bill which covers the ordinary and...ah...other expenses of the State Department of Public Health...ah...I think there are two Committee Amendments, Mr. Speaker...Ah....They're on already, aren't they? The Committee Amendments do two things which I want to be sure the House is aware of. ...Ah..The first Committee Amendment covers the...ah...increase in appropriation for local health departments



which meets the needs of many local health departments around the State. That was raised, I believe to \$3,000,000 and the Department of Public Health has agreed to work closely with local health departments to see that local services are carried out with that increase in funds. The second Amendment ...ah...in line with an earlier comment today ...ah..and as a result of...ah...pressure that was brought to bear through House Bill 1411 by Representative Houlihan allows for \$500,000 to deal with a specific problem of hemophiliac patients ...ah...there was very little other ...ah...matter of note in this Bill...ah... and ...ah...I ask for your favorable consideration."

Telcser: "Any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 876 pass? All those in favor by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. McGrew and Merlo 'aye'. On this question 144 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. For what purpose does the Minority Leader, Representative Choate arise?"

Choate: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I rise for the purpose of introducing the wife of a former colleague of ours an outstanding Member of this body. I'd like to introduce the lovely Mrs. Russ Hamilton.....to the rear hear."

Telcser: "House Bill 938."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 938, Tuerk, an Act making an appropriation to the University of Illinois, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 938 appropriates the small sum of \$15,000 for the Municipal Clerks Training Institute which was set up by the Legislature in 1967 but really was never provided any funds and that's what this Bill attempts to do. I ask for your support."



Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 938 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

Fred Selcke: "Maragos is not here."

Telcser: "Merlo, 'aye'.....House Bill 1045

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1045, McGrew...."

Telcser: "Take it out of the record. Representative Carter. House Bill 1056."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1056, Carter, appropriates the expense....Department of Public Health, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Carter."

Carter: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the ordinary expense, appropriations for the Department of Health. This has to do with urinal dialysis program....ah...may I state that we have now increased the program to include Decatur...just last Wednesday we have opened two new satellites in Decatur, Illinois and with these extra moneys we will have satellites throughout the State of Illinois. I solicit your support."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 1056 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Telcser 'aye'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question 135 'ayes', no 'nays', this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. house Bill 1203."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1203, an Act making an appropriation Superintendent of Public Instruction, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Ogle, Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. There is a companion Bill, House Bill 1514....ah...that goes with



1203 and I'd like leave of the House to have them both considered at this time."

Telcser: "Are there any objections? Hearing none, will the Clerk please readplease read...."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1514, an Act to amend the Comprehensive Health Education Act, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Ogle, Representative Brinkmeier."

Brinkmeier: "Well, Mr. Speaker, these two Bills would appropriate \$200,000 for the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction for the purpose of training Health teachers. Two years ago we mandated that our schools teach Health but we didn't realize that we didn't have qualified Health teachers. We found out when the survey was made by the OSPI office that only two percent of those people teaching Health were qualified to teach it....so a subcommittee worked on this for a year with comprehensive health planning and their recommendation was that we try to induce teachers to.....college students to be trained to teach Health...using the same guide lines that we use to catch up with our special ed teachers. I'd be glad to answer any questions....ah....I would urge an 'aye' vote."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Palmer."

Palmer: "If the Sponsor will yield for a question?"

Telcser: "Yes, he will."

Palmer: "What about the school nurses, don't they....ah..... participate somewhat in the Health training programs in our schools?"

Brinkmeier: "Well, yes, Representative Palmer. I think some of them do. I think that each individual school has their own program. Many times they will use team teaching and if the nurse is qualified if she has her degree and is qualified to teach I'm sure this is being done. But the point is we don't.....we just don't have enough Health teachers in the State of Illinois. For example..."



ah....in 1970-71....the first year that we....that this law was implemented we had 1,400 PE teachers teaching Health....we had Social Studies teachers....English teacherswe had Horticulture teachers ...Music teachers ...only two percent of them teaching were actually qualified to teach....and in most instances...the administrators assigning the Health classes to those teachers having the least load and we feel that Health is that important that we should have qualified teachers and this program would be run....just almost identically to the program that we ran to catch up with our special ed teachers."

Palmer: "Well, let me ask you one further question....Is a person who has a degree in education....are they competent to teach a Health training course?"

Brinkmeier: "No....not necessarilyI was called upon to do that and again it was just because I happened to have a free period or two and the administrator assigned the Health class to me.....Ah...Generally the ...ah...the person that is qua...that is a education degree will have it in other areas...certainly not in Health....that hasn't been the case in the past."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Would the Sponsor yield?"

Telcser: "...indicates he will."

Hudson: "I've been wondering a little about the roll of the 'phys ed' teachers in all of this. Are they not qualified ...ah...at least to some extent through training....ah...through their special training to ...ah... approach this whole matter of ...Health...ah..."

Brinkmeier: "Ah...Representative they are not really certified or qualified. Probably of all the teachers on the staff ...generally the physical ed teachers have the most courses in that area but they just don't have the degreesthey



just don't know how to teach these courses ...they do it as I say...because they are the most closely related courses possibly.....For example we hadthis first year we had over 1400 PE teachersteaching Health. Yet only 253 teachers in the State were really qualified to teach it....I presume some of them would have been also PE teachers..."

Hudson: "Thank you."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is, shall these two Bills pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take two Roll Calls. Have all voted who wish? Take the record....Barnes 'aye'....On this question there are 121 'ayes', one 'nay' and these two Bills having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative Katz on the floor?....Noop.....Madigan is not there.....Neff....wants to hold it.....I don't see Deuster....Deuster....House Bill 1593."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1593, Jacobs, appropriates to the Department of Transportation, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Jacobs."

Jacobs: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House....House Bill 1593 would allow for a grade separation over the Rock Island Lines track on Route 84 in the City of East Moline, in the County of Rock Island. \$600,000 appropriation for the study and survey ...this Bill and I ask for a favorable vote."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall House Bill 1593 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this there are 114 'ayes', 4 'nays' and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed.Keller 'aye'..... House Bill 1676..."



Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1676, Stiehl, appropriation to the Department of Transportation, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Lady from St. Clair, Representative Stiehl. Fred do you want to read 1676?"

Fred Selcke: "I did."

Stiehl: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 1676 appropriates \$100,000 for preliminary studies for a grade separation on State Highway 460 at.....M....
...Missouri Avenue, I ask for your approval."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 1676 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish. Take the record. Fleck 'aye'. On this question 123 'ayes', one 'nay', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. Representative William Walsh, for what purpose do you rise?"

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, in the rear Gallery is the Girl Scout Troup from New Baden, Illinois and in that group is Ben Harpstrite's daughter, Jeanine. Will they all stand up?"

Telcser: "House Bill 1735."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1735, an Act making an appropriation to the Department of Agriculture, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Kane, Representative Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the Committee, this is the appropriation for the Bill that went out of here overwhelmingly 17-34 in the amount of \$26,700 to the Department of Agriculture. Solicit your favorable support."

Telcser: "Ah....Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 1735 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question 122 'ayes', no 'nays', and these Bills having received the Constitutional Majority are hereby declared passed. House Bill 1805....Representative McPartlin on the floor?"



Take that out of the record. House Bill 1944....Representative Polk on the floor? Oh....Gosh...he's asked me a dozen times to call that Bill today....he's not here now....."

Unknown: "There he is."

Unknown: "Let's go Ben, got your Bill."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1944, Polk, an Act making an appropriation to the Secretary of State for providing for the nondenominational chapel in the Capitol Building, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Polk."

Polk: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is not what you would call a 'merely' Bill. This is an appropriation to \$70,000 to establish a non-denominational chapel here in the Capitol Building for the purpose and use of all the Members ...the Senate and the House...any employees that would so feel inclined to use it. There is precedence of other capitols having this, there are five other States that presently have it. There is one in the Nations Capitol. There is one in the United Nations Building. This is a Bill that has bipartisan support, this isn't a Republican versus Democrat Bill, Or a downstate versus upstate, or a black versus white. This is a Bill that's something we can all use and I would solicit your support."

Telcser: "Is there any further discussion? The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "Ben, could you tell meah...what the appearance of a nondenominational chapel would be like?"

Polk: "I'm sorry I couldn't understand the question."

Schneider: "Is it a nondecorative room or...ah...how do you describe a nondenominational chapel?"

Polk: "The description of the room itself will be ...ah...left up to the ...ah...number one the committee on space needs will make the decision as to where it is going to be and



I describe a nondenominational chapel as one that you have probably seen in ...ah...in many hospitals,...ah... it is one that can be used by all faiths."

Schneider: "Well, I don't know, that was a serious question, but I'm really concerned about whether or not we ought to expend public funds for such a function. I agree that it's a.....probably important purpose that serves a lot of individuals but it doesn't seem to me that we've had any problems with utilizing the churches...ah...that are denominational....ah...in the area we are surrounded almostah...totally by churches within this complex area. I suggest that although it's a good cause that we could use \$70,000 for another purpose ...ah...rather than a place to sit and reflect. I wonder if Representative Murphy might want to....ah...introduce a Bill so we can have transcendental meditationin another room...and I think it's a bad precedence, I think we ought to move to beat the Bill....ah...so I solicit a 'no' vote on it."

Polk: "Well, Mr. Schneider, I won't question..ah...whether you.....you have gone to any church in this community, however, I question if you're going to find any church, any temple, any synagogue open after ten o'clock in theand there's been many...many evenings here that we've gotten out of this capitol much after ten. I solicit you to find ...ah...a church that is going to be open before nine o'clock in the morning. I've attempted to get into quite a few churches here in this community and unfortunately due to the vandalism and many cities have the same problem and not just here in Springfield but the churches are not open here early in the morning and I've attempted to avail myself on many instances...many morningsearly in the morning and the churches are just locked. This wayby having it here in the Capitol it would be available to us at all hours...."



Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative McCourt."

McCourt: "Mr. Speaker....ah...I don't think I can be described as an irreligious person and I hate to speak against a proposition that on its face would appear to be good but as I walk around the city hear I know there is many churches within two or three blocks. I know as many office buildings as the State is renting space in, it would seem to me that this space could better be utilized for s.....purposes and I would hope that we would show some responsibility and vote against this quote 'good measure'."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Hudson."

Hudson: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in.....as one of the Cosponsors of this Bill.....I rise in support of it. When I consider how some of the space is usedwere talking about the efficient utilization of space. When I consider how some of it is used in our Legislative Complex here, when I consider to what ends we appropriate some moneys and.... ah...I cannot help but feel that the modest amount of money suggested here to be utilized in the interest of a physicalah...reminder perhaps....that...ah...God does rule in the affairs of men, I'm a firm believer in this, myself. I believe that most of our Members ...ah.. recognize this fact.....or at least would like a opportunityah....when the spirit moves them....to recognize this fact. I think it's entirely in order. Not only would serve as a physical reminder of the existance of some power higher than mere man...but would give our Members, when they feel so motivated toah...consult with Him, I think the....ah....yes, the spiritual aspects of our work hereare important....we are reminded of these things every morning as we open our session with prayer.



I think the Bill is entirely in order and Iah..urge the Members here to think seriously....not to take this lightly....to think seriously about it and give it their support. I urge a green light on this Bill."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? The question is, shall this Billthe Gent.....I'm sorry....the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Rayson."

Rayson: "Well, as the Gentleman last spoke, Mr. Speaker, we should treat this matter seriously...I'm very concerned about it...I don't want to tread in the areas where Angels Fear to Tread, the First Amendment. But, ...but there is something else that bothers me....you know ..Parkinson has a law that says that 'work increases in the direct relationship to space allotted' and we talked about space, and I'm suggesting that if there is any validity in that lawah...we might have to appropriate ...ah...to the staff and to the bureaucracy that might be attached to this religion. I.....I..I..I...really feel it's unnecessary ...I really feel that if we have any kind of spiritual uplift that's needed maybe we'd be better off spending \$70,000 for a sauna bath."

Telcser: "Is there further discussion? Now,.....the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Davis."

Davis: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I don't arise to tell anybody how to pray....Even the Disciples who followed Christ had to be taught how to pray. All I'm saying is that we ought to pray. There is a sacred admonition that men ought to always pray and notthink. Pray in your own way. Pray in your own language...Pray as you have been taught to pray. The Nations Capitol has a prayer room where they can steal away and pray....I haven't done any research on this but I dare say more than a dozen states have a prayer room, where in the language of my old Grandfather and my old Grandmother where they could steal away, just steal away



and pray. Righteousness exault to the Nation. And don't say it wont do the Nation any good. Righteousness exault to the Nation and sin is a reproach to any people."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Leon."

Leon: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I am going to vote for this Bill and my reasons are this... The Supreme Court has decided that our children cannot have any reference to a superior being in their schools and perhaps a chapel in this Capitol Building will remind them that there is a superior being and they should acknowledge Him....Therefore, I urge everyone to vote 'yes'."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, I noticed we've had a little problem on the floor this morning but I really want to ask this question in all seriousness,.....Polk.....I see that you're going to entrust the Secretary of State with the construction. But the question that occurs to me is..... you're going to want....I know...ah...God figure in this chapel and since the Ecumenical Council.....I'm still trying to be as serious as I can....ah...were signifying the Lord with^across without a statue on the cross.....a cross with a statue on the cross. The Star of David and some of the black people have...the Christian Blacks haveah...expected black statues. Now, I think this can lead to some problems, have you given that some thought? Now, I'm very serious about this because I've attended church at the United Nations and I didn't come away very impressed."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lawrence, Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, as the Co-sponsor of this Bill I rise....I rise to confess error. In this particular Bill the mere fact that it is labeled religious or spiritual doesn't make it so....it's a misnomer. I too went to the nondenominational chapel in



the United Nations building and I came away with the conclusion that it was pagan nonsense. In this particular instance I respectfully submit that we could save the taxpayers at least the \$70,000 if we adopted a resolution designating this House chamber as the chapel when it is to be used when we're not in session....and we would all get more spiritual value by coming in with that kind of nomenclature on this room than wasting money on a well intentioned but impractical idea. So I shall vote 'no' and I apologize to the Speaker for having been a Cosponsor with him on it."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Polk wish to close?"

Polk: "Yes, I'll close....in....in fact Mr. Cunningham answered Mr. Giorgi's question. When Mr. Cunningham walked into this nondenominational chapter....chapel....he received nothing from it....therefore he apparently gave nothing to it. I think you'll get out of it just exactly what you put into it....and those of us who would feel that there is a need will receive something from it. I solicit all your support."

Telcser: "The question is, shall House Bill 1944 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Mann to explain his vote."

Mann: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House...First.. First let me say that I ...I have respect for the distinguished Sponsor, secondly I respect the religious ah...beliefs ...ah...of everyone in this room. Voting for this Bill is like voting against God and Country... if you'll excuse the pun....Ah...But at the same time we've maintained a tradition through the years of separation of Church and State....of Government neutrality to all kinds of religion so I oppose this Bill not because I'm antireligious, not because I'm anti-Ben Polk, but because



I think we ought to maintain this wall. Other countries
ah...that have merged...ah...Church and State....ah..
 have imposed...ah...on certain individuals ...ah.....
 pressures.....to put it mildly.....and I would say that
ah..the best place to pray...the best place to pray
 is in our various churchesah...not in a government
 sponsored and paid for room. And that's the only reason
 that I'm voting 'no'. Not that I disrespect anyone's
 religion."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Franklin, Representative Hart."

Hart: "Ah....Thank you, my objection is not to having the....
 chapel but to doing it with public money. I think it's
 a good idea but I think we ought to solicit contributions
 for that purpose and that's the reason I'm voting 'no'."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Mugalian."

Mugalian: "In explaining my vote....I at times, while I've
 been down here, have felt the need for some contemplation
 and I have found a perfectly appropriate place to do that.
 I've gone and observed the statue of Abraham Lincoln on
 the lawn of the Capitol Building."

Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Record
 Representative J. Houlihan as voting 'present'. On this
 question 116 'ayes', 18 'nays', one answering 'present',
 this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is
 hereby declared passed. House Bill 19.....OH! I'm sorry,
 Representative Davis, for what purpose do you rise, "Sir?"

Davis: "Mr. Speaker, I rise for the purpose of presenting a
 distinguished guest to this Body, who is sitting in the
 Speakers Gallery. The distinguished President of the
 Cosmopolitan Chamber of Commerce is with us this morning
 in the person of one of Chicago's great business men, Mr.
 Bertell W. Daag. Stand Mr. Daag, will you please?"

Telcser: "House Bill 1950."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1950, Maragos, amends the Capitol
 Development Board Act, Third Reading of the Bill."



Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker, House Bill 1950 is cosponsored by the three Representatives of the 30th District as well as many Members who areon the Board of Economic Development of the State of Illinois and it is also sponsored by the Leadership of both sides of the aisle. The purpose of this is to amend the Capitol...ah.... Development Board and authorize the Board, subject to specific appropriations, to provide cargo handling facilities to the regional Park District, such as the Chicago Park District. It requires that fifty percent of the gross receipts from the use of the facilities be paid to the State until the amount expended by the State is repaid....There was an Amendment in the Committee, in the Appropriations Committee that in addition to the payment of the principal that the State that the facility also pay back five percent interest which is being charged by theby the Capitol Development Board. It has passed the Appropriations Committee by a vote of 23-0, and....ah....I would like at this time toah...to have both House Bills 1950, 1951 and 1952 be considered for the same purpose because they're supplemental Bills.....Leave to consider 51 and 52 together."

Telcser: "Hearing no objections, will the Clerk please read House Bill 1951 and 1952?"

Fred Selcke: "Ah....House Bill 1951, a Bill for an Act to Amend the Capitol Development Bond Act, Third Reading of the Bill. House Bill 1952, an Act making an appropriation to the Capitol Development Board, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Again, both.....the House Bill 1951 and House Bill 1952 are auxiliary measuressupplement the purposes that were mentioned in House Bill 1950 to give the



\$5,000,000 that which will be repaid, it's the first time in history that this is being done. That the...er...ah...Park District will pay back the money because it's...Revenue Bonds and other authorities are already limited. I ask for your favorable support. Now, all these Bills got out of Committee 23-0."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is, shall these Bills pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. The Clerk will take ...three...Roll Calls. Have all voted who wish? Leon 'aye'. Take the record. Now, these questions there are 100 and....McGrew 'aye'....141 'ayes', no 'nays', and these three Bills having received the Constitutional Majority are hereby declared passed. House Bill 1957."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1957, an Act making an appropriation to William Eugene Andrews, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Macon, Representative Borchers."

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker and fellow Members of the House, this is a momentous occasion. I actually have...and I don't know what to do with it....a noncontroversial Bill. For once in my life. I solicit your support."

Telcser: "The question is, shall House Bill 1957 pass? All those in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question127 'ayes', one 'nay', this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 1971."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 1971, an Act making an additional appropriation to the Commission for the uniformity of Legislation in the United States, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Randolph."

Randolph: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bill 1971 makes a supplemental appropriation of \$5,500 to the Commission for the uniformity of Legislation in the

United States. This is to pay Illinois assessment of dues to the National Conference of Commission on Uniform State Laws and I urgeI ask for your favorable vote."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The question is shall House Bill 1971 pass? All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. Yea.....Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Yea.....This question129 'ayes', no 'nays', and this Bill having received the Constitutional Majority is hereby declared passed. House Bill 966. Representative Walsh, for what purpose do you rise? "

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, it gives me great pleasure to introduce the lovely wife of our colleague Carl Soderstrom, Virginia Soderstrom who is in the Speakers Gallery ...to my right, the Speakers left. Might say also Mr. Speaker, that this is the Soderstrom's thirty-second wedding anniversary.

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 966, Telcser, an Act in relation to the acquisition of open space and recreational lands, Third Reading of the Bill."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, may I have leave of the House to hear House Bill 967it is a companion Bill."

Miller: "Does the Gentleman have leave?" Okay, leave is granted."

Fred Selcke: "House Bill 967 appropriation to the Department of Conservation, Third Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Bills 966 and 967...ah...are Bills which appropriates from the Capitol Development Bond Fund the sum of \$5,000,000 for the acquisition and development of a recreational space throughout the State. The applications would be made to the Department of Conservation and ...ah...who would work with the local government in determining these priorities.ah....In order to acquire the space....



and the land necessary...ah...to develop and acquire these spaces...ah...the first year the Act provides a 75% State, 25% local match, the second year its a 60-40 match and thereafter a 50-50 match and I would appreciate a favorable vote."

Miller: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann is recognized."

Mann: "Our.....when you talk about recreation, now, ah..... will this include open space...ah...in the lake..... across the lake in the lakefront?"

Telcser: "Yes, it's the...ah.... Chicago Park District....of ...who is the...ah..authority in our area which is to acquire ...ah...open spaces along the lakefront for recreation, they would then make application to the Department of Conservation and qualify for the matching funds out of that fund for that acquisition."

Mann: "Ah...And then does the State then require or mandate a certain use of the money?"

Telcser: "Ah...the guidelines, Bob....ah...would be developed by the Department of Conservation so that the State would have'a handle'.....if you will....on the...ah application,..therefore, on the type of development it would be. I have not set out in the Bill ...ah...guidelines, we have left that to the Department of Conservation."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker can I be heard?"

Miller: "Proceed, Sir."

Mann: "In my judgement Mr. Speaker, this is a very important Bill. All over our Country ...ah...we find our Cities turning into...ah...'seas of cement', and there is nothing more important in my opinion than preserving open space so that the people of Chicago can visually and physically enjoy that lake and their lakefront. That's the real wealth of our City and I think this is a very important Bill and I would urge your support."

Miller: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Cook



Mr. Lundy."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, will the Sponsor yield for a question?"

Miller: "He indicates he will. Proceed, Sir."

Lundy: "Thank you. Art,...ah...the language in the Bill... seems to is a little bit unclear in that it designates that the money shall be used for acquisition and development of land in urban areas. Now it's possible that ...that could be interpreted to mean that the money will only be available ...ah..to acquire sites which need subsequent development but it wouldn't be available only for development of land that's already owned by the State and I'm sure you're familiar with theah... Warren Park which is the old Edgewater Golf Course..... which fits beautifully into....into the concept of your Bill, but would money be available solely for the development of that area?"

Telcser: "Yes.....It's either/or, Joe."

Lundy: "Thank you very much."

Miller: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider."

Schneider: "Thank you. Mr. Speaker. Has the Department of Transp.....ah...Conservation agreed to expendah... \$5,000,000.....this year; Art? Or, are they going to use it as requests come in, or.....I guess you haven't established guidelines but are they going to make the determination on how the landwhich land will be acquired and how the....ah...money will be spent this fiscal year?"

Telcser: "Who, the State, Glenn? Was your question.....is the State going to do that?"

Schnieder: "No....the question....I'm curious as to whether or not the Department of Conservation would spend \$5,000,000 this year...ah...and I want to know if you've conferred with them as to whether or not they will expend \$5,000,000? Like Bob Mann and Joe, I'm eager to have



open land maintained but I'm also curious to know if they will indeed plan to spend the money this year or if it is going to be an appropriation that will sit idly by and not be used."

Telcser: "Okay, I have no way of predicting if the Department of Conservation will spend the \$5,000,000, I can only tell you thatfrom the response I've had from this Legislation the local governments, the County Boards, the Park Districts, et cetera will be coming in with applications far in excess of the \$5,000,000. Now, if Conservation approves those applications and okays them, then of course they'll spend it.....Very easily."

Schneider: "But, you have no information from the Director or any of the Deputies indicating that they plan to spend at all?"

Telcser: "Not in that respect. No."

Schneider: "Okay, thank you very much."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Berman."

Berman: "Arthur....ah....Representative Telcser, theah... I know your answer to Representative Lundy ...that you feel that the intent would be acquisition or developmentah..if this passes out of the House would you have any objection to Amending line 24 on page one to say acquisition.....?"

Telcser: "Not at all....I'd be happy to."

Berman: "Thank you."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Will, Mr. Kempiners."

Kempiners: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I'd like to commend the Sponsor of this Bill for sponsoring this type of Legislation andah...for permitting me to sign on as a Cosponsor. I think it's important that we in the Legislature address the problem of open space and I who represent an area that is rapidly developing need this type of Legislation for my constituents. I've got one community, Naperville, that in my District that is growing



by leaps and bounds and they are having problems obtaining open space because of the finances involved. I went on this Bill as a Cosponsor because of the problems they are facing but they're not alonelook at Kane County, look at Will County and Kendall, look at McHenry and Lake....they're having problems which are unbelievable and I think that this Legislationwhether the Department uses all \$5,000,000 or not I think it states where we as the Legislature feel funds are important and I am happy to add my name as a Cosponsor and speak on behalf of this good Legislation."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Lawrence, Mr. Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Miller: "He indicates he will. Proceed."

Cunningham: "Representative Telcser, I was a little discouraged by the comment that priority would be given to the high population concentration areas. Am I correct in my fear that there's nothing in this Bill for the people of the 54th District?"

Telcser: "Not at all, Roscoe. The Bill has a provision thatah....there is a 10% ceiling for any one given project so that Chicago as an example cannot just take it all in one fell swoop."

Cunningham: "Well, what significance do you give to the reference about the priority? Is there some way....."

Telcser: "For this reason, Roscoe,....ah...ah...when you come into the urban areas of the State, which of course would be parts of Chicago, I assume, East St. Louis....ah.... maybe Decatur. Land just isn't available. You can't find land and then...and when something is....ah... possible to pick up then it become a contest between the local government and developers to see who's going to get it. Now, if the local government doesn't have funds available...ah...the land is ...ah...almost all of the time picked up by private interest and is gone forever



for use by the public. And so the urban areas have priorities in that regard and we've also given priority to the flood plan areas so that that land can be better utilizedah....and..."

Cunningham: "I was anxious not to offend one so demonstrably influential and so I will not vote against it and I'll not vote for it unless absolutely needed but it it got to the Senate and have some clause that could be put in there to protect our sparsely populated area it would be ever appreciated."

Miller: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Ah...I certainly agree witha....the last remark of the Representative from Lawrence County, Representative Telcser. I'd like to ask you one question. As I understand it you have amended the Bill down from \$25,000,000 to \$5,000,000."

Telcser: "That's right."

Choate: "And the \$5,000,000 comes out of the Capitol Development Bond Issuances."

Telcser: "Right."

Choate: "I have no objections to the Bill then, because.... my first....my original objection as you well remember was simply because it was outside the confines of the budget as presented by the Chief Executive."

Telcser: "Right, thank you very much, Representative."

Miller: "All right. Is there futher discussion? The Gentleman from Cook care to close?....Mr. Telcser? All right, the question is, shall House Bills 966 and 967 pass? All those in favor will vote 'aye', those opposed 'nay', and the Clerk will take two Roll Calls. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On these two Bills the vote is 145 'ayes', no 'nays' and each of these Bills having received the Constitutional Majority are hereby declared passed."

Telcser: "On the order of Consideration Postponed. We have



a few Bills on that order of business. On the Order of Consideration Postponed.....Okay.....I don't see the Sponsor on the Floor. Let's wait a second. Representative Fleck, for what purpose do you rise?"

Fleck: "Point of Inquiry, Mr. Speaker, I ...ah...note with keen interest that a Gentleman is walking around on the floor of the House taking pictures. Now, I really don't have any objection to this except the fact that ...he isn't taking mine.....but I don't like to be in a compromising position if I'm sitting next to someone who has hired him for some 'PR' purposes and having that come up and haunt me sometime. If I am going to be in a picture I want to know I'm going to be in it and rather take a strong objection to this gentleman walking around taking pictures of Members on the floor when other Members might be in the picture."

Telcser: "All right. Representative.....the joint Leader has just come up to me and ...ah...indicated to me the Gentleman who is taking pictures for a few suburban Legislators..... did receive permission...ah...from the Speakers Office, however I think he has been on the Floor long enough to get enough....more than enough pictures. Representative Fleck, for what purpose do you rise?"

Fleck: "Well I'd certainly hope that he is only taking pictures of those suburban Legislators and some of us others aren't in it. I'd hate to ruin any suburbanites running record."

Telcser: "I think your point is well taken and ...ah...I'm sure the Gentleman has enough pictures by now. He's..... no longer finds it necessary to remain on the Floor. Representative Borchers, for what purpose do you rise?"

Borchers: "Mr. Speaker, Fellow Members of the House, I think it was yesterday or the day before, I noticed some Members of the press taking pictures with long range cameras. Now it's very possible that someone maybe talking or doing something that ...ah...that when it's put into a paper might appear objectionable. I personally had.....had a



notion to say something about it then but now that this is brought upI don't think anyof the press should be permitted to take pictures of Members because I well remembera picture of a Legislator...Legislator in our area about six....eight years ago whose pic....who happened to be asleep and the picture was taken...from the press and showed him asleep in his chair. Now, I'm not sure that this is what any of us would want. Maybe we are asleep ...perhaps we should have our pictures taken but at least it should be with our knowledge and our consent and I do not believe that we should permit pictures to be taken indiscriminately of ourselves in this Chamber. And I would like to bring this to your attention at this time."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, ...ah...that's a good point, I think...and Iand I kinda think that some of the Members don't realize that ...ah....the red light to the rear of the speaker that is on right now indicates that permission has been given to some or many people to photograph the activities of the House and I think that the Members should be aware that when that red light is on up there the Speaker has given permission to...ah....ah..someone or ...perhaps more than one to ...ah...photograph our activities.....but ...ah... I think that ...that should be....ah...done with considerable discrimination and...ah...as you say we should be aware of it and I think that the Gentleman that was taking the pictures certainly should have enough by now andah... ought to leave."

Telcser: "I have been informed by a Member of the press that he would like to rise on a point of personal privilege... that a Member took his picture when he was sleeping in a press box. Now, we have a few Members...ah...who wanted to put some motions. We have to go back to some Consideration Postponed matters but until we can determine which



ones we're going to ...ah...call. What about....a number of Members said that they had motions to make.....Representative....ah...Schlickman, for what purpose do you rise?"

Schlickman: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, on the order of business, Consideration Postponed, is House Bill 797 which would create the New Homebuyers Protection Act, Every attempt has been made to meet the legitimate criticism of the Home Builder but unfortunately to no avail. As a result valuable time has been lost and considering the juncture we're now at, timewise it's highly unlikely thatthis Bill to pass the House would receive deliberate consideration in the Senate. I therefore, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House ask for unanimous consent to take House Bill 797 from the Order of Consideration Postponed and have it referred back to the Committee on assignment of Bills."

Telcser: "Are there any objections? Hearing none this Bill will beah....be re-referred by the Committee on assignment of Bills. The Gentleman from Rock Island, Representative Pappas. Representative Pappas."

Pappas: "Mr. Speaker, ...ah..I would like to have leave of the House to suspend Rule 18 on postingah...I understand there was a Bill re-referred to my Committee, Senate Bill 596, and I'd like to hear that tomorrow in the Motor Vehicle Committee."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Rock Island would like leave of the House to suspend Rule 18 on posting.....Senate Bill House Bill 596.....to the Motor Vehicles Committee..... all in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. 107 votes.....Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Brinkmeier 'aye'. Waddell...Washburn, Skinner, this question 112 'ayes', no 'nays', and the Gentleman's motion prevails. Now, the Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn."



Washburn: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, I would like toah..... ask leave to suspend the appropriate rule so several Bills can be heard in Appropriations this afternoon, namely Bills that were heard in Subcommittee last night and referred to the.....to the full Committee. I shall read them slowly because there is quite a list....House.....All House Bills, House Bill 152, 744, 1528, 1529, 1925, 1948, House Bill 46, 228, 44-----er, 484, 653, 654, 773, 1065, 1110, 1157, 1274, 1327, 1328, 1458, 1516 and 1827....those are all Commission Bills....The following Creeks and Rivers Bills...439, 632, 720, 742, 1307, 1308, 1309 and 1310, 1608, 1609, 1621, 1668, and 1983."

Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 18 so that those Bills can be posted in Appropriations for hearing. All in favor signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'nay'. 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question 131 'ayes', no 'nays' and the Gentlemans motion prevails. The Gentleman from Franklin, Representative Hart."

Hart: "Ah....Mr. Speaker, could you go to First Reading? I've got a Bill I would like to advance, it needs to be read for the First time."

Telcser: "Senate Bills, First Reading."

Hart: "House Bill.....House Bill.....Mr. Speaker.....House Bill."

Telcser: "Senate Bill....First....Is it a House Bill?"

Hart: "House Bill."

Telcser: "House Bill....It's a House Bill on First Reading?"

Hart: "House Bill. It's a House Bill."

Telcser: "House Bill, First Reading."

Fred Selcke: "Number?House Bills, First Reading. House Bill 1989, Hart...appropriates \$15,000 ...ordinary and contingent expenses ... Courts Commission, First Reading of the Bill."

Telcser: "The Gentleman from Franklin, Representative Hart."



Hart: "I move the suspend the appropriate provisions of Rule 31 so that House Bill 1989 can be advance to the order of Second Reading without reference to Committee. Has it been cleared with both sides of the aisle? It's a \$15,000 appropriation for the Courts Commission."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 31 so that...ah...House BillWhat is it Fred?...."

Fred Selcke: "19891989."

Telcser: "1989 can be put on the order of Second Reading without reference to Committee. All in favor fo the motion... signify by voting 'aye', the opposed by voting 'no'. 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question 117 'ayes', one 'nay', and the Gentlemans motion prevails. Now are there any further motions? The Gentleman from Henderson, Representative Neff."

Neff: "Ah...Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would like to ...ah...move that the appropriate Rule.... ah...be suspended on House Bill 1776, Representative Maragos Bill....This Bill was just heard last Friday night in Committee and...ah...We'd.....I'd like to move that the appropriate Rules be suspended and this Bill moved on. We've just got it reported out this morning ...so that it won't die on the Calendar."

Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Maragos."

Maragos: "Put it on the Calendar. Suspend the Rule for the May 25....deadline for hearing of the Bill."

Telcser: "Ah.....I....got you. The Gentleman has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 36 for the purposes of having House Bill 1776 placed on the Calendar in the order of Second Reading ...after the Committee Report is read... which will indicate that Bill was reported out with a do pass recommendation. Fred Selcke: "To suspend Rule 36." Take the record, Arthur?"

Telcser: "Take the record. On this question.....116 'ayes',

Maragos: "Parliamentary inquiry....I....do I need any other

would seem to me that the Clerks office would print that

Telcser: "12th....13th..."

Maragos: ".....I'm satisfied,...."

Telcser: "I think not. Is that right, Fred?.....It will be
on the Calendar, Second Reading, First Legislative Day....
July 12th or whatever. The thirty day rule would then
apply to that Bill."

Maragos: "All right. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker."

Telcser: "Committee Reports."

Fred Selcke: "Mr. Neff, from Transportation, which House Bill
933 was referred; reported the same back with Amendments
thereto with the recommendation that the Amendments be
adopted and the Bill be re-referred to the Committee on
Appropriations. Mr. Neff from Transportaion, which House
Bills 1046, 1207, 1776, 1820, and 1875 were referred
reports the same back with Amendments thereto with the re-
commendations that the Amendments be adopted and the Bills
as amended do pass. Mr. Neff from Transportation.....
House Bills 1047, 1048, 1867, 1891, 1921...were referred,
reports the same back with the recommendations that the



Bills do pass. No further Committee Reports. Now where are we going, Arthur?"

Telcser: "Okay, the Gentleman from Cook, Representative, Katz has an announcement to make."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is just to remind you that this evening at 7:30 p.m. in Room G-4 in the State Office Building the Commission on the Organization of the General Assembly will be taking testimony from anybody who has any views to present on the question of what the Rules of the General Assembly ought to be regarding activities between July 1st 1973 and July 1st 1974. Anyone is welcome to be present and state any views that they would like....Room G-4, State Office Building, tonight at 7:30 p.m."

Telcser: "Okay, are there any further announcements or motions? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "One brief announcement before we adjourn. The Senate is taking a dim view of House Bills on First Reading in the Senate where there is not a Senate Sponsor so if you have a Bill on the Senate Calendar on the Order of First Reading, where there is not a Senate Sponsor, you better find one in a hurry or they will kill it forthwith. And now if there are no further announcements, Mr. Speaker, I move that the House adjourn until 9:30....."

Telcser: "All right. Representative....the Gentleman from UnionOkay.....I'm sorry....Representative Choate has a Resolution.....Fred do you have it here?"

Walsh: "Before we get to that, I....Ithink we better suspend some Rules relative to Billsthe Calendar.And I would like to do that for House Bill....just a moment let me get the list....."

Telcser: "Let's hear Senate Bills, First Reading, Bill while you look....check on the rule...."

Walsh: "All right..."
