

A Roll Call for attendance was taken and indicated that all were present with the exception of the following:

Representative Bernard B. Wolfe - illness.



Speaker Miller: "The House will please be in order and the Members will be in their seats please. The invocation will be by Dr. Johnson."

Johnson: "We pray. For the divine guidance which has sustained us so many times in the past, we rise up this morning to glorify Your name, O Lord of Hosts. Watch over us we pray this day. Cast Your blessings upon all that we do in accordance with Your good will. Above all, as we go about our duties, give us that inner peace which the world can neither give nor take away, so that our hearts may be set firmly in Your mercy. Help us to live and labor in that calmness and confidence which will lead us to lives of service to our fellowmen. Give us grace to look to You for those blessings which come only, but which come surely from Your hands. Our help is in the name of the Lord, the Lord who made heaven and earth. Amen."

Speaker Miller: "Roll Call for attendance. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well Mr. Speaker, it's my privilege to introduce our former colleague, Francis Dawson, who is standing down to our right and to the left of the Speaker."

Speaker Miller: "Messages from the Senate. Just a moment. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, would you let the record indicate that Representative B. B. Wolfe is excused because of illness."

Speaker Miller: "The Journal will so indicate. Messages from the Senate Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Selcke: "A Message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has refused to recede from their Amendment to a Bill with the following title, House Bill 143. I am further directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate requests a Conference Committee to consist of five Members from each House to consider the differences in the two Houses in regard to Amendment #1 in the Bill. An action taken by the Senate June 18, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. "



Speaker Miller: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber, arise?"

Leinenweber: "I'd just like the Members to know that the doorkeeper has taken to heart the Resolution that this Body passed recently and now open the blinds on the side of the chambers."

Speaker Miller: "I acknowledge what you said. I just wanted the Members on the Republican side of the aisle to know that it is very difficult from up here to recognize a face so if you are not recognized, please don't blame the temporary Speaker."

Clerk Selcke: "A Message from the Senate...Mr. Speaker, I am directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has concurred with the House of Representatives in the passage of the Bill with the following title, House Bill 634, together with the following Amendment, in the adoption of which I am directed to ask concurrence of the House. Passed the Senate, as amended, June 19, 1973.

Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. Committee Reports."

Speaker Miller: "Committee Reports."

Clerk Selcke: "Mr. Washburn from Appropriation to which House Bill 1993 was referred, reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bill do pass. Mr. Washburn from Appropriation to which House Bill 933 and 1611 were referred, reported same back with Amendments thereto with the recommendation that the Bills be adopted and the Bills, as amended, do pass. Mr. Washburn from Appropriation to which Senate Bill 285, 343, were referred, reported the same back with the recommendation that the Bills do pass. Mr. Washburn from the Committee on Appropriations to which Senate Bill 296 were referred, reported the same back with Amendments thereto with the recommendation that the amendments be adopted and the Bills, as amended, do pass. Mr. Washburn from Appropriation to which Senate Bill 1193 was referred, reported same back with Amendments thereto with the recommendation that the Amendments be adopted and the Bills, as amended, do pass. Mr. Bluthardt from Elections to which Senate Bill 1187 was referred, reported same back with the recommendation that the Bills do pass."



Speaker Miller: "Introductions and First Reading of House Bills."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1995. Randolph. Creates the Chicago Metropolitan Area Transportation System. First Reading of the Bill. House Bill 1996. Beaupre, et al. Appropriates \$50,000 to the Department of Transportation. First Reading of the Bill. Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Miller: "Agreed Resolutions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution...House Resolution 436. Lauer. House Resolution 439, Schraeder. House Resolution 440, Schraeder et al."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh, with respect to the Agreed Resolutions."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 436 congratulates Mr. Thomas Perry Lanning Dowell, Jr. on his academic achievement. House Resolution 439 congratulates Fred Wing, Tim Shields, and Debby Longman for their outstanding achievements in receiving awards for publications of their articles. And House Resolution 440 congratulates William G. (Bill) Lyons, of Peoria upon his appointment to the position of Marshal of the Supreme Court of the State of Illinois. And Mr. Speaker, move the adoption of the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman has moved that the House immediately consider and adopt the Agreed Resolutions. All those in favor of the Agreed Resolutions say aye. Opposed nay. The ayes have it and the Gentleman's motion prevails. Senate Bills' Second Reading. And the Clerk will call these on the priority of call."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 589. McMaster. A Bill for an Act amending the Environmental Protection Act."

Speaker Miller: "Is Mr. McMaster on the floor? Alright, take it out of the record."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 124. Craig. A Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? Third Reading. Will Mr. Clerk hold Senate Bill 156."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 327. Chapman. Amends the Public Junior



College Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 333. Neff. A Bill for an Act to amend the Vehicle Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 510. A Bill for an Act to add Section I to an Act to establish the Northeastern Illinois University Operations. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Any Amendments from the floor? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 83. Walters. An Act in relation to State Bike-way Program. He's not here."

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Walters on the floor? Take that Bill out of the record."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 148. Waddell. Amends the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1. Skinner. Where the hell did he go?"

Speaker Miller: "Is Mr. Skinner on the floor? A...can Mr. Waddell handle this Amendment? Alright, read the Amendment Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1. Skinner. Amends Senate Bill 148 and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move its adoption. What it does is deletes the 20,000 that was in the original...population, that is."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? Okay, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "We're on Senate Bill 148, this is Mr. Skinner's Amendment?"

Speaker Miller: "That is correct."

Shea: "I don't see Mr. Skinner."

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Skinner is not on the floor, Mr. Waddell is the sponsor of the Bill and he is moving the adoption of the Amendment."



Shea: "Well I'd like somebody to explain to me what...what the purpose of this Amendment is by Mr. Skinner?"

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Jerry, it just deletes the 20,000 requirement that is in the Bill, that's all, it takes the numbers away."

Shea: "Well, the Bill...the Amendment I got by Mr. Skinner, adds a new Section 21 and says the 'township central committee of the political party'."

Waddell: "That's the other portion of it. In other words, the township central committee may, one way or the other, it takes the 20,000 out as a population figure. Jerry, what it does is it sets it up so that they can go either way, either for a primary or against, as the case may be in each township."

Shea: "Alright."

Speaker Miller: "Is there further discussion? Alright, the Gentleman moves that Amendment #1 be adopted. All those in favor say aye. Opposed nay. The ayes have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments, Mr. Clerk? The Bill is ordered advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 220. Tuerk. Amends the Health and Safety Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Three Committee Amendments. Amendment #1. Amends Senate Bill 226, page 1, line 14 and 15...."

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Tuerk requests that it be taken out of the record."

Clerk Selcke: "Doorkeeper, up to the rostrum please. 221 out of the record, too, Mr. Tuerk?"

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Tuerk, 221 out of the record also?"

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 225. W. D. Walsh. A Bill for an Act to amend the Revenue Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Walsh."

Walsh: "Out of the record please. Would you take that out of the record, Mr. Speaker, we're expecting an Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, take this Bill out of the record."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 241. Philip."

Speaker Miller: "Take it out of the record, I don't see Mr. Philip on



the floor."

Clerk Selcke: "We're abiding by the Resolution that was adopted the other day, Tommy. Opposite to the action of the sun, the Resolution says...."

Speaker Miller: "Now will the Doorkeeper close partially, the blinds on the east side of the House of Representatives. Mr. Hanahan, for what purpose do your rise?"

Hanahan: "Point of order, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Miller: "State your point."

Hanahan: "Where in the Rules does it say that the court could order the blinds closed or open? I suggest, sir, if you want these blinds closed, somebody's going to go through me, if you don't close those blinds over there."

Speaker Miller: "Well now just a minute, Mr. Hanahan, this House adopted a Resolution the other day stating that the blinds on the opposite side of the sun could be open. I voted against the Resolution, I recall that distinctly. But this House did adopt such a Resolution and that means that the sun is on the east, yet this morning, so the blinds will be kept on the east side, at least enough, so it's not glaring from the sun. The Gentleman from Moultrie, Mr. Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, having vote....Mr. Speaker, having voted on the prevailing side on the motion by which that Resolution passed, I now move that the vote by reconsidered."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Collins."

Collins: "I move that that motion lie upon the table."

Clerk Selcke: "Take a vote on it, let's get the damn Resolution presented."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, the motion to table is not debatable, but I'll recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I think the Gentleman would have to withhold his motion until we are under the order of business of motions and it is out of order at this time."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, you recognized the motion, you recognized the man who put it on the table, again if the Majority Leader wants



to run the House, he ought to take the podium."

Speaker Miller: "Gentleman's motion was considered not finely under these circumstances, Mr. Clerk, proceed with the Roll Call..... calling the priority of call on Senate Bills' Second Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 283. Kelly. Appropriation to the Department of Financial Institutions. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends Senate Bill 283, page 1, line 12, and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly."

Kelly: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I move for the adoption of Amendment #2 to Senate Bill 283 which gives a slight cost of living increase to the personnel who are in the Department of Financial Institutions."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, your motion should be with respect to..."

Kelly: "...Committee Amendment #1."

Speaker Miller: "...right, Committee Amendment #1. Alright, is there discussion? The Gentleman has moved for the immediate consideration and adoption of Committee Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 283. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it and Committee Amendment #1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #2. Kelly. Amends Senate Bill 283, as amended, and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly."

Kelly: "Yes...Amendment...I would like to move for the adoption of..."

X Speaker Miller: "...Just a moment, Mr. Kelly, I'm going to interrupt the proceedings right now once again. This House is unruly this morning, I don't know what's wrong, this is only the middle of the week, let's forget about the blinds and we'll have the Doorkeeper take care of these blinds and...just a moment...may I have your attention please? Or is this House going to get completely out of order?"

Clerk Selcke: "Well, that's what they get for adopting these stupid Resolutions..."

Speaker Miller: "Now the House is gonna proceed with the business that we're down here for. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kelly, has moved





that Amendment #2 be adopted. Is there discussion? All those in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 say aye. Opposed nay. The ayes have it, and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is ordered advanced to the order of Third Reading. Call the next Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 393...er...Senate Bill 393. Collins. Amends the Election Code. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1. Ewell."

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Ewell on the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "No."

Speaker Miller: "Take this Bill out of the record. We're holding 416, proceed with 427."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 427. Boyle. An Act to provide for the ordinary and contingent expense of the Clerk of the Appellate Court of the Fifth District. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends Senate Bill 427, page 1, line 14 and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Macoupin, Mr. Boyle, with respect to Committee Amendment #1."

Boyle: "Thank you Mr. Speaker. I'm happy to report that Committee Amendment #1 reduces the appropriation by approximately \$3000 and I would move the adoption of the Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman has moved for the immediate adoption...consideration and adoption of Committee Amendment #1. All those in favor say aye. Opposed nay. The ayes have it and Committee Amendment #1 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 447. Simms. An Act to add Sections 1.1 and so forth to the County Hospitals Governing Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1. Douglas. Amends Senate Bill 447, page 4, and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Douglas."



Douglas: "Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I would appreciate, Mr.

Speaker, if we could have a little order because this matter concerns everyone in this House and there are a number of us very concerned about this Amendment, who hope despite some opposition, that we can add this very worthwhile Amendment to this Bill which effects the operation of Cook County Hospital. Amendment #1, which I am proposing, has been worked out with great care and with the support of comprehensive health planning, which is concerned about the problem of Cook County Hospital for reasons we believe quite beyond Cook County Hospital's control serving only a select part of the population of Cook County. Now this Amendment, if adopted by this House, would say that the Cook County Health and Hospital Governing Commission would be obligated to concern itself with the health care of all the residents of Cook County, even though....Mr. Speaker, I wonder if we could have a little order...."

Speaker Miller: "Well I'll try, Mr. Douglas, for some reason this House have been extremely noisy, this morning. I'll try once again."

Douglas: "At the present time, Cook County Hospital, which is an enormous burden on the people of the State and especially on the people of the County of Cook, for reasons beyond its own control, is servicing only a limited number of people in Cook County. Now what we want and what I believe this House, and especially those who represent Cook County should want, is that all of the poor, all of the indigent people in Cook County entitled to help from government for medical and other health related care, should receive attention from the Cook County Health and Hospitals Governing Commission and I emphasize this next statement, in their own communities. This is what I'm asking this House to do, to recognize that people, whether they are poor or they are not poor, are entitled, if they need health care, to get that care as close to home as possible. Now I don't have to conduct a survey in this House to find out how many of you who represent constituents, fifteen and twenty and thirty miles away from where Cook County Hospital is and still reside in Cook County, get virtually no benefit



whatsoever from the operation of the Cook County Health and Hospital Governing Commission function. This Amendment would say, and I quote, 'the Health and Hospitals Governing Commission must arrange' and I emphasize the word, must, 'must arrange to provide health services to all the medically indigent in the county'. 'And then it goes on to spell out how this would be done. Now what it would mean would be that people who live in the Southwest and Northwest and the northsides of Chicago and the Cook County area would be entitled to care and the Health and Hospitals Governing Commission would have to work out ways of helping to get that care through those people. This should be done and can be done with...less expensively than is presently the case. It has never been demonstrated that Cook County Hospital operates at a low economic level. Cook County Hospital has been an enormous drain on the taxpayers. And since it is an enormous drain, everyone of us who represent constituents from all over Cook County is entitled to know that our constituents are receiving the benefits of the tax dollars that go into supporting that Commission and the hospital. I ask for the Members of this House to support this Amendment, which would lower costs, which would help get care for poor people in their own neighborhoods, which would bring health care business to local hospitals, supervise to a considerable degree by the Health and Hospitals Governing Commission, which under the statutes which govern the Commission, would have every right to make sure that the quality and care is the highest. Any excuses that the care could not be helped at the highest level, I think, would be empty ones, because care is not being given to those people now and I ask for your support on this Amendment to House Bill 447."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Winnebago, Mr. Simms."

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, may I ask the sponsor of this Amendment one question before speaking to the Bill? Representative Douglas, did you have similar legislation introduced in this session of the General Assembly, which was defeated in Committee?"



Douglas: "No, Representative Simms, I'm not even sure what you are referring to. I never introduced legislation on this subject. Last week when this Bill came before the Human Resources Committee, I asked a number of questions, was not able to get the answers I wanted, spent a great deal of time since then, as I said I would in Committee, with the people from Comprehensive Health Planning and a number of people in the Chicago area concerned about the medical care of the poor. We came up with this Amendment, which is supported by some very reliable people."

Simms: "Well Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, as the House sponsor of this Senate Bill, which is a product of the Legislative Investigative Commission, Senator Dougherty spent a long time working out the Amendment to the Senate on this Bill to try to reach a area of agreement and compromise. This is the product of the Legislative Investigative Commission, who spent of good number of time...a...looking into the problems of Cook County Hospital. This Amendment, itself, addresses itself to a...a...in essence, of setting up satellite regional hospital centers in Cook County. That's extremely expensive. And if the County Board could afford this, they would have had the Commission implemented. I urge that this Amendment be defeated, that this is not the product of the Commission, there's never been any testimony that's been brought to the Commission substantiating this type of Amendment and I urge that this be defeated."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea."

Shea: "I'm wondering if the sponsor of the Amendment would yield for a question?"

Speaker Miller: "He indicates he will, proceed."

Shea: "Two Sessions ago, we created the Commission and it not only takes care of County Hospital, but it takes care of Oak Forest and all the medical ...the free medical services that the county used to have. At that time, we placed a tax limitation of 25 cents on the amount they could spend. At the present time, their tax levy for this purpose was 19 point some cents on the last tax Bill. As I read this Amendment and have discussed it with various



people up in Cook County, particularly those at the County Treasurer's office, it is my understanding that this Amendment would immediately be raised, the tax rate to the 25 cent limit, and that they probably will be down here asking for an increase. Now have you checked with anybody either at the Commission or in the County of Cook with regards to the fiscal implications of this Amendment?"

Douglas: "Yes, Mr. Shea, we have talked about this now, for over a year with Members of the Commission and with people, health planners, in the Chicago area. Now it is my understanding that there would be no obligation under any circumstances, to raise the tax levy. What we would be doing, if this Amendment were to pass, would be to deal realistically with the needs for dividing services among a larger number of people with the existing tax dollars and also, to use those tax dollars more expeditiously. It is clearly agreed by medical and health planners that treating people in their own neighborhood closer to home would cost less than there having to travel to the monster that is Cook County Hospital, way at the other end for some people of Cook County. This would not raise the cost, if anything, it would lower costs, or with the present tax rate and the present subsidies that are used, it would divide services among larger numbers of people and it would include some people, who at the present time, for one reason or another, do not seek services either, at Cook County Hospital or at Oak Forest."

Shea: "But as I...as I read the language here, you say that the Commission must contract with one or more responsible or not for profit corporations, hospital or health care facilities to provide this. So that, in other words, where we have people who are medically indigent, say in the townships, you would have to contract with local hospitals. Is that correct?"

Douglas: "I can't hear."

Shea: "Mr. Douglas?"

Douglas: "I'm sorry, Mr. Shea, did you finish the question?"

Shea: "Well the mandatory language said you must contract to provide these services. Now around the outer fringe of Cook County, outside of the City of Chicago, are thirty townships where we have a number



of people who are on either general assistance, medical assistance, old age and survivors assistance, that are being provided health care facilities. These people would qualify as indigents. Is it your intention, then, that instead of going to their local hospitals now, as individuals, that these people would be forced to use this service and that the...the Commission would then contract with local carriers or hospitals and force the people to use this type of assistance?"

Douglas: "No, not at all. The way...the way this Amendment is worded it simply places on the Commission the responsibility for making certain that the medically indigent and all Cook County receiving health care of one kind or another. Now many of these people are already receiving care via the Cook County or the State Department of Public Aid. Those people could continue to receive care in the plurastic system wherever they choose to get it as long as it fits in with the Cook County or State Department of Public Aid. What this Amendment would do is it would encourage the Commission to take the responsibility as it was intended that they do in the first place when this Bill was passed some three or four years ago to make sure that all the medically indigent are getting care. Now the way that it is worked out at the present time, is that only a select few get it and those people live on the near west and near southsides of Chicago. That's wrong, what this Amendment is intended to do is to push the Commission in the direction of concerning itself, not of providing care itself, it would not in any way, encourage people to leave their communities. If anything, what it would do is to encourage the Commission to make sure that they can get care right in the township where they live rather than having to travel to Cook County Hospital, which they don't do anyhow."

Speaker Miller: "Are you through Mr. Shea? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Sevcik."

Sevcik: "Will the sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Miller: "He indicates he will. Proceed sir."

Sevcik: "According to this Amendment, is it my understanding that you want branch clinics? Did you hear me Representative Douglas? "



Douglas: "Representative Sevcik, your question was, you said something about branch clinics. Now branch clinics...branch clinics are very expensive. What I'm emphasizing here is that if the Commission chooses to do so and is encouraged to do so under law, that instead of Cook County Hospital setting up branch clinics, which it couldn't possibly do everywhere in Cook County with the amount of revenue that's available right now, that Cook County Hospital and the Governing Commission should use existing health care facilities to the absolute maximum degree possible so that people can get care with some quality control in their own communities. The branch clinic idea sounds fine, the Cook County Hospital in these last couple of years has had minimal success even in contracting with branch clinics-no less building them themselves. "

Sevcik: "May I speak to the Amendment, Mr. Speaker?"

Speaker Miller: "You may proceed sir."

Sevcik: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, there's a Legislative Investigating Commission that's had extensive hearings concerning Cook County Hospital. We had met with the Governing Commission and with Dr. Haughton. His very intention to provide medical services on the southside, which is the prime object at the present time, it is their policy to set this up and I don't think that this Amendment is needed at this time. Now we have had the cooperation of the Governing Commission and Dr. Haughton and have had several meetings concerning this problem. We all realize that the people from the southside have a long way to travel to come to Cook County and it is the intention of the Commission and Dr. Haughton and the Directors to try to provide these building services on the southside and the northside. Now this Bill, as it originally stands, plus the Amendment that was offered by Senator Dan Dougerty, is the way that the Governing Commission, Dr. Haughton, and the Legislative Investigating Commission would like to have this Bill passed and sent to the Governor. So I ask that you oppose Amendment #1."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann."

Mann: "Well Mr. Speaker, as Representative Douglas well knows,



comprehensive health care has long been a concern of mine. I wonder if he would agree to take this out of the record if the sponsor of the Bill itself would hold it at Second Reading and maybe we can work something out...a...which would be agreeable to all parties concerned. Do you have any objection to that?"

Douglas: "No, I...I have no objection, Mr. Mann, if the sponsor of the Bill would hold it at Second Reading so we can sit down and talk about the specifics, especially, since what I am doing here, is not mouthing my own feelings. I'm mouthing the feelings of Comprehensive Health Planning Incorporated of Chicago, who is a semi-governmental agency which...."

Speaker Miller: "The sponsor indicates it is agreeable with him to take this out of record. Is that agreeable with you Mr. Douglas?"

Douglas: "Yes, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, take it out of the record. Call the next Bill, Mr. Clerk."

Clerk Selcke: "Maragos is not here, is he? 546. Maragos.. Okay... Senate Bill 546. Maragos. A Bill for an Act to amend the Park District Code. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amends Senate Bill 546 on page 1 by deleting lines 15, 16, and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Maragos."

Maragos: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to have Committee Amendment #1 to House Bill, I mean Senate Bill 546 adopted. It is a corrective Amendment and in order to implement further the purposes of the Bill. I ask for its adoption."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, the Gentleman moves the adoption of Amendment #1. Is that Committee Amendment, Mr. Clerk?"

Clerk Selcke: "Yes."

Speaker Miller: "Committee Amendment #1, is there discussion? The question is shall Amendment #1...Committee Amendment #1, be adopted. All those in favor say aye. Opposed nay. The ayes have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."





Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 613. Calvo. Is he there, I can't see."

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Calvo on the floor? Call the next Bill, Mr. Clerk, take that Bill out of the record."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 197."

Speaker Miller: "I don't see Mr. Gibbs on the floor? Take this out of the record."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 206. Day. An Act relating to county zoning. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment, you got a Floor Amendment? Alright take it out of the record."

Speaker Miller: "Take this Bill out of the record. The Amendment is not printed."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 243. Philip. Amends an Act relating to Counties. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "No."

Speaker Miller: "The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Committee Amendment #2. Amends Senate Bill 638, page 1, line 1, and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. LaFleur."

LaFleur: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, this is also...a...an Amendment that originated with the Pension Laws Commission of technical nature and I move for its adoption."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman moves for the adoption of Committee Amendment #2. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 696. Leinenweber. Amends an Act relating to fees and salaries. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."



Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider."

Schneider: "I'm sorry, I didn't really hear the explanation of the Amendment. Now am I to understand that this is the...a...a...Bill which would require or authorize the Department of Transportation to do the study of the tollway and so forth?"

LaFleur: "That is right. Yes."

Schneider: "Well now, Leo, I'm sorry to be up again on the question, but could you...would you mind going through the Amendment one more time for me?"

LaFleur: "Well the way the Bill is drafted, the study would take place and begin someplace in Will County and end somewhere, I believe, in McHenry County. In a more orderly manner of being able to build a highway or...a...or possibly a freeway type of thing...it would be necessary, not only to pick up traffic to put on this, but also to



get the traffic off of it. And if you end the highway in the middle of a field, sometimes it is very difficult for the local authorities to take care of this traffic. It is a little more meaningful if we could end the highway at the tollroad itself. Therefore, dispersing the traffic off of this."

Schneider: "That sounds like a reasonable Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, with respect to the Amendment."

Deuster: "Yes, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the Amendment has my full support and I hope that it will be adopted because it is very logical and it makes sense and I support the Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "Is there further discussion? The Gentleman moves for the immediate consideration and adoption of Amendment #2 to House Bill 1430. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading. And now this Bill has been read a Third time and the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster, with respect to House Bills 1430 and 1558."

Deuster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, the appropriation Bill, House Bill 1558, appropriates the sum of just \$200,000 to finance the study to determine the feasibility of developing the Fox Valley Expressway as the Bill is now amended, from the Northwest Tollroad to the junction there, down to the vicinity of Lockport and Will County. The appropriation Bill provides that any of the monies expended for this study shall be repaid to the State Treasury. So in a way, it's not a normal appropriation, it's more in the nature of an advance. The Bill itself, the authority Bill, House Bill 1430, directs the Illinois Toll Highway Authority to study the feasibility of developing this Fox Valley Expressway as part of the Illinois Toll Highway System. And this a...if it would...went forward, would be one of the most important and major transportation developments in northeastern Illinois because it would link-up the Northwest Tollroad, the Eastwest Tollroad, Interstate 55 and form a junction further south, possibly with 147th



Street. And so it would also provide a very good far out bypass...a... from the Cook County highway network to allow motorists greater mobility and a chance to reduce the downtown congestion in the Chicago area urban expressways. Representative Soderstrom and LaFleur and myself would be glad to respond to any questions relating to this. I think it is a very worthwhile study and I hope that it will deserve your support."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, is there discussion? The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I came in opposition to this Bill based on a couple premises. Number one, the Representatives from the districts that is mostly effected by this particular Bill is not...are not even sponsors or cosponsors of this type of legislation. I think that if the people of the Fox Valley wanted this type of a proposal, a feasibility study of a tollroad, that they would seek out the support and the help of the Membership of the Representatives who serve in this General Assembly representating that geographic area. Number two, the statutes provide for a Tollway Advisory Committee made up of Members ....both appointed by the Governor and Members of this House of Representatives and of the State Senate, of which Representative Garmisa and myself, Representative Schoeberlein, are Members of this advisory committee. The advisory committee has not undertaken on whether or not we should have a feasibility study proposal to the Illinois Toll Highway Authority. I suggest that this is a bad precedent to set that if the Representatives from the area that is most effected, do not particularly want this type of Bill to be submitted to the General Assembly, that people in their district that they're representing don't have to go to outside representation to be represented in this General Assembly. If they wanted this type of proposal, they could have gone to the Illinois Toll Highway Authority and had the advisory committee that is set up by the statute, review whether or not this is needed addition to the Illinois Toll Highway Authority, therefore, I oppose this Bill."



Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Grotberg."

Grotberg: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in full support of House Bill 1430. In all deference to the distinguished previous speaker, the homework on this project has been in the digestive process for many years to the mayors and the industrial and the neighborhood concerns of a group of people all the way from Joliet up into your McHenry County sir. And there's nothing new about looking at the Fox Valley...either freeway or tollway, this is simply a study commission to get the thing out of limbo and get it on the road, either as a pay as you go or a freeway. And it is our intense desire to get a north-south traffic pattern along the Fox River Valley that will be meaningful to the traffic that is building up so quickly and so rapidly in this tremendously impacted area. I move very strongly and urge a green light on this particular Bill to study this situation once and for all to the benefit of the people of the full length of the Fox Valley and the Will County and McHenry areas, thank you."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Schoeberlein."

Schoeberlein: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I am a Member of the Tollway Advisory Committee and we thought it best, inasmuch as there's just been a change made by the present Governor, the head of it, and other personnel in the Department. We both thought it best not to bring this up at the present time, but we are large enough in this House that take these matters, and if they should be moved, we move them. Now this particular section of roadway, and again, this is not a tollway that is going to be built, this is a study, this is the only way you get things started is with a study and the State will be repaid as they have \$750,000 from the original tollway. Every cent has been returned from the loan that was made to them. What would we do today if someone hadn't started, Governor Stratton at the time, started this particular tollway from the Fox Valley and west into Chicago. We wouldn't be able to move to and from Chicago. Now this particular roadway that they are planning in making a study of is somewhere near Route 59 and then south and north direction immediately to the



east of a proposed shopping center with about 110 stores. Now there's going to be 14,000 homes built in that particular section and with this shopping center, the traffic will be measured. Now I have consistently voted to help the City of Chicago with their problems. May I have a little quiet please? The Metropolitan Sanitary District requires help, every year or two, and it's all due to people. You wouldn't have this sewage if it wasn't for people. And this is what we're going to have out with this particular roadway that is hoped to be built if this study is made. Another thing in the sanitary... not only the sanitary district, but McCormick Place in Chicago. At two different times, we put in millions of dollars in McCormick Place. The first time and the second time when it burnt down. We had to supply the money, of course we know it comes from race track money, but we had to supply the money here. There was a study made by Representative Randolph and others to see what was needed. We gave it to them. The accelerator plan in DuPage County, I believe there is \$20,000,000 to buy the land for that particular accelerator plan. This is now in operation. But we had to do something to bring it into the midwest and we've got something where people in every country in the land, every country in the world, come to visit. And here again, we did this in order to ...to help the midwest. Now we are asking for help merely for a study and I believe that a study of \$200,000 anticipated is not a bit out of line. You people who come into our particular section of the country from downstate and go to Chicago know what you run into. You know where your traffic problems are and we are anticipating, in the years to come, and you can't deny it, we as the Representatives at this time and if we don't anticipate what we feel is going to be in 1980, we shouldn't be re-elected next year. I'll hang my hat on this one whether I am re-elected or not as I will be a candidate. So I'm going to do what I think is right for the people of the section of the country that is effected by this and as soon as all the people are on the Tollway Commission are reappointed and otherwise; while this will be taken under consideration. So I ask you Gentlemen from downstate and Chicago area, give a lift on this one and let's



merely have a study to put this one over just as we helped you.

Thank you."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mugalian."

Mugalian: "Will the sponsor yield to a question? Representative Duester, has there already been a study made of a freeway in this area?"

Duester: "Representative Mugalian, that's a very good question because as Representative Schoeberlein pointed out, for a long time there have been studies and actually a civil engineering study has been completed and what is needed now is a traffic study of the...and so that actually, we're going to get quite a bit for our money because some of the work has already been done both with the Department of Transportation and the Toll Highway Authority have the results of partial studies, but this will complete the job."

Mugalian: "Well I understand that there were public hearings on the other study. Is that correct? And wouldn't that have included a traffic study?"

Duester: "Yes, there were public hearings and as a matter of fact, some of the public hearings occurred in an area north of the Northwest Tollway that is not effected by the study at this point because of the Amendment that was adopted."

Mugalian: "Well I was just wondering if some of this might be duplication and whether or not the appropriation might not be more than was needed."

Duester: "It might be that the Senate would reduce the appropriation particularly in view of the Amendment and I think that would be the case. I'm sure that it will go down...a...but it is rather low right now and there is no duplication, this will just complete the job and...a...finish all the information that is needed to consider the development of this Fox Valley Road."

Mugalian: "Thank you."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I rise in opposition to this Bill. The House passed by an overwhelming vote, a Bill that would have required that when the Tollway System





Bonds are paid off that the tollways would be part of the free highway system. I regret to report that that Bill has been killed in the Senate. The effects of that Bill and the killing of it, in my opinion, makes the passage of this Bill very dangerous to those of us who believe that the original commitment made to the people of Illinois, that when the Tollroad Bonds are paid off that it would be part of the freeway system. Now I want to point out to you that under the existing tollroad legislation that we have, all they need is a feasibility study and they can really build a new tollroad and issue new revenue bonds in Illinois without ever coming back to the General Assembly or without ever getting the specific approval of the Governor. That was one of the things that was taken care of in House Bill 626 which was killed in the Senate. It was precisely to require that before a new tollroad could be built, that specific approval would be required of the Governor and of the General Assembly. And so if we appropriate money and if you...if it is shown to be feasible at some future time we will wake up and discover that a new tollroad...a..bonds have been issued and that, in effect, once the present bonds are paid off, I can assure you that they will continue to mortgage the tollroad to pay off the bonds that will have been issued at some future time in connection with the Fox Valley Tollway. And so in view of the action taken in the Senate, it seems to me that it would be very hazardous to pass this kind of Bill and support the position of the Gentleman from McHenry in opposition to this Bill."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Moultrie, Mr. Stone."

Stone: "Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, the Gentleman has moved the previous

question. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes, have it and the Gentleman's motion prevails. Now the Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Duester, to close the debate."

Duester: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I think this is a good study that is much needed and I urge your support of it. I might say in response to a remark made by the previous speaker I do have the law in my hand and the law requires that prior to the



commencement of...this work, the...this report will have to go to the Governor, he has an opportunity to review it and either reject it or support it and I believe that may be one of the reasons the Senate took the action they did. Actually, my position as I explained, is that this is a separate appropriation which will be repaid. I do not believe in the Toll Authority taking money out of one pocket to finance the study. This is a separate study appropriation. I want to do it this way because I have the highest respect for the spirit and purpose of the legislation that we considered earlier. This legislation has the support of the county boards which adopted resolutions of Lake, McHenry, DuPage, and Kane and of most of the communities and community leaders along the route and I urge your green light. I think this is a very important step forward and I might add this one note. I think we're trying here, with this legislation, to look ahead and avoid some problems we've had. We now have a cross-town expressway problem because we've allowed an area to develop and become congested and then we've discovered the need for a road and we've had to dislocate people. This will look far into the future and avoid that and develop an important express or at least study the possibility of the development before it is built up and the people have to be moved. So I think this is humane and a forward looking piece of legislation and I urge your support."

Speaker Miller: "The question is shall House Bill 1430 and House Bill 1558 pass. All those in favor will vote aye. And the opposed, nay. Alright, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes, to explain his vote."

Barnes: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I had a question to ask while the questioning was going on, but the previous question has been moved. But I would like to say in explaining my vote, a no vote, I have House Bill 1558, if the sponsor's listening over there. I have House Bill 1558 in front of me and Representative Duester, I was wondering whether or not the \$200,000 that you are eluding to there, whether or not it was from the General Revenue Fund. And if so, why was it from the General Revenue Fund, because



we are wrestling here in Illinois, with the problem of mass transit and some of the same supporters for this kind of legislation for highways, as I can remember, was in opposition for the mass transit money coming from the General Revenue Fund. Now it seems to me that if you are going to have a definitive study of tollroads, it seems to me that there are funds that are more applicable to that purpose, and they are not General Revenue. And so if that is the case, I will cast my vote no in this instance."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Skinner."

Skinner: "Mr. Speaker, there are several problems with this Bill. The first one of which is the appropriation is \$200,000. Now it was \$200,000 when the...when the highway was running from Lockport to Richmond. We are now running from Lockport to Elgin and the appropriation is still \$200,000. So whether this...if this Bill gets passed, it certainly should be cut and prorated on the basis of mileage. The second problem is that the road is on the wrong side of the Fox River. It's on the east side of the Fox River where it is heavily populated. Now if you want...if you want a freeway...if you want a road along the Fox River Valley, it seems to me it ought to be running right along the right of way from what is presently called Land of Road, it goes all the way from Joliet to ...a..to...a ..Crystal Lake. Then you would not have the problems that this Bill has faced, which is eventually...eventually it's going to go right through the Barrington area, there's is so much money per square foot in that town that it will be tied up in litigation forever. The third problem is that in the Governor's supplemental freeway conference last week, according to an article in the little Trib, the hearings on a freeway for the Fox River Valley, will be heard in about a year and a half. And if I can go back to Representative Katz' original argument on his Bill, we were impatient. The legislature of Illinois was too impatient, they passed the tollway system about a year and a half before they could have gotten a federal aid for matching funds to build the 9-10 highways and so we're stuck with tolls while every other state surrounding us, except Indiana, has freeways. And I don't want to



saddle my area with another tollway. I'm going to vote 'no'."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Waddell."

Waddell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah... I rise in opposition to this for the simple reason that we're throwing good money after bad. I see no reason why, ah.. we in the State of Illinois should support a system of double taxation and that's exactly what it is. I see no reason why we should go for more and more and more studies when those people who are initiating these studies already know what they want them to find. And instead of having a freeway that's put out west of the Fox River; here we've got one coming in east of the Fox River to this ah... to the disruption of everybody up and down the whole length and breadth of the State of Illinois. And I submit to you, that you should stick to your guns as you did the other day when you voted with Representative Katz to beat this measure."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Kane, Mr. Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, these two pieces of Legislation could save the people ah... no only of my area, but of the State of Illinois, a lot of money if we would defeat them. The \$200,000 is just a start. I'd like to point out to you that up in this particular area, ah.. that we do have Route 59, that I believe could be improved by the state and save tax dollars for all of the people of the State of Illinois. We now have Kirk Road that the county is building into a four-lane highway with Motor Fuel Tax Money and help from the State of Illinois. And I'm sure that the people in our area don't want another tollway going north and south in that particular area. The only one ah.... the only ones in that area that have contacted me for this particular scheme has been the Mayor of Aurora and one other Mayor up river. The people themselves ah.. who you get into conversation with, don't want another tollway going north and south. They believe that the existing right-of-ways and can be improved at a much lesser amount of money. And consequently, saving the taxpayers of the State of Illinois that money. And it seems to me that if you would vote 'no' or not vote on this particular two pieces of Legislation, it would serve the taxpayers of the State of Illinois very well."



Speaker Miller: "Is there further discussion? Have all voted who wish?  
The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Katz."

Katz: "Responding briefly to the Sponsor's statements concerning my own.  
I'd indicated that ah.. in fact, with a Feasibility Study that a new  
tollroad could be constructed without the Governor's approval. And the  
Sponsor then read certain provisions which he said required the Governor's  
approval. That is not totally accurate. It says that if the study  
sits on the Governor's desk for 30 days and he takes no action, that  
the Revenue Bonds may then be issued without specific approval of the  
Governor. I just wanted to reiterate what I'd said and that's why  
I'm voting 'no'."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Winnebago,  
Mr. Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Well, one last word, Mr. Speaker. I recall in the Spring of this  
year when the Tollway Authority promised us that they were going to  
lower the tolls a nickel. Now they didn't keep their promise in 1954  
or ah.. '64 and I don't expect them to keep their promise in '74. But  
they oughta be lowering their tolls because when the tollroads were  
first enacted ah... it was going to take \$32,000,000 to make that a  
freeway. And the income has now reached \$70,000,000 ah.. twice and  
a half as times much as they're expected to take in. I think they  
ought to be notified of the feeling of this House and lower those tolls  
a nickel."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr.  
Garmisa."

Garmisa: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, in  
regards to the last speaker's statement about the lowering of the toll-  
road fees ah.. a nickel; the Advisory Committee is going to take this  
up at their next meeting after we are reorganized and I kinda feel  
ah.. or I have the feeling that that nickel will be affected. And ah..  
I want to add at this time, Mr. Speaker, the reason for my green light  
up there. If this Feasibility Study should show ah.. a need for a  
tollroad in the Fox River Valley and ah.. hearing the arguments that  
were put up in front of this Bill when it was ah... in front of the  
Committee ah... when this Bill was in the Transportation Committee, there



is ah.. a very very much of a need for a tollway in this area. Now ah... and in order to set the record straight, ah.... the Representative from McHenry made the statement that this should really come under the Advisory Committee. Now should this Feasibility Study show the need for a road ah.. in that area, it will come up in front of the Advisory Committee, at which time we will ah.. then ah.. make whatever considerations we would have to ah... as to whether or not we would advise the tollroad to go into this area. And ah.. I think that this is a good Bill. And I think that it deserves the support of every Member of this House."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Deuster to explain his vote."

Deuster: "Very briefly, ah... I hope we'll see some more 'green lights'. It will help us avoid a problem right in the crosstown expressway. It is a study and the money will be repaid ah.. in the event that the road goes forward. I think that it makes great logical sense from a transportation point of view. This Legislation was a result of the strong urging of the community leaders along the Fox River Valley who are suffering from intense highway congestion and badly needed ah.. forward movement on this subject. I urge your green light and your support and I hope we can send this to the Senate. If there are any changes that need to be made, they can do it over there. And I encourage your support. Thank you."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are.... record Mr. Getty as 'no'. Mr. Jim Houlihan as 'no'. On this question there are 70 'ayes' and 48 'nays' and the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from ah.. Mr. Lake ah.. I mean Mr. Deuster."

Deuster: "Even though we are in the late hours and days of the Session, this subject is so important ah.. I would like to ask that it be placed on postponed consideration."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the Gentleman requests postponed consideration. And ah... the Bill is placed on postponed consideration. Now ah... other consideration postponed ah.. appears House Bill ah.. for what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Juckett arise?"



Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, a point of personal privilege."

Speaker Miller: "State your point."

Juckett: "It is my understanding, Mr. Speaker, that the House of Representatives ah... has a Security Force which is ah.. supposed to secure or to jar the Representative and the House ah.. as well as the office buildings. I'd like to inform the Speaker and the House of Representatives, that last night ah.. the doors to the second floor ah.. at least in the 'L Wing' where my office is ah.. are always locked as the last person leaves ah.. and the Security Force of the Secretary of State ah... Office ah.. locks those doors. And the doors of our offices are locked. This morning when the Janitorial Force went up to clean the offices ah.. the doors ah.. the outer doors to that wing were open. Most of the doors to the Member's Offices were open. And in the particular case of my office ah.. there were things that were taken. Ah... such things as some of the tapes that we made at the I.S.U. Hearings and other valuable papers. It's my understanding also, that ah.. the ah... some of the investigated files of the Sun Times were taken in the last day or so. And my question to you, Mr. Speaker, is that if we do have this Security Force, what are they doing? I do know that they are standing now ah... on guard over at our offices ah... while our secretaries are there during the day. And it appears that their efforts are really not ah... amounting to anything as far as the security of our offices. And I'd like to pose the question to the Chair and to the permanent Speaker, if we are going to have this elaborate Security Force, that I think they should be there when we are not there. They should make sure that those offices stay locked when we lock them when we leave. And that the wing itself should be locked and that we should maybe ah.. send a message to the Secretary of State that people are getting into these offices and these buildings and into the Capital itself and into the area that ah.. when we are not there and there is nobody to safeguard these papers. I have no way of reproducing these records that were taken. I don't know who has taken it. We are going to try and get to the bottom of it, but I see no reason for a Security Force if in fact, they are not securing anything that they are delegated to."



Speaker Miller: "Well, thank you, Mr. Juckett, for your information that has gone into the record here. The temporary Speaker can make no other statement at the moment. It seems to the temporary Speaker that ah... this is an unheard of thing to happen ah.. in the office space operated by the Members of the General Assembly. And I take it for granted that this matter is going to be looked into."

Juckett: "I would certainly appreciate that, Mr. Speaker. And if you could then report back to the House as to the ah.. measures which are going to be taken, I would appreciate it."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the Gentleman from Livingston, Mr. Hunsicker."

Hunsicker: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it now appears that we might have a Watergate Case in Springfield."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I rise on another matter that ah...and it's been an extreme pleasure for me, but before I do; I would also ah... lend support to what the temporary Speaker has just suggested because this is not the first instance that we've had criticism as far as ah.. things happening in the Members Office's ah.... across the street. And I might say that it isn't the first time that things have happened in offices in this Capital Building either because of my personal knowledge of losses that have been entered into and various papers missing. The principle reason that I rise at this time is for the introduction of a couple of people in the balcony. The first one I want to introduce is ah.... certainly no stranger to any Member of this House and is no stranger to any people in the State of Illinois because of his intense interest in good government throughout the State of Illinois. I'd like to introduce at this time, one of the outstanding leaders that the good Lord has ever graced the face of this earth with, the outgoing Director of District 31 of the United States Steel Workers of America, ah... our friend, Joe Germono. Now another pleasant chore this morning is for the introduction of a couple of people that I certainly wish good luck to, as well as ah.. I'm sure all Members of this House, as well as many people who are interested in athletics. In behalf of Representative Hirschfeld, Representative Stone and Representative Clabaugh; I would like to introduce the coach





of the football team at the University of Illinois, Coach Bob Blackman, sitting in that subdued jacket to my right. And certainly we would like to wish well in his recruiting efforts ah.. for him and his staff, the Athletic Director of the University of Illinois, Cecil Coleman."

Speaker Miller: "Under consideration postponed, appears House Bill 531.

The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like permission to move House Bill 531 back to Second Reading for the reason of an Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "All right, this Bill is returned to the order of Second Reading for the purpose of an Amendment. Read the Amendment, Mr. Clerk."

Kosinski: "Mr. Capparelli ah.. one of the Co-Sponsor's will offer the Amendment, Sir."

Clerk O'Brien: "Amendment #3, Leon. Amends House Bill 531, as amended, on page 1, line 19 by deleting \$30,000,000 and inserting in lieu thereof \$12,467,500. And on page 1, line 14 by deleting 'plus interest' and inserting in lieu thereof '.'."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leon ah.. or Mr. Kosinski?"

Kosinski: "Prior to accepting this Amendment, may I recommend that Amendment #1 be tabled? This will be a substitute Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "You want to table? All right, the Gentleman moves to table Amendment #1 to House Bill 531. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and Amendment #1 is tabled."

Kosinski: "Substitute Amendment by Representative Leon."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Leon with respect to Amendment #3."

Leon: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, Amendment #3 is a result of a Conference of all of the Sponsors of House Bill 531, namely ah.. Representative Kosinski, Capparelli, McAuliffe, Lemke, Brandt, Leon, Lechowicz and Peotrowicz. This Amendment reduces the amount of the Bill ah.. from \$30,000,000 as it was originally and it was further reduced to \$18,000,000. It is now reduced to \$12,467,500. The reason for this reduction came as a result of many Conferences with the Governor of the State of Illinois, who indicated that this amount



is the amount of the money that he would be prepared to sign ah..a Bill adopted by this House and the Senate ah.. for the repayment of the depositors of the defunct banks. He feels that this amount would be the amount that they would be able to recover if they ah... if the bank was covered by ah.. insur... by federal depositors insurance. And I certainly would appreciate the adoption of this Amendment."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman has moved for the adoption of Amendment #3.

Is there discussion? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Harold Washington."

Washington: "Will the Sponsor yield to a question?"

Speaker Miller: "The Sponsor of the Amendment?"

Washington: "Yes."

Speaker Miller: "Ah... Mr. Leon? Ah... yes, indicates he will."

Washington: "Mr. Leon, ah.. you did hurry through that Amendment. Would you ah.. retrace your steps and explain that again?"

Leon: "The Amendment reduces the amount of the appropriation from the original \$30,000 which was reduc..... I mean \$30,000,000 which was reduced to \$18,000,000 is now further reduced to \$12,467,500. This is the amount that the depositors, had they been insured by F.D.I.C. would have been able to recover ah... to recover under that program."

Washington: "Now did you say that the Governor indicated that he would sign such a Bill?"

Leon: "This Amendment is a result of a Conference of maybe ah.. five or six different times in the last two or three days by the Sponsors of this Bill with the Governor. And he indicated that this amount would be acceptable to him."

Washington: "By acceptable ah.. do you mean that he would sign the...."

Leon: "He said that he would sign the Bill when adopted by the House and the Senate."

Washington: "Did he not raise any legal questions relative to ah...."

Leon: "The legal questions on this measure ah.. are something that will be determined after the Bill is signed."

Washington: "Well, in your Conference with him ah.. did he discuss with you the matter pending before the ah.. courts of this state?"

Leon: "Yes, yes he discussed that fully."

Washington: "What conclusions were arrived at?"



Leon: "The conclusion we arrived at was this; at the hearing of the Banks and Savings and Loans ah.. Committee ah.. the question of that lawsuit was raised with the Attorney General of Illinois, who indicated that the federal court decision, which was not yet written, would effect the State of Illinois very severely. He also indicated that he would have to appeal that federal court ruling and if he did and he lost, the state would be in severe peril for further lawsuits from any administrative action by ah.. employees of the state. And that he'd rather that this decision was not appealed."

Washington: "Was the Attorney General apprised of this conference or did he participate in ah.."

Leon: "No, the Attorney General did not."

Washington: "Was his opinion sought out relative to what is suggested by way of this Amendment?"

Leon: "At the hearing of the ah... Committee on Banks and Savings and Loans, the Attorney General in response to a question."

Speaker Miller: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Houlihan arise?"

Houlihan: "A point of order, Mr. Speaker. I think that this dialog about a conversation which all of us were not involved in ah.. is really out of place and that Representative Washington ought to talk ah... either directly to the Governor or talk to Representative Leon, but I don't see any purpose in Representative Washington interrogating Representative Leon....."

Speaker Miller: "All right, you're point is well heard. You may...."

Washington: "Mr. Speaker, Mr. Speaker....."

Speaker Miller: "Address yourself to Amendment #3."

Washington: "I will explain to the House why I'm going along this line. Simply because Mr. Houlihan doesn't understand why I'm asking the questions, ah.. it doesn't mean that they are not relevant or shouldn't be asked. Now this Amendment has been proposed ah.. and in support of the Amendment, certain statements was made relative to negotiations, conversations and agreements with the Governor of this state. Now it seems to me that we have a right to know what went on. And not only that, since the Attorney General is involved as the attorney for this



it seems to me that we should know exactly what his position is on this matter and I was pursuing that line of inquiry. Now if this Body doesn't want to know the background of this Amendment, I'll sit down. I happen to want to know."

Speaker Miller: "I think any questions concerning this Amendment, ah... Amendment #3 are in order."

Washington: "Thank you. My final question relative to this Amendment is this; why was not the Attorney General of the State of Illinois apprised of this Amendment and its impact relative to the lawsuit now pending in the Circuit Court?"

Leon: "The reason that the Attorney General was not brought into the conversation was that inasmuch as he is going to be asked as to the constitutionality of the Bill when passed and adopted ah.. and signed by the Governor.... that the constitutionality of this Bill would be before him and that it would be foolish for us to ask him to give us an off-the-cuff decision without seeing the Bill or the law as ah.. might be proposed. It would be foolish for him to make an off-the-cuff decision until he had an opportunity to study it in detail. And then to confer with the Governor as to the political implications and whatever might be the result of this Act."

Washington: "All right, thank you, Representative Leon."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Totten."

Totten: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ah... in the conversations that you eluded to with the Governor; has the Governor confirmed his approval of this appropriation in writing?"

Leon: "Ah... of course not."

Totten: "Does he intend to? Do you intend to request him to do so?"

Leon: "The best way that I could say that the Governor's approval would be attested to ah.. would be that if the Bill was passed and his signature is put on the Bill. Certainly I wouldn't ask the Governor of the State of Illinois to give me ah... an affidavit to the fact that he will sign the Bill if it passes.... there's just too many 'ifs'."

Totten: "This appropriation is not in the Governor's Budget at this point, is it?"

Leon: "The Governor indicated that he would be able to find the money if



this Bill is passed."

Totten: "O'kay, thank you."

Speaker Miller: "Is there further discussion on the Amendment? The Gentleman has moved for immediate consideration and adoption of Amendment #3. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and Amendment #3 is adopted. Are there further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading. Now the Bill having been read a third time, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kosinski."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, you may remember the other day when we discussed this Bill in great detail. I would ask you, Ladies and Gentlemen, that we do not discuss this Bill any further. If we have a reason to explain our vote, I think that would be in order, but I think that as much as there is on the agenda that needs to be considered besides House Bill 531, we should conserve on time. In my appeal, it has been established that these people were bilked out of their life savings by what is most apparently either willful and reckless conduct on the part of the state or possibly even collusion to permit Aron Mensing, President of Citizens Savings and Loans ah...and now a convicted criminal to steal the life savings of these people. May I bring into clear focus that a federal court under Judge Robeson has established the guilt of the State of Illinois by preliminary findings. The guilt of willful and reckless conduct in governing a state controlled institution. May I call our attention to the fact that this Bill is limited to one situation and unlike a court ah.. a court decision cannot, to my knowledge, be used in future....."

Speaker Miller: "All right, after the interruption with the lights out ah.. the Chair will recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Kosinski ah..to complete his presentation of this Bill."

Kosinski: "Mr. Speaker, I'll try and keep my voice lower ah.. so I don't blow another fuse. Ladies and Gentlemen, I'm sure that you remember what I had said to this point. May I call to your attention that this Bill is limited to one situation only. And unlike a court decision, ah.. cannot, to my knowledge, be used in future court decisions of a



related type ah... as evidence of precedent; However, as you know a federal court decision for these poor depositors is now informed. If our Attorney General appeals that decision ah.. and if his appeal is denied, then we are really on the hook for hundreds of millions of dollars and other suits. I told you the other day that it is my hope to end run the federal court decision by making payments to these poor depositors. After last weeks vote of 77 'ayes' ah.. certain questions were given me. And I think that I have answered them completely to the people who then opposed this Bill. I now count on those people and all of you of the General Assembly to pass this Bill and put it into the Senate. I thank you."

Speaker Miller: "All right, is there discussion? The question is shall House Bill 531 pass. All those in favor will vote 'aye' and ah... I can't open the switch, Mr. Clerk. All those in favor will vote 'aye' and the opposed vote 'no'. The Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Christian, Mr. Tipsword to explain his vote."

Tipsword: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to explain my vote. I am going to vote 'no' on this Bill. And I regret that I must vote 'no' on a Bill of Representative Kosinski's. He is a great friend of mine, but I figured up what \$12,000,000 means to my district. \$12,000,000 divided between ah... equally ah.. if that is what would occur, between each of the districts of the State of Illinois, amounts to \$203,379 and a few odd cents for each Legislative District of the State of Illinois. I know the people who live in my district have great sympathy for the people who have lost their money in the Citizens Savings and Loans. We've had bank failures and savings and loans failures throughout the State of Illinois. We've had hundreds of elevators that have failed that are under the supervision of the State of Illinois and under the Auditing procedures of the Department of Agriculture of the State of Illinois. And there's been no State of Illinois help to them. It would be those same farmers in my district who have lost in those grain elevators that would be supplying our \$203, ah.. plus dollars for payment of this Bill. I would suggest that they would rather see that \$203,000,000 go into either a tax reduction or on to the roads ah... either locally or statewide in the district in which I live or for



public improvements or added to the costs that the schools now pay.

And so consequently, I must vote 'no' on this Bill."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Fary."

Fary: "In explaining my vote, Mr. Speaker, I want the House to listen to me. There's \$88,000,000 federal revenue sharing money in the State Treasury and it's been laying there for a couple of years doing nothing. Uncle Richard Ogilvie got that from his great Uncle Richard Nixon. So let's put it to use. There's over 100,000,000 in the State Treasury as a result of the state income tax. Let's loosen up, fellas."

Speaker Miller: "All right, is there further discussion? The Gentleman from Livingston, Mr. Hunsicker to explain his vote."

Hunsicker: "Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah.. I ah.. and Mr. Speaker, I agree wholeheartedly with the Gentleman from Christian County, Mr. Tipsword. I think he hit the nail squarely on the head and therefore, I have to vote 'no'."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Lundy to explain his vote."

Lundy: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House. I didn't vote on this Bill the first time around and I thought I was going to vote against it this time, but I was visited in my office over the weekend by a woman who told me that her experience was a typical. The Savings and Loan Commissioner after this Citizens Savings and Loans was first shut down ah... and that she and her depositors had received positive assurances from the Commissioner's Office that the Citizens Savings and Loans was a safe place for them to keep their savings. Now that seems to me that this is a unique situation. It seems to me that the dereliction on the part of state officials is overwhelming and I'm going to cast an 'aye' vote."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. McAvoy to explain his vote."

McAvoy: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I hope that the Members of House will think of one thing....."

Speaker Miller: "Now the gentlemen in the gallery ah.. the T.V. lights ah.. the engineer has just informed the Chair that ah.. we have an overload and we'd like to ask you not to turn on your lights ah... if you will. Otherwise, the engineer tells me that we're not going to have any lights



again. I'm sorry about that, but there's nothing else we can do. The next step ah.. if that doesn't work, according to the engineer ah... we'll have to turn off the air conditioning. All right, the Chair had recognized the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. McAvoy to explain his vote."

McAvoy: "Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House ah.. before we blow another fuse ah.. I just want to say that I'm happy to vote 'aye' and I wish that many more green lights would appear on that board. Thank you very much."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I rise on a point of personal privilege. The electricians seem to have a problem with this and I have concurred with the Speaker ah.. the true Speaker on this matter. And it seems to me this is a lot easier to solve than going to an electrician. I wonder if we might ask each of the Members in the Chamber who are true Members to raise their hands ah.. please just for one moment? Just put your hand up ah.. I think we can solve this electrical problem in a hurry. Would you mind putting your hand up in the air ah... Members on both sides of the aisle? Thank you very much. The Speaker told me that there is an old Chinese proverb that many hands make light work."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? The Lady from Lake, Ms. Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I have had mixed emotions about this case, but I do feel that it's high time that this Legislative Body assumes its responsibility in as much as we have had ah.. obviously people in the offices of the state ah.. involved in this savings and loan transaction ah... who were willful and neglectful to say the least ah.. in their duties. And I'm very happy to vote 'aye'."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 111 'ayes' and 26 'nays' and this Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby..... the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jim Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I was seeking ah.. to be recognized to explain my vote. I had ah.. serious reservations about this Bill because of the





strain on the General Revenue Fund. I think that the Sponsor's on that particular question had really tried to work it out and therefore, I was voting 'aye'. I think the court questions can be solved later, but on the General Revenue Fund ah.. I think that they have been trying to work it out and this is a very serious human concern. I'm now voting 'aye'."

Speaker Miller: "All right, ah.. this Bill having received the constitutional majority is hereby declared passed."

Speaker Blair: "House Bills, Third Reading. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Tazewell, Mr. VonBoeckman arise?"

VonBoeckman: "I rise, Mr. Speaker ah.. for the purpose of tabling a Bill. First of all, I'm glad to see you back."

Speaker Blair: "Thank you."

VonBoeckman: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah.. due to the fact that the Department of Transportation and the Governor have placed the Pekin Bridge Bill in ah.. in the budget ah... I therefore ask permission of the House to table House Bill 497."

Speaker Blair: "All right, ah.. does the Gentleman from Tazewell have leave? Hearing no objections, the Bill will be tabled. Now I am advised that ah.. when we were last on House Bills, Third Reading, ah.. that we were ah.. the next Bill to be called would be 950 and I am told that Mr. Maragos ah.. says to take that out of the record. And so Mr. Clerk ah... we would be at 1760 on priority and Mr. Telcser has asked that we take that out of the record. And now we're to House Bill 959."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 959, Craig. A Bill for an Act to establish fair trade practices in the dairy industry in Illinois. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I would like to ask leave for the ah... House Bill 959, 960 and 961 and 962 be ah.. heard at one time since they are all companion Bills."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman has asked leave to have 960 and 961 and 962 ah.. considered for purposes of discussions ah.. together. Ah.. is there leave for that purpose? All right, hearing no objection,



ah.. Mr. Clerk, read those."

Clerk O'Brien: "House Bill 960. A Bill for an Act to amend the Section of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois. Third Reading of the Bill. House Bill 961. A Bill for an Act making an appropriation to the Department of Public Health. Third Reading of the Bill. House Bill 962. An Act to amend Section 5 of an Act in relation to state finance. Third Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, this creates the Illinois ah...Dairy Practice Act. It creates the Division of Dairy Industry Trade Practices in the Department of Public Health. Now there's much been ah... some people think that this is a price fixing Bill and this is not a price fixing Bill in any way. This prohibits the price cutting and other unfair trade practices which go on in the dairy industry. This will be a self-supporting Bill. It will appropriate ah.. it's been amended down where the Director will be paid \$22,500 a year and \$22,500 will go to the support of the administration of this Act. And that will cut from \$60,000 down to \$45,000. This will prohibit the selling of milk as a leader in stores or gas stations ah.. for prices which are prohibitive low ah.. practically giving it away to get people to come in as a lead item. The milk production in this ah.. in our state is financially dwindling away ah.. rather than having these measures promoted ah.. I think this will help the milk industry..... the milk production to the people of Illinois by getting at least a fair price for the product and keeping it on a level that will help promote the industry rather than hurt the industry. I'll site you examples such as the Broiler Industry ah... not long ago ah.. has been almost put out of business by the little people because of the feed companies promoting the Broiler Industry and they did not care how cheap the Broiler's were sold. All they were interested in was in selling feed. And I feel that this here ah.. alone will help the milk industry and I would like to urge the support of these Bills, 959, 960, 961 and 962."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman from Will, Mr. Leinenweber."

Leinenweber: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. I rise in



opposition to House Bill 959 and the ah.. subsequent Bills because if if you want to see the price of milk in stores and the homes ah... shoot up as much as 15% ah.. then you ought to support these Bills. This would be the effect. House Bill 959 is an anti-competitive, anti-free market Bill. It's a mandatory price fixing Bill, regardless of what the Sponsor says. It is anti-competitive by adopting a discredited Robinson-Patsmen Anti-Trust Act to the milk distribution seal here in Illinois. The Robinson-Patsmen Act enacted in 1930 was an anti A&C Bill seeking to preserve the neighborhood grocery store. In substance, it prohibits buying in discounts and prevents the distributor in trying to compete in the market places. It is totally contrary to the concept of a free and open market with the law ah.. that supply and demands governs. The Bill does not quip with the Robinson-Patmen Act however because House Bill 959 is designed to control the activities of the resaler. The Robinson-Patmen Act is only for the distributor and manufacturer. Under the Act, neither a distributor nor a resaler may charge less than his costs. The cost is defined as that portion of all of the expenses fairly applicable to the dairy products to the consumer. It lists seventeen different items which are to be included in computing costs ah... but it goes on to say that it is not limited to those. What is meant by unlimited? The Bill does not say. The Bill goes on to give a presumption that a retailer's costs equal the net price he pays to his supplying distributor plus fifteen percent. In other words, he must add on fifteen percent to his cost in order to arrive at what this Bill defines as the retailer's cost. In Section 5 ah.. it is unlawful for a distributor to sell a dairy product for less than his cost; to discriminate between different purchasers in price. The picture here is the proof of discrimination in price is prima facie evidence of the charge. In other words, if a distributor charges one customer less than another, he has prima facie guilty. He must come in and justify it. The rebuttal of the prima facie case by showing that the lower price ah... is contented to meet competition, but the chilling effect is quite apparent here. Nothing prevents price differentials ah.. allowing for the differences in the costs ah.. of manufacturing and sale of delivery resulting in



differing methods of quantities in which the products are sold. This might sound like a quantity discount, but it is not. This is limited to actual costs savings. What this does to home delivery is ah.. uncertain. What happens to your neighborhood grocer if he violates this Act? He could be fined ah.. not less than \$500 and not more than \$10,000 for each sale of ah.. a product at less than ah.. his so called cost for fifteen percent. To read a discription of possible bureaucratic meddling and red tape ah... I invite you to read Section 8 of this Bill. Under Section 6, it is unlawful for a resaler to ah... that is your neighborhood grocery store, to sell milk products for less than it costs plus fifteen percent. No longer can he use milk as the leader. No longer can your grocer pass on volume savings to you, the consumer, or ah.. no longer has he the authority to command a volume discount from his distributor. No longer can your neighborhood grocer pass on any reduction in profit he may wish to make in order to compete in the marketplace to try and get your business. This is a bad Bill as the Robinson-Patman Act is a bad Act, but it is worse than the Robinson-Patman Act. It is uneconomic and will increase your food budget and will be a successful in its purpose as the Robinson-Patman Act was in stopping the A&P. This is an anti-consumer Bill of the very worst sort and I urge its defeat."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mahar."

Mahar: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, will the Sponsor yield for a question or two?"

Speaker Miller: "He indicates he will. Proceed."

Mahar: "Representative Craig, who's going to benefit by this Bill?"

Craig: "Well, it's ah... contrary to the previous speaker, I think that the consumer is going to benefit because over the long pull ah.. I think the price of milk will be



more stable than it will be if we don't have this Act. And as far as other states.... there are fourteen other states and our neighboring state of Wisconsin, which is a large milk producing state ah.. and they have these Bills and they are getting along all right with them. So I think it is a stabilizing factor in the stabilization of the price of milk over the long pull."

Mahar: "Exactly what dairy products are covered?"

Craig: "Butter, condensed milk, evaporated milk, powdered milk and cheese are not covered ah.. other than cottage cheese. The dairy products that are covered by this Act are milk, cream, ah... whipping cream, half and half, buttermilk, flavored milk drinks, fortified milk, skim milk, and cottage cheese."

Mahar: "On more question. The Bill says that it is unlawful for a distributor to extend credit to a retailer for more than 60 days. What's the principle of that?"

Craig: "I think that ah... probably would be for the same reason as in the liquor industry ah.... because ah.... well, they had Bills in here to try and get a 30 day extension and demanded cash because in that instance, if anyone wanted to ah.. I think they may go out of business. And it would leave the distributor holding the sack. I feel that it should be paid for and if we want to get into those things ah... in the market industry; that is a big subject too of what happens in the retail market of a big chain store ah.. that don't pay for a long period of time ah.. and the packers and the ah.. people like that. That is another subject."

Mahar: "Mr. Speaker, may I speak to the Bill?"

Speaker Miller: "You may, Sir. Proceed."

Mahar: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I feel that this particular Bill does not affect the vast majority of people... only a very small segment. Certainly it doesn't help the farmer. It's going to affect



the small businessman who has a problem today making a living. And this is going to affect the large retailer. Many of us know that the housewives go from grocery store to grocery store in order to buy the leader items. Now if half and half can be sold in the grocery store at \$.29 as a leader item to bring the housewives in to shop; it certainly is going to help the consumer. Under this Bill, she won't be able to do that. She's going to have to pay the full price. This is really going to affect the taxpayer. It's going to affect the consumer. It's a bad Bill and as a matter of fact, I don't see how we can constitutionally adopt a Bill like this and make it stick. It just seems to me that it has an adverse affect in our total society and I would urge a 'no' vote."

Speaker Miller: "Did Mr. Anderson, the Gentleman from Winnebago, desire to ah.. enter this debate? Mr. Anderson, the Gentleman from Winnebago."

Anderson: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlmen of the House, I rise in opposition to this Bill. Having heard from several milk dealers ah... and several farmers who called me and wondered what was going on. I said, 'Well, looks like we're being taken here pretty fast.' They said, 'Maybe this thing looks good on the surface.' But they've taken it to their attorneys and they have informed them too that ah... it won't be long that the little fellow will be out of business. Now we can't afford to put the little people out of business in this country. We're not built that way. We're built to ah... our country is to do a good job with a free enterprise business. And if we're going to be run by the government in everything, why they're going to have to shut it all down. I'm very much ah.. opposed to this Bill and I hope that many others will see this too. Thank you."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Rock Island, Mr. Polk."

Polk: "Mr. Speaker, will the Sponsor yield to a question?"



Speaker Miller: "Proceed."

Polk: "This is simply to clarify a point that I have. If a small store ah.. a one man store ah.. decides to have a special and his leader is going to be milk and he wishes to sell that at a price less than he paid for it, this would be outlawed ah.. according to this Bill?"

Craig: "That is right."

Polk: "Thank you."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Logan, Mr. Lauer."

Lauer: "Mr. Speaker, I found it very interesting to hear the various aspects of the discussion of this Bill in the House. It seems to me that there is one group who have not as yet been represented. And this is the most important group of all, the consumer. And most specially, that group of consumers who cannot protect themselves. Children, we are told, need the benefits of milk, that this is one of the most important food products that they can have available to them. Under this Bill though, as was just brought out in the question from Representative Polk; a store would not be able to pass on to children the right to have a break on the price of milk. We have taken a public position both in the state ah.. with educational funds and ah.. it's also federally funded, that milk will be available in schools. We are trying to get milk to children, but this Bill would raise the price of milk to the ultimate consumer. In time that there is an insistence of a certain minimum mark-up on the price of milk ah.. the ultimate loser is going to be the consumer. And specifically, those young consumers who are the greatest consumers of milk. If we believe at all that milk is a product that is beneficial to the young people of this state, then we would have to oppose this Bill. I'm a little surprised not to find the Gentleman who represents those deprived areas, ah.. not standing in opposition to this Bill because, Mr. Speaker, it seems to me that



this most basic of all food products ah... this which is the most necessary to the health of young people is being denied them. It strikes me, Mr. Speaker, that if the logic and the reasoning that is being used by the proponents of this Bill is valid, then it was also valid ah... a statement that I heard as a student in a Dairy Science Class when the professor stood up and in a joking mood said, 'Ladies and Gentlemen of the class, we in the dairy industry hate to admit it, but there isn't a thing in milk that beer doesn't have more of except calcium and Vitamin A.' I would urge the defeat of this Bill."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from McHenry, Mr. Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, coming from the area that's known as the milk capital of Illinois and that's McHenry County where we have more processes and more packaging and sales of milk products than any other Legislative District in Illinois; I would suggest to this House that these Bills are good Bills. The neighboring State of Wisconsin ah.. to the north of my hometown, has the identical laws on their Statute Books and they don't have the unpleasant situations of a milk industry in ah.. and corrupted by leader sales. They prohibit this by law. And the only one that really gets stuck, in affect, ah.. in the neck with the leader type sale that this Bill would prohibit, would be the workingman. We protect the working men and women in Illinois through various methods of Legislation. This would be another incentive to protect those men and women working in the milk processing industry and the milk delivery industries. Now I suggest to those who were talking about ah.. you know, how important milk is to the consumer; it's also very important that we have an industry that is stabilized and an industry that is well kept and economically feasible to pay its worker and pay its farmers to produce and bring to market that milk. I suggest that





These sections of Bills are good Bills. They're supported by the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. And they should be voted on favorably."

Speaker: "The Gentleman from Moultry, Mr. Stone."

Mr. Speaker, I move the previous question."

Speaker: "The previous question has been moved. All those in favor say 'aye' and the opposed 'nay' and the 'aye' have it and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig to close the debate."

Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I heard this said that this is going to hurt the little man I maintain to you that over the past few years, that the little man has been going out of the business very fast and he will continue to do so if some type of Legislation is not enacted because your large companies are... what is going to happen is ah.. you're talking about price and what is going to happen is ah.. is takes the man in the business to keep competition. These are going ah.. these distributors and processors are going to file with this ah... with the department the cost of production. And they can't go out... this milk will not be sold below this cost... And the only way that it can... if one processor can sell below his cost is to... one with competition. If his cost of production is... cent or so lower. But what has been happening... larger processors have been coming in and... at a very very ridiculous low price.... and... men have been going out of the business very... they will continue to do so. Now this takes... to shipping his milk to the distributors... processors ah.. and I happen to be a producer and... ago I could have had ah.. I could have... to five or six different distributors ah... or six different processors. Today, I



only have two. And I'm not sure of the other one ah... that would even come to pick up my milk. This is a very serious thing here in the State of Illinois. The State of Wisconsin has been using it and for you people to think that ah... if you're gullible enough to think that you can be lead into a store by a leader and ah.. given something at a cost below this and think that this can continue to lead on ah.. you in there, you're going to pay for it many many other ways. And I don't think that people should expect anything below the actual cost of production because when you do ah.. you're going to shut off that product because it cannot continue to be produced and sold below cost. And these Bills, I think, will benefit the milk industry. They'll benefit the consumer because as it was previously said; it will stablize things on an equal level. And I urge your support of these Bills."

Speaker Miller: "The question is shall these four Bills pass. These Bills are House Bills, 959, 960, 961 and 962. All those in favor will vote 'aye' and those opposed 'nay'. And the Clerk will take separate Roll Calls. Now the Chair recognizes the Lady from Adams, Ms. Kent."

Kent: "Mr. Speaker, in explaining my vote I speak for the wives of the working men who are ah... hard at trying to cut their budget in food. And of all ways that they look for are the leaders in the grocery stores. You know that your wife watches those advertizements. They watch when milk is low and they watch when butter is low.. they watch when bread is low ah.. when all of the staples are there. So I urge you to vote against this Bill and vote for your wife who has to watch what she spends for her family to eat."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Madison, Mr. Calvo to explain his vote."

Calvo: "Mr. Speaker, this late in the Session ah.. I won't



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take much time, but I respect ah.. the Lady who just spoke very much and I certainly know ah.. why she says what she does, but I would point out to her that this is an Illinois Bill and it applies to ah.... and it concerns the Illinois Dairy Association. Now I might point out to her that most of the milk that she buys there in Quincy probably comes from the dairy herds in Iowa and this Bill won't have much affect on her. And when we talk about the grocery stores and the leaders ah.. the big problem with this situation is this; I happen to live fairly close to a large producing area in the district east of me. And the dairy farmers are quitting the production of milk. And when they ah.. because of the thing that's happening in the St. Louis Metropolitan Area ah.. with dairy prices. Now if this continues to happen ah.. you think milk is cheap now ah.. it's going to get so high that they won't be able to afford to make it a leader in the stores and the milk prices are going to go up to about double what they are now. I urge you to vote for this Legislation because when you help us produce more milk ah.. the loss of supply and demand will keep the prices down. And we dry up the production of milk by continuing the type of practices that go on in some of our areas, then you're going to find milk and all dairy products ah.. at least twice as high as they are now. And the grocery stores ah.. even if they try to sell them to you at cost, it'll be much more than you're paying today. So I urge your support of this measure to help our dairy industry to keep our production high as we did with the Soy Bean Bill the other day. Thank you."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Barnes."

Barnes: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, in casting my 'aye' vote I would like to say in terms of ah.. the leader proposition ah.. involved in retail stores; in my area where people can ill afford to spend a great deal of



money on various products ah... to lead them in with the reduced price of milk and then to jack up prices on everything else in there ah... to compensate for that leader that led them into the store ah... I think it's the kind of practice that has taken place in my area and the City of Chicago. I think that this is a good Bill and we should support it ah.. not only to bring parity in the milk industry, but to think of those small businessmen and to think of those Ma and Pa stores. I've heard many people talking about small enterprise; what about the small stores that cannot compete with the larger competitor that cuts the milk to the point where they cannot meet their prices? These are the people that are suffering in the long run and I think that a Bill of this type is timely and that we should all support it because it is a working man's Bill and I cast an 'aye' vote in support of it."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Huskey."

Huskey: "Mr. Speaker, in explaining my 'yes' vote; in my small business I do business with many small dairies. In fact, I used to, but just last year, I received four bankruptcies from small dairies. Actually what we're faced with today ah... are the bigs putting the smalls out of business completely. Now maybe today in the market place, we will save a few pennies on milk, but I feel that milk is almost tied in ah.. almost similar with the energy crisis. Tomorrow the bigs will control all of the milk and then the ah... and also with the control of the milk ah... they'll control the price. So therefore, I vote 'yes' on this Bill."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Matijevich."

Matijevich: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, ah.. I might say to Representative Huskey that I had exactly in mind ah.. much of what he said. I think on the floor of this House ah.. I've spoken at times in



behalf of what I think the consumer's best interests are. And I think that I've also said that I place the small businessman in much the same posture as the consumer. Now when you talk about leader items ah.. you know, ah..... many many years ago when I was a boy ah.. someone said to me, 'Be careful, don't expect something for nothing. If it costs you nothing, look out for it because it's going to cost you more in the end.' And I would hope that you realize that many of these ah.. matters that have been sold as leader items have really driven the little businessman right out of business. And eventually the conglomerates take over and they not only raise the prices on what that leader item was selling for, but they raise the prices on everything. Now Representative Huskey hit the nail right on the head in what is happening in our fuel shortage crisis right now. The independents are being run right out of business. What's going to happen? The price of gasoline is going to sky rocket. Right now on Highway 66 coming down here last week, it cost me \$.49 a gallon for gas. This is what's happening. You know it wasn't long ago that these independents had price wars and whatnot ah.. and gasoline was real low. So you went and bought it... leader items. But what happens now? The conglomerates have taken over and the gas price has risen beyond ah.. what anybody would believe that they've risen. This is what can happen in the marketplace. And I say, Ladies and Gentlemen, that all this is is a Fair Trade Act and no one will ever lose on that. And I believe that you ought to vote for it if you're for the little businessman ah.. if you're for the consumer."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Vermilion to explain his vote."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, can I get a Roll on that? Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I think this is something that will help the industry....."



Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Randolph, Mr. Holloway has been trying to get may attention. I'll recognize him to explain his vote."

Holloway: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I've sat back here and watched this Bill ah... or this series of Bills with interest. I've listened to the Gentleman from Madison in the legal profession, that this Legislation was needed. I've listened to the Gentleman from McHenry County tell us from labor how this Legislated is needed. I'm glad to know that the Teamsters want to do something for us dairy farmers. Let me tell you, Ladies and Gentlemen of this House, this is terrible Legislation. And what we don't need is ah.. in the dairy business, what we don't need is milk producers ah.. is more regulations. This is what we don't need. If you're not willing to compete in a comparative market, I say that you have no business in business to start with. I am willing to take my chances. I'm willing to take the price that the markets afford. I'm willing to compete in a free economy. I'm willing to operate on the law of supply and demand. And Ladies and Gentlemen, please change those green lights up there to either not voting or to red. We don't need this type of Legislation."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 93 'ayes' and 54 'nays' and this Bill having received the constitutional majority ah.. for what purpose does the Gentleman from Randolph, Mr. Holloway arise?"

Holloway: "Mr. Speaker, how many votes are necessary on this? Is this a home rule Bill ah.. that requires 107 or just 89?"

Speaker Miller: "At this time I will recognize Mr. Pierce for a point of personal privilege."

Pierce: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce ah..in the gallery behind me ah... 90 adults and 15 grandchildren



from the St. Micheal Senior Citizens Group in Chicago. They're from District 30 of Representative Maragos, Giglio and Collins and District 24 of Representatives Caldwell, Mann and Epton."

Speaker Miller: "Mr. Holloway, in answer to your inquiry, ah.. there appears to be nothing in these Bills with the special home rule unit. And therefore, it would be the Chair's ruling that ah... it takes 89 votes. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Effingham, Mr. Keller arise?"

Keller: "Ah.. doesn't this take away from the City of Chicago ah.. the right to regulate ah.. the dairy industry and that would be a home rule provision."

Speaker Miller: "Ah... Mr. Keller, it appeared to the Chair as he stated ah.. now if you have something that you can call to the Chair's attention that would indicate that there was a taking away of home rule powers ah... the Chair would be glad to consider it. The Gentleman from Effingham, Mr. Keller."

Keller: "Well, it limits the home rule provision from ah... doing anything to regulate the dairy industry in ah... in the home rule districts."

Speaker Miller: "Well, Mr. Keller, there seems to be nothing here in these Bills that involves taking away any home rule powers on the basis of the Bill."

Keller: "Mr. Speaker, then could we have a verification of the Roll Call?"

Speaker Miller: "You always have that right, Sir. All right, now the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig is recognized."

Craig: "May I poll the absentees?"

Speaker Miller: "You have that right, Sir. All right, will the Members please be in their seats? And the Clerk will call the absentees."

Clerk Selcke: "Barry, Beatty, Berman, Bluthardt, Borchers,

Miller: "The gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, one more introduction. I'm pleased to introduce...a....Alice Errig, the past president of the League of Women Voters of Illinois...in the Speaker's gallery next to Lobbyist, Mr. Bill Hinckle. Alice."

Speaker Miller: "On the Speaker's table are some general Resolutions. Is Mr. Hirschfield on the floor? Alright, under these Resolutions appears House Resolution 343, and in this connection the Chair will recognize the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Thank you Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 343 would have the House Committee on Higher Education undertake ...actually....and continue the study...the very important subject of income contingent loans. Income contingent loans are funds provided for higher education, which are reimbursed after graduation based on income. This is looked upon by many states as the very important future source of support for higher education, especially for students who have economic difficulties paying for their education. The Higher Education, backed by its Chairman and myself and Representative John Hirschfeld, and I ask for your support so that we can, with the encouragement of the House, undertake this study and come back with the support that, hopefully, will lead to funding in the future for education for...many of our young people and I ask for your support in adopting this Resolution."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? The question is shall the House adopt House Resolution 343. Does this create a special study Committee, Mr. Douglas?"

Douglas: "No, Mr. Speaker, it would be done by the Higher Education Committee. We are pursuing what we feel is the appropriate procedure of working within standing Committees..."

Speaker Miller: "...there's no money involved?"

Douglas: "...very little, if anything, would be involved..."

Speaker Miller: "...well, if there's no money involved, you can do it on ayes and nays. If there's money involved, we have to take a Roll Call."

Douglas: "No money is involved."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, the question is shall the House adopt House Resolution 343. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it and the Resolution is adopted. On the Speaker's table appears House Resolution 355 and the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jaffe."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, House Resolution 355 proposes to create a special House Committee of eight members to study the crime of rape. It is co-sponsored by the Minority Leader and by the Majority Leader. It has the co-sponsorship of the Chairman of the Executive Committee. It passed out of the Executive Committee without a dissenting vote and I would urge an aye vote."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any funds to be expended, Mr. Jaffe?.....To create the Commission? Put Mr. Jaffe on, please."

Jaffe: "Only those funds which come out of the Speaker's.... a...a...petty cash, I think, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, the question is shall the House adopt House Resolution 355. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. Alright, Mr. Jaffe."

Jaffe: "We need a Roll Call vote on this, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Miller: "If there's going to be an expenditure of money, there must be a Roll Call. Alright..."

Jaffe: "Yes, that's what I said...."

Speaker Miller: "...all those in favor will vote aye and opposed, nay. This will take 89 votes, it involves money. Have all voted who wished? The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jaffe, to explain his vote."

Jaffe: "Mr. Speaker, just so that we can get all the lights on the board, it's co-sponsored by the Minority Leader,



by the Majority Leader and also, the Chairman of the Executive Committee. It passed out of Committee without a dissenting vote and we would appreciate an aye vote on it."

Speaker Miller: "Record Catania as aye. The Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. Schneider, to explain his vote."

Schneider: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker, in addition to the co-sponsorship, the Resolution has considerable merit. I understand that there is a problem in determining the extent and nature of rape. Women have been fearful and reluctant to report that kind of a crime because of the kinds of interrogation that takes place. I think this will go a long way toward trying to uncover a proper procedure reporting such a crime and I think we can stand to support a Resolution of this type and we are the appropriate body to make these kinds of...a...studies. So again, in explaining my aye vote, I think if we understand what's involved, it's an important vote for all of us."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. J. J. Wolf, to explain his vote."

Wolf: "Well, I would like...it's too late for a question of the sponsor, but maybe he might nod his head. I was reading in a paper, in a gay liberation paper, that the sponsor was going to possibly sponsor a Bill of Rights Bill for gay people. I wonder if they would be included in this study."

Jaffe: "A...Jake, as I understand it, they are now going to have you as the chief sponsor of that Bill."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 96 ayes, and 12 nays, and this House has adopted House Resolution 355. On the Speaker's table appears House Resolution 360. In connection with this Resolution, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from DuPage, Mr. LaFleur."



LaFleur: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, House Resolution 360 asked for the formation of a special Committee to study the results of a Supreme Court Case known as the Quinlan-Tyson Case, which came down with some direction from the Supreme Court...of the relationships between attorneys and brokers. This Resolution has been introduced by both sides of the House, by both attorneys and real estate brokers, and it is to meet and report back at the next session in 1974 and I would move for the adoption of this Resolution."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? The question is shall House Resolution 360 pass. This will take a Roll Call. All those in favor will vote aye, and opposed, nay. The Chair is assuming this would be some State expenditure so therefore, it will take 89 votes. Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. McCormick, Aye. Grotberg, ....let's take another Roll Call...please, Ladies and Gentleman, let's get on these Roll Calls if you want to vote. Another Roll Call, Mr. Clerk. All those in favor of the adoption of House Resolution 360 will vote aye. Those opposed, nay. This will take 89 votes. Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 110 ayes and 1 nay. Giorgi, no on this Roll Call. This Resolution having received the majority necessary of 89 votes is hereby declared adopted. On the Speaker's table appears House Resolution 363. In this connection, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Mann."

Mann: "Well Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, House Resolution 363 came out of the Executive Committee by a vote of 19 to 1. It sets up a seven man House-elect Committee to report back on Lake Michigan and to evaluate the present condition of the water...a...to look into things like siting of electric power stations...a... rural run-off land fill, minimal excavation in Lake



Michigan...a...existing modes of access to Lake Michigan. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, I'd like to say that the bed of Lake Michigan is owned by the State and is in trust for the people. At the present time there is no State policy with regard to Lake Michigan and the adjoining land. Now there are two other reasons why it is important that we support this Resolution. There is now pending in the federal Congress...a...one major federal shoreline Bill called the Coastal Zone Management Act. President Nixon has indicated that he's asking for \$20,000,000. Alright, Mr. Speaker, people are saying Roll Call, this does involve an expenditure of money and I'd appreciate your vote."

Speaker Miller: "It does not involve an expenditure of..."

Mann: "...it does."

Speaker Miller: "...it does? The Gentleman from Lake, Mr. Griesheimer."

Griesheimer: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd merely like to add my comments in favor of this Commission. It does not overlap the erosion problem which I previously submitted to this House...it's far broader than that, covering all adjacent lands and the general usages of the Lake. I think for orderly development of our State, this is an absolute necessity for the Legislature to have this information, I would urge your support for this Resolution."

Speaker Miller: "Is there discussion? Is there further discussion? The question is shall the House adopt House Resolution 363. All those in favor will vote aye. And opposed, nay. This will take 89 votes. Have all voted who wished? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 130 ayes, and two nays. Mr. Griesheimer, aye. And this Resolution having received the necessary constitutional majority is hereby declared passed. On the Speaker's table appears House Joint



Resolution 38. And with respect to this Resolution, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. DiPrima."

DiPrima: "Mr. Speaker, Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Joint Resolution 38 passed out of the Committee on Veterans Affairs without a dissenting vote and all it does is joins with all the organizations in the State in urging Congress to provide additional funds for the State and Federal Employment Services due to the influx of Viet Nam veterans who have all returned and many of them are out of work. I would appreciate a favorable vote."

Speaker Miller: "Is there expenditure of money involved at all? Mr. DiPrima, there's no expenditure of money?"

DiPrima: "No."

Speaker Miller: "No sir? Alright. The question is shall the House adopt House Joint Resolution 38. All those in favor will say aye. Opposed nay. The ayes have it and House Joint Resolution 38 is adopted. On the Speaker's table appears House Joint Resolution 44 and in this connection, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Vermilion, Mr. Craig."

Craig: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, I'd like to move for the adoption of House Resolution 44 which gives a... asks Congress to give them a...a...capital gain credit for growing and restoring the growth of lumber and trees to help produce lumber for packaging and things of that nature which will take many years and our lumber areas are being depleted and I urge for the adoption of House Resolution 44."

Speaker Miller: "Is there any expenditure of funds involved in this Resolution, Mr. Craig?"

Craig: "No."

Speaker Miller: "Alright. Is there discussion? The question is shall the House adopt House Joint Resolution 44. All those in favor say aye. Opposed, nay. The ayes have it and the Resolution is adopted. Alright, for what purpose





does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Douglas, arise?"

Douglas: "Mr. Speaker, I'm sorry to take the time of the House to do this, but when House Resolution 343 came up for consideration in this Body a few moments ago...a... Representative Hirschfeld, whom I think is still off the floor, was not present for me to speak to him. Since he is to be the Chairman of the Committee that's being set up to study the question of income contingent loans ...I've now learned that there is a possibility to carry out the functions of this Committee properly that funds may have to be expended and I would like to ask for the consideration of this House. Having voted on the prevailing side to reconsider the motion to pass House Resolution 343 and then I would hope with that acceptance by the House, we would vote on it by a...up on the board. So I move for reconsideration of House Resolution 343."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Douglas."

Douglas: "Mr. Speaker, thank you very much for the further assistance here. As I had anticipated, since the standing Committee will be doing this work, standing Committees do have a budget of a sort to work with. Apparently, from what I've been told, we do not need a ...89 votes and I withdraw the motion to reconsider."

Speaker Miller: "Alright, Consent Calendar, Second Reading, Second Day. And will the Clerk read the Bills...yeh, Second Reading, that's right. Consent Calendar, Second Reading. And will the Clerk read the Bills that are on this calendar."

Mann: "Mr. Speaker, can you tell me, have you come to a...a... House Consent Calendar Third Readings, Second Day?"

Speaker Miller: "I do not understand your question. These are Consent Calendars Second Reading and they are all Senate Bills."

Mann: "Will there be a similar...a...a...call with regard to House Bills?"

Speaker Miller: "Alright, these Bills are advanced to the order of Third Reading. Senate Bills First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 5. Appropriation to the Department of Aging. First Reading of the Bill. Senate Bill 290. Appropriation of expense to the State Fair Agency. First Reading of the Bill. We'd like to go back to that order now and call those Bills that were not called previously, if the Members are available. And with leave of the House, we'll go right down the list as they appear on the Calendar."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 83..."

Speaker Miller: "Is Mr. Walters on the floor? Take it out of the record. We want to hold 156."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 197, Gibbs."

Speaker Miller: "Is Mr. Gibbs on the floor? Take it out of the record. Senate Bill 206... take it out of the record. All right, 220 and 221 out of the record. 225 out of the record. Senate Bill 342."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 342, McMaster. A Bill for an Act to amend an Act to revise the law in relation to township organizations. Second Reading of the Bill. One Committee Amendment. Amend Senate Bill 342 as amended, by deleting lines 13 and 14 and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Knox, Mr. McMaster."



McMaster: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would urge the adoption of the Committee Amendment and ah... that the Bill be moved to Third Reading."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the question is shall the House adopt Committee Amendment #1 to Senate Bill 342. All those in favor say 'aye' and those opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the Amendment is adopted. Are there any further Amendments? The Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "Collins, ah.. not here. 416, we're still holding, right?"

Speaker Miller: "416 we're still holding and we've agreed to hold 447. Is Mr. Schoeberlein on the floor? All right, Senate Bill 589."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 589, A Bill for an Act to amend the Environmental Protection Act. Second Reading of the Bill. Two Committee Amendments. Amendment #1 ah.. amend Senate Bill 589 on page 2, line 14 and so forth."

Speaker Miller: "The Gentleman from Knox, Mr. Master."

McMaster: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, these were not Committee Amendments. They were put on the floor yesterday. Ah.. Amendment #1 ah.. was my Amendment ah...that I supported. Amendment #2 was Glen Schneider's Amendment, which I opposed. I frankly feel that I do not appreciate the fact that ah... the Bill had been put into a shape that I as House Sponsor do not agree with. However, I do not intend to be vindictive on this and ah... if this is a waste of the House ah... that the Bill go to Third Reading in this form ah... I no longer object and ah.. would urge that the Bill be moved to ah.. Third Reading."

Speaker Miller: "Well, Mr. McMaster, the Clerk informs me that ah.. the records do not show that ah... Amendments #1 and #2 were adopted. They do not show that."



McMaster: "Well, I'm sorry that they do not because I know ah.. it was shown ah.. and they were passed yesterday."

Speaker Miller: "Does Mr. Schneider desire recognition?"

Schneider: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, ah... as a matter of ah... clarification ah.. I do recall that we did adopt Amendment #2 and I do think that we adopted Amendment #1. And as for Amendment #2 ah.. we specifically made a reference on that ah... Amendment and questioned the Speaker ah.. I believe it was you, Kenny, as to whether or not they had been adopted. And I believe you said they were. So I do believe that we can confirm that ah.. it's my knowledge that they were adopted."

Speaker Miller: "All right, just a moment, ah.. the Clerk's checking it out. The Clerk informs me that Amendment #1 and #2 were adopted in prior action and the Bill was held on Second Reading. Now are there further Amendments, Mr. Clerk? This Bill is advanced to the order of Third Reading. I don't see Mr. Calvo on the floor. All right, Senate Bill 613."

Clerk Selcke: "Senate Bill 613. A Bill for an Act to amend the Library Systems Act. Second Reading of the Bill. No Committee Amendments."

Speaker Miller: "Are there any Amendments from the floor?"

Clerk Selcke: "Amendment #1, Pierce."

Speaker Miller: "Just a moment. For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Shea arise?"

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, I'm wondering if the Sponsor would take this Bill out of the record. There seems to be some confusion about this Amendment and I ah...."

Speaker Miller: "The Sponsor has so indicated. Take this Bill out of the record. Take 641 out of the record. I don't see Mr. Madigan..... he doesn't want those called. Do you want 817 called, Mr. Houlihan? Out of the record. Mr. Philip is off of the floor. All right, the Chair recognizes the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."



Walsh: "This ah... Mr. Speaker, I move that the House stand in recess for a half an hour. We'll return here at 2:45 for the purpose of a Republican Conference in Room 212."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, I would assume that you have a room that the Democratic Members could use?"

Speaker Miller: "I'm informed that M-5 is available, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Then Mr. Speaker, I would encourage the Democrat Members to come to Room M-5 immediately because there are some important matters to discuss. And hopefully we can come back on the floor within the 30 minutes."

Speaker Miller: "All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I think that perhaps we better delay for a moment the Republican announcement as to the room until we clear whether Room 212 is available. Does anybody know for certain? While we're finding that out ah.. Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 1997, Cunningham. Appropriates \$900,000 to the Department of Transportation. First Reading of the Bill."

Speaker Miller: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Jim Houlihan arise?"

Houlihan: "Mr. Speaker, I arise for ah.. well, I guess it's just a question. The Majority Leader indicated that we would be discussing ah.. three or four matters. I wonder if he might share with us what those matters would be. Is that proper to ask that question?"

Speaker Miller: "Normally, ah.. that's up to the Chair to make that decision when we come back on the floor, Mr. Houlihan."

Houlihan: "Well, Mr. ah.. Mr. Chairman, Mr. Speaker, ah.. I was just curious as to what those three or four matters might be so that we might ah... you know, be prepared for those items coming up. Was that a proper request?"

Speaker Miller: "Ah... Ladies and Gentlemen, ah.. we have not yet got confirmation yet on the room. There's an important message here that the Clerk can read that I think ah... each one of you might be interested in. It's a short message from the Space Needs Commission. May we have your attention while the Clerk reads it, please?"

Clerk Selcke: "This is a letter from the Space Needs Commission relative to your desks. So will you please listen?  
Honorable W.Robert Blair, Speaker of the House, Room 316, Capital Building, Springfield, Illinois. Dear Mr. Speaker, it should be announced to the Members that the Speaker and Minority Leader, through the Space Needs Commission are making arrangements for all of the Members that are interested to buy their chair and or desk. Members ah.. that are interested in the ~~above~~ mentioned ah... purchases ah.. should mark the ~~chair~~ and or desk with their name and of course contact the Speaker's Office or the Minority Leader's Office in the ~~interest~~ of the same. Very Truly Yours, Senator Howard E. Moore and Representative John D. Brandt."

~~Speaker Miller~~: "For what purpose does the Gentleman from Tazewell, Mr. Kriegsman arise?"

~~Kriegsman~~: "I'd just like to say that we are in the warehouse business in Pekin, Illinois and if you're ready to store them in Pekin, we're ready to go."

~~Speaker Miller~~: "The Gentleman from Morgan, Mr. Rose."

~~Rose~~: "Mr. Speaker, while we're in a holding pattern here, I wonder if I might move to suspend the appropriate rule so a Bill could be heard this afternoon in Judiciary I? I've cleared this with the Leadership of both sides of the aisle. The Bill is House Bill 1387 by Representative Beaupre."

~~Speaker Miller~~: "Will you state that Bill number again, Mr. Rose?"

~~Rose~~: "House Bill 1387. It was re-assigned to our Committee for the purposes of commitment to the Interim Study Calendar."

~~Speaker Miller~~: "All right, is there discussion on the Gentleman's motion? The Gentleman moves that the provisions of Rule 18 be suspended for the purpose of hearing House Bill 1387 in Judiciary Committee today. Is there discussion? All those in favor of the Gentleman's motion to suspend Rule 18 will vote 'aye' and those opposed 'nay'."



and this will take 107 votes. Mr. Beaupre on this motion."

Beaupre: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, this is the Bill that approximately two weeks ago ah... we heard in very lengthy debate. I asked that it be returned to Committee to be placed on the Interim Study Calendar for further study and I would ask for your favorable support."

Speaker Miller: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record, Mr. Clerk. On this question there are 127 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. We want to adjourn, but ah... the Gentleman from Champaign, Mr. Hirschfeld."

Hirschfeld: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Mr. Speaker, ah... I had to go over to the Senate while they were verifying House Bills 959, 960, 961, 962. I was recorded as 'aye' before I was taken off of the Roll Call. I wonder if I might get consent to be put back on that Roll Call. It will not change the outcome of the Bill."

Speaker Miller: "Does the Gentleman have leave? Hearing no objections, leave is granted. Now the Chair has been informed that Room M-3 is available for a Republican Conference and Room M-5 for a Democratic Conference. Now the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Walsh has moved that the House stand in recess for one half hour. All those in favor of the Gentleman's motion say ah.... the Gentleman from Union, Mr. Choate."

Choate: "Let me again remind the Democratic Members to come to Room M-5 immediately, Mr. Speaker. So that we can hurry back to the floor."

Speaker Miller: "All right, all in favor of the Gentleman's motion that we recess for one half hour say 'aye' and the opposed 'nay' and the 'ayes' have it and the House stands in recess for one half hour. Just so that there is no misunderstanding.... ah... the Democrats will meet in Room M-5 and the Republicans in M-3 immediately."



Speaker Telcser: "All right, will the Members please be at ease? We will be at ease for another ten or fifteen minutes ah... at the request of the Democratic Leadership. Now the Republican Members ah.. please play around the House during the recess period. All right, the House will now come to order. We're going to give everyone else who is in earshot of the House's calling to to order, ah..another five minutes to arrive. So we've got another five minutes to wait and then we're going to start the business of the House. Now will the people who are on the floor of the House who are not entitled to the floor, ah.. please remove themselves. O'kay ah.. in order to take up this five minutes of ah... time, ah... the Clerk has a Constitutional Amendment which he can read ah... during this five minutes." So on the order of a Constitutional Amendments ah... First Reading ah.. the Clerk will read the Amendment."

Clerk Selcke: "House Joint Resolution Constitution Amendment #26, Ralph Dunn. Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the 78th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the State for adoption or rejection at the general election next occurring at least six months after the adoption of this Resolution, a proposition to amend Sections 2 and 3 of Article IV of the Constitution to read as follows: Article IV. THE LEGISLATURE. Section 2. Legislative Composition. (a) One Senator shall be elected from each Legislative District. Immediately following each decennial redistricting, the General Assembly by law shall divide the Legislative Districts as equally as possible into three groups. Senators from one group shall be elected for terms of four years, four years and two years; Senators from the second group, for terms of four years, two years and four years; and Senators from the third group, for terms of



two years, four years and four years. The Legislative Districts in each group shall be distributed substantially equally over the state. (b) Each Legislative District shall be divided into two Representative Districts. On Representative shall be elected from each Representative District for a term of two years. (c) To be eligible to serve as a Member of the General Assembly, a person must be a United States citizen, at least 21 years of age, and for the two years preceding his election or appointment a resident of the District which he is to represent. In the general election following a redistricting, a candidate for the General Assembly may be elected from any Legislative or Representative District which contains a part of the Legislative District in which he resided at the time of the redistricting and reelected if a resident of the new District he represents for 18 months prior to reelection. (d) Within thirty days after a vacancy occurs, it shall be filled by appointment as provided by law. If the vacancy is in a Senatorial Office with more than twenty-eight months remaining in the term, the appointed Senator shall serve until the next general election, at which time a Senator shall be elected to serve for the remainder of the term. If the vacancy is in a Representative Office or in any other Senatorial Office, the appointment shall be for the remainder of the term. An appointee to fill a vacancy shall be a member of the same party as the vacancy succeeds. (e) No Member of the General Assembly shall receive compensation as a public officer or employee from any other governmental entity for the time during which he is in attendance as a Member of the General Assembly. No Member of the General Assembly during the term for which he was elected or appointed shall be appointed to a public office which shall have been created or the compensation for which shall have been increased by the General Assem-



bly during that term. Section 3. Legislative Redistricting. (a) Legislative and Representative Districts shall be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population. (b) In the year following each Federal decennial census year, the General Assembly by law shall redistrict the Legislative and Representative Districts. If no redistricting plan becomes effective by June 30 of that year, a Legislative Redistricting Commission shall be constituted not later than July 10. The Commission shall consist of eight members, no more than four of whom shall be members of the same political party. The Speaker and Minority Leader of the House of Representatives shall each appoint to the Commission one Representative and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly. The President and Minority Leader of the Senate shall each appoint to the Commission one Senator and one person who is not a member of the General Assembly. The members shall be certified to the Secretary of State by the appointing authorities. A vacancy on the Commission shall be filled within five days by the authority that made the original appointment. A Chairman or Vice Chairman shall be chosen by a majority of all members of the Commission. Not later than August 10, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members. If the Commission fails to file an approved redistricting plan, the Supreme Court shall submit the names of two persons, not of the same political party, to the Secretary of State not later than September 1. Not later than September 5, the Secretary of State publicly shall draw by random selection of the name of one of the two persons to serve as the ninth member of the Commission. Not later than October 5, the Commission shall file with the Secretary of State a redistricting plan approved by at least five members. An approved redistricting plan filed with the Secretary of



State shall be presumed valid, shall have the force and effect of law and shall be published promptly by the Secretary of State. The Supreme Court shall have original and exclusive jurisdiction over actions concerning re-districting the House and Senate, which shall be initiated in the name of the People of the State by the Attorney General. Schedule. This Amendment to the Constitution, if approved by the electors at the general election in November, 1974, becomes effective January 1 of the year following the next Federal decennial census year. First Reading of the Resolution."

Speaker Telcser: "Messages from the Senate."

Clerk Selcke: "A message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I'm directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has adopted the following Preamble and Joint Resolution... in the adoption of which I'm instructed to ask concurrence of the House of Representatives to wit; Senate Joint Resolution #44, adopted by the Senate June 20, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary. A message from the Senate by Mr. Fernandes, Secretary. Mr. Speaker, I'm directed to inform the House of Representatives that the Senate has concurred with the House in the adoption of the following Preamble and Joint Resolution to wit; House Joint Resolution #53, concurred in by the Senate June 20, 1973. Edward E. Fernandes, Secretary."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Simms, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Simms: "Mr. Speaker, the House is in Session, correct?"

Speaker Telcser: "That's correct, Sir."

Simms: "Ah.. then ah.. I would suggest to the Chair that he might have the doorkeepers clear the floor of the House and of the ah... aisles ah.. of the people that are unauthorized to have excess to the floor of the House. We have people in the side of the Chambers ah.. that are



lobbyists. And there are people on the floor of the House that have no business ah... and are in violation of the House rules."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, I had announced previously that ah... people who are on the floor and are not entitled to be on the floor ah.. should please remove themselves. If necessary ah... the doorkeeper will assist us in doing that. O'key now ah.. the Clerk informs me ah.. he has an announcement to the Members ah.. in reference to their mail. So if the Members will please pay attention ah.. the Clerk has an message which will be of importance to you."

Clerk Selcke: "I'll read this litte memorandum from the Speaker's Office and ah...this ah.. piece of paper can be picked up at the ah.. post office ah... the House Post Office. And it has to do with the handling of your mail after ah.. hopefully we adjourn here on June 30th. To all House Members. Subject: The handling of personal correspondence. As we approach the end of this Legislative Session, each of you should indicate to the House Post Office where you wish your personal correspondence to be delivered following our adjournment. You should indicate if you want your secretary to pick up your mail or for it to be forwarded to your address in your district. If you prefer the later course, you should indicate to the Post Office the specific address to which you want the mail forwarded. Your prompt attention of this matter will insure the proper handling of your correspondence as you desire. First Class mail only may be forwarded. Second and Third will have to be left here or picked up by your secretary. The form is at the Post Office and if you go there ah... you can pick it up and indicate on the bottom how you want your mail handled. The Postmaster and Postmistress will appreciate your cooperation."



Speaker Telcser: "Representative Cunningham, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, I wanted to inquire about the Constitutional Amendment that was just read by the Clerk a minute ago ah... #26 I believe it was. We've already passed and acted on three proposed Amendments that would exhaust the quota under the Constitution. We're only permitted to ah... recommend three Articles be amended, isn't that correct?"

Speaker Telcser: "Well, without consulting the Constitution ah..."

Cunningham: "Well, your lawyer is there with you."

Speaker Telcser: "My memory seems to indicate that you are right on your point, Sir."

Cunningham: "Well, are we not exempt from considering other Articles after we have exhausted our ah... the three that the Constitution permits to be ah.. submitted to the voters ah... the three Articles? Those that have been submitted have been the Judiciary, Elections and Executive."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, Representative Cunningham, the Resolution will be lying on the Speaker's Table. Ah... I don't believe that it is going to be acted upon for a while ah.. at least that's what the Sponsor seems to indicate... ah... he's shaking his head yes."

Cunningham: "Well, what does the Parliamentary rule as to what would be applicable?"

Speaker Telcser: "The Parliamentary informs me that she never rules ah... that her advice is a very confidential client ah.. client-lawyer relationship."

Cunningham: "With what... a confidential?"

Speaker Telcser: "And since it's so confidential ah.. I can't make the ruling."

Cunningham: "But we've set a bad precedent in ah... when we violate the Constitution. And the Constitutional provision is quite clear on that matter."





Speaker Telcser: "Well, I don't think that we've violated the Constitution, Sir ah.. simply because we have not passed the Resolution. And therefore, ah.. increasing the ah.. number of Amendments ah.. which will be on the ballot ah.. greater than the three which you described. And I think that the Gentleman has the right to introduce the Amendment and it will now repose on the Speaker's Table until some further action is taken upon it ah.. if any at all."

Cunningham: "The inquiry was academic and non-personal."

Speaker Telcser: "I understand that, Sir. The Gentleman from Cook ah.. Representative J.J. Wolf ah.. did you wish to make a motion, Sir ah.. on some posting of some Bills ah.. that I believe are agreed?"

Wolf: "Yes, Mr. Speaker, we ah.. I would ask that we suspend the provisions of Rule 18 a, b and c so that House Bill 883 can be heard in the Veteran Affairs ah.. Personnel and Pension Committee today, for the purpose of reassigning it to the Interim Study Committee."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Choate, did you seek recognition? The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "What ah... what was that request, Mr. Speaker?"

Wolf: "House Bill 883, which has been taken from the order of the Calendar and ah... referred back to the Veteran's Personnel and Pension Committee so we can send it to the Interim Study Committee."

Choate: "O'kay."

Speaker Telcser: "O'kay, ah... the Gentleman has moved for the suspension of the provisions of Rule 18 a, b, and c for the purposes of having those Bills which he inumerated ah... re-referred to the Committee on Pensions and Personnel for the purpose of being put in the Interim Study Committee. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On



this question there are 142 'ayes' and 1 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn with respect to a motion."

Washburn: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would ask leave of every Member of this Body to post two Bills in the Appropriations Committee tomorrow.... for tomorrow. Ah.. they are House Bills 1979 and 1980. Now there are the two Bills that our distinguished Minority Leader ah.. made a motion on yesterday. And through an error in judgement on my part ah..I opposed his motion and as a result it was defeated. These are House Bills. We only have a few days remaining in this Session. They must be set. They are complicated Bills. We want to have them posted even though the staff studies are not completed, but they will be ready to be heard when the staff studies are completed and the Membership has time to review those ah.. recommendations. So I ask leave of every Member to ah.. suspend Rule 18 so that these Bills can be posted ah.. appropriately."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Totten."

Totten: "The ah.. the number of the second Bill number was 1980? Is that an Appropriation Bill?"

Washburn: "House Bills 1970 and 1980 have been referred to the Appropriations Committee."

Totten: "Is that a re-referral?"

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Mr. Speaker, 1980 ah.. is ah.. posted or was posted in Transportation yesterday and was heard there. I appeared on behalf of that Bill and had been assured by the Chairman ah... I couldn't get that Bill out of Transportation yesterday. 1980 is a Bill to provide aid or local mass transit for reduced fares for the elderly and school children. That Bill was in Mr. Neff's Transporta-



tion Committee."

Washburn: "Apparently I've made another error. I was under the impression that both of these Bills had been assigned to the Appropriations Committee. If one of them hasn't been, then I'm certain that House Bill 1979 has been and so I ask leave to have the appropriate rule suspended."

Shea: "1981, Bud..... that's ah..."

Washburn: "Now just a minute. Let's take care of House Bill 1979 first, if you would."

Shea: "O'kay, ah.. can I ask you a question with regards to House Bill 1981?"

Washburn: "Ah.... would you hold off on that? I'll ask recognition at a later time."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "If the Gentleman wishes to exceed to the motion that I made yesterday, which evidently he does, it was 1979 and 1981."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Mr. Speaker, I'd be most happy to because ah... at a later time today when ah.. the staff has prepared another list ah.. I'm certain that House Bill 1981 will appear on it so I will include 1981 in the motion with 1979."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved for the suspension of the provisions of Rule 18 for the pur.... the Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "Mr. Speaker, in as much as House Bill 1980 was mentioned here ah... would Mr. Neff tell us where the money is at to reimburse these transportation companies throughout the State of Illinois for half fare for the students and the elderly?"

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Giorgi, that inquiry is not noted right now. The Gentleman from Grundy, Repre-



sentative Washburn has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 18 for the purpose of hearing House Bill 1979 and House Bill 1981 in the Appropriations Committee. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye' and those opposed by voting 'no'. It will take 107 votes. The Gentleman from Winnebago, Representative Giorgi."

Giorgi: "I know that the ah.. someone has the power to comprehensively move Bills from one Committee to another and ah.. I think Mr. Washburn probably was instructed to listen to House Bill 1980 in the Appropriations Committee and I'm trying to follow this up. I know someone has the power to shift the Bills around because ah.. our rules aren't the best in the world."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from DuPage, ah... Mr. Schneider, do you have a question, Sir?"

Schneider: "No, I'm waiting to make a similar motion."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Take the record. On this question there are 153 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Adams, Representative McClain."

McClain: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd ask leave to post House Resolution 407 and to ah.. suspend the appropriate rules ah.. so that it may be posted and heard in the Executive Committee tomorrow."

Speaker Telcser: "Is there any discussion? The Gentleman has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 18 for the purpose of hearing House Resolution 407 in the Executive Committee tomorrow. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 128 'ayes' and 1 'nay' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from DuPage, Representative Schneider."

Schneider: "I ask leave also, Mr. Speaker and Members of



the House, to post House Resolution 199 so that it may be heard in Executive tomorrow. I have cleared this with both sides of the aisle and the Chairman."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved for the suspension of the provisions of Rule 18 for the purposes of hearing House Resolution 199 in the Executive Committee tomorrow. All in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'no'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 141 'ayes' and 2 'nays' and the motion prevails. The Lady from Lake, Representative Geo-Karis."

Geo-Karis: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I respectfully request the suspension of the appropriate rule so that Senate Bills 280 and 1094 may be posted and heard in Executive Committee tomorrow. I've checked with the Minority Leader and I've checked with Mr. Choate and also with the ah... Chairman of the Executive Committee, Mr. Collins and I've received their o'kay."

Speaker Telcser: "The Lady has moved that the provisions of Rule 18 for the purposes of hearing Senate Bills 218 and 1094 in Committee this week. All in favor of the Lady's motion signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'no'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 131 'ayes' and 1 'nay' and the Lady's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Johnson, Representative McCormick."

McCormick: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to move that Rule 18 be suspended so that ah.. Senate Bill 154 can be heard in Executive tomorrow."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved for the suspension of the provisions of Rule 18 for the purpose of having Senate Bill 154 be heard tomorrow in Executive Committee. All in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 134



'ayes' and 1 'nay' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Clinton, Representative Harpstrite."

Harpstrite: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to suspend the rules to have some Senate Bills in the Agricultural Resources Committee. The numbers are Senate Bill 770, Senate Bill 645, Senate Bill 928, Senate Bill 995, Senate Bill 855, and Senate Bill 1057."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved for the provis... for the suspension of the provisions of Rule 18 for the purposes of hearing in the House Agriculture Committee ah... the Bills which ah... the Gentleman from Vermilion, Representative Craig."

Craig: "That was House Bill 1057 ah.. yes. House Bill 1057."

Speaker Telcser: "For the purpose of hearing those Bills in the Agriculture Committee ah... tomorrow. All in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. Have all voted who wish? It takes 107 votes. Take the record. On this question there are 126 'ayes' and 1 'nay' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Douglas."

Douglas: "Mr. Speaker, I'd like to move to suspend to the provisions of House Rule 18 so that House Resolution 421 submitted about 10 days ago and assigned to the Executive Committee ah.. can be heard there tomorrow."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman's motion is to move for the suspension of Rule 18 for the purpose of hearing House Resolution 421 in the Executive Committee tomorrow. All in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 121 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I would like to request concent of the House for a recess of 30 minutes for the purpose of a Democratic Conference."



Speaker Telcser: "O'kay, ah.. the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker, I just want to say that it is not the intention of the Republican Party to have a conference. Ah... we can have a sandwich instead, but we do intend to postpone Committees that were scheduled for this afternoon to tomorrow morning. So the ah.. we will try and determine what rooms are available and ah.. we will let you know when you return here to what rooms the Committees will be assigned tomorrow morning. The 2:00 Committees will convene at 8:30. The 4:00 Committees will convene at 10:30 and we will go into Session tomorrow at noon."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, the Gentleman has moved the House stand in recess for the period of one half ah.... Representative Washburn, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Washburn: "I rise to make another motion, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, we'll be back at 6:00, Representative Washburn. The Gentleman from Union, Representative Choate."

Choate: "Mr. Speaker, I would appreciate the Democratic Members coming to Room M-5 immediately because ah... I only requested a 30 minute conference and the House does need to get back in Session to do the business that we're here to conduct. So I would appreciate them promptly coming to Room M-5."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, the Gentleman's motion prevails and the House stands in recess for the period of one half an hour. I've been informed that there are witnesses sitting in Committee Rooms waiting to testify. If the Chairmen of those Committees want to get a hold of their secretaries to go to the various Committee Rooms and inform the witnesses that we won't be needing them until tomorrow morning."

Cunningham: "Ah... maybe we could have a few words from Ms.



Geo-Karis. Is this thing going? Ah... this is an opportunity. I mean if you have a few words to give to your constituents ah.. why let's not miss it."

Speaker Telcser: "The House will come to order. This is what Walker did to me and your Conference died. Not too quick. All right, now ah.. I have a couple of Members who wish to put motions ah... will the people who are on the floor who are not authorized to be on the floor, ah.. please remove themselves. Ah.. with respect to a motion ah.. the Gentleman from Kankakee, Representative Ryan ah.. I understand has an Agreed Motion."

Ryan: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to have ah... leave of the House to suspend the appropriate rules to ah.. move Senate Bill 928 to the order of Second Reading. Now ah... I've talked to the Leadership on both sides of the aisle and they're in agreement with this. This Bill is the same as House Bill 1498 that's been through this Chamber and is now in the Senate. I would ah..."

Speaker Telcser: "Would the Clerk please read Senate Bill 928 a first time ah... first and then ah.. has it been read a first time? Has it been read a first time, Representative?"

Ryan: "All I want to do is bypass Committee on this."

Speaker Telcser: "But it has been read a first time? All right, the Gentleman has moved to suspend the provisions of Rule 31 for the purpose of moving Senate Bill 928 to the order of Second without reference. All in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'nay'. This takes 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 122 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. Now the Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn with respect to a motion."

Washburn: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would ask leave again of the ah... of the House to





suspend Rule 18 for the purpose of posting the following Bills in the Appropriations Committee. House Bill 1307, 1308, 1309, 1310, 1142, 1927. Senate Bills 142, 297, 299, 459, 460, 461, 511, 783, 803, 832, 906, 908, 909, 923, 1001, 1024, 1107, 1108, 1109 and 1162, Mr. Speaker."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman has moved for the suspension of the provisions of Rule 18 for the purposes of hearing the Bills which ah.. were just announced in the Appropriations Committee. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'no'. This will take 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. Representative Merlo, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Merlo: "Mr. Speaker, I wonder if Representative Washburn could tell us the day and the time and the room?"

Washburn: "I could tell you the time, but I don't believe the room have been announced yet..... the time is 8:30."

Merlo: "Is that for tomorrow, Representative Washburn?"

Washburn: "Yes, Sir."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, Representative Walsh will make an announcement ah... about where the Committee's are going to be held. Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 135 'ayes' and no 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion prevails. Representative Washburn, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Washburn: "Now, Mr. Speaker, on ah.. on the original list, I omitted two Bills because there were objections to having the motion ah... or the ah.. rule suspended. So now I would like to make the same motion for Senate Bill 181 and Senate Bill 182 so that they can be posted in the Appropriations Committee tomorrow. Senate Bills 181 and 182."

Speaker Telcser: "O'kay, ah.. the Gentleman from McHenry, Representative Hanahan."

Hanahan: "Yes, I'd object to the hearing of Senate Bills



181 and 182 out of order. And the reason why I objected ah.. Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, is that these Bills have come over to the House on May 2nd. Ah...and they've been floating around the House for a long time. They're anti-labor Bills and they've been sited as such. There are a lot of Members of the House that are opposed to these Bills. And I think to give them any unusual or any other kind of consideration than the normal consideration of an anti-labor Bill, such as Senate Bill 182 and 181 is ah... that ah.. I think that we have enough time left that ah.. at the end of the Session, we would want to hear the Bills in Committee. We have a big enough workload in the Appropriation Committee ah.. so that we'll give these consideration in due course of the seven day notice. So I object to the provisions of the Rule 18 to be suspended to hear these two Bills in any order than the normal order."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "Well, ah... these Bills have been here for quite some time, but ah... I think that it's been the intention to set them. It hasn't been any oversight on anybody's part. The Sponsor has been in contact with me and asked that they be set. Certainly, we will have ample time to hear them. Hopefully we will, but I think in all fairness to the Sponsor ah.. he should have the opportunity to reply to this objection. And the Sponsor of both of these Bills is Representative Tuerk. I would ah.. I would ask that Representative Hanahan's objections be overruled, but ah.. I yield to Representative Tuerk ah.. with your permission."

Spekaer Telcser: "The Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Tuerk."

Tuerk: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, when one of the previous speakers ah... characterized these Bills as being laying around for quite some time; he just doesn't



know the facts of the case. The facts of the case are that they've been in the House, but they've just cleared the House...."

Speaker Telcser: "One moment, please. Representative Matijeich, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Matijeich: "Mr. Speaker, I think that this discussion is out of order. The man has objected to leave and now someone must make a motion, that's all there is to it. And then it's going to need 107 votes."

Speaker Telcser: "Since Representative Tuerk is the principle Sponsor ah.. he's indicated that he wants to comment."

Tuerk: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Members of the House, these Bills just cleared the Industrial Affairs Committee last Wednesday... at a late hour and I've given the Appropriations Committee sufficient notice to post these for a hearing. And ah.. I think that the Gentleman's motion ah.. or objection is rather ludicrous that he would want to block the posting of these Bills for a hearing. Now if he wants to oppose the Bills ah..he can try to oppose them and beat them in Committee. Or better still, ah... if he wants to oppose them on the floor, but to block the hearing of these Bills or at least the posting of Bills is absolutely ludicrous in my mind. And I would ask for a favorable vote."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, now ah.. does someone wish to put a motion? The Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn."

Washburn: "I made the motion that ah... that Rule 18 be suspended so that these two Bills could be heard. And then Representative Hanahan raised objection to the motion "

Speaker Telcser: "All right, the Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn has moved that the provisions of Rule 18 be suspended for the purposes of hearing Senate Bills 181 and 182 in the Appropriations Committee ah... without the six and one half day posting notice. All those



in favor of the Gentleman's motion signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'no' and this will take 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? Take.... the Gentleman from Cook, Representative Juckett."

Juckett: "Mr. Speaker, I don't think any notice is required under Rule 18 (d). This is the week preceding June 30th and this ah.... No posting is required for this week. All it takes is an announcement on the floor on the Bill."

Speaker Telcser: "Take it easy, fellows. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would just like to remind the Speaker of his decision as of yesterday and also ah.. you know, when the same accomodation that was trying to be made for Representative Choate's Bill and ah.. I think it was corrected today, but ah..."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, ah.."

Lechoiwicz: "To be uniform ah... you mentioned the fact that the rules be suspended for last week, but not this week."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, Representative Lechowicz, the discussion we had yesterday, of course, has no relevance to the ah.. point of parliamentary inquiry that Representative Juckett has made. The point to which the Gentleman eludes ah... are the rules that set out that one week ah.. prior to the end of the Session ah... ah... that posting notices are not necessary. However, that week starts on Saturday, the 23rd of June, ah.. no now. Representative Juckett, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Juckett: "The rule says no notice by posting is required for any meeting held in the week preceding ah.. June 30th."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, the week preceeding ah..."

Juckett: "And this is the week preceeding June 30th."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Juckett, as much as the Chair would like ah.. very much to rule with you; ah.. I'm compelled ah... to assume that the week preceding begins on June 23rd ah.. maybe 22nd, but today is the



20th. I'm stuck. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I would implore my good friend, Representative Hanahan, to withdraw his objection to this motion. This is a courtesy that has been shown to every Member on both sides of the aisle. As I was saying, Mr. Speaker, this is a courtesy that is shown to Members irrespective of the contents of the Bill and it .... it comes in bad grace ah.. really to object to something because of content. The content will be discussed and debated in the Committee Hearing. Now unfortunately these things have a way of becoming partisan. It takes 89 votes to do anything here and nobody has got 89 votes. So if you don't give Mr. Tuerk this courtesy, then unquestionably there will be retribution on a Bill that you're interested in that you want to post because the Lord knows that there are a lot them. So I would hope that ah.. my good friend Tom Hanahan would withdraw his objection and ah.. permit the Bills to be posted for hearing this week."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Kane, Representative Hill."

Hill: "Mr. Speaker, ah.. I want to congratulate the Gentleman on the other side of the aisle. That's exactly what Clyde Choate gave yesterday. And he copied it word for word."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Grundy, Representative Washburn to explain his vote."

Washburn: "I was seeking recognition, Mr. Speaker, ah.... seldom do I take issue with our Majority Leader and I'm not taking issue with his stand on this proposal, but I do take issue with the statement that Representative Hill just pointed out."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record. On this question there are 64 'ayes' and 21 'nays' and



the Gentleman's motion fails. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Capuzi."

Capuzi: "Ah... Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, I'd like to suspend the appropriate rule so that Senate Bill 582 may be heard in the Committee of Human Resources tomorrow morning at 10:30. The Leadership on both sides of the aisle have agreed to it and they think it's o'kay."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman moves that the appropriate ah... the provisions of Rule 18 be suspended for the purpose of hearing Senate Bill 582 in Human Resources tomorrow. All those in favor signify by voting 'aye' and the opposed by voting 'no'. This will take 107 votes. Have all voted who wish? The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Walsh."

Walsh: "May I ask the Chairman who the principle Sponsor of this is?"

Capuzi: "Partee, ah.. I'm not sure."

Walsh: "And the House Sponsor?"

Capuzi: "Ah.. Ray Ewell."

Walsh: "Well, it seems to me that they are two Democrats. I don't see any ah.... aren't they?"

Capuzi: "Ya, but ah..."

Walsh: "Aren't Partee and Ewell?"

Capuzi: "Ya, but it was my understanding that it was cleared with the Leadership on both sides of the aisle."

Walsh: "It hasn't been cleared with me. I haven't heard anything about it, Louie and I certainly would have no objection ah... whatever in doing this for you, however, I don't see why ah... in view of what's just happened to our good friend, Representative Fred Tuerk; ah.. I don't see why on earth we should support the Democrats the opportunity to have their Bills posted and heard on short notice. I don't even know what this Bill does."



I haven't even looked at it and I would like an opportunity to look at it and I would hope that my Republican colleagues would support me in opposing the Gentleman's motion."

Speaker Telcser: "Have all voted who wish? Take the record.

On this question there are 87 'ayes' and 27 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion fails. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Ewell, for what purpose do you rise?"

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen, I think that reason rather than passion ought to prevail. We can talk of retributions and keeping books, but I think that this is a bad and very serious thing. It's a very simple Bill that ah... needs just a few more votes and ah.. may I suggest that the first step toward reason and passion is consideration. And if we can find in our hearts to be considerate of each other, perhaps these things will bear fruit. And instead of saying ah... what buildings do we destroy? Let us say what trees can be planted? Is it possible that ah.. after a few explanations that we might get a few more votes?"

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, ah.... the Gentleman from Lake, Representative Murphy."

Murphy: "Mr. Speaker, I ah.. move that we move the provisions of Rule 18 as ah... for House Bill 182 and 181 can all be heard in Committee tomorrow morning."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, do you want to take that motion? Is there anything ah... o'okay. On this question there are 87 'ayes' and 27 'nays' and the Gentleman's motion fails. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Well, are we..... ah... are on the motion....."

Speaker Telcser: "Well, ah.. I hadn't announced ah... all right, now ah.. the Gentleman from Lake, Representative Murphy ah.. has moved that the provisions of Rule 18 be suspended for the purposes of ah... Representative Hanahan for what purpose do your rise, Sir?"

Hanahan: "I would like to amend the motion pursuant to Rule 62 (d). I move to divide the question by striking out



Senate Bill 181 and 182 from the original question. I believe it takes a simply majority for that motion to carry."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Lake, Representative Murphy."

Murphy: "I withdraw my request."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, the Gentleman has withdrawn his motion. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I was just going to endorse the motion that the Gentleman made. I do not endorse the observation that Mr. Hanahan just made, but I would like to get some support from my good friend, Representative Ewell for ah... posting the Bills that Fred Tuerk is Sponsor of, 182 and 183, is that correct? I think if we got that ah.. we'd be able to accomodate everyone."

Speaker Telcser: "Representative Hanahan, for what purpose do you rise?"

Hanahan: "Mr. Speaker, when I moved ah.. and objected to Senate Bills 182 and 183 ah.. I knew what the Bills were. I explained to the House that they were anti-labor Bills. Bills that were ah.. barely squeaked out of Industrial Labor Affairs Committee. And Bills that should be killed and probably will be killed. And we have witnesses that want to come down next week and testify against those Bills... that cannot just come down tomorrow morning to be heard at will ah... of ah.. of the Chairman of the Committee. I did not just easily move to object because I think courtesy should be extended in most cases, but by objecting to Representative Ewell's Bill ah.. without even knowing what the Bill is ah.. I think is not courteous and it's certainly not in line with the same thing that I had done.... and notified Representative Tuerk.... notified Representative Washburn previous to my motion to object to them being posted."





Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Committees tomorrow morning, as announced, will be in the room as posted on the Calendar now and I move that the House adjourn until 12:00 noon tomorrow."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Shea."

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, House Bill 582 has to do with the requirements for a Department Director and the Governor's choice for that department. If that Bill isn't heard tomorrow in Human Resources, there's a good chance that it won't come out in time to be confirmed by the Senate. So I just ah... again would ask Mr. Walsh if he wouldn't support House Bill 582."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, will the Republican Members of the House Appropriations Committee meet in the Speaker's Office at 8:00 tomorrow morning and I renew my motion to adjourn."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Lechowicz."

Lechowicz: "Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Will the Majority Leader inform the Appropriations Committee ah... where ah.. what room we are going to have available to us. I know the time is 8:30, but where?"

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "The Committee Meetings tomorrow morning will be in the rooms that are on the Calendar today for today's Committee Meetings. I believe Appropriations is in Room 212? A-1 ah.. well, if it's A-1 on the Calendar, then it's A-1 tomorrow morning ah.. as is every other Committee that ah.. is in the room that is posted on the Calendar today."



Lechowicz: "The whole point is that it's not on the Calendar ah... it was posted for yesterday. And ah.. we're supposed to meet again today ah... and try to get the work done. Unfortunately, with the delay of the House this afternoon, ah.. that's impossible. I'm looking for a room to meet in tomorrow morning at 8:30."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, while they're looking for that room ah.. let's see ah.. Representative Shea, for what purpose do you rise?"

Shea: "Well, Mr. Speaker, just to clarify a question of some Members on this side of the aisle had. The Wednesday Committee Meetings will ah... the Wednesday Committee Meetings that were scheduled at 2:00 and 4:00 today will meet at 8:30 and 10:30 tomorrow morning. The regular 2:00 Committee Meetings for tomorrow will meet at 2:00 and the regular 4:00 Committee Meetings for tomorrow will meet at 4:00. Is that right? Is that correct, Mr. Majority Leader?"

Walsh: "That's correct as of now... right."

Speaker Telcser: "All right, the Gentleman from Peoria, Representative Tuerk, for what reason do you rise, Sir?"

Tuerk: "Well, Mr. Speaker, ah.. for the purpose of a parliamentary inquiry."

Speaker Telcser: "State your point."

Tuerk: "Senate Bills 181 and 182 ah.. the motion that the Appropriation's Chairman made ah.. did not prevail. I ask you now, ah.. under the conditions of the rules of the House when will these Bills be posted?"

Speaker Telcser: "Well, we'll have to consult with the Chairman of the Appropriations to see when the Committee will be meeting ah.. well, ah.. if the Committee meets next week, Representative Tuerk, under the rule which Representative Juckett cited, ah.. the Bills can be heard without a six and a half day notice ah.. or whatever the rule provides for.... because the 23rd starts the last



week proceeding June 30th. All right, the Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "The Appropriations Committee will meet tomorrow morning in Room A-1."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman ah... one moment now, ah... The Gentleman from Cook, Representative Capuzi."

Capuzi: "Mr. Speaker, where will the Committee on Human Resources meet, ah.. C-1? And Insurance?"

Walsh: "They will meet in the rooms on the Calendar. The rooms that are on the Calendar for those Committee Meetings today that are being postponed until tomorrow morning at 8:30..... and ah.. 10:30."

Capuzi: "O'kay, thanks."

Speaker Telcser: "The Gentleman from Cook, ah.. Representative ah... from Lawrence, Representative Cunningham."

Cunningham: "Mr. Speaker, what ever happened to House Bill 634, which was called to concurrence an hour or so ago. I never heard the Speaker make any ruling. Did our Leadership cop-out or did the other side cop-out on tax relief?"

Speaker Telcser: "I'm sure ah.... if you check the recording ah.. the transcript of today ah.. you'll find that you are in error, Sir. That Bill was not called nor considered today."

Cunningham: "Do we expect it tomorrow?"

Speaker Telcser: "Well, I don't know that we can predict what to expect at any time, Sir. We're going to hope for it. County and Townships, I'm told, will meet at 9:00 tomorrow instead of 8:30. The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "I move we adjourn, Mr. Speaker, until....."

Speaker Telcser: "Wait a minute, ah.. Representative Ewell, for what purpose do you rise, Sir?"

Ewell: "Mr. Speaker, a point of information."

Speaker Telcser: "State your point."



Ewell: "I have here a motion that I was putting in and I just wanted it to get in ah.... here ah.. it's already signed. It's a motion which I'm asking the Clerk to receive so that it will be received today and I just wanted Mr. Walsh to give me a minute to get it up there. It's up there now."

Speaker Telcser: "O'kay. The Gentleman from Cook, Representative William Walsh moves the House stands adjourn until the hour of 12:00 tomorrow for Regular Session. 12:00 noon, is that right, Bill?"

Walsh: "Ya."

Speaker Telcser: "All in favor signify by saying 'aye' and the opposed 'no' and the House stands adjourned."
