

Clerk Selcke: "Any Member that doesn't have his desk key or has his desk locked and cannot open it, contact Rodney, or Everett Riker..... say, 'Hi Mom'... just say it."

Unknown Child: "Hi Mom."

Speaker Blair: "The House will be in order, the invocation will be by the House Chaplain, Dr. Johnson."

Dr. Johnson: "Shall we pray. Blessed Your name O God because You continue to be the refuge and strength of all who call upon You. Be with us as we are gathered in this Legislative Hall to be about those tasks designated for this and succeeding Session. Guide us that we may rightly keep and find wisdom which will enable us to respect soberly and to make judgments properly. Lead us by Your spirit to walk in Your way, so what we do and say may secure Your favor and be pleasing before You. Remind us especially, O God, that we live under Your care and under Your concern, when we confidently commit Our way to You, if we have found disappointment in our own plans, help us to seek and understand Your way for us. If we have found success in our plans, add Your blessing that our service may secure from You that word of approval, well done good and faithful servant. May this valedictory, in fact, be comfort to all who have served You here and to all who will continue to serve You here. Thank you, for hearing us Lord, according to Your promise. Amen."

Speaker Blair: "Congratulations. Pick up the adjournment Resolution."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution.... House Joint Resolution #113. Resolved, by the House of Representatives of the 78th General Assembly of the State of Illinois, the Senate concurring herein, that when the two Houses adjourn on Friday, November 8, 1974, they stand adjourned until Wednesday, November 20, 1974, at 12:00 o'clock noon."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker and Members of the House. House Joint Senate Resolution #113, is the Adjournment Resolution, we will be in Session today, tomorrow it will be a perfunct, we would then adjourn until Wednesday, November 20, at the hour of noon. Now, Mr. Speaker, I do move that the House adopt.... House Joint Resolution #113."

Speaker Blair: "Is there any discussion? Mr. Shea, did you hear that? It's the Adjournment Resolution... it says, when we adjourn tomorrow... which will be a perfunct, we will be coming back on the 20th, at noon."

Shea: "At noon, right."

Speaker Blair: "At noon. All right, all those in favor of the adoption of the Resolution say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and the Resolution is adopted."

Clerk Selcke: "Has everybody gotten on the attendance Roll Call or is your doors... all right, we'll keep it open until you get your desks unlocked."

Clerk Selcke: "Could I have your attention, please. We have up at the Clerk's rostrum, the necessary motion forms... if any of you individuals want to make motions relative to the vetoes. If you have an idea of trying to move on a veto, please come up here and we will give you the necessary motion form which you can fill out and file."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Clerk is going to take the Roll and if you're not on it would you please come up to



Clerk's desk and indicate that you're here because some of the switches are not opened."

Speaker Blair: "Introductions."

Clerk Selcke: "House Resolution 1166, Hyde. House Resolution 1167, Kelly. House Resolution 1168, Kelly. House Resolution 1169, Hyde. House Resolution 1170, Blair, et al. House Resolution 1171, DiPrima, et al."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the... did you explain those? The Agreed Resolutions. Mr. Telcser."

Telcser: "Mr. Speaker, Members of the House. House Resolution 1166, commends the Hundred Club of Cook County. House Resolution 1167, congratulates the Tinley Park Lions Club. 1168, congratulates Mr. and Mrs. Harry P. Hagedorn in celebration of their 40th wedding anniversary. House Resolution 1169, commends Charles S. Zaba. House Resolution 1171, commends the Greek Independent Voters of Illinois and the Congress of the American Hellenic Organizations of Illinois. And, House Resolution 1170, is a Death Resolution for Gary Olson, who is a member of our staff. Mr. Speaker, I do now move that the House adopts the Agreed Resolutions."

Speaker Blair: "All right, any questions on the Agreed Resolutions? All those in favor of the adoption say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have and the Agreed Resolutions are adopted."

Speaker Blair: "Introductions, First Reading."

Clerk Selcke: "House Bill 2909, Ebbesen, et al. Amends line item in fiscal year 1975, appropriations of: Capital Development Board at Northern Illinois University. First Reading of the Bill. Correction, 2906."

Speaker Blair: "The Gentleman from Livingston, Mr. Hunsicker."

Hunsicker: "Mr. Speaker, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Members of the House for the beautiful floral piece that was sent for my wife's funeral yesterday. Your words of sympathy and thoughtfulness are



deeply appreciated. Thank you."

Speaker Blair: "All right, if we could have a little order....

The Gentleman from Cook, Mr. William Walsh."

Walsh: "Mr. Speaker, I move that the House stand in recess, until immediately after the dedication ceremony which will commence at 1:00."

Speaker Blair: "All right, the Gentleman has moved that the House be in recess until immediately following the dedication of the renovation of the Chamber... which will take place at 1:00 o'clock, we're expecting the Governor and the other elected officials to be here at that time and we've asked Mr. Clabaugh, the Dean of the House to serve as the master of ceremonies of the dedication at 1, that shouldn't take longer than about 15 minutes.... or 20 minutes and then we'll be back in Session, I would think... by not later than 1:30. All the Gentleman has moved that the House be in recess until immediately following the dedication ceremony which will take place starting at 1:00 o'clock. All those in favor of the Gentlemans motion will say 'aye', opposed 'no'. The 'ayes' have it and we'll be in recess then until immediately following the dedication. The dedication ceremony will start at 1 P.M., here on the House floor. It should take approximately 15 or 20 minutes."

Clerk Selcke: "Could I have your attention, please... could I have your attention, please. Will you please take your seats, we're just about ready to start the ceremony and the distinguished guests will be coming right away. So, if you will please get out of the center aisle so they can get through... sit down..."

Unknown: "All you Gentlemen that is in this center aisle, will you please clear it so, we can bring the people in... so they can have their seats and take your seats



please. Thank you."

Clerk Selcke: "Would you please be seated now and we'll start with our festivities right away."

Speaker Clabaugh: "The House will please come to order... and we'll have the prayer invocations by the House Chaplain, Dr. Johnson."

Dr. Johnson: "Shall we pray. O Mighty God, our returnal and ever gracious father, You have laid the foundations of this world in which we live. In Your all wise providence You have ordained the nations and the government under which we live. In Your mercy You have been especially good to the land, the institutions and above all the people of this state. We thank You, this day for the ordinances of the civil government under which our institutions have prevailed and our people have prospered. We recognize this day with thansgiving and praise the many years of blessings You have bestowed upon this particular chamber, for the men and women who have served as Members of this House of Representatives, for those who have served in positions of leadership and trust, for those who have spent themselves on behalf of their people, for those who have brought honor upon themselves because they honored You and their calling. For those whose Bills became law and which have brought justice, good will tranquility, and freedom to the people of Illinois and for those who now serve, we give You our thanks O Lord, and say in the words of the sonnet, all Your work shall praise You O Lord, that our mouths speak Your praise and that all people bless Your Holy Name forever. And now, O God, bless the United States of America, O God bless this Our commonwealth of Illinois, through Jesus Christ, Our Lord. Amen."

Speaker Clabaugh: "We have several honored guests, public officials of Illinois.... you Democrats ought to be glad enough to be quiet and the Republicans sad enough



to be quiet for a few minutes... first I want to present the Lieutenant Governor of Illinois, the Honorable Neil Hartigan... Mr. Norb Johnson, representing the Secretary of State, Mike Howlett. Honorable George Lindburg, the Comtroller of Illinois. The Honorable Michael Bakalis, Superintendant of Public Instruction. The Honorable Robert Cronson, the Auditor General of Illinois. The Honorable Justin Taft, Clerk of the Supreme Court of Illinois. And, it is my privilege at this time to present to you, the First Lady... First Lady of Illinois, Mrs. Roberta Walker. And, Mr. Speaker, because I want things to be peaceful at my home from now on, I will present to you my second Lady of Illinois, Lou Clabaugh. And, now Ladies and Gentlemen and Members of the House and guest, I want to present the Honorable Dan Walker, Governor of Illinois. overnor."

Governor Walker: "Thank you very much. Representaitve Clabaugh, Mr. Speaker, Mr. President, Mr. Chief Justice, distinguished officials, honorable Members of the House and the Senate, Ladies and Gentlemen. As we look around the Chamber, we are here today to rededicate... I think a lot of us are really thinking about years of long past and the years ahead. History has been made right here in this Chamber. Many speakers of note have presided here. Lawrence Y. Sherman, who went on to become an illustrious United States Senator, Elijah Haines, the Leader at the 1870 Constitutional Convention, spoke out right here on Bills that changed the courts of State Government. This Chamber has witnessed the historic first of seating John W.E. Thomas, the First black Representative in Illinois, who introduced the first civil rights legislation in Illinois and Lottie Holman O'Neill, the first woman Representative seated in the year 1923, and this Chamber witnessed too, the Centennial observances of the birth of Stephen A. Douglas in 1913, and Abraham Lincoln in



1909, and I would like to suggest to you today that the remodeling of this Chamber symbolizes in a very real sense the dramatic changes that we have seen in our State Legislature in recent years. Changes to meet the needs of people such as more frequent Sessions, more efficient facilities and better pay in staff as people have come to recognize the heavy demands, heavy burdens that are placed on our Legislators. This is as it should be, just as history has been made here in the past, so it will continue to be made in the years ahead. I'm sure all of you recall that in the Federalist papers, a great deal of attention was focused on the concepts of Representation. Originally the idea of a House and a Senate was based on the notion that the Senate would be elected according to property or territory and the House would represent the people directly. People still look to the House of Representative here and States around the nation and in Washington itself as the House of the people and I would like to suggest that it be in that spirit that today we rededicate this Chamber, may this always be the House of the people. Thank you."

Clabaugh: "I would like next to present to you the Honorable Robert C. Underwood, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Illinois."

Chief Justice Robert Underwood: "Governor Walker, distinguished State Officers, President Harris, Speaker Blair, Members of the General Assembly and guests. It is a very pleasant privilege for me to join you this afternoon in the rededication of this very beautiful and important Chamber. This remodeling actually... it seems to me is symbolic of renewal in government, a renewal which forges a strong government, a government responsive to the needs of the Democratic society. I think each branch of our government needs to be mindful of its





continuing obligation to renew itself, preserving from the past those things which are useful and discarding those things which are merely relics of a bygone era no longer useful and perhaps only fashionable. In 1964, as all of us know.. our citizens revitalized the judicial branch of government. They further refined it in 1970, and also in 1970, the Executive and Legislative branch were revitalized. In view of the changes which were wrought by the Constitution, those of use who share the privilege of serving in the Executive and the Legislative and in the Judicial branches of our government, are challenged, I think, to re-evaluate own performance in the light of our revised charter and also in the light of the increasingly serious problems that face this day and nation, just as this historic Chamber has undergone the visible improvement so, too, must government be visibly improved to the renewed dedication on the part of its officers, including the men and women who share the honor and the responsibility of occupying the chairs in this Chamber. Every person involved in government but especially, I think, those among us who have been elected to office by our fellow citizens, should rededicate himself to the proposition that it is our individual responsibility and our joint responsibility to leave to our successors a government which is more vital and better able to serve the needs of the people of the State of Illinois. I would like to take just one moment to paraphrase what I consider to be an inspiring oath. It is an old superstition many years... many centuries ago by the citizens of the City of Athens. It reflects an attitude I think and a sense of commitment, most appropriate for those of us who serve in public. As paraphase, I quote, 'we will never bring disgrace to this, our State, by an act of dishonesty or cowardice on our part, or ever desert those who labor in the cause of good



government, we will fight for the idea and the sacred things of this State, both alone or with many. We will revere and obey the State laws and do our best to incite a like respect in those about us who are prone to annul or to set them at naught. We will strive unceasingly to quicken the public sense of civic duty, those in all these ways we will transmit this State, not less but greater and more beautiful than it was transmitted to us." I wish you well in labors here and I particularly thank you, for the opportunity to participate in these rededication ceremonies. Thank you."

Speaker Clabaugh: "And, now I present to you, the Honorable Senator William Harris, President of the Senate of Illinois. Mr. Harris."

President Harris: "Representative Clabaugh, Governor Walker, Mrs. Walker, Distinguished Constitutional Officers, my colleagues in the General Assembly, and friends. I'm really pleased to have been invited to participate in this rededication of this truly beautiful Chamber. For almost a hundred years this Chamber has been the scene of the enactment of Illinois law. That product is now history and part of the fabric of the stuff of which Illinois is made and that is something truly magnificent, the product of Illinois citizenry. This magnificent and beautiful room physically can contribute to an increase in our effectiveness. I think it is important for us today to think in terms of our challenge and continuing the kind of service that we know can come from our deliberations in this Chamber. There are unmet needs, there is unfinished business and it is with a sense of exhilaration that I join in the enthusiasm for the acceptance so to speak, of this beautiful Chamber rededication the good that can come from the work with. Thank you."

Speaker Clabaugh: "Now, I would like to present to you, the



Honorable Jack E. Walker, State Senator and a former Speaker of the House of Illinois."

Senator Walker: "Thank you, very very much. Representative Clabaugh, the Dean of the House, Governor Walker and Mrs. Walker, orther State Officials, my colleagues in the Senate, former colleagues in the House and to show you that there is votes among them people than there are those people, my good friend Ivan Petefish. Standing here brings back many fond memories, I can remember my first term, 1957, Warren Woods standing up here and calling us the greatest deliberative Body on the face of the earth. I still agree with that... deliberative, but sometimes occasionally noisy, as I recall it, but you still do and always have done a good job over here. I remember enjoying my years here as Whip, which was a very nice position... that means you get to float around this side of the aisle and occasionally get caught floating on this side and you get run back to this side. Then to Majority Leader, that wasn't so good, you had to stand at your mike... and after wandering around as Whip, I had some trouble doing that. The Speaker's job, Bob, as you and I know, and the former Speakers, the gavel is the easy part of it. I watched Bob Blair today try and get back to this Chambers, there is always those with something very urgent. It's the hours you spend as Speaker, Bob, and I know what those hours are, that are the toll taking times. I've watched the floor of the House, I've seen those infrequent speeches where razor sharp minds were revealed... Charlie Clabaugh, to name one, back on where Stan Weaver is now, Eddie Leaman, very seldom was up but when he was he had something to say and to be non-partisan on this side of the aisle, Larry DiPrima, and numerous others. I've seen as a yonger Legislator, older Legislators and point of service, trying sometimes disparingly, to share their hard wond wisdom



the fruit of their experience... often painful, with the younger Legislators and in turn I have attempted as an older Legislator, that is in point of service not age... that painting up there is getting younger all the time, where I seems to be changing a little bit. I've seen the older Legislators trying to part that same knowledge as they progress in point of service down here to the younger Legislators. As Speaker, I had the privilege of seeing something that very seldom happens, I remember the day that Eddie Wallbanks walked from that side of the aisle over to this side of the aisle and subsequently, Bill Barr walked from that side of the aisle to this side of the aisle and I've never admitted this to Clyde Choate, before but I thought it was a good swap, in fact if I remember correctly Tony Scariano, says, 'aren't we supposed to get something in addition', I said, 'you have, you've got a left handed pitcher'. It was mentioned there by Chief Justice that Lincoln and Douglas served here. As I recall it, Lincoln lost his first attempt at public office, I tried to follow in his footsteps but I lost my last attempt. Bob, I appreciate the invitation to participate, as you stated, I still say the House will be a basic reservoir from which action to insure responsive, responsible and accountable government in Illinois, I say the House will still continue to initiate that and, Bob, my friend in closing, I would like to say this... '74 has been a good year but it has been a little rough on Ex-speakers and Speakers..."

Speaker Clabaugh: "Senator maybe it was Abe Lincoln that got things out of place instead of you, I lost my first attempt and by golly I didn't lose my last one. Now, I would like to present to you the Honorable Clyde Choate, Minority Leader of the House of Representatives."

Choate: "Thank you. Thank you, very much, Mr. Chairman, of



this fine event and the Dean of our House of Representatives, Governor and Mrs. Walker, Chief Justice Underwood, Speaker Blair, President Harris, all of you State Officers, my colleagues of the House and the Senate and my good friends all. I personally want to pay tribute to the Speaker, for thinking of and bringing about this historical event, the dedication of the new Chambers for the House of Representatives, because the Capitol Building of any state is a showcase for the government of that states people. Inevitable visitors from other states will compare the Capitol Building to their own and to the other Capitol Buildings that they have seen throughout the fifty states. And, I think that the Legislative Chambers of any State Capitol usually attracts the greatest number of such visitors because, during a Session particularly, it is where the visible action is taking place, it's where the visitors and especially, yes, the youths of this State, the school children... see government in action and for this reason we do not feel primarily that the renovation of this old and beautiful Chamber was done only for those of us privileged to be Members and to have seats on the floor of this House of Representatives. Instead, I'm sure that each of you will agree with me in believing that the changes made in this Chambers have been planned to also allow the citizens of Illinois to take greater pride in the symbol of their state governemnt. Also, the renovation of this House Chamber has contirbuted to the efficiency of those of us who are privileged to serve. Many of you can remember, I'm sure that Charlie Clabaugh can remember, with me when I first came to this Legislature we had the old roll top desk with the ink wells and then we renovated and had new desks, today we are taking a giant step forward as far as I'm concerned to increase the efficiency of the individual Member of the Legislature, because you



can remember just a short time back, as an example one, when you had to leave the floor of the House to talk to your constituents and governmental officials, regarding Legislation, as an example now, you can talk to your constituents and you can talk to interested governmental leaders from your desk and remain on the floor and to do the job to which we were all elected to do. As had been said here today, many historical decisions have been made in this very Chamber and I'm positive that many more historical decisions will be made in the future. And, to sit here today is to feel that... truthfully you are a part of history. Those of us who are seated today at our desks, appreciate the opportunity to serve as Representatives of the people of this great State of Illinois and we feel privileged that our fellow citizens have entrusted us with the great responsibility of being their voices in the making of laws and the amending or the elimination of those statutes which are outdated or do not reflect the wishes of the people of this State. I want to join with each and every one of you today and yes, all the citizens of this great State in taking pride as we dedicate the new House Chambers, which I personally feel is a vital part of the overall rehabilitation of a beautiful and stately Capitol and the Capital Complex. Thank you, very much."

Speaker Clabaugh: "Yes, Clyde, I have one of those roll top desks and we bought the desk and the chair for seven dollars and a half and had the chair upholstered, it costed me a hundred and seventy-three dollars, give up hope... then rather than to do it with the desk, gave that to one of my daughters and let her do it. I would like to present the Honorable W. Robert Blair, Speaker of the Illinois House of Representatives."

Speaker Blair: "Thank you. Representative Clabaugh, Mrs. Clabaugh, Governor Walker, Mrs. Walker, Chief Justice



Underwood, President Harris, Constitutional Officers, Dr. Johnson, and my fellow Representatives. As I stand here today, I can say, without fear of contradiction, that there is no more honorable or noble ambition one can have than to be elected to serve as a Representative in the General Assembly of Illinois. The physical beauty and comfort of this renovated Chamber is truly a fitting setting for the magnificent processes of Democratic government which takes place within its walls, but no trappings of power or handsome furnishings are or, ever have been necessary, for this or any Legislative Body to function in the name of the people. From our foundings as a nation, from our Revolution to our approaching Bicentennial, it has been the Legislative institution that has done most to achieve our ambitions as a free society, as a society based upon laws, we have made the Legislature a supreme power that is not to say a power unrestrained or absolute but rather a power conferred by the people to which they voluntarily submit. The acceptance of the supreme power of the people by this General Assembly is a sacred bond and trust that none should and few abuse. Lawmakers is a title that we all enjoy and indeed lawmaking is our most important responsibility. Even the most senior among us will admit that time and repetition cannot dull being a part of this lawmaking process, yet one has only his own eloquence to measure and communicate the personal traits and satisfactions that stems from his or her participation. Certainly, we would hope that those citizens of Illinois who visit our lawmaking proceedings would find this Chamber's Members respectful of their rights and always ready to act to preserve their liberty. We would hope too, that they would never measure us by the mere physical attractiveness of this Chamber, time and use will slowly, but inevitably, tarnish the peak of beauty and



condition we view here today, but neither time nor occasion should erode or diminish the vitality of our acts. It is our ability to respond with intelligence, with courage and with sensitivity to the aspirations of all our people that will help our acts in doing, we must never be timid in protecting the rights of those we serve nor can we ever lack the initiative to find a way and means to help those in need. Our agenda for the future are crowded with ideas, some very new, a few very old, but in every case we hope, individually and collectively, to exercise the power of the Legislature for the enhanced benefit of our society. I am confident that this beautifully renovated Chamber will be an asset in the conduct of the decision making processes that will shape our government in the years to come. Now, as Speaker of the House and on behalf of every Representative serving in the 78th General Assembly, I would like to express the hope that this House of Representatives will always dedicate itself and its Chamber to the service in the name of and to the people of Illinois. To commemorate this rededication of our Chamber, we have attached a plaque to the face of the Clerk's podium and it has a brief inscription noting the date of this rededication ceremony and a listing of the officers of the House of Representatives of the 78th General Assembly."

Speaker Clabaugh: "You all seem to enjoy some humorous experiences that Jack Walker told about and might I impose briefly for one in which I... by which I know. It involved a former Member of the House... Frank Holten, who served for about over fifty years, sat in the seat where Leland Kennedy sits and in 1949, the first Session under the late Governor Stevenson, Frank was made Chairman of the Committee on Conservation and Waterways. Frank was fairly uneducated but very wise, loved and





respected by all and early in the Session a... one of the administration Bills came down, twenty-five Members so, the Clerk said, on the Committee and Frank, voted first and he voted 'aye', the vote went through and when it got to the end obviously one Democrat was adjutant and the vote was twelve for and twelve against and he turned to the Clerk and said, I vote 'aye'. Shea said, Mr. Speaker, you voted 'once... Frank had a little trouble with his false teeth and he waid, well I vote 'aye', how else could we get the Bill out? He reported it out with thirteen 'ayes' and twelve 'nays' and no question was rised. Now our House Chaplin, Dr. Johnson, will give the Benidiction."
